All Things Are Yours





OR all things are yours; whether Paul, or Apollos, or Cephas, or the world, or life, or death, or things present, or things to come; all are yours; and ye are Christ's; and Christ is God's" (1 Cor. 3:21-23)

We are ambassadors for Christ. And since we are appointed to this office, all things that pertain to godliness are obtainable for this

godly work.

"All things are yours." The wealth, the knowledge, the grace that was in Paul, Apollos or Cephas, are equally available to those to whom the epistle was written and to the children of God everywhere. All things that pertain to godliness—the graces, the gifts, right living and right walking, all are yours, and ye are Christ's and Christ is God's. Relationship to Christ, who is related to God, is the heritage of every believer

Paul declares, "And ye are complete in Him" (Col. 2:10). Man is ever learning the subtraction sum from the enemy. "You are not this and you are not that." The Holy Ghost wants to teach us addition and multiplication, and He tells us all things are ours, that we can do all things through Christ, that all things that pertain to life and godliness are our portion, that through His grace we have victory over all the power of the enemy.

Cleansing from all sin is provided, and all-prevailing power through the all-victorious blood. These are part of the all-things that are yours.

Christ was living in poverty and yet possessed all things, for He possessed God and God possessed Him. And He is the link of man to God and God to man. The man Christ Jesus is the God-ordained channel, and God-discovered way through which God could speak to man, could get related to man, and could be restored to man. Salvation is of God. Man is the recipient of redemption, of salvation. False religions

make man his own saviour; and man, by his own merit, tries to get into favor with God. That discounts grace, sets aside grace, kills grace. The grace of God is seen in Jesus Christ that though He was rich yet for our sakes He became poor that we through His poverty might become rich. Christ became bankrupt as it were in order that the bankrupt man could have the riches of God.

As long as man has a banking account of his own it will be his own, but it won't buy an inch of heaven. All the riches of all the rich men that have lived in all the ages will not buy even a small portion of grace. If it could be bought it would not be grace. Grace is grace because it is grace. Accept your bankrupt position. Then you can have the riches of heaven.


Man by wisdom knew not God—never will, never can. True wisdom from God shows man his foolish position, his undone state, that he is an alien from God, and that he is a child of wrath. Human wisdom never points the finger of condemnation at him who possesses it.

The test of a genuine revival is the presence or absence of old-time conviction of sin.

Deep, heart-searching, piercing arrows of conviction, bringing sorrow and remorse for sin, always mark heaven-born revivals.

When Jesus spoke of going away, sorrow filled the hearts of His disciples. Then taking them into His confidence, He told them the plan. He said it was needful for Him to go away, for if He did not go, the Comforter would not come, but if He went He would send the Comforter. When the Comforter would come He would reprove and convict men of sin. "When He is come, He will reprove the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment."

On the day of Pentecost, the day the Holy Spirit came, Peter arose in the power of the Lord and preached. Just what Jesus had foretold came to pass. When they heard Peter's words they were pricked in the heart, we are told, and came to Peter and the rest of the apostles asking, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" Peter exhorted them to turn to the Lord in repentance, and be baptized, for then they, too, would receive the gift of the Holy Ghost. About three thousand souls were added unto them that day. It was the fulfilling of the promise of the Lord Jesus, that when the Comforter was come, He would bring conviction to the hearts of men.

That is what we need today.

The Christian world today that sees the drift of the times, that sees the dethroning of the Bible, and the lack of faith and power in the church cries, "We need a revival." All around the world thousands are praying, "Send a worldwide revival."

God is hearing! The revival is begun!

Where is the revival?

Revival is found today as it was found in the second chapter of Acts, on the birthday of the church. God's plan does not change!

Revival today is found where Upperroom scenes are being repeated. Today
it is found where men are filled with the
mighty power of the Holy Ghost, and
speak forth the Gospel message, "not with
enticing words of man's wisdom, but in
demonstration of the Spirit, and of power,"
God also working with them and confirming the Word with signs following,
and with divers miracles and gifts of the
Holy Ghost.

This is what is considered in the New Testament as fully preaching the Gospel of Christ. The apostle Paul refers to "mighty signs and wonders, by the power of the Spirit of God; so that from Jerusalem, and round about unto Illyricum, I have fully preached the gospel of Christ." This is the "gospel with power."

And this is what we must have. Not a "talked-up" revival, but a "prayed-down"

revival. Some who are praying for it to come, who have preconceived ideas of how they expect it, or where, may not recognize it now that it is coming. Nevertheless it's here.

It is bringing pungent conviction of sin. It is bringing burning tears of repentance. It is constraining strong men to call on God for mercy.

