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The Preparation of the Bride

An Address by Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson at the General Council.

As I looked to the Lord for a message this morning a dozen different themes came to my heart, new and old, but every one of them was swept away, and the Lord gave me just one message, the Preparation of the Bride. "Jesus is coming," we have heard over and over in the last fourteen years, and every time we hear it it brings a thrill to our hearts and makes our faces to shine. Because He is coming there is a people getting ready to meet Him.

The Bible is filled with many beautiful types and shadows concerning the bride and her preparation to meet the Bridegroom. In Revelation 21:9 we read, "Come hither, I will show thee the bride, the Lamb's wife." We long to be taken in Spirit to Patmos where John was, that we might see the bride, the Lamb's wife. We are all interested in an earthly bride, but in the spiritual bride, a hundredfold more. The first glimpse we get of a type of this spiritual bride is in Genesis, second chapter. Adam had been in existence for some time, but the Lord looked down upon him and saw that it was not good for man to be alone, so He caused a deep sleep to come upon him, and while he slept the Lord wounded his side, took out a rib, and from that rib He formed a woman. So the spiritual bride must come from the wounded side of Jesus, the second Adam. Just as God permitted a deep sleep to come upon the first Adam, so He permitted a deep sleep to come upon the second Adam, and while Jesus slept a soldier came and wounded His side, and from that wounded side a beautiful rib company is brought forth, and from that company a bride God brought the woman to the man in Eden, and it will not be long, if we are faithful, until the same Spirit that raised up Jesus from the dead will quicken these mortal bodies and we can be brought to the Man, Christ Jesus. The origin of the bride must be through the blood, and in the next chapter after Adam and Eve had partaken of the forbidden fruit they realized they must be clothed. They tried to make their clothing out of fig leaves, but that was no type. clothing of the bride of Christ must be

·blood-bought. A lamb was slain, and from that slain lamb God made a covering, just as our slain Lamb has provided a beautiful coat of righteousness, a white robe for His Bride.

In the next chapter we get a glimpse of the offering. Cain and Abel came with their offerings. One came with the fruits of his garden, wrought by his own hands, his good works, but the other brought a slain lamb, placed it on the altar, the fire fell from heaven and God smiled upon it. Your offering, if you would be in that Bride, must be of the same a burni offering.

of the same, a burnt offering. The next type which comes to us is in the story of Noah. Jesus said, "As it was in the days of Noah, so shall it be in the coming of the Son of Man." The world at that time was filled with sin. God's heart was almost broken over it, and so He said there was to be a great flood come upon the world. Noah was a just man, walked with God, and we read God spoke to him. It is a wonderful thing to have God speak to you. Some people have their ears so filled with criticism, so full of the world they cannot hear the voice of God, but Noah's ears were open to the voice of God and God revealed His plan to him. Noah was a child of light. The children of darkness walk in darkness, but the children of God walk in the light. God said, "Noah, this world is filled with wickedness. I am going to open the heavens and send down a mighty flood, but I will make an escape for you. Noah, you remembered Me, and I will remember you. You are to build an ark, with three stories, lower, second and third. One door shalt thou set in the side and a window above." Noah Soon you could hear believed God. trees being felled, blow after blow came down and they cut the great big beams. I can imagine the neighbors coming up: "Noah, what are you doing? Going to build a barn?" "No." "Build a house?" "No, I am building a boat." "Noah, how will you get it to the water?" expect the water to come to it." They said, "Well you are certainly a strange

man." But Noah obeyed God.

Soon the waters of tribulation will cover this old world. Prophecy is being

fulfilled. We can hear the waters rolling in every direction, trouble between capital and labor, in the political world, between the Catholics and Protestants, trouble in the churches. We can see all these things, but when the waters rise we shall rise also. They will not overwhelm us.

God gave Noah explicit instructions. He was to make it three stories, lower, second and third. In the world today there is a beautiful spiritual work being builded, three stories high. It is almost completed now, the passengers are getting on board. What was the lower story? God the Father. What was the second story? Jesus the Son. What is the third story? The dispensation of the blessed Holy Spirit. First came the sure and firm foundation, God the Father. We read of His love through the Old Testament from Genesis to Malachi. God in His own time sent His Son; there was to be a door in His side. came a day when the angels came singing from glory, heralding His birth; the wise men saw the star and coming saw the little babe wrapped in swaddling clothes. That was the second story. On Calvary's cross they nailed my Lord, the nails were being driven into the second story of the ark, and He bowed His head and died. The Roman soldier came with the clatter of horses' hoofs, his great spear was driven right into His side, making an entrance for you and me through the blood. Jesus, after the resurrection ascended to the Father. Ten days later He sent down the blessed Holy Spirit with the sound of the rushing, mighty wind, with tongues of flame, with the rivers of water that gushed from the innermost being, three thousand souls were saved, and the third story was being built. The skies are filled with clouds. To the world that may not mean anything, but to us it has a deep significance. To the world the clouds will bring floods of tribulation. They will cover the land, but God will also send floods of blessing upon His people.

