
truth and error. Let us be of the truth, walk in the light

A History of the Present Latter Rain Outpouring of the Holy Spirit known as the Apostolic or Pentecostal Movement. By B.F. Lawrence

Article I-Back to Pentecost

There is, in the religious world of today, a great activity of the Lord's Spirit known as the Pentecostal or Apostolic Faith Movement. This movement of God has resulted in the salvation of hundreds of thousands of sinners, both in so-called Christian lands and in those called heathen. Tens of thousands have been healed of various diseases; other hundreds of thousands have received a Pentecostal Baptism in the Holy Spirit; lunatics and demoniacs have been restored to reason and to peace; believers have been brought into a vital touch with God which has meant a tremendous increase of faith in, and knowledge of, Him; hundreds have felt the missionary zeal of the first evangelists and have gone to the uttermost parts of the earth in one of the most spontaneous and widely spread missionary efforts the world has seen since the days of Pentecost.

THE AIM OF THE MOVEMENT.

The honest-hearted thinking men and women of this great movement, have made it their endeavor to return to the faith and practice of our brethren who served God prior to the apostasy. They have made the New Testament their rule of life. There are some in the Movement, it is true, who have allowed their imaginations to lead them into fanaticism. These have been a grief to themselves, the Lord who died for them, and to us who love the truth. We, however, refuse to let the failure of some who have gone too far cause us to swing to the other extreme and stop short of the fulness of God. It is also true that in some phases of faith and practice we have failed to recover the whole of our New Testament inheritance; but this one thing we do, forgetting the things that lie behind, we press forward to the perfect purpose of our God.

This effort, which is so general throughout the move ment, has had a peculiar effect upon those who were exercised thereby. The older denominations have a past which is their own in a peculiar sense; they can trace the beginnings of their church and the course of its history subsequent to its foundation. The time between the beginning and the present has been sufficient to establish precedent, create habit, formulate custom. In this way they have become possessed of a two-fold inheritance, a two-fold guide of action, a two-fold criterion of doctrine -the New Testament and the church position. The Pentecostal Movement has no such history; it leaps the intervening years crying, "Back to Pentecost." In the minds of these honest-hearted, thinking men and women. this work of God is immediately connected with the work of God in New Testament days. Built by the same hand, upon the same foundation of the apostles and prophets, after the same pattern, according to the same covenant, they too are a habitation of God through the Spirit. They do not recognize a doctrine or custom authoritative

unless it can be traced to that primal source of church instruction, the Lord and His apostles.

THE FRUIT OF THE AIM.

We are bound to admit that, in the beginning of the work, this habit of mind was fruitful in confusion; it could not be otherwise. Paul, inspired of God, found when he came up to Jerusalem, that his doctrine was in perfect harmony with that of Peter. We make no claim to such apostolic inspiration. However, mark this, you who cavil at the confusion, it requires just that recklessness of disposition which produced the confusion to inspire men to throw off the shackles of custom and launch out into ways so old that moderns call them new. Men who are the slaves of custom and precedent have never, in any of the fields of human activity, gained new ground or blazed new trails. That with which you are now familiar and content was in your father's day decried as an innovation.

This reversion to the New Testament was directly responsible for the Movement, as we shall see as we continue our history. It is also responsible for another thing, viz. the absence of any serious effort on the part of the movement to trace an historical connection with the primitive church. There are those among us who believe that the phenomena of the Holy Spirit, for which we so strongly stand, never was entirely absent from the church; perhaps this is true; but to tell the truth, all of us are indifferent about it. If we can so order our lives that they shall fit the New Testament, we care no more for a lack of evidence that the majority of professors of religion did so in the past than we do for the overwhelming evidence that the majority of them are not doing so today. We shall present a few reports of the work of God down through the ages, more for the purpose of providing a ground of expectation that such a work was permanent in the church than in an effort to trace any historical connection with the primitive believers. If we can establish a fellowship of faith and practice we shall be abundantly satisfied.

THE DETAILS OF THE AIM.

And now perhaps you are asking, "In what particulars are you so earnestly striving to revert to primitive Christianity?" The answer is of course, "In every way." We recognize the fundamentals of Christianity, we do not slight them, but in addition, we are laboring to obtain that supernatural character of the religion which was so pre-eminently a mark of it in the old days. We do not mean to say that those who still believe in the new birth have wholly lost this, but we desire a return to New Testament power and custom along all those lines of activity which made evident beyond controversy that the church was the living body of a living Christ. We believe that healing for the body, expulsion of demons. speaking in other tongues, were in early times the result of an activity of the Holy Spirit in direct harmony with, nay. stronger still, a direct result of the divine attitude toward the church and the world. Further, we hold that this attitude was the only one consistent with the divine nature. If this is true, then with the writer of the Letter to the Hebrews we say, "Jesus Christ is the same yester-day, today and forever," and expect the immutable nature to maintain an unchanged attitude accompanied by the same glorious results.

