Man Like a Wild Ass's Colt

"For vain man would be wise, though man be born like a wild ass's colt" (Job 11:12).

The above quotation is not exactly flattering to man, comparing him to an ass, yet such is the biblical record. And man is not only like an ass by reason of his acts but by birth, and a wild ass at that. The wild ass loved liberty, and wanted to come and go in an untamed state. He wanted the personal liberty so much howled about today, and that without restraint. And this is just the picture of man before God takes him in hand. He seeks his own way, and despises the government of God, as "The carnal mind is enmity against God, for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be." Why is all the unrest in the world, why the discontent with all the forms of government from autocracy to democracy? Why does mortal man wish to discard revelation, forget responsibility toward God, and seek satisfaction in following his own way? The answer is simple. Man is like a wild ass's colt.

But has mortal man considered that the ass's colt is condemned to die? If not he should read his Bible, for there we find that unless it be redeemed the colt shall have its neck broken. It is not the old and wilful ass alone that rests under this condemnation, but the ass's colt, from which we learn that condemnation rests not only on man's sinful acts, but upon his sinful nature. Many point to the drunkard, the shameful, and the cruel, and say, "He is wicked," but wickedness is lawlessness, and all who reject the Divine government are among this company, whether they be rich or poor, high or low, learned or illiterate. "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." "Man is estranged from the womb." Oh, my friend, be not deceived. let not an evil heart of unbelief be your ruin, but "repent ye and believe the gospel," for "The wages of sin is death."

But God provided a ransom for the condemned colt and He has provided the same for condemned man. The ransom was nothing in the colt, but God arranged specifically that the only ransom for the colt should be a lamb. Let us hear the Scriptures, "Every firstling of an ass thou shalt redeem with a lamb; and if thou wilt not redeem it, then thou shalt break its neck" (Ex. 13:13). Here is substitution clearly shown. On the right stands an innocent lamb; on the left a condemned ass's colt, but presently we see the lamb led as an offering to Jehovah and as a consequence the colt goes free. O man condemned, there is no virtue in yourself, but a Lamb has come who gave His life a ransom for the many. Can any wonder that John, the herald of the Saviour's approach, cried once and again, "Behold the Lamb of God"? Wicked and rebellious have we been, but God hath laid upon Him the iniquity of us all. A ransom was found for the colt and a ransom is found for man. Hence, "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts, and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him, and to our God for he will abundantly pardon." "Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved."

But there would be no good in redeeming the colt just to let it die. It must be nourished. And God sees this necessity for the redeemed soul. He provides so that they may receive the sincere milk of the Word to the end that they may grow thereby. What pleasure it brings to God, the great Husbandman, as He sees those, once condemned to death, but now redeemed by the precious blood of Christ, growing in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ! All the supplies of heaven are for such, yea, He brings them into His banqueting house and His banner over them is love, that they may eat the fat and drink the sweet. Blessed be the name of the Lord. O brother, God does not wish His redeemed ones to starve, neither is content with seeing them half-fed, but His desire is that they may delight themselves in fatness.

But it would not satisfy Jehovah were the redeemed colt to become nothing more than an idle glutton. No, no. The Master of flock and herd looks ahead and sees service of infinite value to be derived from the one once condemned to death. But that the Master may receive this service the colt must first be taught to serve. And here is a time of great importance, and here it is to be feared too many balk. Some still relish some form of the wild ass life; they cling to self, and seek their own. But only those whom God can "break" will be the ones through whom He will perform His will. Ephraim went into bondage because he would not accustom himself to the yoke, and Christian believers grieve the Spirit and disappoint the Lord because they will not be "broken." Some, it seems do not wish to be broken at all, while others are content with being half-broken, but how much it means to be entirely trustworthy and fully in the hands of the Lord.

And it seems also that new lessons in being "broke" must be had from day to day. Paul said, "I die daily." If our wills are yielded to God, we may say, "I am broken anew daily." This may be illustrated by the simple things of domestic animal life. A farmer has a horse, a noble creature, and he wishes it to plow. It soon learns to follow the furrow, and although warm and tired, obeys its owner's will following the monotony of this trudging life. Had the horse a human reason how happy his heart might

