God wants His comets in the heavens as well as the Pole star. There are planets and there are stars, and not one clashes with the other in their God-ordained course.

God has set in the church, apostles, prophets, teachers, miracles, gifts of healing, helps, governments, diversities of tongues. Have you been equipped, ordained, charged as a minister, as a servant of God? He can equip, recharge afresh, and ordain His ministers for a wider and more efficient ministry.

During the revival in Barquisimeto, there was a young man in our church who made a living by renting his auto, and carrying people from one town to another. He was a very devout servant of Christ, and when he rose to his feet to pray he lifted the whole congregation with him. But between the life of a chauffeur in Venezuela, and family troubles, he gradually got away from God. We often said to him, "We are praying for you. You are not what you used to be. You have not the burning love for Jesus in your heart." And oftentimes to express his love for us he would come from another town with some fruit or vegetables for us. He had terrible family trouble and we tried to straighten it up one time, but we made no headway.

He was playing one night and having a good time with his oldest girl, and that night she died. He was heart-broken. At the funeral service the following day God was mightily present; it was a time of real victory. Late that night he received a call to take some passengers to another town, and when he delivered them he decided to start right back home. It was very late when he was passing a certain part of the road where there was underbrush. Suddenly somebody jumped into the back seat of his car, and it frightened him so. Of course, he was expecting somebody to stab him in order to rob him, and he trembled all over. He ran just a little farther when all his lights snapped off, and he was left in the dark. He got out and felt the wires, but could not find anything the matter. As he was trying to fix the wires, the lights snapped on of themselves; he looked into the back seat of the car and there was no one there.

That sort of haunted him and he felt terrible, but he jumped into the car, put on all the power possible, and ran over that rough road, rough enough to tear a car to pieces. He had gone at, that pace for about fifteen minutes when suddenly someone jumped into his car again. Just as this passenger jumped into the car a second time, off went the lights. He was so frightened he did not try to fix the car at all, but just jumped out and began to pray to God, and to plead the Blood. As he prayed he vowed, "If You will take me back to Barquisimeto, I will humble myself and make my life right." While he was calling on God, the lights snapped on again, and he jumped into the auto and had no inconvenience at all the rest of the way.

The next day he came to the chapel and told his experience. It moved the people. He said to me, "I want you to come over to our home now and settle our family trouble." I was disgusted with the last try we had at it, and I said, "It's hardly worth while." He walked out discouraged, but he had no more than

got out when God said to me, "This thing is of Me." I sent him word, "At seventhirty the elders will be at your home." The elders responded as one man, and as we entered his poor little home the mother-in-law and the wife received us nicely. As we sat there talking, in came Ventura, the husband. When he came in, just at that moment the wife and motherin-law seemed to understand why we had come, and immediately the mother-in-law rose up and went off into a side room, grumbling. In just a few minutes more, in came the brother-in-law, dragging his feet and acting as ugly as a bear-he had heard that we were coming. Into the dark he went, and he and his mother grumbled it out there.

When I saw what we were up against I just groaned in my soul. The Holy Spirit clearly spoke to me, telling me to ask a question. That question started the husband and wife wrangling, and they poured out everything in their hearts. Well, that was the first time we ever saw their hearts. Every now and then the mother-in-law off there in the dark would call out and meddle in. The elders all sat with bowed heads; all we could do was pray. Suddenly the Holy Ghost gave me a message from the Word of God. I just began to pour it out on that young chauffeur, and talked to him for about twenty minutes, until the perspiration ran off me. I knew I was inspired by the Holy Ghost, and the effect on him was that he fell right on his face on the floor. He wept and cried like a child, and as he wept he confessed his sins. Then he humbled himself before his wife and the others, and took all the blame on himself. The first time we tried to straighten up the affair, no one had any fault in the matter. This time he took all the blame. What a sacred hour that was while he was weeping! The neighbors sent over to know if the other baby had died. But no, it was the "old man" that was dying. Finally he broke into such liberty; he stood upon his feet and thanked the Lord that He received such a poor sinner as himself.

Oh, what a transformed face! What glory on his countenance! And the first thing we knew he was praying in another tongue. The Holy Ghost had descended upon him and baptized and filled him. By this time something had transpired in that dark room. The mother-in-law and brother-in-law became convicted and began crying for mercy; we could hear their voices in the other room. When we next saw that brother-in-law's ugly face, it was aglow as he came forth speaking in other tongues and magnifying God. The mother-in-law received the Pentecostal Baptism a few days later. The only one that did not fully yield was the wife. She said she could not break, but she asked us to pray for her that God would break her and take her through. We just had a letter from this young man saying that he is still going on in God.

Some people ask, "Didn't you have any trouble at all with extravagance?" Well, we had demons shriek out; because when you find God at work in His power and glory and majesty, demons will shriek out. When Christ drew near, they shrieked out. But you know God took care even of all that. I remember one Sunday morning, while we were in service, a demonpossessed young man was seized by the power of the demon and thrown from one side to the other, and it looked every minute as though it was going to dash out his brains. I ran down out of the pulpit and seized him and held him down, and waited until he stopped writhing. Then I called about ten or twelve of the newly baptized ones and said, "Take him over to the house and cast out the demon." And we went on with our public service in the chapel.

