THE THIRD MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

The Third Missionary Conference epened the 7th of October, 1918, in the Cleveland Pentecostal Church, under conditions which called for much prayer, as the epidemic of Influenza was raging. God overruled, however, and gave real victory and blessing. The Missionaries and friends who gathered were all of the opinion that this conference had been a most profitable gathering, and in some ways, the best that had been held.

Seven missionaries were present, as follows: Sara Coxe, India; Blanche Appleby, China; Hattie A. Salyer, Egypt; Mrs. J. Wilbur Taylor West Macie Boddy, West Africa; and Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Johnson, W. Africa. sides the missionaries were many friends and workers from various places. Among the workers were Bro. E. S. Williams of Newark, N. J., H. C. Ulrich of Milwaukee, Wisc., Harry Long of Hornell, N. Y., C. A. McKinney, Akron, Ohio; A. A. DeLine, Grafton. W. Va.; Brother Lewis of Framingham, Mass.; Brother Barth of Atlanta, Ga.; J. H. Charles of Battle Creek, Mich.; and Brother Robbins of Fagan, Ky.

The afternoon services were given to helpful messages from one or more of the out-of-town workers or the missionaries, and Brother E. S. Williams gave the evening evangelistic messages, preceded each time by a short talk from some missionary.

Many times during the evening song service, the spirit of worship fell upon the audience and the whole church was lost in praise and song, many times with uplifted hands and rapt faces. Special blessing fell one evening while Brother McKinney of Akron Ohio sang "No disappointment in Heaven". The Spirit-filled messages of song by Brother Willard Pierce and wife will not soon be forgetten.

On the last Saturday night, a Young People's Missionary Rally, under the direction of Brother Pierce, was held. A number spoke of the Lord's dealings with them and of their call to the foreign field. Among this number were Miss Sims of Toronto, Can. (called to Africa); A. A. DeLine, Grafton, W. Va., (called to Africa); Miss Morrison, Alliston, Ont., (called to China); Miss Fannie Van Dyke, Youngstown, Ohio, (called to the Indians of South America); Miss Ada Buchwalter, Gordonville, Pa., (called to China); and Miss Zella Reynolds, Indianapolis, Ind., (called to China). A number of the young people of the Cleveland Church also spoke, and it was ten o'clock before the service was near the end, but the people were so interested they said "Go on", and the meeting lasted until a late hour.

Miss Appleby, in one of her talks, made use of one illustration which was afterwards referred to frequently. She spoke of the soldiers fighting at the front and then of the soldiers who do

not see the front trenches but stay behind and man the big 42 centimeter guns. Those big guns are just as necessary as the individual soldiers, and we who stay behind can, with our faith and prayer and gifts, do for the missionaries at the front what the big guns do for our brave soldiers. Brother Johnson in his most stirring missionary message the last Sunday morning, ended with the story of a man in Belgium who lived in luxury, had everything his heart could desire, houses and lands and autos and every modern comfort. invading army went through, all his property was destroyed and he was left utterly bereft. As he looked around upon the ruins he said, "What I have given to God I have, and what I have kept for myself I have lost." (Reader.

So much of missionary enthusiasm had been aroused by our faithful missionaries and their Spirit-filled messages that it was no wonder when we came up to the last day and the annual missionary offering was taken, the Lord received the largest offering the Cleveland Church has taken up, amounting to at least \$5,800.00, in addition to nearly \$600.00 taken for the expenses of the Conference. It was a banner day for Brother Kerr and the Cleveland Church.

The morning business sessions were productive of much enlightenment and understanding of some problems that had puzzled different minds, and at the close of the Conference the missionaries and friends felt a deeper tie of fellowship than ever before.—Zella H. Reynolds, Secy.

(Brother Kerr's paper will contain from time to time the messages given during the Conference.) The following are the more important recommendations passed by the Missionary Conference:

- 1. That the Pastor and people of every Pentecostal Assembly be urged to do all in their power to co-operate with Him who calls them as co-laborers with Himself in the task of bringing the knowledge of salvation "to every creature."
- 2. That, in recognition of the fact that prayer is a mighty and essential factor in the missionary program, special missionary prayer-meetings should be arranged by each Pentecostal Assembly, to be held at regular stated intervals, preferably once a week, when special prayer should be made for the thrusting forth of more laborers into the harvest field, and for the supply of every need, spiritual, physical and financial, of every Pentecostal laborer on the foreign field.
- 3. That in connection with such prayer-meetings a Secretary be appointed by each assembly, who shall, through correspondence with the missionaries direct and through the information supplied in all the Pentecostal papers, bring before the Assembly the known needs of the various missionaries and the neglected missionaries, se that intelligent prayer can be made for the supply of these needs.
- 4. That the Secretary of the Missionary Conference be encouraged to publish a prayer calendar for distribution amongst God's praying people on which the names of all the Pentecostal missionaries are given, so that all these workers may be remembered by name at the Throne of Him whose delight is the prayer of the righteous.

RESOLVED That in order to secure a more equitable distribution of Missionary funds, we recommend that all Assemblies that are affiliated with the General Council should send their funds to the Missionary Treasurer of the Council, (Brother Stanley H. Frodsham of Springfield, Mo.) for equitable distribution among all true Pentecostal missionaries, especially among those who may have been overlooked. (Of course they should also send their specified funds in the same way. Ed.)

RESOLVED That we urge the Pentecostal people everywhere to pray definitely that the Lord will provide a home of rest for missionaries who return from the Missionary field on furlough.

WHEREAS It is known that at times there are missionaries in isolated places who are unknown to the distributing centers in the home land,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That this Conference recommends that the Missionary Committee or any individual nearest to the said Missionary, get in touch with this party, if possible, and where practicable, report such Missionary's existence and needs to the Secretary of the Missionary Conference.