be as he would think, "I am now well broken, I know my master's will and delight to do it." But one day the farmer hitches him to the wagon and starts him off for town. All of this is new, yet he works well. But presently he sees something which we call an auto and he almost dies from fright, and to escape it as it presses down upon him he tries to run away. Is this horse really and entirely broken? Not yet. But its driver knows its mettle and worth, and, understanding its disposition, patiently teaches it to trust, assuring it that when approached by these unsightly things it need not fear for they will harmlessly pass on by. And in other respects also the lessons of vieldedness and service would require new experiences and teaching until the animal acquires such absolute confidence in the teamster that it can be driven anywhere and made to stand any test without discomfort or fear. And so with us. The Saviour came not to do His own will but the will of Him who sent Him, and never until this same spirit possesses the redeemed soul can one with truthfulness say that he is fully given up to do the will of the Lord. But blessed is the life that is wholly the Lord's for (changing the figure) "His yoke is easy and His burden is light." If you have not found this to be so you are not yet fully broken.

The outlaw animal can be of no use. and the man or woman who will not yield to do the whole will of God without balking, kicking, and plunging, is useless to the cause of God. Many say, "I wish God would use me," when in fact they wish to use Him. Instead of letting the Spirit use them they seek to use the Spirit. Instead of being willing to go where God wishes, they wish Him to go their way. Do not deceive yourself, God knows when the heart is yielded, and when the soul is fully resigned. When it is so, murmurings will cease, chafings will flee, and the happy soul will be emancipated from self-bondage. Israel was redeemed when they came out of Egypt, but Israel was far from being "broke. They murmured against their leader. about their food, and tempted God a thousand ways, until finally, when God saw He could not break them because they would not yield, their carcasses fell in the wilderness. Oh, the curse of selfwill!

But man cannot "break" himself. He must commit that work to God. Selfwill cannot conquer self-will, neither can penance do the work. The secret of being broken is in yielding and submitting to Him whose we are. How easily Jesus can manage the most unlikely of us if we but put our wills and lives into His hands. See Him when He would ride into Jerusalem! They brought him an ass's colt on which never man had sat. Did the Saviour fear? Was there now put to Him a task too great for His loving power? Not at all. He mounted its back and rode calmly and in triumph into the Holy City. Ah, brother, that is it. Let the Saviour mount you and take the reins, and you go at His word and stop at His command. As He rode that day into Jerusalem, He will take your yielded life and turn it into the paths of His choosing. If He says, "Plow," do not say, "But I want to go to town" and if He says, "Go to town," do not think you ought to plow. Be content to stand still or to move, only listening always for the tender voice of Him who never mocks, and never misspends the life and energy of His own. The ass is known for its endurance. The redeemed, well broken soul, endures as seeing Him who is invisible.

SERMON SEED

Text: There is one body and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all and in you all" (Eph. 4:4-6).

For us all there is one body of which we are members in particular, whether we be Jew or Gentile, bond or free, rich or poor, black or white.

There is but one Spirit, although He manifests Himself in divers ways, for none is so peculiar or so different as to need any other Spirit. No one can have any hope save the one blessed hope, which is for all men. "By grace are ye saved through faith," is a promise for all.

There is but one Lord for it is plainly said that He suffered death for every man, being no respecter of persons.

There is but one faith for mankind and this, too, whether you refer to accepting God's Word as true, and stepping out on it as truth, calling this faith; or to that altogether miraculous thing called faith which springs up in our hearts for salvation or other blessing when our repentance is accepted by Jesus; or to that gift of the Spirit mentioned in 1 Cor. 12:9, which is given to this one or that one by the Spirit as He wills. Whatever sort of faith one may have in mind there is not one sort for the Jew and some other sort for the Gentile. There is just one faith for all.

Whether you are speaking of faith for salvation, faith for healing, faith for the Holy Ghost Baptism or faith for the overcoming life, it is the same for all. There is but one and Jesus is its author and finisher.

There is but one baptism for all; and this is true whether we speak of the baptism of suffering and death of which Jesus spoke and which John and James declared they were able to be baptized with; or of the baptism in water by which before the world we are buried with Jesus after being born again; or of the Baptism in the Spirit whereby believers are filled with the Holy Ghost and are endued with power for the service of the King. No matter which of the three one may have in mind, there is but one for all, just as there is one God who is Father of all. There is not a God for the Jew and another for the Gentile, but just one. Hallelujah!

EVERYONE CAN HELP IN THIS

Very many saintly souls in the denominational Sunday schools are firm believers in the truth of the Bible. They believe everything in it from cover to cover. Of course they want their children to believe it too, and teach them to do so.

But great numbers of the Sunday school papers are written by people who do not believe the miracles of the Bible, nor the story of creation, nor that Jesus was born without an earthly father.