After the preaching service was over that morning, I said, "Let us pray now that he will be delivered from this demon power. He had been put out of another church in another state, but we did not feel we ought to throw him out; we felt we ought to deliver him. Well, we got down to pray that God would surely deliver him. But no one could pray; no one had any prayer on them. went over to the house, and there they were all sitting and smiling, and the man was "clothed in his right mind." demon had been cast out, and he was delivered. Then they led him over to the chapel, where the church was sitting, waiting to get the news. When they all came marching in, with this man in the front, they walked like stalwart soldiers who had fought a good fight of faith. Everybody praised God.

Don't expect anything else but that the demons should shriek out. But is that any reason why we should draw back from having the power of God on us? The Christian church today says that it wants everything decent and in order, that the people may not be scared away. But when the Saviour draws near in His strength and power, it is going to cause the demons to cry out. Live in a place where God can use you to cast out demons and to set the captives free. How much better to do that, than to cast them out of the church! Pentecost should endow you with the power of God that will cast out the evil spirit. Let us not shrink back and deny God's power. Let us not be fearful, but fearless; because God has given us authority over these powers. God is able. If you trust Him, He will meet you. Let Pentecost come. Let the power of God be known.

There is an image that is kept in a church in a little village nearby. It is brought into our city about once a year and is kept for about six weeks. As the image is being taken back, a crowd of women accompany it to a cross erected on a knoll. One woman, a very devout Catholic, who worshiped this idol, was among the crowd that accompanied it outside the city, and she knelt and wept as they carried the image out of sight. As she was returning into the city it had

grown dark. Our service of praise had begun, and as she came past she heard the gospel songs and listened to them, standing in the doorway. She could hardly believe we were "devils," because she did not believe devils could sing so nicely. Finally she went to a neighbor who attended our meetings and told her she wanted to go too. When she came, God had the message prepared especially for her, and she became a Christian. She was soundly converted, and if ever I saw a woman true to God, it is that woman. She went through the fires. She went to a neighboring town to visit her son, and had a severe test there. The police heard there was a Protestant in town and they came to where she was and wanted to hear her. For two hours that woman preached the gospel; they were silenced and walked off without a word to say to her.

God takes care of the material side of the work as well as the spiritual. The material is good for nothing when there is nothing spiritual behind it. We may go to South America and build lots of large buildings, and make an outward show, and have nothing spiritual in it; but it would be empty. We started first with the spiritual side of our work; first a church, and then a building to put them in. At first we just met in our homes, but one day God gave us a beautiful chapel where we could worship Him in Spirit and in truth. After we had the chapel, we began to feel we must have a witnessing place at the upper end of the city. We are situated on the main street of the city, and on the lower end is the chapel.

One day one of our families moved into the upper end of the town, and we called on them; and when we saw the house, and the corner lot it occupied, we said, "Wouldn't this be a lovely center for the gospel?" And you know, there came into our hearts such a desire to have that place-and God gave us the desire of our hearts. If you delight yourself in the Lord, He will give you the desire of your heart; but you must keep your delight always in the Lord and not in the gift. The Lord can hardly give us a new dress or new suit because we are liable to delight in it. God would give us more things if we would delight ourselves in

We desired that corner for the gospel, and said to the man living in it, "Will you find out if this place is for sale?" He said, "I will inquire." He brought back word that it had just been sold, transferred to another landlord. The new landlord began to remodel it, making it to accommodate three families. I said to my wife, "There is no use thinking of this corner any more." About a year passed, and one day I came around there and found the door open. I found out the man who had purchased the house had paid a sum down on it and was making it into three apartments, but when it came to pay his interest he had nothing to pay, so they closed the mortgage and took the house away from him. And so the house was for sale again.

We found the lawyer who was the agent for the house, and he said, "If you Protestant people want to do a charitable act,

buy that house on the corner, for the woman is in need of her money. She was asking twelve thousand bolivars for it (a bolivar is worth 20 cents), and I offered her eight thousand. A carpenter said to me, "If you pay ten thousand for the place, you will have a bargain." offered her nine thousand for it. As soon as the business men heard that I offered nine thousand they said they would give her nine thousand. Several months passed and God gave me the word that that house was going to be mission property, and that the gospel should be preached there. I was quiet in my soul, and paid no attention to the property at all.

One Saturday a strange conviction stole over my soul that I should go to a certain that morning. I argued, "Why should I go to that place? I have nothing to do there." But the inner voice said, "Go;" and finally I went. I went to this house where they were building, but the boss that was building it was not there. So I saluted them and started off again, thinking I was deceived. But just as I was going out of the gate, there came the builder. He said, "I have some news for you. The woman is going to close the deal; she prefers to sell to her own countrymen, who are also of her own re-So I went home and said to myself, "This is a kind of a scarecrow. God told me I was going to have that house, that it was for the gospel." Then I just treated the thing indifferently, but I had no rest in my heart.