WHEREAS It is known that at times Pentecostal Missionaries who are on furlough from their work on the field, have been greatly used of the Lord among the Assemblies at home, not only in giving spiritual help and encouragement but also in stirring up the saints to greater zeal and co-operation for the support of the Missionaries on the field,

THEREFORE RESOLVED That this Conference recommend to the Pastors of Pentecostal Assemblies and Pentecostal bands to arrange and establish menthly all-day meetings for special prayer for missions and missionaries; and that they secure the services of the missionaries for such occasions. And in case they are not acquainted with the missionaries or their addresses, that they write to the "Secretary of the Missionary Conference", 278 North Addison St., Indianapolis, Ind. for such information.

RESOLVED That this Conference hereby expresses its appreciation of the efforts put forth by the General Council of the Assemblies of God for the betterment of conditions on the Mission Field, and a heartier co-operation between Pentecostal people and Assemblies in the support of the Missionaries at home or on the field.

WHEREAS The General Council at its last session extended a cordial invitation to the Missionary Conference to hold its next session in connection with the next General Council Meeting,

THEREFORE RESOLVED That the Conference Secretary be instructed to communicate with the Secretary of the Council, in behalf of the Missionary Conference, its acceptance of the extended courtesy.

PRAYER AND MISSIONS.

Prayer is one of the most effective factors in successful mission work. Some years ago Jonathan Goforth and wife went to China from Knox College. Toronto, Canada. After nearly a year in the field, Mr. Goforth became very much discouraged over his inability to acquire the language. One day just before starting for the chapel to conduct a service, he said to his wife, "If the Lord does not give me very special help with this language, I fear I shall be but a failure as a missionary." Some hours later he returned with his face radiant with joy. He had had such special help in speaking that the people seemed to understand him readily and several inquirers presented themselves. So marked was the help given that he noted it in his diary.

Nearly three months later he received a letter from a student in Knox College stating that at a certain time some of the students of the college met to pray for Mr. Goforth, and there had been such a signal manifestation of divine presence that they wished to know if he realized any special help, giving the date of the meeting. The missionary looked it up in his diary and found it to be the exact time when he had been given such liberty that it had resulted in his giving himself to the work anew. Is it not time for the church to heed carefully the voice of her Lord?—Sel.

Satan complained about Job, "Hast not Thou made an hedge about him?" God's special hedge is comprehended in the phrase, "walls of salvation." A sculptor began work on a noble piece of marble, but, lacking skill, he only hacked and marred the block. It was then abandoned as spoiled and worthless, and cast aside. For years it lay in a back yard, soiled and blackened, half hidden among the rubbish.... At last Angelo saw it and at once perceived its possibilities. Under his skillful hand, the stone was cut into the fair and marvellous beauty which appears in the statue of David.

Questions and Answers

544. What does the sin of blaspheming the Holy Ghost (Matt. 12:31; Mk. 8:29; Lm. 12:10) consist in? Is it the same sin as in I John. 5:16 and in Heb. 6:4-6?

Ans. The unpardonable sin of blasphemy against the Holy Ghost consists in seeing a real miracle wrought by the power of the Holy Ghost and knowing fully it was done by the Spirit of God, and then knowingly and willfully attributing that miracle to the power of the devil rather than to give God the credit for it. It is likely this sin is seldom, if ever, committed except in the presence of a known miracle, and often when even a miracle is attributed to Satan it is done ignorantly, honestly believing it to be the work of Satan. If such people repent, as Paul did, when they learn their mistake, they can be forgiven.

I John 5:16 is the same unpardonable sin, but Heb. 6:4-6 refers to those who having known Christ as a Saviour turn from Him to Judaism or some other religious system for salvation, openly disowning Christ as able to save and declaring salvation comes in some other way. It is not possible to renew such a one as long as he does this. few Christian Scientists who definitely and willfully reject the atoning blood are ever renewed. Their only hope is in doing so ignorantly. The ordinary backslider who falls into sin but does not deny the blood of Christ can save, is not at all in this category. God will forgive Him if he will repent.

545. What is the difference between being baptized with the Holy Ghost as at Pentecost in Acts 2:4 and in receiving the Holy Ghost before Pentecost as in John 20:22 when Jesus breathed on them?

Ans. The normal New Testament way to receive the Holy Ghost is in and by the baptism with the Holy Ghost. The term Baptism describes the enveloping, saturating, submerging experience, and the term receiving refers to the permanent gift of the Spirit received in that experience.

In the O. T. times the Spirit often came temporarily upon men to give power to perform some mighty deed, but they did not in such anointings receive the Spirit as a permanent gift, as is promised in the N. T. through the baptism. These O. T. anointings did not change their character, whereas in the N. T. one receiving the permanent gift of the Spirit receives power to live a hely life.

In John 20:22 it is not said that the apostles then and there received the Holy Ghost. Jesus only commanded them and commissioned them at that time to receive the Spirit and they received Him at Pentecost. In Luke 23:49 fesus uses the present tense saying, "I send," as if then sending the

Spirit upon them, but He immediately says "tarry" for it, showing it would be sent later. The "receive" in John is parallel to the "I send" in Luke. These are both parallel to Mat. 28:18-20 and Mark 16:15-18. The commission and promises therewith take a different form in each gospel, but refer in all to the same things.

546. Does Matt. 24:20 mean for us to pray not to be called away from the earth in the winter time or on the Sabbath?

Ans. No, it means that the great tribulation will wind up in an awful seige of Jerusalem, and for those who are in that city to flee and get out of the city, and since the city would be closed on the Sabbath so no one could get out, and since winter is an awful time for people to hide in the cold mountains day and night, to pray that their flight would not be in the winter or on the Sabbath.

547. Since there was on the earth only Adam, Eve, Abel and Cain, and Cain had killed Abel, who was Cain's wife, Gen. 4:17?

Ans. It is a great mistake to assume there was none on earth except those mentioned by name in Genesis. In Gen. 5:4 it says of Adam, "He begat sons and daughters;" but not one daughter is mentioned by name at birth nor is there mention of when these daughters were born. Cain's wife could have been any of these unnamed daughters of Adam.

548. Does I. Thes. 5:3 mean now?

Ans. This passage has had several partial fulfillments. Just before this great war men cried, "Peace and safe-ty"; but the sudden destruction came, and this passage was applicable. But I believe its specific reference is to a time in the future when the nations will think they have made war impossible and that the millenium has come, then the worst tribulation the world has ever seen will break out under the Anti-Christ. How soon no one knows.

