

The Word of Knowledge, and Faith

"To another the word of knowledge, by the same Spirit; to another faith, by the same Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:8,9).

We have not passed this way hitherto. I believe that Satan has many devices and that they are worse today than ever before; but I also believe that there is to be a full manifestation on the earth of the power and glory of God to defeat every device of Satan.

In Ephesians 4 we are told to endeavor to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace, for there is one body, and one Spirit, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God and Father of all. The Baptism of the Spirit is to make us all one. Paul tells us in 1 Cor. 12:13 that by one Spirit we are all baptized into one body, and have been all made to drink into one Spirit. It is God's thought that we speak the same thing. If we all have the full revelation of the Spirit of God we shall all see the same thing. Paul asked these Corinthians, "Is Christ divided?" When the Holy Ghost has full control, Christ is never divided, His body is not divided, there is no division. Schism and division are the products of the carnal mind.

How important it is that we shall have the manifestation of "the word of knowledge" in our midst. It is the same Spirit who brings forth the word of wisdom that brings forth the word of knowledge. The revelation of the mysteries of God comes by the Spirit, and we must have a supernatural word of knowledge in order to convey to others the things which the Spirit of God has revealed. The Spirit of God reveals Christ in all His wonderful fullness, and He shows Him to us from the beginning to the end of the Scriptures. It is the Scriptures that make us wise unto salvation, that open to us the depths of the kingdom of heaven, which reveal all the divine mind to us.

There are thousands of people who read and study the Word of God. But it is not quickened to them. The Bible is a dead letter except by the Spirit. The Word of God can never be vital and powerful in us except by the Spirit. The words that Christ spoke were not just dead words but they were spirit and life. And so it is the thought of God that a living word, a word of truth, the word of God, a supernatural word of knowledge, shall come forth from us through the power of the Spirit of God. It is the Holy Ghost who will bring forth utterances from our lips and a divine revelation of all the mind of God.

The child of God ought to thirst for the Word. He should know nothing else but the Word, and should know nothing among men save Jesus. "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word which proceedeth out of the mouth of God." It is as we feed on the Word and meditate on the message it contains, that the Spirit of God can vitalize that which we have received, and bring forth through us the word of knowledge that will be as full of power and life, as when He, the Spirit of God, moved upon holy men of old and gave them these inspired Scriptures. They were all inbreathed of God as they came forth at the beginning, and through the same Spirit they should come forth from us vitalized, living, powerful and sharper than any two-edged sword.

With the gifts of the Spirit should come the fruit of the Spirit. With wisdom we should have love, with

knowledge we should have joy, and with the third gift, faith, we should have the fruit of peace. Faith is always accompanied by peace. Faith always rests. Faith laughs at impossibilities. Salvation is by faith, through grace, and it is the gift of God. We are kept by the power of God through faith. God gives faith and nothing can take it away. By faith we have power to enter into the wonderful things of God. There are three positions of faith; saving faith, which is the gift of God; the faith of the Lord Jesus; and the gift of faith. You will remember the word of the Lord Jesus Christ given to Paul, to which he refers in the 26th of Acts, where the Lord commissioned him to go to the Gentiles, "to open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness unto light, and from the power of Satan unto God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins, and inheritance among them WHICH ARE SANCTIFIED BY FAITH THAT IS IN ME."

Oh, this wonderful faith of the Lord Jesus. Your faith comes to an end. How many times I have been to the place where I have had to tell the Lord, "I have used all the faith I have," and then He has placed His own faith within me.

One of our workers said to me at Christmas time, "Wigglesworth, I never was no near the end of my purse in my life." I replied, "Thank God, you are just at the opening of God's treasures." It is when we are at the end of our own, that we can enter into the riches of God's resources. It is when we possess nothing, that we can possess all things.

The Lord will always meet you when you are on the line of living faith. I was in Ireland at one time and went to a house and said to the lady who came to the door, "Is Brother Wallace here?" She replied, "Oh, he has gone to Bangor, but God has sent you here for me. I need you. Come in." She told me her husband was a deacon of the Presbyterian Church. She had herself received the Baptism while she was a member of the Presbyterian Church, but they did not accept it as from God. The people of the church said to her husband, "This thing cannot go on. We don't want you to be deacon any longer, and your wife is not wanted in the church." The man was very enraged and he became incensed against his wife. It seemed as though an evil spirit possessed him, and the home that had once been peaceful became very terrible. At last he left home and left no money behind him, and the woman asked me what should she do.

We went to prayer and before we had prayed five minutes the woman was mightily filled with the Holy Ghost. I said to her, "Sit down and let me talk to you. Are you often in the Spirit like this?" She said, "Yes, and what could I do without the Holy Ghost now?" I said to her, "The situation is yours. The Word of God says that you have power to sanctify your husband. Dare to believe the Word of God. Now the first thing we must do is to pray that your husband come back tonight," She said, "I know he won't." I said, "If we agree together, it is done." She said, "I will agree." I said to her, "When he comes home show him all possible love, lavish everything upon him. If he won't hear what you have to say, let him go to bed. The situation is yours. Get down before God and claim him for the Lord. Get into the glory just as you have got in today, and as the Spirit of God prays through you, you will find that God will grant all the desires of your heart."

A month later I saw this sister at a convention. She told how her husband came home that night and that he went to bed, but she prayed right through to victory and then laid her hands upon him. The moment she laid hands upon him he cried out for mercy. The Lord saved him and baptized him in the Holy Spirit. The power of God is beyond all our conception. The trouble is that we do not have the power of God in a full manifestation because of our finite thoughts, but as we go on and let God have His way, there is no limit to what our limitless God will do in response to a limitless faith. But you will never get anywhere except you are in constant pursuit of all the power of God.

One day when I came home from our open-air meeting at eleven o'clock I found that my wife was out. I asked, "Where is she?" I was told that she was down at Mitchell's. I had seen Mitchell that day and knew that he was at the point of death. I knew that it was impossible for him to survive the day unless the Lord undertook.

There are many who let down in sickness and do not take hold of the life of the Lord Jesus Christ that is provided for them. I was taken to see a woman who was dying and said to her, "How are things with you?" She answered, "I have faith, I believe." I said, "You know that you have not faith, you know that you are dying. It is not faith that you have, it is language." There is a difference between language and faith. I saw that she was in the hands of the devil. There was no possibility of life until he was removed from the premises. I hate the devil, and I laid hold of the woman and shouted, "Come out, you devil of death. I command you to come out in the name of Jesus." In one minute she stood on her feet in victory.

But to return to the case of Brother Mitchell, I hurried down to the house, and as I got near I heard terrible screams. I knew that something had happened. I passed Mrs. Mitchell on the staircase and asked, "What is up?" She replied, "He is gone! He is gone!" I just passed her and went into the room, and immediately I saw that Mitchell had gone. I could not understand it, but I began to pray. My wife was always afraid that I would go too far, and she laid hold of me and said, "Don't, Dad! Don't you see that he is dead?" I continued to pray and my wife continued to cry out to me, "Don't, Dad. Don't you see that he is dead?" But I continued praying. I got as far as I could with my own faith, and then God laid hold of me. Oh, it was such a laying hold that I could believe for anything. The faith of the Lord Jesus laid hold of me and a solid peace came into my heart. I shouted, "He lives! He lives!" He lives!" And he is living today. There is a difference between our faith and the faith of the Lord Jesus. The faith of the Lord Jesus is needed. We must change faith from time to time. Your faith may get to a place where it wavers. The faith of Christ never wavers. When you have that faith the thing is finished. When you have that faith you will never look at things as they are, you will see the things of nature give way to the things of the Spirit, you will see the temporal swallowed up in the eternal.

