Prophetic Vision of the Lord's Second Coming, the Great Tribulation, and the End of the World.

"And it shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, that I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions" (Acts 2:17; Joel 2:28).

The Circumstances.

This prophetic vision was granted by God to a Christian lady in Buckinghamshire, England, in accordance with His written word in Acts 2:17 and in Joel 2:28. The vision was given to her during three trances (comp. Peter in Acts 10:9-11. and Paul in Acts 22:17, 18, and in 2 Cor. 12:1-4), each of which commenced during a prayer-meeting in a private house; the first after a communion service and the second after a baptismal service. The vision lasted from August 9th to 11th, and a resume of its contents was foretold three days before in the letter quoted below, which she wrote to a Christian brother from Camberley on August 6th, and which has been carefully kept.

> Camberley, Surrey, 6th August, 1919.

Dear Brother in the Lord Jesus.—All glory to His name. I have much to

praise Him for. Last night the two sisters and myself had prayers before retiring to rest, and I was filled with the Spirit and saw the Lord, who said:—

"In such an hour as ye think not." (Compare, "In such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh." Matt 24:

Then He vanished. But I saw Him in all His glory, and He was so lovely. I was so happy, I simply could not go to bed, so I waited upon Him, and He came to me. saying:

"Be faithful unto Me and I will show unto My servant what shall fall upon the children of the world, who have and will reject Me. Thou shalt see the rapture of the dead in Christ, and the Bride of Christ translated. Thou shalt see the coming of the Antichrist, the false prophet, the sign of those who worship the beast, and who receive the mark of Antichrist. Thou shalt also behold the two faithful witnesses, their labors, their martyrdom and the martyrdom of those who will not fall down and worship the beast. Thou shalt behold the resurrection of the two witnesses and their rapture, and then the

horrors of those who are left behind. Thou shalt not fear, for I, the Lord, will be with thee when thou dost behold these things. For men shall know that there is a God among them, and shall also know that He has warned them through His servant, whether they will take heed or no."

I wonder what to make of this. I saw the Lord so vividly, with the marks in His hands and feet. Pray for me that I may be faithful to Him.

Yours in the Lord Jesus.

Just after the first trance had commenced, the above letter was read out to four other people. who had been at the prayer meeting, in order that they might know the nature of the vision she was seeing, and understand why, ever and anon, she wailed as if in great grief. It will be seen, from what she describes helow, how accurately she foretold the nature of her vision; and from this the reader may deduce how surely the vision itself will come to pass in due time.

Those who do not know where to find these things in the Bible, which is the written Word of the ever-living God, are referred to: 1 Thessalonians, ch. 4, verses 16, 17; 2 Thessalonians, ch. 1, verses 6 to 10; 2 Thessalonians, ch. 2, verses 1 to 14; 1 Corinthians, ch. 15, verses 35 to 38; Revelation, ch. 11 to 21, inclusive.

Names and addresses of the lady to whom God granted the vision, and also of the other witnesses of the circumstances recorded above, will be furnished by the publisher to anyone wishing to reprint, translate, or otherwise make the prophecy known for the salvation of souls.

PART I.

A vision in trance, lasting five hours, from 9:30 p. m., August 9th. to 2:30 a. m., August 10th, 1919.

The Second Coming of the Lord.

During a prayer-meeting I was in the Spirit and fell into a trance, and, in a vision of God, I heard the blast of a trumpet, sudden, shrill and loud. I saw the Lord Jesus Christ descending from heaven enveloped in a bright cloud. Again I saw many graves burst open. and the dead in Christ rising therefrom to meet the Lord in the air. Following them, I also saw the living in Christ caught up to meet Him in the air. Alas! multitudes of those living upon the earth were left behind, and only a very small proportion of the graves were opened.

Immediately after the rapture, I saw those who had been left behind upon the earth visiting the graveyards to examine those graves which had been opened by the power of God. Great crowds of people, both rich and poor, congregated together to talk about this great event. Mothers were crying for the loss of their children, men were distressed for the loss of their wives and families, and wives for the loss of their husbands. These crowds were huge, and the noise which they made was deafening.

Many people were crying out in repentance for their hardness of heart and unbelief in the past, and for having rejected the Word of God.

I saw numbers of ministers of every denomination. Some of these looked very sad; others tried to comfort the people; others again looked very displeased at having been left behind. Then the congregations began to mob their ministers, striking them and angrily asking them why, after listening to their doctrines, they also had not been caught up to meet the Lord when He came.

It was clear that many people were wishing that they had been obedient to the Word of God, and that others, who had opposed the doctrine in the Word of God held by those who had been translated, wished that they had listened to it instead. On the contrary, it was also clear that many were very glad indeed at the departure of God's children, and tried to justify themselves by declaring that it was the devil who had taken them away!

The Great Apostasy.

Then the scene changed, and I saw the people going on with their ordinary occupations and pleasures, for they seemed to have forgotten all about the translation of God's children. Everywhere were places of amusement, fitted with pretty shaded lights of many colors, and into these places multitudes of people entered. Outside most of them large posters were to be seen, while inside, men, women, young lads and girls were lounging about, smoking, drinking, and playing cards, many of whom were only partly dressed.

Many buildings which had once been churches had been converted into these places of amusement and riot, where drink was being sold.

Only a very few churches remained open for God's work, and I could see and hear the ministers in charge of them telling their congregations to keep firm, and be ready to suffer anything for the Lord Jesus Christ. From some in the congregations would come a very earnest "Amen," but from others a curse or a laugh of scorn. Most of those who comprised these congregations would enter these churches without taking off their hats, and would then read newspapers and smoke peacefully while the service was going on. No altar for administering the Lord's Supper was to be seen, for the Lord had only instituted this until He came. (1 Cor. 11:26), and, as He had come, it was no longer observed.

I beheld large fires lighted in open waste places, and even in the streets, into which the people threw their Bibles, prayer-books, and other devotional works. The crowds, which grew larger and larger, were delighted at the destruction of these books.

The Two Witnesses.