549. What part of Revelation are we living in now?

Ans. In Rev. 3:14:22. But one period often begins before another completely closes, so that there is an overlapping of these ages.

550. Will those who have not got the Holy Ghost go up in the rapture?

Ans. There are several senses in which we may have the Holy Ghost. Only those who have real life in Christ through the Spirit will go up. If a person is really saved, is really "in Christ," is walking in the fellowship of the Spirit in the light he will go up. If he is not walking in the light, there is no promise for him. Some who have once been baptized with the Spirit, but have since leaked out and are walking in darkness will fail to go up if eaught in that condition.

551. Does Acts 2:38 mean that we should be baptized in water before we are baptized with the Holy Ghost?

Ans. It most certainly does. As soon as one truly repents and accepts Christ as Saviour, he should be at once baptized in water and look for God to pour out His Spirit upon him. The only excuse for not being first baptized in water would be that God baptized them in the Spirit, as at the house of Cornelius, before they could get to the water, and then they should go right on to the water as Peter commanded them, Acts 10:48.

552. Was the household of Cornelius saved before Peter preached to them?

Ans. Peter says of them, "God chose that by my mouth the Gentiles should hear the word of the Gospel and believe.purifying their hearts by faith," Acts 15:7-9. Now it is by faith in Jesus men are saved and by faith their hearts are cleansed. Since this came to them after the preaching of Peter, they were not before this in the fullness of a full New Testament, Holy Ghost and bloodwashed salvation.

553. When will the dead in Christ arise to go up to meet Jesus in the air?

Ans. Paul says it will be when the "last trump" sounds, I. Cor. 15:51-52. The trouble arises in determining what is the "last trump." Some hold that the "last trump" is the "seventh" trump sounded in Rev. 11:15 by the "seventh angel." But the scripture nowhere says that the seventh of this particular series is the one which Paul calls the "last." If the scripture anywhere said that God only had seven trumpets, then it would follow that the seventh was the same as the last. these seven trumpets, as I see it, belong to a special series of events beginning in Rev. 8:7 and ending in the 11th chapter. Erdman points out that there are seven series in the Book: (1) seven churches, chapters 2 and 3; (2) seven seals, 4:1; 8:1; (3) seven trumpets, 8:2; 11:19; (4) seven personages, 12:1; 14:20 (5) seven vials, 15:1; 16:21; (6) seven dooms, 17:1; 20:15; (7) seven new things, 21:1; 22:21.

554. Does Lu. 12:49 refer to the baptism with the Holy Spirit?

Ans. No, the "fire" there referred to means the "division" and strife that would result over Jesus as in verses 51-54. In verse 50 the "baptism" that was before Jesus was the great sorrow and pain of tasting death for every man.



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LIFE IN THE INNER COURT.

By A. E. Luce.

Part II.

We have seen something of the blessedness of dwelling in the inner court, separated from the world, and in Christ made nigh; yea more. led by the Spirit into the very heart of the Father. Let us now read on, and note in Ezek. 44 what are the characteristics of those who enjoy this sweet communion.

WHO CAN DWELL IN THE INNER COURT.

They are characterized by personal purity. Verses 17 to 19 tell us of the pure linen garments and scrupulous cleanliness always to be observed by the priests who enter the inner court. I believe this applies very literally to cleanliness in our persons, our clothing, our houses and our back yards. Is not the Holy Spirit grieved when we live so much in the twentieth-century rush, that we have no time to attend to all these little(?) details of personal and family life? If God did not think it beneath His notice to prescribe the most scrupulous cleanliness, frequent bathing, unsoiled clothing and wholesome food for the Jews of old, does He care less for His children to-day, or has He a lower ideal for us?

And of course the teaching applies equally to the inward purity of heart and life, the "thinking no evil," and turning away the ears from hearing that which is impure, which should characterize every Spirit-filled child of God. We need to plead the Blood of Jesus every time we take up a newspaper, lest we should inadvertently read that which will pollute our minds, so full is the literature of to-day of that which grieves the Holy Spirit. But, glory to God! there is a place in His inner court where the whole spirit, mind and body may be kept pure, abiding in the Purifying Fire, and under the Precious Cleansing Blood.

2. They are separated from all conformity to the world. v. 20. The shaving of the head and the wearing of long hair were both worldly customs, observed by the idolatrous priests, which Jehovah condemned in His ser-It might seem a very little vants. thing, just to allow the hair to grow a little longer, "because it is all the style now and we don't want to look peculiar:" but no! God's rule for His children is

NO COMPROMISE:

and if a custom is sinful or pertaining to the world, then, though it be dear to us as a right eye, He commands us to pluck it out and cast it from us. Those who dwell in the inner court must live a separated life. as God's own peculiar people, or (as the R. V. puts it) "a people for His own possession," shut up unto Himself, known as belonging to Him.

3. They have learned to be self-contrelled. v. 21. The command to drink

no wine is inclusive of the teaching that the Lord's priest must be so filled with the Spirit as to have all the blessed fruits manifested in his character, the culminating one of the list being selfcontrol, (Gal. 5:22). The Holy Spirit is not only a constraining but also a restraining force in those who are indwelt by Him; and as we yield to His working out the image of Jesus in us, He will balance our characters, and keep us from going to extremes. There will be no excesses in eating or drinking, no outbursts of anger or pride, no undue exaltation and no depression of spirits in those who are dwelling in

FEEDING ON CHRIST.
We must find Christ in the
Word; and, having found Him, feed on Him by faith. This imparts freshness, unction, vitality, energy and intensity, all of which we stand deeply in need of in this day of freezing for-malism. What is the value of a chilling orthodoxy without a liv-ing Christ known in all His powerful, personal attractions? doubt, sound doctrine is immensely important. Every faithful servant of Christ will feel himself imperatively called upon to "hold fast the form of sound words." But, after all, a living Christ is the very soul and life, the joints and marrow, the sinews and arteries, the essence and substance of sound doctrine. Partake of Him

the inner court, and completely controlled by the Holy Spirit. This selfcontrol (or rather God-control) will also be manifested in the public assembly when all the saints shall have been filled with the spirit of yieldingness, never defrauding one another of time, but doing all things decently and in order, as enjoined in 1 Cor. 14, because "the spirits of the prophets are subject to the prophets."

