The Eternal Word



THE things seen are temporal, the things unseen are eternal. The seen seems very real, but it simply points to the unseen, that which seems very unreal but is very real. The seeming real is unreal because it is temporal, but the unseen, which is the real real, is real because it is eternal. How is the unseen, the unknown, made real? By the unseen, by the spoken word of God. The very things that are seen were made and created by the word of God. We believe that the heavens and the earth were created by the word of God. By the word they are kept, until the word goes forth that they are to cease, to be dissolved, to pass away.

The Word that tells of the unseen, the real, also begets us. We are begotten by the eternal word so that we can be habitants, fit habitants, spiritually fitted to inhabit the new spiritual realm. Heaven and earth shall pass away, but the word of the Lord endureth forever. This is the word we preach. Not only is the word God's creative power, redemptive power, begetting power, but it is eternal in its duration. Therefore that which is begotten by it is of like nature—is eternal.

The Word was made flesh, the Eternal tabernacling in flesh, so that flesh may tabernacle in the eternal. Christ says, "Where I am—in the unseen, in the realm of the eternal—where I—the Word made flesh—am, there shall ye be also." How? In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, we, the begotten ones, possessing the word of the eternal, the eternal Word, shall be changed, for this mortal must put on immortality. The Word was made flesh, made mortal, but He put on immortality; so we also who believe and trust, having been born of the Spirit and quickened by the Word, shall also put on immortality.

"The everlasting hills," the mountains, point to, speak of, the eternal things which are not seen. Man tries to solve the age of a tree by counting the rings of the trunk. He has not started yet to try to count the the age of the mountains by measuring their bases, obtaining their circumferences, or measuring their height. If he has or does he is hopelessly wrong, and He who created the mountain does not deign to correct man's figures. Whatever his figures are or calculations may be, they are only measurements of time. Things seen, the mountains, are temporal, the things not seen are eternal.

God has chosen man, and redeemed man through His Son, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself without spot unto the Ancient of Days, that we creatures of a day might share eternity with the eternal One. We have been made partakers of the divine nature by the exceeding precious promises. Christ is with His Father where He was before the creation of the world, and He says to those on the earth to whom He came and who have received Him, "Where I am, there ye shall be also." To as many as received Him, to them gave He the right to become the sons of God, reigning, living, fellowshiping with Him, long after the "everlasting hills" have disappeared into ashes. The eternal God is our refuge. Amen.

The Discerning of Spirits

"To another discerning of spirits" (1 Cor. 12:10). There is a vast difference between natural discernment and spiritual. When it comes to natural discernment you will find many people loaded with it, and they can see so many faults in others. To such the words of Christ in the sixth chapter of Luke surely apply, "Why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but perceivest not the beam that is in thine own eye?" If you want to manifest natural discernment, focus the same on yourself for at least twelve months and you will see so many faults in yourself that you will never want to fuss about the faults of another. In the sixth of Isaiah we read of the prophet being in the presence of God and he found that even his lips were unclean and everything was unclean. But praise God, there is the same live coal for us today, the baptism of fire, the perfecting of the heart, the purifying of the mind, the regeneration of the spirit. How important it is that the fire of God shall touch our tongues.

In 1 John 4:1 we are told, "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God." We are further told, "And every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is not of God: and this is that spirit of antichrist, whereof ye have heard that it should come; and even now already is it in the world." From time to time as I have seen a person under a power of evil, or having a fit, I have said to the power of evil, or Satanic force that is within the possessed person, "Did Jesus Christ come in the flesh?" and straightway they have answered, "No." They either say, "No," or hold their tongues, refusing altogether to acknowledge that the Lord Jesus Christ came in the flesh. It is then, remembering that further statement of John's, "Greater is He that is in you than he that is in the world," that you can in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ deal with the evil powers and command them to come out. We as Pentecostal people must know the tactics of the evil one and must be able to displace and dislodge him from his position.

I was preaching in Doncaster, England, at one time on the line of faith and a number of people were delivered. There was a man present who was greatly interested and moved by what he saw. He was suffering himself with a stiff knee and had yards and yards of flannel wound around it. After he got home he said to his wife, "I have taken in Wigglesworth's message and now I am going to act on it and get deliverance. Wife, I want you to be the audience." He took hold of his knee and said, "Come out, you devil, in the name of Jesus." Then he said, "It is all right, wife." He took the yards and yards of flannel off and found he was all right without the bandage. The next night he went to the little Primitive Methodist Church where he worshiped. There was a lot of young people who were in bad plight there and Jack had a tremendous business delivering his friends through the name of Jesus. He had been given to see that a great many ills to which flesh is heir are nothing else but the operation of the enemy, but his faith had risen and he saw that in the name of Jesus there was a power that was more than a match for the enemy.