Then followed a time of great trouble, during which I saw two men witnessing for God. The first was an old man with long flowing white hair, while the second was much younger and had dark hair, which only came down to his shoulders. Each of them was dressed in a long dark garment of sackcloth, which looked somewhat like a dressinggown. Each wore a girdle about his waist and each carried a Bible in his hand. On their faces, which were beautiful, was a look of wonderful peace. Both these witnesses went about separately, pushing their way in and out of the crowds, testifying to the people of the terrible times that were coming upon them, and showing them that the only way of salvation left for them was by enduring suffering for the Lord Jesus Christ. They told the people how they had been warned all through the ages, and they read to them out of God's Word about the days of Noah, telling them that even worse things should befall them. A few people would believe them, but most of them would laugh at what they said, and drive hither and thither, persecute or kill the few who did believe. Many who did believe were martyred for it, and died rejoicing in their sufferings for Christ, accepting the testimony of the two witnesses concerning the great joy which would be theirs by overcoming. Others were protected by the power of God from being killed, and went about preaching the Word of God.

The two witnesses kept on ever warning and encouraging the great masses

of people, but after a time they called upon God to send famine upon the earth. and immediately fields of corn, wheat, or barley were withered up and scorched by a great heat. Then the terrible times which had been foretold began, and the people rushed upon the two witnesses to kill them, but, as they attempted to strike them with their weapons, fire came from their mouths and destroyed those who tried to injure them. Then these two witnesses did other mighty miracles, for they spoke to the sea and immediately it became blood, and again they spoke, and then followed great thunderings and lightnings.

The Antichrist and the False Prophet.

Then I beheld a strange and hideous creature (compare Revelation 13:1-10), rise up out of the sea, having seven heads and ten short horns. One of its heads was like the head of a huge serpent, and was terribly mutilated on its right side, but the wound was dried up and healed, leaving terrible scars.* The four feet of this beast were like the feet of a bear, and it walked very silently.

Again, I saw a second beast (compare Revelation 13:11-18), come up out of the earth. It looked rather like a goat, and had only two short horns like a lamb and it kept standing upon its hind legs.

These two beasts had great power and did many mighty acts, for fire came down from heaven at their command. The people, who seemed to be very great in number, began to worship these two strange beings. Then the second beast which had the two short horns desired that they should make an image of the first beast, which had seven heads and ten horns, and this was done.

Then I saw the people going about apparently purchasing badges of different quality, and made of various materials of different value, on which the number or the mark of the beast, or both, were to be seen. The number was three sixes, with the heads of the sixes shaped like the heads of serpents. mark of the beast appeared to be three heads, one like that of a horrible goat, the center one like that of a serpent, and the third like that of an eagle. These badges were worn by the people on their hands or on their foreheads, or on both, and in some cases it appeared as if the mark and number were tattooed upon them in these places.

When the people had procured their marks they would fall down and worship the image of the seven-headed beast.

Then a wonderful thing happened, for the image of the beast began to speak, and among other blasphemous things said, "I am God."

Those who would not have the mark of the beast were either starved or terribly tortured with hot irons, knives, swords. hatchets, and spears, and their

*The Spirit of God showed me that this was in fulfillment of God's promise in Gen. 3:15, that the Seed (Christ) of the woman should bruise the head of the serpent (Satan). The Spirit of God further revealed to me that the sword with which the Seed (Christ) of the woman had done this was the 'Sword of the Spirit,' which is the Word of God (Eph. 6:17) in the children of God (Col. 1:27, 29).

cries of pain were terrible. Some had their hands cut off, others their arms or legs. Those who were faithful were tortured to death; but some gave in after being tortured for a while, and worshipped the image of the beast, whereupon they were healed and nourished by the beast, who worked miracles for them. Some received the mark of the beast, but refused to receive the number of his name, whereupon they were tortured until they did; after which they also were healed and fed by the beast.

Then I saw both beasts in the form of men. (Compare Ezekiel 28:2; Revelation 13:18.)

Martyrdom and Rapture of the Two Witnesses.

Now, when the two witnesses of God had finished their testimony, they were beheaded and their bodies were left lying about in the streets, which seemed to be full of people, and to be also covered with dirt and blood. The people were so delighted at the death of these

two witnesses that, instead of burying their bodies, they trampled upon them, and kicked their heads about the street. Then a wonderful thing happened, for their heads came on to their bodies again and they stood upright upon their feet.

Then a great and beautiful cloud appeared, and a loud Voice came out of the cloud, saying: "Come up hither."

Then the two witnesses ascended up into heaven in the sight of their enemies, and following them I saw many, who had been martyred for God and left unburied, come to life and ascend into heaven also.

Then the earth was filled with darkness, and there were great thunderings and an earthquake, and I saw the buildings falling down, amid groanings and weepings and wailings which filled me full of agony for the people.

Then I saw into the heavens, and beheld seven beautiful angels, each holding a vessel in his hand.

CONCERNING YOU

I am writing this for any soul who longs to be in the will of God, but who is not fully assured as to what the Lord's will really is for them. I can guarantee that if they will obey the simple instructions of 1 Thess. 5:18, and systematically keep at it, their hearts will be filled with a divine assurance and they will know for a certainty what the will of the Lord is. The very simplicity of it all is the greatest stumbling block to many souls.

In everything give thanks, for this is the will of God concerning YOU. This is a remedy for many spiritual ills, but it has to be personally applied.

The writer well remembers coming into contact with a precious child of God who, when teaching a Bible class at one time, told of the wonderful life of praise she had entered into by giving thanks for everything. She mentioned having had a cup of tea upset over a new waist, one of the latest things she had been praising for, also a bottle of ink upset on a carpet. I thought I had never heard of anything more senseless than to praise God for such things; I did not realize at that time what victory praise could bring over such annoyances.

I longed to enter this deep, sweet life of praise, but like another dear soul I recently read of, I argued back and forth with the Lord as to the senselessness of such things. However, my hunger increased for this life of peace and praise I saw others entering into by just "giving thanks for everything," and one day I said to myself, "Well, I am not getting anywhere by reasoning and arguing. I believe I'll do what the Word of God says whether I feel like giving thanks or not. I will 'will' to praise God."

So I started in. When things were most annoying I would say under my breath, "Praise God, in everything give thanks!" I went on for nearly a week, the habit of praising becoming stronger

each day, but no joy or peace followed. Then one evening between lights I went to my bedroom, and my cupboard door being open, I ran right into it, giving my head a terrible blow, and unconsciously I found myself praising and thanking God, and the joy and peace of God flowed into my heart and has always been there from that day to this.

He has made me to realize that whatever has happened it has been the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning me, and the knowledge of being in His will is the sweetest thing on earth to the child of God.