I was at a camp meeting in Cazadero, California, about eight years ago, and a remarkable thing happened. A man came there who was stone deaf. I prayed for him and I knew that God had healed him. Then came the test. He would always move his chair

up to the platform, and every time I got up to speak he would get up as close as he could and strain his ears to catch what I had to say. The devil said, "It isn't done." I declared, "It is done." This went on for three weeks and then the manifestation came and he could hear distinctly sixty yards away. When his ears were opened he thought it was so great that he had to stop the meeting and tell everybody about it. I met him in Oakland recently and he was hearing perfectly. As we remain stedfast and unmoveable on the ground of faith, we shall see what we believe for in perfect manifestation.

People say to me, "Have you not the gift of faith?" I say that it is an important gift, but what is still more important is for us every moment to be making an advancement in God. Looking at the Word of God today I find that its realities are greater to me today than they were yesterday. It is the most sublime, joyful truth that God brings an enlargement. Always an enlargement. There is nothing dead, dry or barren in this life of the Spirit; God is always moving us on to something higher, and as we move on in the Spirit our faith will always rise to the occasion as different circumstances arise.

This is how the gift of faith is manifested. You see an object and you know that your own faith is nothing in the case. The other day I was in San Francisco. I sat on a car and saw a boy in great agonies on the street. I said, "Let me get out." I rushed to where the boy was. He was in agony through cramp of the stomach. I put my hands on his stomach in the name of Jesus. The boy jumped, and stared at me with astonishment. He found himself instantly free. The gift of faith dared in the face of everything. It is as we are in the Spirit that the Spirit of God will operate this gift anywhere and at any time.

When the Spirit of God is operating this gift within a man, He causes him to know what God is going to do. When the man with the withered hand was in the synagogue, Jesus got all the people to look to see what would happen. The gift of faith always knows the results. He said to the man, "Stretch forth thine hand." His word had creative force. He was not living on the line of speculation. He spoke and something happened. He spake at the beginning and the world came into being. He speaks today and these things have to come to pass. He is the Son of God and came to bring us into sonship. He was the firstfruit of the resurrection and He calls us to be firstfruits, to be the same kind of fruit like to Himself.

There is an important point here. You cannot have the gifts by mere human desire. The Spirit of God distributes them severally as He will. God cannot trust some with the gift, but some who have a lowly, broken, contrite heart He can trust. One day I was in a meeting where there were a lot of doctors and eminent men, and many ministers. It was at a convention, and the power of God fell on the meeting. One humble little girl that waited at table opened her being to the Lord and was immediately filled with the Holy Ghost and began to speak in tongues. All these big men stretched their necks and looked up to see what was happening and were saying, "Who is it?" Then they learned it was "the servant!" No-body received but "the servant!" These things are hidden and kept back from the wise and prudent, but (Continued on Page Seven)

YE MUST BE BORN AGAIN

Man wants explanation. God gives revelation How to get into the kingdom needs a revelation. Man tries to explain how he can get in.

There are modern Nicodemuses, but they are not so honest. There is the enquiring Nicodemus, but not the receiving Nicodemus. "We know that thou art a teacher come from God." The Son of man does not want patronage. He had homage from angels. He does not want patronage from man, nor flattery. Exaltation of Jesus as a teacher can never displace the fact that man needs to be born again.

"We know that thou art a teacher come from God." The devil knew it, too. Christ said, "Ye must be born again." Ye professors, ye moralists, ye social reformers, who exalt Jesus as a teacher come from God, "Ye must be born again."

Nicodemus was honest. How can these things be? The modern Nicodemus does not even ask. He says it is not necessary. If Christ is a teacher from God they ought to be taught of God. They ought to listen to the Teacher God sent. Will you not ask, "How can it be?" That is the first step before it shall be. The new birth is possible.

People think that by following a teacher sent by God they are going to bring in the kingdom of God. To bring in the kingdom, you have first to enter into

"Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God.'

The person who tries to build the kingdom of God without entering into the kingdom, without being born into it, is setting up a counter kingdom, with a counter Christ at the head of it, an antichrist.

That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit. You cannot marry a corpse to a living man. The soil of earth cannot mix with the heavenly New Jerusalem. People try to study their ancestry, but few take steps to see whether they are in the ancestry of heaven, having God as their Father, Jesus Christ as their Brother, and the Spirit as their Quickener, their Comforter.

"Marvel not that I said unto thee, Ye must be born Emphasis laid upon emphasis. People do marvel, and they go further, they stumble; and some say that the new birth is not necessary. The Son of God from heaven knows the requisites for becoming citizens of heaven. He who is the Way must know

"The wind bloweth where it listeth, and thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh, and whither it goeth: so is every one that is

born of the Spirit." The incomprehensible doing the incomprehensible. The unseen Spirit working in an unseen way, in an unseen place, bringing forth and accomplishing an unseen act. Therefore it is unintelligible to the scientific man, to the scholarly man, to the business man, to the matter-of-fact man. Why? Because it is spiritual, unseen, the Spirit of God working, working in an unseen manner in the individual.

The wind bloweth. Sometimes gently and sometimes in a storm. Trim your sails to catch the faint breath of the Spirit. Some barks respond to a gentle breeze. Some luggers or heavy ships need a whirlwind. The Philippian jailer needed such.

Certain evidences only are manifested when the wind blows. There are more unrecognized than recognized in the phenomenon of the wind blowing. You cannot tell where it comes from, or where it is going, but you hear the sound as it passes. It deigns to notify you that it is passing by. The mighty, convicting, energizing, quickening Spirit comes from

Birth pangs are not always intelligible. The cry of the new-born babe is not very intelligible, not very edifying, but it is music to the mother, joy to the father and annoyance to the elder brother. A lusty baby makes a lusty noise. A healthy Christian, filled with the Spirit, will frequently make a noise.

Whether you have knowledge or no knowledge, understanding or no understanding, the thing is to have the experience of being born of the Spirit. "So is every one," one by one as they enter the kingdom; there must be a spiritual birth to qualify everyone to live in a spiritual realm, to have fellowship with Him who is a Spirit, to worship Him who must be worshiped in spirit and truth.

The modern Nicodemus can have the spiritual experience of being born again if he will listen as Nicodemus did to the words of Jesus. These words did not fall to the ground as far as Nicodemus was concerned. He had a revelation of divine truth, and he followed the Revelator.

Thou modern Nicodemus, stop merely admiring Christ as a teacher and accept Him as a Saviour.

We should never deal lightly with the whispers of a doubtful conscience.

As we practice confession, so will be our happiness and joy; for all true confession is followed by the spirit of praise.

If the conscience be not rightly instructed, it becomes a tool for Satan; if it speaks a false peace, it works ruin; and if it does not speak peace at all, it is a tormentor.

Meditation on the Word of God is the chief means of our growth in grace: without this even prayer itself will be little better than an empty form. Meditation nourishes faith, and faith and prayer are the keys which unlock the hidden treasures of the Word.

We have great need to be prepared for trials of faith and patience in so great a business as reading the Scriptures with an understanding heart. It is only by faith and patience, and prayerful meditation of the Word, that we are delivered from imaginations of the flesh - from sacrificing to our own net, and burning incense to our own drag.

PENTECOSTAL REVIVAL

I. The Promise of the Father

"Behold, I send the promise of My Father upon you: but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high" (Luke 24:49).

There are many promises in Scripture, but this one is called "The Promise." It is the promise of enduement from on high, the promise of the gift of the Holy Ghost. Is it for all?

"The promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call" (Acts 2:39).