I arrived one night at Gottenberg in Sweden and

was asked to hold a meeting there. In the midst of the meeting a man fell full length in the doorway. The evil spirit threw him down, manifesting itself and disturbing the whole meeting. I rushed to the door and laid hold of this man and cried out to the evil spirit within him, "Come out, you devil! In the name of Jesus we cast you out as an evil spirit." I lifted him up and said, "Stand on your feet and walk in the name of Jesus." I don't know whether anybody in the meeting understood me except the interpreter, but the devils knew what I said. I talked in English but these devils in Sweden cleared out. A similar thing happened in Christiania.

The devil will endeavor to fascinate through the eyes and through the mind. At one time there was brought to me a beautiful young woman who had been fascinated with some preacher, and just because he had not given her satisfaction on the line of courtship and marriage, the devil took advantage and made her fanatical and mad. They brought her 250 miles in that condition. She had previously received the Baptism in the Spirit. You ask, "Is there any place for the enemy in one that has been baptized in the Holy Ghost?" Our only safety is in going on with God and in constantly being filled with the Holy Ghost. You must not forget Demas. He must have been baptized with the Holy Ghost for he appears to have been a right-hand worker with Paul, but the enemy got him to the place where he loved this present world and he dropped off. When they brought this young woman to me the evil power was immediately discerned and immediately I cast the thing out in the name of Jesus. It was a great joy to present her before all the people in her right mind again.

There is a life of perfect deliverance, and this is where God wants you to be. If I find my peace is disturbed on any line, I know it is the enemy who is trying to work. How do I know this? Because the Lord has promised to keep your mind in perfect peace when it is stayed on Him. Paul tells us to present our bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is our reasonable service, the Holy Spirit breathes through him, "And be not conformed to this world; **but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind**, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God." He further tells us in Phil. 4, "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, if there be any praise, think on these things." As we think about that which is pure, we become pure. As we think about that which is holy, we become holy. And as we think about our Lord Jesus Christ, we become like Him. We are changed into the likeness of the object on which our gaze is fixed.

To discern spirits we must dwell with Him who is holy, and He will give the revelation and unveil the mask of Satanic power on all lines. In Australia I went to one place where there were disrupted and broken homes. The people were so deluded by the evil power of Satan that men had left their wives, and wives had left their husbands, and had gotten into spiritual affinity with one another. That is the devil! May God deliver us from such evils in these days. There is no one better than the companion God has given you. I have seen so many broken hearts and so many homes that have been wrecked. We need a real revelation of these evil seducing spirits which come in and fascinate by the eye and destroy.

lives, and bring the work of God into disrepute. But there is always flesh behind it. It is never clean; it is unholy, impure, Satanic, devilish, and hell is behind it. If the enemy comes in to tempt you on any line like this, I beseech you to look instantly to the Lord Jesus. He can deliver you from any such Satanic power. You must be separated on all lines if you are going to have faith.

The Holy Ghost will give us this gift of discerning of spirits if we desire it so that we may perceive by revelation this evil power which comes in to destroy. We can reach out and get this unction of the Spirit that will reveal these things unto us.

You will have people come to meetings who are spiritists. You must be able to deal with spiritist conditions. You can so deal with them that they will not have any power in the meetings. If you ever have Theosophists or Christian Scientists, you must be able to discern them and settle them. Never play with them; always clear them out. They are better with their own company always, unless they are willing to be delivered from the delusion they are in. Remember the warning of the Lord Jesus, "The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy."

Before Satan can bring his evil spirits there has to be an open door. Hear what the Scriptures say: "That wicked one toucheth him not" (1 John 5:18). "The Lord shall preserve thee from all evil: He shall preserve thy soul" (Psa. 121:7). How does Satan get an opening? When the saint ceases to seek after holiness, purity, righteousness, truth; when he ceases to pray, stops reading the Word and gives way to carnal appetites. Then it is that Satan comes. So often sickness comes as a result of disobedience. David said, "Before I was afflicted, I went astray." Seek the Lord and He will sanctify every thought, every act, till your whole being is ablaze with holy purity and your one desire will be for Him who has created you in holiness. Oh, this holiness! Can we be made pure? We can. Every inbred sin must go. God can cleanse away every evil thought. Can we have a hatred for sin and a love for righteousness? Yes, God will create within thee a pure heart. He will take away the stony heart out of the flesh. He will sprinkle thee with clean water and thou shalt be cleansed from all thy filthiness. When will He do it? When you seek Him for such inward purity.

THE HONOR THAT IS COMING TO CHRIST A Few Comments on Phil. 2:5-11

Every knee shall bow and every tongue shall confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. He, Jesus Christ, being in the form of God, thought it not a thing to be grasped at to be equal with God.