I met a man at one time who said he had no assurance of salvation. He was told to praise God for saving his soul and to keep right at it till God gave him the witness. At times he was very tempted to leave off praising, but he kept at it. He was a blacksmith by trade and one day he put a piece of iron in the fire to get red hot, On taking it out he found it too hot, so put it down to cool. Just then he was called away to speak to someone for a minute. On his return he forgot the iron was hot and picking it up in his hands, burnt his fingers terribly. He found himself praising God, and with the realization that instead of oaths and curses which he would have said in former days, his heart overflowed with joy as he realized he was a new creature in Christ Jesus, and from that time forward he had no doubt as to his salvation.

Some years ago Γ gave a talk on this verse at a meeting for young people in Rhode Island and there was a young girl present who longed for daily victory whose heart the Lord opened to receive the message. When she got home she had a definite transaction with God that she would enter this life of praise and she began that night.

The next morning everything went wrong. Her father overslept and so did she. Then the wood was damp and the

fire would not burn. So she went to the basement to chop up a dry box and in doing so cut her hand. Then in her hurry up the stairs she tore her skirt by treading on it. However she continued to give thanks whatever annoyances came her way, and she came to the next young people's meeting radiantly happy and her testimony was a real joy to listen to as she constantly affirmed, "It works!"

Are you suffering from heaviness in any way? God has promised to give "the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness," and in Psalm 50:23 He says, "Whose offereth praise glorifieth Me, and prepareth a way that I may shew him My salvation" (R. V. margin). Is not this a wonderful verse? God says to us, "Your praise brings Me glory and prepares for yourself a way for Me to show you My great salvation."

We have heard some object, "You can give thanks in everything, but you cannot give thanks for everything." In Ephes. 5:20, we are definitely instructed of the Holy Ghost to be "giving thanks ALWAYS FOR ALL THINGS unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." Does this leave any room for complaining about anything? No, praise Him! We Pentecostal folks do not know much, but there is one thing we do know, "We know that all things work together for good to them that love God!"

In Ecclesiates 3, the preacher tells us there is a time to weep and a time to laugh: a time to mourn and a time to dance: and a time in which it is in order to do many other things, but you will notice he does not say there is a time to pray nor a time to praise. Why not? Because we are called on to "pray without ceasing," and also to "offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually. that is, the fruit of our lips, giving thanks unto His Name." We do not have to wait for special times either to pray or to praise. On the contrary, we are exhorted to be "praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit," and with the sweet singer of Israel we should say, "I will bless the Lord at all times: His praise shall continually be in my mouth."

So amid these days of pressure from all sides let us continue to give thanks in everything and for everything and always, "for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning YOU."—Alice Rowlands Frodsham, Springfield, Mo.

Most unscriptural statements and extravagent claims are made by persons professing great divine illumination concerning the deep things of God, who have no real foundation in the Word for such boasting.

You might as well try to dam up Niagara with a shingle as to undertake to stem the tide of iniquity in the world, by the methods of reform embodied in the extravagant schemes and vague dreams of inflated optimists.

What it means to be more than a conqueror was demonstrated by David when he ran through a troop and leaped over a wall in the strength of the Lord. He ran through a troop, cutting it down, and leaped over a wall after another troop to conquer.

The slain Lamb, must have a slain bride, and as the Captain of our salvation Christ must have, a military bride identified with Him as the Lamb of God, and the Lion of the Tribe of Judah; made partakers of His divine nature in this mysterious blending of these contrasts.

It is somewhat of a spiritual riddle to be the possessor of something of which you are not conscious, but which is quite apparent to others, and should they draw your attention to it and you recognize it. you would doubtless lose it right then. but should you fail to discover it you would simply turn and walk away with it. We refer to humility.

Not seeking the best we may become satisfied with the lesser good, when the Lord has something better for us and something better through us for others. Let us therefore be constantly on the stretch after more.

The best features presented by the world are dangerous, not because they are in themselves harmful, but for the reason that they serve to perpetuate the worst though being made a substitute for the salvation of Jesus Christ, "the one thing needful." "Truly vain is the help of man."

Partakers the teaching of some, we of might conclude that it Christ. was not designed that we should become real par-

takers of the divine nature, but simply helpless repositories of the divine life, like unto a vessel which, while holding some liquid or ingredient, never becomes directly effected thereby.

This is decidedly not the case if we understand the simple language of scripture along this line, connected with God's promises; for if we are identified with Christ through partaking of His divine nature, then that nature must become a vital feature of our humanity, transforming and renewing our natures by coming into our three-fold beings and circulating through them permeating and saturating us with life divine.

The figure of the vine and the branches fully illustrates this; and as in the natural the blood, which is the lifegiving principle, flows through our veins and arteries, carrying life to every part of our physical, so in the spiritual the life divine flowing, as it does, through our spiritual circulation, carries divine life to every part of our moral nature; going even farther in answer to faith, and quickening these mortal bodies by the Spirit which dwelleth in us.

Praise the Lord for the possibility and privilege of being literal, conscious experimental partakers of the divine nature.

Therefore do not let us be satisfied with anything short of the realization of this blessed experience made possible through the exceeding great and precious promises, which are given unto us, 2 Pet. 1:4.—J. T. B.

Questions and Answers

828. Are there three distinct persons who oppose Christ at His coming, referred to in 2 Thess. 2:8 and Rev. 19:20, the wicked one, the beast, and the false prophet? The Word says the wicked one shall be destroyed at the coming of Christ, but that the beast and the false prophet shall be cast into the lake of fire. How can the wicked one be the same as either of the other two?

It is said of all the wicked that they shall be "destroyed" or suffer "destruction," and some have wrongly concluded from this that man has no ever-existing spirit and is to be totally annihilated at the judgment. This is a wrong conclusion, because such persons take "destroy" to mean "annihilation." For instance. it is said at the coming of Christ that the nations shall be destroyed, but it does not mean the killing of all these people, for Zechariah, after telling of their destruction, still speaks of "every one that is left of the nations," 14:16. Scofield says the Greek word "olethros," translated "destruction," never means annihilation. The wicked one and the beast are the same persons, and when the beast is cast into the lake of fire he is not annihilated. but is destroyed in the sense that his evil work is stopped and he is put out of the way. He is destroyed in the same sense and only in the sense that spirits are destroyed when they also are cast into the lake of fire. They are forever separated from God and all the good. So only two persons are referred to in the above passages, the beast and the false prophet.