The ark was completed and they were told to get on board. Many people say, "I would like to get in the ark but I don't like those people." Noah didm't

talk like that. There were monkeys and baboons, chimpanzees, and all sorts of creeping things, but when it came time to go in Noah didn't shrink from that kind of company. Don't stay out of the Pentecostal ark because of the peculiar company you will find there. I can just see the ark rocking. The higher the water, the higher the ark. When the waves of tribulation cover the earth the Bridegroom will come back with the bride, and just as the ark rested on Mt. Ararat, so will our Lord rest upon Mt. Olivet.

You see the Bride in her preparation in the beautiful type which I love so much, that of Rebecca preparing for Isaac. It is a story with four central figures: Abraham, a type of the Father, Isaac, a type of the Son, Eliezer, a type of the Holy Spirit, and Rebecca a type of the bride. In this story the father is desirous that a bride shall be brought to his son, so Abraham called to his servant, Eliezer, asking him to swear that he wouldn't get Isaac a bride from among the Canaanites but to go to his own country and choose a bride from there. God the Father called the Holy Spirit to Himself and said, "Don't take a bride from heaven. There is none among the angels or arch angels to be a bride for My Son, but go back to My country-some rich people act as though this was their country, but the earth is the Lord's—and to my kindred." Isn't it wonderful He speaks of Himself as our Father. When we were born again He became our Father.

Abraham's servant brought for Isaac's bride, gold and silver and precious stones, and the Holy Spirit is bringing for the Bride of Jesus gifts and ornaments. I read, "All the good things are in His hands." Then Eliezer took his journey from Canaan to Abraham's country and he had to find a trysting place to meet her. He met her at the well. If you would like to meet the Holy Spirit you can meet Him at the well of salvation. We read that before he had done speaking something happened. I like to see things move. Rebecca came out and her pitcher was on her shoulder. If you would be filled with the Holy Spirit you must first of all come out of the world, out of sin. out of temptation, out of things unlike Jesus Christ. Rebecca's pitcher was empty. So many of us come with our pitcher's so full of our own teachings and self. Come with an empty pitcher and you will be filled with a revelation of Himself. Notice the steps Rebecca took: she came out, she went down and then she came up. They are all in the preparation of the bride. First, come out of the things that defile, then down in real kumility, that it may be no more "I." Do you love to go down low before Jesus? It seems I never so longed , to get down out of sight, my own self hidden, the life and person of Jesus exalted, as during these last few weeks. The Bible gives many instances where people came down and they always received something from God. I think of Zaccheus who was away up in a or camore tree, and Zaccheus had to

him. Peter fell down, and I did that too when I received the gift of the Holy Spirit; the glory and majesty was so great I fell prostrate at His feet. You remember Mary sat down at His feet. Do you take time to sit at the feet of Jesus? I know you are busy. I know the babies keep you running from morning to night, but take time to sit and learn of Him. There was Somebody else who had a way of going down. We read Jesus laid down His life for us.

Rebecca went down and filled her pitcher. When you get down you are sure to get your pitcher filled. It is in the place where our heart has bled and people haven't known; places where we would like to have somebody give us a little pat on the shoulder; we would like to vindicate ourselves and explain, but the Lord says to us "Be still. I will fight your battles for you." Have you gotten the source of sure supply? Get down and get your pitcher filled. Rebecca filled her pitcher and came up. If you take care of the going down God will take care of the coming up.

The servant ran to meet her. Would you like to receive the Holy Ghost? Then just come to the well, fill your pitcher with joy and salvation waters. He ran to meet her and she gave him to drink and gave the camels also. Then he began to talk to her. "Rebecca, do you see those hills?" "Yes, my lord." "Do you know the valley that lies beyond and the wide, extended plains? Over the hills and the valleys, and the wide plains there is the beautiful land of Canaan. Over there is the bridegroom waiting. His name is Isaac. Would you be willing to leave your father, kindred and home to be his bride?" And as he described that home in Canaan, Rebecca said, "I will go." Her people were good, but she had to go and leave them. This is an individual walk with The servant brought jewels of God. gold, a symbol of His divine nature, and raiment. Are you poor? Do you feel your poverty? He will clothe you. To her mother and brother he gave some precious things. Now the people who are not going on in the Spirit will get precious things, but oh to the Bride, to the one who says "I will go" are given the choicest gifts.

The servant tarried for the night and the next morning he brought the camels. Rebecca rose and she rode upon the camels. The moment you say "yes" to God the Holy Spirit will bring some

camels around your door. Camels are not the smoothest means of riding. There will be lots of tests, lots of hard places on this journey, but every bump brings you one step nearer home. Some people say, "You do not know where I live. I cannot live for God in my own home." Yes, some people let the camels lay on them. It says that she rode on the camel. Instead of letting the trials and tests ride you and bear you down, you ride the trials and hard tests. If when the hard things come you can see it is not Brother So-and-so, it is not your husband or your wife, but it is God, then you will realize it is just a place to be an overcomer, to fit you for bridehood. She went quickly along, and the servant was her guide, a type of the Holy Spirit guiding us. As they went along he doubtless told her of the bridegroom who was waiting for her.