Equal to God, in the form of God, He thought it not robbery to be equal with God. However, He made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of man. Men are looking at the fact in the central part of the passage: "Took upon Him the form of a servant and was made in the likeness of man." The keynote of modern religion is that Christ took upon Him the form of a servant and was made in the likeness of man. The servant Christ, the social Christ, the Christ an example, who took upon Him the nature of man. Men look at His human nature and overlook or ignore or deny His divine origin and His divine and glorious future. But the statement preceding this, "Who being in the form of God, thought it

not robbery to be equal with God"—they wilfully set aside and magnify the Christ of example and pattern and teaching, who took upon Him the form of a servant.

"And being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." It was no martyrdom. It was no dying for ideals. He humbled Himself, He had to empty Himself of so much of the divine glory in order that death could prey upon Him. Man fights death; Christ had to come so low that death could fight Him. He said, "I lay down my life." It was not taken from Him. Death had permission to touch Him who was the author of life.

Even the death of the cross! No ordinary death, a death of extraordinary lowness. The martyrs were stoned, felons were crucified. Of all the list of heroes of faith in Hebrews 11 not one was crucified. Christ went lower than all. They were martyrs. He was a sacrifice—a voluntary sacrifice.

"Wherefore God also hath highly exalted Him, and given Him a name which is above every name." God again came on the scene and shows Christ's uniqueness above every one who has died. Because He was exalted, raised from the dead, the firstfruits, and God has given Him a name which is above every other name, the name of the greatest martyr does not rank in the same category as His name, which is above every name.

"That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth." Therefore God has decreed that this humble one, the one who took upon Himself the form of man, the servant, should be honored above in heaven by those who knew Him before in heaven as the one equal to God. The heavenly hosts had to give Him additional honor for His condescension and humiliation.

"And things in earth!" Every living creature, before and after His coming, has to recognize that He is the one to be worshiped by all, high and low, celestial and terrestrial. This is an honor due only to Godhead. The divine Son of God has to have worship from the sons of men, either voluntary or under compulsion.

"And things under the earth!" Art Thou come to torment us before the time? Thus evil spirits spoke to Him. They knew the time when they and their fellows under the earth would have to acknowledge Him as Lord. They are denying Him now as Lord in the bodies of their dupes, in the asylums and out.

"And that every tongue shall confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." Pilate said, "Shall I crucify your King?" Discordant shouts rang through the air, "We have no king but Caesar, away with Him, crucify Him." These and their like all down the ages will have to confess that He is Lord, Master, King, Ruler, Potentate, the eternal I Am, to the glory of God the Father, His Father. God will have all men honor the Son.

This inspired passage starts with the statement that He is equal to God, in the form of God, and winds up with this homage being paid to Him to the glory of God the Father, the Father of the Servant and the Son. Amen.

NATION-WIDE CALL TO PRAYER IN VIEW OF PRESENT WORLD DISTRESS AND UNREST

At a Ministers' Pentecostal Meeting held in Waukegan, Ill., on Nov. 12, 1923, a nation-wide call to prayer was read, after which a motion was unanimously adopted to publish this call in the Pentecostal press.

Convinced that we are nearing a national crisis, I am sending forth this call to prayer to all Pentecostal saints and to other evangelical believers, irrespective of denominational affiliation, inviting all to unite in prayer for world sovereigns and rulers, and especially for our beloved President of the United States of America. See 1 Timothy 2:1, 2.

May we not dare believe that judgments which might and would otherwise overtake us, can and will be averted through prayer? God has done so for others, why not for us? May we not trust the Lord to make our country an asylum, a place of refuge, for the afflicted of His people?

I would suggest that there be united prayer in all Pentecostal assemblies and missions at the usual Watch Night Service, Dec. 31, 1923, and that leaders of the services shall read the Call to Prayer to the Congregations assembled.

God alone is able to avert calamities which might overtake us by entanglement with the nations of Europe in this hour of distress and unrest. Mr. David Lloyd-George, former Prime Minister of Great Britain, in his very recent visit to the United States warned us of the possibility of another world war, the horrors of which we dread to contemplate.

I therefore entreat that all children of God will pray that needed wisdom, discretion and judgment may be given to all rulers, and particularly to President Coolidge and the members of his cabinet. As an encouragement to my brethren to pray, I append the correspondence from the President which assures me of his good pleasure in the matter.

By way of explanation, I will state that I and the members of our household have been for several months past, earnestly praying for the President. Recently we were impressed to write him, thinking it might be helpful to know that some are really praying on his behalf and not merely saying prayers. A prompt reply was received to this letter from Washington. I therefore wrote the Chief Executive again, asking permission to publish his letter, and received an immediate reply granting my request. I herewith append the entire correspondence.

Honorable Sir:

Being conscious of the grave responsibility resting upon you as the Chief Executive of this nation, especially in these trying times, and realizing your need of wisdom such as God alone can give, a band of us are praying daily that you may be directed in all things to the glory of God and for the protection of our country. We are sending this with the hope that it may, in some degree, strengthen your hands and encourage your heart.