829. After receiving the baptism and having taught your children the full gospel, is it right to send your children to other church Sunday Schools when you are out of reach of a Pentecostal school? Or must we keep them home and teach them ourselves?

The Lord will have to show each one what is best to do under such circumstances. All church schools are not the same; some are poor and others are bet-Who the teacher is and what he teaches is a vital question, and they differ in different cases. Who the children are, what size, and how much under control of the parents and how far satisfied with your ways is another element in the problem. Then what one considers out of reach of the school of his faith another will consider still in reach. We should give our children the best possible religious training. No man can entirely settle for you what is possible to you. You have to lay all the facts and circumstances before the Lord, then get on your knees and ask Him to help you settle it. If you are able to control and teach children successfully, you might start up a little Sunday School of your own and other children whom you can likely find that need such a school. How does this strike you?

830. Who are the two witnesses? He did not say two of my witnesses, but He

said "My two witnesses." The only two witnesses God ever had in the world are the Spirit and the Word.

We do not know for sure who the two witnesses of Rev. 11:3 are; but we know enough to know the above answer is not right. Why do we know this is wrong? (1) Because God has had many other witnesses. (2) Because these two are to witness only 1260 days. Certainly the Spirit and the Word have already been witnessing longer than three and one-half years. (3) Because after the three and one-half years the beast will "kill them," 17:7. Certainly the beast cannot kill the Holy Ghost. (4) Because it is said, "Their dead bodies" lie in the streets and the nations behold their dead bodies "three days and an half." Who ever heard before of the Holy Ghost having a corporeal body? Of His having a dead body? Of His dead body lying around in the streets? Of His being dead three days and a half, and then being resurrected? The Holy Ghost is certainly not revealing such unscriptural teaching as the above questioner sets forth. These witnesses are evidently real living men, who prophesy, who bear testimony for God. who work miracles, who get killed, and whom God raises from the dead.

831. What is meant by "pillow" in Eze. 13:18? What does this verse mean?

The word "pillow" refers to an ordinary soft cushion to lay the head on for rest. They are used here by these false prophetesses as a symbol of ease and rest to deceive the people into believing easy times of peace and plenty were coming, and not punishment, as the Lord made his true prophet say. These lying prophetesses made these false prophecies for gain, to get "barley and bread," as verse 19 shows. They were deceiving people with their lies and thereby destroying souls, and God pronounces a woe upon them for it.

832. What is the best thing a wife can do who is trying to bring up her children in the fear of the Lord, but has a grumbling husband who stays out at night till one and two o'clock in the morning?

Sister, it is hard to tell unless I knew all the facts in the case. Many a wife in such a condition has, through love, kindness and prayer to God, won her backslidden husband back to God after a long struggle. If he supports you and the children better than you could do it without him, and he does not do you bodily harm by knocking and beating you around, you better trust God and go on praying for him. It is possible for his very example to make the children hate that sort of thing and to cause them the more to heed your faithful teaching. Some mothers have raised the soberest boys in the world right over the bad example of a drunken husband. Look to God. He can, and will help you, if you trust Him.

833. Does the Lord have anything to do with the method of stopping the flow of blood by repeating three times the verse in Ezekiel 16:6? Some think this is as much Divine Healing as is healing through prayer to the Lord. Is this practice of the Lord or of the devil?

I never saw this practice nor do I know what kind of persons it is that are engaged in this practice, nor with what success. But no scripture teaches any such method of healing nor directs any such use of Eze. 16:6. If the practicers of this method are clean people, who associate no other practices with this of an evil or superstitious nature, who do it without faith in God and depend wholly on the mental process, then it is very likely pure mental science, rather than Divine Healing. In this case it would be purely natural, neither of God nor directly of the devil.

If the persons are spiritualists or any other suspicious characters of unclean practices, then the origin of this practice could be strictly of an evil source. It seems unlikely that the Lord has anything to do with this practice. A fuller history of the persons and all that is taught and associated with this practice is needed to be able to pronounce more emphatically upon it. It is not the method practiced by Christ and the apostles, nor by us.

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The Menace of Spiritualism

As Seen from the Pentecostal Viewpoint

"And when they shall say unto you, Seek unto them that have familiar spirits and unto wizards, that chirp and that mutter: should not a people seek unto their God? On behalf of the living should they seek unto the dead? To the law and to the testimony! If they speak not according to this word. surely there is no morning for them." Isa. 8:19, 20, A. S. V.

We have had many references of late in the Evangel to the unspeakable evils of spiritualism, and we had thought to drop the matter, but as the newspapers and magazines are so full of this subject, and the menace is becoming so great and terrible to the young people of this country, we offer no apology in sending out this further word of warning against what spiritualists call their "New Revelation."

Solomon told us there is no new thing under the sun, and the "ouija boards" or "planchettes" are to be seen on the Pyramids of Egypt and in the oldest Buddhist temples, and Moses wrote of the peril of consulting with those who had familiar spirits three and a half millenniums ago. Spiritualism is no "New Revelation," but is rather an old delusion rehashed.

When we hear that in Paris alone there are 32,000 mediums; when London, according to its leading newspaper, is "medium-mad;" when we learn from the New York Sun that the cabinet ministers of Gt. Britain during the war were continually seeking "inspiration" from spiritualistic seances; when we read "fifty United States congressmen crowded a spiritualistic seance and consulted the 'ouija board' for advice upon the affairs of this country," we realize that a great peril is with us. Our fight is not against flesh and blood, but, as the inspired apostle writes, we wrestle with the "despotisms, the empires, the forces that govern and control this dark world, the spiritual hosts of evil arrayed against us in the heavenly warfare" (Eph. 6:12, Wey.). Hell is bringing up its reinforcements. We may rightly enquire, are we not already seeing the earnest of Rev. 16:14, "The spirits of demons working miracles-spirits that go out to control the kings of the whole earth, to assemble them for the battle which is to take place on the great day of God?"

These demon spirits are indeed working marvels already, and their impersonations of the departed are so clever as to deceive the greatest scientists and the most learned men of the day, and they would—if it were possible—deceive even the very elect.

Why do we so vigorously oppose spiritualism? Our first and main reason is because the Word of God so definitely warns us against this evil.