"He will take of the things of Mine and reveal them unto you." The way was long and hard and dusty but it came to an end. "The bumps of the camel are too hard." Cheer up, we are almost at the end of the way. Isaac went out to meditate. He lifted up his eyes and behold! the camels were coming. Jesus' may be on His way now to meet us. Can He look into your home and say, "My beloved is coming?" Not only did the bridegroom lift up his eyes, but Rebecca lifted up her eyes. Are your eyes uplifted looking for the heavenly Bridegroom? When she lifted up her eyes she saw her bridegroom. Can you imagine the ecstasy and glory of our meeting with Him, our Bridegroom? Good-by sorrow, good-by pain, good-by misunderstandings. Won't you go back home and ride those camels willingly? We are near the end of the way. He took her into his tent and she became his wife. "Let us be glad, for the marriage of the Lamb is come." And this last word I love the best of all, "And he loved her." Every time I get to the end of this it seems I stand on the shore of a great, mighty ocean. I cannot see the lengths of it nor the breadth of it, but as I think of the ocean of His great love, I say, "Jesus, if You loved me, a poor, miserable, good-for-nothing sinner, enough to die for me, wash me in Your blood, what will it be if I become Your wife? If it means Golgotha, let me go with You. If it means the tomb, my own aspirations and hopes are laid away. If those I love are taken from me, there is just room for You, Lord Jesus."

"Come hither and I will show you the bride, the Lamb's wife." Can we say with Rebecca, when the Holy Spirit asks us, "I will go?" Let us go through in our prayer-life. Let us go through in our soul-winning life. Let us go on with our preparation. God has promised the former and the latter rain to fall together in one month. That is yet to be fulfilled. The promise still holds good. It must be fulfilled. Remind God of it. Couple the name of Jesus with the reminder, which must also be enforced by the power of the Spirit.

God will honor His Son, will honor His Word, will honor His Spirit, and will honor the faithful pleader.

Floods upon the dry ground, so that the desert will blossom as the rose! Amen.

SOUNDS OF ABUNDANCE OF RAIN.

It is well also to remind God of the cross, for the wealth of the reserves of grace is still available through the work of His Son on Calvary. The slain Lamb lives, and therefore it is possible for a revival to come.

Grace is reigning and not sin. The scepter of mercy has not been dropped. The rod of wrath has not been taken up. And while God holds the scepter of mercy we can pray for a revival. Avail yourself of the privilege, and expect, as Elijah did, a great rain.

A great need, a great prophet, a great God, a great rain. The conditions today are identical. There are sounds of abundance of rain, even though wickedness abounds.

"If God will verily withhold no good thing from those who walk uprightly, let us hold to His faithfulness and walk worthy of Him. Trusting Him thus we may face with calm and sober, but confident assurance of victory, every difficulty and danger. We may count on grace for the work, on pecuniary aid, on needful facilities, and on ultimate success. Therefore let us not give Him a partial trust, but daily, hourly serve Him, holding His faithfulness."

FROM THE PENTECOSTAL VIEW-POINT.

There is a wide difference between man-made union and God-made unity.

In one we see the prominence of man, in the other, the pre-eminence of Christ. One is self-centered, the other is Godcentered.

Loving Christ, of necessity, means loving every member of His body. And those who are truly one with Him are ever one with His. Those who love the Lord with all their hearts, and souls and minds find no difficulty in loving their neighbors in the body. Love is the bond of perfect unity.

We do not have to make the unity of the Spirit, but we are to endeavor to keep it. The one God-given way of keeping it is for brethren to dwell together in unity, with all lowliness and meekness, and with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love.

There can be no unity between faith and infidelity, between holiness and worldliness; there can be no communion between light and darkness, nor any concord between Christ and Belial. Nor can you put the new wine of Pentecost into the old bottles of denominationalism. In the early days, Pentecostal faith and fervor could not blend with Jewish infidelity and indifference, nor in the last days will Pentecostal purity and power unite with Gentile pride and pomp. What God joins together let no man separate; and what God separates let no man attempt to unify.

"I have given them My glory that they may be one." So said He who spake as never man spake. And He has promised, "I will give grace and glory." His glory can do more in five minutes to create unity than man's ingenuity and effort can do in five millenniums.

In the so-called progress of civilzation -from gold to clay-we hear from many sides that "union is strength." They think that their gigantic foundation of untempered mortar will be so strong that it will last for ever. Man is attempting to make a reinforced concrete out of iron and clay, war-proof, strike-proof and God-proof. But this Goliath of man's own manufacture will go down before a single stone, cut out without human hands, that will come down from heaven. And in the crash. all man's attempts at union, religious union and all, will become as chaff on the summer threshing floor.

God will gather His eagles together, but the bats and moles will be left behind. S. H. F.

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EDITORIAL MEDITATIONS.

If we testify strong, we ought to live straight.

If "life is made up of trifles" we should not trifle about anything.

Until we become perfectly submissive and fully resigned to God's permissive will, as revealed in His providences, and go down under them, we are not likely to experience any relief through a change in our condition or environments.