One brother testified, "I could not get away from this verse. I was indeed afar off—far off from God, when the Spirit convicted me, but I sought the Lord and He fulfilled the promise even to me."

II. The Praises of the Disciples

"And were continually in the temple, praising and blessing God" (Luke 24:53).

Praise is the fruit of faith. It puts the enemy to flight. Start to praise God and something will happen.

III. The Peace Imparted by Christ in Manifestation

"Jesus Himself stood in the midst of them, and saith unto them, Peace be unto you" (Luke 24:36).

"And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place" (Acts 2:1).

Where there is dissension, the Spirit cannot operate. When peace prevails, He will work. The dew only falls when the atmosphere is peaceful.

IV. The Power Falls

"And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance" (Acts 2:2-4).

The Spirit of God filled their whole beings and even captured the last unruly member, the tongue, and used it for the glorifying of God. This was the way God worked at the beginning. Have you any objection to Him working this way today?

V. The Preaching of Peter

"This is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel" Acts 2:16).

"This Jesus hath God raised up, whereof we all are witnesses. Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted, and having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, He hath shed forth this, which ye now see and hear. . . . Let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ" (Acts 2:32, 33, 36).

VI. The Plow of the Spirit Operating

"Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do" (Acts 2:37).

Their hearts had been made ready and Peter immediately planted the seed of the gospel, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38).

"Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls" (Acts 2:41).

VII. The Presence of the Lord Everywhere Manifested

"And His name through faith in His name hath made this man strong" (Acts 3:16).

"There came also a multitude out of the cities round about unto Jerusalem, bringing sick folks, and them which were vexed with unclean spirits: and they were healed every one" (Acts 5:16).

"And Peter said unto him, Aeneas, Jesus Christ maketh thee whole: arise, and make thy bed. And he arose immediately" (Acts 9:34).

"But Peter put them all forth, and kneeled down, and prayed; and turning him to the body said, Tabitha, arise. And she opened her eyes: and when she saw Peter, she sat up" (Acts 9:40).

VIII. The Prayers That Prevailed

"And now, Lord, behold their threatenings: and grant unto Thy servants, that with all boldness they may speak Thy word, by stretching forth Thine hand to heal; and that signs and wonders may be done by the name of Thy holy child Jesus" (Acts 4:29, 30).

Note the answer. "And when they had prayed, the place was shaken where they were assembled together; and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and they spake the word of God with boldness. . . And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all" (Acts 4:31, 33).

IX. The Plentitude on All Lines

"And the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and of one soul: neither said any of them that ought of the things which he possessed was his own; but they had all things common. . . Neither was there any among them that lacked: for as many as were possessors of lands or houses sold them, and brought the prices of the things that were sold, and laid them down at the apostles' feet: and distribution was made unto every man according as he had need" (Acts 4:32, 34, 35).

X. The Practices of the Early Church

"They continued stedfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers" (Acts 2:42).

1. Doctrine. All doctrinal difficulties were settled by the Holy Ghost as the brethren met together in council. See Acts 15:28, 29.

2. Fellowship. The early saints did not forsake the assembling of themselves together as the manner of some is.
3. The Breaking of Bread. They kept the Lord's Supper on the first day of the week. See Acts 20:7.

4. Prayer. Prayer was first and foremost. See Acts 6:4.

XI. The Persecution and Its Results

"At that time there was a great persecution against the church which was at Jerusalem; ... therefore they that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the word" (Acts 8:1,4).

Their comfortable nests were broken up, and the Head of the church sent them forth to fulfill His commission. The Spirit directed. See Acts 13:2; 16:6,7.

XII. The Pattern for Revival Today

"Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit. And there are differences of administrations, but the same Lord. And there are diversities of operations, but it is the same God which worketh all in all" (1 Cor. 12:4-6). It has been said, "The Holy Spirit of God has never changed. He has given us in this record of Pentecost, the conditions and principles upon which He works, and we shall never obtain His mighty working until we fall into line with His methods, and give Him His right place." Dr. Arthur Pierson once wrote, "Give to the Spirit as chief Executor, men after His own mind to carry out His policy, and you give the Head competent instruments to do His bidding. He can work unhindered.

"And it shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh" (Acts 2:17).

"I will yet for this be enquired of by the house of Israel, to do it for them" (Ezek, 36:37).

Divine Healing and the Use of the Tongue

The other day I picked up a very interesting book, the autobiography of a famous physician who made a great name for himself by his successful treatment of tuberculosis, otherwise called the White Plague. It was really through his disabilities, his misfortunes, that he reached the pinnacle to which he attained; like the famous Dr. Lorenz, who became a "dry surgeon," the greatest in the world, because an incurable skin disease prevented him from becoming a wet one. In his young manhood, just as his life was opening out most promisingly before him (for he was wealthy, highly educated, socially prominent, and intellectually brilliant), this specialist on tuberculosis found himself a victim to the fell disease. His fellow physicians had nothing in the way of hope to offer him, for from their standpoint he was doomed. However he did not despair, but applied himself determinately, untiringly, to the study of God's laws as written in the book of nature and in the very substance of his own body; and, as soon as he interpreted a command, he obeyed it fully and unflinchingly, though it meant changing the whole course of his life, leaving the great city where his home had been from childhood, dwelling on the mountain tops, sleeping under no roof but God's, leading a rugged, simple existence devoid of all the luxuries which had surrounded him from his birth. And he reaped his reward, not only in the checking of the morbid process in his own body, but in his ability to formulate for other sufferers a new mode of treatment which has resulted in the recovery of quite a large percentage of cases, and, to some extent, has robbed the disease of its horrors.

The great lesson which his life taught me and which I desire to pass on to you, is the necessity which we are under (if we would be faithful witnesses of the risen Christ, who has conquered sin, sickness, and death) of studying God's word in the Bible just as faithfully and untiringly as he studied it in nature, and of obeying it just as implicitly as he obeyed the laws of health as he ascertained them. For, in His written Word, God has given us most wonderful laws of health, on which we may absolutely depend, and which we must obey implicitly if we would show forth in our bodies the fulness of the redemption which is ours in Christ Jesus. And it is essential that we should obey them implicitly; otherwise, if we go limping and groaning as we preach divine healing, people may say to us what they sometimes say to those who preach the Word but whose lives fail to adorn the doctrine of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, "What you ARE speaks so loud that I don't hear what you say."

When a person comes to a doctor, he, or she, cannot be too frank and humble if they are to get the best results; and as we listen to what our great Physician has to say about the misuse of the tongue as a cause of sickness, and even of death, let us each ask God to show us an X-ray photograph of our self, if that be a necessary step towards our physical deliverance for His glory. Do not think of what sort of an X-ray anyone else would make, and don't be discouraged if God shows you awful failure in your case

in this respect, for there is an all-efficacious remedy at your disposal in the blood of Jesus.

Now to consider the hygiene of the tongue. In the 12th chapter of the book of Proverbs and the 18th verse, we have this statement: "The tongue of the wise is health." That means that it is health to the speaker and health to the listener.

In the 5th chapter of Matthew and the 13th verse, we find these words, "Ye are the salt of the earth; and in the 4th chapter of Colossians and the 6th verse, "Let your speech be alway with grace, seasoned with ' Salt is formed by the union of two substances one from above (a gas or vapor) and the other from beneath (a dull, dark, grey metal, sodium) - and is pure, glistening, white, and exquisitely beautiful in its crystalization. What a perfect comparison to the believer - born from above, God the Spirit, which unites with our earthly being and produces out of the dull, dark, lusterless thing, the purity, whiteness, and loveliness of Jesus. Salt is also most wholesome, arresting decay and putrefactive processes, cleansing, purifying and healing. And we are commanded to let our speech be seasoned with salt, that is, we are to let it ever breathe the fragrance of the Rose of Sharon and the Lily of the Valley, the new creation in Christ Jesus.

