# "LET US NOW GO EVEN UNTO BETHLEHEM."

"And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth, into Judea, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem; (because he was of the house and lineage of David:) to be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child. And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered. And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn" (Luke 2:4-7).

It was just a common little stable but in it, wrapped in swaddling clothes, was the very Son of God. It was not visited that night by the great scribes and priests and high priests; but a few common, unassuming, simple-hearted shepherds came and saw Him in that stable. That's the way God always does things. When our Lord Jesus chose disciples He chose them from the common people. He did not choose men with their heads full. He chose the simple Galilean fishermen, the fish scales still upon their clothes when He called them. From this humble class of men He chose most of His disciples.

It is the same today. "Ye see your calling, brethren, how that not many wise men after the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble are called." The Lord has chosen the foolish things of the world, the weak things, the base things, the despised, yea the are-nots. The men and women who are willing to come down to this low level are able to have fellowship with the Son of God. I am glad to see the way God deals with things. If we had been doing things and had been starting a religion, we would have chosen a few of the leading Jews, and some of the best of the Greek philosophers, and some of the most prominent of the Roman senators. But not so with our God. If we want to be chosen by Him we must all come down to the same common level of zero, and let Christ be all in all. The Lord has such a way of pouring contempt on the things of earth, and the things which are highly esteemed of men are an abomination to Him.

In that same country of Bethlehem were shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them and they were sore afraid. They were frightened at the glory, but the angel told them not to get scared for he was bringing them good tidings of great joy to all people. Something very wonderful had taken place; that day there had been born in the city of David the One for whom all who looked for redemption in Israel had long been looking, a Saviour, which was Christ, the Lord.

What did these shepherds say? Did they say, "Now let's go over and gather up some of those scientific folks and some of the scribes and let's make an investigation to see whether this thing is true?" No, they forgot their sheep and they said, "Let's go and see." They had never heard a message like that before. This was indeed glad tidings. And so they said, "Let's go." And cannot we echo the words today and say, "Let's go"? And they found HIM; and when your heart is humble like that of those shepherds you will find HIM too. We will find Him, and when we do, we will return like those shepherds

glorifying and praising God for all the things we have heard and seen concerning our wonderful Jesus.

No one told those shepherds to praise. But they had seen Him, and the praise came bubbling up out of their hearts. You may be as stiff as some Presbyterians I have met, but if you once see this wonderful Jesus the praises of God are likely to break out from you at any time. These simple shepherds made known abroad the saying which had been told them concerning this Child; and when you have really met with this blessed Jesus of ours you will want to spread abroad His fame, and will spend your days glorifying and praising God for His unspeakable gift of Jesus Christ.

When the angel had announced the good tidings of great joy, suddenly there appeared with him a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." I somehow believe that those angels are still happy because they had the privilege of bringing that message. As they looked down from heaven they must have considered the need of the world. Everybody needed Jesus. The whole world needed Jesus. Even in Israel, in that nation to which God had been so gracious, things were in a very sad condition, the religious leaders were teaching for doctrines the commandments of men and overlooking the weightier matters of the law—judgment, mercy, and faith.

There is no doubt in my mind that those angels would have been glad to have preached the gospel. But God has given to us the exclusive privilege and right. You will remember that in the case of Cornelius the angel did not bring Him the gospel, but told him to send for Peter; and it was Peter's privilege to tell them all about Jesus of Nazareth whom God had anointed with the Holy Ghost and with power, so that He went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed of the devil, for God was with Him. Since God has given us this privilege, let us see that we get the message out even to the ends of the earth. The great business that we have on hand is to preach this gospel to every creature (Mark 16:15).

There is one word to which I want to call your attention. It is the word "suddenly!" "And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host." God does some things suddenly. Some people cannot understand God doing things immediately. When they pray they don't expect an immediate answer. Some have the idea that perhaps a million years from now they might possibly get an answer to their prayers. Some when they want to get saved think they have to leave off this and cut out that other thing, and by some means or other rise to higher heights and get their head filled with all the philosophy of religion, and they think that when they have done all this themselves, this self-attainment will prove acceptable to God. This is ridiculous. It is foolish. Alas, a great many men don't expect God to do things now. But God does things and does them suddenly. When you want to live better, just bring your sins to the Saviour, this Saviour that was born in Bethlehem. You are not your own saviour. Christian Science makes out that you are. But I want to tell you that you can never lift yourself into

glory by your own boot straps. But you can come to God when you are "knocked out," when you are down and out and utterly wretched; and the worse you are, the easier it is to get saved. Seek this precious Saviour, seek Him who declares, "Him that cometh unto Me I will in no wise cast out." Him and I assure you that you will find Him, for "He that seeketh, findeth."