A Remarkable Book by a Hebrew Christian

It is said of that old stalwart of the faith, Joseph Parker, that whenever he saw a Jew he took off his hat. When questioned why he did this he would simply say in the words of the apostle, "Who are Israelites; to whom pertaineth the adoption, and the glory, and the covenants, and the giving of the law, and the service of God, and the promises; whose are the fathers, and of whom as concerning the flesh Christ came, who is over all, God blessed forever. Amen."

We must confess that we, too, have a like feeling towards the Jews, especially to those to whom it has been revealed that our Lord Jesus Christ is their Messiah. It is always a pleasure for us to hear our Hebrew brethren unfold to us the Old Testament scriptures and it is always a delight for us to read anything from the pen of an enlightened Christian Jew. Many of the brethren who attended our Council meeting in 1916 will remember that we were privileged to have with us a Hebrew brother who took part freely in the discussions, especially on the subject of the trinity of the Godhead. We have been out of touch with this brother for some years but recently he has sent us a copy of a book he has written and we have read this book with intense delight. Mark John Levy, for such is the name of our brother, has certainly given us a feast of fat things in this book, "Christianity, the Flower and Fruit of Judaism."

"Across the land, across the sea,
I wing in love this message true:
The blood of Christ doth wash away
My sins, and cleanse my worship too.
It purifies my ministry
To sinful Gentile, sinful Jew,
And gives me joy as on I speed
To face a sinful world in need
Of knowledge of Salvation's plan,
Through Christ, the Son of God and man."

The first chapter of his book is entitled, "The Exactness of the Word of God," and Brother Levy points out what a wonderful book the Bible is, mathematically true to its minutest "jot and tittle." **He points to the importance of reading and meditating on the whole of the Scriptures and states truly,** "Sectarianism is the logical result of refusing to accept and declare 'all the counsel of God.'" He states here, "Christians have no right to accept or reject any doctrine until they have 'ruminated' (meditated, or pondered) on it. A Jewish brother once observed to me, 'I enjoy the peaceful and restful atmosphere of the Christian chu.ch.' I replied, 'The atmosphere you enjoy is no more the real peace and rest of Christian faith than the atmosphere of the kitchen on Thanksgiving Day is the real Thanksgiving dinner.' We are

commanded to 'taste and see that the Lord is good' (Psa. 34:8)."

Brother Levy has a very interesting chapter on the subject of "Hebrew Verb Roots and the Holy Trinity." He says here, "The doctrine of the trinity of the Godhead as taught by the Christian church is identical with the faith of ancient Israel, and this is confirmed unconsciously by orthodox Jews of today, who universally acknowledge belief in our Heavenly Father (Avinu-ba-Shomayim); Christ (Messiah to come); and the Holy Spirit (Ruach-ha-Kodesh). The Hebrew word Echad (one), used in the Scripture, 'Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God (Trine Elohim) is one Lord' (Deut. 6:4), and in other Old Testament texts, always denotes duality or plurality in unity. Yacheed (only) expresses absolute unity in the Hebrew. The Holy of Holies, the most sacred spot in Israel's worship, a cube; the Divine ascription, 'Holy, Holy, Holy' (Isa 6:3), acknowledged by orthodox Jews even unto this day to be the triplicated name of the Deity; and the Levitical blessing, 'The Lord bless thee, and keep thee: the Lord make his face shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee: the Lord lift up his countenance upon thee, and give thee peace' (Num. 6:24-26), are additional ancient testimonies that Christian teaching concerning the trinity of the Godhead is scriptural and incontrovertible."

Writing of "Christ and the immemorial blood covenant," Brother Levy says, "An unbiased study of the solemn question clearly proves that there are two distinct lines of prophecy in the Old Testament referring to two separate appearances on earth of the one true Messiah, who had first to come in humility and ride through Jerusalem on an ass, previous to His death (Zech. 9:9) for the salvation of all men, and then return on the 'White Horse' of victory to take His seat on the throne of His father David at Jerusalem to reign throughout the glorious millennial age as the King of kings and the Lord of lords (Rev. 19:11-16)."

To many our Brother Levy will bring new light in his comment on Jer. 31:31 and Heb. 8:8, "Jehovah declared that He would 'make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah.' The word translated 'make' reads 'cut' in the Hebrew and confirms the ancient method of entering into a covenant with the Almighty, namely, by the shedding of blood, without which there is no forgiveness of sin and, therefore, no possibility of communion between a holy God and a sinful man. Israel's blessings under the Mosaic covenant were temporal, primarily, namely, wells our fathers had not digged, houses they had not builded, olive trees they had not planted (Deut. 6:11). Under the new covenant Christ in His own blood purchased for us an eternal inheritance and provided for us unspeakable spiritual blessings (Heb. 9:11-15). Under this covenant He puts all

His powers and possessions at our disposal; but our lack of knowledge, our unbelief and disobedience limit the blessings He is willing to bestow on His blood-brothers, even in earthly life. Every Christian, too, is bound in duty to hold his life and possessions at the service of every other Christian who is striving to be loyal to the obligations of the eternal blood covenant: 'Hereby perceive we the love of God, because He laid down His life for us; and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren. But whosoever hath this world's goods and seeth his brother have need and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?' (1 John 3:16, 17)."

