ND he was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. And, behold, there was a woman which had a-spirit of infirmity eighteen years, and was bowed together, and could in no wise lift up herself. And when Jesus saw her, he called her to him, and said unto her, Woman, thou art loosed from thine infirmity. And he laid his hands on her: and imme-diately she was made straight, and glorified God. And the ruler of the synagogue answered with indignation, because that Jesus had healed on the sabbath day, and said unto the people, There are six days in which men ought to work: in them therefore come and be healed, and not on the sabbath day. The Lord then answered him, and said, Thou hypocrite,

doth not each one of you on the sabbath loose his ox or his ass from the stall, and lead him away to watering? And ought not this woman, being a daughter of Abraham, whom Satan hath bound, lo, these eighteen years, be loosed from this bond on the sabbath day?" (Luke 13:10-16).

A triangle fight. The woman bound by Satan, Christ the liberator, and the ruler of the synagogue bound by tradition. Formalism in antagonism to liberty of the Spirit. The ruler of the synagogue would rather see a whole sabbath-or a sabbath whole in his estimation-than a whole woman. He would rather see a loosed ox than a loosed daughter of Abraham. He had more regard for his stock than for the stock from which he and the woman descended. He got so brutal that he would rather attend to the brute beast than to attend to and minister to a daughter of Abraham.

Christ and the woman. He recognized her as a daughter of Abraham, not a backslider, not a hypocrite. He recognized also that which nobody else had recognized, that Satan had bound her and He knew how long. He made no accusation against the woman. He did not say it was her fault. He did not say she was unfaithful nor that she had failed God somewhere. Man's ingenuity in explaining why the saints are sick is greater than his estimation of Christ's grace.

He never blamed her for all the money she spent upon doctors and He never made her promise that she would give up doctors and medicines, and that if she did this He would heal her. The healing was spontaneous, without condition, irrespective of anything that had gone before. Christ had come to undo, to destroy, the work of Satan and to set the captive free, and that was not brought about by questioning the woman, criticizing her or bringing into doubt her relationship to Abraham. Because she was a daughter of Abraham, that was the one reason she should be set free.

He who was ruler of the synagogue and ministered to the children of Abraham should have rejoiced that a daughter of Abraham was set free. The mask was removed by the Master, instead of being a minister Christ called him a hypocrite. Lots of ministers who are fighting healing done in the name of Jesus are one day going to have the mask removed by the Master and be called hypocrites. In their hearts they would rather see a person suffer than the power of Jesus as Healer be manifested. This ruler was apparently the perfection of orthodoxy, but Christ ex-posed him before his congregation as a hypocrite. Christ is going to do the same, either in time or eternity, to all those who oppose healing done in His name. "Woe unto you scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye shut up the kingdom of heaven against men; for ye neither go in yourself, neither suffer ye them that are entering to go in" (Matt. 23:13).

"And when he had said these things, all his adversaries were ashamed: and all the people rejoiced for all the glorious things that were done by him" (Luke 13:17). The ruler and his com-pany in the synagogue of God were called Christ's "adversaries," but the people rejoiced; and it is the ecclesiastical enemies today that are fighting Christ in His ministrations of mercy. But in spite of the adversaries, Christ will do His work and the people, the common people, will rejoice.

From henceforth that woman would be a marked woman by the adversaries, but as long as Satan's mark was off, and the thrill of life from those divine, tender hands was upon her, she cared naught for the ruler and his colleagues.

"A SAFE HIDING PLACE" Pastor J. S. Norvell at Bethel Temple, Los Angeles, Calif.

"Behold a king shall reign in righteousness, and princes shall rule in judgment. And **a man** shall be as a hiding place from the wind, and a covert from the tempest; as rivers of water in a dry place, as the shadow of a great rock in a weary land" (Isa. 32:1, 2).

The first thing I wish to bring out of this second verse is "a man." Hallelujah! "A man shall be as an hiding place from the wind." And this man is Christ. This Old Testament, in its law and its ordinances, in its prophecy and poetry, was all given to bring out Christ. Here we have a full-length portrait of the pavilion that meets every need of yours. God Himself has brought us into that pavilion.

Turn to 1 Tim. 2:5, "For there is one God, and one mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus;" or, as the Revised Version has it, "For there is one God, one mediator also between God and men, himself man, Christ Jesus."

So then He is this hiding place, for both sinners and saints. He is my hiding place. He was the city of refuge for the sinner, who could flee to that city of refuge and find absolute deliverance from the law the law of execution.

But now that I am in Christ, and still in this old world, there are many foes. But we find in Luke 1: 69-74 that this salvation which He provided redeemed us from the hand of all our enemies, . . . and out of the hand of all that hate us."

Even to a child of God there are many perils; but if you know your hiding place (and that is by faith), not one of them can ever touch you. "That wicked one toucheth him not." It is because I am in Christ, this hiding place. Praise the Lord! He is a refuge. Turn to Psa. 143:9, "Deliver me, O

He is a refuge. Turn to Psa. 143:9, "Deliver me, O Lord, from mine enemies: I flee unto Thee to hide me." Oh, how sweet! the real thought is brought out in the margin, "I flee unto Thee, hide me with Thee." Hallelujah!