THE IMMUTABILITY OF GOD.

Upon this point of the immutability of God depends all the value of the Bible as a revelation of God; all the value of Christianity as a real, proper comforting form of worship of God.

First, The Bible as a revelation of God. The Canon of Scripture was closed some eighteen hundred years ago; there has been no "year book" issued to keep pace with heavenly developments. If God, in character, attitude, affection, purpose or power, has removed from the place in which the scripture leaves Him, we do not know where to find Him. Mormonism and Christian Science (falsely so-called) profess to have information of a later date than that contained in the Bible, but this information contradicts that which we have obtained from the Scriptures, and we are rejecting it upon that very ground. Our very rejection of these modern messages compels us to admit that we believe that the God of the Bible is the God of today. If we make this admission, why not go all the way with it and allow God to manifest Himself in the church today as He was pleased to do in the days of our predecessors in His House.

Second, *Christianity as a real, proper, comforting* form of worship. This form of worship is founded upon the Bible and upon the Bible's God. It tells us to draw nigh to God, to love Him, to trust Him. It does this because the God with whom it was acquainted in the days of its inception was of the nature that delighted to have man do these things. If He has changed, Christianity is at fault, it does not give a real form of worship.

Again, Christianity instructs us how to draw nigh, and this instruction was founded on the character, nature, attitude, etc., of God. If He has changed, we no longer have a proper form of worship.

In bidding us draw nigh to God, Christianity tells us that He will receive us, love us, comfort us, defend us, strengthen us, supply all those various needs which only such a one can supply. If God has altered, we no longer have a comforting worship.

THESE SIGNS SHALL FOLLOW.

Mark 16:15-18 declares two things; first what will happen to a believer of the gospel; and, second, what will happen to an unbeliever. Of the believer it is declared that he will be saved and that certain signs shall follow him. The orthodox churches admit that the fifteenth and sixteenth verses contain a perpetual commission and promise. Why not admit also that the Seventeenth and eighteenth present a perpetual description of the activities of the believer. There are no special classes of believers mentioned.

There are only three reasons why these signs do not follow in the church today. First, God may not desire to do these things; second, God may no longer be able to do these things; third, men may not allow God to do these things.

First, God may not desire to do these things. If God ever did these things to edify, and bless men, and it can be proved that they would still bless and edify, then the refusal of God to do them would create serious question as to whether He might not, in time, lose all affection for us and view our eternal loss with equanimity.

It is the excuse of many that medical science has made such progress that we do not now need the help of God in Miracle working. So long as the hearses daily carry victims of the ignorance of medical men; so long as the lame, the halt, the blind, the lunatic continue to defy the most advanced methods of that vaunted science, so long do we need the kind of help which God vouchsafed to blind Bartimeous, to the lame man at the Gate Beautiful, to the demoniac in the Gaddarene tombs. This is not an arraignment of the medical fraternity the world owes a great deal to them—but God can still outwork the arm of flesh.

Second, *God may be able to do these things.* If not, why longer a weakening, failing God to save from sin and hell? And the attacks of professors upon these manifestations of God's power have bred a doubt in men along every line.

Third, Professed believers may not allow God to do these things. And here you have the real reason. "These signs shall follow them that believe." When men will not believe, the signs have no one to follow.

Lastly, every thing in creation is either changing or is subject to change. God alone can say, "I Am That I Am." He alone can say, "I contain within myself all the principles of life and being necessary to an immutable, eternal existence. Time, conditions, environments do not affect me. I created them and am independent of them." It is this immutability that makes God an object of perfect faith.

Because these things are most certainly true, we are diligent in searching the Scriptures that we may discover those conditions which made it possible for the power of God to manifest itself in the midst of our ancient brethren. We count nothing of their faith and practice too small or too difficult to imitate, inasmuch as it was practiced and believed upon such authority and with such results.

We are conscious that the pursuit of such a course, the acknowledgment of such an ambition, will attract the scorn and opposition of those who are wise in their own conceits and who are satisfied with that condition of affairs which ministers to their personal profit. But we are encouraged in the recollection that our Lord and His apostles made such a profession and endured opposition even unto blood. We are happy in following them and, by suffering with the Master of the House, prove the legitimacy of our claim to membership in that House.

OUR INTENTIONS.

This department of the paper will publish, from week to week, articles dealing with the rise and progress of this great movement. We shall endeavor to trace, where possible, the conditions that allowed the activity of the Spirit, the results of that activity; discovering where we can the characteristics and methods prevalent. We believe that this will glorify God, edify the saints, and attract the attention of those who may thereby be led into a fuller fellowship with God.