Not only should we never utter a word that is not in the Spirit, but our speech should be a veritable heavenly breath, purifying the atmosphere about us and neutralizing evil utterances as the salt arrests decomposition. If we fail here we are not complying with God's great laws of health which are inexorable; and we shall suffer for it. For, if the tongue of the wise is health, the reverse is also true; for we read in the first clause of this same verse, "There is that speaketh like the piercings of the sword." When you speak harsh words of anyone, remember that you may stab them, but you are piercing your own vitals at the same time. You may not be conscious of it just at the moment, but you will realize it to your awful loss later; for God is not mocked. His Word is true.

"The words of a talebearer are as wounds and they go down into the innermost parts of the belly" (Prov. 18:8). I am perfectly certain that the origin of many deep-seated diseases in internal organs, necessitating capital operations, and often causing the loss of life itself, is the misuse of the tongue, especially in carrying tales. But if they are true, isn't it right to carry them, to repeat them to those interested? Certainly not. We are not advertising agents for the devil. Our lips are to be as a thread of scarlet, ever extolling the precious blood and the glories of our crucified Re-

"He that keepeth his tongue, keepeth his life" (Prov. 13:3). What wonderful words! How can we keep our mouth? Only by having our heart kept by the indwelling Christ; for out of the fulness of the heart the mouth speaketh; and by our words we shall be justified and by our words we shall be condemned (Matt. 12:37).

Longevity is associated with the proper use of the tongue in the 34th Psalm, where we are told that, if we would see good days, and long days, we are to refrain our tongue from evil and our lips from speaking

"Death and life are in the power of the tongue" (Prov. 18:21). What does this mean? I believe that it means just what it says, i. e., that death and life for ourselves, and for others, are in the power of the tongue. If we speak as the oracles of God, as we are commanded to do, not only when we are giving a Bible reading, or testifying, but all the time, we shall deliver souls from death, and our very own life depends on our doing this. I believe that a "sin unto death" may be committed with the tongue and that when we come to pray for one who has committed a sin unto death the Holy Spirit will warn us to desist (1 John 5:16, 17). Sometimes I have been unable to pray for the recovery of people for whom I have been asked to pray. On one occasion when beside the bed of an apparently dying person, God told me distinctly that she had not committed a sin unto death and that I might pray for her recovery and it would be granted; and He made His word good. Remember that your very life depends on the use which you make of

Those who are appointed, as was Miriam (for in Micah 6:4 we are told that she was one of the Godappointed leaders of Israel), to speak to the people the words of life in the name of the Lord, are doubly responsible for the use they make of their tongue; for "The priests lips should keep knowledge, and they should seek the law at his mouth: for he is the messenger of the Lord of Hosts" (Mal. 2:7). Can we have blessing and cursing proceeding out of the same mouth, bitter water and sweet coming from the same fountain? In the 12th verse of the 3d chapter of the epistle of James the Holy Ghost answers this question, which He asks in the 10th and 11th verses. He says there that no fountain can yield both salt water and fresh; because the brackish water will inevitably mingle with the sweet water and defile it. Thus if we have envying and strife in our hearts, the wisdom which we give forth descendeth not from above but is earthly, sensual, devilish; for where envying and strife are, there are confusion and every evil work. What a terrible pronouncement! The wisdom that is from above is first pure (without admixture), peaceable, gentle, easy to be intreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy. When our hearts are filled with this wisdom, no guile will be found in our lips; but honey instead, the Word of God, and milk, food for babes in Christ, will be under our tongue.

I believe that the fact that her brother Moses, a mighty man of God, one of the outstanding figures of the centuries, in every way a prince among men, had married an Ethiopian woman, was a deep humiliation, a lasting sorrow and an impenetrable mystery to Miriam. "How could he do it?" no doubt she asked herself a thousand times. Every time she looked at her sister-in-law no doubt she appeared blacker, more alien, and altogether unsuitable for her position. What a pity that she did not take her trouble to God alone instead of talking against Moses and thus bringing the wrath of God upon her own head and Aaron's. If there are things which we do not understand in one another, let us tell them to Jesus alone, and pray for the one who seems to us to be at fault. It is the only safe course.

A guilty conscience is one of Satan's great weapons against the children of God: faith can only be bold as the conscience is clean.

If we have a doubt upon our minds upon any point, we should go straight to Jesus to get it solved. Love abhors a winding course.

(Continued from Page Three) the little children, the lowly ones, are the ones that receive. We cannot have faith if we have honor one of another. A man who is going on with God won't accept honor from his fellow beings. God honors the man of a broken, contrite spirit. How shall I get there? So many people want to do great things, and to be seen doing them, but the one that God will use is the one that is willing to be hidden. My Lord Jesus never said He could do things, but He did them. When that funeral procession was coming up from Nain with the widow's son carried upon the bier, He made them lay it down. He spoke the word, "Arise!" and gave the son back to the widow. He had compassion for her. And you and I will never do anything except on the line of compassion. We will never be able to remove the cancer until we are immersed so deeply into the power of the Holy Ghost, that the compassion of Christ is moving through us.

I find that, in all my Lord did, He said that He did not do it, but that another in Him did the work. What a holy submission! He was just an instrument for the glory of God. Have we reached a place where we dare to be trusted with the gift? I see in 1 Corinthians 13 that if I have faith to remove mountains and have not charity, all is a failure. When my love is so deepened in God that I only move for the glory of God, that I only seek the glory of God, then the gifts can be made manifest. God wants to be manifested, and to manifest His glory to humble spirits.

A faint heart can never have a gift. There are two things essential; first, love, and second, determination, a boldness of faith that will cause God to fulfill His word. When I was baptized I had a wonderful time and had utterances in the Spirit, but for some time afterwards I did not again speak in tongues. But one day as I was helping another, the Lord again gave me utterances in the Spirit. I was one day going down the road and speaking in tongues a long while. There were some gardeners doing their work, and they stuck their heads out to see what was going on. I said, "Lord, You have something new for me. You said that when a man speaks in tongues, he should ask for the interpretation. I ask for the interpretation, and I'll stay right here till I get it." And from that hour the Lord gave me interpretation.

At one time I was in Lincolnshire in England and came in touch with the old pastor of an Episcopalian Church. He became very interested and asked me into his library. I never heard anything sweeter than the prayer the old man uttered as he got down to pray. He began to pray, "Lord, make me holy. Lord, sanctify me." I called out, "Wake up! Wake up now! Get up and sit in your chair." He sat up and looked at me. I said to him, "I thought you were holy." He answered, "Yes." "Then what makes you ask God to do what He has done for you?" He began to laugh and then to speak in tongues. Let us move into the realm of faith, and live in the realm of faith, and let God have His way.

Keep no secrets from God. Confession of sin to Him in all detail will greatly help us in the subduing it.

Blessings Many and Needs Galore

Causes for Praise and Prayer

For many years past a number of God's people have been constrained to pray for an outpouring of His Spirit upon all flesh. Our hearts are encouraged from time to time by news of great blessing from different lands. Let us pray on, and believe on, and praise on, and e'er ever we are aware of it, we shall be in the midst of the greatest revival the world has ever seen. For the benefit of Evangel readers we are printing reports of revivals which we have received from various sources.

