THE REST OF THE REIGNING LIFE

Ruling "Ruling" follows as the result of being "jointseated" with Christ in the heavenlies.

We are told that "he that ruleth his spirit is better than he that taketh a city" (Prov. 16:32).

All the discipline of spirit to which we are subjected is in order that we should be fitted to rule; first, over our own spirits, and then over our circumstances and in the sphere of service where God has placed us.

What Does It Mean to "Rule Our Own Spirit?" It means the exercise of self-control.

The teaching that self-control is in itself of the

flesh is wrong.

Christians are loth to recognize their true self, with the result that they are afraid to put forth any effort for fear it would be evil self-energy. They have been taught to leave the control of their life to the Holy Spirit, and to passively submit to being controlled. The result is that they have less self-control in their lives than they had before they were converted; having given up exercising the control which they did formerly; hence they have become weak and characterless. If they only knew it, the Holy Spirit cannot control them without their co-operation; and they, failing to give that co-operation, are neither controlled by themselves nor by the Spirit.

In Galatians 5:24, we see that "temperance" (or self-control) is part of the fruit of the Spirit. It is produced by the Spirit, and manifested in the lives of those who are prepared for the necessary pruning

and purging.

Spiritual self-control is obtained by the same process of discipline and training as natural self-control; but so many of God's children make the mistake of expecting it to be given to them without any effort of their own.

What Does It Mean to Rule Over Our Circumstances?

Christians so often fail to see their duty Godward regarding their circumstances; and consequently they are failures in the place where God has put them.

There are two causes from one or other of which

this failure may arise.

Firstly, their inability to walk in the Spirit in the common duties of life; and secondly, their passive attitude, in throwing upon God all responsibility and taking none themselves.

In the act of surrendering their circumstances to God's control, they automatically take their own

hands off the reins.

I well remember when God revealed this truth to me, and I changed my attitude and said, "O God, I take my place in the midst of my circumstances, and I choose to rule and reign here for Thee." Gradually chaos gave place to order, as I began to co-operate with God.

There are thousands of Christians whose homes and circumstances are absolutely in disorder through this

passive dropping of their concerns.

Domestic affairs go wrong, and business affairs get into confusion; and all the while probably the Christian is trusting God to keep things right, and falsely reasoning that his troubles have been permitted by

God for his own spiritual good. This trend of mind leads souls to anticipate evil rather than good, and thus paves the way for the devil to go before them; whereas an intelligent faith in God, accompanied by their own active co-operation, would pave the way for God to go before them.

"Rule thou" remembering that God does not do for you what you can do for yourself; and that much that He does do, He will do through you rather than apart from you. Only if and when circumstances are too much for you will God work apart from you.

What Does It mean to Rule in the Sphere of Service

Where God Has Placed Us?

There is no doubt that our training for future ruling is the service which God has given us to perform

In the parable of the talents recorded in Matthew 25, we have clearly shown to us the test as to fitness for future ruling.

The Lord's word of commendation to the faithful servant, "Well done, good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy Lord;" teaches us that future ruling is dependent upon faithful and diligent service now.

Faithfulness consists in putting Christ's interests

before our own.

It is principally through prayer that we learn to rule in the sphere of service where God has put us; and to gather the reins of our work into our hands and control it for God.

Prayer makes the Christian watchful and sharpens his spiritual perception; and enables him to discern the approach of evil and pray it away. His very sense of responsibility turns him to God; and from the watch tower of prayer, he learns to observe the approach of evil.

The powers of darkness assail a man in order to dethrone him from the place where God has placed him: and it is absolutely necessary for him to main-

tain his ruling position in spirit.

Christian workers are continually being defeated because they fail to recognize that they must hold the ground for Jesus Christ against the foe, until they are called to give account of their stewardship.

Prayer and action go hand in hand; but there is a passive attitude amongst many of God's children regarding their service, which weakens them, and which the enemy uses to attack them. The enemy does not like the Christian to assert any individuality of his own; and will combat every kind of suggestion that he must stand and withstand in the sphere of service where God has placed him.

"Rule Thou"

This is purely a spiritual attainment, and cannot be arrived at until the conflict between the natural soul life and the divine life in the spirit is over. If the soul life is stronger than the spirit life, it is more difficult for the believer to control his spirit. The strong activities of the soul life have the effect of weakening the spirit life, and bringing the spirit into bondage to the soul; with the result that when there

is need to be strong in spirit the person fails in the test.

When a believer is "soulish" he goes by feelings, impulses, emotions and intellect; but when he becomes spiritual, he is controlled by spiritual understanding and faith.

The Cross is the place where the natural life that governs the soul is brought to its termination, and the soul shorn of its strength becomes a servant of the spirit

But before this can happen the believer must be willing to part with the old life in its various manifestations.

It must be remembered that the soul life has its virtues as well as its vices; and these are more difficult to deal with than its evident evils. Its zeal for God and its untiring energies are amongst its most difficult traits of character. Doing the work of God in the energy of the flesh—plenty of "go"—full of plans and schemes for making the Word of God prosper; in some natures, never still, mind always active, nothing restful in their character. There is a marked absence of spirit in it all; for the Holy Spirit can only work in an atmosphere of REST.

The effect of all this natural activity in Christian work upon the spirit, is to bring it into utter bondage and dull all its faculties, with the result that the person becomes very satisfied with his state; insensible of the need of his spirit; utterly deceived as to the final results of his labors, and void of all control of his own spirit.

There is no rest or harmony in the being until it is brought under the Spirit's control; and let me repeat it, Calvary is the place where that harmony is brought about.

Reigning Is More Than Warfare

It means that you have accomplished your warfare, and are ruling over the subjects you have subdued. "Having overthrown . . . all . . . stand" (Eph. 6:13, Conybeare).

There may come a time in your experience when wrestling will cause you to make no further progress, and will be a weariness to the spirit; this may be an indication to you that the hour has come when you are to rule in spirit, rather than to wrestle. Ruling does not exclude warfare; but as the Church draws nearer to the time of the end, the forces against her will be so stupendous that the only way to advance will be by RULING far above all principalities and powers.

Therefore let us finish our personal warfare quickly, that we may enter into union with Christ in reigning in spirit with Him over all the power of the enemy.

