Going Through With Jesus.

Notes of a Message Given by Makato Niki, Better Known as Sister Truth, of the Door of Hope, Japan, at the Springfield, Mo., Assembly.

"Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love Him" (1 Cor. 2.9)

I thank God because I can say I know that all things work together for good to them that love Him. I thank Him for His love that conquers everything, even sickness. Since I have been over in this country I have had tests of sickness. One day I seemed to lose all strength, I could not pray even, I was too weak. After 6 o'clock, I began to think, "Why is all this sickness? Does not it come from the devil? My heavenly Father must have allowed it for some purpose, and has He not promised to work all things together for good to them that love Him? And I know that this sickness does not alter the fact that I love Him."

Defeating the Devil.

This had no sooner gone through my mind when I felt the power of God, just like an electric power, surging through my body, and touching the very spot where I was sick. I cried out, "Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him," and I jumped up from my bed. Just at that moment I became afflicted with a pain, but I cried out, "This is a lie of the devil." And the devil had to go. We know that all things, even our sicknesses, work together for our good when we love God.

We must have this love for God, this love for Jesus, at any cost, and we must learn to love Him under all circumstances. And this love comes through the Holy Spirit. The desire of the King of Kings is towards us. By beholding Him we can be changed into His likeness, even by the Spirit of the Lord. And when Jesus comes, we shall be changed in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye. Praise God, that day is approaching.

A HOLY LIFE

Part of the Experience of Madam Adorna.

Madam Adorna's views of human nature, as it is when unsanctified by the grace of God, corresponded with the representations of Scripture, viz, "as evil, and only evil continually." God, she regarded as the Infinite Love; continually going outward from Himself, under the unchangeable impulse of His own benevolent nature; and living His life, and realizing His happiness in the life and happiness of all that is good and true throughout the vast space of His own ceaseless operations. Man on the contrary, she regarded, in his unsanctified state, as the opposite of love, and as synonymous with self; and consequently as drawn inward, by the very necessities of his being, within a narrow and narrower circle, till he knows no thought, no life, no happiness, but his own interests, and thus separates himself at the greatest possible remove from infinite love.

She regarded the tendency of the natural heart as definitely and as certainly in the direction of sin, as is the tendency of a stone when it is thrown into the air, to return again to the earth, towards which it is drawn by a law that

is inflexible in its operation, and always increasing in strength.

Her views in relation to the nature and results of selfishness, are very instructive. She relates, as she was one day dwelling in thought on religious things, she had, by the aids of divine grace, a clear view of this subject. She was enabled, as she thought, to perceive very distinctly that the spirit of self. such as we see it in every unholy person, is the same thing as the spirit of Satan. They were presented to her mind as entirely identical. So that if the holy person may be regarded as bearing about the image of God in his own regenerated nature, the unholy and selfish person may, with equal reason, be looked upon as a miniature image of the Prince of Darkness.

"I come to a conclusion," she says in some remarks on this subject. "that selfishness is the root of all the evils to which we are exposed, either in this life or in the future. Satan himself would not have fallen if he had not left the love of God for the love of self. And still more clearly, as it seems to me, am I enabled with divine aid to trace the

results of this destructive principle in the fall of man. Adam fell the moment he turned his desires from God to himself, and substituted his own will, as his principle of action, for the will of God. And this life of self which he then possessed, in accordance with the law of natural descent, which gives to the child a moral character as well as a natural body like that of the parent, becomes the inborn principle and life of those who have sprung from him.

"Selfishness, which nothing but the special grace of God can extirpate, may be said to have its existence not only in the heart, but in the whole being, in the very blood and bones, of the natural man; so that independently of the grace of God, there is not a word, or thought, or action which is not infected with this poison. Until he is purified from this great evil, in a greater or less degree, no one can enjoy communion with God, and the communion will be the more unembarrassed and more perfect, in proportion as the purification becomes more complete."

In regard to the love of God, she considered it as positive in its operation. Not merely a principle which preserves from evil, but one which bestows positive good, and as possessing a stronger power than either men or angels can conceive.

She was accustomed to say that it is impossible to know the length and breadth, the depth and height of God's understanding. And she might have added the same may be said of His hatred, that He hates the appropriate objects of His hatred with a mental energy not less intense. So that it is impossible there should be any harmony between God and sin, or that they dwell together without a contest. The soul, therefore, that knowingly permits the least stain of sin to rest upon it must suffer incalculable evil. the necessity of purity of heart. And hence the necessity not only of forgiveness for the past, but of holiness for the present. And in order to be thus holy, and to enter into communion and union with God, she saw very clearly that the life which she must live must be a life out of herself. God had taught her that in a life which has its spring ("All my springs are in Thee!") or source of action in anything short of His own free grace, there can be no good thing. So that she could not be satisfied without being able to say, "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me." And in living this life she could be said to bear the divine image.

It was a cherished sentiment with her that God loves His own work. lives and rejoices in that which is from Himself, and in man not less than anything else; at least so long as man remains in his true position of entire de-In accordance with the expendence. pressions in the Book of Proverbs, it can be said of God, with a truth which His own heart of love alone can know, that "His delight is with the sons of men."

Man has little idea of the extent of the fall, so the redeemed have little idea of the redemption that has been purchased for them on Calvary. Not only a redemption from the lowest pit, but a redemption that raises them up to the very throne of God.

