# Infidels Who Tasted the Punishment of the Never Ending Age to Come.

Sir Francis Newport was trained in early life to understand the great truths of the Gospel, and while in early manhood it was hoped that He would become an ornament and a blessing to his family and the nation, the result was far otherwise. He fell into company that corrupted his principles and morals. He became an avowed infidel, and a life of dissipation brought on a disease that was incurable. When he felt he must die ..... he exclaimed as follows: "Whence this war in my heart? What argument is there now to assist me against matters of fact? Do I assert that there is no hell, when I feel one in my bosom? Am I certain that there is no after retribution, when I feel present judgment? ..... Wretch that I am, whither shall I flee from this breast?"

An infidel companion tried to dispel his thoughts, to whom he replied, "That there is a God I know, because I continually feel the effects of His wrath; that there is a hell I am equally certain, having received an earnest of my inheritance there already in my breast: that there is a natural conscience I now feel with horror and amazement, being continually upbraided by it with my impleties, and all my iniquities, and all my sins brought to my remembrance... O that I was to lie upon the fire that never is quenched a thousand years, to purchase the favour of God, and be reunited to Him again! But it is a fruitless wish. Millions of millions of years will bring me no nearer to the end of my torments than one poor hour. O eternity, eternity! Who can discover the abyss of eternity? Who can paraphrase upon these words-forever and ever?"

As his mental distress and bodily disease were hurrying him into eternity. he was asked if he would have prayers offered in his behalf; he turned his face and exclaimed, "Tigers and monsters! are ye also become devils to torment me? Would you give me prospect of heaven to make my hell more intolerable?"

Soon after, his voice failing, and uttering a groan of inexpressible horror, he cried out, "Oh, the insufferable pangs of hell!" and died at once, dropping into the very woe of which God gave him such an earnest, to be a constant warning to multitudes of careless sinners.

The infidel, Voltaire, feeling the stroke. that he realized must terminate in death, was overpowered with remorse. He at once sent for the priest. and wanted to be reconciled with the church. His infidel flatterers hastened to his chamber to prevent his recantation; but it was only to witness his ignominy and their own. He cursed them to their faces; and, as his distress was increas-

ed by their presence, he repeatedly and loudly exclaimed, "Begone! It is you who have brought me to my present condition. Leave me, I say; begone!

Hoping to allay his anguish by a written recantation, he had it prepared, signed it and saw it witnessed, but it was all unavailing. For two months he was tortured with such an agony as led him at times to gnash his teeth in impotent rage against God and man.. At other times in plaintive accents, he would plead, "O Christ! O Lord Jesus!" Then turning his face he would cry out, "I must die-abandoned of God and of men!'

#### THE POWER OF THE SPIRIT.

Jesus Christ contained enough of the Spirit and received enough of the Spirit to last His people all through the ages. He has dispersed the Spirit all through the ages and is now pouring out of His Spirit in a special way. The Spirit is being intensified to His people. Receive the Spirit in essence so it will take you through the dry periods.

The wind bloweth where listeth. The time comes when it is not blowing. Take in a good supply. Let all sails be fully set to take all the breeze; when the calm comes you will be so far on your journey. The wind will al-ways be of sufficient strength to carry you over cross currents and dangerous shoals. And when the wind is not blowing you can be in a wonderful calm, resting on the bosom of Him who is a Haven before you get into haven.

As his end drew near, his condition became so frightful that his infidel associates were afraid to approach his bedside. Still they guarded the door, that others might not know how awfully an infidel was compelled to die. Even his nurse repeatedly said, "For all the wealth of Europe I would never see another infidel die. It was a scene of horror that lies beyond all exaggeration.'

Tom Paine was born at Thedford. England, in 1737. He is widely known by his connection with the American and French revolutions and by his infidel writings.

During the session of the French Convention, Paine composed his infidel work, "Age of Reason," by which his name has gained an unenviable notoriety, and after the alteration of political circumstances in France he returned to America and there dragged out a miserable existence, indebted in his last illness for acts of charity to disciples of the very religion that he had opposed. Bishop Fenwick says: "A short time

before Paine died I was sent for by him.

October 19, 1918.

A decent elderly looking woman showed us into the parlour. "Gentlemen," said the lady," I really wish you may succeed with Mr. Payne, for he is laboring under great distress of mind, ever since he was told by his physician that he cannot possibly live and must die shortly. He is truly to be pitied. His cries, when left alone, are heart rending. 'O Lord. help me!' he will exclaim, during his paroxysms of distress; 'God help me! Jesus Christ. help me!'--repeating these expressions in a tone of voice that would alarm the house. Sometimes he will say, 'O, God!. What have I done to suf-fer so much?' then shortly after, 'But there is no God;' and then again, 'Yet, if there be, what would become of me hereafter?' Thus he will continue for some time, when on a sudden he will scream as if in terror and agony, and call for me by my name. On one occasion I inquired what he wanted. 'Stay with me,' he replied, 'for God's sake! for I cannot bear to be left alone.' Then said he, when I told him I could not always be in the room, 'Send even a child to stay with me, for it is hell to be left alone.' I never saw a more unhappy, a more forsaken man.'