FLOODS

"Fear not, O Jacob, my servant; and thou, Jeshurun, whom I have chosen. For I will **pour** water upon him that is thirsty, and **floods** upon the dry ground." (Compare John 7:38, "He that believeth on me, as the scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water.") "I will pour my spirit upon thy seed, and my blessing upon thine offspring: and they shall spring up as among the grass, as willows by the water courses. One shall say, I am the Lord's; and another shall call himself by the name of Jacob; and another shall subscribe with his hand unto the Lord, and surname himself by the name of Israel" (Isa. 44:2-5).

"Prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour

(or empty) you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it" (Mal. 3:10).

Floods is just the word to express the dire need in seasons of prolonged drought; not only the parched, sun-cracked earth thirstily moans, but the very springs of the ground fail; and the deep, deep cry of the heart is for floods, floods, poured out, yea emptied out. A wide rent in the heavens, and Almighty God, as it were, "emptying out" His buckets, without stint, upon the parched, thirsting, gaping, bare land, in such quantities, such torrents, floods, great rivers, that there is no containing the waters. "He shall pour the water out of His buckets" (Num. 24:7).

It is a lovely thing to picture God pouring the water out of His buckets, no stint there, no shortage. What buckets? The buckets of God! An almighty downpour, almighty floods, enough, amply sufficient; not man's puny buckets, or supplies, no-divine energy, royal supplies, flung out of the buckets, emptied out to the last drop, out of these enormous buckets of God, through the gaping heavens, upon the perishing, seared, outcrying, parched earth. "Fear not" indeed, man could never do it, nor attempt it, "but . . . God!" "I AM" has promised, and He will do it. Are God's people thirsty, are they dry, well then, that is where God will empty out His buckets, in sudden, prodigious quantities-let the thirst and the dryness be sufficiently felt, and realized, until it becomes intolerable; then it will be expressed with a sense of "unutterable" need, expressed and expressed again—"I will not let Thee go until Thou bless me," will be the grim cry and determination of the heart, and the floods will come, the heavens be rent; "there will not be room enough to contain it." "They shall spring up as amongst the grass, as willows by the water courses. One shall say, I am the Lord's; and another shall subscribe with his hand unto the Lord, and surname himself by the name of Israel." Converts shall multiply extraordinarily; "the earth shall (begin to) be filled with the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea." "Is it not yet a very little while, and Lebanon shall be turned into a fruitful field, and the fruitful field shall be esteemed a forest" (Isa. 29:17). The converts shall be past counting, thousands and ten thousands.

Is it not time for God to work? It is not time for men to be in earnest? How should one chase a thousand, and two put ten thousand to flight? Is it not our own fault—this thirsty, barren, desolate condition? What are we doing? How casually we take it, how little the fighting instinct of Jacob-like prayer is aroused in us. Are we not lethargic to a degree?

Why are the floods not here, the heavens rent, God pouring out, emptying out of His buckets? There is no man that stirreth up himself to take hold of God; we are otherwise engaged, otherwise interested, our energies are elsewhere.

Whereas God's world is dying, in the grip of spiritual famine and desolation, no man careth; whereas God is waiting for a man, one man, to fill the gap, one man to wait before God, Elijah-like, until floods fall. May God raise up a man for this. My reader, what will you do?—C. P., in "Flames of Fire."

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WORLD-WIDE REVIVAL

"In the last days," and "before" the arrival of the day of the Lord (Acts 2:17-20), God says: "It shall come to pass," no uncertainty about it, "I will pour out of My Spirit on all flesh," a God-sent, world-wide revival. Don't our hearts long that He may hasten the time?

It is Joel's prophecy (Joel 2:28-32) referred to by Peter, under the direction of the Spirit of God. A careful reading of Peter's words makes it clear that the great manifestation at Pentecost was not the final exhaustive fulfilment, for he purposely quotes it without leaving out the reference to miraculous signs in sun, moon, and earth which did not take place at Pentecost.

Nevertheless the final fulfilment was to be identical in kind. "This is that," he says. It was not something of interest to Jews only. The pouring out is to be on all flesh. This is in full accord with the present

dispensation, a calling out from all nations.

But in Joel, having described a condition of full restoration of Israel he goes on to say, and it shall come to pass afterward that I will pour out My Spirit on all flesh. However, the Spirit, who alone knows how to apply prophecy, puts "in the last days" for "afterward." So that we gather, that either the passage has a double application, or the word rendered 'afterward" might be rendered "hereafter.'

What most directly concerns us now is that this is to take place "in the last days." That we are now in this period the Lord's servants continually remind us. We are more or less familiar with the signs of these times. So, because it is promised, tens of thousands of saints are praying for it. It shall come to pass. God says so.

It is not a promise that all flesh will be saved; but all flesh shall experience a manifestation of the Gospel, in the miraculous power of the Spirit, of the like kind as at Pentecost, but far greater. Only a fraction of the witnessing public surrendered in response to the unanswerable testimony at that time, but it is most encouraging to learn that in these last days God is going to see to it that all shall see the Gospel in power, unhindered by the weakness and unfaithfulness of a lukewarm church.

In the account of the flood in Genesis 6, the expression "all flesh" comes several times (Gen. 6:12, 13, 17, 21). As it is the first mention, it is, as generally owned, a safe criterion as to the meaning of the expression. And we may be sure that the promise of blessing will not be more limited than His threat of judgment.

We can also perceive a powerful moral reason why God should fulfil this promise. It is this: The enemy is coming in like a flood. The bulk of men is ignorantly and helplessly at its mercy. The evil one is thus pouring out his spirit on all flesh. Can we therefore wonder that God will come miraculously to the rescue, leaving not a stone unturned to disillusion the masses? And it shall come to pass that whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved (Acts 2:21; Rom. 10:13; Joel 2:32). May He hasten the time.—D. Treharne, in the Morning Star.

One big reason why some of the Lord's children get so few answers is because they spend so little time on the Word, and less on their knees. One of the important conditions is FAITH, but there's only one way of obtaining faith, and that's the Rom. 10:17 way, coupled with Luke 18:1. This is why George Muller, of Bristol orphanage fame, received over 30,000 answers to prayer-he asked in GOD'S way, and KEPT asking.

"Oh, but that's 'teasing' God," said a woman to us the other day. Call it "teasing God" if you like; Christ called it "importunity" (Luke 11:5-10). If a thing that God wants you to have for the asking isn't worth asking for until you get it, it isn't worth

The more important of these conditions are: A right heart and motive (Psa. 66:18; Mark 11:25; James 4:3,8; 1 John 3:21,22); according to God's will (1 John 5:14, 15); in the name of Christ (John 14:13, 14; 16:23, 24); in faith (Mark 11:22-24; Heb. 11:6); without anxiety, but rather with thanksgiving (Phil. 1:6); with perseverance (Luke 18:1-7); in the Holy Ghost (Eph. 6:18; Jude 20). With these conditions met, God must answer. He cannot deny Himself. (See 2 Cor. 1:20; 2 Tim. 2:13, 19; Heb. 6:17-19; 10:23, 35, 36.)