In the days of John Wesley sinners fell prostrate on the ground where outof-door meetings were held. They screamed out in agony of soul, his journal tells us, clutching at the ground. Then when they surrendered, he says, the sweetest smile of heaven itself would play upon their faces, and the sweetest, most gentle adoration arise to the Lord. That was conviction, and the blessing that followsfull salvation.

Under the preaching of Jonathan Edwards, men would fall from their seats as dead men, as many as perhaps fifty in a service. That was conviction brought by the searching presence of the Holy Spirit.

Many of us have read of Charles G. Finney walking one day through a factory. At the sight of his face, marked by the presence of God's Spirit, one young girl began to weep. Then others at work in the factory began to weep. The superintendent of the factory said it would be more profitable to have a prayer meeting then and there than to try to go on with the day's work. So they turned the factory rooms into an altar of prayer. Sinners cried to God for mercy, and many were saved. That was conviction.

The prophet Joel tells us there was to be a falling of the early and the latter rain. Peter saw the early rain, for he said, "This is that which was spoken of by the prophet Joel." We are seeing the latter rain, preparing the great harvest field, the world, for the final sickle. The same rain that is ripening the tares is ripening the wheat. The very characteristics that marked the falling of the rain in Peter's day, mark the falling of the rain today.

Then it was the presence of the Holy Ghost filling the disciples with power from on high that gave arrows to their words to pierce the hearts of their hearers. Today again, it is the presence of the Holy Ghost filling and anointing those who proclaim the Gospel, that stirs men's hearts to cry for God.

Look about you!

Where, apart from the Latter Rain message is there a deep moving reviva! wave?

Where, apart from the people who have sought God that they might be baptized with the power from on high, do we find deep, piercing conviction for sin?

Where, apart from those who depend not upon their natural learning, but upon the supernatural power of "God working with them," can we find power to combat the wave of indifference and apostasy to-day?

Outside the special presence of the Holy Ghost there is no power to lift a revival meeting today! There is preaching, but not power! There may be hand-shaking and determined, fine endeavor, but not the old-time conviction that would get men out of bed to call on God for mercy.

Evangelism outside the message of the power of the Holy Ghost, is in a deplorable condition today.

God has raised up noble and stalwart witnesses to the infallibility of the Bible, men of wisdom, men of learning. Courage-ously have they sought and labored to fulfill their mission. We honor them and love them for their work's sake. Yet a learned and literal witness to the authenticity of the Scriptures is not sufficient. That is one witness to the fundamentals of the Gospel. But it has not brought revival!

God is raising up a second. It is a supernatural witness. He is finding men and women from the highways and the byways of life, some who have not spent years in great universities, and He is choosing them out as He chose fishermen and tax-gatherers in days long ago. Upon their hearts He is laying the burning message of the Gospel, of the power of Jesus' blood to wash away sins, of power through faith for the sick to be healed. They cannot lean upon their own understanding, therefore they are compelled to lean hard upon God.

They are forced to depend upon Him. And He does not fail them. No. God is working, confirming the Word with signs and wonders.

What is the result?

The Holy Spirit begins to work in a supernatural measure. Old-time conviction seizes men's hearts. The Holy Spirit accomplishes what much learning could not do; breaks hardened hearts and fallow ground. Where the Holy Spirit is working folks are getting saved. Yes, old-time weeping, old-time crying to God, old-time repenting, then old-time victory, and old-time glory!

Supernatural features marked the early church. Men believed.

God is restoring the supernatural in a God-forgetting generation, and again common folks are believing God.

The supernatural is God's last witness before the tribulation to an apostate church and a God-rejecting generation.

Does it bring results?

It does! It melts hearts that learned dissertations on the Scriptures fail to melt. It brings conviction.

In our own meetings when God was healing the sick in a miraculous way, have seen strong men rise and tell us they were awakened in the midnight watches and compelled to rise and pray. I have seen young men leave the scene of a revival, walk blocks away, then be compelled to turn about, come back to the meeting, find their way to the altar where others were weeping their way to God, and call for mercy. I have seen women leave a meeting, go to their homes, only to be compelled to return, find the prayer room and seek God. I have seen young folks standing with their companions, laughing at what God was doing, suddenly compelled to break away from the group, fall at the altar, and call for mercy.

That is conviction!

I have seen little children seek the Saviour, then receive the Baptism of the Holy Ghost, so gently, so sacredly, so unmistakably direct from heaven that the hardest hearts, looking on those angel faces, radiant with God's glory, would break, and scores and hundreds turn to weeping for their sins, confessing and seeking the Saviour. Oh, it is the coming of the Comforter, the Holy Spirit, that reproves of sin, of righteousness, of judgment.