"Having remained sometime in the parlour, we at length heard a noise in the adjoining room. We proposed to enter, which was assented by the woman, who opened the door for us. more wretched being in appearance I never beheld. His look was that of a man greatly tortured in mind, his eyes haggard, his countenance forbidding, and his whole appearance that of one whose better days had been one continued debauch."

Upon their making known the object of their visit, Paine interrupted the speaker by saying, "That's enough, sir, that's enough. I see what you would be about. I wish to hear no more from you, sir; my mind is made up on that subject. I look upon the whole of the Christian scheme to be a tissue of lies, and Jesus Christ to be nothing more than a cunning knave and imposter. Away with you and your God too! Leave the room instantly.

Among the last utterances that fell upon the ears of the attendants of this dying infidel and which have been recorded in history, were the words, "My God. my God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

David Hume, the deistical philosoopher and historian, was born at Edinburgh in 1711. In 1762 he published his work, Natural Religion. Much of his time was spent in France, where he found many kindred spirits as vile and depraved as himself. He died in Edinburgh in 1776, aged 65 years.

Hume, the most subtle, if not the most philosophical of the deists: who, by perplexing the relations of cause and effect, boldly aimed to introduce a universal skepticism and to pour a more than Egyptian darkness into the whole religion of morals.

The following account was published in Edinburgh where he died: About the end of 1776,a few months after the historian's death. a respectable looking

woman, dressed in black, came into the Haddington stage-coach while passing through Edinburgh. The conversation among the passengers, which had been interrupted for a few minutes was speedily resumed, which the lady soon found to be regarding the state of mind persons were in at the prospect of death. An appeal was made, in defense of infidelity, to the death of Hume not as only happy and tranquil, but mingled even with gaiety and humor. To this the lady said, "Sir, you know nothing about it; I could tell you another tale. Sir, I was Mr. Hume's house keeper for many years, I was with him in his last moments; and the mourning I now wear is a present from his relatives for my attention to him on his death bed; and happy would I have been if I could have borne my testimony to the mistaken epinion that has gone abroad of his peaceful and composed end. I have, sir, never till this hour opened my mouth on this subject, but I think it a pity the world should be kept in the dark on so interesting a topic. It is true, sir, that when Mr. Hume's friends were with him he was cheerful and seemed quite unconcerned about his approaching fate; nay, freqently spoke of it to them in a jocular and playful way; but when he was alone, the scene was very different; he was anything but composed, his mental agitation was so great at times as to occasion his whole bed to shake. And he would not allow the candles to be put out during the night, nor would he be left alone for a minute, as I had always to ring the bell for one of the servants to be in the room before he would allow me to leave it. He struggled hard to appear composed, even before me, but to one who attended his bedside for so many days and nights, and witnessed his disturbed workings-who freqently heard his involuntary breathings of remorse and frightful startings, it was no difficult matter to determine that all was not right within. This continued and increased until he became insensible. T hope to God I shall never witness a similar scene."

Altamont's frightful death has been recorded by Dr. Young as follows: The sad evening before the death of the heble youth, I was with him. No one was present but his physician and an intimate friend whom he loved and whom he had ruined. At my coming in he said, "You and the physician are come too late. I have neither life nor hope. You both aim at miracles. You would raise the dead!.....I have been too strong for omnipotence! I have plucked down ruin!" I said, "The blessed Redeemer—" "Hold! hold! you wound me! That is the rock on which I split—I denied His name!"

Soon after, I proposed prayer—"Pray, you that can. I never prayed. I cannot pray—nor need I. Is not heaven on my side already? It closes with my conscience. Its severest strokes but second my own." Observing that his friend was much touched at this, even to tears, with a most affectionate look, he said: "Keep those tears for thyself; I have undone thee—dost thou weep for me? That is cruel. What can pain me more?"

Here his friend, too much affected, would have left him. "No, stay—that thou mayest hope; therefore hear me. How madly I have talked! How madly thou hast listened and believed. But look on my present state, as a full answer to thee and to myself. This body is all weakness and pain; but my soul, as if stung up by torment to greater strength and spirit, is full powerful to reason, full mighty to suffer. And that which thus triumphs within the jaws of immortality, is doubtless, immortal. And as for a Deity, nothing less than an Almighty could inflict what I feel.

"I have not long to speak, my much injured friend, my soul, as my body, lies in ruins, in scattered fragments of broken thought. Remorse for the past throws my thought on the future. Worse dread of the future strikes it

With what an eye of distraction what a face of despair, he cried out, "My principles have poisoned my friend; my extravagances have beggared my boys; my unkindness has murdered my wife! And is there another hell? Oh! Thou blasphemed. yet indulgent. Lord God, hell itself is a refuge, if it hid me from Thy frown!"

Soon after his understanding failed, his terrified imagination uttered horrors not to be repeated, or ever forgotten. And ere the sun (which, I hope, has seen few like him) arose, the gay noble, ingenius, accomplished and most wretched Altamont expired.

518. Is the holy kiss commanded for all the men to kiss all the women or all the sisters to kiss all the brethren?

Ans. Some all down the Christian era have thought so and have put it promiscuously into practice. As a student of history I do not know one single group of saints which ever did this that did not fall into free-loveism. Hence the Pentecostal Movement is solidly against this practice. The sisters must confine their religious kisses to the sistors and the brethren to the brethren. We do not fellowship free-lovers.