THE SECOND COMING OF CHRIST

The following address was delivered by Finis Dake, one of the graduating students of Central Bible Institute, at the Commencement Exercises in Springfield, Mo.

False Predictions. In the past century there have been many days set for the coming of Christ. For example, the Millerites said Christ was coming in 1844, and Mrs. Rowen of the Reformed Adventist Church, in a recent prediction in Los Angeles, said Christ was coming on February 6 of this year. But in spite of these and many other false predictions, God's Word standeth sure. We can say emphatically, He is coming!

Old Testament Proof of His Coming. In the Old Testament the second coming of Christ is mentioned twenty times as often as is His first coming. there are twenty times as many references to His coming as a crowned king to sit upon the throne of David, bringing victory to Jerusalem, and peace upon the earth, as there are to His coming as the meek and lowly Jesus, wounded for our sins, and dying upon Calvary. This is the reason that the Jews, who had been looking for a mighty king, failed to recognize the lowly Nazarene, and still refuse to recognize Him. He did come fulfilling all the redemptive prophecies, and soon He is coming to fulfill all the kingly prophecies. "Unto them that look for Him shall He appear the second time without sin (apart from sin) unto salvation."

New Testament Proof of His Coming. In the two hundred sixty chapters of the New Testament, His coming is referred to three hundred eighteen times; that is, one out of every thirty verses of the New Testament is devoted to this glorious theme. The epistles of Paul refer to water baptism only thirteen times, while they refer to Christ's second coming more than fifty times. Each time you repeat the Lord's prayer, you are praying for His coming, "Thy kingdom come." But can there be a kingdom without a king? The last prayer in the Bible is a great heart-cry for His coming: "Even so, come, Lord Jesus." The answer rings back from heaven, "Behold, I come quickly; and my reward is

Promise of Jesus. Jesus Himself promised that He would come, saying, "If I go away (to prepare a place for you) I will come again." What could be plainer? "If I go away . . . I will come again." Did He go away? Acts 1:9 answers us, "When he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up and a cloud received him out of their sight." If I go away. Yes, He went away. But listen; "suddenly two men stood by them in white apparel and said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ve gazing up into heaven? This stand ye gazing up into heaven? same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." This same Jesus shall return; not some mystical, invisible spirit, but this same

Jesus. A Jesus, who, after His resurrection ate fish and honey with the disciples.

Paul's Testimony. Also the apostle Paul bears witness to the same great event, saying, "For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first; then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air; and so shall we ever be with the Lord." Such are a few of the definite references to His coming.

How Is He Coming? But you say, "How is He coming? This event of which you speak, how is it to take place?" There are many theories as to the manner of His return. Some say the coming of the Lord was spiritually fulfilled on the day of Pentecost when He came in the form of the Spirit, comforting the disciples and enduing them with power to preach the Gospel. It is true, a real Person did come on that day, but this Person was not the Lord Jesus Christ, but the Holy Spirit; He of whom Jesus said, "It is expedient for you that I go away, for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come; but if I depart, I will send him unto you." In this passage, it can be seen very plainly that Christ is not speaking of Himself, but of Another, namely, the Holy Spirit, the third Person of the Godhead. Let us not confuse the office work of the Spirit with that of the Son. The Spirit has come to the earth to reprove of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment; while the Son is at the right hand of the Father, doing His priestly work just as He was seen by Stephen after Pentecost.

Theories.-Others say that the destruction of Jerusalem, 70 A.D., was the coming of the Lord. But an honest study of the Scriptures disproves this, for His coming is to be marked, not by the destruction, but the restoration of Jerusalem. The Jews who have been scattered to the four corners of the earth will again be brought to their own land, where they will be deceived and brought through great tribulation by the Antichrist. Then they will see the Lord coming in the clouds of heaven to deliver them and set up His kingdom on the earth. Still others affirm that the coming of the Lord takes place at conversion. But neither can this be true, for at conversion the sinner comes to the Lord, and not the Lord to the sinner. And yet others maintain that the spreading of the Gospel to all parts of the earth is the coming of the Lord. A moment's reflection on the subject, however, convinces us that this also is a mistaken thought, for His coming is to be sudden, "in the twinkling of an eye," "two will be sleeping in one bed, one shall be taken and the other shall be left," whereas the sending forth of missionaries to evangelize the world has taken centuries and, as all admit, is a slow and tedious process.

How Is He Coming? The best way to determine this is to search the Scriptures. Acts 1:9-11: "When he had spoken these things, while they beheld, He was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight. And while they looked stedfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel; which also said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven.' The same Jesus, visible, corporeal, the same resurrected body which you have just beheld, with the same pierced hands and feet. This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen Him go into heaven.

Coming in the Clouds. He went up in a cloud, He will return in like manner; that is, in the clouds of heaven, "Behold, he cometh with clouds, and every eye shall see him, and they also which pierced him: and all the kindreds of the earth shall wail because of him." Here is a literal statement in God's Word which cannot be taken in any other way.

He Is Coming Suddenly. "Of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only." "But as the days of Noah were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be: for as in the days that were before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noah entered into the ark, and knew not until the flood came, and took them all away; so shall also the coming of the Son of man be." There will not be time to prepare. Then those who are ready to go will be caught up to meet Him in the air, but those who are unprepared will be left behind.

He Will Come as a Thief in the Night. A thief comes to a home at an hour when least expected. The inmates of the home are not notified as to the hour of his arrival. A thief comes with a definite object in view, and when it is accomplished he quickly takes his departure, carrying with him that for which he came. He does not seek the furniture, nor the carpets. He comes for the gold, the silver, and the precious stones. The richest treasure in the earth today is the redeemed, blood-washed and Spirit-filled believers who wait for the coming of Jesus Christ. He is coming for the gold-gold that has been tried in the furnace of affliction; for the silver of atonement which has been wrought out in yielded lives; and for the precious stones which have been digged from the mire of sin and crime, and polished by the Master Himself into glittering diamonds to adorn His crown.

Loved Ones Gone. That day many homes will be left desolate; for the godly father, mother, husband, wife and child will be caught up to meet the Lord in the air. There will be confusion and despair in many places—loved ones gone. What does it mean? Where can the missing ones be? Then those who are left will begin to remember the words which they had heard for years, heard unheedingly,

words which if they had been regarded would have prepared them for that day.