The Son of man tasted the bitterness that the fall entailed, and He alone can tell the bitterness of that cup. Calvary tells in some measure what the Son of man suffered to redeem man from the power of Satan. Man in his present state cannot grasp nor understand the extent of the fall, neither the greatness of the redemption and restoration to a position beyond that lost by Adam, to become partakers of the divine nature.

Since the price paid for redemption is so great, the redeemed are precious, very precious, to Him who gave so much for them that He might receive them back to Himself. "They shall be Mine, saith the Lord of Hosts, in that day when I make up My jewels." Jewels are for a special purpose. Their highest use is for the coronation of kings

Coronation jewels must be especially prepared. They must be polished after a similitude, the similitude that Jehovah Himself has designed. The earth is full of the glory of the Lord in gem, in pearl and in stone; and Jehovah has His gem, His pearl and His stone in His spiritual kingdom. And they are being reserved for the great Coronation.

The thief cometh to steal and those who are not in the fold will be stolen. His jewels will not be lost "They shall be Mine in that day when I make up My jewels." He will not lose anything that belongs to Himself, and Satan is only going to get his own.

THE GREAT NEED.

Because thou sayest, I am rich, and have need of nothing, and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind and naked I counsel thee to buy of Me gold tried in the fire (a pure heart filled with the fire of God), white raiment (the righteousness of the saints), that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and anoint thine eyes with eyesalve (the anointing of the Spirit that gives spiritual vision), that thou mayest see." Then He declares, "As many as I love I rebuke and chasten; be zealous therefore and repent."

This is the great need. Oh for a return to God, to the first love, to heart consecration. A return to the old paths wherein is the good way, and walk therein, and find rest to the soul.

Let the Church acknowledge the need, return to God, and a revival wave will sweep over her, and numbers now in the valley of decision will decide for Christ.

Then the Church will again be fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners, and go forth to meet the Bridegroom with joy and rejoicings. Amen and amen.

Turning Tests to Triumphs.

As we reflect upon conditions today, we are convinced that one of the greatest needs we have is a deeper consecration. A consecration that will bring us to the place where Abraham was in the 22nd of Genesis.

When God called Abraham to give his only son in sacrifice, it must have been the supreme test of his life. He could more easily have given himself. Abraham is a type of the Father. As we have read the sacred (?) books of the different pagan religions we have found that no heathen writer or prophet has ever brought the thought of God to their followers, in the relationship of a parent. To them God is an austere, distant one, only to be feared. I once asked a converted Sadhu, or holy man of India, what had attracted him to Christianity, and he replied, "It is the only religion that tells of a God of love.'

Follow the little company as they wind their way to Moriah, to the very place God had told Abraham of. When Abraham "lifted up his eyes and saw the place afar off" he said, "I and the lad will go yonder and WORSHIP." He keenly realized what lay before him but he counted God worthy and turned that supreme test into "worship."

Again we see Jesus, as He contemplated His ignominious death. He said, "The hour is come that the Son of man should be glorified."

It is not when sitting alone with Him, permeated with the fragrance of His love, or in meetings, carried away with the depth of communion with Him, and fellowship with the saints, but in the valley, in the darkest test of our lives, that God accomplishes His definite work. Can we too turn the test into worship? Is He being "glorified" in us or "crucified again"?

It isn't how much but the spirit in which we suffer that counts. We may "give our bodies to be burned" and be profited nothing. Each cross is a "jewel" to set in His crown. The jewel (stone in the rough) must be polished. We may not recognize the value at first and may try to get rid of the process. Some stones must go through fire, others must be subjected to hammer or chisel. No one knows the value of the stone but He who has received like You know not the value of the test, but He does. The tests come to perfect that which concerneth us. Shall we not, in these superficial days, seek to turn each test into deep "worship"? -Jennie E. Kirkland, Detroit, Mich.

THE SECRET OF BEING A CLEAR CHANNEL.

1089. Please explain how I may know the mind of God concerning anything. Some people open the Bible at random with finger on a verse, and conclude this is an answer from God. Can you give proof where this is correct?

No, I can give no scripture to prove that God has promised to guide us by opening the Bible and putting our fingers down at random. Some testify that they have been graciously led in this way. God in His mercy may do such now and then, and I do not dispute the testimony of these. But since God has made no such promise I personally could not trust any such method.

We can know the will of God in three ways, and when all of these three ways combine to point in the same direction, the assurance may be thribly sure. First, the thing that we want to do should be in keeping with the moral and righteous principles in the word of God. God never wants us to make any unrighteous or immoral act. As we study the word, if God seems to give special light on passages, and seems to show us by His Spirit that they apply to the case in hand, then this is one evidence in favor that the thing is the mind of the Lord. The second thing is the direct leading of the Spirit of God. If we will get our own minds and our own desires and our own emotions still before the Lord so that we have no personal desires in the matter, and can commit the matter honestly to God and be willing to accept yes or no, then God can impress us directly by His Spirit. He can put a mighty sense of moral duty, a great sense of obligation upon us to do the thing which He desires us to do. When such unselfish impressions come to us in prayer, and God thus puts a great ought in our soul, we have a still further assurance that the thing is the will of the Lord.

Third, the providences of God should co-operate with these other leadings of the Lord. No matter how we feel about things if God shuts up every door tight, and it is impossible to get them open, then either the thing is not the will of the Lord, or it is not the will of the Lord at that moment. If the matter is the will of the Lord, and we walk with Him, He will certainly open the door and make the thing possible. When all of these things work together and in accordance with the best information we have on the subject, we may be assured that the thing is the mind of the Lord.