They have lost sight of the fact that in order to get to heaven one must have a heart-felt, know-so salvation, must be born again, and so in these papers you read of people "doing better," "joining the church," "signing a card for membership," "giving the preacher her hand," and so on, but nothing about having a complete change of heart by the miraculous work of the Holy Spirit.

These Sunday school paper writers do not intend to teach doctrines in Sunday school papers, but, believing as they do, little things will creep into what they write which will hurt the young readers. For instance an expression like this, "Before man had developed into his present form," or "The old fable about the Lord closing the mouths of the lions," when the young man or woman reads it they at once see that the good man who wrote the story they are reading believes, like the teacher in the school, that the Bible is not true.

The young reader does not see clearly that he must have a complete change of heart, become a new creature, be born again; but reads about young people "deciding to quit sinning," "making up their minds to join the church." After they join the church, in the story, they go right on to the dances and still play cards and go to the movies.

Now these things are a great grief to the really saved people in the denominational Sunday schools, and they would like to have their young people reading Sunday school papers in which the stories tell of young people being born again, recreated, made new inside and out. But they do not know that any such Sunday school papers are being printed.

If you will go and have an earnest talk with the real Christians in the denominational Sunday schools in your community, about good reading matter for their young people and tell them about the Christ's Ambassadors, perhaps you can induce them to subscribe for a supply of them. Give them some copies of the paper and tell them how the stories are really sermons, prayed down from the skies, and then cast in story form to hold the attention of the young.

It is a pitiful thing that millions of young people, having high ideals and really wanting to please God and do the best for themselves are compelled to feed their minds on reading matter written by men who do not believe the Bible, and who do not really know what it means to be born again. Can you not do something in your community this very day?

It is not the thought that by this means you can get some people to be Pentecostal, but that you can get some young people to have a chance to learn what it means to be a Christian. Millions do not know, and have a poor chance to find out. Let us help them.

HEALED OF TETANUS POISONING AND LOCKJAW

My son William was doing some exercising and misplaced a vertebra in his back, which became very sore. Soon after, on the night of July 22, 1926, tetanus poisoning and lockjaw from a very slight gunshot wound set it. The jaw gradually became set, so that my son could not eat anything but liquids; the neck became stiff, the arms became practically useless; when he tried to walk the legs stiffened so that it was pitiful to see the boy drag his toes on the floor. His tongue swelled to such a size that it was difficult to understand anything he said.

I was away from home at the time, being one of the evangelists at the Greensburg, Pa., camp meeting. I received a letter from my wife on July 24th at noon, telling me of the serious condition of my boy. Naturally my first impulse was to drop my work and rush home. Instead, as both my wife and I are consecrated to the service of the King, I went to my room and prayed to my Heavenly Father and He gave me the assurance that He would heal my son. I sat down and wrote to my wife by special delivery, telling her that I had committed William Junior to God and that he would not die, but that God would heal him. At the close of the camp meeting I went home, arriving there on Monday night, July 26th. I can assure you that when I looked at my splendid, robust boy, sixteen years of age, in this pitiable condition, my faith was tested, but my cry went up to God. The boy's brow was cold like a paralytic and his eyes nearly closed. He had a greenish yellow color as well. About this time he had some sort of convulsion also.

At this crisis my dear wife reminded me that the God who six years ago had instantly straightened our little Elizabeth's terribly curved spine, the God who had always been our Physician and had never failed, was still alive! Praise the Lord! Glory to His matchless name!

As is our custom, I anointed my boy with oil according to Jas. 5:14, and, together with Mrs. Coxe, laid hands on him, according to Mark 16:18, and in the name of Jesus Christ claimed his healing. Then I sat down and wrote to many of my beloved brethren in the Lord and asked them to pray with us.

Let me say also that my boy had faith. He had been saved, baptized in the Spirit at the age of eleven, and knew that God could heal. His sister Mary wrote from the Eastern District camp meeting at Pittson, Pa., that God was healing many, walking among His people. My son wrote back, "Well, Mary, I cannot go to camp. However, God can heal me here, and He is going to do it too." Praise the Lord for his faith!