When Is He Coming? It is no small wonder that the disciples asked Him the questions, "Tell us when shall these things be?" "What shall be the sign of thy coming and of the end of the age?"

These three questions concern three distinct events: the destruction of Jerusalem and its temple, with the overthrow of Jewish rule, and the dispersion of Israel; the coming of Christ for His saints when they will be caught up to meet Him in the air for the marriage of the Lamb; the end of the world (or age), when Satan will be cast into the bottomless pit, and the Lord will begin His reign over the earth as King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

Can one know the day or hour of His coming? No. "Watch ye therefore, for ye know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh. "Though we may not know the day or the hour, we are told in 1 Thessalonians 5 that we need not be ignorant of the times or seasons. There have been many signs given us to prove that His coming is near. Let us look at a few to see if the time is not at hand. False Christs are to appear. Many have come, saying, "I am Christ." There are over forty people in the world today who claim to be Christ. Among the number may be mentioned Mr. Swinefurth, Dora Beekman of Minnesota, Mr. Heron of Detroit, Mich., who declared himself to be Prince Michael coming to fulfill Dan. 12:1; and the Bab of Persia, whom so many worshiped as Christ. Many today declare the coming of Mrs. Eddy with her "Science and Health, or the Key to the Scriptures," to be the coming of the Lord. Such are some of the blasphemies of the day and such are some of the fulfilments of this prophecy.

"False prophets shall arise and deceive many." This is an age when false prophets and false religions spring up over night, and certainly they do deceive many. Christian Science calls itself Christian, yet denies the deity of Christ and the necessity of the atonement. Surely they are deceiving many. Spiritualism, the mother of Christian Science, is even less careful to cover its Satanic origin and power. Spiritualists claim to call up the dead, yet it is nothing but Satan himself impersonating departed spirits.

ing departed spirits.

"But," you say, "these religions perform many miracles, and therefore must be of God." No. The devil has power to perform miracles, for did he not cause the magicians' rod to become a serpent? He is going to display his power more and more in these last days, for Jesus said, "Many false Christs and prophets shall arise, and shall show great signs and wonders, to seduce, if it were possible, the very elect. In the 13th chapter of Revelation, we read that, in order to deceive the people, the devil will cause fire to come down from heaven. So we see from God's Word that he can and does perform miracles.

Love Shall Wax Cold. "Because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold." Today iniquity and lawlessness abound on every hand. Politics are corrupt, the desire for power and money urges people on. The world is pleasuremad with feasting, and drinking, dancing,

dressing. Yes, iniquity is abounding, and the cup of sin and crime is full to overflowing. Love waxes cold on every hand Many are falling away from the old faith of the Bible. Everywhere we see the cold forms and ceremonies of apostate creeds. Ministers deny the miracles and the supernatural of the Bible; they declare that only a part of God's sacred Word is re-liable and inspired. They not only deny the deity of Christ, but also declare it a sickening shock to refined people to make mention of the blood of Christ. say, "Let us not have altar calls and weeping for sins, and rejoicing in God for salvation." They no longer believe in these, but do believe in filling the church with concerts, suppers, shows, movies, and pool tables. God help us to tell the truth about this thing. So-called Christian colleges and seminaries teach evolution and modernistic ideas, and so destroy the old-time faith in young hearts that they come out skeptics and infidels, saying, "Where is the promise of His coming?" But praise God! there is a people who are not ashamed of God nor of His Word, but who are looking for Christ's coming, looking for the time when every knee shall bow, and every tongue shall confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Knowledge Shall Be Increased. Why did not our forefathers discover all the wonderful things man has discovered in recent years? The reason is this; that God had set a time for the increase of knowledge; i. e., in the last days. During the last two generations we have seen the invention of the steam locomotive, electric trains, trolley cars, and motors, electric lights, the telephone, telegraph, ocean cables, automobiles, aeroplanes, radio, great coal- and oil-burning steamers, submarines, giant cannon, torpedoes, gasoline-motor-driven farming implements, electric motors that do everything from sweeping floors to lighting whole cities, drawing long trains, and lifting hundreds of tons. Such inventions springing from the minds of two generations! What It can mean but one does it mean? thing; we are in the last days, and He, our Christ, shall soon come again.

"Many shall run to and fro" (Dan. 12: 4). Never in the history of the world has it been so easy and common to travel as it is today. Trains speed across the country day and night, train after train running within a few minutes of one another; and yet, the depots are always full of thousands of people, running to and fro. Thoroughfares and subways are blocked with automobiles. Aeroplanes are racing through the sky, carrying their passengers. Thus God's Word, spoken more than 2500 years ago is fulfilled, "Many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall be increased."

"Wars and rumours of wars." Since these words were uttered, there have been wars and rumours of wars. From the fall of Jerusalem in 70 A.D. to the warring of the Saxons, of Napoleon Bonaparte, the French Revolution, the American Revolution, down to the late wars—our Civil War, the struggle in the Philippines, the Boer War, the Boxer Rebellion, the World War. There has been one international upheaval after another. Then

there have been rumours of wars—rumours of war with Japan, with Mexico, and with many other countries. But Jesus said, "When ye see and hear all these things, be not troubled."

The Cry of Peace and Safety. "But when they shall cry, Peace and safety, then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child, and they shall not escape." "For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there shall be famines and pestilences, and earthquakes in divers places." For many years godly men have been teaching that Christ is coming back to earth, but they declared that certain things in prophecy must be fulfilled. There must first be a world war, the Jews must return to Palestine, there must be earthquakes, famines, pestilences, and blood-shed. The declaration that there was to be the greatest war the world had ever known was ridiculed. People cried, "We are too civilized; what did Christ know about our twentieth century? We will decide whether there will be a war or not. No, we will have peace forever.' That a world war was possible for a civilized age, they emphatically disbelieved. So the cry of peace and safety sped around the world. But the nations thought the best way to keep peace was to prepare for war, to build up a larger army and navy, so that other nations would be afraid to speak of war. "Then let us build a peace palace," said all the nations, "where the leaders of every government can come together to settle their difficulties without war." So they built at The Hague a Peace Palace costing several millions sterling. Each nation gave costly gifts and donations for its erection. Then they placed in it a marvelous library of 75,000 volumes dealing with the subject of international peace. A body of eminent judges from all nations was brought together as a permanent jury to settle each difficulty of the nations. Thus everything was arranged. There was to be no more war, for the judges would adjust all

The palace was completed, the flags of the nations were floating over it, bands blared forth the national anthems; soldiers marched while crowds cheered. All seemed peace and safety. But the words of the Bible must be fulfilled. There must be a great world war before Christ could come. Like a bolt of lightning out of a clear sky came the cry of war instead of that of peace. Within one month there were thirteen declarations of war. Six out of the great nations were tearing at one another's throats. The German hordes were sweeping through Belgium, longing to reach Paris. People began to realize that the good old Bible was true after all, "For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom." Wider and wider swept the war tornado, until our own United States of America was fighting with the rest.

