PRAYER AT THIS TIME WILL BRING COMPOUND INTEREST.

When Jesus prayed, "Father, glorify Thy Name," there came a voice from heaven, "I have both glorified it, and will glorify it again." If you have a measure of the Spirit it is a proof you can have more. The Name of our God will be glorified again. God is tied down to His people. He can be glorified in His people.

Don't limit Him. When the disciples waited in the upper room they had no conception of the nature of the Promise of the Father. It was beyond their wildest dreams. If you wait on God, He will do beyond your wildest dreams. You must be of one accord. In apostolic days seekers were commanded not to depart until they received the promise of the Father.

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"I WILL POUR OUT MY SPIRIT ON ALL FLESH."

The disciples were imprisoned, threatened, beaten. The enemy sought to stop them from preaching the Word of God. "But the angel of the Lord... said, Go, stand and speak in the temple to the people all the words of this life" (Acts 5: 19-20). God so worked that in spite of the opposition of the Sanhedrin and priests and Pharisees, the Word was proclaimed.

The Word must have free course and run and be glorified. In order that the Word shall run and have free course, all barriers, hindrances and apathy must be removed and then we shall see the running of the Word right through the world. The world is encircled by the Word like a fuse, and when the Spirit ignites the fuse the light will run along its world wide course as never before.

Light will be where there was darkness. The Word shall run and have free course and be glorified. Is the Word glorified today? Only partially. It's going to be glorified. The Holy Spirit is going to quicken the Word as never before. The Word is circulated to a wider extent than has ever before been known. Though it is the letter of the Word that is so circulated, the Spirit can quicken the letter. Jesus said, "The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life."

In Ezekiel 37:1-10 it is written: 'The hand of the Lord was upon me, and carried me out in the Spirit of the Lord, and set me down in the midst of the valley which was full of bones,

"And caused me to pass by them round about: and, behold, there were very many in the open valley; and, lo, they were very dry.

"And He said unto me, Son of man, can these bones live? And I answered, O Lord God, thou knowest.

"Again He said unto me, Prophesy upon these bones, and say unto them, O ye dry bones, hear the word of the Lord.

"Thus saith the Lord God unto these bones; Behold, I will cause breath to enter into you, and ye shall live:

"And I will lay sinews upon you, and will bring up flesh upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and ye shall live; and ye shall know that I am the Lord.

"So I prophesied as I was commanded: and as I prophesied, there was a noise, and behold a shaking, and the bones came together, bone to his bone.

"And when I beheld, lo, the sinews and the flesh came up upon them, and the skin covered them above: but there was no breath in them.

"Then said He unto me, Prophesy unto the wind, prophesy, son of man, and say to the wind, Thus saith the Lord God; Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live.

"So I prophesied as He commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood up upon their feet,

an exceeding great army.'

Can these bones live? Can the dry letter of the Word live? The prophet was told to prophesy, "Come . . . breath and breathe upon these slain." And the breath came into them, and there arose an exceeding great army, made out of dry bones! And it was all brought about in the following order, namely: 1, The command of God: 2, The obedience of the prophet, "So I prophesied as I was commanded;" 3, The command of the prophet, "Say to the wind, Breathe upon these slain that they may live;" 4. The breath came upon the slain and the result was an exceeding great army.

God has His plans of working: He does not work in an arbitrary way, but rather with method: On the day of Pentecost He raised up 120 prophets. The breath of the Spirit came upon them. Peter was God's mouthpiece. He preached and there was an exceeding great army cf 3000. Again the divine breath of the living son of God came upon God's witnesses, and the result of the overflow of the Spirit was 5000 regenerated souls.

If 120 Spirit filled saints can bring in one day 3000, how many will 1200 Spirit filled saints bring in in one year?

"And it shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of my Spirit upon all flesh" (Acts 2:17). On the day of Pentecost they were limited to Judea. But in our day this promise in its fulfillment means that God is going to pour out His Spirit upon all flesh to the uttermost parts of the earth. He is going to pour out His Spirit on Gentile flesh as well as on Jewish flesh.

We can look to Him to raise up prophets, Ezekiels, Jeremiahs and Isaiahs—men saturated with the Word and saturated with the Holy Ghost,—men who won't be frightened to answer God's big question, "Can these dry bones live?" Ezekiel made God give His own answer, "O Lord God, Thou knowest."

In the world today you see a great mass of dry bones. Can they live? "O, Lord God. Thou knowest" will be our answer. He who made the bones can put life into them, and He can put breath into the frame work.

There is sufficient wind for the biggest army of dry bones in the universe! Prophesy to the wind, north, south, east and west. Have you ever come to the end of the wind? A lull in the wind does not mean a dead stop. At the divine command the prophecy will be fulfilled, the wind will come and the dry bones will be clothed by the breath coming upon them.

This company will not be a company who are helpless. They will be an army of picked, Spirit filled men selected for a definite work.

In Revelation 19:11-16 it is written: "And I saw heaven opened, and behold a white horse; and He that sat upon him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness He doth judge and make war.

"His eyes were as a flame of fire, and on His head were many crowns; and He had a name written, and no man knew, but He Himself.

"And He was clothed with a vesture dipped in blood: and His name is called The Word of God.

"And the armies which were in heaven followed Him upon white horses, clothed in fine linen, white and clean.