519. What is the sin referred to in Rom. 5:14 which caused death to reign from Adam to Moses?

Ans. The sin of Adam which gave him a sinful nature which evil nature was inherited by all Adam's descendants.

520. If all those who take the mark of the beast receive when Christ comes torment day and night forever (Rev. 14:11) and all those who refuse to take this mark are killed by the beast, who will be left alive on earth for Christ to eign over during the millennium?

Ans. At first this seems unanswerable, but at least some light can be shed on it.

First. Often a passage speaks in wholesale terms which we might easily take as all inclusive, leaving no exceptions, but other passages dealing with details show there are exceptions. For instance 2 Thes. 2:8 seems to indicate that at Christ's coming the wicked antichrist beast will be literally consumed and destroyed. But Rev. 19:20, dealing more in detail, shows he is captured and put alive into the lake of fire. So many passages seem to imply the complete destruction of all living nations at Christ's coming, those in rebellion against Christ; but other passages show in detail that remnants will be left who will repent and submit to Christ.

Second. It is not said in Rev. 13:15 that the beast will actually kill every one that does not worship his image, it only says he has "power" to cause that they "should be killed." That there are exceptions and some shall escape death with great persecutions. is seen in the same chapter in case of the woman fleeing to the wilderness, and the earth swallowing up the attempts of the beast to destroy her. God will preserve some alive.

Third. Ancient Israel also illustrates the judgments of God. On the edge of Camaan they rebelled in unbelief and said God could not bring them in Joshua and Caleb stood true to God, and **God** said he would destroy in the wilderness all but Caleb and Joshua. But this wholesale destruction only applied to the responsible ones over 20 years of age. God exempted all under 20 and led them into the promised land. Remembering that the beast is a great politician, he may deal chiefly with legal voters of military age. If so, the majority under 20 might escape his mark, and so escape the wrath of Christ or even if they took it at the compulsion of the heads of families, if they repented when Christ destroyed these heads, Christ might exempt the minors as God did in Israel. More may be said but these are hints that suggest a Bible solution.

521. Does Thes. 1:7-10 refer to the beginning of the millennium?

Ans. Yes, in the main. The final judgment, however, will take place after the millennium. See 1 Cor. 15:23 for an example where things in the same verse are separated by two thousand years.

522. Will there be a chance for sinners and backsliders to get saved during the Tribulation and after the Rapture?

Ans. Yes, if they have not taken the mark of the beast, but most of them will take the mark of the beast in order to get bread, to do business and save themselves from persecution, and the result is shown in Rev. 14:9-12.

523. Will the Holy Spirit be taken out of the world when the Bride is taken up?

Ans. Some hold this, but I think it is rather the Spirit-filled saints that now hinders the anti-Christ and that they go up rather than the Spirit. The Spirit convicts sinners when He is poured out upon the saints. The Spirit will do little except through those already saved.

524. Can a person live a Christian and carry an insurance policy?

Ans. Certainly he can, if it is not in oath-bound lodge where saints are yoked up in an oath-bound allegiance to the world, contrary to the word of God.

525. Would it be murder for a child of God to go to war and shoot men as do other soldiers?

Ans. Our faith leaves this with the conscience of each man. We have never opposed the going to war of our members whose conscience allowed them to go. But every one must keep personal hatred out of his heart. The sheriff who hangs the criminal as commanded by law need have no hatred in his heart, and he is not a murderer when he executes the law. Neither is a soldier a murderer when he obeys his country in executing just punishment on the criminal Hun.

526. Explain Luke 3:14 and I John 3:15 as they relate to war.

Ans. Luke 3:14 refers to soldiers doing police duty in a conquered country. They were not to take advantage of their position to rob people by violence, and were not to trump up a false charge against any one. The Huns are doing both, and God is against it. I John 3:15 forbids personal hatred of men.

527. How can we obey Luke 16:9? Ans. By so using your money as a child of God that souls will be saved thereby and the saints in need so blessed that their hearts love you and will joyfully welcome you in glory.

528. Should a Pentecostal wife attend a Pentecostal meeting when her husband is violently opposed to her going?

Ans. This depends upon whether he is doing this out of love for her and in ignorance of the Pentecostal people, or whether he knows the truth and is doing it knowingly against God. If he is misinformed as to Pentecostal people, and honestly believes they are bad people, you should exercise much patience with him and see to it quietly that he becomes properly informed so as to remove the false prejudice in his mind. But no man has the right knowingly to oppose his wife in serving God, so long as she is true to him and faithful to her home duties.

529. What is meant by going "in" and "out" in John 10:9? What is the pasture outside of Christ?

Ans. You totally miss the point in the parable. In it, Christ is neither the fold nor the pasture. He is the Door. The fold is the place of safety, and Christ means to say that through Himself is the only entrance into safety, and through Himself is the only way to the green pastures. The sheep need feed and pasture as much as a place of safety. Spiritually there is no pasture outside of Christ.

FAMINE IN BRITISH EAST AFRICA

We have been passing through a famine in B. E. A. Many have died of starvation. I thank God that He helped us to relieve many of the suffering. The missionaries through the famine districts have done all they could, the Government furnished food for the destitute, and the missionaries distributed it to those who were needy.