"There Shall Be Blood and Fire and Vapors of Smoke." Blood? Yes, blood flowed all over the battlefields, till one could see even a deeper dye than that of the poppies. Fire? Fire was shot from the cannon's mouth, towns and villages were aflame, forests blazing, men even fighting one another with sheets of liquid

fire. Smoke? The heavens were filled with the smoke of the flames from earth below, from the battlefields, from guns and burning homes. On land man fought with vapor of smoke and poisoned gases; and on sea ships were wrapped in curtains of smoke to hide them from hostile eyes.

"There shall be famines, pestilences and earthquakes in divers places." Critics said before the war that there could not be famines, for our storehouses were all full, and every country well supplied. Who among us cannot see the fulfillment of Scripture in the past few years of awful suffering from famines in Armenia, Russia, and other lands, where thousands have died. Pestilences? "We shall never have another world epidemic with our modern medical system," they said. But just think of the plagues of the last generation. Thousands of children were stricken with infantile paralysis; millions of people were killed by influenza, until medical men could not cope with the situation, and caskets could not be made fast enough to bury the dead.

"Earthquakes in divers places." No one will dare dispute this sign, for earthquakes have increased over forty per cent in the last twenty years. In that time over 300 villages have been destroyed, according to statistics in Washington. Yet we have heard little about them in the daily news. Why? Because Satan wishes to keep the people blind to the fulfillment of the signs of Christ's coming. Recently in Japan there have been 273 quakes in two days; 216 of these were on the day of the great disaster which killed between 300,000 and 500,000 people, and left millions homeless. In many places there are shocks that we know little about. These things should stir us from our indifference to realize that Christ is coming, and coming soon.

Outpouring of the Holy Spirit. Last, but not least, the greatest sign to me is the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. Previous to 1906, Christians everywhere felt the need of a revival in their own lives and in the life of the church as a whole. Prayer-meetings were held everywhere, until at last God began to pour out His Spirit as He did in apostolic days. People of all denominations were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance, the sick were healed, the blind were made to see, the deaf to hear, the dumb to speak, and mighty signs and wonders were wrought, and are still being wrought in the name of Jesus Christ. A deeper life and walk in the Spirit, a clearer vision of the whitened harvest fields, and a deeper realization of Christ's coming were the results of this outpouring of God's Spirit. The end has not yet come, for again the church is sending forth the call to pray for a world-wide revival, and the revival is surely coming, for our God is always faithful to our call. But let us heed His Word of warning, "Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh.'

For Whom Is He Coming? Since He is coming, for whom is He coming? He is coming not for some denomination, but for His true saints, the true church, His Body, His Bride, for those who are washed in the blood and who are walking in all

the light God has given them. Thousands and thousands of blood-washed saints from all parts of the world will be caught up to meet the Lord in the air, so shall we ever be with the Lord.

The rapture must be distinguished from the revelation. The rapture is His coming in the air for the saints. He will not literally come to the earth at this time nor be seen by the inhabitants of the earth. There will be a period of several years, a period of great tribulation between the two events, "Tribulation such as was not since the beginning of the world, to this time, no nor ever shall be." His revelation is His literal coming to earth to set up His millennial kingdom. "Immediately after the tribulation of those days shall the sun be darkened, and the moon shall not give her light and the stars shall fall from heaven, and the powers of the heavens shall be shaken; and then shall appear the sign of the Son of Man in heaven, and then shall all the tribes of the earth mourn, and they shall see the Son of Man coming in the clouds of heaven with power and great glory.'

The saints who will have been caught up to heaven will come back with Him at this time and shall for one thousand years reign upon the earth. At His coming He will deliver Israel from the clutches of the Antichrist, and from the armies of the nations who will then be gathered against Jerusalem to destroy it.

World Not to Be Converted First. We can talk about converting the world and getting it ready for Christ's millennial reign, but the Scripture does not tell us that the world as a whole will be converted before He comes. It will not be until the setting up of His earthly kingdom that all will acknowledge Him as King of kings and Lord of lords. Then "The government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace."

"BUT BELIEVING"

Early this past Easter morning God dropped into my waiting heart these words—"Be not faithless, but believing"—spoken so forcefully to Thomas by our risen Lord. They have been sinking deeper each day as I have asked God to let them become assimilated by every part of my spiritual being. Perhaps God has a portion here for every young heart who reads these lines.

A word of such tremendous scope as "faith" makes an almost impossible subject. But as the Holy Spirit limits and defines its meaning to our individual hearts, by showing us our lack of faith along various lines, we have a more definite understanding of what it means. Its lack, so apparent in young and old everywhere, distinguishes these as the last days. Faith in God goes first, then faith in our fellow men; and in a heaving, turbulent mass we see the world, socially, morally, religiously—slowly disintegrating. Unrest, suspicion, jealousy, strife, backbitings, murmurings are just the beginning of woes resulting from such a "faithless" condition. And are we not there today? Who then but the faithful Holy Spirit sounds in all our hearts the divine clarion call for a "believing" peo-

Like a deadly miasma, unbelief creeps over us, unless we are alert in watchful prayer to guard against its oncoming. And how to guard? "Looking unto Jesus, the Author and Finisher of our faith." It is no task to trust one we know. Love begets faith, and the closer we draw to our lovely Jesus, the more steadfast and real becomes our faith. It is so easy to believe when Jesus is real. This is why the mighty outpouring of the Spirit which makes Jesus so gloriously real has stimulated a new, living faith in thousands of hearts the world over. Hallelujah! Living in the Spirit keeps the vision fresh and makes it easy for us to keep on believing in that first-love simplicity of faith. We often consider faith such a profound thing that we fail to see what a simple thing it really is.

"The just shall live by faith," so then it is the vital atmosphere of the growing child of God.