Suppose you are a liar. You want to reform and you make up your mind you will only tell three lies next week, and only two the week after, then the next week only one, and the following week you won't tell any at all. This is the idea of self-improvement that many have. If this was the way of salvation we would get all the glory for it ourselves. But praise God, it isn't the way of salvation. You just come to the Lord Jesus Christ and He effects a quick transformation. He will make you a new creation and He will do it suddenly.

There is a popular notion about getting filled with the Spirit, that you just grow into the thing. Now I have nothing to say against growing in grace, and I recognize that our spiritual growth is a gradual matter; but when it comes to our being filled with the Spirit, we don't grow into this experience. You do not receive just a little each day till at last you become full. I would advise you to read the second chapter of Acts and see how the Spirit came at the beginning. "And suddenly there came a sound from heaven." And when the Spirit fell they were all filled "And suddenly there came a sound from and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance. It won't take you forty years to be filled with the Spirit, neither will it take you ten weeks. You can come to the Lord in simplicity, you can come now, and God will give you the greatest Christmas gift you ever had.

### THE NAME OF JESUS Its Power and Potency

"The angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a dream, saying, Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost. And she shall bring forth a Son, and thou shalt call His name JESUS: for He shall save His people from their sins."

In the last book of the Bible we read, "The revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave unto Him." "I, Jesus, have sent mine angel to testify unto you these things in the churches" (Rev. 22:16). "At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow" (Phil. 2:10).

The angel was commissioned to give His name. He, who was the Son of God, the Emmanuel, was given the name Jesus, "for He shall save His people from their sins."

It was the name by which the heavenly Son was to be known on earth, and He retains that name

throughout time and throughout eternity.

And when they crucified Him they set over His head this accusation, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." Jesus the Saviour! Jesus the King! He is proclaimed as the One who saves from sin and also as the King of the Jews. At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow, and every tongue shall confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father.

This is God's chosen name, the name that was to remain, "for He shall save His people from their sins." Saviour! Seeing this is His name, God-given, and that His is a God-given office and work, Satan, in virtue of his character and office, must of necessity endeavor to undo or detract from the office and power of this name. So it is either taken in vain, or if held in respect, His name is coupled with the names of other leaders and reformers of the ages. He is robbed of His origin, robbed of His divinely appointed position, and robbed of His ultimate position as Ruler of the Jews and supreme Ruler of all mankind.

God wants His people, through the power of the Spirit, to realize the power associated with, linked up with, and belonging to the name of Jesus the Son of God. "Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in My name, He will give it you. It is coming to the Father of the Lord Jesus Christ and asking in the name of Jesus.

Peter said, "Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee; in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk." "And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations" (Luke 24:47). "In my name shall they cast out devils." In His name, signs, wonders, manifestations, revelations, may be expected.

The more Satan tries to detract from the Godhead of Jesus of Bethlehem and of Nazareth, so God will correspondingly own, magnify, glorify that name in the mouth of His believing people.

They threatened the disciples to speak no more in that name, but the more they threatened the more they prayed: "Grant unto Thy servants, that with all boldness they may speak Thy word, by stretching forth Thine hand to heal; and that signs and wonders may be done by the name of Thy holy child Jesus.' The men of the Council said, "Let us straitly threaten them, that they speak henceforth to no man in this name." And they called them, and commanded them not to speak at all nor teach in the name of Jesus. But they prayed the more in that name that they might speak with all boldness in that name. God took notice of the threats of the Sanhedrin by granting the disciples greater power and greater faith in that name.

Opposition to the Deity of Jesus from the enemies of God, should only incite God's people to pray for, expect, believe for, greater power, greater signs, greater wonders to be done in the name. "It is time for Thee, Lord, to work; for they have made void Thy law.

If Christ is to come shortly in the might of His power, scattering His enemies before Him, and slaying them with the breath of His mouth, God's people

have a right to expect an earnest of it now.

