(Luke 21:36)

"Likewise also as it was in the days of Lot: they did eat, they drank, they bought, they sold, they planted, they builded; But the same day that Lot went out of Sodom it rained fire and brimstone from heaven, and destroyed them all. Even thus shall it be in the day when the Son of man is revealed" (Luke 17:28-30).

Lot out; judgment in. The angels said, "Arise, take thy wife and thy two daughters, which are here; lest thou be consumed in the . . . Haste thee, escape iniquity of the city. thither; for I cannot do anything till thou be come thither" (Gen. 19:15, 22). They were taken out. liverance of God's people, individually and nationally.

Daniel had a temporary inconvenience, an uncomfortable environment with the lions' company. Their smell was not pleasant to Daniel. The inconvenience of the smell was nothing like the inconvenience of providing a meal for the hungry lions. He was drawn up out of the den and then the lions of the pit were busy on the enemies of Daniel.

We are in the presence of a people of unclean lips. They have upon them the smell of the country to which they belong, the smell of their father, the father of lies—the roaring lion. "But not a dog shall move his tongue against you" (Ex. 11:7), nor will a fang enter your being. They may roar. The smell may come up into your nostrils, but at the right time, the time when intercession will be brought to a fullness, the King will send, yea, He will come Himself for your deliverance.

"Satan hath desired to have thee to sift thee as wheat." Peter was in very unpleasant quarters, but he got out free. "Thy speech betrayeth thee! You belong to Him! You are a Galilean! You ought to be where He is!" Christ went through that we might pass out, but Peter suffered from proximity to the devil in the servants' quarters. If you hobnob with the world, look out. Peter went out and wept bitterly went out and wept bitterly because he denied his Lord! Some will have an abundant entrance. Some will be saved as though by fire. Abraham saw Sodom from a distance, knew what was going to happen, and by such means was able to pray for the doomed city, Pray for the doomed world, and you can only do it as you take the place outside where you can hear from God. I passed between the two large Corinthian columns of a well known building in the city of my birth one night and found myself in the midst of a fairly large and honorable company of well known artists. It was easy to recognize some of them as artists for their hair was long and they wore velvet coats. The majority did not betray their profession. In this distinguished company I conversed freely, for the gathering had received me as one of their number, not because I was an artist, not because I was a great man in the city and had some special privileges, nor had I performed some remarkable deed which called forth the appreciation of the people, but simply because a few days before an artist had given me an invitation to the gathering and on the strength of that artist's invitation I enjoyed the elite company.

I wish to call your attention to the subject of invitations, and particularly to some of the invitations of the Lord Jesus Christ given during His earthly ministry.

Kindly turn to that most familiar one in Matt. 11:28, 29: "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls." Here is an invitation to everyone, an invitation to the burdened ones from the bountiful Lord. Notice first of all that it is the call of the sympathetic Christ. He is One who feels for man, and His compassion is expressed in the yearning desire to help the weary. And secondly, it is the call of the confident One, for He says, "I will give you rest." He did not say, as some of us might have said, "I will do my best to give you rest." That is not His way. "Come," He says, "and I will give you rest." He confidently affirms the fact.

Then it is the invitation of the unambitious One for He declares, "I am meek and lowly in heart." Here is something we can greatly rejoice over. The Lord Jesus Christ was unambitious. "Come, and I will give you rest; for I am meek and lowly in heart." He has revealed His own disposition, He has disclosed His own character. Only the truly meek could dare refer to personal virtues without being misunderstood. He does not reveal Himself in order to glory, but to inspire assurance in the hearts of the hearers. "I am meek, and therefore you may come ard tell me your troubles," we seem to hear HIM say. How this thought draws out our confidence, for we would never tell our troubles to one who was not meek, to one who was ready to point out our feebleness and deride us for what we have felt drawn to confess. Here is One to whom we can tell our troubles and

difficulties, and He will not scorn or spurn us. He is meek and lowly in heart.

It is also the invitation of the incarnated Christ. He came to help us. He is the One who left heaven's splendor in order to come into the midst of stricken humanity and give from His own lips the word of invitation. And, it is the invitation of the Burden-bearer. "Take my yoke upon you." He comes to share the burdens, the difficulties, problems, and temptations of life. He desires to come into our lives to deal with our difficulties. to share our burdens, to banish our sins and iniquities. Oh, weary one, the Lord is seeking to help you. Divinity is reaching out after stricken humanity. The Lord has come from heaven to earth to give you an invitation. He will help you, give you strength to climb the steeps of the difficult, stony hill of human experience. He will deliver you from sin and save you eternally. Come to Him. Accept this great invitation.