"And out of His mouth goeth a sharp sword, that with it He should smite the nations: and he shall rule them with a rod of iron: and He treadeth the winepress of the fierceness and wrath of Almighty God.

"And He hath on His vesture and on His thigh a name written, King of Kings, and Lord of Lords."

A Divine army of saints has to be completed and the Son of God is going to do it. The army which follows Him, whose name is the Word of God and who rides on a white horse, is composed of those who ride on white horses; they compose an exceeding great army.

God's order for the building up of the army is first, dry bones (sinners), then sinews, then flesh, then breath. Later on these will be clothed in fine linen, white and clean, riding on white horses and following Him who was called Faithful and True. An exceeding great army! Called and faithful and chosen, going forth conquering and to conquer!

The material is all at hand. Get the vision. Listen to the command to prophesy. Be like one who said, "I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision." Amen.

Questions and Answers

625. Does the Bible teach that the promise of Eternal Life includes eternal life to our mortal bodies without death?

Ans. No, not at all. Many blessed saints in the centuries past have felt they would live till Jesus came, some claimed the Word promised this to those who would believe for it, and even that the Lord has told them in particular that they would be alive when He came. But they have all died just the same. Some now alive claim these same things, but if Jesus tarries long enough they will all sleep in Jesus as have the rest.

If such had been included in the promise of Eternal Life, surely some of the early saints who were victorious and taught by the apostles would have attained to it, but they did not. Such claims are not according to the Word. The bodies of the saints will live, praise God, but it will be through the resurrection or through a change in the bodies of those who are alive at the rapture.

The sect called Israelites in Michigan claim they will make up the 144,000 in Revelation, and will live in their bodies till Jesus comes, but they are dying off and filling up a cemetery just like everybody else. Their claim is pure moonshine. I hope no other saints will be caught and deceived by this teaching.

627. Will the League of Nations bring in the millennium?

Ans. No, even the Foreign Secretary, the great statesman of England, says it is foolishness to expect it to usher in the millennial reign of Christ on earth. He is right. The Bible shows clearly it will not.

628. Does the Bible reveal the day or the hour when Jesus will come for His own?

Ans. No, Jesus said that even the angels in heaven knew not these things, that the Father only knows the day and the hour.

Jesus revealed many things that would precede His coming and the signs whereby we might know when that day is nigh at hand, even at the door, and we see these things being fulfilled all over the world today. Let us look up and rejoice, for our redemption draweth nigh.

629. Are all the promises and plans of God conditional, or are some things predestinated and will come to pass no matter what we do?

Ans. Most of God's promises are conditional. Even many prophecies of punishment and destruction that seem on their face to be unconditional are conditional, nevertheless. God told Jonah to declare He would destroy Nineveh within forty days. But though not expressed, it was conditioned on their repentance. When they repented and thoroughly humbled themselves, God forgave and spared them. This is God's usual rule, either expressed or implied.

But the great outlines of God's eternal plans are fixed, and will come to pass no matter what men or devils may do. Between these great fixed lines there is ample room for man's freedom, responsibility and redemption upon the acceptance of Christ. But the plan of the ages will roll on exactly as God has predetermined, and nothing can thwart the eternal ends which God has set out to accomplish. Hallelujah!

Our supreme and final effort will wind up in the Great Tribulation, in colossal failure, and Jesus Christ will then take up the reins of things, and the world under Him will blossom as a rose from the River unto the ends of the earth. Even so, come Lora Jesus!

Bro. A. H. Post writes from Egypt that at one station they are erecting their own humble Mission House because of finding it simply impossible to secure a suitable place for the meetings. He speaks of bringing out a "Christian Evangel" in Arabic to reach the fifty millions who read the Arabic language in Syria, Palestine and Arabia, and asks us to unite with him in prayer about this. At Alexandria there is what is known as the Good Shepherd School, the brother and sister in charge of which have received the baptism of the Spirit, and who desire to come into vital union and co-operation with the Council work. As there are a dozen native workers to support, Bro. Post needs a minimum of \$250.00 per month to carry on the Pentecostal work in different parts of Egypt.

It is blessed to know that in God's precious word we find His provision for the healing of our bodies, declared in words that none dare gainsay, as here in Exodus 15:26. And it is blessed to know that we have proved His word and found Him true. Hallelujah!

Beloved, there is a place of establishment we need to reach on this line. We need to get rooted and grounded, fixed on His Word, and then God will have more opportunity to prove Himself. Many who think they are trusting God, alas, are only trying Him, and God knows our hearts and He knows how steadfast or vacillating we are going to be. It must grieve the heart of our precious Lord, when He has said so much and done so much and we are yet so dull on this line. We sometimes hear saints of God say, "Well, if we can't have faith for healing, we just have to have a doctor or medicine." Dear ones, we can have faith for healing, and we should have it or die trying. Is this statement too strong? I say a thousand times no! For if we set our faces like a flint to trust God, sink or swim, He will not let us die until our time comes, and then fifty doctors couldn't save us. If our treasures are really in heaven, death is not such a calamity that we need to be weak-kneed as to our confidence in Him. It is time for us, as His Spirit-filled representatives on earth, to be settled on this great question. Will we trust our God or will we continually grieve His great loving heart by our faithlessness?