4. Their domestic relations are a pattern to their flock, v. 22. Even marriages that were permissible for the common people were unlawful for the priests in the inner court, whose every action was to be an example to the flock, tending to uplift and purify their every relation in life. How important then for God's ministers in these days of social decadence to maintain the highest standard in all matters of domestic life! Our Lord told us that the last days should be like the days of Noah, characterized by thoughtless "marrying and giving in marriage," which of course refers to irregularities and impurities in the marriage relationship. God's priests cannot proclaim too emphatically His abhorrence of all such irregularities, and the unchanging sancity of the marriage tie. The world will seek loopholes in state laws and prevalent customs for divorce and re-

marriage; but not so the child of God, who desires to be ruled by His Word. The Scripture unequivocally declares, and the words fell from the lips of our Saviour Himself, that "whoso marrieth her which is put away doth commit adultery" Matt. 19:9. May the Lord keep us all true and obedient to His Word, and may all the domestic relations of His priests be such as to bring glory to His Name, and be an example to the flock entrusted to their care. "And they shall teach My people the difference between the holy and profane, and cause them to discern between the unclean and the clean."

5. They have discernment to know the will of God, and to teach it to others. v. 24. "In controversy they shall stand in judgment, and they shall judge it according to My judgments: and they shall keep My laws and My statutes in all Mine assemblies.'

Only those who are in intimate friendship with a great man know his confidential secrets—none but the "inner circle" of his acquaintances are entrusted with the intimacies of his private life. In the same way, if we desire to learn the secrets of our Heavenly Father, we must live very close to Him. And this is just what life in the inner court implies: a continual dwelling in the bosom of the Father (which is our place in Christ), listening for His voice. drinking in His Spirit, learning to look at things from His point of view, and thus to enter into His plans for the world.

There are many who have matters of "judgment" and "controversy" about which they need guidance; and the Lord intends His priests in the inner court to be ever ready to help such needy souls, under the guidance of His Spirit. In Jer. 23 we read the heart-yearnings of our Father-God over the prophets who had failed Him in this, who did not stand in His secret place, and so were not equipped to help those seeking guidance. And in verse 22 He says, "but if they had stood in My counsel and had caused My people to hear My Words, then they should have turned them from their evil way, and from the evil of their doings."

6. They are kept from all known sin. "They shall come at no dead v. 25. person to defile themselves." In all parts of the Scripture death is used as a type of sin; and it was a part of the Nazarite's vow (Num. 6) that he should abstain from all contact with death. Now spiritual death is all around us in this world: how important then for God's priests to be shielded and kept free from its defilement.

When we first come to the Cross of Calvary and see the Son of God dying there for us, as our faith appropriates His sacrifice, the burden of all our past sins rolls away, and we are free. But what about the sin in us, that evil nature ever prone to err, the "old man" Paul speaks of so often? Here comes in the blessed truth of sanctification, by the same one eternal, all-sufficient sacrifice on Calvary's tree. My first look at Jesus on the Cross taught me that "He died for me;" but as I look again I see the further truth that "I died in Him." Thus I see my old man, the sinful nature within me, nailed to the Cross with Jesus; and as I reckon by faith myself to be dead indeed unto sin and alive unto God, the Holy Spirit makes it a reality to me, and I am sanctified-set free from sin and set apart for God.

What the world needs to-day is a host of truly sanctified Christians, who will not only preach with their lips but illustrate by their holy lives the glorious Gospel entrusted to them. eareless, godless worldlings will not take the trouble to read the Bible, but they do read the lives of Christians, and they have a right to expect that our lives should correspond with our Book. When they see irritability, pride or laziness in a professed follower of Jesus, is it any wonder that they discount his testimony or his preaching? May the Lord keep us so humble, and so dependent on Him in simple faith, that the Holy Spirit may be able all the time to keep the flesh in the place of death, and to show forth in every word and action the pure and holy life of Jesus. "If we live in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another; and the Blood of Jesus. His Son, c'eanses us from all sin. one who continues in union with Him lives in sin; no one who lives in sin has seen Him or knows Him. No one who is a child of God is habitually guilty of sin. A God-given germ of life remains in him, and he cannot habitually sin, because he is a child of God." 1 John 1:7 and 3:6-9, Weymouth's translation.

7. Their every need is supplied by God. v. 28-31 "And it shall be unto them for an inheritance: I am their heritance; and ye shall give them no possession: I am their possession. Every dedicated thing in Israel shall be theirs. And the first of all the firstfruits of all things, and every oblation of all, of every sort of your oblations, shall be the priest's; ye shall also give unto the priest the first of your dough. that he may cause the blessing to rest on thine house."

There is no lack to those who follow the Lord fully. Frices may rise, harvests fail, and retrenchments be ordered on every side; but when a priest is dwelling in the inner court, separated unto his God and depending only on HIM, he will find the promise true, "Bread shall be given him, his waters shall be sure," Isa. 33:16.

Here I find in Christ a sure and safe retreat.

And He feeds me with the finest of the

THE CROSS OF CHRIST.

The same cross which connects me with God has separated me from the world. A dead man is evidently done with the world; and hence the believer, having died in Christ, is connected with God, in the power of a new life, a new nature. Being thus inseparably linked with Christ, he of necessity participates in His acceptance with God, and in His rejection by the world. The two things go together. The former makes him a worshiper and citizen of heaven, the latter makes him a witness and stranger on earth. That brings him inside the veil; this puts him outside the camp. If the cross has come between me and my sins, it has just as really come between me and the world .- C. H. M.

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REMARKABLE REVIVAL AT THORN-TON HEATH, LONDON June 9th to 17th, 1918.