If we are not earnestly longing after and seeking for the grace that will enable us to live up to the highest possibilities and privileges in God, provided for us this side of the rapture, then we are not where we ought to be, nor what we ought to be.

Oh the great immeasurableness of the Divine; the vast, full glory of the Infinite! How truly wonderful art Thou! No thought or wish; or hope but centers, Lord in Thee! And how can we, the feeble finite, apprehend Thee more? Inflate us with Thy life imparting breath, till all that's superficial disappears, and we are filled with light and peace divine; and bear us ever on the bosom of Love's shoreless tide till lost within its vast immensity, we feel that life-transforming power that makes us in a measure like Thyself, where we, enthroned above the fleeting things of earth, are wrapped in Thine unspeakable repose, and drink forever from the source of life divine.

Others testifying to their sense of self-depreciation will ofttimes give expression to just what we feel but hesitate to utter, lest the very voicing of it should savor of the self-life we claim to so much deplore. And that our testimony may not have the appearance of an assumed humility we sometimes suppress, rather than express, what is in our hearts, seeking thus to avoid what might seem like parading it as a virtue. Yet we observe that those who have no scruples along this line get great credit for being very humble and Spiritual; but Christ made of Himself no reputation,-not even for humility. He was the embodiment of it, and so should we be.

If God gave you your choice between an active and conspicuous ministry and a hidden and seemingly unimportant one, would you willingly accept the latter, and sing from your heart,

"Oh, to be little and unknown; Loved and prized by God alone"?

There are phases of ourselves which cannot be discounted beyond a certain point, nor dispensed with without impairing our true individuality. need only to be sanctified, modified and regulated. There are other features. however, which are superficial, and, in some cases seemingly artificial, which may be safely discounted, and others even dispensed with, without our suffering serious results. Yet there is withal, such a consciousness of the human and so little sense of the divine; so much of self and so little of God: so much of ourselves in our own estimation, and yet so little of us in God's sight, that we cling to that little, and magnify it till we are in danger of becoming, in some instances, a walking example of what someone has styled the exaltation of the exaggerated ego. Such a sense of selfimportance seems to characterize the majority of frail mortality, that if it were not for the pronoun I some of us would be very limited in our vocabulary.

Self scrutiny in the natural is unprofitable, but we greatly need from time to time to have a revelation of ourselves to ourselves by the Lord, and take a good look at ourselves, not as though looking into a glass to admire ourselves, but to see ourselves just as we are in God's sight and let Him so shape us that we can bear to take a look at ourselves when necessary without becoming either pained or puffed up.

THE VALUE OF STILLNESS.

There are two commandments given in the Word of God, which are in strong contrast, but not in conflict with one another. One is, "Be still and know that I am God;" and the other one is, "Shout aloud thou inhabitant of Zion!" Both of these can and should be obeyed.

But the majority of Christians, we feel, do not appreciate the value of silence, and though not necessarily inclined to shout aloud, they nevertheless find it difficult, as a rule, to keep still long enough to sense God in this way; and being comparative strangers to the power and benefit of this divine stillness, the expression, "Blessed quietness," is to them merely a poetic phrase. What creatures of sense we are?

When the Lord called Elijah to go forth and stand upon the mount while He passed by, causing a great, strong wind to rend the mountain, followed by an earthquake and fire, and later by a "still small voice," He declared that He was not in these outward startling things, in the sense that He was in the "still small voice," although they may have had the effect of awing Elijah into silence

Doubtless many of us now sense God in the storm, the earthquake and the fire, but few recognize Him in the "still small voice," and when we fail to do so we miss His best.

There are times of waiting before the Lord when quietness in the natural prevails, which is but the stillness of death. On the other hand there is a profound stillness produced by the Spirit, which is freighted with life and power divine; but many of God's children fail to distinguish between these two kinds of stillness, and count them both alike unprofitable.

The internal restlessness and outward creaturally activity of some keep them ever in a state where they cannot hear God's whisper.

On the occasion of the taking of Jericho by the Israelites, under the leadership of Joshua, the people were commanded by him not to shout or make any noise with their voice, nor to let any word proceed out of their mouth until the day they were bidden by him to shout; and according to the divine program they marched around the city silently for six days, and on the seventh day they circled the city in silence seven times. Then the people, as directed, shouted with a great shout, and the walls fell down flat.

But we fear that if a company of Pentecostal believers were sent forth by God to-day to capture some modern Jericho by the same or similar methods, they would reverse God's order of things, and do the shouting first, and find as a result, their efforts instead of walls, fall flat.

There is certainly a time to shout, but the shout that has most of God in it is usually born of a holy hush. And is it not significant that all power, both in the natural and the Spiritual, is distilled in silence. This is clearly evidenced through the forces of the universe, all of which are silent and unseen, and recognized only by that which they produce. Things seen and sensed are temporel, but things unseen and unheard are eternal, according to the Word.

Let us study, then, to be quiet, and live where we can hear the "still, small voice," and be better able to see, to sense, and to apprehend and know God.