Here is another invitation. "Jesus turned and saw them following, and saith unto them, What seek ye? They said unto him, Rabbi, where dwellest thou? He saith unto them, Come and see" (John 1:38, 39). "Come and see" constitutes an invitation to fellowship with the Master. These two disciples had heard John Baptist declare that Jesus was the Lamb of God and they had been drawn by the Spirit to follow the Master. Andrew and that other disciple are now following the Master. He turns, and seeing them following, says, "What seek ye?" They said, "Master, where dwellest thou?" What is He going to answer? Is He going to turn them away? He turns and says, "Come and see." And that was all sufficient for those two. They did not need a long oration; they were yearning for fellowship, they wanted to know the Lord Jesus Christ. It was unconditional. He did not say, "Come, but there are things we must consider first. You can only come so far into My life. This coming where I dwell will mean close intimacy and I cannot have you too near to Me." He had nothing to hide. He did not lead a double life. It was an invitation to close intimacy-to know Him.

It was an invitation to a life of faith. "Where dwellest thou?" Oh, He dwelt in places which would stumble some. The Son of man had not where to lay His head. The one who desires to know close intimacy with the Lord Jesus Christ must know it along the line of faith. Come then and dwell where He dwells. The secrets of His inner life are divulged only to those who live with Him in the closer intimacy of sweet fellowship. To see His miracles wrought would not satisfy for long. We would tire of seeing miracles wrought, but there is one thing the

soul never tires of, it is sweet fellowship with the Lord Jesus Christ. I have attended a number of the meetings of Brother Stephen Jeffrey's and have seen so many miracles wrought through the Lord Jesus Christ that they have not that peculiar magnetism they once had. I have watched the eyes of the blind being opened and deaf ears unstopped until I have grown weary of the sight. But I have never grown weary of fellowship with the Lord Jesus Christ.

"In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying, If any man thirst, let him come unto me, and drink" (John 7:37). It is an invitation to the thirsty. "If any man thirst." He does not invite people who are not spiritually thirsty. This invitation was given to worshipers. And the invitation to be filled with the Holy Spirit is not to everybody, it is to worshipers. It is an in-"If vitation from One who could give. any man thirst, let him come unto me, and drink." He was the Fountain-head. It is an invitation to a flowing life. "Out of him shall flow rivers of living waters.' How often we have tried to give a word of testimony, but there was no flow about the words. We see a person in need and yearn to give the Word, and yet somehow we are dumb, or if we have spoken the words how awkwardly they have been given.

I remember being in a car once and opposite me there was a young man with his feet on the cushions of the other seat. He was making a great exhibition of his colored socks, and I was just yearning to speak to him about the life in the Holy Ghost. In the English trains there are small compartments to seat ten people. I said, "O Lord, just keep this compartment reserved for us if I am to speak to him." A person came to the door of the compartment and put her hand on the handle and was coming in, but she changed her-mind and went into the next compartment. Two more came and were about to enter when they changed their mind and went into the next. And then someone else came, but changed his mind. I do not know how many there were in the next compartment but we had ours just for the two of us. I said, "Lord, if I am to speak to this man, get him to put down his newspaper." And down went the paper. I was just overflowing with such joy and delight in the Lord. Of course I began the conversation in an ordinary way. I talked of politics, of which I know nothing in the world. He was able to tell me quite a lot. Then I spoke of distressing conditions and told him of One who could put the whole matter right, and I wove on the wonderful story of full salvation until he took his feet off the cushion and put his elbow on his knee and his chin in his hand, and looking with intense yearning into my face he said, "Man, have you found satisfac-tion?" Well, I should think I had and I told him how to find it. He grasped my hand in such a kind way, saying, "I am glad I have met you."

We had an assembly at Birmingham at one time and in it was a lady who had a great desire for God. Her husband

was a local Wesleyan preacher. This good lady used to regularly and earnestly seek the Holy Spirit, but her husband only came to our meetings on special occasions. We had some tarrying meetings there and people were receiving the Holy Spirit. This good woman had been to three of the meetings that week and oh, how she had enjoyed them. On the fourth day the Lord spoke to her and said, "If you will go to the meeting tonight, I will baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire." She said, "O Lord, I cannot. I have been out three times already this week and my husband won't allow me to go again. You make him willing and I will go." If you have an awful husband, pray about him. That husband hardly put his foot in the door before he said to his wife, "My dear, you may go to the meeting tonight." She shouted, "Oh, praise the Lord!" He said, "Why are you getting so excited about She answered, "I was praying toit?" day and the Lord told me He would baptize me tonight with the Holy Ghost and He said, "Well, we will see." As fire.' soon as she got him a little supper, she ran all the way from the house to the meeting hall and dropped on her knees, panting, and saying, "O Lord, please baptize me with the Holy Ghost." When she had been on her knees nearly an hour she said, "O Lord, you are keeping me a long time." And down came the Holy Ghost and she was baptized.

She got up and ran out of the room and ran all the way home. She was going to tell her husband all about it but he stopped her. He said, "I know all about it." She said, "What do you know?" He said, "I know you have been baptized with the Holy Ghost. I have been praying over your actions and the Lord spoke to me and said, 'I have baptized your wife in the Holy Ghost."" He said, "I am very pleased you are baptized for you would never have been satisfied without the experience, but I don't want it." Notice his words, "You would never have been satisfied without it." Those are the people who receive the Baptism of the Holy Ghost-the thirsty ones that are not happy unless their thirst is slaked.