At Grange Hall, Thornton Heath there is a Mission carried on by Mrs. Denham, who is better known as Miss Lily Littlebury "the Drunkard's Friend." The Mission was not a Pentecostal Mission but the Lord had used it for the salvation of many souls. Owing to Mrs. Denham having been ill, the work was not in a very prosperous condition and Steven Jeffreys, the Welsh Revivalist, was therefore invited to come from Llanelly to conduct an 3 or 9 days' Mission there.

Altogether Steven Jeffreys gave seventeen addresses and during that time it is estimated by the workers that about 75 souls were converted, and that in addition about 60 back-sliders were reclaimed. These dedicated their lives to God, and began to seek the baptism of the Holy Ghost. Six were baptized with the Holy Ghost with the scriptural evidences and several remarkable cases of healing were witnessed. About 180 came out into the enquiry room altogether. Unfortunately the Mission Hall was only large enough to accommodate about 200 people at a time.

Visions of Christ.

A number of those who attended the Mission saw the Lord in the meetings. These were of all ages, children of about nine years, young men, young women, old men, and old women, saints and sinners. Three of the conversions were caused directly by a vision of Christ. A soldier in the Royal Flying Corps was brought in by another who had consecrated himself to God at a previous meeting, and after hearing the address was obviously convicted would not yield to God. Asked by Mrs. Denham if he could see the Lord, for she could, he answered "No": whereupon she prayed the Lord to open his eyes. The Lord heard her prayer; the soldier saw Christ; and seeing Him, wept and immediately gave his heart to God

The Heavens Opened.

On Thursday evening Jeffreys was preaching about visions and pointing out that in the scriptures visions frequently were given to God's people when they were suffering tribulation and persecution for His name. Examples cited were Paul, who was left for dead at Lystra and caught up into the third heaven; John, to whom the Revelation was given when he was in banishment in the Isle of Patmos for the Word of God (Rev. 1, 9); and Stephen who was stoned for telling the religious people of his day that they did always resist the Holy Ghost. While Jeffreys was speaking of how the heavens were opened to Stephen. God opened the heavens to him (Jeffreys) and he saw into the glory, saw the Lord and the whole scene of Stephen being stoned. Jeffreys' face changed, his lips trembled, all could see that his eyes were opened to behold the unseen realities. He stood looking up into heaven and spoke of what he saw, asked the congregation if they could not see too, but they could not. When the vision passed and he looked at the congregation everything appeared to him to be glittering, for he was dazzled with the glory he had been privileged to see.

Various Conversions.

Members of various denominational churches who thought they were right with God, discovered they had never been born of the Spirit at all, and came to the foot of the Cross. Many saw visions, some heard the angels singing, and some saw lights round Jeffreys head while he was preaching. Jeffreys often did not know what he was going to preach about, but when he got up. the Spirit of God came on him and the preaching was with power. One man was converted by seeing his children being baptized with the Holy Ghost; he came out of curiosity, saw his children on their knees shaking from head to foot, praising and glorifying God, sometimes in their own language and sometimes in an unknown tongue, and he gave his heart to God, there and

Evil Spirits Cast Out.

Quite a number of people who had not got the JOY of salvation were delivered and found joy when the evil spirits were rebuked. One evil spirit came out screaming like some of the cases in the New Testament. One young man who had been baptized with the Holy Ghost sometime before instead of going on with the Word of God had started to study various religions. He had been caught in the net of Russellism (Doctrine of no Hell), lost all his joy, rejected a great part of the Scriptures and was in a very bad condition. He was convicted by the preaching and came into the enquiry room in search of peace. God gave Brother Jeffreys the word of wisdom (1 Cor. 12:8) to deal with him, he was delivered, found his joy, was re-baptized with the Holy Ghost by Jesus, spoke in an unknown tongue under the power of the Spirit, God giving Mrs. Denham the interpreta-"Satan shall not have dominion over thee. My grace is sufficient for thee. My strength is made perfect in weakness."

Divine Healing.

A woman who had had a stroke and been partly paralyzed so that she could not put her feet to the ground was brought to one of the afternoon services in a wheel chair, for healing. When prayed for and anointed with oil, special attention being paid to the words, "Confess your faults one to another and pray for one another that ye may be healed" (Jas. 5:16), she got out of her chair and found she was able to stand alone. Encouraged to walk she took a tottering step and received strength from God, she walked all around the room twice by herself, and then down the hall.

A Methodist who lived about 1½ miles from the Mission was bedridden, given up by the doctors, and dying. He obeyed God and called for the elders of the Church. Steven Jeffreys, Mrs. Denham and another worker went to see him on Sunday, prayed with him.

anointed him with oil, and on Monday evening he was at the Mission, having walked most of the way. He has been again since and is very happy in the Lord. A sister was brought to the Mission in a wheel chair for healing. When questioned, she said she had received the Spirit of God, but that she had not been obedient to Him. All her joy was gone and Satan was tormenting her body. When prayed for and anointed she regained her joy. clapped her hands, praised the Lord, and left the Mission with a face happy with the light of heaven oneit, and the roses again on her cheeks. Asked by her friends if she felt better she said. "I know I shall be healed." Just then two lads of about 17 years of age, one belonging to the Baptist, and the other to the English Church, came up and said, we know she will be healed, as we saw two angels over the wheel chair while she was being anointed with oil." The writer did not know them and entered into conversation them. "It was no imagination, Sir, we saw the angels, we know she will be healed. But someone tells us that if we see visions we shall die. Is that so?" They went away happy to study Joel 2:28, which was quite new to them glad to know that their experience wa a sign of the last days, and that God was confirming to them Steven Jeffreys' message that Jesus was coming soon. ("Where there is no vision the people perish.") Next day a message came that the sister who had been anointed had walked up stairs by herself.

The Heavenly Anthem.

On two occasions God's people were on the tip-toe of expectation, expecting to hear the heavenly anthem, but only two sisters took part singing in tongues and in harmony a few bars of this wonderful song of praise. If David sang in this way, no wonder he was called "the sweet singer of Israel."

Trance and Prophecy.