William certainly stood between life and death, and only God could save and deliver him. At this time also I had a talk with him, pointing out that perhaps God had permitted this accident to draw him closer to Himself. God spoke to his heart, and he got down on his knees the best way he could. He told the Father that if He would heal him he would go all the way with Him. Glory to God! I cannot but praise Him! God took the boy at his word and began to deliver him. We continued to hold on to God. praising Him, for a few days and each day marked much improvement. SEES THE STRIPES

"By his stripes ye are healed." I had read this scripture many times, but being slow to hear I never fully comprehended it. Then, like Thomas, I believed, yes I knew I was healed; and from that moment I have had no return of the disease. That was 2 o'clock a. m., June 14, 1926.

I have had my faith tested in various ways since then, but I see those stripes as shown me so vividly in the vision and the thing is gone. Sometimes it goes in a second or two, but it always goes. Sometimes I say, "See those stripes," and that is sufficient to defeat the enemy. Often the worse they are treated the greater their power. Some, like Stephen, have short lives, others like Paul, live long, while others have a continual ministry. Some are used as book-marks and are laid aside for years, and yet mean stars in some one's crown. Anybody can preach the gospel with them, and everybody can speak a good word for them.—The Pentecostal Testimony.

The Holy Ghost Baptism

Is it scriptural for the church today to expect that the Holy Ghost Baptism will be evidenced by speaking in unknown tongues?

This great question is probably attracting more attention at the present than at any other time in the history of the world; and, as we are still in the church age, we must find God's order for the church. If we turn to 1 Cor. 12:28, we read, "And God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers, after that miracles, then gifts of healings, helps, governments, diversities of tongues." Here we see God hath placed speaking with tongues in the church. This we cannot deny.

A Recognized Sign of Receiving the Holy Ghost

In Acts 2:1-4 we have the first Bible record of anyone receiving (as called by our Lord, Acts 1:5, see Mark 1:8) the Baptism of the Holy Ghost. Here the initial sign or evidence of speaking with tongues accompanied. We read, "And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance."

Again, the same sign was present when the Holy Ghost first fell on the Gentiles, though apparently Peter had thought this experience was only for the Jews. However, he tells us in Acts 10:44-46 how he knew the Gentiles had received the Holy Ghost. He said, "For we heard them speak with tongues and magnify God."

The same is true of the disciples that Paul met at Ephesus, when he asked the question:

"Have Ye Received the Holy Ghost Since Ye Believed?"

They replied that they had not heard whether there be any Holy Ghost. After instructing them, "Paul laid his hands upon them and the Holy Ghost came on them: and they spake with tongues and prophesied" (Acts 19:2-6).

We have now seen the Bible patterns of how the Holy Ghost first came to the Jew, how the Holy Ghost first came to the Gentile, and how the Holy Ghost first came to those brought in under Paul's ministry. In each instance the speaking with other tongues accompanied.

Now note that while the 120 spoken of in Acts 2:4 had enjoyed great spiritual blessings, yet they were commanded not to depart from Jerusalem, until they received the Holy Ghost (Acts 1:4-15). The Samaritans had had a most wonderful revival under Philip's ministry, and there was great joy in that city; in fact, few churches in these days ever had a revival like it; they were even baptized (in water); yet it was not till after the apostles sent unto them Peter and John that they received the Holy Ghost (Acts 8:5-17). Then consider Cornelius, who was a very devout man, one who prayed to God al-

ways; yet he and his household did not receive the Holy Ghost until Peter, who was specially sent by God, came and began preaching to them (Acts 10:2, 44). Furthermore, the disciples at Ephesus did not receive the Holy Ghost when they first believed; in fact they had not known that the Holy Ghost was yet given till Paul came and brought them into the experience (Acts 19:2-6).

How necessary it is to believe God for this wonderful Baptism, as it is only given to those who obey Him. See Acts 5.32

Is it not true that many professing Christians show by their words and actions, that they really despise the speaking with other tongues which accompanies the marvelous outpouring of the Spirit, now falling on many thousands of believers throughout the world in these closing days (Acts 2:13; 19:9)? Nevertheless, the Scriptures clearly teach that

God Hath Set Diversities of Tongues in the Church

We read in Mark 16:17 that Jesus said, "And these signs shall follow them that believe . . . they shall speak with new tongues." Now, since Jesus said this, is it not the privilege of the believer to speak with new tongues? Again, would Paul have said, "I would that ye all spake with tongues," if it were for only a chosen four?