Since God first healed me many years ago, it has not entered my soul to doubt Him, praise His great name, and I have found Him faithful. He says that He will keep us. Why not believe Him? For some years, too, I had not the blessed light that we have now of discerning the precious broken body and shed blood for the healing of our bodies. Paul said for this cause many are sick and many sleep (are dead). It is so plain I wonder that we so long have overlooked the real meaning of the blessed communion at the Lord's Supper for the healing of our bodies. Without him, truly we can do nothing; but surely He gives us encouragement enough to put our trust in Him. By His wonderful grace somehow He constrained me to trust Him at all times, and so He has been able to manifest His healing power many times in my body. All glory to Him.

He has delivered me from Influenza when from fifteen to eighteen were dying every day here in Springfield in October. In the first place He did not let me fear. I made no effort to keep out of the way of it. One night I went to bed feeling very ill, cold chills, shooting pains all through me. I still did not fear, asked no one to pray and hardly prayed myself, but just simply threw myself entirely on my Lord. About two o'clock the battle began. The precious Spirit Himself interceded for me for

about an hour. When it was over I slept like a babe till time to get up, and felt as well as ever in my life. O the goodness of the Lord!

Beloved, if we would but let Him, He would show us His goodness every day. In Jeremiah 31:14 He says, "My people shall be satisfied with My goodness." Bless His dear name forever. years ago I fell head first down a flight of 19 stairsteps, down a rough back stairway; no covering on them and very steep also. I stooped to pick up some milk tickets, and the next thing I knew I was going down and I thought it would surely kill me. But some of God's believing children prayed for me, and in five minutes I walked right back up those steps and had a perfect night's rest, though badly bruised up, not a broken or even fractured bone. It was a miracle. Oh it is the Lord who keepeth!

About eight years ago I had a bad case of blood poisoning and almost lock jaw caused by picking a small pimple on my chin with a needle that had just a tiny bit of rust on it. My husband was more than three hundred miles away at a camp-meeting and had no idea of coming home before Monday. A phone message, a telegram and a special delivery letter all failed to reach him. But on Thursday afternoon the Lord gave him a vision of me in distress and speechless, looking up to nim with an expression that was pleading for help. He could not dispel the feeling that I needed him, and so took the fast train and arrived home Friday morning. It must have been God, because when I was anointed and prayed for by eleven o'clock that morning I was healed. I had a blazing fever, pains all over and terrible pains in my head, jaws set and neck stiff, and a red streak about three inches wide extending from my chin towards my heart. My children were frantic almost for a physician, but I knew that God would undertake, if He was not through with me, and was joyfully trusting Him. Great is our God and greatly to be praised. He never fails. I do not question why He allows these awful things to come. But I believe it is this, we must learn to trust Him more and more and more. Don't you? People take very strenuous physical exercise to make them stronger. God tests our faith to make it stronger.

I can look back and see His merciful hand of love over me times without number. Once when a great loss came into my life by the death of a loved one, I could positively feel tender arms about me and I could almost see the Lord; I knew He was there, and O how He made me still before Him. He comforted me as a mother comforteth her child. He took the sting away. No tongue can tell, O how sweet He was to me!

Six years later my precious oldest daughter, not yet 21, was called away from earth. He was there again to pour in the oil and the wine. If He had not been there, how could I have borne it? Ah, no wonder the very heart

strings are torn asunder! My sweet, blue eyed child, but God gave me such a beautiful vision of her, pure and safe, and of the angels taking her away. Take the world, but give me Jesus. I have found Him a very present help in time of trouble, and I did not have to run out and hunt Him up. He was there. Hallelujah! Hallelujah to His name!

I have tried to tell these things for His glory and to encourage other hearts to put their trust in Him, the Almighty One. In dozens of smaller ways the dear Lord has made Himself so real to me, has led me and cared for me in very definite ways. It is no merit I have. Many times it seems to me I am absolutely a slacker on the Lord, and surely do not do anything of merit, but I do trust Him, beloved, and I do believe Him. Even this He gives to me.

With all my heart I want every fainthearted and feeble-kneed one to know that God will heal you, if you will say yes to Him forever. I will trust Him if I die tonight. If the Lord tarries I will have to die sometime. Let Jehovah-Rapha have you, soul and body. It is glory just to walk with Him. The precious promises in Exodus 15:26; 23:25; Deut. 7:15; Jas. 5:14-15 and Mark 1:24 we have and many more. His Word says they are every one yea and amen in Christ Jesus. Thanks be unto our God.—Mrs. E. N. B.

He Set the Captive Free

Soon after we landed in Oohn, began visiting the hospital once or twice a week. On one occasion I was much moved as I noticed the intense suffering of a poor frail woman, and I went to her bed to try to point her to Jesus, our Physician. She soon understood by my broken words in her language as I pointed upwards and knelt and prayed beside her that I was telling about Jesus, and she put her hand under her pillow and drew out an old rosary and began her prayer on those lifeless beads, and expression was just as lifeless as the beads. Oh, how I longed to really be able to bring her to my God, He who could not only change that expression but her whole soul and body. Somehow she seemed ever before me, and I found myself going almost every day to see her. Every time she seemed a little more open. I finally secured her a Testament in the Spanish language and marked passages for her to read.

Our family of orphans and others had grown until we were obliged to look for a larger home. The Lord definitely led my dear husband to an old haunted house, or rather a house that had stood vacant for years because of some superstition of ghosts. When my husband returned from seeing this house I went with him to see the old place and God witnessed to my heart as He had witnessed to my husband, that this was where He wanted us to live. As we acknowledge Him in all our ways, He will direct our paths.