Friend, when the enemy comes in like a flood, all you have to say to him is, "Jesus is my defense;" and he will go away, will slink back into his darkness; and you can walk on as though nothing had disturbed you. Do not be disturbed. There is nothing that can harm you or disturb you.

When these attacks come say to the enemy, "You can do nothing against me, for I am in Christ."

"For in the time of trouble He shall hide me in His pavilion: in the secret of his tabernacle shall He hide me; He shall set me up upon a rock" (Psa. 27:5). How many of you are going to believe God's word? If you believe God's word you can go out of here in that safety box. (Brother Eldridge had referred to all he had committed to God as being in Christ: God's Safety Box.)

I visited a sister the other day who was at the point of death. She said to me, "I have not slept during the night. Our bank burned down. We had a few papers there in the safety vault and I was so disturbed that I could not sleep." I wanted to say, "Oh, foolish woman, almost ready to die, and disturbed over the loss of a few deeds that could have been reproduced at a cost of about \$4.00!" I said to the husband, "We must allay this woman's fears, because they are making her sick." I asked him if there was any danger to his papers, and he said, "I have just had word from the bank, and they are safe."

If we could believe God in the time of trouble, He would hide us in His pavilion. In the secret of His tabernacle would He hide us. "He shall set me upon a rock."

Now what is that hiding place? "And be found in Him, not having mine own righteousness, which is of the law, but that which is through the faith of Christ, the righteousness which is of God by faith" (Phil. 3:9).

A few months ago a Pentecostal preacher here in California came to me and said, "Do you know where I could get a good promising mine? I want to convert everything I have into money and get away back into the mountains somewhere and get a good mine, because awful disasters are coming upon the earth and I want to build up a little community so that when these disasters come the saints can go there and be safe."

I said, "Brother, I have a better place than that. I know disasters are coming. Hallelujah! I am glad they are coming, because it presages the near coming of the Lord; and I am glad that I am here on earth to see them come; and I am not afraid for them to come."

"Where is that place?"

I answered, "I ran into Christ and all hell can never find me." If you find your place in Christ, let the disasters come.

"And be found in Him!"

I have heard some people say in their testimony that when the devil comes he does not find them at home.

The reason he cannot do anything against me when he comes is because he finds me at home. Hallelujah! I am in Christ. Hallelujah! He cannot get at me. He snarls and growls and makes an effort, but I don't care how much he scratches at the door. Christ is the door and the almighty power of the eternal God protects me if he tries to touch me. I am in God. Praise the Lord.

Mr. Moody told us a story from Henry Moorehouse. At one time Henry Moorehouse was going through a certain part of London and entered the zoological gardens. On that day they were having a contest in the gardens. A number of men had brought their little rat terriers there and were having a contest similar to the cock fights they used to have in this country. They would put their little terriers down into a pit with a rat and have their dogs kill as many rats as they could in a certain number of minutes. One man, a cockney, had a terrier that had killed more rats than any other, and had won all the cash that had been put into the gambling pool. He said, "I will bet that my dog can kill twenty-five rats in one minute, and all put into the pit at once."

When they put the little dog into the pit with the rats they all jumped on to him at once. He killed as many of them as he could, but the rats were too many for him and in a little while he was fainting. The man took him out and lost his bet; and his reputation and his pride were hurt. When some of the people were gone he kicked and beat the dog until he was limp. While he was doing that and some of the men were laughing at him, the man who fed the lions and tigers came along with great pieces of raw meat for

the animals. As he opened the cage to put the meat in for the lions, the owner of the little dog was so angry that he picked him up and put him into the lion's cage, hoping to see the lion tear him to pieces.

It is a well-know fact that many wild animals will protect a crippled one. When the door was shut the great lion came up and licked and fondled the little wounded dog and got right over him growling at the men when they came to look.

As some of the men were going out of the garden they met the general keeper of the gardens and told him what had happened and that the man threw his little dog in to the lion, hoping to see him torn to pieces, but that the lion protected the dog and tried to get the man. The keeper came to the cage, looked with great surprise and said, "How did that little dog get in the lion's cage?" The owner stepped up and said, "Keeper, that is my dog." "Indeed, and how did he get in there?" "Well, I was a little angry at him and when the cage was opened I threw him in, but I want him now." The keeper walked on. The man followed him and said, "Sir, that's my dog, and I tell you I want him." "Oh, you do, do you? Well, I'll open the cage, and you can go in and get him if you want him!"

Henry Moorehouse said, "When I found my way into Christ Jesus, bleeding and bruised and helpless, the Lion of the Tribe of Judah took me in His care and all the power of hell could not touch me."

When I found out that my place was in Christ Jesus, I ceased my fight—my struggle. The only fight we have now is the fight of faith.

Oh the wonders of the grace of God! Why am I in Christ? Because God loves me. Not because I was worthy. No. It was God! The grace of God! God is grace. "The God of all grace!" It was God's doings that I was put into this safety box. Praise the Lord.