I called my wife, and said, "Let us pray." And we began to hold on to God. The Lord showed us that we must close the deal that day for the house, and close it even if it cost us ten thousand bolivars (two thousand dollars). I told her what the Lord said to me, and she said He said the very same thing to her; so we were agreed. I took the hundred dollars we had in the house, and put it in my pocket, and started for that house. When I got there she said, "I have decided to let you have it for ten thousand bolivars.' I said, "Now listen to me, I am going to make you a proposition. I have offered you nine thousand bolivars. I will come up five hundred, and you come down five hundred, and I will take the property at nine thousand five hundred." decided to take my offer, and I pulled out a hundred dollars and said, "Give me a

That same day the business man, who had been watching for that property, decided to give her ten thousand bolivars for it. But he made the mistake of dealing with the wrong party, the one who had not the power to close the deal. On Monday he went to the proper party to close the deal, and they told him, "It was just sold on Saturday to the Protestants." The Lord has proved Himself every step of the way since. We have a beautiful new building on that corner now, an institute where our school is, and we have preaching services there also. When the walls were up we found we had no money to go ahead with. I said, "If this is God's building the money will come when it is time to go ahead. I am not running at my own charges." By the time the walls had dried enough to go ahead, there was the money. When we came to the floor the money was gone again. I said to my wife, "If this is the Lord's house, He will put a floor in it." The day came when we thought we would have to lay off the men who were working on the building. But just that week my wife fell heir to a little inheritance, and we went right on with the building.

God helped us from the first day we arrived in Barquisimeto, and guided us by a way that we knew not. We would have bought a home in a place right in the center of the city, a place where all the sewer water passes. It was in the dry season and I did not know it. But God knew it. I closed the deal for that property, but when the man found out it was for the Protestants he sent word that the property was not for us. If he had another chance to sell us that property, he would take it as quickly as possible. In the rainy season the water stands a foot deep on the floor of that house. I would have had to buy rubber boots for my wife. God saved us from that sickly house. I was entering into that deal in my own strength, but when we lost that one we went on our knees, and God definitely guided us to the right one. It is not a nice, new, modern bungalow; it is a little over a hundred years old and is made of mud. We have lots of mud fall from the ceilings. But that old house has become a sanctuary where many souls have penetrated to God. My, the fire has fallen in that place!

One night we were examining candidates for baptism, and we always start that service off by a half hour of prayer. The candidates were sitting on the front corridor when they got so full of the Holy Ghost that they danced before us. They talk against dancing, but I get it down in my feet sometimes. When I get happy it starts at my feet and goes clear through me. The children of the King have a right to shout and sing. We are a free people, born free, the sons of God, the sons of Isaac, the son of laughter. If those old Ishmaelites look on and mock us, let them mock. If it happens to be a backslidden daughter of Saul looking through the window, let her mock. If we get into bondage, the people of the world will not be able to see we are set free by the King. There is no stiffness with us in Barquisimeto. We have the joy bells ringing inside, and we are a regular set of shouters. We love the Word of God, and it is our daily meat. We revel in it. It satisfies us, and pours the life into us. Keep on rejoicing in the Lord and He will take you through.

He gives us these refreshing times by the way to encourage us so we can stand the next hard test. If I did not believe in praising the Lord, I wonder how I would ever have gotten through in Barquisimeto. When everything is so black and dark, we just get down and say, "Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, etc.," until the thing just rolls out. And I want to tell you, the devils have to go and we get the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. If you will praise God in the dark places, you will find God will

Brother S. H. Patterson writes from Denver, Colo.: "Four months ago, I came to Colorado to do evangelistic work, but it seemed God directed differently, and led me to accept the pastorate of the Assembly of God in Denver. We have been heard in three states and that is very good for day time broadcasting. Brother and Sister Fay Williamson are a great blessing to the work as musical directors and in visiting the sick. We have an orchestra of 12 pieces, taught by Brother Vaughn. Our young people conduct splendid street meetings.'

THE REQUEST OF HIS HEART

Caesar Malan, a minister of the gospel in Geneva, suffered much reproach on account of his faithful witness to gospel truth. Traveling with his son and a friend through picturesque mountain country in 1840, they stopped-after walking for about two hours from the dawn of day-for coffee at a village inn. Noticing that the young woman who waited on them was furtively weeping, Dr. Malan tenderly questioned her, and, learning that she had just lost her husband, he made room for her beside him on the form and began to tell her of the comforting promises of the Gospel. Soon she asked leave to fetch her friend Jeanette, who, in her turn, begged the stranger to visit her father who was lying ill close by. "We were conducted to a little wooden house,' writes Dr. Malan's son, "and into a large room, at the end of which, near the window, lay a white-haired, old man.

"In the conversation which followed, Dr. Malan-who soon discovered in the invalid, signs of genuine piety-asked him how he had come to know his Saviour. 'On this bed,' he replied, 'where I have lain for many years; and through reading a book written by a Mr. Malan, of Geneva. Ah! had I not been aged and infirm, I should long ago have gone there to see him. Look here, sir, you cannot think how earnestly I have entreated the Lord that I might see him before I died. For a long time I thought that He would grant my desire, but I'm afraid I shall have to give it up.' I stole a glance at my father, who was sitting silently looking at his hands. 'What is the name of the book you refer to?' he suddenly enquired. 'Stay,' was the reply, 'here it is, it's always by me;' and he drew from his pillow a well-worn copy of my father's hymns. 'Do you sing any of these, then? asked my father. 'Oh, Jeanette knows some of them; she often sings them to me,' adding as though speaking to himself, 'If I could only see the dear gentleman who wrote those beautiful hymns; he must be a good Christian.'