We went at once to find the owner of this old tumble down house, and found a rather well educated Chinaman who spoke good English. At once he saw his chance because he saw we were "Molikenas Hooli" (white strangers) and asked \$30.00 a month for the house. It was an eight roomed old frame building and badly in need of repair. We told him we could not pay such a price. He looked us over and asked if we were Christians, and we answered, "Yes", He then wrote us out a lease for a year at \$16.00 a month, with the understanding that we do our own repairing. He was pleased because he thought he had us fast among the ghosts for a year, and we went away rejoicing because we knew God had done all we asked in giving us the home for \$16.00, and we moved into it the next day.

Before noon a poor man came to our door with two children, one a boy of seven and the other only thirteen months old. He begged and cried for us to take care of his children for him, saying he had just come from Kawaii, that he had no money and had to get work, but could not keep the children at the Emigration Station because baby was too small. He also told us that his wife was sick. We felt we could not take such a charge with so much on our hands, for the old house was like a sieve, the rain poured in through the roof, not a door had a latch on it, and the mosquitoes swarmed like bees and nearly sent us wild with their stings. But as we went down before God He made it plain to us that He had directed the man to our place, and so we took the children.

The very next day a woman, about thirty years of age, came and gave her heart to Jesus and offered to care for the baby and help me if I would give her a bed and something to eat. We recognized the goodness of God toward us both and kept her also.

After a few days I was surprised to find I had taken in the two children of the woman I was visiting in the hospital, and she did not know, neither did her husband, but our God knew, and was working out His plans to bring honor and glory to the precious name of Jesus. Very soon the sick woman was to be discharged from the hospital as an incurable case, after having several operations, and one kidney removed, and the other so much diseased that nothing could be done for her. I talked with the doctors and nurses, but no use, she must go.

As I walked home, Jesus spoke to me telling me to take the sufferer to my home. I found I was very unwilling to obey Him as my husband had been forced to go to work to meet the needs of the home, and I had so much on my hands I felt I could do no more, but as I told my husband he said the Lord had shown him also to take the woman in. The cross was heavy, and I could only see the cross. At that time we had a sick missionary, Bro. Williams and wife, with us. and I drew back.

Because of my lack of prompt obedience in taking this woman into our home, the emigration people took the case in hand and I soon got word to take the children to Liki Liki, an island boat going to Kawaii, and, Oh friends, it was then I paid for my disobedience, when I saw that family sent off and that there was no bed for the sufferer. I sent a boy to my home and got bedding, made her a bed on deck, and went home unable now to change matters as they were then in the hands of the emigration company. I went home and got down before God, and for six hours I cried to God confessing my faults and asking Him to spare Juana's life, and if He would send her back to me I would give her my bed. The burden lifted and the peace of God filled my heart, and in my busy life I forgot all about it, but Jesus never forgets!

One Sabbath morning I found the same poor woman with her children at my door, all stooped and suffering with pain, and the odor from her clothing almost unbearable. At that time every bed I had was full. I was going to put her in my own bed when Acintho offered his bed. He was a homeless boy, nineteen years old, who had lost his right hand in the pineapple factory, and who had come to us from the hospital. I made the sufferer comfortable and cared for her temporal needs, and for two days my time was so taken up that I found no time to try to point her to Jesus, but all the time my heart was going up in prayer. We learn on the

field to run and pray, and pray and run.

The second night after she came I heard Juana call me at 11:30 P. M., and as I entered her room it was like stepping into the presence of my God. She sat up in bed, her body trembling under the power of God, her hands extended, and her face radiant with the glory of God while she repeated over and over, "Before Jesus far away, now inside! Before afraid to Muckie (die), now no die, go to Jesus," and she preached and praised and glorified Jesus in English and Spanish, and in other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance. Jesus visited her that night alone and saved, healed and baptized her in the Holy Ghost. Everyone in the home gathered in that room from midnight until morning, and it was truly an Upper Room experience.

She got up early and began to sweep the floor and in less than a week walked seven blocks to our mission twice on Sunday. It was she, now strong and well thru His stripes, who touched the throne of God and brought the answer down in the home and mission the following two months. She joined her husband again in Lohina Mawi, and for one year we only had letters saying, "We are happy in Jesus, but no meetings," and begging us to come and open meetings at Lohina.

At Christmas time in 1916 Juana Sanche and her family came to stay a week with us, and our hearts were filled with gratitude to God as we saw her radiant face and her husband's reverence to God, and found she had grown in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour. She ate a hearty dinner on Christmas day, then in the evening she inquired if there was not a meeting. We answered. "Yes," and then urged her to eat something before she went, to which she replied, "Oh too plenty Kou Kou (food), little Jesus. Little Kou Kou, plenty Jesus," meaning if she would refrain from eating supper the Lord would meet her in the meeting. This poor heathen woman, only saved one year, and shut out of meetings, had yet been taught these valuable lessons by the Holy Ghost, lessons many fail to learn here in the United States. We saw them off to Oakland, Calif., where the husband is at work on a fruit farm, and Juana is happily caring for her family, and praising Jesus. We are thanking Him also that He counted us worthy to entertain one of the least of His, and as never before in this work, we do it as unto Him.

Will all who hear this pray for Berachah Home, and that grace and strength be given us to keep these doors open for those whom He sees fit to send.