We shall be glad to hear from those who are acquainted with the details of the Lord's work. In writing to us about these matters, always give dates, locations, names as far as possible. We cannot use indefinite information in this department.

Pray that God may use us to His glory and that this department may be a thing pleasant in His eyes.

HINTS REGARDING DIVINE HEALING.

We must constantly ask God to protect us from sickness. "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty." Ask God to hedge us in as He did His servant Job; that He will build the hedge around us, that the enemy cannot reach us. The hedge consists of the Word, the blood and the Spirit. "Be filled with the Spirit" is a command.

When God wished to place the "tree of life" out of the reach of man, he surrounded the tree with swords. God's sword, or the Word of God, will protect His children from the power of the enemy. Study it morning, noon and night; if possible carrying a portion with you as you go about your work. Ask the Lord to keep you under the blood, for when Satan, or his demons, see the blood they must pass you by.

Everyone should pray several times a day that God will maintain His hedge around them, protecting them from sickness, accident and every power of the enemy. In most lives today only a dead Christ reigns. It is so easy to imagine Christ dying on a cross, but many never realise that He arose again and is alive today; that His power is just the same as when He healed the sick on earth. A glimpse of faith at a dead Christ will bring healing, but health is only found when we receive the living Christ—until He lives in us. We must learn to draw from Christ's resurrection life the strength of His resurrected body. He alone can teach us to do this.

Take an example of a babe and a nursing bottle. I can take the bottle, wash the nipple, heat the milk, put the milk in the bottle, place the nipple to the child's mouth, but my part stops here. The child may starve before my eyes if he does not learn to draw his food. So we must learn to take from the Lord even as the branch draws from the vine. Jesus said, "If any man thirst, let Him come unto me and drink." We must come and drink if we would receive our healing. Many have the faith to come but stop just there—they do not drink —they fail to draw the spiritual food He provides, and go on, half starving, while a few, praise the Lord, "drink," are fed, nourished and kept growing—strong men and women, monuments for the cause of Christ.

It seems that Israel of today is slow to believe the promises of God. The seeker after health comes to God's ministers who minister to him in the name of Jesus, pointing to the risen Christ. But the seeker turns to his symptoms and says, "I feel just as bad as I did before I was ministered to; my back aches just as badly, my head pains me!" Of course it does, dear one. Why shouldn't you feel bad, you are looking the wrong way. You must look beyond symptoms to God. The Lord may allow your symptoms to remain after He has undertaken your case and your healing commences; or even when the healing is nearly completed, to test your faith. The devil may put aches and pains upon you that have nothing to do with the disease you are trusting God to deliver you from. You must pay as little attention as possible to symptoms and keep your mind fixed on Christ.

If after the "fiery serpents" had bitten the children of Israel, they had insisted on looking at their bites instead of fixing their eyes upon the brazen serpent, they would not have been healed. God's people today, insist upon looking at their bites and pains and aches, and in nursing and talking about them, refusing to look up at the risen Christ. Stop looking down. Look up!

Never talk over your ailments with others after being ministered to; and taking your case to the Lord, leave it with Him. Pray with your neighbor who is sick, but, except in the way of instruction, say little to him about his sickness. Never mention your own aches and pains to anyone but the Lord. He is your Physician, treat Him fairly. It is a well-known fact that talking health actually helps to hasten ones recovery; while allowing the mind to rest upon disease, and worse vet, talking about disease, causes doubt in our own mind as well as in others, and as doubt is the opposite of faith, healing is hindered. School yourself to act health. When Jesus cleansed the lepers he told them "to go and show yourselves to the priests," a thing they were not allowed by the law to do. As they started to go, acting health, on the way they were healed, in the act of obedience; they acted health and healing was the result.

When the Lord healed the writer of a disease of sixteen years duration which had baffled the skill of the best physicians, the first lesson He taught me was acting health. While so sick I could scarcely lift my head from the pillow, the message came, "Do you believe that I, the Lord, am able and willing to heal you?" My heart replied, "Yes Lord, I believe." "Well, if you believe I have undertaken your case, and have taken me for your Healer, act as if you believed; get up and dress yourself and go about your work." I obeyed, all the symptoms of disease remaining.

The work I had planned for that day was a washing. Not an encouraging prospect for me, who could, looking at the natural only, scarcely walk about the house. Again I obeyed and attempted the week's washing, really feeling too sick to stir. After completing the work, the symptoms disappeared. Attempting the seemingly impossible opens the channel through which the supernatural current flows and healing is the result. Yes, think health, talk health. act health and God will hear your words and see your actions, making both true.