1090. Was the Church set up on the day of Pentecost, or before?

There were regenerated souls as individuals before the day of Pentecost. Paul speaks of above 500 believers that Christ appeared to after His resurrection. All these, including the apostles and 120 mentioned in Acts first chapter, were no doubt saved persons, and were lively stones to be set in the building of God's church by the outpouring of the Holy Ghost on the day of Pentecost. So we may say that the materials for the church were prepared before the day of Pentecost, but that they were put together in the Spirit on the day of Pentecost.

1091. Please explain Jeremiah 31:12. What is meant by "For wheat and for oil and for wine and for the young of the flock"?

Rotherham translates this, "To the goodness of the Lord, to the wheat and to the wine, and to the oil, and to the young of the flock." This verse is a part of the description of the joys that belong to Israel in the last days. multitude is to pour in like a stream to the goodness of the Lord, to the wheat, etc. The idea is that they are to have righty to eat and to drink, and to be abundantly cared for so that their souls shall be as a watered garden, and that they shall have no more sorrow.

1092. Is the word "Advocate" in 1 John 2:1 and the word "Comforter" in John 14:16 derived from the same Greek word?

Yes, the word is "parakletos." means one called to the side of. Any assistant or helper is a parakletos. According to the context and varying according to the context it may be translated helper, advocate, intercessor or comforter. Both Jesus and the Holy Ghost are Helpers, are Intercessors, and Comforters.

1093. A preacher is preaching around here that none but those filled with the Holy Ghost will go up in the Rapture. I believe every blood-washed child will go. Please explain.

No doubt all who see their privilege, should be filled with the Spirit; but all those who have walked in the light as they had it and who remain bloodwashed will no doubt go up in the Rapture. The solemn question is not what experience one has had, but what is their present standing in the Lord? Are they now blood-washed? Can they remain blood-washed after they have the light, if they wilfully refuse to walk in it? I fear that some who have been baptized with the Holy Ghost may be lost out in their soul and may fail to go up in the Rapture. It behooves us all to do our best and trust wholly in the Lord.

1094. How did that old wicked king know the fourth man in the fiery furnace looked like the Son of God?

Perhaps the expression in Daniel 3:25 translated "the Son of God" would be better translated "a son of God." Likely the idea of the king was that the fourth person he saw was so majestic and Godlike that he meant merely to describe him as a son of God. This does not mean that he had ever seen Christ and knew that this person whom he saw in the fire looked like Him. But if the expression be interpreted as it stands that the king knew that the fourth person was like the Son of God, then his knowledge would have been supernaturally communicated to the

THE MUCH NEGLECTED MESSAGE OF REPENTANCE.

When Paul was before Felix he gave testimony to his faith in Christ, and as he reasoned of righteousness, temperance and judgment to come, Felix trembled.

Paul was no timeserver. He was a prisoner, but he did not say smooth things in order to curry favor with the governor. He preached of righteousness, temperance and judgment to come. His hands were chained, but not his tongue. Many a modern preacher has his tongue chained, though his hands nay be free.

Wealth and position never influenced Paul. When Paul was before the governor, the governor trembled, not Paul. The righteous are as bold as a lion. If you are not bold, examine your righteousness. Christ, the righteous One, was ever bold. "Go tell that fox." Herod, the king, called a fox, the essence of cunning! If Christ is your righteousness, you should have the boldness of Christ, the boldness of the righteous.

Felix dismissed Paul, but he never dismissed his sermon. It is recorded in his mind. It is recorded in the Word of God, and the record will be read in his presence. Paul's skirt was free from the blood of that man. Many men's skirts are not free. The skirts of many preachers are soddened with the blood of those they should have warned. It will drag them down. "Their blood will I require at thy hand." Woe to the shepherds that do not warn the flock. Woe to the prophets that prophesy smooth things.

Paul set forth the whole gospel—righteousness, temperance and judgment to come. Some set forth morality and act as if there was no judgment by their silence. Every minister is responsible to God first, and will have to give account of his stewardship. They are called to warn, testify and exhort, but they prefer to generalize, theorize and mystify.

John the Baptist came preaching, "Repent ye." Christ came saying, "Repent ye, and believe the gospel." When men asked Peter, "What shall we do?" he said to them, "Repent." PENTECOSTAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE.

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Days of Miracles Not Passed.

"Go and show John again those things which ye do hear and see: The blind receive their sight, and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached to them. And blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in Me." These were the words of Jesus to the disciples of John the Paptist when he had sent them to inquire whether Jesus was the Messiah or they should look for another. But these words fit with almost literal exactness the scenes that have been witnessed in the city of Denver, Colo., during the past few days.

In the daily press the writer of the above saw accounts of the lame being given power to walk, the deaf being given their hearing, the blind being restored to sight, and morphine victims being released from the shackles of the drug habit. He did not question the statements, for the names and addresses of the fortunate people were given and included some of the leading citizens of Denver and surrounding communities. He, however, felt that the evidence would be more convincing if he could see with his own eyes such cures as were being heralded in the daily press. Therefore, he tuned up his auto, invited his wife and his church treasurer, Mr. V. B. Campbell, and his wife, to accompany him to Denver, a drive of 145 miles. We had a delightful drive, and arrived in time to be at the door of the Auditorium at 6:30 p. m., thinking that amply early to attend the evening service scheduled for 7:30 p. m. But alas, thousands of people were standing outside, and after we stood there over one hour we found that the doors had been opened at 6:00 p. m. and in ten minutes the vast building that seats 12,000 people was filled.