Remarkable revival in the Congo— The Congo Mission News for April, 1923, contains a report of the blessed revival which has occurred among the Baptists in Sona Bata district. Mr. Thos. Moody, reporting the revival says:

"A year ago last May we noticed the people were coming more numerously to the services. We had been praying and working for years for such a revival, but we were just having a normal growth. Then, out of a clear sky, the revival came upon us. We have a large field of ten thousand square miles with a population of eighty thousand. At our thanksgiving meeting at Kasangulu, on the railroad, on June 19, we baptized 18, and kept back 80. On June 26, at Kingila, 184 were baptized. The people kept coming to the meetings in large numbers.

"In July at four other centers we baptized 426. This has been going on month by month, and the numbers have continuously increased. In the eighteen months since the revival began we have had 46 baptismal services in all parts of the field. At one service, but one was baptized, and the largest number baptized at one service was 537. The smallest number in any one month was 51, and the largest number 959.

"At our Matondo at Sona Bata this year, on Sept. 22nd, there were more than two thousand precent, and 439 were baptized. To give those unacquainted with our 'Matondo' some idea of these association gatherings, let me say that at Songololo the people came in from five different churches. They arrived on Thursday, the men and women, boys and girls, marching in order four abreast, men carrying mats and firewood, and women carrying the babies on their backs and water bottles on their heads, as well as their food to last them the four days of the Matondo. They came from different directions by the hundreds until we had quite fifteen hundred. They all camped out. It was a weird sight to go out in the moonlight and see the people sleeping out in the open. My wife and I counted fifty-seven camp fires.

"Sunday, August 20th, 1922, was the great day of the feast, when 537 who had been examined by their different churches were accepted for baptism and church membership. After baptism they were given the right hand of fellowship, after

which all who were able entered the great tabernacle of palm branches and listened for two hours to the preaching of the Word. A large thank-offering followed, after which in the communion-service we remembered the death of our Lord and Saviour.

"During the year 1921, God graciously gave us an increase in the church by baptism of 1500, and in the year following He still continued the blessing so that 3000 have been baptized. The work is still going on and the increased gifts of the people have been sufficient to meet the extra expenses entailed.

Mr. Moody, in concluding his report, says, "The work is here—God has done it. I am thankful God has counted me worthy to have a part in it. I would not exchange places with any man on earth."

Further Encouraging News from Africa.-Mention is made in the South African Outlook for March of the encouraging work that is being done by the Bible schools conducted by Mr. Dan Crawford in the Luanza country of the Congo. Mr. Crawford has twenty-four of these schools and the total attendance on roll is actually 110,091. Mr. Crawford calls these schools "Cocoons from which we hope to hatch a Spurgeon or a Moody." Mr Crawford is praying that he may have 100 Bible schools. We have just received a report direct from Brother Crawford in which he speaks in sadness of the importation of the white man's sins into Africa. In the mining camps to which the natives are recruited there is continually an orgy of adultery, drink and the devil. The saloons, the gambling hells, the harlots, get the African's money and themselves. Africa is being swept with syphilis and one doctor from Uganda reports that in 66 per cent of maternity cases, the mothers are suffering from this terrible disease. Mr. Crawford is making a special effort "first to save the converted youths of Africa to their homes and health; second, to give the gospel through them to those who are crying out for it. So that is how there has been born to Luanza mission, within the last few weeks, a Bible training institute, with its nucleal group of charter members. How in God's hands it will progress, we do not know. One thing, though, we do know. That while you can count all the apples on one tree, you can never count all the trees in a single apple. And any of these initial few may be the Spurgeon of Central, or the Paul of Pan Africa."

The African knows the value of the new birth. "How do I know that that man is saved?" asked a raw heathen to Mr. Crawford. "How do I know it's daylight without leaving my dark hut to see if there are streaks of dawn? I know it by the singing of the sunrise birds. I cannot get into this Christian with his new heart to inspect it. That is not ne-

cessary. It's life comes out in song."

Acts 2:4 in the Congo.—About twentyone day's journey from Luanza is the station erected by two Pentecostal brethren. Brothers Burton and Salter. Many Evangel readers will remember the story of the gracious outpouring of God's Spirit at this station a few years ago. In a recent letter from Brother Burton published in "Things New and Old" we read, "A few afternoons back I was giving our young evangelists a Bible study on Acts 2:42, when so sweetly and quietly the Spirit fell and two young fellows re-ceived the Holy Spirit. We were able to recognize several Welsh expressions. Now never used such expressions 'Diolch Iddo,' (any who visited the Welsh revival will remember that this is the most common expression of praise upon the lips of converted Welshmen,) and these lads can never have heard such sounds from us, so that it was a blessed confirmation when we heard these expressions in tongues."

Brother Burton tells a remarkable story of how the Lord delivered them from a plague of white ants. He says, "These ants do not show themselves, but work under the surface of things, and often the first intimation that one has of their presence is when the bottom of the box falls out, showing that they have eaten both bottom out and finished up the contents. We have tried all sorts of remedies, wiping things over with coal oil, spraying with arsenical dip, tarring the floor, and so on, but the white ants made light of such obstacles, and it seemed as though they would eat us out of house and home. At last (and why did we not do it at first?) we took the matter to God in prayer, telling Him that we were at our wits end, and asking Him to undertake for Jesus' sake. Soon af-terwards, quite contrary to their usual custom, out came the white ants in millions, spreading themselves over our floors, in the bed rooms, on the verandah, in my office, everywhere. And out after them came millions of little active brown ants. A perfect invading horde. Each one killed and carried off a white ant. Streams of wee, brown ants went scuffling off, and each one with a dead white ant much bigger than itself. On the verandah the old mother hens, with their young broods of chicks, soon found what a splendid feast was on hand, and joined in the fun. The result is that tonight there is not a sign of white ants working about the place. How faithfully God answers praver, and in His own inimitable way, delivers/ His children. 'Oh that men would praise the Lord for His wonderful works to the children of

Revival in Indo-China.—The Sunday School Times reports encouraging news of revival among the Lahus and Was. The latter are fierce head hunters who for generations have raided peaceful villages, burning homes and carrying away heads with queues to use as protecting charms against the ever menacing spirit world. The British government has so little relished contact with these head hunters that it has simply marked their country "Unadministered territory." Mr. Ernest

Gordon reports that in Northern Burma, close to the Chinese frontier, 16,000 have been baptized as long ago as 1917. The fire has leaped the frontier and more than 10,000 have come into the church in the Chinese province of Yunnan. Mr. Gordon states that the Lahus have a tradition of two heavenly messengers who, at a crisis in their history, comforted them with the promise of a white teacher coming at some future day to tell them the way of eternal life. They called their country therefore, Sankaishin Muhmyi, the land of those who seek a blessing. These people are coming ten days journey with presents of ponies and lump silver to beg for the good news of the kingdom. About forty native workers are preaching in connection with the American Baptist mission, and a Bible school is projected for the preparation of Lahu and Wa evangelists. One worker writes that he looks for the baptism of 10,000 Was presently.

Similar Blessing in North Siam.—Mrs. Dodd, the wife of a great Presbyterian missionary, Wm. Dodd, is bravely continuing single-handed the pioneering work of her husband, and writes, "Four more villages have come in since the persecution began. There are over 1000 converts now in Muang Ya alone. The work the Lord is doing here is the most wonderful thing I have ever seen. The new converts are strong, intelligent, industrious, well dressed people. Chinese from the hills and heathen Tai have attacked them but they stand firm, saying they will die for the Lord if necessary."