In the Nyangari tribe if a man or woman or child is caught stealing food in time of famine the thief has a piece about half inch deep and one inch long cut off the rim of the left ear. It marks the thief for life. During the famine a little girl came to us with her left ear bleeding. She had been stealing food and had received the mark in her left ear.

# THE JEW FIRST

The place, significance and coming destiny of the Jew is becoming an intensely interesting subject for study day by day. "A man without a country, yet every country claims him. His own land not his, yet he holds a clear title to it by inheritance from his father Abraham." For long, weary centuries he has been longing for that promised land and looking forward to the time when he shall take possession of it.

The aims of modern Zionism have no relation to the expressed purpose of God toward the Jew. The Zionists seek to found a Jewish state in Palestine which shall take its place among the nations. True Israel is to be a people separate from other peoples, a "peculiar people" unto Him. So God has held them through the long years since they marched out of Egypt with not a feeble one among them. "I have declared and I have shewed, when there was no strange God among you. therefore, ye are my witnesses saith the Lord, that I am God." (Isa. 43:12).

Why has the Jew been so miraculously preserved through unspeakable hardship and persecution? That he might be just that, a witness for Jehovah. Every Jew witnesses to the veracity of Bible history when he says, "Abraham Abinu, Abraham our father." And when higher criticism would deny the authenticity of the books of Moses and even his existence, "a whole nation is maming him as 'Moshe rabbinu' 'Moses our teacher, Moses our lawgiver!' witnessing for Jehovah that His word is truth."

"Salvation is of the Jews." From the loins of Abraham, from the tribes of Judah, from the house of David came He whom we worship as Savior, Lord and King. That which Israel rejected became the rich blessing of the world. The crumbs from the children's table became the bread of life to the Gentiles. While the Jew has wandered and starved in the wilderness, the Gentile has grown fat on the milk and honey of Canaan. But now, praise Jehovah the time is certainly and swiftly approaching when Judah shall come again to her own. Israel "shall ask the way to Zion with their faces thitherward saying. come and let us join ourselves to the Lord in a perpetual covenant that shall not be forgotten" (Jer. 50:5).

From the Jew came salvation. To the Jew in the coming time will be entrusted the evangelization of the world. To the Jewish people as a whole? Not at first. The Jews will gather back to Jerusalem in unbelief. They will be deceived by Satan's last great emmisary. Antichrist. They will make a covenant with him as their Messiah. In him they will think they see the realization of their dream of a Messiah who shall set up the throne of David and restore Palestine to its position among the nations of the earth.

But, they will not all be so deceived. Christ found a few faithful disciples who knew Him as the Son of God. All thru the Christian era there have been Jews who have learned also to know Him as the Promised One. These will not be seduced by the blandishments of the great deceiver. These, Jehovah will single out to be His witnesses in the awful days to come. There will be "no strange god among them." They will not be dazzled by the prospect of political power and place. They will be looking for the true Messiah to come and to them will be given the honor of being known as Christ's own.

In Rev. 7:1-8 we read of a special selected band. We quote the 3rd and 4th verses, "Saying, hurt not the earth, neither the sea nor the trees, till we have sealed the servants of God in their foreheads. And I heard the number of them which were sealed and there were sealed an hundred and forty and four thousand of all the tribes of the children

of Israel." What is this sealing? What is its purpose? In the New Testament the baptism of the Spirit is spoken of as a sealing (See 2 Cor. 1:22; Eph. 1:13). The servants of God, "sealed in their foreheads," have minds. purposes and wills all given over to Him and He sets His mark of ownership upon them. Twelve thousand sealed from each tribe —these tribes are mostly lost to earthly ken today, but God knows His own and where they are. In His own good time He will seal those whom He selects for His service.

The Jew is scattered over the whole earth. It has been stated that in a remote corner of China a small tribe was discovered which was unmistakably Jewish in features, traditions customs and habits. They are sealed, then, from every tribe that God's own may be found among all nations, kindred, tongues and peoples in every nook and corner of the world. The purpose of it is, undoubtedly, that they may be witnesses for Jehovah when Antichrist is deceiving nearly the whole world with his preten-When "It is given him to make sions. war with the saints and to overcome them," what but this special sealing will be able to keep the servants of God from being destroyed? The storm of Antichrist's fury and the persecution which is to fall upon those who refuse his mark, may only be withstood by the very power of God.

Thus protected they may fearlessly proclaim to all people "Him who shall come out of Zion, the Deliverer, and shall turn away ungodliness from Jacob. For this is My covenant unto them when I shall take away their sins" (Rom. 11: 26-27). "My covenant," in contradistinction to the false covenant of Amtichrist.

By this sealing the 144,000 will become a first fruit unto God and the Lamb. "Not the first fruit of all the saved, for the living ones and the elders are in heavenly place and glory above and before them, but a first fruit of another and particular harvest. The first fruit from the Jewish field in that new beginning with the Israelitish people for their fathers' sakes, which is to follow the present 'times of the Gentiles'"—Seiss.

Will this not be the first company of Jews to have the "veil" removed from before their eyes, and to accept Christ as their Messiah? Here is seen the first working out of the purpose of God in His Son Jesus Christ, toward those for whom He came, and suffered and died, They are the first of the branches. broken off the "tame olive tree" to be grafted in again, because they ablde not in unbelief." (Rom. 11:23).