There was a herald in the form of John the Baptist before His first coming, and God is sending, will send, and must send a herald and heralds proclaiming the coming of the glorified One in power and might. If He cannot get one class of people whom He has called, He will raise another to carry out His commands and to preach the gospel in demonstration of the Spirit and of power.

# A TRUE CHRISTMAS STORY Percy Bristow

When I was in Kalgan, China, I heard a Dutch missionary tell the following true story:

"I was living on an island in Holland in a comfortable home where every luxury was provided. My father and mother were atheists and taught us children that if we wished to find God we were to look inward. We were a happy, contented family, but one day my only sister when passing a mission was attracted by the bright singing and went in, and there she heard the story of redeeming love. She bought a New Testament, took it home and read it continually, but did not let our parents know about it.

"There is a custom in Holland for the better-class families, that three weeks before the marriage of a daughter the guests are invited to the home to visit and feast and make merry. My sister was to be married and there were scores of guests gathered for a three-weeks celebration of the wedding. The custom is that the bride appears before all the guests in her bridal attire the night before the wedding.

"The last night had come and my sister came down to the guests dressed as a bride; but while she was standing amongst them a homorrhage came and she rushed upstairs, mother following her. Doctors were sent for, but they gravely shook their heads and said there was no hope. While mother stood there weeping, my sister called her and said, "Mother, don't weep." Then she told about the time when she had gone into the mission and heard of the love of the Saviour, and how she had bought a New Testament and had been reading it. Then, handing the Testament to mother, she asked her to promise to read it and to meet her in heaven. Then she passed away.

"The sudden death of her only daughter affected my mother's mind, and she was taken to another part of the country in care of a nurse. While there she kept her promise and began reading the Testament, and before long had found peace and salvation.

"In a year's time she was able to go home, and when she went down to breakfast the first morning she put the New Testament in my infidel father's hand and asked him to read about the Philippian jailor. In a rage he pushed the book back and said she was beside herself. I had been at college studying law, but came home for a vacation, and mother asked me to go to church with her. To please my mother I went along; and when I saw in the pulpit a bright, intelligent young preacher, I said, 'What is that fool doing there wasting his time and talents?' I went home and tried to rest, but there was no rest nor peace for me. About midnight I arose, knocked at my mother's door, and asked her to pray for me, and that very night I found salvation.

"Then I told my father I was going back to college to study for the ministry. Father said, 'There cannot be two wills in this house. If you go back and study law I will defray expenses, but if you study for the ministry don't look to me for college funds." I was determined to go through with God and went back to college, but the splendid suite of rooms I had had before had to be given up and a small, single room taken instead. My books had to be sold one by one, then my clothing was sold. Christmas time came and I expected there would surely be a letter from my father containing money, but none came.

"Just before retiring Christmas Eve I received my father's visiting card, but I put it to one side, saying to myself, 'I won't pay any attention to it, my father has neglected me for so long; still I love my father.' I went to rest, but there was no rest for me, so I got up and looked for my father's card. Seeing that he was staying at a nearby hotel I decided to go to see him. Father received me warmly and broke the news that he had found my mother's God. We had a glorious prayer meeting together and then father told me he was willing to pay my way through college as a minister of Jesus Christ. Now I am in China preaching the unsearchable riches of Christ, and father is one in the battle with me." Hallelujah to Jesus!

"When I was a boy," said Charles Inwood, "I remember once, and only once, seeing some tailors working at white work. If I remember correctly they were making some white waistcoats, which were very fashionable at that time. # THE CHRISTMAS GIFT—CHRIST, THE WISDOM OF GOD

"Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a Son, and they shall call His name Immanuel, which, being interpreted, is, God with us" (Matt. 1:23).

This was God's great gift to man. Jesus Christ was Emmanuel—God with us—God in man, in order that

man might be raised to God's standard.

There was only one Emmanuel. We are not all Emmanuels as is taught by many. God was incarnate in one Man, the Son of man and Son of God. Adam was made in God's image. Sin came in and spoiled the image. The vessel was marred, and the Potter had to make a new vessel—Christ, the wisdom of God. Christ is the divine perfection of divine wisdom, He is the first and the last, the first new man and the standard of the last man. Adam was made; Christ the Son of man was God from heaven—God with us.

Yea, Christ was more than God's pattern, more than God's standard. He was God's requirement for man. If any man be in Christ Jesus he is a new creation, and the old Adam is passed away. It was not the old skins with new wine in them. It was a new skin for the new wine. And God can be Emmanuel—God with us—only if we as individuals have accepted

Christ-you in Christ and Christ in you.