In Leviticus 20:6, God says, "The soul that turneth after such as have familiar spirits (that is the mediums) and wizards (male mediums, scorcerers or magicians) to commit adultery with them (God always calls false worship adultery), I will even set My face against that soul. and I will cut him off from among his people."

In His wondrous mercy, God did not want to set His face against, or cut off any soul in Israel for this reason, and He commanded that "a man also or woman that hath a familiar spirit, or that is a wizard, shall surely be put to death" (Lev. 20:27). The reason for this is given in the preceding verse, "And ye shall be holy unto Me: for I the Lord am holy, and have severed you from other people, that ye should be Mine." There can be no greater benefaction for mankind than to be wholly His, separated unto Him, for "they that trust Him wholly, find Him wholly true," and have no need to seek to become familiar with evil spirits.

A similar note of warning is given in the New Testament against the demons that controlled the heathen oracles, who are identical with those who control the spiritualists of today, and the apostle Paul writes, "I would not that ye should have fellowship with demons. Ye cannot drink the cup of the Lord and the cup of demons; ye cannot partake of the table of the Lord and of the table of demons."

Read also Deut. 18:10-11; 2 Kings 21:6; 2 Kings 23:24; 1 Chron. 10:13, 14.

Secondly, we reject spiritualism because it insistently invites men and women to put themselves under an evil power instead of being under the control and inspiration of the Spirit of Christ.

Some years ago, before I knew the Lord, I attended one or two spiritualistic seances. I shall never forget my first seance. In a room that was darkened the spirits of evil love darkness rather than light-a company of us gathered in a circle, and after a hymn and a prayer, in neither of which was the name of the Lord Jesus Christ mentioned, the medium went through some terrible contortions and then she got under the control of what I now know was a demon impersonating the departed. As most in the circle were confirmed spiritualists, that "spirit-guide" as they call it, bestowed most of its attention upon me, first telling me I was mediumistic, a thing I find they tell most novices, and it did all it could to persuade me to give myself up to the control of "some of the departed," who, it declared, wanted to help me. I asked whether I could not be filled with the Spirit of Christ, but I was told that His influence was so far gone that altho' lots wanted to be possessed and controlled by Him, this was impossible.

How grateful I have been since that time for a godly upbringing, and that from a child I had had a fair knowledge of the Scriptures. How faithful the Holy Ghost was in reminding me, "Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of His." The Spirit and the Word of God are the only safeguards against this Satanic delusion. It was this one Scripture applied by the Spirit of God that for ever alienated me from the spiritualists.

Talking with the medium after the seance I discovered that she was formerly a member of the Baptist church, but she found it impossible to be a Baptist and a spiritualist too, and so the Baptist church and all its teaching had to go. "Yes," she said. "I had to unlearn lots of things I had learned there. And the first thing that had to go was the doctrine of the Atonement." The precious blood of Jesus Christ, God's Son, the only provision for the cleansing of sin, the first thing thrown overboard!

This is entirely in keeping with what Sir A. Conan Doyle is saying these days, "The whole doctrine of original sin, the Fall, the vicarious Atonement, the placation of the Almighty by blood—all this is abhorrent to me. The spiritguides do not insist upon these aspects of religion." Dr. F. B. Meyer tells of one young woman being suddenly arrested and turned back to her early faith by hearing a message from the invisible world to the effect that, if Mr. Spurgeon were to return to earth, he would not preach the doctrines of redemption on which he had been accustomed to insist, and that he had become convinced of their error. This message had the effect of convicting this young woman of the error of the spiritualists.

This is further confirmed by a British writer who says, "The spirit-guides talk vaguely of a Christ Spirit, whose special care is the earth. There is nothing in their report of Atonement or Redemption. 'The New Revelation' has much to say of our Lord Jesus Christ as a medium; it says nothing of Him as a Mediator. It offers fellowship with discarnate personalities. but it excites no longing for fellowship with the Risen Lord. The spirits are quoted as declaring that no religion upon earth has any advantage over another."

I was further told by the medium to go alone in the dark from time to time and just be passive and to yield myself to the spirits that would be certain to come and control me. In other words, just as the inspired apostle beseeches us by the mercies of God, to present our bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is our reasonable service, the purpose of which is that we might be transformed by the renewing of our minds; so the spiritualists beseech us, first having persuaded us to throw over the protecting power of the precious blood of Christ, to get alone in the dark, and passively present our bodies, our wills, our minds, to the world of unseen spirits, who, under the direction of their leader, the prince of the power of the air, will gladly avail themselves of an opportunity of entrance. Those who are persuaded to do this are henceforth led captive by Satan at his will. It is far easier for a fly to disentangle itself from a spider's web, than for a spiritualist to get unmeshed from the strong delusion and diabolic power into which he has allowed himself to be drawn.

A few years later, when I knew what it was to be born from Above, and to appreciate the fact that Jesus Christ had died for my sins according to the Scriptures, that He had carried them down to hell, that having purged my sins He rose, and is seated at the right hand of God, there to make intercession on my behalf and on behalf of every heir to this great salvation, He caused me to know that it was His wish that I should be endued with power from on High as were His first disciples when they received the promise of the Father in the Upper Room at Jerusalem, and se trusting wholly in the precious atoning blood, and making that my only plea, I yielded to the inflow of His heavenly power, and I received, not a stone, nor a serpent, nor a scorpion, which I doubtless should have received from the devil had I stayed with the spiritualists, but the blessed Holy Ghost, the Comforter, and He made no difference between me and them at the beginning, causing me to speak with other tongues as the Spirit of God gave utter-

Alas that many are being satisfied with anything less than which God's Word shows is for all "them that believe!" If the professing Church of today had the power of the early apostolic church, her converts would not be flocking to spiritualistic seances. or fooling around with "ouija boards." There is no temptation in spiritualism to those who are "filled with the Spirit."

We are opposed to spiritualism because of its fruit in the lives of those who follow it.

Some years ago the spiritualists advertised a special open-air campaign in the town in which I was then living. I secured a very large bundle of tracts on spiritualism from Pastor A. A. Boddy of Sunderland, and armed with these I attended every meeting and gave them away to the listening crowds.

At the first meeting their leader, John Adams, past president of the Spiritualist's Society in Gt. Britain, made some startlingly anti-Christian statements. I took these down at the time he uttered them, and had them printed, together with a number of passages of Scripture, to show that his statements were in strong contradition to the Scriptures of Truth. Together with these, I had a number of warnings from the Word against spiritualism printed in tract form, and distributed them at all their open air meetings.