Thus the identity of this band seems quite clear. They are literally Jews, entirely distinct from the "great multitude" mentioned in Rev. 7:9, who are out "of all nations, kindreds people and tongues." They are also distinct from the translated saints understood to be the "Bride," whom John sees "amidst the throne, and seated on four and twenty thrones (R. V.) round about the throne." These were in place when the door was opened in heaven for John to "come up hither"-before the first seal was broken. These also are "redeemed to God by Thy blood out of every kindred, and tongue, and peo-ple and nation." The judgments under the sixth seal have taken place before the 144,000 are sealed.

"What the Living Ones and Elders are to the church universal, these 144, 000 are to the recovered restored and redeemed children of Abraham in that new order which is to come when the times of the Gentiles are fulfilled" (Seiss).

The events under the seventh seal are narrated before we again come upon mention of this sealed band. They have evidently passed through the varied judgments poured upon the earth at the sounding of the seven trumpets, Now we see them standing upon Mount Zion with the Lamb. "These are they which follow the Lamb whithersoever He goeth," the Bride one with Christ, these His faithful followers. And they sing a new song before the throne, before the four Living ones and the Elders. and no man could sing that song but the 144.000 which were redeemed from the earth."

Standing on Mount Zion with the Lamb! Redeemed from the power of

Antichrist! Taken away from the horrors of his reign on earth! "It will not meet the case to take Mount Zion here as simply the heavenly Jerusalem \* \* \* It must take in some new and exalted order touching the earthly Jerusalem, the Jewish nationality and that throne and kingdom of David everywhere promised to be rebuilt and restored, never to fail any more. The scene thus looks over into the new earth to that time when the ransomed of the Lord shall return and come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy upon their heads, and shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away, (Isa. 35:10). \* \* \* The Lamb is yet to take possession of the city where he was crucified . there to fulfill what was written over His head in Latin Greek and Hebrew when He died. And when that comes to pass, these 144,000 are with Him, His near and particular associates in that particular relation and administration."

#### PENTECOST IN BASUTOLAND

Basutoland has had the Gospel for more than eighty years, and many devoted servants of God, men like Francais Collard, have spent the best of their lives laboring among the Basuto. In a vision the Lord gave me in my first visit to this country, this testimony was compared to the light of a lantern which served its purpose well but that the Lord was soon going to make the Sun of righteousness arise with healing in His wings. Our short experience, a little more than one year, is proving that the Lord has a great desire for the people, and proved also that they appreciate the blessing of a full gospel, a fuller gospel than they hitherto have enjoyed, a gospel that brings healing in its wings.

We have the privilege of being set down in one of the darkest corners of Basutoland.- The place is called Makuabating, the town of the "ne'er-do-Until quite recently it seems wells". that this place was a sort of dump for

all the folks who wanted to settle in the land and who had no right there. "Send them to Makuabating", and to Makuabating they came. The present chief is only the second the town has had. and previous to the advent of their first chief. the people were continually suffering at the hands of the neighbors. Their cattle and produce were stolen, and they were always in fear.

To this place five years ago this July, 1918, the Lord sent a native preacher. A sort of John Baptist-a restorer of paths to dwell in. For in the

same year the Lord sent one of His prophets to Hereford, England, where my wife and I were staying, to tell us to rise up and go to South Africa. He did not then say Basutoland, but we were sent to Cape Town from where, after two years of ministry, we were sent on to the place of His choice. Beloved reader, rest in the Lord, and wait patiently for Him. Blessed are all they that wait for Him.

Arriving in Basutoland, being in the way, the Lord led us to this place by the hand of a dear brother, a farmer, who had been used of God to place the dear native preacher here three years before. On my first visit we found fifteen men and women who had turned to God from idols. They had been baptized in water, but had not heard whether there be any Holy Ghost. Full of the blessing bestowed by the coming of the blessed Comforter, we preached the promise of the Father, and to His glory, be it told, the Holy Ghost fell as at the first and seven were baptizeed in the Holy Ghost and spake in other tongues. Hallelujah! Little by little the way opened and both chief and

pastor pleaded with us to come their way, and we could do no other, as the hand of the Lord was bringing us there. Wife and I took the piece of land offered by the chief and which was handed over in the presence of the "city fathers" in the usual way, but not one penny had we to build a house to dwell in. We knew, however that He who had begun the good work would perform it until,---Hallelujah! And again they said Hallelujah! We got half way home when we heard some good news. Dear Sister Billing was reading in Haggai where it. says, "Go up to the mountain and bring wood and build the house, and I will take pleasure in it, and I will be glorified." Haggai 1:8. And as the Lord's custom is at times, the letters appeared to stand out in bold headline type before the good old lady, for she has passed her three score years and ten. She said. "But Lord, you can't mean this for me! I've got no money to bring wood



snatched from the power and kingdom of Satan. We have a school at this place of twenty-three children, and an out-station school with seventeen children, and three native evangelists, preaching for the people, the full, free Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Our present chapel which holds one hundred is much too small, and we have been granted a piece of ground to build another. We have done what we could and now we ask your prayers that the Lord will help us to bring this people to the feet of Jesus.

Last month old Klass and his wife came to the Lord. This old chap was the leader in all the beer drinks round here, and our people had not much faith for his conversion, but the Lord has had His way and the old couple were conducted to the river and buried with the Lord.