"'Listen, brother,' said my father; 'these young gentlemen and I have just come from Geneva.' 'You have come Geneva? Then perhaps you have seen Mr. Malan?' 'Certainly I have; we all know him well; and I can assure you that if he were here he would remind you that he has only been a feeble and imperfect instrument of good to you; and he would speak to you above all, not of himself, a poor sinner as you are, but of the eternal grace and perfection of our blessed Lord.' The conversation lasted a few minutes longer; my father prayed; then, when we had sung together one of the hymns which Jeanette knew, he prepared to leave. When he had reached the door, however, he stopped, and returning once more to the bed where the old man was lying with folded hands, said to him, with emotion, 'My father, God Himself, to whom you will so soon depart, has granted your prayer. I am Malan of Geneva; your brother in the faith of our blessed Saviour.'

"The poor old man, fixing his streaming eyes upon him in a long and ardent gaze, and slowly raising his trembling hands,

exclaimed, 'Bless me, bless me before I die! You whom I have so long prayed God to send to me, bless me now that I have the joy of seeing you!'

"Falling on his knees at the bedside, my father replied, in tones which betrayed his deep feeling: 'You ought rather to bless me, for you are old enough to be my father. But all blessing comes from God alone; let us once more ask it of Him together.' And, folding in his arms the lowly brother whom he felt he should never see again till they met in the better country, he invoked upon him 'the peace which Jesus gives,' and we left the

COOPERATIVE FAITH By Ruth Needham, Student Graduate, Southern California Bible School

These are days in which reason is warring against revelation, and the storms of unbelief are beating against the foundation of faith. Recognizing this fact we need to take heed to ourselves that we be built up in faith in order that we may be able to stand against the onslaughts of Satan and "to stand before the Son of Man" when He cometh.

Let us consider the importance which God in His Word places upon faith. First, we are told in the Word that "without faith it is impossible to please God." Faith pleases God because it honors Him by transferring man's confidence from self to God, and lets God be God. Furthermore, faith is not only an essential element in our Christian life, but it is an abiding element, for "now abideth faith, hope, and love." Since we are not living for time but for eternity, we want to deal with things eternal, conducting our

lives so that we shall have an abundant, eternal inheritance.

From the Scriptures we find in the Old Dispensation as well as the new, that God was seeking to find faith in His people. In that catalogue of the faithful (the eleventh chapter of Hebrews) which enumerates those Old Testament heroes of faith, we find the words "by faith" reiterated again and again, showing that faith was the propelling power in the Old Dispensation that made the "impossible" possible.

Then in the life of our Lord Jesus, as He came in contact with people, He placed emphasis upon faith, and sought to find it in them. When the man who was sick of the palsy was brought to Christ, He "seeing their faith" said to the man, "Son, be of good cheer, thy sins be forgiven thee." Likewise to blind Bartimaeus, and the afflicted woman who pressed through the throng and touched Hm; Jesus said, "Thy faith hath made thee whole." It was not a question of how righteous they were, or what intellectual conception they had of Christ, but it was a matter of faith. When we see the expression that was called forth from our Lord Jesus Christ by some special demonstration of faith, does it not cause us to realize how He desired and delighted in its mani-When the centurion showed such confidence in Christ's power to heal his servant, "He marveled and said . . 'Verily I say unto you, I have not found so great faith, no not in Israel," and again to the Gentile woman who with such persistent faith and true humility was seeking deliverance for her daughter Jesus responded, "O woman, great is thy faith; be it unto thee even as thou wilt.' Yes, our Lord Jesus, was seeking faith in people when He was here on earth; He is seeking it today; and in that day when He comes, He will seek it, for anticipating that time He said, "Nevertheless, when the Son of Man cometh, shall He find faith on the earth?"

Since it is faith that pleases God, and it is the means which brings us in vital touch with Him, let us observe how it may be developed so that we shall be "strong in faith." Every one of us may have faith, for God does not ask us to exercise that which we cannot possess. Paul tells us that "faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God;" thus we find a means by which it may be received. As Christian people, we all have a certain degree of faith but how often we bemoan our lack of it, or the weakness of it. Let us consider how these difficulties may be overcome.

In the first place, we must recognize the law of growth that operates in the spiritual as well as the natural realm.