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MORE ABOUT THE MINISTERS.

In my last article on this General Council page I gave my counsel concerning the minister's responsibility to be a true and dependable man of God in every respect, that the ministry may not be blamed and that serious difficulties may not arise as the result of a wrong attitude on the part of the people toward God's anointed. I feel that very strongly; and then there is another side to the situation as there always is. Even when ministers are truly called and anointed and sent to a people, there is an inclination on the part of many believers to deny them their true place and authority in the relationship entered upon. There is a willingness to receive the man and to listen to his message as a means of blessing for themselves and to look upon him even as a real comfort to them from the Lord.

If he is an Evangelist, they are glad he has come and hopeful that his stay among them may result in a revival among the people. They are zealous for the salvation of others and do most heartily enjoy being in a big meeting where others are being saved and baptized in the Spirit. It always brings a quickening to all the saints who are not so far backslidden that they cannot get warm by the fire when it burns upon the altars, and they are all glad he has come until he says something about their responsibility in the matter of helping do something beside shouting and singing in the meetings. Then there is, at least in some cases, a sudden coolness developed in the atmosphere around there and the result of a changed attitude toward the Evangelist will be apparent even to the sinners who are coming to the meeting. And finally it will prove that some people look upon the ministry as wholly a matter provided for their convenience and comfort, but not at all for their discipline and development as servants of God. It is the minister who, to them, is the servant of God and who is supposed to do all the servant's work there is to be done. They are SAINTS and the SAINTS are supposed to simply shout and shine and tell all about it after it is over.

If it is a Pastor who is to be considered, it is very often worse than in the case of the Evangelist. Some assemblies, I trust they are the exception and not the rule, after having asked a minister to come to them and having chosen him to be the pastor by a unanimous vote with all hands up, will look upon him and treat him with supreme condescension instead of recognizing him as one who is among them as in God's place and who is responsible to God for leading them into safe and successful soul-saving service as servants to whom He has intrusted the interests of His kingdom. They consider their Pastor as one who is available and upon whom they are free to call at any time of day or night to come to them for any service they may desire of him and

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woe to the poor man if he is not ready to pray the prayer of faith that will bring them the healing they need or to perform any other service required of him. He may have been treated with so much disrespect and have been denied by them the very sustenance of life, so far as they are concerned he may be starving even, but unless he is on the job with the faith they themselves utterly lack, tho they are well fed both spiritually and naturally, they are inclined to think and quite inclined to say, well, (some who read this may know what and so I shall not repeat it to others).

It is true that the pastor is to be an example to the flock, but he cannot be expected to be such and to perform his appointed ministry among a people who mistreat him and deny him his true place among them. He is there as God's representative in the business on hand and should have his people's most tender care at all times, with a feeling in every breast that he is a man upon whom God has laid His hands and has separated unto Himself, a HOLY THING; sanctified, set apart to act for GOD in His plan for His people.

I suppose it is not very much different to God whether the people mistreat His ministers or mistreat HIM. It is easy for me to see why God claims a portion of His people's material things and how it is that He demands the first fruits of all their increase. He needs it for His ministers. An unhappy and very distressing condition is created when people of God for some reason do not understand or are not willing to obey God in this respect. Then it is that the people think THEY are supporting a Pastor or HELPING an Evangelist; but when the people see and agree that God has some rights even in the material things and that He has a special agent in the field to whom His share is to be given, then a poor Pastor may humbly say, "The Lord supplies my every need both spiritual and material."

Many would not entertain the idea of having a man among them who did not trust the Lord for his support while at the same time that which God has planned to use in supplying His ministry is withheld as tho they had a right above that of God Himself to dictate in its use. However, the most far reaching influence for evil in this misunderstanding and wrong relationship results from a cheapening of the sacred office of the pastor as moral and spiritual instructor of his people. There is a sense in which a pastor has the rule over his people under God and should be obeyed by them. The welfare of their souls may depend upon it and unless a people are willing to recognize this God-given authority and obey the directions of their Pastor, he will be unable to help them as they need and will be free before God from responsibility for their condition as a result. They themselves are the losers in greatest measure, but the heart of any true pastor is torn to bleeding by such willfulness and disregard for his sacred office and responsibility toward God.

All this is written as the result of observation running thru a long experience with these matters and comes from my heart to those who are my own people, whom I love. I do not think these conditions are present everywhere or that they predominate among us, but they are here in our midst or I would not mention them. I most heartily believe that they who are really intending to walk with the Lord and be ready to go when HE comes to claim His own, only need to see and understand concerning these matters (as well as all others), to conform to God's Word and will in them, even if self-humiliation is essential to that end. Others-who do not really intend to walk with the Lord, but trust that HE will walk with them rather-will continue to cheapen God's ministry and deny them their true place among us.

A STATEMENT FROM BRO. PINSON.

Please permit me to make a statement to the brethren and to the saints scattered abroad through the Christian Evangel!

I want to say to one and all that I am very sorry that I got mixed up or confused over the tongue question and I am really sorry for the stand I took in the Council at St. Louis. I was sincere, nevertheless I was wrong both in the doctrinal point and in not keeping silent. I ask forgiveness for the same.