It is where the Holy Spirit is working that we hear messages of warning, inspired of the Holy Ghost, warning of the coming days of tribulation, of the clouds of wrath and judgment about to break upon a God-rejecting generation; warnings that make the strongest to tremble, and turn sinners to flee from the wrath to come. It is the supernatural power of God that can do this amid all the fast

living of today.

Down in Arkansas, I talked earnestly to a man about his soul one night, begging him to turn to God. For eighteen years his wife had prayed for his conversion. He would not yield. But the convicting power of the Holy Spirit had certainly been in that service. He went Later I found out he could not sleep all that night. Next morning he could not eat his breakfast. He went out into the fields to work, but could not get his mind on his work. He came in to dinner, but could not eat, and returned to the fields. At five o'clock that afternoon, out in the fields, he threw up his hands and cried, aloud, "O God, I surrender. I can hold out no longer. Save me now." He was saved, and has since lived a real Christian life. It took the power of the Holy Ghost to do that.

In a city in the Middle West we were holding a campaign. The power of God was in evidence in a miraculous way. The sick were being healed. Scores were turning to God. I went down the aisles one night inviting to the altar those who appeared hungry for God. I spoke to one woman who gave a haughty and indifferent reply. With sorrow I turned away, and went on to others. Some time later we were in that same city for the dedication of their large new tabernacle. On the first night numbers were praying through to salvation, and then arising to testify to those still seated in the congregation what God had done for their souls.

A number, with beaming faces and uplifted hands had testified to being saved, when one woman, after praising God for saving her that night, turned and flung her arms about my neck crying, "Now will you forgive me?" I had no idea what she was talking about, and tried as best could to get her quiet. "Can't you get quiet now, and tell me what it is?" I asked her. So eventually she controlled her weeping and told me. She said, "I am the woman who spoke so coldly to you when you asked me about becoming a Christian. That was the last time you I went home that night and were here. could not sleep, thinking what a serious thing I had done in turning down God's

invitation. In all the months that have gone by, I have regretted that word. In the midnight hours I have been awakened to live again that scene. Long ago I promised God that if He would ever bring back that lost opportunity, I would never again let it go; I would turn to God. He has given me the opportunity I prayed for. So tonight, the very first night, I have

come, and I know Jesus has saved me. Now will you forgive me?" What a scene of rejoicing followed!

No human wisdom, no human endeavor, could bring about scenes like this.

Conviction?

It is the supernatural presence of the Holy Ghost that brings it about.

CONGREGATIONAL SINGING

All our churches need arousal on this subject. Those who can sing must throw their souls into the exercise, and those who cannot sing must learn how, and it shall be heart to heart, voice to voice, and the nousic shall swell jubilant with thanksgiving and tremulous with pardon. Have you ever noticed the construction of the human throat as indicative of what God means us to do with it? In only an ordinary throat and lungs there are fourteen direct nouscles that produce 16,383 sounds, and thirty indirect muscles that produce 173, 741, 823 sounds; and the human voice can produce seventeen trillion, five hundred and ninety-two billion, one hundred and eighty-six million, forty-four thousand, four hundred and fifteen different sounds. THE GREATEST PERIL

The deepest world-peril of all is the cold-blooded refusal of the nations to turn to God. "If," says Dr. J. H. Jowett. "you look around today-and ever since the armistice-would you be persuaded to believe that we are going to reconstruct our life on the double basis of piety and fraternity? Are the people eagerly and reverently exploring the mind and heart of God, so that they may obtain sufficient vision and light to reconstruct their common life? I for one am profoundly disappointed. I did believe that after these terrible and desolating years there would be a more urgent and hungry inclination towards God. I don't see it. I thought we should be dead weary of the old cisterns-broken cisterns which can hold no water-and that we should be turning to the well of salvation. I expected that we should be terribly tired of things, and that we should want more of the Spirit. I expected that God would be greatly worshipped, and that piety would be coming back to her sacred nest. Do you think we are seeking God, and that there is more piety than there was some years ago? I don't find it."

The Great Subject of Stewardship

Our Lord's teachings as to money gifts, if obeyed, would forever banish all limitations on church work and all concern about supplies. These teachings are radical and revolutionary. So far are they from practical acceptance that, although perfectly explicit, they seem more like a dead language that has passed out of use than like a living tongue that millions know and speak. Should these sublime and unique teachings be translated into living, the effect not only upon benevolent work, but upon our whole spiritual character, would be incalculable.