Some have said, that, if a real language was spoken, which was foreign to the one speaking yet understood by one or more present, they could believe it. Numbers of instances have occurred in this great revival in which believers, having received the Holy Ghost, spoke in languages foreign to themselves, yet understood by one or more present. However, the Word does not teach that all the speaking with tongues as the Spirit gives utterance, or the speaking in tongues of those who have the gift of tongues, will be understood. Even on the day of Pentecost, when the 120 were filled with the Spirit, the sign of speaking with other tongues accompanied the Baptism before it was noised abroad or the multitude had a chance to

There is nothing to indicate that when the Holy Ghost first fell on the Gentiles at Cornelius' house, or at Ephesus, the speaking with tongues was understood by any; though it certainly was a sign to Peter and to those with him that the Gentiles had received the Holy Ghost.

In 1 Cor. 14:2, Paul said, "He that

In 1 Cor. 14:2, Paul said, "He that speaketh in an unknown tongue speaketh not unto men but unto God, for no man understandeth him; howbeit, in the Spirit he speaketh mysteries." This settles the being-understood objection.

Again in verse 5, Paul said,

"I Would That Ye All Spake with Tongues,"

and added, "But rather that ye prophe-

sied: for greater is he that prophesieth than he that speaketh with tongues (so many stop here), except he interpret." Now, many interpretations are being given these days, and when interpretation is given, who can say prophecy is greater than tongues? If the Corinthian believers could receive and give interpretation, why not the believers of today? In verse 13, we are especially told to pray that we may interpret.

In verse 14, Paul said, "If I pray in an unknown tongue my spirit prayeth but my understanding is unfruitful." Did Paul stop praying in the unknown tongue because his understanding was unfruitful? Positively no, for in verse 15, he said, "I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding also; I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also."

Even in Paul's day it would seem that critics of speaking in tongues had arisen, for in the 18th verse Paul takes occasion to boldly assert that he is a ringleader among the Tongues people, and in verse 39 he closes the argument by warning us not to forbid the speaking in tongues.

not to forbid the speaking in tongues.

But it is said, "We believe in speaking in tongues all right, but what we object to is the saying that it is the necessary sign of one's having received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost." Now that has a good sound. It sounds fair. But listen: Have you seen any of these people speaking in tongues? No, I suppose the only people you have ever heard of speaking in tongues are the very people who assert that the reason they know they have the Holy Ghost Baptism is that they speak in a language that they never learned.

Truly this speaking in a language one never has learned is a striking miracle. Consider for a moment what is involved in the Holy Spirit's taking such intimate control of the tongue and other vocal organs as that, wholly without the conscious effort of the speaker, there should come forth from his lips intelligible speech in a language he never has learned. When the added fact is stated, that such speakers when naturally understood are found to be speaking the unknown language without a brogue, the wonder of it all increases.

It is not to be wondered at that in the vast majority of cases those present, by their natural intelligence, do not understand what is spoken. Paul speaks in the thirteenth chapter of 1 Corinthians of speaking with the tongues of men and of angels. In view of the several hundreds of languages there are in the world, and of the languages of the angels of unknown number, who could expect anything else but that it would be seldom that a language spoken should be understood by the bystanders? However in my own little experience I have known of a lady being understood as she spoke in French, of a man being understood speaking in German and of a Jewess understanding and marveling at a part of the solemn service of the synagogue in Hebrew. None of the speakers knew anything of the foreign language spoken. Our pastor here at Springfield as he spoke in tongues was understood once by a German lady and once by an Indian, he having spoken in the German language and in the Indian language without ever having learned either one. Such instances could be greatly multiplied; but where can such an incident be found in the case of one who claims that tongues are all right but the receiving of the Holy Ghost Baptism is not so evidenced?

Did the people in the eighth chapter of the Acts speak in tongues? I think so, for while it does not say so it does say that their being baptized in the Spirit was accompanied by some marvelous manifestation which Simon's showman soul greatly desired to be able to produce. What was that manifestation? The Bible does not say, but why should we suppose that it was anything else but tongues. Tongues would fill the requirements as being a manifestation calculated to produce the effect on Simon that was produced, and no intimation of any other sort of marvel is hinted.

Did Paul speak in tongues when he received his Baptism? It does not say so in telling of his experience in the

ninth chapter of the Acts, but the fact that he had that manifestation in those baptized under his ministry as in the nineteenth chapter of the Acts coupled with the fact that he was a speaker in tongues to an unusual degree makes it plain that he had the same evidence of the Baptism that was noted in the other Bible instances.

Taking it then that they spoke in tongues at Samaria and that Paul did so too when he received, we have tongues as the evidence of the Baptism in the five records of its being received (i. e., at Pentecost in Acts two, at Samaria in Acts eight, at Damascus in Acts 9, at Caesarea in Acts ten and at Ephesus in Acts nineteen.)