After giving your case over to the Great Physician, do not tamper with medicines, drugs or remedies, which are all right for the children of the world, but not for God's children. "I am the Lord that healeth thee," saith Jehovah. Some who claim to trust God fully for their bodies are constantly tampering with natural remedies. They think it no harm to use lemonade for a cold, or hot water for a pain or bruise, a plaster for aches, and ask if it is not right to apply alcohol for weakness, not seeking to understand that the use of the natural interferes with the workings of the supernatural, always retarding and sometimes preventing the healing. One says, "When Jesus healed the blind man he used clay." Yes, but this was simply to try the man's faith, not because there was any virtue in the clay. If clay contained virtue sufficient to heal the blind, the secret would have been known long ago and all who were blind would see today. We read, "By His Word He healed them," and "according to their faith was the promise." If you have entered into the "kingdom of God." you are no longer under Satan's rule, and the natural need not always be recognized.

If, unavoidably, you are obliged to sit in a draft, get the feet wet, lose sleep, go without food or eat improper food, do not expect sickness, but ask the Lord for deliverance from the old time bondage. First be sure that you are doing God's will, then step out on the promise, "As thy days so shall thy strength be." Too many Christians do not realize their birthright. God's cause may be suffering, but they cling to the natural. They cannot be broken of their rest, they say. And just as sure as they step out of the old time "ruts" Satan binds them. Beloved, I am in the Kingdom of Heaven and under supernatural law, and if I break these laws I must suffer. I am not bound to the law of the world regarding health, only as I allow Satan the Master to blind and bind me. I do not teach or disregard the laws of nature, but I do entreat the Christians to be free from the bondage of Nature's laws. After asking the Lord to heal you in the name of Jesus, thank Him for it. In other words, praise Him.

Before I was healed I heard one say, "Certainly, if you have faith sufficient for your deliverance, of course you will praise and thank the Lord for what He has promised to do." The baby in a Christian household was sick and given up to die. His little sister praved for her little brother and then came to the broken hearted mother, telling her not to cry for baby would soon be well. "How do you know." said the mother. "O, I prayed to God and then I said thank you." "Why did you say thank you, baby is growing worse every hour." "Yes, but God says if ye ask anything in my name I will do it, so I just asked Him and I was so glad that baby brother would live that I said thank you God." It is needless to say that the baby lived.

If we older children would learn to praise more and talk less, less sickness would be our lot. Songs of praise alone have many times been known to cast out demons from the room and from individuals. Beloved, would you be made whole? "He is the same yesterday, today and forever." "As your faith is, so shall it be unto you."

A BLESSED EXPERIENCE.

I feel I should tell the world of God's wonderful power and of the way He has been dealing with me in the last few days. I was a strong opposer of church worship and I had my own ideas of getting salvation. When people talked to me about going to the altar it seemed quite a delusion to me. I said I could get saved any time I wanted to at home. But the Pentecostal people came and preached repentance and the baptism of the Holy Ghost and the signs to follow. They taught repentance. not only as a deep God-given sorrow for sin, but, as a complete turning away from every known sin, Isa. 55:7, and that a sinner must be born again, and become a new creation, a fit subject to receive the gift of the Holy Ghost, and that He must wait for the promise of the Father and that he should receive it with the Bible evidence according to Acts 2:4.

Jan. 6. "For He doth not afflict willingly nor grieve the children of men." Lam. 3:33.



RULES.

1. Ask only questions of real interest on which you honestly are seeking light, and not for controversy.

 Ask only questions about religious matters that can be answered from the Bible or History; don't ask for interpretation of dreams or visions. We do not have the gift to interpret these.
Make questions as short as possible, and do not expect long exhaustive answers.

4. Sincere questions on controverted matters will be answered by giving a short explanation of what each side of the controversy holds, and the reader left to judge which is most correct according to the Bible.

5. Don't expect an answer in next issue of the paper after you ask it. Look in every issue until you find it printed under this department.

I. Who are the people sealed in Rev. 7:3, and what is meant by the sealing?

Ans. Rev. 7:3 itself says they are "servants of God," and it is clear from Rev. 7:4-8 that they are saints solely from the twelve tribes of Israel. They have not yet been sealed, and the sealing is to be with the Holy Ghost. See Eph. 1:13; 4:30 and 2 Cor. 1:21, 22.

2. Is an ordained Elder qualified to baptize his converts?

Ans. The Bible nowhere states exactly what officers are to baptize converts. But the commission to make disciples and baptize them (Matt. 28:16-19) was originally given to the Apostles or Eleven Disciples. These were preachers, and any Holy Ghost filled, clean, recognized preacher would certainly have a right to baptize. An Elder is really a preacher or teacher in the Bible sense of this term. Titus 1:5-9; 1 Tim. 3:1-7. But some assemblies appoint deacons who do not preach, but they call them elders. It is not customary everywhere for such local nonpreaching elders to baptize; but there is nothing in Scripture to make it wrong for them to baptize, if need so require. If it is all right with their assembly, and there are those that desire it and who will be satisfied with it at their hands, there should be no objection to it. Especially is this true if God gave him some converts. An exhorter or Deacon, filled with the Holy Ghost, in the absence of others more customary, and if approved so to do by their brethren, might baptize converts without violating any scripture command or precept.