The next morning at 8 o'clock we were again at the door of the Auditorium for the service that was to begin at 10 o'clock.

With patience and expectation we waited the hour of nine when the doors were thrown open. All about us were anxious people of all ages and conditions of life. men, women and children; residents of Denver and people of other states, who had come hundreds of miles to attend the services. Some may have been skeptical, but few expressed such suspicions, few emong those who had left home and business duties to attend the service. At 3 a. m. the doors were flung open and in rushed the eager people. In fifteen min-utes every seat of the 12,000 was taken again disappointed thousands stood outside and waited till afternoon, to enter the service to be held at 2:30 p. m.

It was a children's service. Thousands of kiddies were gathered in the seats reserved in the center for them, and hundreds of bouquets and toys and pounds of candy were brought at the request of those in charge of the service for the children who had been brought there by heavy-hearted but hopeful and loving parents for relief from the bondage of sickness and suffering.

Finally our attention was attracted by the clapping of hands, and the shouts of welcome. A woman had come upon the platform, dressed in white and bearing upon her madonna face the mark of a close walk with her Christ and intimate association with Him who went about doing good. She was beautiful in person, with that grace that comes from nobility of character and purity of life and absolute health.

This woman of power and magnetic bearing was Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, evangelist and instrument in God's hands to call men to repentance and heal their diseased bodies. There was no evidence of braggadocio, no egotism, no boasting of her power, but there was humility, sympathy for the suffering and intense interest in the work to which God had called her.

After preliminary details of the service, this woman-of-God spoke to the children, telling them of Christ and His power to deliver them in the Hour of temptation, inviting them to take Christ into their young hearts. She asked all who desired to be Christians to raise their hands, and up went hundreds of hands of boys and girls.

Then came the hour for calling on Christ to heal the sick children whom their parents had brought. The writer had a seat on the platform and was within five or six feet of Mrs. McPherson and the many who received divine help. The scene cannot be described, and can never be forgotten. The agony of soul depicted on the faces of some of the mothers as they bore their deformed babies and older children to the platform was enough to burn the heart out of any one. The hopeful trust of the poor, little blind and deaf and dumb and crippled children taught what Jesus meant when He said, "Except ye be converted and become as little children ye shall not enter the kingdom of heaven." The line seemed endless as the parents came with their suffering and crippled little ones.

Mrs. McPherson's prayers are specific. There is no rambling and going around Robin Hood's barn. When a blind victim came she said, "Oh blessed Jesus, open these blind eyes." When deaf ears were before her she asked Christ to unstop them. When paralyzed legs were dangling from the weak body of some poor little boy or girl she tenderly asked Christ to give power to those helpless legs. When one writhing with St. Vitus dance and epilepsy was borne to the platform by loving parents she threw all the force of her life into her prayer as she said, "Thou evil spirit, I command thee to come out of this girl in the name of Christ."

I saw a boy given sight instantly so he could name objects held before him, who had not seen distinctly before.

I saw a deaf and dumb girl, who had been in that condition from birth, for fifteen years, given power to hear and speak. She spoke the name "Jesus" first of all.

A poor little lad about seven years old, who had worn a brace on his leg for five years and had not walked without it, was prayed for and he removed the brace and walked from the platform unaided.

A girl about five years old who had not walked for two years because of infantile paralysis, and who was borne to the platform in her mother's arms, with her little legs dangling helplessly, was prayed for and immediately was able to walk unaided from the platform down the long aisle amid the hearty applause of the people.

I saw a girl about seven years old whose spine had been so curved that it crowded the left shoulder blade. A week before she was healed and at the service I attended she was brought back by the loving mother to show the results, and her spine was back in place, where it should be. Such cures are not instantaneous, but evidently sure.

A babe six months old who had been covered with eczema so that a hundred bleeding sores made life a veritable hell, and had been cured a week before, was brought back by the grateful mother. The doctors had said all that could be done by medical science had been done for the little one. In a week after Christ's healing power came upon the child its skin was like that of Naaman after his cure in the river Jordan.

Scores of other cures on children were performed in my presence, and within five or six feet of where I stood in amazement.

We were again at the door at 5:30 p. m. ready for the evening service to be opened at 7:30 p. m. A little after six the doors were flung open and in ten or fifteen minutes the great hall was filled with 12,000 anxious and trustful people. For the most part the Pharisees did not come. remained away, in their homes or studies, for many of them (shame on them) were preachers. But on the platform were many ministers who had come from Kansas, Missouri, Colorado, Wyoming, California and elsewhere, to see what there was in the reports going out of divine healing and add their sympathy and prayers to the good work. The scenes of that night are burned into my consciousness. It was a service for adults.

I saw a girl who had not been able to hear or smell for sixteen years given power to smell and hear. She had not been able to smell ammonia. She can now enjoy the fragrance of a carnation.

Upon the platform came a fine looking woman about thirty-five years old, with a goiter about the size of a hen's egg choking her and deforming her otherwise beautiful appearance. She was earnest and full of prayer and hope. Mrs. Mc-Pherson anointed her with oil and laying her hand on the diseased neck prayed, "Jesus remove this goiter." And in less And in less time than it has taken to tell this the goiter disappeared as a toy balloon would when pricked with a pin. My wife and I stood in amazement as we beheld this miracle. Tears of joy filled our eyes as we saw that woman feel for the goiter and discover it was gone. No wonder she raised her hands and cried out, "Praise God!" But other similar cures were witnessed, even more wonderful.