Man's standard is as far removed from God's standard as a blade of grass in height is short of the distance to the sun. The sun can influence the blade of grass; but the blade of grass cannot influence the sun. Satan said, "Ye shall be as gods." Satan is trying to make men believe they are gods, and he and his dupes are both satisfied. Satan can counterfeit the work of the Spirit; but he can never do the Spirit's work. "Ye must be born again"—born of the Spirit. To as many as received Him, the Lord Jesus Christ, to them gave He power to become the sons of God. Men, comparing themselves with themselves, are not wisetelling men they have the spark of God in themselves and they must cultivate it. There must be a definite receiving of an outside power, of an outside life-the divine Spirit quickening the life within. Christ is the wisdom of God, the standard, and nothing less than the likeness to, the nature of, the essence of Christ in you, can satisfy God. Partakers of the divine nature! It is an imparted gift. Satan says, "You are gods already." Christ said, "Ye must be born again." The Spirit of life is offered to lead all into life if they will have it.

Christ is the wisdom of God, and Christ is offered. God wants to unfold to the receptive soul His riches, the riches of His glory, the riches of His grace, the riches of His love, the riches of His healing power, the riches of His wisdom, the riches of His compassion, the hidden riches, the unnamed riches, the unspeakable riches, the inexhaustible riches, the wealth of unexplored riches, the height, depth, length, breadth—the incomprehensible made comprehensible. In Him are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge, the glories and majesty of the Godhead.

In Him dwells all the fulness of the Godhead bodily. Christ is the divine depository of God Himself in human frame. God has given His Son in order that every man, every human being, who comes into relationship with Christ, may be partaker of the riches. And to those who have accepted Christ the Holy Spirit says, "Ye are complete in Him." Heirs of God, and joint-heirs with Jesus Christ! It is more than a partnership. It is a relationship—bone of His bone, flesh of His flesh. All is available, but only, however,

inside the kingdom. There is a gulf fixed between the natural man and the spiritual man. The natural man receives not, cannot receive, never will receive, the things of God, the things of the Spirit. Try to teach the ape philosophy or the dog astronomy—it is easier than to try to teach the natural man the things of God. They are foolishness unto him, the Word says.

The monkey would think the philosopher a fool to try to teach him philosophy. The monkey does not think he is a fool, he thinks the philosopher is a fool. Foolishness! The natural man thinks the spiritual man is a fool to try to teach things that do not belong to this world. These are earthly, sensual, devilish. Light has no fellowship with darkness. A Timely One of our readers, Brother Tussey of Santa Cruz, Cal-Protest ifornia, sends us at this time a protest against believers celebrating the event of Christmas in a worldly manner. He writes, "A study of the Bible fails to show the date or season of Christ's birth. Back in the Babylonish period there was a queen who ordained her own worship. Now we all would like to remember the day on which our Redeemer was born; but since we do not know the date, I would suggest that we quit observing a date set aside by that Babylonish woman in favor of her son Yule. He smote the rock that the water gushed out; can He give breadalso? Can He provide flesh for His people?' If they had been asked whether God could provide streams in the desert, they would have answered, 'Yes. God has done it.' He could do it again. But when the thought came of God doing something new, they limited Him; their

expectation could not rise beyond their past experience, or their own thoughts of what was possible. Even so we may be limiting God by our conceptions of what He has promised to do. Do let us beware of limiting the Holy One of Israel in our very prayers. Let us believe that the very promises of God we plead have a divine meaning, infinitely beyond our thoughts of them. Let us believe that His fulfillment of them can be in a power and an abundance of grace beyond our largest grasp of thought. And let us therefore cultivate the habit of waiting on God, not only for what we think we need, but for all His grace and power are ready to do for us.'

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED By W. H. M.

Q.—Did Jesus bear our sins on the cross ONLY, or was His life also propitiatory, ending in His blood being our sacrifice, that we might live as He lived? I know He was "God manifest in the flesh," but was that "flesh" human nature as it came from Adam with the sin principle? Of course this could be, as it was I believe, for us, and not for Himself.