I. The Principle of Stewardship

The basis of Christ's teaching about money is the fundamental conception of

stewardship (Luke 12:42; 16:1-8). Man is not an owner but a trustee, managing another's goods and estates, God being the one original and inalienable Owner of all. The two things required of stewards are that they be "faithful and wise," that they study to employ God's gifts with fidelity and sagacity - fidelity so that God's entrustments be not perverted to self-indulgence; sagacity, so that they be converted into the largest gain possible.

II. The Principle of Investment

In our Lord's teachings we find this kindred principle of "Thou investment: oughtest to have put My money to the exchangers" (Matt. Money-25:27). changing and investing is an old business. The "ex-changers," as Luke are renders, the bankers, the ancient Trapezitae, who received money on deposit and paid interest for its use, like modern savings institutions. The argument of our Lord refutes the unfaithful servant on his own plea, which his course showed to be not an excuse, but a pretext. It was true that he dared not risk trading on his own account; why not, without such risk, get a moderate interest for his Master by lending to professional traders. It was not fear but sloth that lay behind his unfaithfulness and unprofitableness.

Thus directly is taught the valuable lesson that timid souls, unfitted for bold and independent service in behalf of the Lord, may link their incapacity to the capacity and sagacity of others who will make their gifts and possessions of use to the Master.

III. The Subordination of Money

Another most important principle is the subordination of money, as emphatically taught and illustrated in the rich young ruler (Matt. 19:16-26). This narrative, rightly regarded, presents no enigma.

With all his attractive traits, this man was a slave. Money was not his servant, but his master; and because God alone is to be supreme, our Lord had no alternative. He must demolish this man's idol. It was not the man's having great possessions that was wrong, but that his possessions had the man. How few rich men keep the mastery and hold money as their servant, in absolute subordination to their own manhood and the masterhood of the Lord!

IV. The Law of Recompense

We ascend a step higher and consider our Lord's teaching as to the law of rec-"Give, and it shall be given unto you" (Luke 6:38). We are taught that getting is in order to giving, and consequently that giving is the real road to getting. God is an economist. He intrusts larger gifts to those who use the smaller well. Hundreds of devout souls who have chosen voluntary poverty for His sake have been entrusted with immense sums for His work. George Muller, of Bristol.

found in a life that nearly rounded out a century, that it was safe to give to God's purposes the last penny at any moment, with the perfect assurance that more would come in before another need should arise. And there was never one failure for seventy years.

V. Superior Blessedness

Kindred to this law of recompense is the law of superior blessedness. "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20: 35). Paul quotes this as a saying of our Lord. Whatever the blessedness of receiving, that of giving belongs to a higher plane. By a singular decree of God, what I surrender for myself for the sake of others comes back even to me in larger blessing. It is like the moisture which the spring gives out in streams which through evaporation returns in showers to supply the very channels which filled the the spring itself.

VI. Computation by by Comparison

We rise a step

higher in considering God's laws of computation. How does He reckon gifts? Jesus teaches it is by comparison. No one narrative is more telling on this theme than

that of the poor widow who dropped into the treasury her two mites. The Lord standing near, watched the offerings cast into the treasury. This widow's whole offering counted financially for but a farthing. What could be much more insignifi-But the two mites constituted her whole means of subsistence. others reserved what they wanted for themselves, and then gave out of their superabundance. The contrast is emphatic; she "out of her deficiency," they "out of their supersufficiency." Self-indulgent hoarding and spending spreads a banquet; the crumbs fall from the table, to be gathered up and labeled "charity." But when the one possession that is dearest, the last trusted resource, is surrendered to God, then comes the vision of the treasure laid up in Heaven.

VII. Unselfishness in Giving

We ascend still higher to the law of unselfishness in giving. "Do good and lend, hoping for nothing again" (Luke 6:35). Much giving is not giving at all, but only lending or exchanging. He who gives to another of whom he expects to receive as much again, is trading. He is seeking gain, and is selfish. True giving has another's good solely in view, and hence bestows upon those who cannot and will not repay, who are too destitute to pay back, and too degraded, perhaps, to appreciate what is done for them. That is like God's giving to the evil and unthankful. That is the giving prompted by love.

VIII. Sanctified Giving

Our Lord announces also a law of sanctification. "The altar sanctifieth the gift" -association gives dignity to an offering (Matt. 23:19). If the cause to which we contribute is exalted it ennobles and exalts the offering to its own plane. God's altar was associated with His worship. gift laid upon it acquired a new dignity by so being deposited upon it. Some objects which appeal for gifts we are at liberty to set aside because they are not sacred. We may give or not as we judge best, for they depend on man's enterprises and schemes, which we may not altogether approve. But some causes have Divine sanction, and that hallows them; giving becomes an act of worship when it has to do with the altar.