The break came over one year ago today when our dear young chief came boldly forward and yielded his heart to

same week of the same month of the and build a house." He answers, "It is for you my child."

Listen, beloved, and praise the Lord! Two days afterwards she received a cable from England, "Brother passed away. Left you residuary legatee". The money was not much, but enough to fulfill the purpose of the Lord. And to this dear sister the surrender was a cheerful one. "Yes Lord!" "Yes Lord!" "Yes Lord!'

The difficulties were great, the mountain was high, and materials because of the war were expensive, but the Lord had made the calculation, and had provided what He had planned. But was it?-oh yes it was all right. Did space allow we could tell how we were guided to this firm and the other, how men of the world had to do this and that without being able to find the reason why; how workmen came just as others left, and so forth and so on. Today the house is finished, and God is taking pleasure in it, and God is being glorified. "I have both glorified it, and will glorify it again." Blessed be the name of the Lord!

Today we have between fifty and sixty names on the roll of men and women

Christ. It came about after a wonderful answer to prayer. For several years the harvests had been nil, because of continuous drought, and the chief felt that he could not stand by another year and see his people starve. He came to me pleading that I would pray to God to send them rain. He gathered all the men of the place together in church and at 10 a.m. we commenced our service. We preached to the people from the Word of God and told them of God's love. and also of God'r wrath. We pled with them to believe, repent,

and turn to God, and God would forgive their sins and send rain upon the earth.

At 12:30 the people came crowding into the hut. "What is the matter? "The rain has come!" And for fourteen days it rained and rained, and the Lord gave a good harvest.

Well, the young chief could not but believe in a God who gave rain, and he turned to God with all his heart. He sent special messengers to all the chiefs and his many friends, and as he went to the river five miles away he had at least three hundred followers.

Since that day, month by month, the people are turning to God, and the end is not yet, praise the Lord! And our people are so glad because our God is called "Jehovah-Rophi. Sunday after Sunday the sick come to be healed, and the testimony of all is "when the maruta said AMEN I was healed," and why The good old book says "The not? prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up". And so it happens. And their faith grows as it is exercised.

My boy had taken a workman to the station in the capecart. The horses had to rush to catch the train and one horse was sick. The local experts told



the boy that it was finished, but he believed that because the maruta (minister) belonged to God, his horse belonged to God also. The animal was apparently dying, but John got down and putting his hands on its back prayed to God to let him take the horse back to his master. And the Lord heard. For the faithful man's faithful God made it stand on its feet and it has been going ever since. Encouraged by this testimony, another of our Christian boys one of the babes in Christ, prayed for a sick sheep and its life was restored.

Every day men, women or children are brought along for prayer, and every day the power of the Lord is present to heal. Glory be to His holy Name forever!

At one time, when we were at Orai and there were fourteen single boys who were in our charge, we ran short of funds on a Friday. But we had heard that the mail steamer carrying home mail had arrived in Bombay, and expected the mail train through on Saturday afternoon.

Of course the Lord would supply through the homeland and we would receive help to carry us over Sunday. The mail came and we sent a boy to get the mail-but-God had a different way. Instead of sending in money from home at this time, He picked up one of our boys-one of the most covetous of the whole number-and late Saturday afternoon he came to my room and acting

in the hills. But the Lord brought to my mind that I had promised to use all this money for the Bible Society, providing He furnished purchasers. Then He brought to my mind the case of Ananias and Saphaira. At once I determined to be true to God, so I sent the whole sum.

Then the devil came to me and said, "Now what will you do, you have not anything to pay your expenses in the hills." But the Lord said, "Am I not the God of the hills as well as the plains?" I had no answer to this, so decided I must pack up and go.

Well, the Lord wonderfully supplied, and in many ways that summer, He showed His loving kindness. During that season He saw fit to take our little baby boy, but through even this He did a new thing. The morning our little boy died, I do not think we had over three or four rupees on hand to pay the funeral expenses (which amounted to about Rs. 75) but as far as we know, no person knew


this.

We have just closed a ten days revival meeting held in a large mat shed put up for that purpose. God wonderfully poured out His Spirit. It would sweep over us like great ocean waves, and some would be dancing, some shouting, and some coming through to the Baptism. Our teacher, a formal church member, was given a vision of heaven, and was told she could not enter. Now she sees the light of Pentecost, and is earnestly seeking God. Pray for her.

One of our school girls received the Baptism and was baptized in water. Her people, hearing of it, came and took her out of school. She is an orphan, and the only one of her village who believed. We ask prayer for her that God will keep her in the midst of persecution, and bring her back to us.

One of our faithful Christians got right down on his knees in the midst of the mob and flying brickbats and prayed with all his might. We sent word to the American consulate who immediately sent aid. The two worst men of the mob were arrested. We could have had them severely punished, but felt it was best not to.

We can say with the Psalmist, "If it had not been the Lord who was on our side, when men rose up against us, then they had swallowed us up quick, when their wrath was kindled against us."

On the last day of the meeting eight were buried in baptism and three soldiers would have been, but they were suddenly ordered to a new station and had no opportunity. Several wonderful cases of healing also took place. An unbeliever came in who had chills and fever. We laid on hands and anointed him with oil. He is now testifying that a great light of fire came before him and entered into his body. He is back to work and a believer now.