3. Should one speaking with tongues and claiming the baptism, but still using tobacco, be disfellowshipped as a sinner or be still treated as a brother in Christ?

Ans. It depends somewhat on the light the brother has and on whether all other points were in his favor. No child of God should use tobacco. It is a dirty, filthy and injurious habit, as even unprejudiced sinners admit. I would preach on it so hot that the fellow would get under conviction and quit it.

4. Is taking medicine a sin?

Ans. The Bible does not exactly say it is a sin; but King Asa, when sick, sought the physicians instead of the Lord, and God let him die. See 2 Chron. 16:12-13. He may let all others (saints who have the light) die likewise if they trust man more than God. All whose time has not come to die anyhow, can get healing who will meet God's conditions of repentance, faith and obedience. I would not advise disfellowshipping a saint who does nothing worse

than take medicine or have a doctor, through weakness of faith. Rather pray for and build up the faith of such.

5. Is the Man Child of Rev. 12:5 the Bride of Christ? Ans. Some hold the Man Child is Christ Himself, but I do not so see it. I consider the Man Child a type of the Overcomers. Read Rev. 12:5 and compare with Rev. 2:26-28. Every overcomer will be a part of the Bride; but I could hot say the Man Child was all the Bride. Another view s that the Man Child will include the raptured church which, as His body, provides "the fulness of Him who filleth all in all."

6. Who are the prophets that lie dead three days in $R\varepsilon v$. Chapter eleven?

Ans. It is somewhat uncertain. Some hold they are the church but I don't agree to this. Others hold they are the overcomers or first resurrection saints. This is unlikely. Others hold they are Enoch and Elijah who went to heaven without death and who will return, prophesy and be killed and raised up. This may be true. But at least, I believe they will be two real men and prophets whom God will raise up as witnesses for Him to do exactly what is there said they will do.

7. What is meant by being born of water in John 3:5?

Ans. All church fathers and preachers from the second century up to John Calvin in the 16th Century, held it referred to water baptism. (See Hastings Bible Dictionary on baptism.) Calvin denied this historic and traditional interpretation. Two other views are held. One is that the natural birth is referred to. This view is supported by the fact that Jesus goes right on in the next verse to speak of the birth of "the flesh." Still another view is that the "washing of the water by the Word" is referred to. See Eph. 5:26. Since Calvin, till recent years, most Protestants have followed Calvin while the Episcopal and Catholic churches have followed still the ancient view that it referred to water baptism. Alexander Campbell, in the last century, and all his followers since, have held it referred to baptism. In recent years many Baptists have deserted Calvin and hold with Campbell on it, but not with as much emphasis on the water as he.

Pentecostal saints, most generally, have denied the ancient and Campbell view, but more recently, many hold that it refers to water baptism as an external purifying symbol while the real internal birth is done by the Holy Spirit. See article on Christian Circumcision in Evangel No. 118.

8. Are we born of God or of the Spirit when we are saved?

Ans. Yes, we are born when we are saved, but what does it mean to have a full New Testament Salvation? Adam is called a "Son of God." (Luke. 3:28) because God brought him into existence. The angels are called sons of God (Job 1:6. This scene is in heaven. See 2:1-7). This is the sonship of creation, not that through the new birth by the Spirit. Solomon and the nation of Jacob are called sons, but these were not sons in the New Testament sense of being born again through faith in Christ and of the Holy Ghost. Before the death of Christ the Apostles were taught to call God their Father, but they were sons on Old Testament grounds, as the blood had not been shed nor the Spirit sent. So today, every one who has been quickened, made a new creature in Christ, renewed by the Holy Ghost, are sons of God, and have some sort of a birth of the Spirit. But without the full baptism with the Holy Ghost, all such are in an abnormal condition far below the normal New Testament experience for believers after the day of Pentecost. A normal apostolic Christian experience in its fulness is not to be found short of the receiving of the Holy Ghost as given in the baptism with the Spirit.

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Our petitions should be addressed to the FATHER, in the NAME of the SON, in the fervor of the HOLY SPIRIT.

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

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON. January 9, 1916. THE COMING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT.

Lesson Text.—Acts 2:1-13.