Just because we have been translated into a supernatural realm, we need not think that spiritual ideals are realized take of skeptics, doulinstantaneously. They are gained by believing your doubts.'

slow, steady plodding, a process which is distasteful to the soul who is impatient to scale the utmost heights of the heavenly realm into which it has been ushered. We find God's law of growth laid down in His Word. It is "first the blade, then the ear, after that the full corn in the ear." What exactness, what method, and care the omnipotent God takes relative to the growth and development of His children. It is human inclination to start on a large scale, but God begins with the little things. That which man lightly esteems is often the thing of which God takes cognizance. Man, in his eagerness to attain to the great things, is often short-sighted, despising "the day of small things," not realizing that God works from the lesser to the greater, thereby missing the insignificant stepping stone that would lead him on to higher things if he were only quick enough to see it, and humble enough to tread upon

As children of the Lord, we have to cooperate with Him in using that which He has already given us, before we can expect Him to multiply it. Fenelon, that choice saint who shone as a light in corrupt and darkened France in the time of Louis XIV, has well said, "Souls true to the grace given them will never suffer any diminution of it. On the contrary, the great and unchangeable condition of continuance of growth in grace is cooperation with what we now have. This is the law of growth not only deducible from the Divine nature, but expressly revealed and declared in the Scriptures. 'For whosoever hath to him shall be given, and he shall have more abundance; but whosoever hath not, from him shall be taken away even that he hath.' A faithful cooperation with grace is the most effectual preparation for attracting and receiving and increasing grace. This is the great secret of advancement to those high degrees which are admired; namely a strict and unwavering cooperation moment by moment."

Can we not apply this same principle to the development of our faith and say, "A faithful cooperation with faith is the most effectual preparation for attracting and receiving and increasing faith"? So when our faith looks very small, instead of bemoaning the fact, and giving way to a dejection of spirit, let us say, "I have a measure of faith, and 'whosoever hath to him shall be given'" and, claiming this promise, patiently plod on in a positive manner, declaring the faith that we have, although it be small, and expect God to increase it. The man, who came to our Lord Jesus in behalf of his son possessed with a dumb spirit, cried out, "Lord I believe; help thou mine unbelief." He made a positive declaration of his faith first, and then asked the Lord to deal with that negative quality of unbelief. One has wisely said, "Doubts and difficulties are not cured by brooding over them, and debating them, but we can dissolve them by patient obedience to what we know already of the divine will of God." Dr. C. F. Deems has given us this axiom, "Believe your beliefs and doubt your doubts. Do not make the common mistake of skeptics, doubting your beliefs and

Having seen that our faith needs to be exercised for its development, let us consider how God asks to exercise it. In both the Old and New Testaments, we see that God demanded some initiative on the part of man in order to make His power effectual. It isn't that man's action accomplishes the thing-man is impotent-but his venture of faith gives God occasion to accomplish the thing, whereby He can display His mighty power. When the children of Israel were walled in by Pharaoh's army behind, and the Red Sea in front, God said to Moses, "Wherefore criest thou to me? Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward." Then as they were journeying toward Canaan, and had to encounter King Shion of Heshbon, God said regarding the king and the land, "I have begun to give. Begin to possess that thou mayest inherit his land." Here we see

Here we see God taking the initiative, but calling for a counterpart initiative on the part of man. As God was beginning to give, man was to begin to possess. If we would only begin by taking some step of faith, would we not be surprised to find out how it would open the way of God to work in our behalf?

Preparatory to the entrance into Canaan, God said to Joshua, "Every place that the sole of your foot shall tread upon, that have I given unto you." Here again is a divine declaration which embodies cooperation from the human side for its realization. Look at the children of Israel facing their enemies after they have entered Canaan, for

although it was the land of "milk and honey," it was also a land of enemies.

The progressive Christian life is one which advances from conflict to conflict. Foreign tribes were coming against the Israelites, and God gave them these comforting words, "The battle is not yours but God's." However, He went on to say, "Tomorrow go ye down against them." They were not to fight in the battle, but they were to face the battle. Then we have the blessed word that followed their obedience to God's command. "And when they began to sing and to praise, the Lord set ambushments against the children of Ammon, Moab and Mt. Seir, which were come against Judah and they were smitten."

Now we shall turn from the Old Dispensation to the New, and see this same principle in operation. To the man with the withered hand Jesus gave the command, "Stretch forth thy hand." To the

man sick with palsy the word went forth, "Take up thy bed and walk." In response to the cry of the lepers, Jesus said, "Go, shew yourselves unto the priests," signifying that they would be healed, and "as they went they were cleansed." In each of these cases there was a command on the part of Jesus, and obedience on the part of man which demonstrated faith in Jesus' power. The story of the raising of Lazarus so clearly and beautifully teaches us along this line. When Lazarus was sick, his sisters sent word to Jesus, evidently with the expectation that He would quickly come to their aid; but in His love and wisdom, He acted differently from what one would expect, and we have these words, "Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. When He had heard therefore that he was sick, He abode two days still in the

same place." How strange this seems to the natural man.

As we recall the narrative, we remember that when Jesus came to Bethany, Lazarus had been buried four days. How His love seems to have been misunderstood! From both Martha and Mary came the word "Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother had not died," and some of the Jews questioned saying, "Could not this man who opened the eyes of the blind have caused that even this man should not have died?" How Jesus' heart must have been grieved with the lack of penetration on the part of the people! Nevertheless, we see Him with that sorrowing and questioning group of people standing by the cave which held the body of Lazarus, and hear Him say, "Take ye away the stone." Immediately upon giving this command which called for an expression of faith, human reasoning began to operate, and Martha said, "Lord, by

this time he stinketh; for he hath been dead four days." His only answer was those majestic words of promise and rebuke, "Said I not unto thee, that if thou wouldst believe thou shouldst see the glory of God?" Then they obeyed, and rolled away the stone; as a result, the mighty power of God was manifested, and Lazarus came forth from the dead. What a lesson this teaches us of cooperative faith! In the presence of the impossible -death-our Lord Jesus called for an expression of faith-that of rolling away the stone. The rolling of the stone was in itself absolutely ineffectual to raise Lazarus from the dead, but it demonstrated faith in the One who could raise him from the dead, and thereby gave Him opportunity to display the power of God. Is there not some stone that Jesus Christ is calling us to roll away, that will make it

possible for His resurrection life to be made manifest in our lives?