Sadly enough to some, the dimming of the heavenly vision has lowered faith's atmosphere and a lack of spiritual vitality has resulted. We do see souls cramped, and shriveled, and suffocating from an atmosphere of unbelief. "Lord, help us all to believe thee," should be the constant cry from our hearts. Then without strain or struggle let us in childlike confidence walk on with eyes unwaveringly fixed on Him who has promised, and who is faithful.

"Faith is believing, since the Lord hath

And is not founded on a wish or whim, For false belief creates no certitudes; But faith believes His word, since knowing Him.

And when He says, "I give," faith gladly takes,

And when He aught withholds, faith does not fear,

For having Him, faith has no other need,

And does not grope to feel if He is near."

There are four vital relations of faith to our lives. Faith in everyday living. Many regard some prominent one in gospel work, greatly used in public ministry, as being especially endowed with mighty faith; but God has hidden ones, filling common, humble places that, if the truth be known, have a faith just as mighty. Whatever the circumstances, environment, or nature of your life and ministry, you have an excellent opportunity to believe God. Have not we all sometimes found it harder to believe God for some apparently trifling thing than for the mountainous need? A kingdom was lost one time-so runs the old childhood rhymethrough the loss of one horseshoe nail. Some great defeats in God's cause have resulted from lack of faith in some hidden corner where God placed somebody, depending on him to believe Him and stand true. In your school, in your office, your factory, your home, recognize the importance of your faithfulness and however ordinary or discouraging your surroundings-"Be not faithless, but believ-

Faith for victory in the midst of severe trial. By faith the three Hebrew children "quenched the violence of fire" so the record runs in Hebrews 11. Go back and read the story in Daniel 3, "Our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace, and he will deliver us out of thine hand, O king. But if not . . . " Here was the challenge of faith from three men who shrank not from the acid test. Their one concern was to be true to God, not plead whimperingly for a way out. Have we not sometimes misjudged God's own believing children placed in a fiery furnace—accusing them of lack of faith for not getting out of their difficulty, not realizing that it took far more faith to hold quiet and steady in that fire. We have yet to learn that there is something bigger, more glorifying to God than the deliverance our natural heart cries out for. It takes a purer, holier faith to believe God and stand still, even though heart and brain and nerves are throbbing, until God's fullest plan is worked out and He opens the door of freedom. This is puregold faith, reflecting the very image of. Jesus Himself who came not to do His own will but the will of Him that sent Him. Ponder the life of Jesus at its three great crisis hours, in the wilderness of temptation, in the garden of Gethsemane, and on the cross. See how the greatness of His power and strength is manifested in not choosing an easier way but holding steady to the end. Then lift your heart to Him "not faithless, but believing" for His own matchless victory in your life.

"And so I whisper, 'As God will,'
And in the bottest fire hold still."

Faith for victory against over-whelming odds. Read the thrilling story of Paul's shipwreck in Acts 27. Look at Paul—a prisoner on a ship about to go down. No sun, no moon, no stars for many days, no hope of being saved. It was as dark a prospect as any of us ever faced. But how our hearts thrill as he stands forth in their midst with these words of faith, "Sirs, be of good cheer, for I believe God, that it shall be even as it was told me." Vs. 25. And so it came to pass, that they escaped all safe to land."

"Compass the frowning wall With silent prayer, then raise Before its rampart fall The victor's shout of praise."

It sha'll be done, faith rests assured, challenge thy mountain in the Lord.

What are you facing, dear young heart? Have you a vision that seems delayed, a longing as yet ungranted, a prayer still unanswered, a dear unsaved one you are striving to win, a God-given purpose hindered on every side, a way hedged about by frowning obstacles? I wish to relate for the glory of God how He wonderfully and miraculously raised up from certain death my son Ardsley, age 15, in answer to the prayer of faith. In the meantime the blood specialist advised that the blood culture showed Ardsley had infection in the blood (or blood poison). The doctor, together with the specialist, came and made a thorough examination, and after a short consultation stated that Ardsley was beyond human help and that nothing would do any good, that he was doomed to die, and to give him whatever he wanted. Wife and I both decided if human aid could not save him we would trust Jesus and leave him in His hands to do as He thought best.

Brother Tunmore was called in several times and prayed and talked to Ardsley about his soul's salvation, and he gave his heart to Jesus. We called for our pastor, Brother Nimrod Park, to come and pray for him, and as soon as he laid his hands on him and rebuked Satan and death, God graciously and mercifully undertook and Ardsley sat up in bed and called for his clothes. With my assistance he walked to the dining-room and sat down to dinner. A few days after, his arm swelled to about three times its natural size. Brother Park prayed for him again and he could raise it straight up in the air. MORE ABOUT THE INDIA MIS-SION STATIONS

From Bara-Banki a hurried journey was made to Nawabganj, stopping a short time at Gonda in order to change cars. Here we met Brother Chase, the missionary in charge. Brother Chase is doing excellent work and is proving to be an efficient missionary. On reaching Nawabgani we were met at the station by the missionaries, the boys from the school and the women from the zenanas, carrying banners or flags which they used in giving a salute of welcome. Before we reached the missionary station or compound we were overtaken by an India band bent upon contributing their part to the notable occasion. At the Mission they played lustily upon their crude instruments, no doubt to give the Missionary Secretary an example of the superiority of the Indian music together with its fascinating and inspiring charms. The more one manifests any appreciation of their beautiful music the more they want to perform. This would be an excellent example for some of our extremely diffident people to emulate. But with it all I love the Indian people.

Our Mission at Nawabganj we may well be proud of. In fact we are much indebted to all the missionaries who had any part whatever in helping to bring about the present work. The four outstanding features at Nawabganj are the Boys' School, the leper work, the zenana work and the evangelistic work. On approaching the station the new school building attracts one's attention. The school is the most prominent work on the station. This school by a recent vote of the Executive Committee becomes the official Boys' School of the Council. Besides the new school is the hostel or dormitory for the housing of the boys, between sixty and seventy in number. This building is far too small for the accommodation of all the boys. Then there is the building for the House Father of the school. This building is near the hostel The immediate need for the Boys' School is a modern bath house and its necessary complements with modern sanitation. Then there is the need of another hostel for the accommodation of the additional pupils in the future. Hereafter the school will be more or less under the administration of a school committee, thus adding to the efficiency of the work. We were very much impressed with the quality of the pupils, and the work they are doing. In connection with the school is an industrial department where those specially adapted are taught how to weave, do carpenter work and This affords both intelmachine work. lectual and practical training for the boys.