A .- The Scripture says: "Who Himself bare our sins in His own body on the tree" (1 Peter 2:24). "Christ died for tree" (1 Peter 2:24). "Christ died for our sins" (1 Cor. 15:3). "Christ also hath once suffered (this word is translated 'died' in A. S. V. margin) for sins, the just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit" (1 Peter 3:18). It was on the tree that the sacrifice was offered, not whilst He was walking about in Palestine, for a sacrifice of BLOOD was necessary, the life must be poured out. Without shedding of BLOOD—involving death—there could be no remission of sins. The life of Christ was one long preparation for Calvary. But His sufferings during His lifetime were because they "hated Him without a cause," "for envy" they delivered Him. He exemplified the truth and the world hated Him for that reason. It was necessary that He should be tested and tempted at all points and proved sinless, as only an unblemished sacrifice could prove acceptable to God. Christ was without the sin-principle which we inherit from Adam. He had a perfectly pure human body, but free from the taint of sin in any respect.

# Q.—Do you think we have another chance after death?

A.—This must be entirely decided by Scripture evidence. Everywhere, in Scripture, sinners are exhorted to get right with God NOW (Job 22:21; Eccles 12:1; Isa. 1:18; Acts 17:30, 31; 2 Cor. 6:2) and they are warned: "Boast not thyself of tomorrow"— i. e. "Do not rely on having another chance." The Lord says that they will have to pay the uttermost farthing when once they get into prison (Matt. 5:26). Not the least hope was held out to the rich man in Hades (Luke 16:25-31), nor yet to the people who rejected Christ: "Ye shall die in your sins; whither I go ye cannot come" (John 8:21). They had nothing to look for but "a certain fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation." The Lord does not allow His servants to encourage sinners to take risks by offering them hope beyond the grave. The gospel invitation is for today only.

Q.—Would it be committing adultery in the heart for young or old men to admire the beauty of young women and maidens if they are single? In other words, would the natural attraction of the two sexes be considered sin or adultery in the heart?

A.—No. Natural attraction is not sin. It is perfectly lawful for a man to leave father and mother and be joined to a wife. Beauty comes from God, and may be lawfully recognized and admired. But

great care is necessary. Beauty is vain (Prov. 31:30) and is often used to ensnare, sometimes unconsciously, but not seldom, designedly. It is not a sure index of a beautiful soul. A man will surely lust in his heart if he wantonly feasts himself on female beauty. No man dare trust his own heart; none by himself can control his thoughts. The human "heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked," but if there is a true desire for God to guide He will give the needed discretion and enable one to discern the true from the false and not be carried away by a beauty which is on the surface only. The true safeguard is to be filled with the Spirit, with our eyes and heart entirely under His control. We need to pray the prayer of Ps. 26:2, which should read FINE my reins and my heart,' so that we will desire and choose in others that which is esteemed by God.

Q.—In what way do the "Three" spoken of in 1 John 5:7 bear record in heaven, and in what way do they bear witness in verse 8?

A.—In this passage the R. V. makes a correction. The words from and including "in heaven" (v 7) to and including "in earth" (v. 8) are omitted, because they are not found in any Greek manuscript before the fifteenth century; reducing the entire section to the words "For there are three that bear witness, the Spirit, and the water, and the blood, and the three agree in one.

The blood witnesses in heaven (Heb. 9:12; 12:24). It "speaketh" in God's presence of expiation and full satisfaction made for our sins. The water speaks of cleansing, as applied to our conscience and is a symbol of the Word of God. Jesus says, "Now ye are clean by the Word which I have spoken unto you" (John 15:3). See also Eph. 5:26, "That He might sanctify and cleanse it (the church) with the washing of water by the Word."

The Spirit witnesses in the presence of God's throne (Rev. 4:5), and also in our hearts (Rom. 8:16; John 14:17).

# PENTECOST SPREADS IN CALIFORNIA

We have just closed a gracious meeting at Fresno, Calif. Our first visit to this city was in 1915. We assisted the pastor Will E. Opie of Bethel Church who at that time had a very small struggling assembly of less than fifty mem-

bers, which was one of the hardest battles I have ever fought and the results were just fair, but on this visit we were greatly surprised to note that the work in this city has grown to such large proportions. Bethel Church now seats about nine hundred fifty people and has now a membership of over seven hundred, and besides in this city there is another large work of about the same membership, "The Full Gospel Association," both of which works are in unity and have occasional union meetings. Sister McPherson's campaign in this city was a great asset to the Pentecostal work.