Some of us had been impressed to ask God to pour out His Spirit as He did on Baalam, Peter, Paul and John and give the people visions in trance in their own homes. This prayer was answered in at least two cases, one being in the writer's home where the Spirit fell on one of the maids at evening prayers and she was in a trance five hours, during which the Lord appeared to her and told her that He was coming soon. He also said:

"This is the time of Daniel's vision, which, although rejected by much people, shall be fulfilled. Have I not sent My ministering spirits and My prophets at all times and in these days of greater light they will not hear My prophets. Yea, they are hungering to silence them and to kill them, and those that do this are not the ignorant ones but those who call themselves the children of God. I know them not, they rob Me of My holy name, the devil has blinded their eyes that they shall not see My mighty wonders with spiritual eyes lest they be born again. It is only those who are born of the Spirit and joined together as one in Me, and bring Me

honor and glory, who bear fruit. For those who are born of the Spirit must bring new souls into birth.'

Revival Continues.

When Steven Jeffreys left after nine days the revival continued under the ministry of Mrs. Dawson and Mrs. Denham. In another 14 days the number of new converts were brought up to considerably over 100. About 30 people were saved under Mrs. Dawson's ministry. This sister is a converted Gipsy, and on one occasion as she was speaking in the Hall the face of the Lord was seen at the back of the Hall looking down upon her solemnly as she was exalting Him and it had a deep effect upon the audience.

Christian reader, this account is written by request in the belief that you will rejoice at these signs of revival in our country and that you will be inspired to launch out to reach the unsaved masses. If you will put your time, prayers and money into bringing the unsaved to Jesus and preach the whole gospel without fearing the face of any man, God will work with you confirming His Word with signs and wonders following as in the days of old. and multitudes will be saved.



blessed and saved souls. In different parts of Georgia mountains and in outof-the-way places near Hoschton, the Gospel was also given out. One meeting in Georgia mountains in a little home the Lord especially blessed, and among the saved were five little boys from ten to fourteen years of age. Four of them received their baptism and took

active part in the regular meetings, besides holding out-door meetings in the mountains by themselves. Their shouts of praise gladdened the hearts of the older ones and will long be remembered. People who don't believe in conversion in childhood should have heard some of their testimonies. There were remarkable healings also.

On account of great persecution, only a few attended most of the meetings in Georgia mountain districts. One place where I preached three churches have already burned, and the little company of Pentecostal people who were saved or baptized during my meetings last year at that place, who have had others added to their numbers this year, do not dare to build even a rude church as it is almost sure to be burned.

Besides doing the work of an evangelist, distributing quantities of tracts, placing Bibles in the homes of Christian families, tacking up gospel signs, I have been distributing quantities of clothing to the very poor, almost without an exception, Pentecostal people. Any one who can help in the way of clothing should address me as soon as possible as freights are very slow these war times. Do not send barrels to me. Write me for address so clothing can be sent direct to its destination. Parcels by post can be sent direct to me, and I will be glad of even one article sent by post. I can use clothes of all kinds for men, women and children, shoes, toys, pieces of cloth, cotton or wool for quilts, also picture cards. As is always the case, quick giving is twice giving. Help given in the past has saved much suffering and perhaps many lives, for the weather in mountain districts is very cold in winter, with snow and ice.-Florence L. Nothing could make us rejoice more than to see these dear Japanese brought to the fullness in Christ. All things are rapidly advancing in prices, but our trust is in God. Coal is very, very expensive, and as we have to buy it by small sacks, one at a time, it sums up greatly. We have three missions and home to heat. We only wish to mention this for prayer."

Bro. Ivan Kauffman writes from Tao Chow, Kansu, China, "The Lord is truly blessing us now. We have had eight days of meetings, ten conversions, more or less, fifteen baptized in water and possibly as many in the Spirit. Praise God, He is with us in spite of all opposition encountered. He has done exceeding abundant." Bro. Kauffman is looking to the Lord to be able to put up a missionary home that will be a sanitary dwelling, a great necessity in China and the cost of the same will be about \$1000. Let us stand with him in faith for this need.

Bro. C. G. Hansen writes from the Virgin Islands, West Indies: "I was over at St. Kitts Island and Montserrat Island a short time ago, and the Lord wonderfully blessed me. At Cayon, St. Kitts, nearly forty souls got saved and Bro. Smyth writes me they are holding on faithfully, thank God. At Happy Hill, Montserrat, many got saved and three received the baptism as in Acts 2:4. After coming from there nine have been baptized in water, and four have received the blessed Holy Ghost, so the Lord is working. My faith has never wavered since God took me out of the ice in the Arctic Ocean. I have many imes been in hard places, but God is always ready to help."

FPAY FOR CHINA

The present is a very serious and critical time in the Chinese Empire. A very solemn article appeared in the proceedings of the China Continuation Committee explaining that there was hardly an honourable, honest statesman. All seem set on making what they can out of their positions; and the country was going to rack and ruin. In all provinces the country is terrorized and trade largely at a standstill through bands of rival, armed companies. Even missionaries' lives are in jeopardy. The election of the new president is stirring up the Southern party, so that still civil war seems inevitable. There never was such a time of need of prayer for China as at present.

Then for Tibet, not only are the Tibetans fighting the Chinese, but late news is that they have demanded from the Government of India a revisal of the Treaty made after 1904, when the British entered Lhassa. So that the Great Closed Land is in the midst of troubles and unrest. Nevertheless God rules, but there is none the less a great opportunity and need for His children to take hold of Him in prayer.—Cecil Polhill, London, England.

Brother W. J. Taylor writes from Kobe, Japan: "The offering in your letter was indeed 'a handful dropped on purpose". Only a few hours previous I had told my head native evangelist that although it was the 25th of September, not one cent had come in since August, and though it was a time of testing, I knew God would not forsake us. Praise Him, He did not, for your letter came as a result.

"We had a terrific typhoon and for the third time blew in the tent at Okayama. In all nearly a hundred dollars damage. Without warning it came, and the first 'puff' did the damage; but as we often sing here both in Japanese and English,

'No we never, never, never will give in, No we won't, no we won't

No we never never never will give in, For we mean to have the victory forever.'

Tuesday, Sept. 24th, on her eleventh birthday, my little girl went down with Scarlet Fever, so the fight is on. Hallelujah for the cross."