It is not only a safety box and hiding place; it is a covert, bringing out an answer to every person's need. A covert from a tempest. A tempest is worse than just a wind. A covert is not only a defense against something, but it is a nestling place. **He** is our security.

"The name of the Lord is a strong tower: the righteous runneth into it, and is safe" (Prov. 18:10). "The name of the Lord"—that is Jesus. He gave you His name. He put you in His name. The margin reads, "the righteous runneth into it and **is set aloft,**" raised up out of the miasmas of disease, up out of the flesh, up out of your own effort, up out of your own faith into the faith of the Son of God. You are in His name.

Look at Psalm 61:4, "I will abide in thy tabernacle forever, I will trust in the covert of thy wings."

Yesterday I sat by the side of a woman who seemingly is dying of stone cancer. She has had many wonderful experiences, but I cannot get that woman to rest a minute or to take anything from God except on her experiences. As I talked with her about the marvelous things God had done for her, she said, "Yes, brother, but I have had such experiences—the joy used to rise and bubble up, and it has not risen for days." I answered her like this: "I have been saved for fifty-four years, and for one-third of that time I didn't know anything about it. I have been asleep one-third of that time; but I was as much saved as when that thing was turning hand springs in my heart." She said, "If I could only feel it I would know that I am healed."

I am only giving you a picture of yourselves-many

of you. "I will abide in thy tabernacle forever." Not just this week.

"I will TRUST." That is the highest form of faith. "I will trust." In what? "In the covert of thy wings."

The 91st psalm gives you that from the 1st to the 4th verses, "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty. I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge and my fortress: my God; in Him will I **trust**. Surely He shall deliver thee from the snare of the fowler, and from the noisome pestilence. He shall cover thee with His feathers, and under His wings shalt thou **trust**: His truth shall be thy shield and buckler."

I went to a place this week where they were religious. They had been baptized in order to be saved, and now they were doing the best they could to be saved, and if they could hold out faithful in that they would be saved. The boy was dying with tuberculosis. They had tried everything, and finally that foolish thing called Christian Science. Now that everything else was exhausted they said, "We will trust the Lord."

I said to the mother sitting there by that boy who was dying, "Mother, are you a Christian, a real child of God?" She looked at me in astonishment. I said, "Have you ever been born again, and had the witness that you are His child?" She said, "No, I am not saved. I never had any life from God. I am not saved." I said, "Mother, in the time of Christ, when He was on earth, there was not a mother who ever brought her child to Christ but He healed him. If you were able to bring your child to Jesus and cast him at His feet He would heal him. Mother, you are without Christ and have no hope. You haven't even a God; for a Gentile that has no Christ has no God. I must turn from you to this boy, and if he trusts Christ, He will heal him."

We dealt with that boy for one and one-half hours and he accepted Christ. It was beautiful. He said, "I know the Lord will heal me," and He did. We prayed with him and laid hands on him, and when I said, "Amen," the boy said, "Thank you, Lord, for healing me."

The mother put one hand on my shoulder and one on the son's shoulder and said, "I must go in with my boy." We knelt and prayed, not over a quarter of a minute.' I said, "Sister, have you accepted Christ, and has He accepted you?" She answered, "Yes, I am saved."

Jesus is the door, the way, the hiding place; and when you go through the door you are safe.

No man can get through that door except the Father draw him. There is no danger of evil ever getting through that door. There are no devils where I am—"In Christ Jesus." God Himself put me in there and He shut the door against hell and judgment.

"I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge." He is not only a hiding place, but rivers of water in a dry place. Water is for refreshing and for sustenance.

"But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life" (John 4:14).

May we just open our hearts to this marvelous truth.

What did our text say? "A man shall be as a hiding place." Who is this man? He is blood of my blood, my elder brother. He is a man. He is God's Son. God begot Him in the flesh, a man to bear man's sin, (Continued on Page Five)

SO THAT YE COME BEHIND IN NO GIFT

"I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than ye all" (1 Cor. 14:18).

"Ye all! All ye Corinthians! I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than all you Corinthians!" We are so far removed by time from the early Corinthian church that we can only get glimpses of the condition. And we are so far removed from the condition of the early Christian church that what they experienced seems foreign to us. The fact is that we are foreign to them, to these experiences.

The Corinthian church came behind in no gift. And they spoke in tongues. It was so universal that Paul reminded them that he outclassed them, and of the vast number of the Corinthians who spoke in tongues there was not one who outdid him. It was so universal that they were crowding on one another in the meetings in the exercise of the gift, and so he, had to write to regulate the gift.

"Oh," the critics say, "what about the Ephesian church? They did not speak in tongues. It is not mentioned in the epistle written to them." Did they practice healing in the Ephesian church? We find no mention of it in the epistle to the Ephesians. We know that Paul practiced healing wherever he went and special miracles were wrought in Ephesus (Acts 19:11). It was in Ephesus that Paul laid hands on the twelve men and they spoke in tongues and prophesied when the Spirit came upon them. It is an impossible thing to have twelve newly baptized, Spiritfilled men in any one community without the message spreading.