John Adams announced he would reply to my tract on a certain Sunday, and his reply consisted in an endeavor to make light of every Scripture I had quoted. But when he came to 1 Chron. 10:13, 14, which reads, "So Saul died for the trespass which he committed against Jehovah, because of the word of Jehovah, which he kept not; and also for that he asked counsel of one that had a familiar spirit, to inquire thereby,

and inquired not of Jehovah, therefore He slew him, and turned the kingdom unto David the son of Jesse," he could not very well explain it away, and all he could do was to heap censure on Jehovah, whom he described as a mere tribal God of the Hebrews. Outside the meeting, in the presence of several of us, he cursed Jehovah with the utmost vehemence. Every Bible student knows that since no man hath seen God (the Father) at any time, that the Lord Jehovah, who manifested Himself to prophet and patriarch so often in olden times was none other than the only begotten Son. our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who is the one, according to John, who has declared or made the Father known (John 1:18), and one does not have to have very great discernment to judge what manner of spirit it is that calls the Lord Jehovah accursed.

'We spiritualists are socialists to a man," said John Adams on another occasion. These coming days will bring us abundant proof of the vital connection of spiritualism with the red flag, the red peril and the red dragon of Revelation 12.

We are opposed to spiritualism because it stands in opposition to faith.

God has forever ordained, "The just shall live by faith." This was His thought for our first parents, but the serpent's temptation to Eve was to substitute for faith the knowledge of good and evil. Although God had said of that forbidden tree. "In the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die," the serpent declared, "Ye shall not surely die." The same old serpent is beguiling men and women everywhere with the same old lie, "There is no death," and alluring the sons and daughters of Eve on to a forbidden knowledge, "a sorry so-called enlightenment" that in reality is gross darkness.

God knew that His creatures would be better and happier living a life of simple trust and confidence in Himself. What profit is there to seek to know the future by consulting a medium when He has declared, "As thou goest step by step, the way shall be opened up to thee" (Prov. 4:12, lit.) and when the Master has instructed us to take no thought for the morrow. As Coulson Kernahan has written, "It is better to ask no question whatever of what comes after death. leaving all in perfect trustfulness in the hands of God, than to squander nerve power, will power, and energy in following after the will o' the wisp of spiritualism—the attempting, as it were, to strike damp matches, this side of a vast and deep and dark river, in the hope that thereby we may descry what lies miles-far beyond."

As for me, since I know the dear Lord as my Shepherd, the assurance of the Psalmist as to my future, is amply sufficient, and I can sing with him: "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever."—Stanley H. Frodsham.

My name is Frank Favacula, and I was born in Italy in 1894. My parents died when I was a baby. I was brought up by my grandfather, and was of course a Roman Catholic. At the age of ten I had learnt to drink, gamble and play cards. Before I was of age I came to New York, but was not allowed to remain in the States as I had no friends here, so I went to Canada. I wandered about a good deal and at last arrived at Buffalo. By this time I had got into bad company, was drinking heavily and gambling and got into many a scrap. In fact I was guilty of almost every crime, except murder, and I did that in my heart. The devil has his agents and he gives them good pay, so they think, and they go about deceiving people. I belonged to a secret society, it was not political in any way, but its main object seemed to be revenge. At the age of 20 I felt 50 years old in sin. About this time I came to Protection N. Y. and God rescued me just in time otherwise I would have been in prison or in my grave.

There was at this time a Pentecostal Camp meeting being held in Protection. I went to the meetings simply to disturb them. I was leader of a rough gang, but was such a terror that they at times left me alone. One day I was at the meeting and they were singing when something queer seemed to strike me. I went out into the air to try and shake it off. This strange feeling came over me several other nights.

I was at this time a great smoker and drinker. I usually smoked before breakfast, and one morning I started to smoke, but water seemed to come up into my mouth. I said to my mate, someone has been doing something to my pipe, I cannot smoke it. I tried again during the day, with the same result. I tried but it was no use. I thought the tobacco had been doped. At last I said to my mate "Give me a chew of your tobacco." But it was no use, it seemed to be getting worse. At this time my swearing seemed to be getting less, and I had no desire for gambling. I myself

did not try to check the bad habits, neither did I try to encourage them.

My friends were concerned about me and advised me to see a doctor. But praise God the Great Physician was dealing with me and I did not know it. How different to all man's ways.

God was stripping me and I did not know it. There must have been people praying for me all unknown to myself. I remember taking a friend to a saloon for a drink. I told the bar tender to give my friend as much as he liked, and I would pay for it, but that I did not want any. "You won't drink, you say, why you would drink till it came out of your nose," he said.

As there were to be special meetings held at the camp, I asked a man to go with me, and he did. At the call to prayer I went down on my knees. I could not help myself. The boys at the back saw, and laughed, and thought I was having a big joke on the leaders of the meeting but I was serious. But I never said a word of prayer. I could not understand the hymns as I knew so little English. but they seemed to grip me. I went the next night, but felt no particular difference.

At this time I felt very lonely. All the boys thought that I was still playing a great joke on the leaders of the camp for I was so bad in every way, a ringleader of everything that was bad. But I left my bad companions alone at that time. On Sunday, I well remember, there was an altar call, but I did not go forward, but just knelt down by my seat. Then a cloud of darkness seemed to come over me. It was a darkness that could be felt, and I was troubled. saw my past wickedness, my sins and my lost condition, and I cried out. (The pastor of the assembly stated that he cried out in a loud tone for about two hours, no one was dealing with him, but some were praising God for the way He was working.)

Then I seemed to see Jesus washing away my sins. I then got up and told Brother Hawkes that God had forgiven me my sins, and that I knew the priest could not forgive sins, only Jesus Christ. I felt I would like to sing, but was unable to do so, not knowing the hymns. One or two of the people had spoken in tongues at times and I believe Italian words were spoken, but I forget the words

Later I was asked why I did not tarry for the Baptism of The Spirit? I replied that I was too ignorant to know how to. The sister read to me a portion in Romans showing me that God was no respector of persons, and I was encouraged I was seeking the baptism of the Holy Spirit nearly four months.