In considering this phase of faith we must recognize that after having taken some definite step, our faith may be severely tested. Such a test may be a sign of its virtue for it was not only against the house built upon the sand, but also against the house built upon the rock that the "stream beat vehe-mently." In Hebrews (6:12) there is a word of exhortation to be "followers of them who through faith and patience inherit the prom-ises." We are also told that "tribulation worketh pa-tience," and "the trying of our faith worketh patience,' so in the light of these passages

might we not be permitted to paraphrase that verse in Hebrews and say, "Be followers of them who through faith and the trying of their faith inherit the promises"? When our faith is being tested, and it seems that overwhelming forces are arrayed against us in order to tear it down, we should remember that it is Satan who tempts in order to tear down, but that it is God who tests in order to build up, and as we cooperate with God in the test, He will cooperate with us to strengthen our faith, turning to our account the destructive means of Satan, using it for our upbuilding, and thereby make the temptaton a real blessing.

We must keep in mind that God is a secret, silent worker, and that He takes time to accomplish His purposes. One in speaking of God's method of working has said:

Homely Things from a Pastor's Diary

Wednesday, September 14. On the last day of August at the regular monthly meeting of the board we invited the wives of the official brethren, and the women working together spread a nice lunch on the lawn, ready for us at seven o'clock. After lunch the women took charge, gathering "up the fragments" and then had a nice time together in the living room, while we met in my study.

I made my report showing how much I had received from the Treasurer and how much from other sources, both in money and in other things. I showed them some of the details of the fine results coming from Sister Drelling's work, as I had found them in going about calling on those to whom she had sold Evangel subscriptions. I was able to tell of so many cases of real blessing coming to those new subscribers through my ministry, and so many new students in the Sunday school, and so many dear souls added to the assembly roll, who never would have been reached, seemingly, except for Sister Drelling's work, that they, felt well satisfied that the considerable sum of money paid her was money well spent.

But I had a purpose in making this report so much in detail. I said, "Brethren, a large number of those subscriptions for the Evangel were for only three months. Sister Drelling began taking them in the early part of June. I hope I may have your assistance and your approval in my plan of having her go, at the expense of the church, and make a determined effort with every one of those short term subscribers, when their subscriptions expire, to get them to take the paper for a year. She can carry one of our good books hitherto not canvassed here, and sell that too. Her commissions will probably be so small however, that I believe we had better say to her that we will pay her four times as much as she can make in commissions."

There was that good look of willing acquiescence on the faces of the brethren which a pastor so enjoys seeing, when he offers to lead the church in some new venture of faith, but Brother Simon put the general feeling into words. "I am in favor of it. So many people are paying their tithes faithfully since we established the treasury system that we have plenty of money and I do not think of any better use we could make of tithes than making it worth Sister Drelling's best efforts to get these short term subscriptions made into yearly ones.

The brethren seemed satisfied and no one else offering to speak I put the question, and it carried by unanimous vote. Praise the Lord!

Seeing a chance to fasten down a little more firmly some wholesome truths. I said, "Brother Simon spoke of the good condition of the church finances since we established the treasury system. There are two important reasons why the people are doing so much better since that was done. When, in a large church, the tithes all go to the pastor, many people refuse to bring in their tithes feeling they will not be needed for the pastor's comfort, and often so many think this, that he is underpaid. When they understand that the pastor has agreed with the deacons on the amount he needs for a comfortable support and that only that much of the tithes will go to him from week to week, they bring in their tithes. This is in accordance with a natural law. We do well to keep our feet on the ground in all our church planning. of the two important reasons is that it frees the pastor's hands so that he can fearlessly and so often as he deems wise, preach the privilege and joy of tithing, without people being able to say that by such preaching he hopes to add to his own income.'

"Well, that series of tracts all on tithing and all different, one for every month in the year, that we bought and have been distributing monthly to everyone in the church, has had a lot to do with it

"That is quite true, Brother Simon, but you see I could hardly have escaped severe censure in speaking every month about the new tract then being distributed, outlining what was in it a little, and urging the people to read it carefully, if the people had not known that no mat ter how much they brought in, my own income would be no greater. We have all worked together in blessed unity, and that is the thing God loves in a church, but we have used what people call horse-sense too. It might be called common sense if it were not so uncommon,

Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity! Praise the Lord!

"This is ever the way God moulds His deeds, In silence and out of sight;

So we need to learn to wait on God in faith, letting Him accomplish His purpose in His name and way. J. Pierpont Morgan gave the following statement as an ethical code for the banking profession, which may bear a suitable application at this point, "Never do something you do not approve of in order more quickly to accomplish something you do approve of. These are no short cuts in piloting a business or a ship." Likewise in the time of testing and trial, let us not take a "short cut" to try to accomplish something in our own strength that we believe God wants to bring forth, but may we be enabled to look unto our God which worketh for him that waiteth for Him" and trust Him to accomplish His will in His way, and rejoice in knowng that "the trial of our faith is much more precious than of gold that perisheth."