Paul was satisfied with the spiritual condition of the Ephesian church. He had no fault to find in their using the gifts. Hence they are not mentioned in his epistle. The same thing applies to otl er churches to which he wrote.

That which was of such inestimable value to Paul, which was the prerogative of everyone in a new born church on the Day of Pentecost, was a perfect example for all subsequent branches of the church, and Paul would never have rested content if any other church had been behind the Corinthians. And if the Corinthians had not been treading upon one another in the exercise of the gift, Paul would not have written the fourteenth chapter of Corinthians; then the twentieth-century Christian would be-abolutely cer-

tain that the Corinthian church never spoke in tongues, because Paul made no reference to it.

The epistle to the Hebrews, that wonderful letter to Hebrew Christians, had very little reference to the coming of the Lord, yet the Hebrew Christians believed in it, for Peter and Paul preached it, and the other writers refer to it. No reference to a doctrine or an experience in an epistle does not infer that the doctrine was not taught or believed in, nor that the experience was not manifested or enjoyed by the people to whom it was written. In the Acts of the Apostles we read that they went everywhere preaching the word (Acts 4:31; 6:7; 13:26), just the simple statement, the word. It was preaching the gospel. What is the gospel? It is elaborated in the epistles, especially in the epistle to the Romans. The record does not say that they went everywhere preaching justification by faith, repentance, baptism, turning from idols and all. That is inferred in the gospel message. It simply states they preached the word.

And so reference to the Spirit in the epistles is spoken to people who had experience in the Spirit. Paul did not say to the Ephesians, "Be baptized in the Spirit;" but he wanted them to learn the lesson from drunkards who on every occasion took advantage to imbibe. Therefore he counsels them, "You imbibe-you be filled with the Spirit-you have had the appetite already for the Spirit, you have been immersed in the Spirit, keep on imbibing. Be filled with the Spirit."

Paul would never ask them to turn on the tap if he knew the tap had not been already connected with the divine reservoir. Because you have been baptized in the Spirit you have a right to expect a continuous infilling.

"I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than ye all !" Fancy the great Corinthian church all experiencing the Baptism of the Spirit and many of them possessing the gifts in their manifold aspects. And because we are hearing the echo of their speaking, some are misconstruing the echo, and misunderstanding it, and even criticizing those who recognize in the echo that they, too, can have the original voice, the same voice, the voice of the Spirit that spoke through the Corinthians.

Some saints in the last days are simple enough to believe that God is restoring that which Satan took away. Amen.

"NOT MY WILL, BUT THINE, BE DONE"

In the prayer-meeting a good sister prayed, "Lord, we're afraid of our wills; we're afraid to do our wills for fear of the consequences; teach us Thy will!" There was something striking about that prayer. The majority of people, including even some professed Christians, are afraid of God's will rather than their own .- Spring Grove Ripplet.

CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE FROM THE VIEW-POINT OF ONE OF OUR CHINA MISSIONARIES

(The following is an extract from a letter enclosing an offering of \$10.00 from one of our lady missionaries in China.)

"The cut of the unfinished Bible school building with an article by you in the Pentecostal Evangel some time ago, was the visible means used by the Holy Spirit to move upon my heart to write you with the enclosed offering. I do not remember the article but that photo of the unfinished building stands out quite clearly in my mind's eye. . . I trust that the enclosed is another lever that will help to raise the Central Bible Institute. 'Be strong and of a good courage for God is with you!'

"I am a strong believer in Bible schools. The longer I am on the mission field the more strongly I advocate them. I came to the mission field without Bibleschool training, for I was advised by Pentecostal preachers and workers not to go to Bible school. I feel today that I have been cheated out of my birthright. I would that I could sound a clarion call to every young man and woman in America to attend a school where the Bible is taught as the inspired, infallible, inerrant (and if there are more adjectives to make the meaning stronger, add them) Word of God, with practical training in connection. As Hudson Taylor once said, 'Crossing the ocean does not make one a soul-winner,' so one needs to begin at home with a knowledge of the use of the sword 'which pierces even to the dividing asunder of the joints and marrow and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart.' The Chinese are born philosophers, very loquacious and extremely keen in some of their questions. I am sure the peoples of other nations are likewise, hence the need of the missionary possessing a thorough knowledge of the Word to teach them and guide them. No smattering of Scripture knowledge will answer or be sufficient.

REMEMBER THE LOVE OF GOD

and make us brothers with Himself and sons of God. Rivers of water! It is Jesus Himself. The Holy Ghost was not sent to make you happy. He came to loosen Jesus and let Him out. Jesus is that fountain in you and when the Holy Ghost comes He opens up this fountain and lets it out.

"When the poor and needy seek water, and there is none, and their tongue faileth for thirst, I the Lord will hear them, I the God of Israel will not forsake them" (Isa. 41:17).