On two occasions hands were laid on me, and all power seemed to be lifted and I was as dry as a bone. On another occasion after tarrying for the baptism for a time, I felt it was no use and got up to go away. In parting a brother shook hands with me, and it seemed as if I had received a shock of electricity, and in two minutes I was speaking in the unknown tongue. Directly the man heard me speaking, he called out,"that

is all that is necessary." I know now that he made a great mistake, for I felt that God had much more for me than if I had been left alone with God, He has much more for all of us.

The Lord has been very precious to me in fact is more precious to me today than when I first had the baptism. Praise His Name! I had a New Testament given to me but I could not read it; but I felt there was life in it, so I would just hug it. I did so want to be able to read it, so that I would have something to to stand on. I would cry and weep because I was so ignorant. I used to trace the letters, like COME, and was told what it meant, then I would trace a pencil mark all around it, and put a piece of string in the page of the testament. I would get quite a number in this way and so would read them in my room. In this way I got quite a few words together. Well, praise God, at last I could read the Testament, and now I can write a little.

The Lord has healed me several times. My thumb was once caught in a hopper of a gravel car on the railway and I could not get it out, and had to wait till the door was lifted. The thumb was crushed flat when it was released. I was advised to go at once to the doctors and have it cut off, but I did not because God was living. Instead I went home crying out "God, You are living." The next morning it was restored, and I went to work at 7 A. M. The foreman asked to see the thumb. I showed it to him. He said I do not want to see that one, but the one that was crushed. He did not believe that it was the injured thumb, and only when I showed him the other would he believe. He said "You are lucky."

I showed it to the others around, as they desired to see it and just said, "God is living."

I can truly praise God for all He was done for me. "This is a faithful saying, Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, (of whom I am chief)."

THOSE WANDERING THOUGHTS.

When Satan cannot keep our bodies from the place of prayer, he strives to carry our thoughts far off from the closet where God is meeting us. With wandering thoughts in prayer most Christians have to contend. Brother Lawrence years ago discovered a great secret of how to deal with this enemy of the prayer hour. "One way to re-collect the mind easily in prayer," he wrote to a friend, "and preserve it more in tranquility, is not to let it wander too far at other times: you should keep it strictly in the presence of God; and being accustomed to think of Him often, you find it easy to keep your mind calm in the time of prayer, or at least to recall it from its wanderings." Brother Lawrence knew as few saints have known how to "pray without ceasing." When Christ thus becomes the everymoment home of our thoughts there will be less wandering from home in the special secret seasons of fellowship with Him.—Sel.

MIRACLES OF HEALING IN ENGLAND.

On Sunday, Oct. 26th, 1919, a young man, an ex-soldier, came in to the meeting at Parkstone, Dorset, suffering from paralysis and wearing steel and padded supports. give you his own account in brief, as fol-

"Whilst in the Dardanelles, I contracted typhoid, dysentery, pleurisy and other complaints, after which paralysis of the left leg set in. I was sent home shortly after Christmas, 1915. My life was ruined as far as I could tell. I was sent to hospitals at Bristol and Gloucester, where they tried electricity. I felt a little better at the time for this treatment, but there was no lasting benefit. I was sent to another place where I became quite helpless and could not move my foot at all.

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GREATER MISSIONARY SPIRIT IN ASSEMBLIES.

We have much to praise God for in the continued reports of greater missionary interest developing in the assehblies of God. As controversies over doctrine and practice decline, missionary spirit grows, and the blessing of the Lord rests in greater measure upon the assemblies. A resolution concerning missionary work was passed in the 1915 Council in St. Louis which has been overlooked by many assemblies. resolution was made with the thought of developing the home assemblies in missionary interest. It was resolved that every assembly should have a definite part in the proper sending, supporting and supervising of approved missionaries, either sending and maintaining one or more missionaries of its own, or sharing the burden of one or more missionaries with one or more other assemblies.

In keeping with the above resolution. the Pentecostal Church of Cleveland. Ohio, has assumed the entire support of several missionaries, among whom are Miss Lavada Leonard, China; Miss Marguerite Flint. India, and Brother and Sister J. Wilbur Taylor, of West The Pentecostal Church of Africa. Scranton, Pa., is assuming the support of Mrs. Violetta Schoonmaker and the Assembly at Akron, Ohio, assumes the support of Brother and Sister Turner, of China and Bart Dean, of India. There is plenty of room at the top and there are a large number of missionaries who have no regular means of support. If your assembly can assume the support of one missionary, we shall be glad to make a note of this and count that missionary as your missionary. If you can only partly assume the support of a missionary, possibly your neighboring assemblies would join in with you in this matter and between you, you could assume this support. The idea is good, and if it is adopted it will save the missionary much effort to interest the whole field when he or she can concentrate in furnishing information to his or her home assembly for their united prayer and co-operation for the need. Missionary Department will be glad to co-operate with any assembly desiring to adopt one of our Pentecostal missionaries as their own missionary.

PENTECOSTAL MISSIONARIES ROB-BED BY CHINESE BANDITS.

The following is an extract from a letter received from Mrs. Olive Maw Finch which will touch a chord in all our hearts. We must do what we can to replace this money that has been lost by these dear missionaries who are suffering the loss of all things for Jesus' sake.

"Mr. Finch and myself were on our way from Sai Nam to Lo Pau by boat. We were sailing along without any thought of danger, when suddenly a gun was fired and the bullet passed within a few inches of our faces. We were both so stunned that we fell to the floor and crawled to the opposite side of the boat from whence came the shooting. I was never so unnerved in my life. I could hardly stand. The boat pulled to the shore, and the thieves got on and took all they could find which they might use to any advantage. They took nearly \$200.00 in silver from us, besides articles valued at about \$30.00. They took the electric light that had been given me. They took the folding umbrella I bought in Cleveland, and also Mr. Finch's umbrella, razor and strop. and a number of other things. We dared not resist them, for they were all armed. When I asked one of them to please not take my wedding ring, he raised his gun and pointed it at me, and just at that time one, whom we took to be a leader, told him to leave it alone. Two or three tried to get it off my finger, and each time were told by another to let it alone, so I have it yet. tho I am not wearing it. Only the Lord kept them from cutting off my finger to get it (it fits tightly). They searched our persons several times, acting very rudely in doing so. There was nothing that we could do but to bear their treatment. The Bible says that 'all things work together for good to them that love the Lord who are the called according to His purpose.'