God wonderfully blessed the ministry of brother J. D. James of Hong Kong, who kindly came and helped during the meeting .--- Sarah A. Kugler.

Bro. James Salter writes from the Belgian Congo, "The work here grows rapidly and calls and open doors are far more than we can possibly keep pace with. At present numbers of men and women are pressing us for baptism. This is the first break among the women. and as their baptism entails among other things, the marriage question, it is a cause of much prayer. Here, as a rule, girls become engaged when quite young, and the intended husband begins his payment. This invariably consists of guns, cloth, beads, goats, etc., and occupies a few years. Some who are asking to be baptized became engaged in this manner quite a number of years ago and their purchase is practically complete. They are willing to give up their intended husbands rather than the gospel, but here again is another obstacle. Their parents have received the payments and are not willing to give them back. The whole problem bristles with difficulties, but God, we believe, will make all things plain. We covet your continued prayerful in-terest."

After having spent a year in Egypt. Bro. A. H. Post writes, "What hath God wrought for us during the year? I. He has fully doubled our force of Christian workers, for a year ago, on my return, we only had about six, and while one of those left us and went to another mission, yet now we have a full dozen. 2. # FROM A PENTECOSTAL VIEWPOINT

#### October 27th, 1918. ISAAC AND REBEKAH

#### Lesson Text.—Gen. 24:57-67. Golden Text.—Prov. 3:3, 4.

We were not able to fully appreciate the blessed love story of Gen. 24 until we came into Pentecost. Then we began to have a new understanding and appreciation for Isaac, the child of the promise. His very name is Pentecostal. Isaac means "Laughter," and some of us in Pentecost know something about that, for at the time the Lord delivered us from the bondage of formal churchanity, He indeed filled our mouth with laughter. Isaac's life teaches us preeminently the lesson of submission, for even in the choice of a bride he submitted to the will of another; and a life in the Holy Ghost that follows an Acts 2:4 experience should be essentially a life of submission. Nine-tenths of our troubles can be traced to an unsubmissive spirit.

#### I. A Bride for Isaac

After-Isaac's victory of submission on Mount Moriah, where he was laid a willing sacrifice upon the altar, the only adequate compensation was a bride. And after the triumph of Calvary, does not our Jesus deserve a bride? Nothing less will satisfy.

Abraham wanted a bride for Isaac, not from the heathen of Caanan, but from his own people in Haran. God's choice of a bride for His Son will not be from the most noble and wise and wealthy in the world, but from His own despised people. Abraham sent his servant to search out, prepare and bring a bride for his son. Our God has sent the Holy Ghost, and He is searching out preparing and will bring home a bride for His Son. Abraham's servant had wonderful gifts to impart, and so the Holy Ghost has not come empty-handed. He too has wondrous gifts, which He distributes severally as He will, but above all would He lead us into the more excellent way of heavenly love.

#### II. A Willing Bride

Rebeckah's relatives would have hindered her departure, but the servant desiring to hasten back to his master. said, "Hinder me not." To her it was a choice whether she would stay longer with those she loved in the flesh or would she at once start off on her journey, to her unseen lover. But when asked whether she was willing to go at once her answer was, "I will go." And the Bride of Christ is willing to forget her father's house, she is weaned from all earthly desires, and she is willing to go immediately to Him whom having not seen she loves.

#### III. Union.

It was a long pilgrimage for Rebekah, but after awhile, in the dimness of the eventide, she saw him on whom her affections had been set. She quickly lighted off her camel, for no position could be low enough for her now, and speedily veiled herself. Isaac had seen her coming, he had been on the lookout for her. You may be sure that she had been the theme of his meditations and prayers. He took her into his mother's tent, where everything was prepared for her, and "she became his wife and he loved her."

Sometimes it seems as if we had come to the last mile of the journey. It is eventide, but the promise is "that at eventide there shall be light." It is said of the bride in the Canticles that she has "dove's eyes," and dove's eyes are remarkable for their keenness of sight. The dove that came down by Jordan's banks when Jesus was baptized did not make the mistake of alighting on John the Baptist or any of the rest of the crowd. And she of the dove's eyes will know her Isaac. He never ceases to think of her, and ever liveth to make intercession for the one He loves. Think you not that already there is an unspeakable longing in her heart for Him?

#### IV. Glory.

No place will be too low when she sees Him whom her soul loveth. Immediately will she reach for her veil. What is this veil? Is it not a veil of glory? The Holy Spirit is surely a Spirit of glory. Our Father has promised grace and glory, and we have tasted much of His grace, but we need to go on to know the overflowing fullness of the Spirit of glory. This alone will bring the perfect unity in the body of Christ, for which we are all earnestly seeking and praying. Did not Jesus say in that wonderful prayer of John 17. "And the glory which Thou gavest Me I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one?"

How the heavenly anthems will ring as the choristers of glory cry one to another, "Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honor to Him, for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and his wife hath made herself ready." This will surely be the climax of her joy. But perhaps not the climax, for who can tell what joys beyond compare He has laid up for those who love Him? Is it not worth while to say "Yes" to Him now?