We teach others that when they see they are wrong to confess it, so I am doing as I preach it! God only knows what I have suffered in this great struggle both to be true to Him in doctrine and to obey the call of God to get the Gospel to the Spanish speaking people. I have hindered my own work by the stand I took, I confess, but trust I have learned some lessons in this struggle that I shall never forget. One of the lessons is to be more patient with those that do not see as I do. We may be right in doctrine but wrong in presenting it. I mean to say we may present the truth in the wrong spirit. I confess I fear that has been done in this movement by some of us.

Brethren, pray for us, for we by the grace of God have taken our stand for a real Pentecostal experience: the baptism in the Spirit as Acts 2:4 teaches it, "They were all filled with the Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance." Glory to God, we will endeavor to rightly divide the Word of truth!

I want to thank God for the article that Bro. Kerr wrote sometime ago on "Tongues," for it was such a help to me. I never felt more like going forth in this Mexican Missionary work than I do now. We are now on the border and the devil don't like for us to do this missionary work. Not a house to be rented here and we were not permitted to put up a tent in the town to live in, so we camp just outside of the town of Calexico. Calif. and we are living somewhat like the Mexicans. We need more workers in this field to help us in this hard battle, but unless you mean to undergo hardships and privation of many good things there would be no need of coming this way!

Gaston has been making an exhaustive study of the matter and is soon to appear in a series of articles to be printed in the Christian Evangel in which he gives his present views.—J. W. W.

Sister Mary Chapman reports victory in special meetings at Royapetta, Madras, India. "From ten to twenty Indian people were provided with room and meals that they might have time and opportunity to seek God. Some were from parts of Madras too far distant to come and go. God met with us very preciously and we know He is doing a deep work in many hearts. Six received baptism by immersion, and three the evidence of the full baptism of the Spirit."

Bro. Will K. Norton of Benares, India, writes, "These days we are being kept extremely busy looking after influenza patients, repairing buildings, overseeing the work of our Indian preachers and doing personal work among the pilgrims. We have rented a hall in the native part of the city where I go every day to meet special enquirers among the pilgrims and others who desire to ask questions and learn more about Jesus. There are several interesting cases whom I would like to ask prayer for. God is working in their hearts. We are believing for a great revival in this heathen stronghold."

Bro. James Harvey of Nawabganj, India, writes, 'We had a good Christmas in helping the poor around us. There has been much suffering on account of war, famine and "flu" and we were glad to help these people. I believe that through prayer and warm clothing we have saved a number of lives (James 2:15-17). We distributed 250 blankets, dresses, coats, etc., and 230 lbs. of food. We hold meetings once a week in seven different places regularly besides scores of others. We are now organized to do more real and permanent work. The church will be finished and consecrated before this reaches you.'

Bro. John M. Perkins writes from Cape Palmas, Liberia, a further word concerning Sister Bowley. "Rhodema Mendenhall Bowley was one of the first nine missionaries to come to this place about ten years ago and has been here ever since with the exception of a furlough home. She came from a Quaker family in Iowa and was a real missionary at heart. About eighteen months ago she and Bro. Bowley were married, and they have been doing pioneer work in a new tribe ever since. During the last two weeks she suffered much and expressed a desire to be with her Lord and Saviour. She experienced a very triumphal death and continued to sing and praise the Lord as long as it was possible for her to do so. Pray much for dear Brother Bowley."

Bro. Geo. M. Kelley writes encouragingly of the jail work near Sainam, S. China. "There are as many as sixteen who have given their hearts to the Lord to be baptized as soon as an opportunity is presented. Some who are in for life say they care little for this body of flesh, but they ask that I petition the governor to let them out long enough to go and be baptized in the river. They look forward to the day when we go and preach the gospel to them, and every Tuesday when they hear the train whistle blow they say, 'There he is, Mr. Kelley is coming.' Most of the poor fellows have not enough clothing to keep them warm in cold weather and even in their cells they cannot keep their bodies warm."

Sister Willa B. Lowther writes of a blessed Christmas at Sainam, S. China. 'The decorations of paper flowers, green foliage and flags brought out swarms of curious people, and we were delighted for the opportunity of explaining to them the real meaning of Christmas. Significant it is indeed that we should be celebrating the birth of our Lord during the same week that the Chinese are celebrating the devil's advent. His occurred on Tuesday and our Lord's on Wednesday. There is much feasting, idol-worship and indulging in sin on their part, and there is much rejoicing and thanksgiving on our part for the unspeakable gift lying in our possession. Hall'elujah." Sister Lowther writes that she is planning to open up a school at Shin Tong in connection with the mission. She reports that Bro. Kelley's home is going up rapidly now, and every morning at the family altar they are reminding the Lord to send in the thousands of dollars that will be needed to pay for the completed building.

GOOD NEWS FROM JAPAN.

We have good news from one of our Japanese workers, the English speaking interpreter. He spent some time on the top of a mountain and received a mighty baptism of the Holy Ghost. Bro. Coote's worker and Bro. Gray's pastor both received up in the hills. This means very much to the work. There are ten baptized in the Spirit altogether and others are tarrying. God is working both in Yokohama and in the village work. All the workers have the baptism. We have five prospective workers for Japan. FAT SHAN, SOUTH CHINA.

We moved to Fat Shan two months ago, and found the field so white that we wanted to go night and day trying to gather in some of the harvest. We often have large crowds to preach to, and for the most part the people are eager to hear. But there are often a few mockers and scoffers.