IX. Transmutation

Another law of true giving is that of transmutation. "Make to yourselves friends of the mammon of unrighteousness; that, when ye fail, they may receive you into everlasting habitations."

Mammon here stands as the equivalent of money, practically worshiped. It reminds us of the golden calf that was made out of the earrings and jewels of the crowd. Now our Lord refers to a second transmutation. The golden calf may in turn be melted down and coined into Bibles, books, tracts, and even souls of men. Thus what was material and temporal becomes immaterial and spiritual, and eternal. Here is a man who has a hundred dollars. He may spend it all on a banquet, in which case the next day there is nothing to show for it. It has secured a temporary gratification of appetitethat is all. On the other hand, he invests in Bibles at ten cents each, and it buys a thousand copies of the Word of God. These he judiciously sows as seed of the Kingdom, and from that seed springs up a harvest, not of Bibles, but of souls. Out of the unrighteous mammon he has made immortal friends, who, when he fails, receive him into everlasting habitations. May this not be what is meant by the true riches—the treasure laid up in Heaven in imperishable good?

AN EXPERIENCE IN TITHING

In which the writer passes through a time of severe testing and receives wonderful blessings.

I had heard the truth about tithing but because we were in debt, I thought I could not afford to give so much to the Lord

About five years ago, the truth was made plain to me, that, though we may be in debt to man, our duty to God comes first. AN EVANGELIST'S STORY

When the Lord saved me He put a new song in my heart even praises unto our God. I was not brought up in a Christian home although I believe my mother was a saved woman. She was not, however, demonstrative in her religion, and as a child, I do not remember that she ever talked to me about the necessity of the new birth. My father was not a Christian. I never saw him at a religious service until he was an old, gray-haired man, when the Lord gave me the joy of leading him to Jesus.

My mother was a writer, and some of her stories were dramatized and produced in the theatres.

Quite early in life, my mother began to train me for the same work.

I was five years old when I made my first appearance on the stage, and had a part in my mother's plays. As time went on I was placed in the hands of Professors to develop what talent I possessed for elocution and dramatic art, with a view of becoming an entertainer. It was a very fascinating life to me. I loved the glitter and beauty of the theatre. The lights and music, the flowers and applause of the people and at sixteen, life looked very rosy to me. The future stretched out before me in dazzling brightness. I was really going to have a career.

At the age of fifteen I began to assist my mother in her literary work, and when barely seventeen secured a position on a city paper as society reporter, and often I was given an assignment. I worked at this for three years and succeeded, but during that time I continued to study for a public career and was making rapid progress in voice and elocutionary training.

My life was one whirl of activity. I was present at all the social functions. My work as a reporter took me everywhere and into everything and I loved it.

During those years I never had any serious feelings about my soul. I went to church but never heard a sermon that brought me under conviction. I took for granted that I was saved, for my mother, who believed in predestination, told me I was saved before I was born. I felt, of course, that this gracious state relieved me of all responsibility. There were times, however, when something seemed to say to me, "You are wrong, you are making a mistake in the choice of your life's career. God has something altogether different for you."

Then something happened. The Lord whose loving eye was upon me all the years of my life, now began to lay His hand upon me, though I did not know He was directing my movements.

A great evangelistic campaign came to our city. The meetings were held in a big, board building, not unlike our tabernacles of these days, and people far and near were attracted to the meetings.

One day the Editor said to me, "Go down and cover those meetings, Miss Edick, and get us copy for each issue of the News, while they last, and make it snappy and entertaining."

I shall never forget those meetings. Many a time I had been sent to report speeches, lectures and sermons, but this was altogether different. They had great testimony meetings, such as I had never seen before. One night a woman got up and in her testimony said, "she just knew her husband was converted because he came down stairs the other morning and kissed her for the first time in twelve years."

That went into the paper with big head-

One night a bright-faced young man leaped to his feet and said, "Glory to God, I am saved. The fellows down town are betting a barrel of beer that I won't hold out till Saturday night, but by the help of God I intend to go through."

I was interested. "Who is that young man?" I asked some one near me, "Why he is their star convert, the preachers all bank on him," was the reply.

"Well, if I knew how to pray, I think I would pray for him. I hope he holds out anyway," was my mental comment. "Believe I'll get his little story for the paper."

At the close of the meeting, I sought the minister and he said, "Certainly Miss Edick I will introduce you to this young man," and the next moment the minister was saying, "Miss Edick, allow me to introduce my friend Mr. Frey, who is only a week old in the Christian life." I raised my eyes and looked straight into the face of my future husband.