We are glad that our brother has included in his book his lecture on "Christian Symbolism in the Jewish Passover." He brings forth much which will be real light to many concerning the passover. He states, "The search for leaven in orthodox Jewish homes by housewives and maids is most minute; but the father is expected to make a final search with a candle and to pronounce a curse on any portion overlooked, and thus make it 'null and void.' 'Leaven' is an acknowledged rabbinic type of sin; and to enforce the need of a rigid self-examination, the Lord declared that He would 'search Jerusalem with candles' (Zeph. 1:12); and He gives us the blessed assurance that in Jerusalem above we shall need no 'candle or light of the sun' (Rev. 22:5). Apostolic antitypical teaching proclaims that 'Christ our passover is sacrificed for us; therefore let us keep the feast, not with the old leaven, neither with the leaven of malice and wickedness; but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth' (1 Cor. 5:7, 8).

"On the table there are three thick cakes of unleavened bread,—some say they represent Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, or Jehovah, the Priest, and the people. Hebrew Christians believe they represent the Holy Trinity,—Father, Son and Holy Spirit, because the middle cake is broken in two at the commencement of the feast, then secreted between the pillows or in the pillow case, and partaken of after supper by all present. It was this piece of unleavened bread which Christ took when He said, 'This is my body which is given for you (Luke 22:19), and truly it represents His body, broken on the Cross, then hidden in the clean tomb, and resurrected later for us as 'The Bread of Life.'"

A chapter that will be of special interest to Pentecostal people is that entitled, "The Holy Spirit in Israel and in the Church." In this chapter he gives some light on the subject of tithing. He says, "Abraham paid tithes to Melchizedek. Christ is a priest after the order of Melchizedek. He declared that our righteousness must exceed that of the Pharisees, who paid tithes. The eleven tribes in Israel had to support one tribe, the Levites, who in turn had to tithe their income to support the sons of Aaron. Tithes today should be devoted exclusively to the support of orthodox ministers in the homeland, or of orthodox missionaries in foreign fields, but should

not be given to feed the poor or build churches, etc. These benefactions come under the name of free-will offerings. It is said that about the third of one's income in Israel went to the payment of tithes, free-will offerings, taxes and charities.

"The Baptism in the Holy Spirit is the prime factor in joyful Christian worship and power for service. Without His aid neither Jew nor Gentile can say unto salvation that 'Jesus is the Lord' (1 Cor. 12:3). Jews, Protestants and Catholics acknowledge belief in the Holy Spirit; but how few welcome His fellowship in their daily lives! When Israel came forth from Egypt, our fathers were willing to listen to the voice of Moses, but not to the voice of God; and throughout Christendom today a like condition prevails. At Sinai the Lord spoke in trumpet tones; and the terrible World War, declared on the anniversary of the destruction of Israel's temple, was His blast of warning to the nations to prepare for the withdrawal of the Holy Spirit from the church (2 Thess. 2:1-12) prior to the time of Jacob's Trouble and His awful judgments on the Gentiles. Therefore it behooves every loyal Christian to remember our Lord's parable of the wise and foolish virgins and seek diligently to keep their lamps filled with oil (the Holy Spirit) lest we be taken in the snare of Satan and shut out from the marriage supper of the Lamb."

Concerning the great war, Brother Levy points out, "That the late terrible war began on the double anniversary of the destruction of Solomon's and Herod's temples is a truth demanding imperative consideration by all diligent students of prophecy.

"General Allenby expelled the Turks from the upper part of Palestine on the Feast of Tabernacles (Sept. 21-28, 1918). He took Nazareth on the last day of the Feast—the anniversary of the day when Christ cried in the Temple: 'If any man thirst, let him come unto Me and drink' (John 7:37)."

There is a chapter in this book on "The Anglo-Saxons and the Lost Ten Tribes of Israel." Brother Levy fully believes that Great Britain and the United States represent the lost ten tribes of Israel. There are many who believe that this is true, but others are not satisfied with the evidence brought forth by those who believe this. We have met Hebrew brethren who have been in total disagreement with this theory.