The thousand years of Christ's reign upon the earth will be a time of judgment in righteousness. The great White Throne judgment referred to in Rev. 20:11, will be the great and final judgment day for all the unsaved dead, who will then be raised and brought into judgment and given their final sen-

899. What does friendship with the world mean as enmity against God, as in Jas. 4:4?

It means that the world is godless and opposed to the Lord, and to take sides with the world and to be a friend to this system of unrighteousness is to make one's self an enemy to God.

900. Is Jas. 5:13 to 15, as to affliction and healing, incumbent as a duty upon Christians, or is it merely a privilege to be resorted to when all other means fail?

It is both a duty and a privilege.

901. Is it scriptural to offer prayer and fail to say that we ask it "in the name of Christ?"

It is very doubtful in the mind of many scholars that when Christ told us to ask in His name that we could do so by merely repeating the words "in His name." If merely repeating the phrase "in His name" would fulfill the requirements, then the biggest sinner in the land, who is in rebellion against God, might get all he wanted of the Lord, and still be in rebellion against God. I take it for granted that no person can truly ask anything in the name of Christ, on which basis Christ promised a certain answer, unless he himself is in Christ. If a person is in Christ and in His will and doing everything for the glory of God and as a Christian, then it will be implied in all his prayers that they are in the name of Christ. It will be all right to add the little phrase, "In the name of Christ"; but he can utter a scriptural prayer without that literal phrase. God is concerned with the heart and the spirit of our prayers. In rebuking demons it is more essential and scriptural to always use the name of

902. What is the attitude of Pentecestal people toward oath-bound and

secret organizations which omit the name of Christ?

They generally let them alone and strictly stay out of them. They generally do not feel free to bind themselves by oath and be so yoked up with sinners that they can be ruled by any worldly organization. We desire to keep free to obey the Lord only.

903. Should we always expect the speaking in tongues as the Spirit of God gives the utterance to accompany the Baptism of the Holy Ghost now as in New Testament days? If so, should we also expect the cloven tongues of fire to be seen?

Yes, we have a right to expect the same sign as seems always to have been present with the Baptism of the Holy Spirit in New Testament days. there is no mention of the cloven tongues as of fire having been seen but once in the New Testament, and this is never referred to in any case as proof that the Holy Ghost was poured out. But the tongues do occur in other places in the New Testament, and they are specifically referred to in Acts 10:46, as proof that God had poured out the Spirit on the Gentiles. No doubt many do receive a baptism of fire at the same time they receive the Baptism with the Holy Spirit, and some believe that it is always present and is inseparable from the Baptism with the Holy Spirit, even though the fire may not be visible. It has been seen visibly many times in these last days. When Elder A. H. Post, who is now a missionary in Egypt, was baptized with the Holy Ghost in Los Angeles, quite a number of the saints saw a large tongue of fire fall upon him, and he immediately received the Baptism. It has also been seen in many other cases. Many others testify to feeling it where nobody saw it. There are many internal witnesses to the baptism, but nothing internal can be an external sign.

904. Why was baptism for the dead practiced in New Testament days, and why has it been discontinued since? Does this baptism affect the condition of the dead after death?

It depends upon the interpretation put upon the language used in the scriptures, as to whether you conclude that it has been discontinued or not. The scriptures teach that all sinners are dead in trespasses and sins, and that when we believe on Christ we identify ourselves with Him in His death, and acknowledge that we are dead, and then in baptism are buried with Him as dead. Every such person, when he is baptized in water, though still physically alive, is baptized for dead. In this sense the reason is clear from the scriptures why believers are so baptized, and that the practice in this sense has not been discontinued. Even if a practice is referred to of some being baptized in behalf of dead friends, it is certain the New Testament does not teach that living believers should be baptized in the name of friends who died in their sins at some previous time. If one were to do such a thing, it could in no wise change the condition of the dead.

905. When I received the Baptism I spoke in tongues, but have not done so since. Why is it that I do not continue to speak in tongues?

The scriptures do not teach that you have to continue talking in tongues the rest of your life. So if you do not so speak, and you are walking on with the Lord, and you still have the other evidences of the power and Spirit of God in you and upon you, then you have no need to worry. Leave this matter with the Lord. Walk on with Him, and keep praising Him. But, as you press the battle and keep close to Jesus, we know from actual experience of many other such cases that some day in prayer you are liable to break out speaking in tongues again. Most of such cases do, sooner or later.

906. Is it right or scriptural for one to marry a second time after their first companion dies?

There is nothing that requires such a person to get married, but such men or women are just as free to marry after their former companions die as though they never had been married. They are again single in the eyes both of the law of our country and of the law of God. But if such person is a Christian he is exhorted to marry only in the Lord; that is, marry another person who is in the Lord.

907. Please explain Eph. 4:5.

908. Please explain the last part of the 2nd chapter of Colossians.

No truer statement could be published than that made by our Brother J. W. Welch at the recent Council, to the effect that "The General Council was never meant to be an Institution, it is just a missionary agency." Brother Welch used the word "missionary" in the comprehensive sense of including both home and foreign work. And that is just exactly what we are. We have a distinctive message for all people, at home and abroad, and only sufficient machinery as is necessary will be used in carrying out the work entrusted to us.