A missionary who had learned in the jungles of India to love Jesus very much, came home for a furlough, and as she journeyed from Convention to Convention the thing that struck her most was that everyone was so extremely busy that they could not find time to wait on the Lord Himself, all being so fully occupied with their service for Him rather than tarrying at His footstool like Mary of Bethany and choosing the better part by rendering service to Him. She remarked, "Jesus seems to have lots of workers in this country, but O so few lovers!" Are you a real lover of the Lamb?

#### November 3, 1918. APPETITE AND GREED Lesson Text.—Genesis 25:27-34. Golden Text.—1 Cor. 9:25.

"Portraits for Nothing!" A Jewish pastor, working in the East End of London, had these words printed in large type outside his mission, and he invited the crowd to come inside. He informed all anxious inquirers that they could take their pictures away with them. On the day prescribed he gave them their portraits out of the Word of God, and some of them went home pricked to the heart. Some of us can recognize our own portraits in the story of Esau and Jacob. In today's lesson we get an enlarged picture of what Paul calls "the old man." But some of us can praise the Lord for the fact that the grace of our God has reached us and changed us, and for the knowledge of the fact that our "old man" was crucified with Him; but it is good to look back occasionally at the pit from which we have been dug. Our song of praise rings all the louder when we remember "Such were some of you: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God."

#### I. Esau and Jacob

Esau is described as a "red man, a man of earth,""a sportsman, boisterous, wild, clumsy, worldly, sensuous. adventurous, a gentleman by birth but a brute by choice." In the New Testament he is called "a fornicator," which in scriptural usage is one who forsook the true God for the worshipping of idols. He is further called a "profane person," indicating that he was one who had contempt for that which is sacred and holy.

Jacob's name means "supplanter," and naturally he was as cunning, crafty and crooked a man as you would find in a year's journey. As a sister wrote to us at one time, "Jehovah looked down on the children of men to see who was the meanest man He could find, and He found Jacob, a supplanter, a liar, a crook, and He who delighteth in mercy bestowed on him His wonderful grace, and transformed him into an Israel, a prince with God." If God could so transform Jacob, there is hope for you and me. All through the Old Testament we find that the Holy Ghost gives as a favorite title for Jehovah, "the God of Jacob," and this should ever speak to us of the God of all grace who can transform the altogether unlovely into a vessel of honor, meet for the Master's

## II. The Eternal Choice.

There comes a day in the life of every man when he decides his own eternal destiny, a time when, in some way or other, the choice is put to him, "Choose ye, this day, whom ye will serve." And he chooses either for the Lord or Baal, either for God or Mammon, either for Jesus or for self. It was Esau's day of choice, and he came in from the fields, tired, weary and faint, and probably very discouraged at his lack of success in the day's hunt. It is when we are tired and discouraged that the enemy

will always try and take advantage of us, and it is then that we have to flee to our hiding place in Jesus, and to the all-sufficient shelter of the blood.

Esau could only think of the immediate present. He was very hungry and that mess of red pottage that Jacob was cooking smelt just too good for anything. He asked for some, and Jacob, shrewd, scheming supplanter as he was, recognized at once that here he could take advantage of his brother and drive a close bargain with him for his birthright. And we will find that someone shrewder than Jacob will ever be offering us baits to try and get us to forfeit our inheritance. It is good to be well fortified with the Word on such occasions, just as Jesus was in the time of His great temptation, and He foiled the Tempter every time.

"Sell me this day thy birthright," said Jacob. What was involved in this birthright? Primarily, Esau's birthright carried with it the fulfillment of those wonderful promises that Jehovah gave to Abraham and Isaac. If Esau could have only taken "the long look," he would have said, "I would rather die than forfeit my inheritance! What, for. feit an eternal inheritance for myself and my race for a plate of beans? I'll go without my supper tonight, but I will not go without the blessing of Je-But instead of that he began hovah." to pity himself and his empty stomach, and then to reason, "Behold, I am at the point to die: and what profit shall this birthright do to me?" No wonder Luther used to exclaim, "Thou beast, Reason!" Doubt has slain its thousands and Reason its tens of thousands. So Esau, lightly esteeming his birthright sold it for a basin of soup, a vegetable stew that you pay about a dime for in any restaurant.

#### III. Your Choice and Mine.

In this way we have seen scores treat the new birth and the inexhaustible inheritance that comes with it, the right to become an heir of God and a joint heir with Jesus Christ. Alas, so many are willing to forfeit the heavenly inheritance, that is to last throughout all eternity, for a dinner, for a dance, for the short-lived pleasures of sin, for something that will last but an hour.

Esau made his choice and sold his wirthright, and we read in Hebrews that although he afterwards desired to inherit the blessing, he found no place of repentance, or as we read in the A.S.V. "he found no place for a change of mind in his father, though he sought it diligently with tears." So with many souls today. There comes a time in the history of each one of us when we can forever settle our destiny, a moment of decision when we can say "Yes," to God, and through His grace, a determined "No" to every enticement of the devil. This is the day of decision. "Plenty of time yet!" whispers the tempter. Saul yet!" thought he had plenty of time, but he had closed the heavens against himself with his own disobedience, and we read of him in his last days, "Saul enquired of the Lord and the Lord answered him not." There will be millions of wouldbe righteous people when the door of opportunity is closed. Take good care that you are not one of them.-S. H. F.


#### WOODHEIM, TEXAS.