Are you a child of God? Are you thirsty for this Baptism? If the great God said He would hear you, He will surely hear you if you are in the Beloved. He heard that poor, old outcast, Hagar. She cried to God and He opened her eyes to see the well.

Anyone who in his thirst will call on the Lord shall be heard. You don't just get a drink—it is rivers. Turn to Ezekiel 47:9, "And it shall come to pass,

Turn to Ezekiel 47:9, "And it shall come to pass, that everything that liveth, which moveth, whithersoever the rivers shall come, shall live: and there shall be a very great multitude of fish, because these waters shall come thither: for they shall be healed; and everything shall live whither the river cometh." Hallelujah! Our text tells us that a man—the man Christ Jesus—shall be as rivers of water in a dry place. If you come to Him he lets the river pour through you. That river issues out from under the throne of God in the temple. It came out just a clear, little spring branch.

Wasn't that a wonderful experience the first time you came into God's grace and power. First the water came to the man's ankles; then to the knees; then to his loins; and then he could swim in it. It could not then be passed over by any man. The trees on either side were for the healing of the nations. Christ is this river. The Baptism of the Holy Ghost is to bring out Christ. Not to make you happy — though it will do that. Very little satisfies some people. You are not that river. It isn't your experience that is the river. It is not your holiness and righteousness and your wonderful knowledge of the Scriptures that is the river. Christ is THE river.

"Wait on the Lord, be of good courage, and He shall strengthen thine heart."

· Here is a good tonic for weak hearts. Weak-hearted ones are all about us. Heart strengthening is promised to those who wait upon the Lord.

Many are weak, weary and faint-hearted. God is waiting to fulfil the wonderful promise made to those who wait upon Him. We can mount up with wings as eagles, can run and not be weary, can walk and not faint. The condition to this wonderful promise must be met if we would experience the fulfillment of the promise. "Come wait upon Me," He says, "and I will lift you up by the power of my Spirit. I will cause you to run without weariness."

May the Lord deeply convict us of our failure on these lines!

As we wait upon God daily, and the flow of the Spirit deepens, we become deeply sensitive to that which is not in full harmony with God. Perhaps in no other way, or by no other means, can this be so much realized as in waiting on God.

A larger revelation of Christ is sure to come as a result of waiting on God. The inflow of the Spirit, daily increasing, brings this deeper revelation, also, a full-

er revelation of our self-nature. Isaiah could not go on with his life work without the vision of God in His majesty and glory, and the vision of himself. Neither can we—the double vision must come. Waiting on God will bring it. Nothing will bring us to the end of ourselves like seeing ourselves in the light that only God can give. We then see ourselves as utterly undone; and thus we lose confidence in our natural, fleshly ability.

Daniel received the vision; and he fell on his face, there remaining no more strength in him. He then could go on in the power and might of God.

Have you received the double vision? As we practice waiting on God we become skilled in the exercise of waiting on Him as in playing on a musical instrument, we become skilled by the practice of what we have been taught. Our faith is increased as we experience the willingness of our God to meet us along these lines. Also, our capacity for receiving from God can daily enlarge. We become more and more conscious of being drawn into God in a deeper sense, realizing the mighty drawing power of the Spirit laying hold of us increasingly as we each day tarry and hold still in His presence. We thus are drawn into the current of His drawing power, and rapidly gravitate toward God. It is blessed to be made conscious of the fact in our daily experience.

In passing out of ourselves into God, we cease from our own fleshly activities, learning to act only as the Spirit moves upon us not only in prayer, but in all our service for God. There is a place in God where the Spirit constantly moves

upon us and we can hear from heaven every hour of the day.

As we wait in stillness before Him, the Spirit comes upon us as the dew is distilled; softly, quietly, the sweet inbreathings of the Spirit deepen and grow, becoming stronger and deeper, until we are conscious of being enwrapped and inbreathed by the Spirit. We thus have the consciousness of dwelling in a warm atmosphere of fire and glory. We can live in the cloud of His presence continually.

"The Lord is our dwelling place." "Abide in me, and I in you."

We can learn to meet God quickly in our seasons of waiting upon Him, as He is sure to break through to us. He is waiting to meet us beyond our highest expectations, as we seek to draw closer to Him in our seasons of waiting and prayer.

There is a place where we can freely drink in the Spirit each day, learning to have **free access to God**, just as we freely drink water and breathe air. We can thus have daily refreshings, daily renewings, daily outpourings of the Spirit.

How well many of us remember when we were first baptized in the Spirit. The long waiting with many of us—tarrying long, and earnestly seeking—the selfemptying, the deep heart-searchings, and the meeting of conditions. Finally, how the Lord graciously condescended to us, and marvelously poured out His Spirit upon us. Then, as the months and the years have passed since, we often have so wished that the experience could be repeated.

Some, perhaps, have gone on with God, deepening in the Spirit; many have not known just how to go on. Waiting on God can be made the means of going on, going deeper, ever deeper in the Spirit cach day. Larger outpourings of the Spirit, deeper anointings, are for us.

Water to drink, and air to breathe are nature's gifts. We have free access to these. Is not the Spirit just as freely given?