Our brother has a deep-seated conviction that, "Our Jewish brethren are free to observe the national rites and ceremonies of Israel when they accept Christ, according to the clear teaching of the New Testament and the practice of Christ and the apostles," and he brings strong arguments to support his convictions. Many of his Hebrew brethren take very strong exception to this viewpoint. Those who attended the 1916 Council meeting will remember that our brother presented a memorial on this line and the brethren present felt incompetent to deal with the matter without going into it very thoroughly, and so postponed any decision concerning the same until such time as the question could be thoroughly

studied. The Protestant Episcopal church at their General Convention held in St. Louis the same month favored Brother Levy's memorial and adopted the same.

Brother Levy prints the words of a song which he addressed to the American Jewish Congress in 1917. We quote a part of this song:

"Messiah, Come! He cannot come to lead us back to Palestine, our ancient happy Jewish home, until your hearts to truth incline. Ah, yes! to Palestine we go when Europe's bloody war shall end, —no human or demonic foe can God's plain purpose backward bend. But not to peace—no! Judah, no!— shall we to Israel's land return, because your hearts are not prepared all fleshly idols yet to burn. Ye seek the peace the world doth give with countless vanities of Time, and not God's peace through Faith's new birth that fits us for the heavenly clime.

"Not till the anti-christ appears and nations to his standard flock, will Jacob's trouble culminate, as shown on God's prophetic clock: our nation will be born again in this approaching travail hour; till then no president or king can Judah save from Satan's power. One, only One, hath conquered him—the Son of God, King David's Son, who rose triumphant from the grave and everlasting victory won. On Him we pierced, our eyes must look with mourning for our nation's guilt, to make the Stone of Stumbling prove the Stone on which our hopes are built. Then He, Messiah, Prince of Peace, will stand again on Olivet, and Armageddon's bloody eve see Judah's sun of sorrow set.

"He meekly rode the ass of old through joyful Salem's festive streets; but when He comes as King of kings, from His white horse all sin retreats. We hail thee now, O sinless morn! O bliss! as King to see Him reign, where glad hosannahs greet His ears from joyful Jewish lips again!

"The Golden Age's holy dawn will then illumine the land and sea, and Love's full orb of glory shine on man's Edenic unity."

NEW ENGLAND DISTRICT COUNCIL

Through the kind assistance and hospitality of Brother and Sister Weaver of Springfield, Mass., many of the pastors and workers in New England, already affiliated with the General Council, met in conference at Bethany Chapel on November 7, and after two days of prayerful consideration reorganized the New England District Council, with Presbyter T. Arthur Lewis of Framingham as chairman, and R. H. Norton of Boston as Secretary-Treasurer.

The conference was highly favored by the presence of Brother Joseph Tunmore of Pittsburg, chairman of the Eastern District Council, who rendered valuable assistance as chairman of the meeting. Sunday: "His peculiar treasure" (Psa. 135:4).

Comforting depth of sweetness of these words for those of us whom the world has misunderstood, despised and rejected. How tender His love to us—His very own, yea, His treasure! Then, as if to stamp indelibly a seal upon our relation to Him, we are called His "peculiar" treasure. Hallelujah! Peculiar in the unique meaning of that word as Webster gives it, denoting possession absolute and unquestioned. Does it not satisfy thine heart, dear pilgrim, alone in a place of testing? For thou art tenderly loved, thou art treasured, thou art owned in surest right by Him who "hath chosen thee . . . unto Himself." How satisfying under every condition to feel we are thus possessed by Him, and that He who loves us with an everlasting love will do all things well even in the bitterest trial.

And though furnace heat surround me,
In my heart there is no fear,
For His love is ever whispering,
"Thou art Mine own treasure dear."

Monday: "Go ye therefore" (Matt. 28:19).

If God has spoken these words to you He means exactly what He says. "Go" does not mean "send" or "pray;" it means for you literally "to go." Supposing the early Christians had evaded this word, taking the command as most of us would rather take it—what progress would the glad tidings of salvation through a resurrected all-powerful Redeemer have made in reaching the darkened? But the disciples, we read, went everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the Word with signs following. Lend your ears, dear young people, and you can no longer question your personal responsibility. The pitiable "fewness" of laborers must break your heart. "Go ye therefore," saith your Lord and Master.

"Uttermost part" is His order,

Dare any answer, 'No'?

What will you do when you meet Him
If you refuse to go?"

Tuesday: "The Lord . . . send thee help from the sanctuary, and strengthen thee out of Zion" (Psa. 20:2).

And when God sends you the help you are asking Him for, it will be just the help you should have. It may come in a different way. It may come from an unlooked for hand. It may come at another hour than you expected—but it is coming right out of God's sanctuary for your peculiar lack, and if you will recognize it as God's own aid you will rejoice to see it will more than meet your fullest need.

Wednesday: "Neither will I offer burnt-offerings unto the Lord my God of that which doth cost me nothing" (2 Sam. 24:24).

Precious Lamb of God—how great the cost of Thine offering for a dying world! How small, how trifling seem our offerings in return! How little do we know

of real cost measured by love's sacrifice. Forgive us, Lord, our selfishness, our ease-loving selfishness. We would give to Thee, we would make Thine offerings of greater value by pouring forth in fulness all of our consecrated lives, disregarding any seeming greatness of the cost.