"A part of the money they took from us belonged to the Misses Meyers, Kunkle, and Appleby. Miss Kunkle was in debt, but had received an extra donation that would have freed her. Lo it all went, and now she is worse in debt than ever. We were also trying to get out of debt, but the Lord knows all about it, and we want to learn the lesson that He meant for us in permitting it. We would like to have gone into the Hakka district but cannot do so now, so will do what we can at Lo Pau.

"Miss Appleby is not at all strong. She has not fully recovered from the fever. It has settled in her ankle, and her heart is also very weak, tho she looks well."

Simpson writes from China, "Since the work is spreading out in all directions, requiring almost constant travel, I have decided to send for a Gospel wagon which I can fit up something like home and live in it constantly, both on the road and while carrying on meetings in the cities. This will conserve my physical strength while traveling and make me interested of the filthy uncomfortable juns. dependent of the filthy, uncomfortable inns.

I need a Gospel tent to seat some 200 peo-ple to take along with the wagon, and I am sure the Lord will provide all that is need-

"I shall be traveling and holding meetings in this province nearly all the time this spring and summer. There are new places opening up constantly and just now there are calls to come to four new places. The Lord is raising up more workers among the Chinese while the older workers are getting well seasoned and experienced sufficiently to bear more responsibility. Taken altogether, there is much to praise God for on this field."

Tonight, the evangelist is in the Chapel with a few men explaining the Gospel, and the Bible woman is in the next room to me with some women and girls who want to learn about the Gospel. Some women came today and asked how much money it took to belong and if they had to take a bath. I suppose they had heard of baptism. The people are interested and they need the Gospel, and I am glad that I can give the Miss Mae Mayo writes from China, "I The people are interested and they need the Gospel, and I am glad that I can give the Gospel where no one else is giving it. Please pray that our landlord will be saved. He smokes opium and his poor family are to be pitled. Then pray that we will be delivered from rats. There are so many that we are kept awake nights. One fell on my shoulder the other night. God is able for this. Two of my Chinese helpers have the baptism and two have not. Pray for them please."

Miss Lavada Leonard writes that they are now seeing evidence of answered prayer in an awakening of the people towards the Lord in South China, which is a great encouragement to them. "A few short weeks ago six converts were immersed in water here in Sai Nam, and last Sunday at Bro. Kelley's mission in Canton we had the joy of seeing ten converts taking an open stand for Christ and buried with Him in water of seeing ten converts taking an open stand for Christ and burled with Him in water baptism. Here in Sai Nam we have several more candidates for baptism, fine young men and women of the better class. Baptism in water means much to the Chinese, for usually after being baptized and making

for usually after being baptized and making known to the world that they are believers in the Lord, they receive much persecution from their own unsaved, heathen people. "We cannot tell what a day will bring forth. The thieves in the surrounding villages are becoming very bold and are holding up the river boats and robbing them. Just the other day one of these boats was bald up and robbed. Two of our missionheld up and robbed. Two of our mission-aries were on board on their way to Lo Pau They too were robbed of \$200.00, part of this amount belonging to themselves and this amount belonging to themselves and part to the missionaries in Lo Pau. The thieves held a gun to their heads until they had gotten all that they desired from them. There is also fighting going on near Sz Ooi between eighteen and twenty miles from here, and for some time there has been a threatened war in Canton. Remember us in your prayers."

Norton writes from Benares, India, "The Lord has enabled us to open up three new out-stations near Benares where at each place we have Christian preachers giving out the Word of Life to all whom they meet. The work at Benares continues as before, the Gospel is being daily given to thousands, and there is much encouragement. Praise His name!"

Brother and Sister Norton are undergoing terrific strain at the present time and eed our prayers. They have five outstations to oversee and keep going efficiently, which, with their other work in Benares and Bahraich is almost too much for them. They are badly in need of some assistance.

Sister Mattie Ledbetter writes a very interesting letter of a recent trip to the villages of China. She writes: "Though it was pretty tough on us we found the best opportunities on rainy days, for more men were at home. So a big crowd would gather and invite us into the public hall, which every town has, out of the rain, and we would hang up our printed songs and open our little organ and sing a few songs to their great delight. Then we took our time to preach to and teach them. Then let them ask questions. We sold 146 Gospels the two weeks we were out and gave out 428 tracts. We had a smoky hut without a window in it. Dirt floor and hard board bed. The tears fell often from the smoke that filled the room as we prepared supper and it was rather difficult to elbow our way around through the crowd of people that always flocked in as soon as we came home, asking dozens of questions. But hunger caused us to persevere till finally we'd get our meal on the table and then what a great time they would have watching the foreigners eat. It was trying at times when we were so tired, but we enwhat a great time they would have watching the foreigners eat. It was trying at times when we were so tired, but we endured it, hoping to get hold of their hearts for Jesus and we did not hope in vain. Quite a number came out on the Lord's side and many hundreds heard the Gospel who had never heard before. The Lord is blessing also in our mission work here in left Shery, Four have been saved since I blessing also in our mission work here in Fat Shan. Four have been saved since I wrote last and are waiting for baptism. I wish you could have had a sight of our little band yesterday at our upstairs prayer meeting. The power came down and every body got blessed. I thought I never saw such happy, joyful faces."

Thos Hindle writes from the borders of Mongolia, "When you receive this, please help me to praise God for one tongue is not enough to praise Him for His goodness to me. One old Chinese gentleman had ad-vanced twenty-two dollars toward the work there. One old Chinese gentleman had advanced twenty-two dollars toward the work and the others had failed to share the burden with him. You people in America can hardly realize what a large sum of money \$22.00 is to a Chinaman. Though we had many debts and not one dollar in sight, I rose in the meeting in faith and promised to lift the load. Jesus is faithful. Before I resumed my journey to Kalgan, a Chinese brother who was traveling with me handed me \$3.00, saying I might use it on the road and give it to him in Kalgan. Thus God provided for the second step of the journey. The distance from Goshatay to Kalgan is nearly one hundred miles. I had debts to meet in Kalgan and goods to purchase for the mission and not one dollar in sight. On reaching Kalgan among other donations I received your two which I am now acknowledging, so all who read this must praise God with me. God honors faith always. To show how clearly the hand of God is in it all, I may add that God permitted these donations to reach Kalgan just a few minutes after a bunch of letters was forwarded to us in Mongolia. This bunch crossed me on the road, but God had arranged to hold the drafts for me in Kalgan. Again praise God."