A LETTER FROM PALESTINE

Have been four wonderful weeks in what is called the "Holy Land." I met a Jew the other day, who came over on the same boat with us, and when I asked him how he liked the Holy Land he said, "It's not a holy land at all; it's a dirty land, filthy land, a hungry land, a barren land. Look there;" and he pointed to a dirty, ragged, barefoot specimen of humanity.

I answered: "But it won't always be like this; your Messiah is coming." The tears were in his eyes as he said, "I don't know; we have waited so long." I talked on and finally said, "And when your Messiah comes He will be our Christ." With an impatient gesture he turned away, and Christ was again rejected.

Yes, it is a land of holy memories, of sacred places and historic settings. One day, walking through a street, I saw "Ecce Homo" written on the wall, and in a moment I knew this was the street He walked on His way to Calvary and it was holy ground for me. The dirty crowds were all about me, the overloaded donkeys patiently plodding along, the camels not far away, the women with great baskets of all sorts of burdens on their heads, the ragged men, the howling throng buying and selling and shouting their wares; but He had passed that way to the cross to save a lost world from sin. And He will come back to this same city and it will be the Holy City, Zion, the city of the great King and the joy of the whole earth.

We visited Bethlehem Christmas Eve and went down into the stone grottos where He was supposed to have been born. We watched the people come and kiss the stones and worship the place and were reminded that they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth. We went from place to place with our little wax tapers, visiting the many sacred places, but were relieved to come out and walk down to an open space and looked out over the Judean hills and plains. We were told that yonder was the place where the shepherds kept watch over their flocks out under the Syrian sky when the convoy of angels came praising God and saying. "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." And heaven and earth have been nearer ever since.

Dear Miss Brown, with whom we are staying, is a saint of the Lord. She is doing a man's job, or I should say two men's jobs. I have gone with her and her native pastor to Accho to visit the prisons and give out Christmas gifts to the men, a three-hundred-mile trip taking three days. Her native pastor is a young man of high character and clear logical mind and is deeply spiritual. He is exceptionally qualified to deal with prisoners. They make this trip every two weeks and go down toward Jaffa to two other prisons every two weeks. On the way we passed through the little city of Nob, then on to Sychar or Shechem, where we stopped at Jacob's well for a drink, the well where the Lord Jesus met the woman of Samaria and told her all things. Then we passed on through the plains between the mountains of Ebal and Gerizim, where Joshua read the blessings and cursings with six of the tribes on one side and six on the other and the ark between. Then on to Nazareth where the women came with great stone jars and filled them with clear, cold water and carried them away on their heads. How they balance them is more than I know.

"Off the side of one high hill is a great steep cliff and there was where they tried to cast Him down after they had wondered at the gracious words that proceeded out of His mouth, so we were told. We pass on over the plains of Esdrael, through Samaria first, and then on to Dothan and on to Mount Carmel and Haifa, where we stay all night in a little hotel on the shore of the Mediterranean sea and watch the the fishermen mending their nets and drawing them in, etc. The next day we drive thirty or forty miles along the hard sand of the sea at the water's edge to the prison camp. It is Friday and the Moslems' Sabbath. Miss Brown sits by her little organ, surrounded by that indescribable bunch of dark-skinned, ragged, desperate-looking lot of men. As they join her in singing my heart is filled with a great yearning pity for them all. They have never had homes or right training, but are taught to deceive and steal and hardly know it is wrong. Many of them are really turning to God and a new life is being revealed to them.

The next day on our return trip we went through Cana of Galilee and on down to the beautiful little sea of Galilee. No wonder the Lord Jesus loved Galilee! The little sea is six hundred feet below sea level, six miles wide and twelve miles long, surrounded by hills, and the water is so clear and blue. It was here that a great storm swept down and the boat was about to spill them all out when the Lord Jesus commanded the sea to be still. Beautiful little sea! We sat on its shore and ate our lunch of fish that had been caught that morning by a Tiberias fisherman.

Miss Radford is starting Bible classes right here in Miss Brown's home, but there is such a crying need of a hall or building where public meetings could be held. I have spoken several times through an interpreter. Somehow I feel that the Latter Rain must fall in Palestine and get a people ready for His coming here. The Jews are coming back and a number of Jewish villages have sprung up. And one of these days He will come whose right it is to reign.— Vida B. Baer.

McALESTER, OKLA.—Never was such a meeting held in the town. Hundreds were turned away. Earl W. and

Beula O. Clark and party came to the M. E. Church on West Grand Avenue on January 25. God put His approval on their message. Two hundred came for salvation, and about 600 for healing, of whom there were some wonderful healings. One was Mrs. Mathias of Dow, Okla. She was dying of bone cancer and was unsaved. I want In our inner Christian life, in God.' our everyday prayers, in our Christian living, in our churches, in our prayer meetings, in our fellowship, it must come to that-that God always has the first place; and if that be given Him, He will take possession. SUCCESSFUL BIBLE SCHOOL

Brother W. W. Simpson of Shihchia Chuang, China writes: "This four-months' term of Bible School has just closed. There were over forty students, from six provinces and Mongolia. About half had received the Spirit before coming, and now all but five have received. There has been very good progress on all lines; and nearly all will go into the Lord's work at once. There is abundant ground for the hope that the work all over North China will be greatly benefitted by reason of these four months of Bible training.