A notable case was that of a girl about eighteen years old who had come the day before with her right arm in a plaster of paris cast. Her bone was tubercular and a Denver physician had told her (the name of the doctor was publicly announced) that amputation was the only way to save her life, Mrs. McPherson prayed that Christ might cure that arm. I saw the young woman return one day after that prayer was offered, carrying the cast in her hands and as she raised ner once helpless and painful arm above her head she told us what had taken place and that her doctor had that day examined it and pronounced it cured and told her she was all right and to continue her present treatment.

Another case that filled the audience with amazement and hope was that of a young woman twenty years old. She was brought on a bed in an ambulance to the Auditorium. She had been in bed sixteen months and was wasting away. As she lay on her bed at the right of the platform for two hours before her turn came we often looked at her as she lay there panting for breath. When Mrs. McPherson reached this case she requested that all on the platform kneel and pray also for this afflicted girl. My good wife and I knelt as did a score or more of others on the platform. I shall not forget the sin-

cere and earnest prayer that Mrs. Mc-Pherson offered for that sick girl. When we arose from our knees the once help. less young woman arose from her bed and walked victoriously from the platform.

How did Mrs. McPherson perform these cures? She did not perform. She is simply the instrument of Jesus Christ to heal souls and bodies. She makes no claim of power to heal. She gives Christ all the credit.

But she does require certain conditions on the part of those who come to be healed or of those who bring their loved ones. They must have faith in Jesus Christ as the atonement for the sins of the world. They must accept Christ as He is revealed to us in the Holy Book. She will not accept the Christian Science belief, but tells people the difference between Eddyism and Christianity. She makes plain that what she is doing by the help of Christ is not a process of mind over matter, but of Christ over sin. She condemns the false doctrines of Eddvism which ignores the efficacy of Christ's blood and denies the fact of sin.

Mrs. McPherson believes in the old fashioned New Testament gospel. She believes as Jesus did and the Bible teachesthat Satan is a fact and that he must be conquered by the power of Christ. I shall never forget one scene as I stood on that platform as the long line of suffering and afflicted children filed by. By my side stood a noble Christian layman, a successful business man of Denver, and who for thirty-five years has been a member of Trinity Methodist Episcopal church of that city. A father and mother led up their beloved daughter who was writhing and twisting with St. Vitus dance and was also an epileptic. It required the strength of both parents to hold the afflicted child from falling. Mrs. McPherson knew she had a hard case to combat. Instead of beseeching Jesus in tender tones to heal the afflicted girl, she offered this prayer as her eyes flashed with passion: "Come thou, evil spirit, out of this girl, I command thee, in the name of Jesus Christ." In an instant the wild, rolling eyes of the girl became sane and normal, her hands dropped quietly to her side, her legs became strong, and without help from man she walked off the platform, cured by the power of Christ. Mrs. McPherson turned to the pastors and laymen who stood near me and said, "When you are believe with all their hearts that Jesus of you are afraid of him. He is like a horse. he knows who is afraid of him."

What do the people of Denver think of what is being done? Thousands of them believe with all their hearts that Jesus of Nazareth is passing along healing and blessing as He did nineteen hundred years ago, except that He is doing this work through a consecrated woman's prayers. But as in the days when Jesus was here in bodily form, so now there are scoffers and doubters, and Pharisees. I regret to say some of them are the Christian min-The Ministerial Association has failed to endorse the work, and some catamity howlers, with little faith and less discretion have predicted there will be a serious reaction and falling away from the church. If that comes to pass no one can be blamed as much as those pasters who have failed to back up Mrs. McPherson by their sympathy and prayers.

It should be remembered that Mrs. Mc-Pherson's primary work is that of bringing men and women to Jesus Christ. She is more interested in their souls than in their bodies, or rather she is first of all interested in having Christ cleanse their souls, then they are in position to ask

Him to heal their bodies. She does not attempt to bring healing to those who reject Jesus Christ as the Saviour of mankind, or who go off into fads such as Eddyism. She believes with all her soul that Christ will heal if we approach Him in the right attitude of heart, with sincere faith and belief in His atoning blood.

It is high time that the Church of Jesus Christ awake to its possibilities and duties.—Louis E. Carter, D.D., in the Central Christian Advocate (Methodist).

The San Jose Revival.

For many months there has been much prayer, people praying in cottage meetings in different parts of the city and in the Pentecostal meetings on Wednesday all day. The Lord has blessed the street meetings, and people seeing the happy, contented faces of God's people have followed them into the mission and gotten saved and baptized in the Spirit.

When Mrs. McPherson was here last spring, God saved and healed some Italians and has worked marvels among them. It would rejoice your heart to hear their ringing testimonies. The deaf hear, the blind see, the lame walk, and it seems as though every sickness in the catagory is there except leprosy and deadly diseases.

"Incurables" Healed.

Though there are so many incurables, they come by hundred to be healed, one young man having tuberculosis, so emaciated, was instantly healed, and the next day received his baptism in the Spirit and now walks off like a man, and how the people cheer him when he comes in the meeting and testifies. One who had a cancer on his lip was instantly healed. A brother who was healed of stomach trouble told me he was standing by when Mrs. McPherson prayed for him and he saw it disappear, said it was gone in two minutes after she prayed. An old man who fell off his horse in 1863 came hobbling to the platform. He had a dead hip and I think something was the matter with his legs. He had heart trouble, was deaf, one eye was gone and the other was nearly totally blind. He was instantly healed and found his way back to his seat alone. The next night he came and testified and he could not get through praising the Lord. Sister McPherson had to send him back to his seat to give place to others.