The next feature of the work was that

of the zenana. Here are women from various conditions in life. Many are widows, or those who have had other unfortunate circumstances in life, and here is a home for those most unfortunate victims, where they can enjoy the blessings of a Christian community and the privileges of religious fellowship and feeding upon the Word. Prayer forms an important part of their life, while the whole serves as an inspiring and uplifting influence.

The work among the lepers is very touching indeed. Here are a number of people afflicted with a most unfortunate and helpless disease. The flesh is slowly but imperceptibly eaten up. Think for a moment of being in that utterly helpless condition. What a blessing to know that some one cares and is willing to make a sacrifice to give you the Gospel, and at least a few of the comforts of life, especially eternal life. How your heart would rejoice. Among the inmates was a woman whose toes, fingers and nose were eaten away. She seemed to be in the last stages. She was a most pitiable sight, but I thank God she knew Christ as her Saviour.

Then, there is the important work of evangelism, which holds a unique place at Nawabganj. They have a native preacher living at a village about twelve miles from Nawabganj. Here excellent work is being done. Besides, there are a number of other preachers who go out to the surrounding villages to preach the Gospel. Thus the Gospel is being preached, and where hearts are not too far steeped in Hinduism the Word evidently takes root and sooner or later Christ is accepted as Saviour, at least inwardly. Persecution in India against those becoming Christians is beyond endurance and almost unbelievable. How these people need our earnest prayers. I have spoken to some about becoming a Christian, and invariably their answer was, "If I become a Christian where will I get my khana (food)," or "if I do they will put me out of my village.' what would you do under similar circumstances? May the dear Lord help them.

From Nawabganj we went to Fyzabad where Sister Helmbrecht is stationed at present. In going to Fyzabad it was necessary to pass through Ajodhya, a place noted for its many heathen temples and idol worship. Here there are many melas held every year. This year on March 4th to 8th was held one that occurs once every fifty-two years. It was estimated that fifteen million people were in attendance. They came from all over India, to bathe in the river and bring an offering of flowers or sweets to these idols of stone, dead idols who neither hear nor know. The long journeys they

take, the hardships they bear, the sufferings they endure, the time they spend, and the sacrifices they make would be an honorable and noble example, but it is all misguided energy. If we Pentecostal people possessed these characteristics we would soon shake the world. Oh, to be rooted and grounded in Pentecost and the Word. What India needs is a demonstration of the practical reality of Christianity over and above Hinduism. With the Baptism in the Holy Spirit and training that brings obedience to the Word we could do this very thing.

The work in Fyzabad is mostly village work A vast number of these villages are yet untouched. Here is a great field of missionary effort. More native preachers are needed at once to give these people the Word. Our sister is to be admired for the courage she displays in an attempt to reach these needy fields. Let us pray much for her to this end. enjoyed a day with her and the native preacher in village work. What a privilege to represent Christ to these poor people that they might know Him as their Saviour. India needs the Gospel very much. Had Christ lived to preach to one village a day until now there would still be 30,000 villages yet untouched.

Brother H. C. Ball who is on a trip through Texas, Arizona, New Mexico and California, sends a good report concerning the mission work in all this territory. He writes:

"In El Paso we had a good conference and nice meetings afterwards. There were delegates present from Ciudad, Juarez, Mexico; Anthony, New Mexico; Fabens, Texas and El Paso. Two were licensed to preach. The Assembly in El Paso seems to be in fairly good condition with quite a few new faces in the Assembly since the Convention last November.

"I went from there to Douglas, Ariz. and Agua Prieta, Mexico. The Assembly in Agua Prieta is in fine condition spiritually. I should judge there are between 50 and 100 members. Two were licensed to preach so that now we have seven ministers in the Arizona and Sonora District. I held one service in Pirtleville where we have an Assembly of from 15 to 20 brethren.

"At the Convention in Southern California three were licensed to preach, and we had delegates present from Northern California and from the South, San Diego.

"Brother Serapio Burciaga of Zarago-za, Coah., Mexico has been given a Dodge car for the Lord's work, but he needs new tires and has not enough money to buy them. I feel sure that many of our brethren would be glad to send him slightly used tires if they knew about it. If you feel like doing it, you may send tires to C. C. Garrett, Box 344, Eagle Pass. Texas, and he will hold them for Brother Burciaga."

FAITHFUL UNTO DEATH

Brother J. M. Perkins of Cape Palmas, Liberia, sends the last testimony of a remarkable native worker named William, who has just gone to his reward.

A runner has just arrived with news of the home-going of our beloved William. We have not had time to learn particulars, but fear the enemy has poisoned him. It was really wonderful how the Spirit of God had opened up this darkened mind and given him an insight into the deep things of God. Quite often, when a certain truth was brought to his notice in the Word, he would express delight and surprise, saying, "God show me that thing, but I don't know it live in Bible." He used to wear a ring on his finger, till one day Mrs. Perkins asked him why he wore it. He said, "I do not know what I wear it for; two or three times I take it off and throw it away, then I put it on again." When Mrs. Perkins showed him the Word about not adorning ourselves with outward adorning, he said, "I understand now that God want me to take this ring off." It came off and never went on again.

He and Peter had been on the road pretty steady for some time and expressed their desire to remain home awhile and get some more Bible study. While here, a call came for them. One man, whose eyes were partly open to the truth, had persuaded his father to destroy his jujues, and wanted William and Peter to come and do the work. On their way they met the king of a large town ten miles away, whose people had once destroyed their ju-jues but had gotten a new supply. The king had come under conviction for this and came down to the mission to confess his wrong and say he wanted all their ju-jues destroyed. He told the boys to go on and burn the jujues, but the king himself came on down. The boys went from Gropaka to a point two days farther back, then comes the

news of his sudden death.

William used to say, "I thought my body was my own, but this time God got my body." At our Christmas meeting this year he said, "This time I no got any hands, I no got any feet, I no got any eyes or ears. I dead already. Jesus got my hands and feet and eyes and ears. Jesus got me altogether." His love for Jesus was without dissimulation. He hated sin, but loved the sinner very compassionately. Late at night and early in the morning William's voice could be heard in prayer. In our prayer services, when we had William to pray and Peter to sing with a loud voice, in the Spirit, it seemed as if they were a host in themselves.

Almost unhindered he allowed the blessed Holy Spirit to live out the Christ-life in him. It was a treat to hear him testify. He always had something fresh and juicy and good to say. The Holy Spirit convicted him of sin, saved and baptized him in the Holy Spirit while he was down the coast working for a white trader. For four days before coming through to the Baptism in the Holy Spirit he did not sleep or eat. Of course plenty of people thought he was crazy, but he told them, "No, I no got craze, I no got sick.