Now if it is indeed true that people do receive the Baptism in the Holy Ghost and yet do not speak in tongues must it not be far more satisfactory to receive it in the way and with the evidence spoken of in the Bible? It seems to me the Bible way is far the better way, if there be two ways.

The Wise Man prayed, 'Give me neither poverty nor riches; feed me with food convenient for me: lest I be full and deny thee, and say, Who is the Lord? or lest I be poor and steal, and take the name of my God in vain.'"

"Then it is the best way to not be poor or rich either one," said Harry. "But if you were rich you would have so much more to give to poor people who need help."

"Yes, but you would not feel like doing this, I suppose. For the man who gets rich is a man who has kept what he has made while he was making it, and thus he has got used to passing by the poor people who need help.

"I think then," said the boy, slowly, as he pondered this new and great subject, "that I will plan to make all the money I can, but not keep it. If I make a lot of money I can give a lot of it away, can't I?"

"Yes, that is a fine plan. It is much like the rule that John Wesley laid down for the Methodist people. He said, 'Make all you can, save all you can; give all you can.'"

WAIT FOR VICTORY

The revival did not come because the meeting closed when the revival was just about to begin. In the average church it is next to impossible to bring on a revival in ten days or two weeks. Many churches and preachers plan for a meeting ten days or two weeks and that ends it. Many a meeting should go on three weeks, four weeks, perhaps longer, till victory comes. The old-fashioned protracted meeting of our fathers had the right idea; it kept going till the break came. We remember a great church meeting that kept going for six weeks before the break came, but when it did come it was immense. Many a meeting has been lost because it was closed when it was just in condition to begin.-Canadian Pentecostal Testimony.

BEATEN WITH CLUBS

One of our native workers in Peru, Hipolito Astete, held a meeting some 30 miles from Huaras, our station, and a Catholic priest who was in the town stirred the people up, urging them to "club him to death." The morning after the meeting a mob of bigots, accompanied by the priest, broke into the house at 6 a. m. and beat him with clubs while he was in bed, wounding him severely and dislocating two joints. God spared his life causing the owner of the house where he was lodging to attempt to defend him, though this man also was ill treated by the mob. He escaped from that town and reached the next one, six or eight miles away, weak from loss of blood, and a Chinaman, married to a native, who is living in that town took him in and cared for him. News was brought to me and I got a horse and went to bring him home.

Some of the missionaries understood that he had been killed but that was an erroneous report. Through prayer he recovered rapidly and is now almost over the effects, after three weeks, though it was also a severe shock to his nerves. He said he felt quite sure they were going to kill him, but had peace and even joy in his soul. Though converted only 15 months ago, at Brother Lightner's death and through his prayers, this educated Indian boy is now a deep student of God's Word, and ready to lay down his life, if need be, for Jesus. These are ideal localities to get the Gospel to a large number of people.

Each new station opened up should have suitable buildings which will cost from \$700 to \$800. This next dry season should see at least four or more out stations under construction. This means an increase of missionary personnel. Then, too, to carry on this work aggressively, as it should be, an auto truck is sadly needed. The missionaries on the field are all earnestly praying that funds will permit such a forward move.

Brethren, when we take into considera-



tion the tremendous possibilities on the one hand, and the self-sacrificing spirit of the missionaries, the hardships they endure and the discomforts involved on the other, it ought to move us all with pity and compassion for them. During the last trip to bring in some new missionaries the Ford car broke down a number of times and had to be repeatedly repaired, thus retarding the journey and making unnecessary hardships for our missionaries.

When our missionaries are willing to make the sacrifice, endure the separation from home and thrust forth their lives to bear the Name of Jesus to the ends of the earth, ought we not to back them up with our prayers and financial support to the limit?

Our mission station consists of a series of mud huts, one of which, formerly used as a stable, has now been converted into our bedroom. Much cleaning and fumigating was necessary before this became possible, but for this God wonderfully supplied the grace we so much needed.

One good feature about the compound is that there is a nice long building in front that my husband with the help of our teacher whitewashed and turned into a very presentable chapel. The only thing we lacked were the benches, but God always has a way; so, although we had no money to buy benches, we were able to borrow some for a period. We then started a series of meetings, with the help of a Spirit-filled evangelist, and night after night our hall was filled with listeners eager to hear the old gospel story. Our gospel songs seem to be getting hold of the people so that we hear them often as we pass along the streets. Moreover, the people in the villages around seem quite friendly towards us.