Many Being Saved.

The spirit of conviction is in the air. San Jose is swimming. Hallelujah! The rivers are flowing and God is restoring the years the canker worm has eaten. Clippings from Newspapers.

A little old wrinkled mother, Mrs. John Kline, leaning heavily on a crutch, her head covered with an old-fashioned black lace cap, hobbled as best she could to the front line of afflicted praying for healing at the Aimee Semple McPherson revival services. Her eyes were closed and as she mumbled to herself tears worked their way down her lined cheeks.

"Oh pray that her dislocated hip may be healed, that this little mother will be able to walk without her crutch, that her eyes may see again," pleaded Mrs. Mc-Pherson. Every head of the thousands upon thousands gathered in the tent was bowed in prayer.

"You are healed, you must walk now," concluded Mrs. McPherson. There was no hesitancy, no doubting, the moment the prayer was ended, the aged body straightened and hanging her crutch upon a nearby post, she walked the length of the altar crying out "Praise the Lord, I can walk and I can see." The crowd applauded and many rushed up to watch her go down the steps.

"Thy Paith Hath Saved Thee."

Choosing her sermon for the evening from the eighteenth chapter of John, Mrs. McPherson broadened into the discussion of the blind crying out for healing as Jesus of Nazareth was passing by.

"Even the disciples rebuked him for daring to cry out for healing," she told her tremendous audience, "so why should we blame an occasional doubter today? It is ignorance. But Jesus pushed them aside and said, 'Who is it that calleth Me?' and when the blind beggar was brought into His presence he was healed immediately.

"And he followed Him praising. See that when you have your healing you do not lose it. The secret of keeping your healing is to keep your faith.

"Oh, how I love the words 'and Jesus stood.' He is standing here now, people. Jesus of Nazareth is passing by now, He is the same Jesus that He used to be.

"'Go and sin no more lest a worse thing come upon thee."

There were faces representing every nationality it seemed when the altar call was given. A little Japanese woman with her feet tightly bound and wearing native costume, bent humbly to the altar and prayed while a young girl joined with her. A Civil war veteran clasping the arm of a comrade brought him to the front and with white heads bending close together, their aged hands trembling, prayed aloud for salvation and healing. There were Italians praying in their own language, a French woman gesticulating and speaking rapidly in her language, while over two hundred Americans knelt side by side and joined in their entreaties.

"The bodily healing will go down in the grave," Mrs. McPherson told the kneeling throng, "but that which is done for the soul lives on forever. Divine healing is the lever which opens the prisons of doubt, of worldliness and of indifference." —San Jose Mercury Herald, Aug. 21, 1921.

Healing Services.

At the close of the talk, the long line of afflicted began their steady march to the altar, prayers on their lips and the light of faith brightening their faces. One woman choked back sobs until she could stand it no longer and while the choir increased in volume of singing, she sobbed aloud during her healing.

A miraculous cure took place when the spine of a young girl suffering from curvature, was immediately straightened. Her testimony was given with as much bravery as she could summon before the thousands of spectators standing to hear it.

And so the line passed beneath the healing touch of prayer. Deaf ears were opened and three blind persons had their sight restored. Mrs. Bischopp, healed last Wednesday night, mounted to the platform and told how a cancer had melted away and she had been given perfect health.

To each one receiving healing, Mrs. Mc-Pherson advises "say praise the Lord and never stop saying it."—San Jose Mercury Herald, Aug. 23 1921.

Other Newspaper Reports.

Three ministers from churches of three different creeds prayed fervently upon the altar for healing from nervous troubles, paralysis and spinal ailment. The Rev. J. H. Merrill, retired Congregational minister prominently known in Oakland walked without aid from one side of the altar to the other, then with words of praise for the power which had cast out paralysis of his right side, addressed the tremendous audience upon the miracle which had just been performed.

"I have been afflicted for 27 years. Praise the Lord, I can walk as easily as when I was a boy," he said, his face beaming with delight.

A pitiful sight coming before the altar for healing was that of a mother carrying a child of eight years who had never walked. Paralysis of the legs had made it necessary to carry little Loretta Flowers. The mother weakened under the burden of the child as she waited in line for her turn. With tears streaming down hercheeks as she listened to the prayers being offered, Mrs. McPherson led the little one up and down the length of the altar while the crowd shouted and clapped their hands hilariously. The mother and little girl walked down the steps and remained seated near the altar until the close of service.

The Rev. Carlton L. Kirk, of Alhambra, Cal., brought his 20-year-old son to be healed of blindness. After praying for the boy, the multitude waved handkerchiefs before his newly healed eyes. Throwing his hands into the air, he responded to their message and let them know that his sight had been restored.

At the Children's Service.

A father leading a boy 14 years, his son, deaf, dumb and partially blind, knealt in the line and prayed until his turn had come. The boy had been left in that condition through infantile paralysis. Tears streamed down scores of faces as the father prayed aloud for his boy.

"Can you hear me?" asked Mrs. Mc-Pherson, after praying for him.

The boy's face brightened, his eyes shone and he nodded his head in assent. "Say 'Jesus,'" she directed him. Lips that had never formed words since the boy was a tiny baby repeated the word The mother, pale with exciteafter her. ment, believing and yet not believing that a miracle had been performed, rushed upon the platform to witness the cure. The three went off hugging each other. Just as the boy passed down the steps some curious person, wondering whether or not the little fellow was really hearing. called to him, "Say, what's your name? The lips that probably used to say his name when 2 or 3 years of age answered with a smile "Floyd Rooney."