I just got Holy Spirit." At once he was filled with a longing to preach to his peo-

In our Sunday night service about two weeks ago Willam told us of a vision he had just had. He said, "In my sleep God show me great, great, fine, fine picture. He show me 'ven (heaven). The place be too fine and it be big too much. I see plenty people and plenty, plenty fine house and fine thing. My tongue no fit to tell all the fine thing I see. At the far side and on one high place in the middle I see one bright man. His face shine too much. His face shine past the sun. He tell me to come to Him. I never saw anybody face shine so before. There was plenty green grass in the place and it was too big. My tongue no fit to tell you all I see in that place. I thank God for all He done for me. I don't know how to read, and He teach me how to read. I don't know how to pray, and He teach me how to pray. He never forget me day or night. Before, I always curse people and want to fight and do every evil thing. But God took all the fight and steal and curse far away from my heart. I no like them any more at all. First time when I do all these wicked things it bring plenty trouble for me, but this time when I no do them then no trouble for me again. I know He teach me plenty thing, and show me that heaven be fine place too much."

A NEW MISSIONARY IN INDIA Miss Katherine Cooke writes her first

letter to the Foreign Missions Department after arrival in India as follows:

"After our arrival in India it was Christmas time before we got settled and then I commenced the study of the language. I enjoy the study very much and am getting along nicely, so they tell me. My studies have been interrupted, however, three times by attacks of dysentery and once with flu. The hot weather is here and I find it hard to get back my usual 'pep' but I am looking to the Lord to open the way for me to go to language school in May in the hills where I can study in a cooler atmosphere. It seems impossible to study in the heat on the plains.

'I cannot tell you how glad I am to be here. I am very happy in the work and am enjoying it, but will enjoy it much more of course when I can speak the language fluently.

"We surely need a new bungalow. This old mud hut house is falling to pieces and will hardly go through another rainy season. Then too, we are very crowded. Mrs. Harvey, her little girl and myself lived in a tent when we first came, but it has long since become too hot for that. Mrs. Harvey and Zaida are in a little room that Miss Helmbrecht vacated and I have my trunk on the little veranda off the Nethery girls' room. We all sleep out in the yard at night as it is too hot in the house. We trust the Lord will give us funds for the new bungalow

A HEATHEN WIFE

From Liberia, W. Africa comes the story of a native boy who had been trained on one of the mission stations and who had endeared himself to the missionaries. A short time ago this native boy died and the loss was keenly felt by the missionaries and by his friends. Some time before his death the family of the boy had bought a girl for him and had paid one bullock down on her. William, for that was the boy's name, put her in the mission school to be trained for his wife. As soon as William's family heard that he was dead they made a rush to the mission station to get the girl and to carry her back to the heathen town. Three different parties have come to the mission and the last one was the King of the town and the girl's mother. The missionaries are fighting to hold her on the station rather than to allow her to be carried back into heathendom. The missionaries write that up to the present time Martha has taken sides with them and they have been able to hold her on the station. They state it is hard work talking these long palavers with the black men and they ask our prayers that this girl may be spared to the mission station and saved from heathendom.

MR. MOODY AND THE FREE-THINKERS

Amongst the most remarkable scenes have ever witnessed was one in East London during the visit of those beloved and honored men of God, Moody and Sankey, in the years 1883-84. was pitched in the center of the dense working population of that quarter, where men by the thousand live and work in workshops and factories. One Monday evening had been reserved for an address to Atheists, Sceptics, and Free-thinkers of all shades.

At that time Charles Bradlaugh, the champion of Atheism was at his zenith, and, hearing of this meeting, he ordered all the clubs he had formed to close for the evening, and all the members to go and take possession of the hall. They did so, and five thousand men marched

in from all directions and occupied the whole of the seats.

The service commenced earlier than usual. After the preliminary singing, Mr. Moody asked the men to choose their favorite hymns, which suggestion raised many a laugh, for Atheists have no song or hymn. The meeting got well under way. Mr. Moody spoke from "Their rock is not our rock, our enemies themselves being the judges" (Deut. 32:31). He poured in a broadside of telling, touching incidents from his own experience of the death-beds of Christians and Atheists, and let the men be judges as to who had the best foundation on which to rest faith and hope.

Reluctant tears were wrung from many an eye. The great mass of men, with the darkest, most determined defiance of God stamped upon their countenances, faced this running fire attacking them in their most vulnerable points, namely, their hearts and their homes; but when the sermon was ended one felt inclined to think nothing had been accomplished, for it had not appealed to their intellects, or reasoning faculties, and had convinced them of nothing.

At the close Mr. Moody said, "We will rise and sing 'Only Trust Him,' and while we do so will the ushers open all the doors so that any man who wants to leave can do so, and after that we will have the usual inquiry meeting for those who desire to be led to the Saviour." I thought, "All will stampede, and we shall only have an empty hall." But instead the great mass of five thousand men rose. sang, and sat down again, not one man

vacating his seat. "I Can't!" "I won't!"

What next? Mr. Moody then said: "I will explain four words-Receive, Believe, Trust, Take, HIM." A broad grin pervaded all that sea of faces. After a few words upon "Receive," he made the appeal. "Who will receive Him? Just say, I will." From the men standing round the edge of the hall came some fifty 'esponses, but not one from the mass seated before him. One man growled, "I can't!" to which Mr. Moody replied, "You have spoken the truth, my man; glad you spoke Listen, and you will be able to say 'I can't' before we are through."

Then he explained the word "Believe." and made his second appeal, "Who will say 'I will believe Him?" Again some responded from the fringe of the crowd, till one big fellow, a leading club man, shouted, "I won't!" Great-hearted Mr. Moody, overcome with tenderness and compassion, burst into broken, tearful words, half sobs, "It is 'I will," or 'I won't' for every man in this hall tonight."

The Atheists Confounded Then he suddenly turned the whole attention of the meeting to the story of the Prodical Son, saying, "The battle is on the will, and only there. When the young man said 'I will arise,' the battle was won, for he had yielded his will; and on that point all hangs tonight. Quickly the meeting was closed, that personal work might begin, and from that night till the end of the week nearly two thousand men were swung out from the ranks of the foe into the army of the Lord by the surrender of their will. They heard His "rise and walk," and they followed Him. The permanency of that work was well attested for years afterward, and the clubs never recovered their footing.