It has taken a little time to get adjusted to one another for the best interests of the Kingdom of God, but now that our foundations are pretty well established, we can look out on the fields with greater interest and can concentrate our forces for an aggressive campaign for lost souls in all lands.

THE LORD WORKING IN CHINA.

Miss Mae F. Mayo, who has been visiting some of the Pentecostal missions in North China, writes: "I visited the mission in Peking—Mr. Hansen's place. A good crowd and good interest. He has some fine workers. At Tientsin God is working. It was inspiring to see some fifteen men kneeling in prayer, some seeking the baptism and some to be saved, at Mr. Baltau's mission. There were also good crowds at Bro. Creamer's mission. Creamer's mission.

REVIVAL MEETINGS IN SOUTH CHINA.

This is the time for special revival efforts in South China. Bro. Geo. M. Kelly writes, "In every station there is need of Revival Meetings, which are most generally held at this time of the year. I have engagements for months, should Jesus tarry, in evangelistic campaigns. The five missions of our own are looking forward to their part of these meetings and others of our missionaries expect that we will give their part of these meetings and others of our missionaries expect that we will give them a little time. The need of more consecrated, Spirit-filled missionaries with a knowledge of the Chinese language, to take charge of these meetings, is apparent." Pray much for these evangelistic cam-paigns this fall.

CHINA AS A MISSION FIELD.

China has awakened the interest of the world as a mission field. Its vast millions of population and its extensive territory invite the ambassadors of Christ to come over and possess the land. For years the Denominational Boards have been pouring in men and money, but there are vast slices of territory which remain untouched, and one need not go very far into the interior of the country to find thousands of souls who have never yet heard the name of Jesus.

China possesses at the present time a larger number of Pentecostal missionaries than any other foreign field. Fortyseven missionaries who are members of the Council are located in China. These missionaries are grouped in a small territory near Canton, South China; another small group in North China around Peking and Tientsin, a small group on the western border of China and Tibet, and a few scattered ones in various parts of China. You can travel from Shanghai, a month's journey directly westward, without seeing a single Pentecostal missionary until you reach Kansu Province, where are grouped the little band on the Tibetan border. There is much territory in China to be possessed.

China offers peculiar advantages for missionary work. An apostolic ministry in apostolic power will bring apostolic results. This has been demonstrated.

Bro. Lloyd Creamer announces that he expects to leave China for a much needed furlough on Nov. 18th, sailing on the S. S. Empress of Japan.

Miss Ada R. Buchwalter writes, "Last night we had a meeting for missionaries only and oh how blessedly the Lord did reveal himself and we knew He was in our midst strengthening and encouraging our hearts. We are planning to go next week on an itinerating trip to a place that, so far as we know, no missionary has ever been, and we trust the Lord's blessing shall be upon us as we witness for Him."

At the present time the missionaries in North China are facing a famine which will prevail for many months. During this famine many thousands will die and fill Christless graves. Much concern is being expressed by the missionaries over the situation. In addition to the famine, China is having its share of wars and rumors of wars. though not much has been published in the American newspapers, China has been undergoing revolution upon revolution which have centered around Peking. For a time mail for our missionaries in North China was delayed for over a month and the missionaries were practically cut off from communication with the homeland. We need to pray much for our missionaries in China that God will sustain them and give them great power to witness during these trying days of reconstruction and sifting.

Miss Ella Finch writes, "These are perllous days on the mission field. Two of the provinces are now at war and nearly all the soldiers are taken from the cities to fight. This leaves many places at the mercy of thieves. This past week there was a battle here in Sainam between the soldiers and the thieves in which six soldiers were killed. It is not safe to go out of the city after dark because of the thieves. Nevertheless, we are safe under the shadow of His wings and in the hollow of His hand. of His hand.

Miss Blanche Appleby recently had the privilege of visiting Brother John D. James' station in Hong Kong and writes, "I was very favorably impressed at the neatness and order of the Pentecostal Assembly of God, Lun Fat St., Wanchai, Hong Kong, made possible by Brother J. D. James' faithful teaching on giving and the liberality of the Chinese brethren in response to the teaching of the Word. The mission furniture, though simple, was very neat, and the walls had beautiful texts, neatly arranged. It truly had the appearance of the Lord's House'.

"Leaving Mrs. Needham at Tsinanfu to rest, I took an early train south about two hours and a half journey to Taianfu, Brother Anglin's orphanage. Brother Fyhr met me at the train but I had only been met me at the train but I had only been at the Orphanage about a half hour when a couple natives came in from the country, about twenty miles distant, bringing word of the death of Brother Carlson. Brother Carlson, as you know, was one of the coworkers left in charge of Brother Anglin's work while Brother Anglin went on furlaugh furlough.

"I had intended leaving by the six o'clock train next morning, returning to Tsinanfu, but remained for the funeral. The body was carried in that night, and Sister Carlson, Bro. Fyhr (who had gone to assist in any way possible) and another Swedish brother who had been acting as nurse, arrived about noon, Several friends from the Salvation Army and the Methodist Mission gathered in with the friends from the Salvation Army and the Methodist Mission gathered in with the children of the Orphanage. We had a simple short service together, a young man from the Methodist Mission acting as interpreter, and the Lord's presence was very definitely with us, strengthening and comforting Sister Carlson and encouraging us all to press on in the battle. I could not remain for the burial which was to take place out in the little foreign cemetary over a mile away, as it was necessary for me to return to Tsinanfu that same evening."