Sunday morning, Nov. 25th, we opened our campaign at Bethel Church, a real spirit of the Lord permeated the place as days of prayer preceded this campaign. The services opened with a sunrise prayer meeting beginning at 5:30 a. m. in the morning at which almost one hundred of the saints attended. The power of God fell in the evening service and several were saved and a great number were healed, over seven hundred attended the evening service and the crowds increased every night until the big auditorium which seats over nine hundred was packed to its capacity. Every night souls were saved, healed and baptized in the Holy Spirit. Thanksgiving evening was a great night of rejoicing, four chronic seekers were baptized in the Holy Spirit bringing great joy to the congregation and four remarkable conversions.

A wonderful miracle happened on Monday night. A request for prayer which read as follows was laid on the pastor's desk: "Please pray for a little girl who is very low with spinal meningitis." The church went to prayer with the many requests which came in and also remembered the little girl especially in prayer. Nothing more was heard or thought of regarding the case until Wednesday night when the pastor found the following note on the pulpit, "The little girl with spinal meningitis who was prayed for on Monday evening was definitely healed, she was unconscious twenty-four hours, had eleven convulsions, had two blind spells, one lasting an hour, the mother sends

We have rarely ever seen since the early days of Pentecost such wonderful alter services. Such earnest altar workers I have seldom found. I have long since seen that real altar work and altar workers are the secret of success in a revival meeting. "Lord, give us more real altar workers." From one hundred and twenty-five to two hundred seekers and workers crowded the altar night after night until the small hours of the morning. Whole families, father, mother, sons and daughters who had grown discouraged with formalism and coldness in their churches, turned out to the meetings, started to Sunday school and sought the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. The meetings have not closed but are going on in glory and power. May God bless Brother Opie who after years of labor and toil has been rewarded by this great work. Our next meeting will be in Bakersfield, Calif., beginning Dec. 10th.

Mrs. Black and I have been laboring exclusively this year in California up and

down the coast and we praise God for the way the Pentecostal message is spreading throughout the State. Churches are springing up everywhere. Before coming to Fresno we dedicated a forty thousand dollar church in Lodi, where we had a gracious outpouring. We were assisted by Evangelist Clarence H. Erickson and his wife.

The work started here under the labors of Dr. Charles Price who is now having great fame on the Evangelistic field. Dr. Price had a campaign here with Sister McPherson and the whole country around for miles was stirred, and the work in Lodi is growing by leaps and bounds and the official board are planning on active aggressive work for the coming months. Evangelist J. McConnell and wife succeeded me there and are now pushing a big revival effort.

Before coming to Lodi, Mrs. Black and I held a week-end rally with Dr. Towner of the First Baptist Church in San Jose. Dr. Towner has a constant revival in his church the year round. He took in some fifty members who joined the church the last Sunday we were there. In the evening I preached to almost one thousand people. Our souls were inspired at the large band of young people who are on fire for God. Dr. Towner has established a School of Divinity in connection with his church and delivers lectures there daily, besides a Gospel Mission which he has established in the down town section where meetings are held every night in the year. San Jose, also has another large work under the leadership of Brother Friemark, a converted Hebrew.

We conducted successful meetings in Sacramento and Oakland where the Pentecostal work is in a flourishing condition. Brother Craig in San Francisco has outgrown his quarters and plans are on foot for a new building. This year the student body is the largest in the history of the work. While in the southern part of the state, time and space forbid me going into details, but we praise God; God's truth is marching onward. spent three weeks in the Angelus Temple with Sister McPherson and sang and preached in a number of her meetings, and words are too inadequate to de scribe the scene. At one tarrying service in the "Upper Room" the Spirit of God fell in such a way, I shall never forget it. Mrs. McPherson began to play in the power of the Spirit on the piano and a spirit of praise and song took possession of the audience, and some got the Baptism in the Holy Spirit in their seats, and it was almost twelve o'clock before one person left the room. Miracles of healing are common in every service. At one healing service in the afternoon over two hundred and fifty sinners knelt for salvation. At that service I prayed for one old man weeping for salvation and when I asked for his age, he told me he was 103 years old. While at the Bethel Temple of which our beloved Brother Eldridge is pastor, numbers are turned away at the morning services and a great work is being done, and souls are continually seeking God. To God be all the glory.