"Love so amazing, so divine,
Demands my life, my soul, my all."

Thursday: "Thy hand was heavy upon me" (Psa. 32:4).

"When the pressure is sorest, the hand must be nearest. What should we do in suffering if we were left to imagine that it was Satan's hand that presses sore! The hand is the most sensitive member, gifted with the most quick and delicate nerves of touch. When it presses, it instinctively measures the pressure; the contact is the closest possible; the throb which cannot be seen is felt, truly and immediately. This is how His dear hand is pressing you; this is what the pain means."

Friday: "To know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God" (Eph. 3:19).

"I want the love that cannot help but love;

Loving, like God, for very sake of love.

A spring so full that it must overflow,

A fountain flowing from the throne
above."—A. B. S.

Saturday: "Who then is willing to consecrate his service this day unto the Lord?" (1 Chron. 29:5).

"And now that the suffering is over, and the Captainty is won, and we are enrolled to be His faithful soldiers and servants unto our lives' end, is it to be merely a nominal thing on our side? It was no nominal thing on His side. The sufferings of the Lord Jesus were not nominal, and His exaltation to be a Prince as well as a Saviour is not nominal; then shall we dare to treat His orders as merely nominal, and as something to be comfortably explained away, according to circumstances? Oh, if our loyalty were as literal as His love, if our obedience were as literal as His sufferings would there, could there be such want of volunteers to go where He has plainly set up His standard, and such want of free-handed pouring into His treasury, and such want of brave speaking of our heart abundance, and such want of fervent, faithful, persevering echoes of the great prayer, 'Father, glorify Thy Son!'"

QUESTIONS ANSWERED

Q.—How may I lay up treasures in heaven?

The Lord's reply to the rich young man was, "Sell whatsoever thou hast and give to the poor and thou shalt have treasure in heaven."

We are forbidden to pile up money or other treasures for ourselves. All that we have and are belongs to the Lord—we are not our own, but His, therefore all we have is to be disbursed as trust funds. The early Christians "Sold their possessions and goods and parted them to all men, as every man had need" (Acts 2:45). "Neither said any of them that ought of the things which he possessed was his own, for as many as were possessors of lands or houses sold them and brought the price of the things that were sold" (Acts 4:32-35).

Paul suffered the loss of all things for Christ's sake and for the elect's sake, but he described himself as "poor, yet making many rich." (See also Heb. 10:34, 35).

Q.—Who are the seven women spoken of in Isa. 4:1?

A.—This passage is the conclusion of chapter 3. It means that as a result of the crushing judgments on Jerusalem which chapter 3 threatens, such a number of males will perish that women will vastly outnumber the men, and be unable to find any one to marry them. As it is considered in the East to be a disgrace to be unmarried, the women are reduced to the desperate expedient which the prophet foretells.

Q.—One preaches that the four virgin daughters of Philip prophesied at home only, and that this was not preaching. Is this correct?

A.—No, it is not correct, but an entirely arbitrary assertion which cannot be proved from Scripture. No doubt they prophesied at home sometimes, but in 1 Cor. 11:5 the apostle distinctly authorizes the praying and prophesying of women in the church. From this we can see that there would have been nothing to prevent them from sometimes prophesying in the public assembly.

Prophecy is not only the uttering of predictions. It also takes the form of words of edification, exhortation, or comfort when the actual words are chosen by the Holy Spirit, and the speaker becomes His mouthpiece. (1 Cor. 14:3).

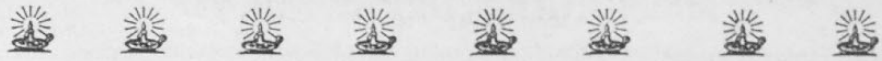
Q.—Please explain Mark 4:26 to 29.

The process of sowing and reaping has a likeness to something in the spiritual realm. There are two applications. (1) to the individual. If he consents to fall into the ground and die, by secret process, known only to God, a quickening takes place and a marvelous harvest of fruitful service ensues. (2) to the world. "The sower soweth the Word." We cannot tell how prayer influences things, nor how conviction comes to the sinner, nor how revivals come, nor how political situations arise to help God's plans. We know that a vast movement is in process, which will result in an unprecedented harvest of souls, but to us it is as though the earth brought forth "of herself." The lesson is:—that God's purposes are advancing to fruition as certainly as an earthly harvest follows seed-sowing. We can have complete confidence in this; we need not worry, we can take our hand off God's work, the latter rain will fall at the right time, nothing will fail.

Q.—What do you think about souls sleeping in the grave?