Brother Carlson had only been in China one year and six months. He was nearly forty years old. He went home to be with the Lord September 27th at 4:30 a.m.

Not long ago I was in Peking and just got out by the last train before the gates were closed owing to the war. From Kalgan, north China, to Gashatay, I carried over \$100.00 in silver on the saddle with me and rode one hundred miles through a country infested with robbers." TROUBLE IN NORTH CHINA.

Miss Alice E. Evans writes of the trouble in North China as follows: "A colonel of the American Legation has just been down to Tung Hsien to report that there is hope of the situation clearing up after awhile. Four days ago a sergeant and eight American Marines came down from Peking for our protection and they are to stay a few days longer at the least. So much of the difficulty lies in the fact of there being several different armies hostile to one another, whose Generals have seemed anxious to make themselves of some importance in the government of the country. It is all too complicated to be able to go into detail in a letter. For about three weeks there has been no train service between here and Peking, and for several days the line to Tientsen from Peking was blocked by troops. Now we get mail though it has to come by steamer from Shanghai as the railroad south of Tientsen has been torn up in places and the same is true concerning the line running through Honan and Hankow.

"The sixteen gates of Peking are kept

is true concerning the line running through Honan and Hankow.

"The sixteen gates of Peking are kept shut all the time in order to prevent invading armies from entering. Tung Hsien and the surrounding villages have been looted and some of the dear Christians have suffered loss. We feel that our lives are not in danger, yet our belongings are liable to be looted at almost any time. So please pray for both ourselves and the Chinese Christians in this respect. If their wadded winter garments are taken from them they will suffer much when winter comes."

New York, Oct. 2.—Charles R. Crane, United States minister to China, has cabled to President Wilson details of the famine in Peking district, said a cablegram received today by the Board of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Episcopal church from Bishop Wilson S. Lewis.

Bishop Lewis, who arrived in Peking last week sent the following message:

"Thirty million people suffering. One thousand deaths daily. Conditions growing worse. Church members dying. United States Minister Crane has cabled details to President Wilson."

This is the chief cause of the difficulties encountered in India. Nothing but the mighty power of God can overcome the obstacles in the way. We can pray and we can give and God will give the increase. Let us pray as we never have before for our dear missionaries in this hard, difficult field.

to repeat a verse from the Bible or join in
singing Christian hymns. Now they know
most of the Bible stories and the Life of
Christ, and will join in the singing. In
one village the old men (who are set hard
in their religion), call the little ignorant
boys to sing the Christian songs to them,
and many of them sing them through. The
verse of Scripture comes to our minds
which reads, 'Out of the mouths of babes
and sucklings Thou hast ordained praise.'
"In another village, where a year ago the

"In another village, where a year ago the women of the village were afraid to allow the Bible women to come into their homes, the Bible women to come into their homes, they now beg of them to come and sing and pray and talk with them. In several cases of child-birth in this same village the Bible women were called to pray with the women at the time of delivery. It surprised the women when they found out they could give birth to a child without drinking the water their husbands feet had been washed in, and without going through other superstitious customs, idol worship, etc.

"There has been several cases of heal-

There has been several cases of heal-"There has been several cases of healing. One woman said she would never again worship idols if Jesus would heal her son who was very, very sick. He was healed as she and the preachers prayed. Another is a case of a leper who was healed by washing his diseased limbs three times a day in water at the direction of one of the preachers. This reminds us of the case recorded in the Bible. It must have been a case of obedience.

"The meetings in these villages are held

"The meetings in these villages are held out in the open air where everyone can see and hear all that is going on and yet it goes on unmolested. The only place we have a church building is in Sharannagar. Many of the children never miss a meeting and the men and women also leave their work to come and listen and sing."

Yesterday one of our little girls, age ten, was severely bitten by a large black scorpion, considered by the natives very dangerous. God heard prayer, and in an hour she was playing with the other girls, and said she felt no pain, while a village woman the same day, bitten by a black scorpion, died within sight of the Mission Compound. We are reminded of the sweet old story, the blood on the door posts, hallelujah!

Latin America

The Land of the Dark Ages

It is not necessary to go back a few hundred years to find the dark ages, one need only take a trip to any part of Latin America to find conditions very similar to those which prevailed in the days of Martin Luther. By Latin America we mean Mexico, Central America and South America. These lands are controlled largely by Catholicism. While the governments of many countries in Central and South America are throwing off the Roman yoke, yet the priests control the people, and our missionaries must contend with priestly opposition continually. Because of the difficulties encountered in the work, few missionaries have cared to go to South America. with the result that this vast sister continent lying to the south of us has been dubbed "The Neglected Continent."

Thank God, a few missionaries have dared to go to Latin America with a living Gospel of a living Christ and God is blessing their ministry.