At one place an upper class man dressed in his silk, came up where we were preaching and began, "Your God has made a wonderful plan of salvation, etc., but I am sorry that according to the measurements in your bible, He has made heaven too small," and then walked off laughing, and would not hear what we had to say tho we called him to come back.

Worse than the scoffers is the dense darkness over their minds and hearts, making it so hard for them to understand the simple story of God's love. Sixteen have been saved in the prison where we have been preaching every Tuesday afternoon for over a year. One was released a few days ago and came to see us. This prison is at Sam Shui. We have left there, but the Sai Nam missionaries, three miles away, are keeping up the services.

Many thanks to each one who has sent us means to carry on the work. It takes quite a bit to keep our ten little girls in school and a boy in the Bible school, and buy tracts to distribute, and pay rent, and train and boat fare, besides personal, and many miscellaneous expenses.

NINGPO, CHINA

About two weeks ago a native Christian brought a heathen man to hear the Gospel, and also to ask prayer for his wife's healing. She had been in bed some days, and he had spent much of his meager savings in idol worship, feasting the devil and using all sorts of charms, and giving his wife food that had been offered to idols, but she only grew worse. He was a devout idolater, having paper gods pasted on each of his water jars, over his cook-stove and on his doors, and even in his chickencoop, besides having many wooden gods and gods of clay, etc., and yet his heart was far from at peace. He was so bound by the devil that he was afraid to remove one of his gods lest the devil's wrath would follow, and yet he had come to the place where he had lost confidence in all those things. He gladly accepted the offer of this friend to bring him here to hear the Gospel. As we talked with him, explaining the way of salvation, one could see a change in his expression, a new hope having sprung up in his heart. He knelt with us in praver, for the first time kneeling before the true and living God. He told us he was going home to destroy all his idols and he was determined that he was going to follow Jesus. He accepted joyfully all we told him, but all seemed so wonderful to him and so very different from what he had followed. He was quite amazed that there was a living God who loved him and his. We gave him a scripture portion and some tracts when he left. A few days later he asked the friend to come and tell us that prayer had been answered and his wife was well. Yesterday he came in person to tell us of his wife being raised up, and wanted to hear more of the Good News. We are praying that God will fully save this family and make them true witnesses for Him in their heathen community. It costs much for one to come out from heathenism and become a child of God, in fact, it is a real miracle, because they usually have so much persecution from neighbors and relatives, but God is able for all. Praise His Name.

Our dear children are all well, and going on nicely. There is a growing spirit of earnestly seeking the Lord in our midst. A wee baby of five months was brought into us last Thursday by a poor heathen father whose wife had just died, leaving him with several helpless little ones. Someone told him of the Home here and he brought the little one in hopes we would receive it. The baby was such a dear one, but Oh so filthy, dirty and half starved. After the papers were made out we gave her a bath and put on some clean clothes and she looks quite different. One of our young women, dear Eng-seng, kindly consented to look after her, and baby is thriving. God so prospered everything done for her, even sending in a native pastor to call, who upon seeing her, handed me \$1.00 to buy something for her. We were just praying for some money to be sent in to buy her a bamboo cradle, and this was God's answer. She is such a good baby and gives so little trouble and is growing sweeter and prettier each day. We named her Enfot (comfort and blessing).-Nettie D. Nichols.

JOHANNESBURG, S. AFRICA.

We are glad to report progress, and results in our work, from the various stations, and although just recently we have been passing through many trials. God has to be praised for making us more than conquerors through Jesus Christ our Lord.

During the recent plague of Spanish Influenza we lost one of our most valued workers; Brother John W. Ingram has passed on to be forever with the Lord. He spoke the native language fluently, and had our compound work well in hand. Consequently, his homegoing was a great loss to the natives, and the Mission at large. However, in our hour of need, God has been very near and real to us, with the needed strength for the extra burden, as we placed our shoulder to the wheel, endeavoring to fill the gap. During my last two visits to the compounds, eleven souls gave their hearts to the Lord, and sixteen who had been previously saved passed through the waters in Baptism. It is a glorious privileg we have of

heathen. It takes patience, and "precept must be upon precept, line upon line, here a little and there a little," and it is astonishing to us as we see them grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, like trees planted by the rivers of water, for when the glorious truth of salvation finally breaks over them, truly they become new men in Christ Jesus.

Our dearly beloved Brother Salter, from our Congo stations accompanied me on this trip. He is a precious soul, deep in the Word. God made his messages a real blessing to hungry hearts. At the close of the convention he took the train for Capetown, expecting to take the first boat to England in the interest of the work, and on a much needed furlough. We have been advising him to visit the brethren in the States, and I think if time permits you will probably have the pleasure of seeing him in your midst.

REVIEW.

GOD'S HAND IN A NATION'S LIFE. Mar. 30. Read Joshua 24:14-28. Golden Text, Proverbs 14:34.

1. Pharaoh Oppresses Israel. Ex. 1 and 2. The children of Israel were a nation separated from the world to preserve the true worship of Jehovah. those who are of faith, those who are born again, are God's spiritual Israel, His "holy nation" (1 Pet. Pharaoh oppressed Israel, but we have an enemy worse than Pharaoh. Israel had a deliverer given them in the person of Moses, but we have a greater Deliverer given to us in the Person of Christ, and He gives to us power over all the power of the enemy.