Two children, Etta and Angus Campbell of 226 DeLong street, San Francisco, both almost totally deaf, were restored to hearing. The father testified before the audience that some of the most noted specialists had told him that the cure was impossible. Brother and little sister immediately began to enjoy their new faculty

by talking to each other in queer highpitched voices.

David Whitesell, 670 South Eighth St., was totally deaf in his right ear for more than four years. While his father held tightly to his hand and prayed for him, his hearing was instantly returned. Little Hazel Ducoty of Morgan Hill suffered from weak eyes that could see only a few feet before her. They were so badly crossed that it seemed she would lose her sight entirely. After the prayers were offered, her eyes miraculously straightened and she pointed out objects in the rear of the tent.

The most astounding cure of the day was the healing of Luckle Rhodes, blind for nine years. Her parents reside at 1511 Thirty-third street, Oakland. Fasting and praying, clutching at a tiny bunch of flowers in her hand, the child was led to the front of the altar. Mrs. McPherson called upon every one present to pray fer-

GREAT PENTECOSTAL REVIVAL IN LONDON, ENGLAND.

THE YEARLY REPORT.

The financial report for the year ending Sept. 1st, 1921, shows that the Missionary Treasurer received and disbursed a total of \$107,953.55, a gain of approximately 184-5% over the previous year, when the offerings amounted to \$90,812.40.

Most of this gain was made during the first few months of the year, although the high peak of \$12,341.29 was reached for the month of April.

During the previous year which closed Sept. 1st, 1920, there had been a regular gain from month to month, with very little fluctuation, but during the past year the fluctuation has been tremendous, the greatest fluctuation occurring between April and May when the offerings dropped from \$12,341.29 for April to \$6,653.44 for May. This has made it quite impossible to give a proper distribution of funds to the missionaries, and the missionaries have all suffered

Total for the year\$107,953.55 Former years have seen considerable offerings made for famine relief, but the past year probably yielded larger offerings for the famine in China than any previous year. The total offerings received and disbursed for famine relief during 1921 amounted to \$10,-383.12. These offerings were spread over a period of nine months, and were much blessed of God in enabling the missionaries in North China to bring the Gospel to China's famine-stricken people.

Considering the financial condition of the world, the large number of men without employment and the tightness of money matters, it seems to us that the above report is a remarkable one, and every member of the Assemblies of God have much reason for praising the Lord for His faithfulness. So far we have not been compelled to withdraw one

missionary from the field on account of shortage of funds. It is true the offerings have dropped so low that none of the missionaries have been properly supported during the past spring and summer, but we know of not one case of severe suffering, the Lord having supplied the need from other sources when funds in the hands of the Missionary Treasurer were inadequate to meet the needs.

We can only press on in the future hoping and trusting for greater things. There should be a deeper spirit of sacrifice, a greater consecration and a steadier faith. We need to believe God to do greater works than in the past, and to provide funds for the greatest advancement along missionary lines we have ever known in the history of the Pentecostal Movement.

Several plans were tried but they all fell through for no one was willing to rent to us for this purpose. It seemed as though we were defeated on every hand and that the devil was standing back and laughing at us. But hallelujah to Jesus! the very site that our dear Sister Appleby wanted and which was the most difficult to secure was ours through our all-conquering Lord. After nearly two weeks of prayer, tears, and fasting, the victory was won on our knees and the land in our possession, so it wasn't very long before the workmen were busy erecting a place for the glory of God and the salvation of precious souls.

The great day of the feast began on Sunday the 5th of June. Nine of us missionaries were present besides many of our native pastors and Bible women. The service opened at 11:30 a. m. and from 400 to 500 people came filing into the matshed. Bro. G. M. Kelley gave a few words of exhortation, short and to the point, and about 500 people from all classes sat with open hearts and ears to the living word of God, after which he offered up a soul-stirring prayer, dedicating the mat-shed, the people present, and all who should enter within the dears to the lower of the least of the l

of God, after which he offered up a soul-stirring prayer, dedicating the mat-shed, the people present, and all who should enter within the doors, to the love, care and protection of the God of heaven and earth, the great Creator of mankind. The choir did its best to swell the heavenly anthem and sound forth the praises of our Redeemer, our leaders put-ting their whole hearts and souls into the playing and singing, inspiring us to follow their good example until the vibrant chords of the two trombones, the two organs, the tambourine, and the voices of the singers re-echoed to the farthest corners of the

building and might have been heard several blocks away. One noteworthy feature of our orchestra was the drums and cymbals played by the students of the Precious

Again in the evening the doors of the mat-shed were thrown wide open and the place soon filled with people, men, women and children, all seemingly hungry and ready for the invitation to "Come and dine" at the Master's table. Bro. J. R. Spence gave the message of the evening. His text was from the 10th chapter of Luke on the parable of the good Samaritan. Both foreigners and natives. Both foreigners and natives, Christian and heathen, were thrilled by the inspiring words of this parable as given forth by our dear Brother Spence under the anointing of the Holy Ghost. A hymn and prayer was offered up to God at the close, and after distributing entrance tickets to those present for the next day's services, the crowds dispersed and we rekets to those present for the next day's services, the crowds dispersed and we retired to our different quarters for the night. Thus ended the first great day of the banquet.