Golden Text.—Know ye not that ye are a temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? 1 Cor. 3:16. Leading Thought.—The giving of the

early rain. 1. The Spirit Descending. Vs. 1-4. We have before us that bit of scripture which has been made so very real to thousands of hearts the world over; and it will be impossible for us to reread it without a wave of refreshing, if our hearts are open and intent upon following God. To one who has felt the brooding of the Holy Ghost as on that day of Pentecost every word will burn like fire. The Holy Ghost himself proves the best interpreter of the meaning. May we all be anointed with fresh oil from the hand of our glorified Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Ten days of waiting the disciples had put in. They had had a sort of church election and apparently everyone had kept sweet. That was a test. It is rather evident that the disciples divided their time between the temple and the upper room in which most probably the last supper had been celebrated. Luke 24:53. The Day of Pentecost was the fiftieth day from the second day of Passover. It was noted in commemoration of the first-fruits of wheat harvest, and the Jews considered that it commemorated the giving of the law on Mount Sinai. This fact is deeply significant. Sinai is the strong type of Pentecost in the O. T. Read the account and see. Ex. 34: 1-28. Compare with this 2 Cor. 3:7-18. And then consider those scenes which we have seen with our own eves in the past nine or ten years, of God's glory revealed. Ah surely the ministration of the Spirit is glorious. It is fitting that the spirit, who alone can fulfill the law, should be given on the same day. "Fully come,"-What a God of order we have! He sent His Son in the fulness of time, and now He waits the time of scriptural completeness to fulfil His Word spoken through the prophet Joel.

"With one accord in one place" and has this not ever been the condition for God's most manifest working? The trouble is, we so foolishly allow the Enemy to slip in and break this "oneaccordness," the continuance of which would only intensify the working of God. Recall the account of the building of the tower of Babel, and what God said concerning their united purpose on that occasion. Oh the sad discord the most of us have had a hand in making! The dear Lord forgive us and give us a new appreciation of the "unity of the spirit." This "one-accordness" is referred to exactly seven times in the Book of Acts in a good connection; and three times in an evil one. Take your Concordance and look it up. It will be a help to you. There were three remarkable outward evidences of the Holy Spirit's presence,--- "a rushing, mighty wind," "Cloven tongues like as of fire," and the speaking "with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance." While each may have its symbolic meaning, these were actual manifestations of the Spirit's power. Then there was that inward manifestation that could not be seen, but was so very keenly and deeply felt. "They were filled with the Holy Ghost," and it was out of the abundance of their hearts that their mouths spake. Hallelujah for such a filling! A little farther in the Book we will see some other evidences and results of this mighty filling. And don't overlook the last clause of the 4th verse, "as the spirit gave them utterance."

2. The Amazed Multitude. Vs. 5-13. All nations were represented in this Jerusalem assemblage-it was a very opportune time for such a demonstration. Such an affair would soon be noised abroad. Their recognition of the disciples' lowly station only testified the more to the supernatural character of the event. And they likewise recognized the orthodox nature of their message,--it was about the wonderful works of God. Today the message has almost universally been concerning the Lord's second coming. In lands beyond the sea, from among the widows of Pandita Ramabai's School, word has

come of the clear testimony of the nearness of this event. The last two verses of the lesson are as faithful a picture now as then of the effect of such happenings on the assembled multitude. While some believe there are always those who are in doubt. And there are always those who view any supernatural moving of God from a purely natural stand-point. Wherever God pours out His Spirit there are always those who criticise, misjudge and slarder. But this did not deter the disciples from going right ahead: neither should it us It is the very time when we should leap for joy. And so it was God gave the former rain; and now we are made to rejoice in the drenching showers of the latter rain.

"Oh I'm glad the promised Pentecost has come

And the Latter Rain is falling now on some;

Pour it out in floods Lord on the parched ground,

Till it reaches all the world around."

It will be of great interest to our readers to note the following extract from the S. S. Illustrator in connection with this lesson:—

"The Spirit of Power." 2 Tim. 1:7.

"Began to speak with other tongues." V. 4. Power is the manifestation of the Spirit through the believer in the use of definite "gifts." 1 Cor. 12:7-10, 28-30. Mrs Carrie Judd Montgomery has published a tract telling how the gift of speaking in the Chinese language was given to her by the Spirit. Her speaking and singing in Chinese was recognized and understood by a missionary who had been working in China for seven years. This is a remarkable case, and seems very authentic, yet most Christians these days have to acquire strange languages in the ordinary way. Sometimes the Spirit helps remarkably in the study of foreign tongues, as the following testimony reported by Dr. Stearns will show. He says: A young woman, a professing Christian, but who had fallen into an ordinary worldly life was, by the Word, restored, quickened, built up, and led to desire earnestly to support her own missionary in the foreign field. From a small salary she cheer fully denied herself five dollars a month to have a Bible reader in Japan * * Sometime afterward she went herself as a missionary to Cawnpore, India, and has been marvelously helped in the study of the language, and owned in the conversion of souls through that same Word which so quickened her own soul. Listen to her testimony:

"I know that you will rejoice to hear that the prayers which you have so faithfully offered to our Father that I might be helped with the language, have been heard and answered to such an extent that I have been enabled to complete the nine books in the two languages, Hindu and Urdu, which are required in the first year's course, and appeared last week for my examination, successfully passing in all the books."