Another missionary, Hugh Taylor, who has been evangelist for several months among the Tais, writes, "I doubt if in any of the annals of missionary work there has been recorded a more eager, earnest reception of the Word of God than we have had since we crossed the border of Siam. I have gone to bed at night so tired that I have felt like crying, and a hundred men, heathen men, below me on the ground, were repeating over to one another the story of the cross and the way of salvation as they heard it during the evening. And oh, how they beg for gospels!" Mr. Gordon further reports, "The Garos of Assam, 200,000, have in their midst a flourishing church of 8000. Last year saw in ingathering of 932 ex-head-hunters, the largest in the history of the mission.

Revival in Russia.—Pastor B. Goetze has recently made a journey to Russia on behalf of the work of the Russian Missionary Society. He conferred with evangelical leaders in Moscow and reports the following: "The brothers confirmed what I had already been able to see with my own eyes, namely, that there are signs of a great revival already having commenced, and which has already reached great dimensions. I was glad to be able to perceive in this the divine answer to the prayers of the multitude of Christians of the whole world who in the last years have specially prayed to God for Russia. Prayer meetings in Russia are filled to overflowing, and the Spirit moves upon those present, who pray that the power of the gospel may make its presence felt in all the different

stratas of the people. All classes of the people want to hear the word of life. Before the war there were about 250,000 believers in Russia, but during the last years of the war the figure rose to about 10,000,000. The Russian authorities have said quite openly that they fear nothing so much as believing evangelical churches and indeed, the ruling classes have taken all the steps in their power lately to hinder and altogether stop the spread of the evangelical church movement, until only a mere shadow remains of the freedom of religion established by the revolution of 1917, and believers are openly pestered and badgered and put down by the rulers. All church workers must be registered and pay a twenty million rouble tax. Every registered church worker must take out a license, which costs one hundred and fifty million roubles for the first three months of the year. Then there is the tax for the meeting house, and one community, for instance, pays two thousand million roubles for one month as tax for its meeting house. All Sunday school work is forbidden, and any church carrying it on does so illegally and at its own risk. The import of Christian literature from abroad is totally prohibited, and a consignment of Bibles for the believers in Russia, the brothers inform me, was confiscated and destroyed by the authorities. A new consignment of 10,000 Bibles and 60,000 New Testaments is at present in the custom house at Moscow, and officials refuse to let them out until the sum of \$5000.00 is paid as custom tax, which is naturally impossible for the brothers to get together. The editor of the Friend of Russia states that money has been sent from England to release these Bibles. Pray and praise for the work of the Lord in Russia.

Conditions in Letvia.-Letvia was formerly a part of the Russian Empire but now has its own government. have told in the Evangel of a blessed outpouring of the Spirit among the hungry Baptists in Letvia in which the Spirit was outpoured as at Pentecost in twenty different Baptist churches. Tremendous persecution came to these Pentecostal churches of Letvia and many of the saints have been compelled to sell everything and emigrate to Brazil. A Lettish brother writes to us from Riga, "Our poor country was almost destroyed and wasted by the world war. Our land has been robbed many times. 1. By the going back of the wild Russian army. 2. From the Germans. They took all they could find in the farms and cities, and many hundreds of thousands or railway wagons full of food, animals, furniture and other things. All machinery in our factories was taken. Before the war we had about 500 factories in Riga and 10,-000 workers, but now all is waste. The people are too poor to buy new machinery. They have no work and no bread. 3. After the Germans left, the wild Russian Communists robbed us of the rest of our goods. So our new Letvia has been founded on a waste condition. Those who possess a table and a chair are very fortunate, and those who have only a poor room are satisfied." Our brother

speaks with great gratitude of some Pentecostal song books we sent him and he is translating many of our hymns into Lettish. He is also grateful for a bundle of children's papers sent him. He says that it is a great joy to have the Pentecostal Evangel visit him weekly. He shares it with other brethren there. Pray for the Pentecostal people of this impoverished land.

"The Gospel of Redemption and Healing in Vancouver."-Under the above heading the Presbyterian Witness of Toronto has a long article by Principal W. H. Smith, D. D. He states that on Sunday, May 6th, a series of special services opened in Vancouver which awakened wide spread and profound interest, not only in the city, but throughout the province of British Columbia. The meetings were held in the Arena, which is seated for 10,000. In the afternoons more than 4000 gathered, while in the evenings the building was fully occupied often by six o'clock, and frequently 5000 were turned away. He states that nothing in the religious life of the city forms any parallel to the interest. The appeals by Dr. Morgan and Gypsy Smith, each a prince in his own line, did not rally more than 3000 souls, and apart from the great value to those who attended, one scarcely heard a word outside of the circle of immediate followers. But today the campaign is the theme of common conversation, on trains and boats, in hotels, shops, pool rooms; everywhere the masses are keenly interested and profoundly aroused. Letters and telegrams have poured in from different parts of the province asking advice concerning the needy and crippled. Every train and boat brought an eager company. The Chinese theater was crowded as the evangelist ministered there and a company of Hindus gathered to hear his message. The evangelist is Dr. Chas. S. Price who is a minister of the Congregationalist church of California. A short while ago this brother held very liberal views and would finish up his sermon early on Sunday morning to go and perform at a vaudeville show. But he attended a Pentecostal revival held by Sister McPherson in San Jose, he got right with God and was filled with the Spirit according to Acts 2:4. At the advice of Dr. Towner of San Jose, who has also received the Pentecostal Baptism, Dr. Price took a tent and started out in the full gospel ministry. He has had a remarkable ministry in Victoria, B. C., where vast crowds came and were blessed in spirit, soul and body.

Dr. Smith writes, "Such diseases as deafness and dumbness, blindness, goiter, tumor, twisted and paralyzed limbs will indicate the types dealt with." He is very guarded in speaking of results but states. "As regards the types of cases healed, there is a great deal of reliable information." He states, "The campaign closes with the religious life of the city aroused, eager, expectant, and ready for action. The movement in Victoria continues in the marked reaction upon the activities of the churches. Prayer meetings have become the congregations at

Those who have found their faith strengthened enough to believe in the healing ministry have found a new source of hope and encouragement. This testimony is all the more valuable because it comes from a Presbyterian minister.

Pentecost in New Zealand.-A friend has forwarded us an extract from a private letter written by one of the saints at Wellington, New Zealand, where Brother Wigglesworth had a remarkable campaign about a year ago. The saints are erecting a hall in that city to seat 1000 people and expect to have it ready by the time Mr. Wigglesworth returns. The letter says, "God is blessing us in a wonderful manner, and since Brother Wigglesworth left we have held meetings in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall which seats 650 people. We have had conversions every Sunday and many have been remarkably healed of all manner of diseases. Many have also been saved and healed at Newton. It is a great sight to see the hungry souls who are seeking the Baptism. On Wednesday evenings, set apart for the sisters, 72 to over 90 are seeking regularly and a large number have received, and several have the gift of tongues. On Friday evenings the brothers seek, and quite a number have been baptized. We have baptized 190 believers in water in Wellington since Brother Wigglesworth left. A number of our workers are getting equipped to send the Pentecostal gospel to every part of New Zealand, and before this reaches you we expect several to be in the field. Many calls come from sick people to pray with them and handkerchiefs for anoisting come in large numbers. have many instances to healing. thank God for sending Brother Wigglesworth to New Zealand, for the Lord has established his labors in a remarkable manner. The meetings are growing in power and numbers. Any who come from other parts of the Dominion tell us no mission is like it in this land. Our open air meetings attract large crowds. Last Sunday the Council Chamber was crowded and many came out boldly for

Remarkable Healings in South Africa. -A correspondent writes to us from Pretoria, So. Africa, "Having seen in the last Pentecostal Evangel something about Mr. J. M. Hickson's Divine Healing Mission in So. Africa, I thought it might interest you to know that not only most wonderful healings were received, but numbers received a very great spiritual blessing. He not only laid hands on and prayed in Jesus' name for whites, but also for natives. I see by the Times newspaper that 199 natives have been discharged from the Leper Asylum since Mr. Hickson visited that place and prayed for the inmates. In one place he laid hands on and prayed for 7000 natives. many of whom had most wonderful healings, and here in Pretoria I was present when he ministered to over 3000 natives and colonials. I praise God for the wonderful things I saw there. Mr. Hiickson is a layman of the Church of England." According to the Melbourne Herald, during Mr. Hickson's South African campaign, Canon Palmer, Principal of the Grace-Dieu Training College, reported that on the first day of the Mission, 36 cases of blindness were healed. In two instances the sufferers had been born blind.