A.—We are told plainly in Scripture of dead kings being alive in the under-world, and the very words they say are reported. See Isa. 14:9-20; Ezk. 32:31. Lazarus was not asleep in Abraham's bosom. The word "comforted" speaks of conscious enjoyment. The rich man, on the other hand, was consciously tormented. Abraham, too, obviously was not asleep. The Lord's words to the penitent thief denote conscious liberty and victory before that very day should end. Paul would not have considered it better to "depart" if he had expected just to go to sleep. The phrase "fallen asleep" as applied to dead saints (1 Cor. 15:18; 1 Thess. 4:14) refers only to their cessation of activities in our midst. It does not necessarily imply that they are unconscious. It is a figure of speech only.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—She has come and gone, but the fruit of her labors in our midst is quite evident. Evangelist Mrs. Mary T. Miller, of Seattle, Wash. has just concluded a three-month campaign in this city. Scores have accepted God as their personal Saviour and rejoice in the liberty of their new life, and are standing firm in the midst of adversity. Over 100 received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. Sister Miller brought forth some inspiring messages; her evangelistic sermons were aflame with fire and enthusiasm. Thousands were in attendance, it was estimated that around 1200 gained admittance to one evening service. Brother Wigglesworth is a deeply spiritual man of humble mien, and God mightily used him in our midst. Hundreds were prayed for for the healing of their bodies, and some remarkable cures took place through following the simple precepts laid down in the Bible. Several ministers from outside points were present during the services, including Pastor Robt. and Mrs. Gillespie from Bellingham, and many others. We solicit the prayers of the Evangel family.—F. R. 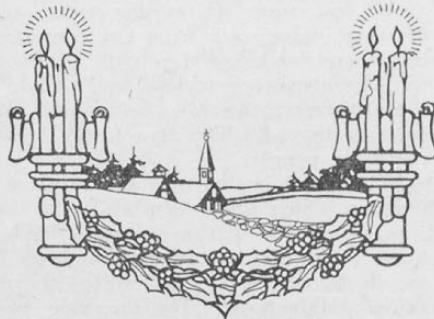

Yes, to have a part in that great Coronation Day we must all be missionaries, and if we cannot go ourselves, we'll send someone else in our stead.

But what about prayer. Yes, it is true, prayer changes things. Besides all that, there's a blessing in prayer, prevailing prayer. So we're going to pray for our missionaries too, and in so doing, we'll not only be a blessing to them but we'll get a blessing in return.—Wm. M. Faux, Missionary Secretary.

Floods in India

Do not forget our Missionaries in your Christmas giving. Let December be our banner month.

"The rainy season just closed, resulting in heavy floods in this part of India. Numberless villages have been swept away just near us as the river, only fifteen minutes walk from our compound, has been flooded. Hundreds of people have been made homeless, and to add to their distress, the rice fields have also been destroyed which is a heavy loss to the poor people.

"The photo is that of a Hindu place of worship which was taken while the flood was rising. It was a structure built of brick about ten feet square and on the top in the center of it is erected the god called 'Mahadeva.' By the side of it stands a huge tree called 'The Pipl tree' which is also very sacred to the Hindu. The three men with the Sadu (holy man) continued their form of worship, seemingly undisturbed by the rising flood which then was only a few inches from reaching them.

"We are put to shame many times as we watch the devoutness of the Hindu in his worship even though he daily bows down before his idols of wood and stone, and which never bring any peace or joy to the soul. We desire the prayers of the saints as we try to do our little bit in this dark land."

CONVENTION IN INDIA

Brother Niels P. Thomsen writes of God's blessing on the convention held at Cawnpore: "The Indian convention was a decided success. There was an interest from the first meeting that did not wane during the whole convention. One of the workers definitely received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. She is blind, but I wish you could see the glory in her soul shining from her face. She is one of God's jewels. A LIBERIAN TESTIMONY

So I love have plenty time with my Lord, every day, every day, every night, every night. We all be one brother now. Let us thank our Lord proper. Our Lord be too sweet, so make we follow Him good. No let any thing make us fool. Only way of John Baptist (repentance) be proper humble way, proper God way. God no like proud man. All we like sheep have gone astray.

"First time I use tobacco, drink rum, I used to fight, and do all wicked thing, but God truly change my heart. I see the way of wicked man be too bad. This time my Lord tell me I must not let my heart be trouble. So let we bow down and worship our great God. First time I think devil doctors be God-people, but this time I know their fashion be different. They no have God's Spirit.

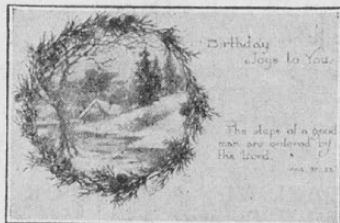

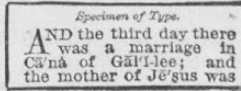

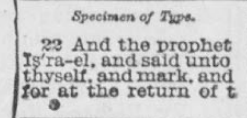