And this before she had been more than six months in the country, because she believed the promise "He that is perfect in knowledge is with thee." Job 36:4.

Mr. Reuter, a German pastor who has been visiting Japan, was for many years engaged in church work yet had never, as he said, known what it was to have a changed heart. This experience came to him in a Salvation Army meeting and since that time his one interest has been to tell people of Christ's love and of the power of salvation. He has gone from land to land preaching the Gospel and has already done this in twenty tongues. Mr. Loomis who met him in Japan says that his gift of acquiring languages seems almost miraculous. In twentythree days after reaching Japan he applied at the Bible House for appointment as a colporteur and it was found that already he spoke enough Japanese to be understood. In less than two months he sold thirty-two Bibles, 116 Testaments and 48,600 portions, going from house to house telling people that God loves them, visiting drinkshops and the Buddhist temples, receiving everywhere a ready hearing and respectable treatment.

POWER TO WITNESS. God's Protecting Care.

Some years ago a Christian farmer lived in a sparsely settled part of the country. Every Sunday he would hitch up his horse and carriage and drive his family to church, leaving only one person to care for the house. One beautiful Sunday the father left his little girl behind to look after the house. It was the first time that she had been considered old enough to do so, but she was not frightened, for was not the good watch dog Rover there to protect her?

She watched the carriage drive off and then she took the large Bible and, for an hour, read the wonderful stories. Then she went into the garden taking care to shut the door to hinder Rover from doing any damage. She sat down on the grass and soon went to sleep. It was past noon when she woke up. She went into the house and, as she was setting the table she noticed two men who were coming towards the door. They were dirty and untidy and did not look like Sunday visitors, but, with the spirit of hospitality which she had learned from her father, she opened the door and invited them to come in. The two men seemed quite surprised and amused by her simplicity and looked at one another smiling.

"Then you are alone in the house, little girl!" said the younger of the two sitting down.

"Yes, sir; Rover and I."

"Who is Rover?"

"He is the big dog; I am surprised that he has not barked at you."

"Dogs don't do us any harm; we don't let them," answered the other man.

"Never mind Rover. I don't think you know the object of our visit, little girl."

"No, sir; but I think you would like to have something to eat. You seem hungry."

"Sure, we are! Hurry up and get us something," said the elder one rudely.

"Don't frighten the young lady," said his comrade, and speaking to the little girl, added, "he is cross, because he is hungry."

Reassured, Mary soon set out a table covered with good things, and sat down with her guests.

The younger began to cut a slice of meat when Mary said gently, "Won't you thank God first?"

Making a significant sign he answered, "I forgot how, for it is scarcely one of my habits. You say grace yourself, little girl."

Mary seemed surprised, but standing up she said, "Make us truly thankful, O God, for this food which Thou givest us in Thy mercy, for Jesus Christ's sake, amen."

After eating voraciously, the men asked the little girl many questions,--when she expected her father, etc. They inquired if she were not afraid there alone, and hinted at burglars coming to rob the house.

"I am not at all afraid," she answered, looking him full in the face. "God will take care of me. I expect you know the Psalm which says, God will take care of those who trust in Him." "I cannot say that I know it. How

does it go-that Psalm?" "Here is one verse," said Mary, "The angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear Him, and delivereth them."

"And what are the words of the next verse?" he asked, pretending not to see the increasing impatience of his companion

"O, fear the Lord, ye His saints: for there is no want to them that fear Him. The young lions do lack and suffer hunger; but they that seek the Lord shall not want any good thing."

The man began to feel ill at ease. He moved in his chair. Finally, he got up and went over to the window, his companion quickly followed him. There, in low tones, they engaged in a conversation which became more and more excited. Finally the younger man said, "I tell you, Thomas, I will not do it, and if you try, we shall see which is the stronger." Mary heard no more, for the two went out. Presently one came back and said goodbye to Mary, whereupon they both departed.