The Chinese manager of the campaign, The Chinese manager of the comparing Mr. Tseung, has been an inspiration to use all by his earnest, untiring zeal for God. He not only puts a proposition before the workers, but he himself uses every means available to carry out these plans. Monday he suggested to the native preachers and workers that different hands be formed. and workers that different bands be formed who would go out every day to all the surrounding villages witnessing to them and giving out announcements of the meetings.

The records of God only will show all the good accomplished while out laboring in these whitened fields. Sufficient to say is that on this first errand, God gave them fruit, thus setting His seal of approval upon their labors. While preaching in a village called Tseung Ngon, and distributing notices, a woman to whom the story of Jesus had never before been told, became so interested that she laid aside her work and walked to the meetings. Her heart was so touched as she listened to the message of salvation that all family cares, heart was so touched as she listened to the message of salvation that all family cares, troubles and sorrows were forgotten in the joy of this new found light. On returning home that night she was met at the door by her son, his face ablaze with anger because she had forgotten to boil his tea. One of her first actions on arriving home was to pull up her incense sticks and to throw out the incense urns—no more worshiping of false gods since she had heard about the true. No one had preached on tobacco and the drinking of wine being a sin and all of her life she had been addicted to these habits, but instantly all appetite for these things was taken away from her. The next day in spite of the anger of her son she was at meeting, finding a place and staying over night for fear that if she returned to her village her son would not permit her to come backagain. Praise God for this one soul snatched from eternal burning.

Another very interesting story comes to us from this same village. A woman who in previous times had been marvelously healed through prayer, had not been out for some time, so two of the Bible women went in search of her. Arriving at her village, she was not to be found, so they were doomed to disappointment. Still unwilling to give up the search, these two "hot hearted" Bible women continued on message of salvation that all family cares,

perchance she might be there, but they were doomed to disappointment. Finally they arrived at the third village where they met this woman's uncle. This man is a very zealous worshiper of idols and is a general manager of all their big idol festivals. On this particular occasion he was found to be just in the midst of a big worshiping time, having hired all hands available to take part, and being very much excited and flustrated because they were short-handed and unable to hire more. While in this state of mind, these two faithful servants of God began to preach the old, old story of the cross, and God's dying love to men, and real, Holy Ghost conviction came down upon him and there

Mr. Lei, a very fine, well educated man from this same village, having heard the gospel story many times before, came to these meetings, was so convicted of sin that he, too, has decided for Christ, and has given in his name as wanting to be a disciple of Jesus and be baptized. Towards the end of the meetings, a fine, old gentleman, one hundred years old, with long, white whiskers, came to the service. Although most of his life had been lived in Lo Pau he had never before been inside of the mission, having had no desire to go, but on this occasion he said that there was such a drawing power in this direction that he just had to go. That night the Holy Spirit through the message moved upon his heart and he gave in his name as wanting to be a Christian.

These are only a few examples, personal testimonies, of those whom the Lord has called out to follow Him. I am sure could we but write down the experiences of all those who have put in their names as wanting to believe in Jesus, we would perhaps find many far more interesting tales to tell than these, but time and space will not permit us to go further into detail along this line.

On Monday morning, Pastor Au, from Shiu Hing, who had been invited as a special worker, arrived. His messages were so fraught with the power of God that his listeners were pricked to the heart. His earnest pleading with them to come to Jesus and be saved caused many a one to decide for Christ. Night after night hands were raised and names and addresses written down of those who wanted to come over on the Lord's side.

Later in the week, Pastor Tseung Lap Tsoi arrived, he also being specially invited to help out. Mr. Tseung is an independent Baptist preacher and has been greatly used of God in the ministry. His whole heart in in the work and he offers his service free of charge, glad of an opportunity to extend the kingdom of heaven. The first evening of his arrival he gave as splendid message on "Facing Heavenward." Truly he spake as he was moved by the Holy Ghost. During the same message he spoke of his earlier experiences in Lo Pau in comparison to the present time. Fifteen years ago Mr. Tseung made his first appearance in this place as a colpor-Lo Pau in comparison to the present time. The people were hostile and that night he could not find a place to lay his weary head, so he had to rent a small house boat and spend the night there. The next morning he was driven from the city next morning he was driven from the city and had to flee for his life. In fact, he had to get out so fast that he left his shoes behind. What a big change there has been in fifteen years.

On this evening when he told his experience the mat-shed was filled clear to the back, and he had between five and six hundred people listening to his message, all favorable towards the gospel, many of whom were already believers and others almost persuaded to believe. Besides this, a splendid work is being carried on here by our own Pentecostal missionaries. A mission and two schools (boys' and girls') are prospering and increasing in numbers under the wise leadership of our dear Sister Appleby who is in charge.

Sorry to say, and yet all things work together for good to those that love the Lord, but on Wednesday night the fourth day of the revival meetings the services had to be shut down on account of Lo Pau being flooded and the waters entering the mat-shed. On Thursday two services were held in the mission, but by Friday even this had to be cut off for all the streets were running with water and boats traveling up and down them. Even though the meetings have been hindered in this manner we have much to be thankful and praise God for and we can shout the shout of victory for during these few short days of service there were one hundred people who put their names down as wanting to become Christians. When the floods recede Sister Appleby wishes to con-

tinue the meetings a few days longer if she may have the use of the mat-shed extended, so we are trusting that many more names will be added to this list who will really take their stand for Christ and His gospel.