2. Moses the Leader of Israel, Ex. 3:1-12. Moses first tried to save Israel in his own strength, but forty years later was sent to deliver God's people, but this time with the promise "Certainly I will be with thee." Jesus was wholly dependent on His Father, and waited until the Spirit descended on Him by Jordan's banks before He began His ministry of delivering people from sin and sickness, and their author, Satan. We, too, should seek first to be filled with the Spirit, and live a life of absolute dependence upon God.

3. The Passover. Ex. 12:1-14.

God commanded that every man in Israel take a lamb, and having killed the same, to sprinkle the blood on the two side posts and the upper door post. "When I see the blood I will pass over you" was the heavenly exhortation. 5. Giving of Manna. Ex. 16:1-36. God gave to His people of the "corn of heaven," and today He has given us heaven's best in Jesus Christ, who is to eat the flesh of the Son of man, and drink His blood, ye have no life in you" (John 6:53).

6. Jethro's Counsel. Ex. 18:1-27. The question always rises as to whether Moses was right in taking counsel of the priest of Midian, but God has given to us a Counsellor who is altogether wise, and concerning Him, He has declared, "This is My beloved Son, in

The prayers of Moses prevailed for Israel, but a greater than Moses ever liveth to make intercession for us. He will teach us to pray.

9. Report of Spies. - Num. 14:1-10.

In this lesson we see the results of unbelief, as well as the heroism of faith in Caleb and Joshua. We too shall fail unless we can testify with Paul, "The life that I now live in the flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave Himself for me" (Gal. 2:20).

10. Joshua, Patriot and Leader, Jos. 1:1-9. Joshua was told how to make his way prosperous, and there is a blessed secret for us here, the continual study of the Word of God, and meditation therein day and night. Ask God to give you a new delight in His Word.

11. Cities of Refuge. . Josh. 20.

Six cities of refuge were provided for Israel, but with the Psalmist we have learned to testify, "I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge" (Psa. 91:2). "A Man shall be as an hiding place" Isaiah prophesied, and we can say of our Jesus, "We have found Him, of whom Moses in the law, and the prophets did write, Jesus of Nazareth."

12. No Compromise. Josh. 23:1-24:28. Joshua warned Israel against every kind of idolatry. The Holy Ghost warns us against covetousness "which is idolatry." Little children keep yourselves form idols.

SECOND QUARTER.

Some Great Teachings of the Bible. GOD OUR HEAVENLY FATHER. April 6. Gen. 1:1, 27; Psa. 103:1-14; Matt. 6:24-34. Golden Text: Matt. 6:9.

God as Creator. From Genesis to Word was with Him in the beginning, 3 the Word that was made flesh and dwelt among us. John tells us, "No man hath seen God at any time; the only begotten Son, which is in the bosom of us "the Bread of Life." "Except ye the Father, He hath declared, (revealed, interpreted) Him." Jesus told us further, "No man knoweth the Father save the Son, and he to whomsoever the Son will reveal Him." You cannot know God the Father save through Jesus Christ the Son. To as many as received Him (the Son), to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His Name. There are some who have no faith in

that worthy name who talk boudly of "the universal Fatherhood of God." but they do not get such a phrase nor such a teaching from the Word of God. The Word teaches us that we are "children of wrath" (Eph. 2:3), "children of the devil" (1 John 3:10), until we are born of God.

The Father of Mercies. But our God is a God of mercy and when, like the publican of old, we cry, "God, be merciful to me a sinner," He delights to be merciful to us and to deliver us from the power of darkness and translate us into the kingdom of His dear Son, giving to us the Spirit of adoption, whereby we cry, "Abba, Father," and the Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are the children of God. What a Father is ours! "God is the most lovable Being," writes Andrew Murray, and we have proved it so. We can indeed echo every word of the Psalmist in Psalm 103. Verse 13 is sometimes translated "Like as a father fondleth his children, so the Lord fondleth them that fear Him." I have long since found out that my Father is very fond of me. He is very fond of all His children.

Without Carefulness. Jesus wants us to have simple childlike faith and trust in His Father. We need have no fear that He, who never forgets to feed the fowls of the air, and who clothes the lilies of the field so beautifully, will fail to look after His own. The trouble is that most folks put their trust in "mammon," their worldly riches, that which the Scriptures calls "filthy lucre," and they think that their success in life is to be measured by the amount of this stuff that they can accumulate. This is serving mammon, and Jesus plainly told us we cannot serve two masters, for either we will hate the one, and love the other; or we will hold to the one and despise the other, and that we cannot serve God and mammon. The inspired apostle tells us "The love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows."

It is worry about the financial end of things that takes the joy out of many lives. "Worry is as bad as worldliness" A. B. Simpson declares. Jesus gave us a simple rule of life that we need to keep ever before us, for he, who truly obeys this word of His, need never have another moment of anxiety on any line. Here it is, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness; and all these things (food, drink, clothing,)

shall be added unto you."

A Life of Faith. What a comfort it is to realise that our Heavenly Father knoweth all that we have need of. [We cannot add one cubit even to our spiritual stature by taking undue thought. There is no need for any anxious thought for the morrow, for Father will be just as faithful in providing tomorrow as He has been today. One man testifies, "My worst troubles were those that never came to me.") The devil is a great artist and he is very fond of painting

mountains just ahead of us. But if we have faith as a grain of mustard seed we can say to the devil's mountains, "Be thou removed and cast into the sea," and they will have to go. The just shall live by faith. S. H. F.

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
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