We have felt very greatly helped by our teacher who has preached some very precious messages and has given us valuable instructions in preaching. We are looking to the Lord very definitely that the Word may sink into the hearts of these people and many be won for our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

BIBLE WOMAN IN CHAPRA, U. P. INDIA, RECEIVES HOLY SPIRIT

The Lord has certainly been most gracious to us here and has heard the cry of our hearts giving us refreshing showers from His presence.

Five of our girls have recently received the Baptism in the Spirit also one of our new teachers and a Bible woman. Hallelujah! It was so wonderful to watch the Spirit working through the girls of India; they had visions of Jesus, sang and spoke in "other tongues" and glorified God, just as the first disciples did, so long ago in the upper room in Jerusalem

We asked you some time back, to pray that funds might be forthcoming to put .

up some very much needed buildings, and I am sure you have been praying with us, for the Lord has most wonderfully answered.

Thousands of miles away across the blue seas, a dear humble man of God was saving his money to provide for a large, growing family of children, and one night the Lord spoke to him by a vision. He saw in the vision stacks and stacks of bricks piled up in a yard and heard the voice of the Lord saying, "I want you to put these bricks into walls for me." This came to him again and again until it was made clear to him that he was to send his savings, a thousand dollars, across the waters to India, in order to provide home and shelter for the Christian converts in Bettiah. Thank God he was willing to obey and do just as the Lord said. So that now our tears have been turned into songs of praise, and the walls are going up, hearts are rejoicing, and six families who have been living in old grass huts not fit for the pigs are counting the days when they will have a nice brick home to live in.

We are building a long row of six rooms, with a little veranda and inclosed yard for each of the six families and oh, how we praise the dear Lord for His great faithfulness. We are now looking very definitely to the Lord to provide for the girls' dormitory.

Prayer changes things. Our God hears and answers.

I must tell you also of the wedding bells that will be ringing here. Four of our own dear girls are to be married. Shall I tell you about it?

Years ago, in a Hindu village of mud and grass houses, a girl was starving. She was not an orphan but then she was only a girl, so what did it matter. There were others in the family, boys and girls but the father earned only a few cents a day and sometimes nothing at all. The girl was hungry and crept into a neighbor's field and eagerly devoured an ear of corn. She was discovered in the act and beaten severely after which she was thrown out of house and village with no one to care for her and nowhere to go.

Then she remembered the white-faced woman who had come to their village and told them a story of the love of Jesus whilst they sat around the village well. She remembered the woman had said this Jesus loved all the world including the girls and women. She would go to the Jesus' home and stay. So Bachchia came to us. She has never been bright but she has been faithful. She is still in the first grade in school never able to pass examinations and get into the second grade but she has been faithful in her work, always ready to scrub the pans, draw the water, sweep and grind, and do the work others do not want to do.

Now she is going to be married and she is so happy. When the young man came hunting for a wife, we told him he could have Bachchia. They had never seen each other so we put them together out on the veranda and told them to get acquainted. They sat together for almost an hour before either spoke but now they are both happy and looking for-

ward to their wedding day. Another of the dear girls is Florence who was a Mohammedan girl and orphan.

Aliman was a little Hindu orphan wandering about begging at a railroad station; now a splendid little Christian and a girl who loves to preach and tell about Jesus. Grace is a sweet girl who is about seventeen years old and in the fourth class. The four young men they are to marry are all Christians and the girls will go into their own Christian homes to make new lighthouses in the darkness of India.—Marguerite Flint.

MANY STARVING IN HUNAN, CHINA

"God has been very gracious to us here in Yuanchow. Just recently twenty-nine souls followed the Lord in Baptism. God was very near to us whilst the ceremony was taking place and many hearts were touched. Amongst the candidates were eight old ladies over seventy years of age. One of them being 94, also a blind woman, who received spiritual sight, came with the rest for baptism.

"Perhaps to us the greatest joy of all was to be able to baptize the mother of the murderer who wounded Mrs. Becker so severely in January, 1918. She had been in prison and was sentenced to death, but I was able to have her set free after seeing the magistrate. She could not believe, however, that we would not take revenge on her for the bad act of her son and accordingly fled into the country. After two years of absence she ventured again into the city and was invited by some woman to come to the meetings, with the result that she came and found the Saviour. Praise the Lord for these precious souls!