That evening when the family came home, they found the dog Rover stretched out on the roadside, dead, but no other harm done. The two burglars did not leave off their evil ways. They were seized and deported to Australia. The older of them died unrepentant; but the younger man attended a service where he heard the Psalm which had made such an impression on him when little Mary had read it, years before. He repented of his sins, accepted Christ, and became an exemplary Christian. After a time he was paroled and subsequently released. He afterwards married and became a useful Christian. All this, dear young people, was the result of one little girl's perfect trust in God, and guileless testimony for her Savior. We hope that none of you will be ever subject to such an inadvertent test, but it is your calling to be always filled with the Holy Spirit, and your very life will speak for Jesus.-Sel.

THE APOSTOLIC FAITH ORPHAN-AGE.

Ningpo, China.

Much has happened since we last wrote you in August, so much that one scarcely knows where to begin in order to share the news with you.

Owing to the typhoon of which we wrote you, a wee girlie of one and a half years has been added to our family. Her parents, poor farmers, rendered homeless and starving as a result of typhoon, were about to sell her when some native Christians heard of it and persuaded them to send her to us. She was very weak and ill-nourished when we took her, but looks like a different child now. We have named her Muneng (Full Grace).

Several of the children have been ill, one quite seriously with an acute attack of dysentery, but we were again filled with praise as we saw the mighty hand of God stretched out on her behalf. We felt we could not spare our little Tse-eng and He gave her back to us. The others were attacks of Malaria from which He gave quick deliverances. This Autumn has been an exceedingly trying one, so much rain, resulting in an epidemic of Malaria and other fevers as well as damage to crops, etc.

The early rice crop was damaged by the typhoon, and the late crop by the continued rains just at harvest time. Already the prices of rice and native food are much higher than formerly and continue to increase. This means much suffering and distress among the multitudes of poor this coming winter, but Elijah's God is our God, and the Father of the orphans.

Our hearts have been deeply touched lately by many tokens of His love and care 'for our bodily as well as spiritual needs. He has sent us a gift of household furnishings for our own apartment. This came as a comfort for we had our rooms very sparsely furnished, believing in spending the money sent in.

as far as possible, for the Chinese, only using sparingly for our own personal needs. Most of our furniture was made from packing cases, neatly varnished, the work of our young carpenter friend. Now God, Himself, has provided us a very comfortable home. Praise His name.

Miss Webb would like to share one of her precious lessons learned during her illness. When in great pain, the Lord said, "In everything give thanks," The question naturally arose, Why? What for?-at such a time when one was crying for speedy relief! But He gave the spirit of obedience, and she did. After two days, Malaria developed. During the first attack, when in high fever, the Lord drew very near and whispered, "In everything give thanks," but this time very graciously giving the reason, because, "in everything ye are enriched by Him." We trust the enriching will be continuous for His glory and the blessing of others. The mission at Shin Tong has been rebuilt, since the damage by the great flood which was in China this year, but I haven't been able to build the top part yet, which is very necessary, for when it rains we cannot have meetings. This expense will be about \$75.00, making our total needs \$275.00 We need your prayers.

R. S. MCBRIDE-S. AMERICA.

We find the Indians here in the heathen state and almost void of clothing, downtrodden and forsaken by all except God and His Christ, and those that He has sent to reap the rippened grain for Him.

We desire an interest in your prayers as we need wisdom in dealing with these dear ones and also more finance than we have heretofore received, as we must turn this work for God into the Pentecostal channel for His glory. Will you dear ones in the home-land co-operate with us to this end for the glory of our Christ and these lost, downtrodden ones?

We have opened up a school and find that the Indians are eager to learn and are very apt. We have also opened up an industrial school and the women are taught to sew, bake, crochet, etc. and are learning rapidly. The men, when not at work in the fields of cane, are taught how to make tables and chairs for their homes as these things are unknown to them, and they take great pride in them. We make them out of boxes taken from one of the Leach stores, but we are limited in our manufacturing department from the fact that we have so few tools.

. We open the day with prayer and then we have school and the reading of the Word, and services every night except Saturday night.

Our services were interrupted Sunday night by a snake attending the service, and again on Monday, a large one came into the mission room and frightened the women very much, but was hastily dispatched with a gun. We killed three lizards in our house and some of the largest spiders that I have ever seen.

The Keltys are with us and are doing good work, as they have been in the Argentina for over five years, so don't forget them when you pray.

Wish I could send more, but I am a widow with only a pension for an income, and there is no assembly here, and I am the only one here that has the baptism. The natives are facing starvation in Jerusalem and all lower Palestine, and awful massacres are occuring in Armenia. I saw some who escaped, and it is beyond description. There is no immediate cause for alarm, but most Christian work has stopped and nearly all the workers have gone, and the darkness and powers of the enemy are great. Three native baptized saints and three German are all that are left at the present. Pray for them.

I found the work here in good order. 1 went to Cairo, but after' two day's search for Brother Doney, returned here to leave for New York today, but a dream and an interpretation stopped me. The brethren beg and pray me to stay, and their love is touching.