"This evening we begin the Second Annual Chinese Conference, to last till February 3. I then go to Shanghai to look after the printing of more hymn books, holding meetings at the same time in several places. About March 20 I leave Shanghai for Chengchow. Honan, to hold meetings in various places till May 1, when I start back to Kansu.

"We are now in financial straits, and completely stranded and the entire work will have to cease unless something is done at once. We endure privations and gladly bear for Jesus' sake. I do not complain at all, as I have made up my mind to starve to death with a glad heart rather than cease preaching Christ in China."

Note.—Such conditions are the result of non-christian co-operation and lack of sharing one another's burdens. Beloved of the Lord, let us pray much for all missionaries in like circumstances.

LIVING THE LIFE

Sister Emma Daab of Sainam, South China writes: "A few weeks ago the sixteen-year-old child of one of our neighbors took suddenly and seriously ill. The parents called for the hideous old priest, who called upon the gods for her deliverance and used hot irons, burning the child dreadfully in his endeavor to burn the evil spirit out of her. After he had received a sum of over Ten dollars (\$10) he left her in a far worse condition. The distressed parents, seeing their child was dying, then called for us to pray to the true God. She continued getting worse until the following Sunday. The parents sent for us every day. At this time Miss Militcsher and I went over. We found her in a very serious condition, unconscious and gasping. The mother was weeping, but we told her not to fear for, in the face of circumstances, we still had hopes, in the Lord. We did want to see the Lord prove to these people that, what the gods could not do, He could do. At about nine o'clock that night the father of the girl begged us not to leave her bedside. I had been away all that day to the outstation at Siutong and felt very weary, but, for the sake of Jesus, we decided to stay with them. They said that when we were with them they felt so much more restful. How wonderful to be able to carry the presence of God with us. We were at her bedside, in that little hut with its mud floors, from five o'clock Sunday evening until five Monday morning, when we left the girl breathing naturally and resting. God performed a miracle that night, otherwise she would have left this world then. By Tuesday she was able to sit up a little and take nourishment. Before that, for days, she could not even swallow. The parents were overjoyed and, with us, praised the Lord. I believed the Lord raised her to prove His power and give her an opportunity to accept Him as her own Saviour. She then told us she believed in the Lord Jesus. .

"On Tuesday a relative of the mother came to see her. He is a doctor, and I understand that he gave her some medicine. Immediately after a fever came upon her and continued rising until the following Sunday. We again prayed for her constantly but could not get the victory the second time. The following Sunday night the parents sent for us again, at about eleven o'clock. Two of us girls went over and were joined by another, after we had been there, to help us. At eleven-thirty the girl, our little "A Yau," whom we learned to love during her sickness, left this world to go to her new found Saviour. The mother became frantic at the loss of her child. That was a hard night for us. One of the missionary girls tried to comfort the mother, while the other and myself took care of the girl's body. We had to be the undertakers. We thought this was a thing we could never do, but again we found His grace sufficient. We felt this was our opportunity to show the love of Christ to our neighbors. We attended to the body, to the amazement of the people; because they themselves are so afraid of death. The parents showed their appreciation, and some of the neighbors said, "We want to serve this God also." I must say, however, we did need grace from on high. Perhaps you were praying for us at the time. So in this home we not only had the privilege of preaching the Gospel but of LIVING it; and it is LIVING it that counts.

"During the time of this little girl's illness, the family put away idolatry and, with us, called upon the true God. We know the Lord gave us the soul of the girl and has spoken to the hearts of her parents. Now, the doors of this home are wide open to the Gospel. They had a Christian funeral, which was quite a step for them to take. " The mother has already found the Lord Jesus and, even though she has lost her daughter, she still believes, and occasionally goes to the meetings at the mission with us. We are believing for this family, that in the future they, too, will be a shining light in this town. I am solicitious for your prayers and God will bless you as you pray for this people."

A WEDDING IN INDIA

The wedding was rather quiet and nice. Very few of the missionaries could come. Some of the local English friends were anxious to come, so they were all invited and quite a number came. As none of our missionaries held license to marry, or solemnize marriage in Bihar, we had to get another minister.

Our friends did not know that I had walked a few cents' worth of sole-leather off of my shoes in the morning making preparations to surprise them, and so, as they had no idea of the possibility of our getting away in any other way than by train, they contained themselves very saintly, keeping bags of rice, rose-petals, etc., in readiness to give us what they thought was coming to us at the station. The Lord, through the kindness of one of the friends at Bettiah, allowed us to ride off in a nice white carriage out of the compound. No carriage could have been better suited for the occasion. They thought we were off to the station, and had their carriage ordered to follow us about five minutes later. But our carriage made a strange turn, unknown to our friends, and landed us in the bazar, where was a "Ford" containing our grips, etc. Soon we were settled in it and drove off towards Laheria Sarai for a distance of 28 miles, leaving our friends to enjoy themselves at the station and elsewhere asking questions as to the whereabouts of the bride and bridegroom. I am not sure that we have been forgiven by all for this trick.