Having considered some phases of this subject of faith, let us, in closing look at the One in whom we place our faith.

A business firm made this statement in an advertisement which it put out, "A man doesn't inspect every bolt and wire in an automobile or every cog in a watch or every ounce in a sack of flour. He finds a name he can trust, and then buys on faith." We do not have to analyze God or His works to ascertain whether He is worthy of our confidence. We couldn't if we tried, for the finite cannot comprehend the infinite whose "greatness is unsearchable" and whose ways are "past finding out;" but praise God, we have found a Name in which we can trust-'a Name which is above every name"the name of Him who in the Apocalypse is called "Faithful and True," and we can "buy on faith;" or more truly, possess our inheritance "on faith." fore, let us yield to Him in such a cooperative faith as will give Him occasion to display His grace and life and power in our lives, here and now upon earth; and which will be "found unto praise and honor and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ," when faith shall come to its full fruition i nsight, and we shall behold Him "whom having not seen we love," "face to face."

We have been in our new quarters three days and are very busy trying to get settled that we might soon be able to open the chapel. Our compound is somewhat small and consists of mud Chinese houses, which are very dirty and need a thorough cleaning and disinfecting. We have crowded into two small rooms until we are able to clean and fumigate as we ought. The room which will be our bedroom I am sure has been used as a stable, but we praise God, He gives grace that we will be able to use it as our bedroom after it is cleaned. In the front of the compound is a long store. The landlord has taken out some partitions and it will make a nice chapel. At present we have no money to buy benches. pulpit, etc., and as I had given my little organ to the Baltaus for their work when theirs was stolen, I am even without that, but I do believe the Lord will meet the need.

The people of the village are all glad we have come and are asking when the chapel will be opened. We intend to open that speedily, even if we are minus the benches. It will be necessary for me to visit in the homes, to reach the women and children. My former Bible woman in Taianfu is anxious to come and help me, but at present, being pressed financially it is hard to take her on. have a very good teacher, who will help us in evangelistic services and a very precious Spirit-filled evangelist has promised to come and help in special services, which we will have for the opening. We also hope and trust the Lord will enable us to open a day school for the children. The parents will see we are interested in their welfare. Please pray for the new little station that it may prove a great blessing.—Mrs. Pauline Gleim Ferm.

A TENT MEETING IN JAPAN

On April the 24th, Brother C. F. Juergensen and Japanese workers, with Sisters Marie and Agnes Juergensen, brought their tent from Tokyo and started a series of meetings in Hachioji.

In every step of this campaign, the Lord seemed to set His seal upon the work. We were enable to get a lot on the main street large enough to pitch the tent, a lot belonging to the Post Office and government property and which, according to the letter of their law, should not be used for other than governmental purposes. But the head man at the Post Office in Hachioji said, "We are closing our eyes to the law, please use the lot for God's work." We gladly accepted this as God's direct undertaking and the tent was pitched in this busiest section of the city.

About two weeks before the opening of the tent meetings, a new ruling was made in Hachioji that no street meetings or gatherings of any kind would be allowed on the streets. But when the head police office was visited and request was made that we be allowed to march through the streets before the evening services, and also hold short street meetings for the work of the church, permission was courteously granted and again we felt that God was setting His seal upon the campaign and our hearts were newly encouraged and we rejoiced in His wonder working power.

From the first the interest was good, but as the meetings continued the crowds increased and the tent was filled to the limit with hundreds standing on the outside unable to get in. Deep conviction rested upon the people, some of them hearing the gospel message for the first time. We rejoiced to see many precious souls take a stand for Christ. Grandmas and grandpas, young men and young women were all together at the altar seeking His grace and finding their way to God. There were twenty-five new ones added to the Lord. The whole of Hachioji was stirred by this meeting and we believe that the coming days will bring a harvest from the seed sown in this campaign.-Jessie Wengler.

PIONEERING IN CEYLON

I have a dear old Chinese brother, 77 years old, who went through the Boxer troubles and was to be murdered several times, but had some miraculous escapes. He is a walking Bible. My, how he knows

the Word! When he speaks it is like "Rivers of Waters" which, bless God, have not become stagnant through the years. Nor is he by any means rusty. Truly his youth has been renewed like the eagles. Pray for us.-Percy Bristow.

GOOD NEWS FROM LIBERIA

We praise God that He is working in our midst, and our dear boys and girls are finding that the Lord Jesus saves them from the old life of sin, and they have no desire to live in sin. It has brought great joy often to me as I have seen how true they are to God, even when their family people have heaped curses upon them.