Brother J. M. Perkins writes from Cape Palmas, West Africa: "Quite a number of our missionaries have been more or less down with the fever, but news comes from the bush today that all are much better and quite on the mend. Miss Pottorff has just had a very marked and speedy deliverance from her first attack of fever after being in the country at least eighteen months. We have had no other missionary in these parts who has gone so long without fever. We give God all the glory."

SUFFERING AND PRIVATION IN CHINA

Extract from a letter of Bro. L. M. Anglin of Taianfu, Shantung, N. China "We cannot leave the work since so many sacrifices have been made here and now the door is opening up before We are not able to do our full duty because my wife and I have to deny our bodies nearly everything that would seem necessary for one's health. The only thing that keeps is the precious blood. We are not discouraged nor cast down. Praise God. We are not wanting these things. Neither are we complaining, but just telling you so you may know how we are hindered. For nearly two months now we have not had sufficient food. Yesterday we did not get anything together to eat till almost 12 o'clock. The children and I ate a little green lettuce out of the garden to keep from being so very hungry. Last night we sold a few empty boxes and got enough for breakfast this a.m. And the Lord enabled us to sell four others this a.m. to buy food for dinner. So many of our neighbors have suffered this Spring. Were it not for the hope beyond, these things would press us so we could not go on. Our work in the Lord is not in vain. Like Paul on the ocean voyage, the Lord comforts us by visions and dreams and His precious presence. If thirty friends would each give \$5.00 a month we could carry on the present work nicely. On account of hard times we are not expecting great things neither are we asking for thousands of dollars to carry on the work. We have an opening to go to Tsao Hsien and preach Pentecost. There is a large mission there and quite a number of foreigners and a large orphanage. open door has been given us. Pray that we may be able to enter in."

Sister Susan R. Chester, who is on her way back to India, writes "Here I am in Hong Kong, having arrived on the eighh of September. When I came and asked the passage to India, all the companies assured me that there would be no way to go before November, but I kept on asking, and one morning was told that there was a chance to go as far as Singapore, first class. I felt I must take it, although I was sorry to spend the extra money which would be greatly needed on reaching India. So we prayed, and I told the agent to keep me a place but would prefer second class. Yesterday came the good news that I could go all the way to Ceylon second Praise, Oh praise the Lord! We are to sail tomorrow, D. V., Sept. 18th."

Mrs. H. L. Lawler sends a report from Shanghai, China: "God is blessing in the meetings for which we praise Him. One dear girl, about sixteen, saw a beautiful light last Sunday evening when she came into the mission. She said, 'It is so much brighter than the electric lights,' and how her face did shine as she was giving her testimony. She has been saved nearly a year. It was so sweet to see these dear people come to the true God and worship Him."

EARTHQUAKES IN DIVERS PLACES

On Friday the 11th at 10:16, God's mighty hand moved in a way that the people did not expect. All brick buildings here are fissured, and the rich people are living in old wooden houses. According to the papers more than 200 have died. Many have been drowned by the sea, and others were killed by the buildings that were thrown down.

Porto Rico shows an appearance of ruin, but in the midst of all these troubles we are having a most wonderful time with the Lord. The most glorious services are taking place these days. Sixteen have been saved in four days, and a young girl, fourteen years old. received the promised Spirit during the time the earth was shaking. Pray much for us.—J. L. Lugo, Ponce, Porto Rico.

Bro. Adolf Wieneke sends an encouraging word from Tsiningchow, China, "Since February this year, when the Lord greatly blessed us and poured out His Spirit upon us, we felt our precious Jesus among us in our meetings pouring showers of blessings again and again upon us. We still felt a lack of power, so we thought to have a meeting in May to pray earnestly like the 120 in Jerusalem, but the meeting was delayed as I was sick before it, and not strong enough when the time came to have these meetings. But early in June the Lord gave the victory and restored my strength; and also one of my colporteurs, who had been very sick with typhus fever and came very near the gates of death, got healed by the prayer of faith at the same time. 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Sunday School Lesson -

JACOB WINS ESAU (Nov. 24th. Gen. 33:11) Golden Text. Prov. 15:1.

The End of the Supplanter. In order to appreciate the present lesson we have to go back a little way to learn the secret of the change in the character of Jacob, from supplanter to a true brother, with a heart full of love. we left Jacob at Bethel, where the Lord of all grace had given him a revelation of the Son of man in the vision of the ladder to heaven, he had been away in Haran, where, by trickery as well as by industry, he had gotten very rich. In obedience to the word of God, he was coming back to Canaan. Jacob was apparently under conviction, and the fear of the brother he had wronged was like a snare in which his soul was badly trapped. When he heard his brother was approaching with four hundred warriors, Jacob was very much distressed, and began to pray. He had not much faith, and again began his scheming, at which art he was a specialist, and in the hopes of appeasing his brother, he sent a gift of nearly 600 animals, and gave special instructions to his servants to make a space between drove and drove so as to make them look as many as possible.

The boundless grace of the God of Jacob. Yet Jehovah loved Jacob, and in spite of all the personal defects of the supplanter, once again revealed Himself to him. "There wrestled with him a man." It was none other than our Jesus who had come down to deal with the craftiest man in Bible history. Much credit is given by some to Jacob for spending all night wrestling with the angel, but if we study the passage closely we will give all the credit to the Man-Christ Jesus-who wrestled all night with stubborn Jacob until the supplanter was broken. It was when Jacob was helpless and broken that he clung to the Man who wrestled with him and cried, "I will not let Thee go, except Thou bless me." Jacob was given a new name-a new nature-and as he limped forth from the ford of Jabbok that next morning he was Israel, a prince of God.

How patient is that "Man." He has spent more than a night, yea, many weary months and years wrestling with some of us until He has got us broken. Isaiah says, "The lame take the prey," and not until our own nature is lamed can we expect to rescue the prey of the terrible, poor bound sinners enchained by the enemy of souls.

Quiet from the Fear of Evil. Jacob had no fear as he met his brother that next morning, for perfect love had cast it out. He was willing to take the humble place of submission, and seven times we see him bowing before his brother-prophetic, many believe, of the seven "times' or periods that the Jews have been in subjection to the Gentiles. What a blessed reunion is this! Surely another prophetic picture of the harmony of Jews and Gentiles at that time when the earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea. All one!