SILVER CITY, N. MEX .- For over a year and a half wife and I have been working in New Mexico in a wholly new field. The first year we were mostly out in isolated neighborhoods - one place, settled over 20 years, where a sermon never before had been preached. Saw over 100 saved and a number receive the blessed Baptism as in Acts 2:4. Last Dccember God spoke definitely to us about Silver City, the county seat. We nad only \$4.00 in money, Ford in very bad condition, clothes inadequate for winter here at 6,000 feet elevation, knew no one to whom we could turn for a night's lodging or even a meal. How He opened up ways, raised up friends, caused an old debt to be paid me at this time, and made it possible to remain here is marvelous in our eyes. There has been a severe drought through all this country for several years past, and the mining industry having closed down, made times distressingly bad. Our offerings never exceeded \$10.00 any one month the past year and a half, often less. How we have lived only God knows. only a meal ahead on hand, but He has never failed us. When our severest financial tests were on, usually we got a call to pastor an assembly-four in the past year. But we dared not accept-our call was here in this needy field-no other assembly within 150 miles and only one other in New Mexico. After months of praying, God sent in funds to make first payment on a tent, some from a saint we never heard of. The tent is up and meetings begun. Do pray for us. Only one baptized saint to stand with us.-J. D. Miller, Evangelist.

SPRINGHILL, LA.—Brother J. W. Wilburn was with us in a two-weeks meeting at Kings Corner, where we are pastor. The Lord wonderfully blessed in this meeting-five restored, and two saved and received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit according to Acts 2:4. There were some wonderful cases of healing; one sister who had appendicitis had the doctor with her and she grew worse all the time and seemed to get no relief until she called the saints to pray for her. A TRIP THROUGH THE ORIENT By a Pentecotsal Pastor.

I have just returned from my trip to the Orient and I am sure the saints will be pleased to hear an unbiased report of what some of our Pentecostal missionaries are doing on the foreign field. My time was too short to go far inland, so the only missionaries I could see were in the seaport towns. The first place I came to was Yokohama, Japan, where through the Salvation Army captain we found Brother Coote. The things we heard about him were interesting. He was being persecuted nearly unto death. The devil had burned up one of his mission halls and beaten up the workers. But the captain said that through it all God gave them ten souls on Sunday evening, praise God, and the captain's wife is getting interested in the Baptism.

I notice that our foreign missionaries are not confining their work to the heathen but to any they can touch. Some of their best helpers are home people who have been converted in heathen lands. The brother I mention was a business man from England, and through our Brother Taylor at Kobe he came into Pentecost, and is now a power for God. Even in the last few weeks over 80 heathen have been converted and quite a number have received the Baptism already and followed the Lord in water baptism. This brother is certainly having his trials for he was beaten up twice while I was there.

At Kobe I met Sister Straub in her Bible class session. I had not the pleasure of meeting other missionaries there but I met a number of their converts who gave evidence of the thorough work that our precious missionaries have done.

I Arrive in Shanghai. On Easter Sunday I arrived in Shanghai, China, just in time to meet a number of our loved ones coming from a baptismal service where they had baptized 23 of their Chinese converts in water. What an intelligent company of natives these baptized ones were, mostly merchants I noticed. On the following day, two of the brethren, H. Mader, and H. Lawler, started on their periodical trip of 300 miles into the interior. They traveled on bicycles, sampans and shank horses. This trip takes them 13 days each way. They go through many places where the people have never heard of Jesus. They preach to eager crowds and nand out tracts and testaments as far as their meager means permit. Their destination is a place where one of their converts, now a successful evangelist, lives. This evangelist is having more than he can take care of and so calls for help.

When a missionary offering is to be taken here in the home land, some say,

"Well, are they doing anything out there?" Let me tell you that they are doing magnificent work and are using the means you are sending them for the salvation of souls. Every baptized, Godcalled, heaven-sent missionary out there in China is worth his weight in gold and some of them are worth their weight in rubies and diamonds. Yes, missionary offerings bring big returns. Missionary offerings are good for dead churches and grumbling saints.

The fruits of our missionary labors are to be seen all over the world. When I was a preacher in Canada I met a young Chinaman who had been converted through the ministry of Brother and Sister Lawler in China. He told me how he felt the power of God on him one night at a prayer meeting and spoke in tongues, in plain English and Russian, and said that he had never found a people who knew God like the Pentecostal people in all the churches he had attended in the United States. When he found that we had the same Baptism with the manifestations of the Spirit as they had in China, he was overjoyed and praised God. I found one of Brother Barth's Chinese converts thousands of miles from where he had heard the blessed story and found his Saviour. Many hear the gospel in our Pentecostal missions in China and go forth to the uttermost parts of the world to tell it there.

A Message to American Saints

One night as I preached to some Chinese in the home of Sister Lawler, Beatrice Lawer acting as my interpreter, the native pastor responded in so touching a manner, saying on behalf of the church of Jesus Christ in China, "Tell the church in the home land that we are a part of you. Some day we will all come from the east and west, from the north and south, and stand before the throne of God and we will thank you for sending someone to tell of Jesus' power to save. We are all one in Him now, but then we' will realize what we have believed here, and love will be complete." He asked me as their appointed representative to write a message to their friends in the United States and say, "We appreciate the work you have done for us in sending the missionaries and the light of Jesus. We, as a Chinese church, are young, we need you all to pray for us, that God will send us a mighty outpouring of His Spirit." When he said, "Send us more help from the home land," I noticed the look on the missionaries' faces. It seemed to say, "They had better first take care of those they have already sent."

I also visited the public schools of which Sister Lawler has the oversight in three departments. There were about 100 scholars and they all expressed their joy in getting a little message. They responded through the interpreter, sending a message back with me to the Sunday School children of America, asking them to pray for the Chinese children, that they might know more of this wonderful Jesus, for the very last one of them confessed to me that they had studied about Him in the school and had learned to love Jesus. Many of them attended Sunday School and at Easter five of them were immersed in water. The Bible is one of their text books—they have not banished this book from their curriculum as we have in our so-called Christian land.

Both in north and south China the Bible women send greetings, asking for the saints in America to pray for them in their work. They have positions to teach the study of the Bible in public schools. One said, "Pray that God will help me to so teach the truth of salvation that the children may be saved, and that God will give me many more children to teach.

The Work is Lasting

In Hong Kong, China, I had the pleasure of preaching three times in Brother Barth's mission through Brother Stone as interpreter, to an eager audience of natives. I saw one heathen at each service come to Jesus for salvation. There are some very earnest native Christians in this congregation. Some one asked me, "Is the work lasting?" I want to declare it is, if they have gone through to the fulness with proper teaching. I met Sister Lee and Sister Ah Gum, the first two women in South China to receive the Baptism thirteen years ago under Brother and Sister Garr. They are still true and their light is shining brighter and brighter. Sister Lee is married to a benevolent doctor and Sister Ah Gum gives all her time as Bible woman and deaconess.