Last week a man came from a town a little distance from here to call me to come as some one had been hurt. Before I could get started another runner had come for me to hasten as the man, who had been hurt, was suffering so. I hastened on with the native workers. When we reached town we found that a large bush cow had been shot, and the huntsman that first shot it thought that he had killed it and ran to it too soon, but the animal revived and tore the man, and also badly bruised him with her horns. Another man, having come to his rescue, managed to fire and kill the cow at once. The people had taken the man outside of the town, and there was a crowd of men and women gathered around him, but they were waiting to see what I could do for him. The native worker and I laid hands on him and prayed, then washed the wounds and bound them up. The presence of God was there as we prayed. I realized there was nothing I could do, but the Lord Jesus was able, and the next morning when I went back I found that he had a good night's rest, and was feeling better. He is getting along nicely, and I do praise the Lord that He did the

The Lord baptized three of our dear boys in the Holy Ghost. Two of them were praying alone when they began to speak in tongues, and the Spirit wonderfully spoke through them. After one of our meetings one of the three remained on his knees and received a mighty Baptism. Soon afterwards we had blessed meetings. "When He giveth quietness, who then can make trouble?" The dear Lord is enabling us to go on peaceably in the work. The meetings, five services a week now, are undisturbed; the house is seldom stoned any more.

The three of us in the mission are being kept in health, able to work hard every day. God blesses the teaching and visitation work, and the distribution of thousands of tracts and Scriptures which go out from the mission far and near every month. Yesterday in our afterservice, a dear woman wept her way through to the Saviour. She has been coming to the services with her daughters, occasionally, for perhaps a year. They live some twenty blocks away. She has read her Testament through and every day before eating, she draws a text from her promise-box. Our people all do this now, like ourselves, since I gave each family a box for a Christmas gift last year. They are a blessing.

Dear old Dona Maria Videl is getting so happy that she laughs in the Spirit and dances, and says she does not know what is going to happen to her. Some are getting their Baptism. Our services are small, but the power of the Holy Spirit rests upon them more and more. Praise God! Dona Lucia told yesterday in testimony meeting how God has healed her of chronic diseases entirely. He has doubtless saved her body and soul.

One sister, who is living with us, helping in the work, and preparing for more effectual service, told how she had lived so sad always, until the first time she came here to meeting, then she thought, "Now I have found true happiness at last, and something which satisfies." She looked it. It is an inspiration to see her sit drinking in the truth, also others of her family. The masses all about us are living vile, corrupt lives. When the Lord sends us another missionary teacher we hope to open up another Sunday school across the city.—Alice Wood.

IN A STATE OF WAR

Easter Sunday we opened services here in Esteli. The priest has poisoned the people's mind against us by telling them that if they would even walk on our side walk they would be "condenado"-condemned. One lady, as she passed by in the street, put her finger tips to her ears so that she could not hear the singing, for fear she would be defiled with the hearing of the gospel hymns. We had four adults and twice as many children at our first service. Not a large number to be sure. We praise our Lord Jesus that already we can see the prejudice being broken down and some have become bold enough to enter the little mission hall, while a great many more stand on the outside where they can hear and see all that goes on. Three have come forward to the altar to seek salvation. Two of these have been under the influence of evangelical teaching before, while the other, a young man of the middle class, is entirely new to the gospel light.

The second week we were here, wife was poisoned, but God answered prayer and delivered her.

Nicaragua is now in a state of revolution. Just a week ago today a proclamation was issued by the president declaring the Republic in a state of war. Away up here in the mountains we hardly know yet just what is going on. We hear a great many rumors, but nothing for certain. Both telegraph and telephone service has been disconnected and the mail is very uncertain. Everything here is in a turmoil and excitement is at its highest pitch. They have been forcing every man that they can lay their hands upon into service. There are hardly any men left in town that are not soldiers. The few that are, are old men and boys too young to carry a gun. Only vesterday morning a troop of recruits (all of them raw Indians from the mountains, perhaps a hundred in number) were herded into town like so many cattle. Not only are they forcing them into service, but they are taking all of the horses, mules and cattle that they can lay their hands upon. The revolution has only been on for a week, but already the country has been stripped so of livestock, merchandise, etc., that it will take months, perhaps years, to recover, even if this trouble comes to an end this week, but who knows how long it will last? We covet your earnest prayers for the peace of Nicaragua.— Clarence T. Radley, Nicaragua.

A GROWING WORK

We are still in the midst of our hot weather and we are not able to be as active as we are in cold weather. Even many Indians (natives of India) have died of sun stroke by being out too much in the hot sun. Those who say the sun is cooling off should live out in India in the hot weather. We would appreciate it if it were a little cooler.

You may be interested to know that we are making plans and hope to begin very soon to get up our new church building. We have entirely outgrown our old meeting room. Most of our people sit on the floor and squeeze up rather tight against each other and a good many can be packed in a small space. But even then our present place is not large enough. And when the people are so packed in during the hot weather, the heat is terrible. It is not very helpful to having a good meeting. So now, we are going to get at it as soon as we can to get up a better house of worship, which will accomodate all who want to come and have good ventilation and a good roof to protect from the sun.

Many towns in India are like towns in England or America, that is, some are growing while others are getting smaller. Both of our main stations of Dhond and Orai are growing towns. New buildings are going up continually and the population is on the increase. Ours are the only missions with missionaries located at either place. So our responsibilities and

opportunities are increasing.

We also have unlimited opportunities in reaching out to the distant villages. We are repeating the "Story" over and over in these villages and know that God's Word is the hammer that will break the rock in pieces.-John E. Norton.