The meetings were drawing to a close and as yet I had not decided for Christ. The fiery message of the Evangelist had burned its way into my soul and I was miserable. The devil said to me, "If you go to that altar you will have to give up your career. You will lose your friends and break your mother's heart." But one night my pencil could not write. Big tears dropped on the pad in front of me. I was sick of myself and every thing else. At that moment a dear woman put her arms around me and said, "Come Mae, let us go to the altar." It was all I needed, just a loving word and a gentle pressure of the sister's hand in mine, as we went down the trail and there bowing low before my Saviour, I cried, "Lord, be merciful to me a sinner." Praise God, the burden of my heart rolled away and I entered into rest. Joy unspeakable and full of glory filled my soul. I knew I was saved.

From that moment my life was changed, and I knew the Lord wanted me for His service. I left the big church where

I sang in the choir and went down into a little mission to play and sing for Jesus and to help lead lost souls to Him. Mother was heart-broken indeed. When meeting was out, I would find her at the door waiting for me. She never came inside. All the way home she would weep and tell me what an ungrateful girl I was, for I had given up everything for Jesus and His service. "After all I have sacrificed for you," dear mother would cry, and all the money I have spent on your studies, to think you are flinging away your wonderful career for a life like this, you are disgracing yourself and me."

I never had one word of encouragment in my Christian life at home or among my friends. They told me I had made a fool of myself, and that I would see the day that I was serry.

No longer could I attend the social clubs, dances, theatres and card parties. My life was changed. My only desire was to win souls for Jesus.

One day I was invited by a pastor to assist him in some meetings, and that was the beginning of real evangelistic work for me. Of course I did not attempt to preach. It never occurred to me that I would ever do more than sing and play and do personal work. After I was married, husband and I continued to assist pastors in evangelistic meetings, doing altar work and leading the song service.

One day a letter came inviting us for a union campaign in a Pennsylvania town. The meetings were being wonderfully blessed of God and one morning the pastor, in whose home we were stopping, came in and said to me, "Mrs. Frey, I just met the dean of the college—it was a college to n—and he says the entire body of students are coming to the service tonight and asked for reservations. I told him we would reserve the galleries for them. 'We are coming to hear the woman preach' he said." "What woman? I asked. "Why, you of course," replied the pastor.

"But I can't preach," I cried in consternation,

"You have got to preach." announced the pastor in no uncertain tones.

I fled to my room, and throwing myself on the bed, burst into tears. In a little while my husband and the pastor followed me, "Come, now," said the preacher, "stop crying, and get down on your knees and pray. Didn't you tell the Lord you would do whatever he wanted you to do?"

"Y-e-s, but I n-e-ver t-o-l-d Him I w-o-uld pr-each. I ca-n'-t pr-each," I sobbed. My husband tried to comfort me. "I'll br-ea-k d-o-wn," I wailed.

"No, the Lord will help you, and we will pray for you," said my husband as he tried to quiet my fears.

That night the big church was packed to the doors, the galleries filled. When I arose to speak, all I saw was a sea of faces and for one instant the room seemed to be going around like a merry-goround. My heart beat wildly and I prayed, "O Jesus, do help me now," and praise His name He did. He gave me His own message and that night when I finished with the altar call, more than forty young men and women broke from the galleries and came to the altar, tears of

repentance flowing down their cheeks. A few years later I was able to attend a splendid Bible school, also took a short course under the Baptist denomination and husband and I became identified with that organization.

I never sought ordination. In fact it never impressed me that I needed to be ordained. The church of which my husband was pastor had given me license to preach and I was contented to fill any place, little or big, that my blessed Lord might open.

CHILDREN'S CORNER

HOW GOD ANSWERED THE ROBINS' CALL A True Story

In Friedenshort in Germany there are some, "Homes for the Homeless." There are forty or more homes; some are small cottages and some are large castles that have been leased or rented. More than fifteen hundred children are being cared for in these homes. They are supported by the loving free-will offerings that are sent in answer to prayer.

In each home there are a number of little orphans who are in charge of a "Little Mother" or Mutterchen.

The different Homes go by the pretty names of "Sparrows' Nest," the "Swallows' Nest," and a letter sent out at Christmas time by Sister Annie of Friedenshort tells of an answer to prayer at the "Robins' Nest." She writes:

"For a long, long time the children in this family have been longing for a harmonium or organ of their very own! It sounds somewhat preposterous, and more than once 'Mutterchen' shook her head (inwardly!) a little puzzled as to how far she ought to try to control the earnest prayers and faith of her children on such points. There were times in the last months when so many more practical needs were making themselves felt -and yet, one day, as she said, 'Children, I find that so many other things are much more necessary,'-little Maria looked up at her and answered, 'Oh. Mutterchen, I find a harmonium is so very necessary!' On being asked to explain the necessity, the child answered, 'You cannot imagine what it is like to hear the "Swallows" playing and singing in the evening, and we never can!' Maria is very musical, she sings mezzo-soprano and contralto quite correctly by ear, even though only eleven years of age. Mutterchen smiled and dropped the subject, after remarking that she found mattresses more necessary. So Maria contented herself by continuing to prav for a harmonium.