As I approached the mission on Sun-.. day morning, Sunday School was just on and outside on the walk the heathen were crowding round the door to watch what was going on inside. They do not know what Sunday means in China and so business was in full swing in the street. Right beside the door sat an old woman selling cigarettes, idols and joss sticks to burn to the idols. The smoke filled the mission. Beside this woman, right in front of the door was a whitewash barrel. They were whitewashing the porch outside. While I was preaching, the painter stood on the ladder listening through the transom. Then a cooper came along with his tools, calling for work. A man came to him with a broken bucket and they sat down on the walk before the open mission door to mend the thing. But the climax came while we were at prayer inside. One man at the door stepped on another's toe while trying to make out what those people inside were trying to do, all praying at once, and right in the doorway they got into a hand to hand fight. The rest went on praying while I peeked through my fingers to see the sight. But it soon blew over. You see the adverse conditions under which our missionaries work. Don't you think they need your earnest prayers?

Through Much Persecution

In Hong Kong there is a Hindu named Sadar Khan, a splendid looking boy of about twenty-seven years who has found Jesus through the ministry of Brother Barth. He is suffering untold persecution from the hands of his Mohammedan fellow soldiers. Soon after he found the Lord he went to India on a four months furlow to visit his parents. As soon as his parents found that he had embraced the Christian faith they drove him from home. He had to go back to the Calcutta barracks until his four months were up and then go back to China to do duty as a soldier. He has tried in every way to get to America or somewhere else where he will be able to live for Jesus undisturbed. He asked me to take him as my servant and even offered to pay me for bringing him to a land where he could serve God according to the dictates of his conscience. Pray that God will keep and bless this young man.

The Great Need for Money

Internal war in south China is making it doubly hard for our missionaries in the interior. The cost of living and food stuff is high all over the Orient. I have found that our workers over there are not kept well enough to do justice to their calling and to themselves. I understand that a thousand million dollar centennial fund is being raised in a forward movement in the churches to go to the world's missionary cause. I find that the church missionaries are well taken care of. They do not lack funds. Their work seemed very shallow and it seemed plain to me that there was waste. But the real men and women on the firing line, those who are really getting the heathen converted and who have a know-so experience, filled with the Holy Spirit and power and faith in God, with faith to be healed and kept, are receiving no part of this great sum of money. Believe me, saints, I saw suffering among our dear missionaries. They need both food and raiment. This should not be so. One brother with a big family had but a few cents in his pockets and met incoming boats for a week with an empty suit case, expecting that he might receive a letter from home in answer to prayer, and that he might be able to purchase the wherewith-al that their bodies might be fed. When I left that hope was not yet realized. If ever a man was worthy, this man is.

In Manila I learned that there was no Pentecostal missionary. It seemed to me that one with the Spanish language would do well there. On the boat 1 met a teacher who had just finished his education in America. We talked very freely and often he would say to me, "I wish you could come with me to preach this gospel to my people; I believe that you have the thing we need." May God send someone to preach the gospel in its fulness in the Philippine Islands.

From what I have seen and learned on this tour I shall pray more for the salvation of the heathen, for the comfort, strength, courage of missionaries of all classes, and for a greater missionary spirit among the saints at home. I will increase my own missionary offerings and work harder for the missionaries myself. What will you do?—Evangelist E. G. Block, Yakima, Wash.

GREAT NEED IN BROTHER HARVEY'S WORK

Since the death of Brother James Harvey last fall and the homecoming of Sister Harvey on furlough it has come to our attention that many who have been helping in this work have let down on their missionary giving which has brought considerable distress and suffering at the Sharannagar Mission. This Mission is quite large and the expense of carrying it on is very great. It takes in the neighborhood of seven hundred dollars a month to take care of all expenses so that the work does not suffer. But we know that for the past few months the offerings have not reached nearly this amount, which has put a great strain upon the workers to carry the work on.

Besides the Institutional work which is being carried on there are two outstations where the workers give all their time to preaching the Gospel. There is also an evangelist located on the Mission Station who gives all his time to the preaching, and three meetings are held daily, and on some days there are more. The Zenanna women have prayers in the morning in the Zenanna, and the boys and Christian workers have prayers in the Church. At midday there is a meeting for the workmen, and on Thursday evening there is a meeting for those who tarry for the Baptism in the Holy Spirit.

Brother Harvey taught all the people to pay tithes and many of them give offerings as well. Some of the women often give eight annas, a month's allowance, as a thank offering to the Lord when they have had a definite answer to prayer. The tithe money is given into the Church fund, and from this they support an outstation. The people all take a great interest in this station as they feel that it is their work, and they are responsible for it.

Miss Anna Helmbrecht who has charge of the Sharannagar Mission during the absence of Sister Harvey on furlough, has written as follows: "Here is the Zenanna with its forty or more women besides girls, and the little children who are now home on their vacation. These need clothing and food. It is not only a matter of buying clothing, but planning for the sewing. They also need discipline, and many are the different problems that present themselves along this line.

"Over on the other side is the boy's boarding. Here are about forty-two boys under the house father's charge. Their clothing has to be provided and looked after. We have a school for these and this needs our supervision. Besides this we have the old men and old women, and then the workers and helpers in the different departments.

"We are glad to have a part in this work for the Master, and we are trusting Him to give grace and strength, and to help as it is needed. We are looking for the time when we shall see a full reward of our labors, and when we shall be able to come with rejoicing bringing in the sheaves."

NO EXCHANGE ON CHECKS

Occasionally, the Missionary Treasurer is asked for information concerning checks. We are glad to inform all who may be interested that the banks of Springfield do not charge us any exchange on out-of-town checks. Therefore, checks are the cheapest and most economical way of sending money for missionary purposes.

Miss Hilda Wagenknecht, one of the latest recruits for India, sends us her first report as follows: "I left Dhond about two-weeks ago and came here to Bettiah to join Miss Kirkland in the work. Was glad to see the building work going on, and we are just trusting the Lord to supply every need, that the buildings may be finished quickly.

"Last week I had my first experience in village work going out with Miss Kirkland. This was quite different from the work at home, but I enjoyed it so much for it is precious to see a company of heathen listening to the Gospel. We know that His Word shall not return unto Him void."

THE LAWLER'S SHOULD COME HOME

F. Harland Lawler writes from Shanghai, "We feel the need of a change as these years have been very strenuous. For our family we will need two full fares and three half fares. It will take about eight hundred dollars gold to bring us home. We are leaving this all in the Lord's hands to work out according to His good will and purpose. We need the prayers of you dear ones at home, and we hope to come home as soon as the Lord opens the way."

Money for the fares of Brother Lawler and family has been coming in very slowly. We trust that a special effort will be made so that this family of faithful missionaries may be brought home at the earliest possible moment.

THE CONFERENCE IN MEXICO

Brother H. C. Ball writes from San Antonio, Texas, "We had a fine trip to We left here on the 7th and arrived in Muzquiz about dark on the 8th. We had a blessed time of conference together. There were thirteen preachers and workers present and two new brethren were licensed to preach, When we left Muzquiz we visited San Juan de Savinas where I baptized seven in water. A new Issue Mexican had been working there for some time, so we had quite a victory as these brethren affirmed their belief in the Trinity and were baptized in water according to the formula in Matthew.

"Just before we arrived in Morelos, Lupe Flores' car went dead and we could not revive it, so I had to pull it to Piedras Negras and across the international bridge. This was over sixty miles. You can imagine us in that country, passing through adobe villages and towns, and through deserts, with the car behind being pulled with barbed wire. It was some experience, but all a part of missionary life."