"The Lord is surely working in our midst. We often have something like 500 people at our prayer meetings with perhaps 50 or more praying at once. They all want to pray so that we have found it necessary at times to divide them up into 10 praying groups of 50 to a group.

"The old grandmother whom I mentioned in my last letter as having killed her grandson and wanting to boil and eat the body, has repented of her wicked act and is coming to the meetings.

"The famine is awful. Rice has risen to 28 times its original cost. The city magistrate asked us to investigate the granaries and buy all the grain we could get in order to sell it at a nominal price to the famine sufferers. So great is the hunger of the people that it seems at times as if they would tear one to pieces in their desire for something to eat.

"Our gates have been broken down by the crowd and three times during the last few weeks I have had to run or the clothes would have been torn from my back.

"Several women threw their children into the river, in order to end their suffering, not being able to give them anything to eat.

"A bandit executed by the soldiers, in five minutes was cut to pieces by women and taken to their homes for food. At least 100 are dying of starvation daily in this district and the stench of decaying bodies is dreadful. Our Christians receive only half a meal a day. In the orphanage we have to give each child his ration, but they are not grumbling but praising the Lord for what they receive.

"Thank God, we are living, moving and working in the presence of the Almighty who alone can fully satisfy."—Herman Becker.

A PLEA FROM PORTO RICO

We have just received word that a hurricane has swept through parts of Porto Rico, and has caused considerable damage to the mission property there. The estimated damage amounts to about \$500, which is not very much to pay when one considers that one chapel was entirely destroyed whilst two others in different towns were very badly hurt.

The believers naturally suffered also, many of them losing their entire crops of corn and beans on which they rely almost entirely for their living. They cannot therefore be expected to help in the re-building of the missions, since they will have all they can do to get along themselves. Unless we can send an additional \$150 a month to our brethren on this field many of the native workers will have to be given up. Already three have been dropped through lack of funds, and help is urgently needed to maintain a preacher who was recently put out of the Methodist Church because of the stand he took for the Pentecostal Bap-Let us unite in prayer that funds may be forthcoming to meet this very urgent need .- J. L. Lugo.

"One of our most venerated and farseeing citizens," says a foremost preacher of New York, "recently remarked that in his eighty years of active life, associated with some of the most stirring events in the commonwealth, he had never seen such an orgy of lawlessness as that through which we are living now. GOD'S MOVING IN THE LACKA-WANA AND WYOMING VALLEYS

The Assemblies of God in the Lackawana and Wyoming Valleys in Pennsylvania are cooperating in a very beautiful manner and the Lord is adding His blessing to the fellowship there among them. These valleys comprise the Anthracite Coal Region and furnish a remarkable field for the Gospel. Towns, colleries, boroughs and cities join one another in an unbroken line for many miles up the valleys and offer fertile soil for the Pentecostal message, among a people of many languages and many nationalities.

The summer's activities in these valleys have borne much fruit for God. On July Fourth, the Scranton and Peckville assemblies united in a water baptismal service and seventy-three candidates from the two assemblies including a few from Clarks Summit were buried with the Lord in baptism at Newton Lake. Pastor Flower of Scranton, and Pastor Couzens of Peckville were constrained to baptize simultaneously on account of the large number of candidates. Much blessing rested upon the service. On the same day, Pastor Tom Twiss baptized a large number of candidates from the Gravity assembly, a few miles away.

The Eastern District Council camp meeting was brought into the valley this year and was located about half way between Scranton and Wilkes Barre. This was the largest camp ever held in the Eastern District. Quite a number were saved and received the Baptism of the Spirit although no accurate count was kept of the number. One man who attended every camp in the district for years, finally received his Baptism this

At the close of the camp meeting, Brother John Jenkins, pastor of the assembly at Taylor (near Scranton) opened a tent meeting with Brother Bernhardt of California as the evangelist. The month of August has been rainy and yet crowds have stood around in the rain each night to hear the Pentecostal message and many of the church people are becoming interested. Souls are being saved all through the meeting.

Brother Tom Twiss has also conducted a successful two weeks' tent campaign at Hamlin. Great interest has been aroused, and a large number saved and baptized in the Spirit.

There is work going on in the larger assemblies at Scranton, Gravity, Wilkes Barre and Peckville, together with Taylor, Clarks Summit, Carbondale and Harvey's Lake. There are many outlying assemblies in Dunmore, South Scranton or Minooka, Throop, Pittston, etc. The Italians have four or five assemblies and the revival spirit is on them