"And now hear how God has answered the prayer and faith of a little child. Some young girls heard that the Robins had this wish, and began to send small gifts to help in buying an instrument. One was especially touching—the giver is, by her own confession, an unbeliever, frankly owning that she cannot imagine how the children's prayers are going to be answered—for a a harmonium is not just a cardbord box!" Yet she has been sending from time to time gifts of three marks for this purpose.

"As money quietly began to gather, Mutterchen wrote to a firm in Barmen (the other side of Germany), and asked for a price list, and also if they had second-hand instruments. She added that she was not contemplating a purchase at the moment, but wanted to know prices. This firm had been recommended to her as being trustworthy. She told of the

children's longing, and that some money had already been given for the purpose, but added that she could not order before the full sum was in hand, as we do not make debts Instead of receiving a price list, to her surprise, came a very kind letter from the head of the firm, saying that the children were to go on saving up any gifts that might come in until November, and then send them the money, and no matter how small the amount might be, they wished to have the pleasure of suppplying one of their very best harmoniums as a Christmas present for the Robins!

"Mutterchen was overwhelmed. We knew nothing of the matter, but last week, as I was in bed with an attack of influenza, Mutterchen came to visit me, and in the course of conversation told me the whole story. She is young, and to see her bright, fair, young face, bubbling over with joy, on picturing to herself her children's surprise and joy, did one good. The harmonium was to be smuggled into the locked-up Christmas room before Christmas Eve, and all that the children knew was that a great surprise was coming. They were wildly guessing among themselves, very wide of the mark when little Maria said quietly, 'I think it must be a harmonium,'-and as an older girl said to her, 'But Maria, do you know what a harmonium costs?-More than four hundred marks!'-she answered, 'And if it were a thousand, that is nothing to the Lord Jesus-He can!"

"Blessed childlike faith—we older ones are strengthening ourselves at present on the faith of a little child, and are going over into the New Year restfully and gladly knowing that He can!"

A sequel to the story has just arrived from Germany. The "Robins" have their harmonium or organ. They sent in two hundred marks—all they could gather together before Christmas—but to their joy and surprise the head of the firm himself wrote them a kind letter returning their two hundred marks and saying that he wished to have the pleasure of giving it entirely.—S. S. Times.

HEALINGS AMONG MEXICANS

About three weeks ago Brother Blaisdell and I, went to a mountain village, six hours' ride on the train and then three days on donkey-back or on foot, over steep mountains, in places where we cannot obtain milk or bread or potatoes. When we arrived, tired and footsore, we were amply paid for our trouble because we found a large group of hungry people.

About three years ago a man brought his younger brother, saying that the young man had been sick and demon possessed for over a year and that he could never be left alone nor could be work. They had tried everything in their power and it had all failed. He looked like an idiot and stared at you like an animal when you talked to him. But after much prayer and fasting the demon went out, and the young man got entirely well and gave his life to God. He both sang and testified to the power of Jesus' blood to save

and heal, praise the Lord.

When his older brother saw that, he too, gave his heart to Jesus. They both went away to their own tribe. They are of the very ancient people of Mexico called Otoni Tribe. Many of them worship the sun and moon, and practice witchcraft of all kinds. Only once in 3 or 4 months did they come to the mission as they came into the city for provisions. But some time ago the older brother came and showed us that he had surely borne a good testimony among his own people, and the government made him judge among his own tribe. He begged me to come over and help him.

So we went. We had a meeting every day. About two or three hundred gathered to hear the blessed news of salvation through Jesus. Many were saved and healed wonderfully. A lame man who had been wounded in one of his legs and could not walk like others, was perfectly healed. The Lord saved him, and he did not want any more cigars or drink. One morning they brought to us a woman who did not speak one word of Spanish. She was very sick with a horrible fever that the people get at the cost of the Gulf of Mexico, but at the evening services she came walking and testifying to perfect healing. To God be all the glory .-David G. Ruesga.

Seven weeks ago I looked up to God for deliverance, claiming my right in the name of Jesus, telling Him that He had called me here and had made my heart for the high altitude; and almost immediately the Spirit of God in me rebuked the pain and I felt relief at once and could lie on my left side. was filled with praises in the Spirit and thanked God for the witness right then.