Mexico has one white missionary who has the endorsement of the General Council and several Spirit-filled native workers. A number of American missionaries are doing good work among the Mexicans along the border. The vast field of millions in Mexico is awaiting laborers to go in and possess the land.

Central America has four missionaries who are members of the Council. These missionaries are located in Guatemalla and Honduras. There are also some good independent Pentecostal Missionaries in Central America. The field, however, is practically untouched yet.

South America should awaken the sympathy of every Pentecostal saint in the United States and Canada. A continent nearly as vast as North America with only a dozen missionaries who are in fellowship with the Assemblies of God. These are located in Venezuela, Argentina, Peru and Bolivia. There is a blessed work in progress in Chili however, and another work in Brazil. We also have learned recently of a party that has landed in Argentina from Sweden. These Scandanavian missionaries will be welcomed on the field and we will pray for them as well as our own missionaries as they bring a full Pentecostal gospel to those who sit in darkness.

Pray much for South America that God will send laborers in to the ripening harvest field.

We came to this pioneer field last October and in less than a year's time we have a little assembly, for which we praise the dear Lord. The work was set in order last Sunday evening, and we declared ourselves an assembly, beginning with seven charter members. It is certainly of the Lord how we are covering this big field in so short a time with so few workers, but we felt sure God was sending us here and we also feel that He is leading."

Brother Tommy F. Anderson of Bolivia writes: "At last we are in Bolivia after crossing the Andes Mountains sometimes at an altitude of 14.550 feet. But God gave me the victory and on the following Sunday I baptized eighteen in water and held three services besides. About the time I was getting better of my boils my wife had two, one on her hip and one on her ankle. Our trust is in God and we have not gone down to Egypt for help."

Africa As a Mission Field

A Wonderful Land of Opportunity

For many years it has been said that "the dangers of missionary work in Africa are too great—the field is closed fast." And the dangers are great. Consecrated missionaries have filled premature graves in all sections of the continent. On the other hand, there are millions yet untouched by the Gospel, dwelling in the depths of paganism. Even today the number of human lives sacrificed to devils far exceeds the loss of life during the great European war. This awful condition of depravity and darkness challenges the whole Christian world to activity. The door must be entered at once. Mohammedanism has seen the opportunity and is spreading its propaganda all over the continent. Already there are between forty and fifty millions of Mohammedans in Africa. The race is set and the course is clear. It is either Mohammed or Christ. When the African pagan becomes a Mohammedan he is practically lost as it is ten times harder to win him with the Gospel of Christ.

Vast millions are waiting the Gospel. On September 1st, 1920, there were only twenty-one missionaries in Africa who are members of the Council. Thank God, this is not the entire number of Pentecostal missionaries in Africa. These twenty-one missionaries are in four groups, viz. Egypt, Liberia, French Guinea and the Transvaal. A party is also now in preparation for the Belgian Congo, but the time for sailing has not yet arrived.

The field is so vast, the difficulties so great, and the opportunities so wonderful that one is appalled at the prospect. Let us go up and take the land for Christ.

Jessie L. Eustace writes from Liberia: "Several days ago our native preacher's little boy was taken very ill and he really seemed to be dying. The mother and little sister began to cry; the father and I began to pray and lay hands on him and in the name of Jesus we rebuked the sickness and in less than five minutes the little lad was perfectly delivered. We give all the glory to our wonder-working God."

Macie M. Boddy, of Liberia, writes:
"About three weeks ago God met us wonderfully in our Sunday evening service in a heathen town. When the service began there was only a handful of people present, mostly children. We were somewhat discouraged, but while singing the power fell on one of our Christian boys (a teacher in the school), and he began praising the Lord. He became so drunk with the wine of the Spirit that he could scarcely stand on his feet as he danced around the large circle formed there in the midst, of the heathen huts. Others were also catching the spirit of praise and as God worked the crowds gathered. The wife of one of our native Christian preachers was prostrated. When she arose it seemed that she could hardly wait until the brother speaking would finish. Then she stepped out, and the anointing was on her for about twenty minutes. How she did pour the truth into the ears of that great company of heathen people! It was truly wonderful, and my



eyes filled with tears as I listened and beheld.

"It is a rare thing for a woman in this country to take much active part in services. They are timid and shrinking from being kept down by the men—practically slaves—and they are very slow to grasp the truth. This woman has been in missions since she was a little child and of late has gone through some trying and peculiar experiences which have drawn her closer to God. She is the most fearless native Christian woman I have known and seems always ready to give a testimony. Praise God for such a tower of strength among our women!"

Sister Lillian Trasher of the Orphanage, Assiout, Egypt, writes: "I praise the Lord that in every way my work is getting on very nicely, indeed. The older children have now grown up to be real helpers. They are such ambitious little things, always delighted when they can find something to do for God. They have special prayer meetings several times a week where only the large ones are allowed to enter so that they can pray and plan how they can better live as examples to the smaller children. I love these meetings better than any for they are so earnest and it does my heart good to see these young girls all from 12 to 16 years planning how they can live better every day. Do, please, pray for them that they may truly be living epistles."