When questioned as to those around, Jacob had a good testimony to give as to the bounty of the Lord. When Esau did not want to accept the gift that Jacob had sent along as a sort of bargain to appease his brother and to get his own life spared, and was refusing it because he had enough, Jacob insisted he should take it as a love gift. What a change? What the cause? Jacob had been to Peniel and had seen God face to face. Peniel was but the earnest of Calvary where the body of the Man from the glory was broken, that you and I might be made whole. It is on Calvary's lone hill that we can find the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. Beholding the glory of the Lord, we too are changed-not are "going to be"-into the same image from glory to glory, even by the Spirit of the Lord.

JOSEPH SOLD BY HIS BROTHERS (Dec. 1st. Gen. 37:18-28.) Golden Text. Prov. 10:12.

Behind every page of sacred writ the eyes of the pure in heart can see Jesus, and hardly anywhere is His profile more clearly apparent than in the story that we have often caught mother reading and weeping over, the story of Joseph.

Supernatural Dreams. Dreams come, according to Scripture, "through the multitude of business," and if we are fully occupied with our Father's business. we may expect dreams accordingly. Joseph had some remarkable dreams, and told them out in the innocency of his heart. There is that innate in the heart of every son of Adam that hates the supernatural, and Joseph's brethren. who hated him already because he was his father's favorite, when he told them what God had shown him, "hated him yet the more for his dreams and for his words." Read in the New Testament the words of Joseph's great antitype, "They hated Me without a cause." Jesus bore witness to the truth, and to what he had seen and heard in glory, and what hatred, what envy, what malice rose up in the hearts of sinful men! "For envy they delivered Him." they were not satisfied until he was slain. So with Joseph's brethren, "They envied him," and when he came down to see them at Dothan "they conspired against him to slay him." Human hearts have not changed, and those who are true and faithful witnesses of Jesus Christ today may expect similar treatment. The trouble is that we have had so little of the supernatural that the wrath of sinful men has not been fully aroused.

Reuben's Compromise. There was one of Joseph's brethren who was not so bad as the rest, and he did not want the lad murdered, but he was too cowardly to stand up for him, and he did what every coward does, he suggested a compromise. Put the lad in a pit, let him starve to death, they would not have to shed blood and their purposes would be served just the same, and he thought he could sneak around, when no one was looking, rescue the lad and take him to his father. His plan carried, but as with every other compromise, there was no final triumph for righteousness. Joseph was stripped and cast into the pit, and from Gen. 42:21 we see that the lad was in deep anguish of soul as he besought his brethren not to treat him thus. Reuben was not round when the lad was taken out and sold for a slave, and when he came to the pit later to rescue him. Joseph was gone, gone to a slavery, into what in many cases was worse than death. Reuben rent his clothes, his compromise had failed, and though he went crying to his brethren, there was no undoing of the mischief. It always pays to be absolutely uncompromising in our stand for the right.

Beath, Burial and Resurrection. In 1 Cor. 15, Paul gives us the gospel in a few words. Christ died for our sins, He was buried, and He rose again. It was a real death to Joseph to be stripped of that coat of many colors, and it was a real burial to be put down into that pit, but later on "they drew Joseph out of the pit." and it was a real resurrection to a new life. Calvary, the tomb, and the resurrection, foreshadowed on the fields of Dothan! And to everyone who identifies himself with Jesus by a living faith, there is a death to the world and its vanities, its gay coats of special distinction, yea. and sometimes to natural ties; in baptism there is a burial with Christ; but praise God, there is something more, being raised with Him too to walk in newness of life. Every baptismal service today speaks of our Jesus going through the anguish of death, being laid in the cold tomb, and then, having purged our sins, coming forth triumphant over death and the grave and over sin and Satan. And in Him we too are triumphant over all these enemies.

Years later, Joseph, commenting on this, said, "It was not you * * * but God." He learned that great lesson of tracing everything to its first cause, God. And his testimony was, "God meant it unto good." God always does. Have you not found it so?-S. H. F.

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

A GREAT OPEN FIELD FOR THE GOSPEL

France is at present the LAND OF PROMISE for missionary effort. It is the camping ground of armies, prisoners and internes from practically every heathen and Christian country in the world. One million warriors of Africa with their idols, their heathen orgies, and savage customs are gathered in France to bring the heathen land to our very doors. Twenty-five thousand Chinese laborers in one city create a field for several American missionaries. A large percent of the Mahommedan world is gathered there. The French missions are depleted through the awful toll of life this war has claimed amongst the ranks of French witnesses for Christ. The flower of the Missions Evangelique du Paris are either maimed, broken in health or silent in death. As I write, a letter arrives from Pastor Ph. Delord of Paris the Director of that Mission's work in Switzerland, delegating me, as others have done, to make ardent appeals to our American forces to come and fill in the gaps. By grace, I hope to tell the story with a passion born of actual contact with suffering too deep for expression by pen. Pray that the awful gaps may mean to our own youth a challenge to go forth to witness for Christ in the regions beyond with the same zeal which spurs them to respond to their country's call.

Again, these last days in Switzerland are crowded with interviews on the subject of a much needed Missionary Bible Training School in the French language. Six months ago, a sword pierced my soul, as a newly converted Belgian interne, eager to prove his loyalty to his newly found Saviour, offered to join the Congo Inland Mission, and not a single Bible Training School in all of the French speaking countries, France, Belgium and French Switzerland could be found. The Theological Seminaries, asleep in the arms of Higher Criticism or the New Theology, are a menace rather than a help to real soul saving work such as is needed in evangelistic and missionary effort.

This may account somewhat for the present lethargy of the church in Switzerland. We agree with John Mott in his remark, that "Switzerland is the hardest field he has found in Christian lands." Switzerland NEEDS and it WANTS a revival. Help us pray it down as with the more than one hundred thousand internes, soldiers refugees and prisoners here from all kinds of nations. it offers, next to France, an unparalleled field of labor to all the world .- Alma E.