# GOD ANSWERS PRAYER IN THE LAND OF THE PHARAOHS

Going south from the Mediterranean the rains become slighter until Cairo is reached, and farther south very little rain used to be seen except in the winter, Hence houses are not built to be protected from the rains. Brother and Sister Doney tell us the rains have come very much earlier this year. In fact the rains have been greatly increasing for the last five or six years until the streets often are flooded in places from curb to curb. Last spring their mission and school were flooded with water. Because of this, and because the school has so increased, it was necessary for them to have better and larger quarters. They have therefore been looking out not only for a mission and schoolhouse, but also for living rooms for the missionaries, but to no avail. They had arranged to give up their house on the first of November, and three days before the first no house was to be had. In the place they wanted, only one apartment was available, the occupant of the lower floor refusing to move, although their lease had run out. The agent offered to pay him if he would move, but he still refused to leave. The rains had again flooded their mission and schoolhouse in the meantime. As they were in such dire need of a house, they decided to take the one flat and trust God to give them more rooms soon. They signed the contract on Monday and moved on Wednesday. It rained most of Tuesday, and Wednesday they moved between showers, with no harm to the goods. Then there was a cloud-burst.

It meant some planning to put one hundred children into five rooms and live there too, but what else could they do? They began to clean and make ready for them, and the next day the man offered to give them the rooms if they would renew their promise, and on Saturday he handed over the keys. Sister Doney says, "When God saw we were willing to live and have school in the same apartment, he gave us the part we needed. Thank God! He loves and cares for His own."

They had one hundred scholars Nov. 4th, and no doubt after moving into larger and better quarters the number will be increased, and if they get the needed help they can take in between two hundred and three hundred children. Pray that God will send some one soon.

This is a very needy section of the city, where there is no school near. The nearest ones are Catholic and Moslem. This is on the outskirts of a section which has been practically untouched by the Gospel. God laid this part of the city on their hearts for weeks. One day having fasting and prayer, they became burdened with strong crying and tears all day. In the afternoon Miss Salyer was to take a lesson in Arabic, but she could not check the tears. Her teacher was a theological student of the Presbyterian College and she told him of the burden on her heart. They got down and had prayer together and soon after this God in a most wonderful way, gave them three prayer meetings in this section of the city.

There are no free schools in Egypt. There are so many that cannot pay the fee in the native schools, and it is for this class that God has lead them to open their school. You ask, "Does it pay to have schools?" We answer, "Yes, most assuredly, for first we get into homes and lives that we could not in any other way, and we get the Gospel into the young hearts which is sure to bring forth fruit in after years."

#### A GREAT OPPORTUNITY

The Lord laid upon the heart of our beloved brother Tommy Anderson and his wife a burden concerning the great need among the Indians in Bolivia. God bless them. It is this. To get the Gospel to the people we must begin with the children and train young men to become missionaries. To do this they need a home for children and young men. Some will be real slaves which were bought and sold; some will be from the savage tribes. Their aim is to first free them from slavery and barbarity, then Jesus will save them and free them from all sin. They are then to be trained and sent out to the various tribes with the full Gospel message of our Lord.

After much prayer and work they are convinced that this is the only way to reach the people in general, and savage tribes who never yet have been reached by a missionary. There is no such institution as this in all Bolivia. They can rent small houses to live in but not large enough for that kind of work. Should they rent, they may be put out any time, because the people are fanatical and easily influenced. Neither will they repair these houses but leave them with leaking roofs and walls falling in because of the heavy rains. They need one block of land for a Full Gospel Mission, Bible Training School, and Orphanage. This would enable them to raise their own vegetables and fruit, and in a few years' time make the institution self-supporting. It would require more than \$3000.00 to buy the land and erect the buildings, but at present they could get well started with that amount. They are in perfect harmony and fellowship with the Foreign Missions Department and property would be held by the General Council of the Assemblies of God. This is a most worthy cause and an opportune moment to become entrenched in Bolivia for aggressive missionary work. The Missionary Treasurer will gla 'ly receive and forward all monies that might be donated for that special purpose. The project has the official endorsement of the Foreign Missions Department. May the Lord put it in the hearts of our people to give liberally toward this worthy cause.

#### GREAT DROUTH IN TRANSVAAL

Miss Hannah James writes from Middelburg, Transvaal, "The heat is so terrible here this year. We have had no rain beyond a shower since September 17th and the ground is so hot that our feet blister through our shoes as we walk over it. Even big trees in some places are dying from lack of moisture, and farmers are killing their lambs so as to preserve if possible the ewes.