So having spent the night in Motihari, in a "Dak Bungalow," we completed our journey to Laheria Sarai the next day, arriving here as it got dark. We were met at the station by our preacher. He acted a bit out of the ordinary, but we had no idea as to the cause until we neared our compound. Here from a little distance, we saw perhaps two hundred or more little lights glimmering, telling us of some unusual joy in the hearts of our dear Christian workers seeking ex-

pression. They had worked hard for a couple of days making bamboo arches on either side of the road leading from the main road to the bungalow, and on these they had stuck their native little, mud, oil dishes, each holding about a spoonful of oil and its wick. It was all perfectly native, as no white face had seen or had had anything to do with it.

It is true, the black hands toiled and labored to get it all ready for the coming of the "dulhin and dulha" (bride and bridegroom), but the Lord's touch was upon it: for it melted us both and we could not refrain from weeping. An Indian Babu here had sent a private carriage to the station to meet us. This was much like the one we rode in at the first, only that it was black. Quite a crowd of natives from the near-by village had gathered to greet us as we drove into the yard. We were then seated on the veranda when suddenly fire works began to announce to us that the end was not as near in sight as we had thought. This continued for a while and finally ended by sending a couple of balloons up into the clear moonlit sky. Then a few words of thanksgiving followed from us both, after which we retreated into our room to reconsecrate our lives to God for service among these people .-- Jacob and Jennie Meuller.

Brother and Sister Slager of Chuchowfu, Che, China, write: "It is now nearing the Chinese New Year season. It comes on Feb. 5 this year. Many of the Chinese are now making preparations for it, as it is the great holiday season of the year all over China. Our day school closed today for the New Year holidays. We will soon have good opportunities for selling scripture portions on the streets to people from the villages around, who come into the city to transact business before the New Year. Please pray for us here, and that many may turn to God from their idolatry and other sins, before it is too late."

BACK IN INDIA

Sister Personeus of Chapra, India, writes: "Greetings from India.. 'For all the Lord has done for me. I never will cease to praise Him.' I am so glad to be back in India among these needy people. The voyage across was very pleasant and all the way I realized the tender mercies of our blessed Lord. We reached Bombay on the morning of the third of January, and I found Miss Mc-Leod at the Missionary Home; and she, with two new Missionaries, and I traveled north together. We had to change trains at Cawnpore, so had time to go over to the Mission House and have dinner with Brother and Sister Thomsen. A young man who had heard no sound in one ear for sixteen years was instantly healed. Another man who had heard no sound in one ear for thirty years was perfectly healed. All these persons heard the watch tick through their restored ears. I thank the dear Lord that through His power the gospel may be preached also to the deaf.

A few days before the revival at Willisville closed, the revival power lifted. I tarried many hours before the Lord to find out the reason why, but received nothing from the Lord except the command to get quickly out of that town. I preached a farewell sermon to the church and left Willisville, not knowing whither I was going. I went to Cutler, a little town four miles éast of Perry, where Brother Williams, a brother from St. Louis, had opened a mission. Ten persons had already received the Baptism under the labors of Brother Williams.

When I arrived at Cutler I found that Brother Williams had been praying to the Lord to send me to Cutler to help him. I had received the message which he had sent to me via heaven, and had come to help him. During the revival at Percy the Holy Spirit told us by prophecy that we should have a greater revival than the one at Perry in another town. This prophecy has already been fulfilled at Cutler. About fifty persons received the Holy Spirit in the first week of the revival. Others are coming through at every service.

Another brother had a vision of the battle of Armageddon. He saw an immense army from a right flank position. He could see down between the lines of soldiers. The army was marching down a broad valley between two ranges of mountains, covering the entire valley from mountain to mountain. The army was so many lines deep that the brother could not see the rear end of the army. The soldiers all had guns with bayonets fixed on them, and they seemed to be rushing forward to make a bayonet charge. Then the vision moved to the right and the brother saw an army of saints reaching across the valley in front of the great army. The saints were all dressed in white, and held no weapons in their hands. Hosts of angels were hovering over the army of the saints, which looked like a white streak across the valley. When the front ranks of soldiers were about two hundred yards from the army of the saints, some of the saints clapped their hands, others pushed out their hands towards the advancing army and the soldiers in the front ranks of this great army fell dead by the thousands. The rest of the soldiers who were not slain in the mighty blast of God's power, became confused and began to slay one another. Soon the ground was covered with blood: but where the army of the saints stood there was no blood. Then appeared above this terrible scene in letters of fire the word ARMAGED-DON... See Rev. 16:16.

I believe this revival will spread into many other towns for the Holy Spirit has said, "There will be many open doors." Yours for the coming of the Lord.—Wm. G. Schell.