MAN PRONOUNCED DEAD RAISED TO LIFE

I have just returned from a five weeks' trip to the South Kansu Assemblies. Traveled 700 miles, mostly on foot, as the roads are too narrow and precipitous to ride horse back. Visited and held conventions with the assemblies in Hsiku, Wutu, Peimaduan, Pikow and adjacent country. The entire region is very mountainous, being the eastern end of the great Tibetan Plateau where it is cut down into deep gorges by the White Dragon and White Water rivers and their tributaries.

The Spirit is working in Pentecostal power in these assemblies. There have been wonderful miracles of healing in all of them. At Hsiku a man who had been pronounced dead by a Chinese doctor was raised to life through prayer. He came to the meeting and gave his bright testimony. It makes New Testament life and teaching so real to meet and talk with a man raised from death to life just as Dorcas was.

The work is spreading much, especially in the country places. There are some three hundred Christians in some ten villages. No foreigner has ever visited the place before, the work having been carried on by Chinese workers who have gone there on itinerant trips off and on for 5 years. Some 50 have been baptized and a few have received the Spirit. I returned fom Pikow to Muichow (a distance of 250 English miles of indescribably rough, stony roads) in six days; that is over 40 miles a day, and walked every step except about 10 miles. Many days my feet were blistered and sometimes bleeding, and every step on the hard stones was with pain and weariness. Yet I do not complain or ask for an easy lot; I only ask that the work and workers receive enough money to keep going so that our glorious talk of preaching Christ and saving men may continue.-W. W. Simp-

SOWING AND REAPING IN SYRIA

You will be glad to know that nineteen of our girls accepted Christ as their Saviour a few days ago. Some of the bigger ones are already going out with our Bible women evangelists to the near villages preaching the gospel. Last Sunday they came home all glowing with the love and joy of Christ's service. They were having a meeting at one of the villages when the priest came upon them suddenly. The room was full with attendants, and the priest with anger. Right out and without excuse, he started asking everyone present why they were there, and why they did not come to church.

The dear evangelist wisely waited till he was through, then drew attention to the fact that they were holding meeting after his church service, and it wasn't just the thing for him to interrupt them. "But I don't know why they do not come to church," he said, "Where will I get my living if they don't?"

The evangelist invited him to sit down and the poor priest acquiesced and enjoyed a hearty Bible talk and a number of good gospel songs. We are invited to hold services every Sunday in that village with no more interference from the priest. Pray for him please, and for this and many other villages which are similarly in need of the gospel light.

One of our school teachers had to be away for a couple or three days, so I took some of her classes during her absence. At the Bible lesson the first morning the subject led to the coming of Christ and the work of the Holy Spirit. Interest took hold of the class, all being big girls.

The Spirit was working. When the bell rang for their grammar lesson, they begged me to go on with the Bible instead. Again the bell rang for French. "Oh, can't we continue Bible?" was the plea. I was only too glad to do it. So we had Bible all morning. The next day one of the girls (the hardest case in the class) came to me and said, "Since yesterday's talk my heart is very much troubled; please tell us some again please, about the way of the Lord. I must have peace in my troubled heart." So another morning was spent with Bible in hand at Jesus' feet, resulting in this precious girl's deliverance from oppression, and her finding the peace her heart craved for. There is a big difference in the expression on her face now. The girl had been oppressed by an evil spirit, her queer ways and looks showed it. Praise God for complete deliverance!

We have over seventy children in the school now. At my last visit to the Jewish quarters some men opposed the gospel message, but the women welcomed it, and the younger ones said, "Don't mind the men, come again soon and tell us more about the coming kingdom of the Messiah." They, were in earnest about it.

Conditions in this country are not any better, but I have peace in my heart and feel to press the battle more forward than ever. One old father said that nothing could induce him to come to a prayer meeting a few months ago. Now nothing can keep him away from it. It is a fact, very seldom he misses a meeting now.—Yumna G. Malick, Shweifat, Syria.

PIONEERING IN MEXICO

Brother Ruesga and I went on a trip into the mountains in the state of Hidalgo, close to the Vera Cruz line, to visit a tribe of Indians. It was a very difficult trip. I walked about three hundred kilometros, or two hundred and twenty-five miles, over the worst mountain roads I ever saw, but the Lord gave us victory, praise Him. The first night we had a congregation of about sixty. When we left, it had grown to two hundred and fifty or more. Many of these Indians still worship the sun and moon, along with many other heathen customs, and never have been told about Jesus. It is absolutely virgin territory for the Gospel, and a really big work is in prospect, but we have no way of grasping the opportunity. 