But there is a sequel to this story. After living in the home with a baptized wife for nearly twelve months, he got thirsty. But he was a local Wesleyan preacher and did not like to tell his wife how thirsty he was. He began to come to our meetings and the two of them sat there one time. They were both praying in their hearts and the husband was saying, "O Lord, I should like to be baptized with the Holy Ghost, and if it is Thy will that I go out of this large hall into the tarrying meeting, please get my wife to ask me to go." And the wife was praying, "O Lord, I don't like to ask him again for he is always so rough when I ask him. Give me courage to ask him once more." Both prayers were answered. She summed up courage and said, "My dear, would you like to seek the Holy Spirit?" He was on his feet in a mo-ment, and said, "Yes, my dear, yes." And in they went to the seeking room. He knelt down. In a short time he had for-

gotten everything, forgotten the people seeking with him, forgotten where he was. He had been carried away to a land unknown before to him, and he came right to the foot of a cross on which a Form was hanging. He gazed in wonder and astonishment at the Form he saw, and as he gazed his eyes caught the words written above. They were in English-"This was for you." And underneath the words his name was written. Oh, how his heart was filled with gratitude and his mouth with praise! He shouted, "Praise the Lord!" And before he knew it the language of the Spirit was flowing through him. He came out of that room with two hands up in the air, shouting "Praise the Lord!" He was not used to doing things like that for he was a local Wesleyan preacher. Is something within you saying, "I need more than I have"? The Lord can meet your greatest need and baptize you with the Holy Ghost and fire. Never a week passes in our meetings in London without someone being baptized in the Holy Ghost.

A missionary from India came to me one night and said, "Mr. Carter, I am going to India tomorrow and I have come to receive the Baptism of the Holy Ghost tonight." It was late at night and she was to go early in the morning. We prayed. I do not believe in praying for a long time to ask God for His gifts. Time fled and we had been praying twenty minutes but she did not receive. I said, "Sister, would you not like to praise the Lord? So she said in a very quiet voice, "Praise the Lord.". I said, "Say it vigorously." And she said it again very weakly. prayed another ten minutes and then I said, "Sister, I am sure of this, that if you praised the Lord you would be baptized with the Holy Ghost. The Lord can baptize you any minute." So she went to her room and knelt down and praised the Lord, and after about three hours she thought it was time to get into bed. She had been speaking in other tongues for about three hours.

The invitation to the Spirit-filled life is an invitation which is according to the Scriptures. We need experiences today which are according to the Scriptures, a Baptism which is according to the Word of God. The Spirit-filled life is an overflowing one because the source of blessing is in God and not in man.

"If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me" (Luke 9:23). Here is an invitation to a life of self-denial. What is self-denial? It is something far deeper than we are accustomed to think. The denial of self strikes at the root of the very thoughts and intents of the heart. It is not leaving one lump out of two of sugar out of your coffee. As though the Lord would take a lump of sugar from us! "If any man will come after me let him deny himself." That old self of yours that will usurp authority, that will dictate to you and tell you what to do, and mold your ambitions and set up your idols, that self must be dealt with.

There was a young woman who was very musically inclined and was ambitious to be one of the great players. God said

"India" to her. She said, "O Lord, it would be very difficult," but she denied herself. There was a man exhibiting pictures at the Royal Academy in London and he was becoming quite an adept with the brush. God said to him, "My work." And he denied himself. Another young man, a bank clerk, climbing the ladder of success, and God said to him, "My service." And he denied himself. Another one wrestled and wrestled and wrestled, like Jacob of old, and at last he said, as the perspiration was running down his brow, "Very well, Lord." Self received a deadly blow that night and he has never been the same since. He has been an earnest worker for the Lord.

"If any man will come after me, let him deny himself." O friends, God will have self dealt with. If you have never said it before, let this be the time of consecration when you say, "O Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" If any man will come after me, let him deny himself. Is not that sufficient? No, that is only part of the invitation. "Let him deny himself, and take up his cross." Isn't that too much? No, in the light of the glory of that magnificent sacrifice on Calvary, God must have our all. Pleasure seeking? No, we must bear the cross, we are not our own. Don't make any mistake about the cross. It is not what some of you think it is. I have heard some say, "My cross is my husband." Oh, no, no, no! That is not it. Why, unconverted women have You picked that cross up husbands. quite willingly at one time. What is the cross? It is all that you bear for the name of the Lord Jesus Christ; the scoffing, the persecution, the shame, the suffering you bear because you are a believer of the Lord Jesus, because you are following in His footsteps. If your husband stands in the way of your fidelity to Christ, then he can be your cross.

"If any man will come after me let him take up his cross **daily.**" Not take it up once and then say, "Well, I have borne my cross; that is the end of the matter." It is not the end. You must take up your cross daily.

The invitation is prefaced by an "If." "If any man will come after me.". The Lord Jesus knew that would come so readilv. This would sift out the company. Many would come out of curiosity to see His miracles and hear His word, but now they are going to be sifted.

I knew a man who got weary of bearing his cross and carrying the burden of the Lord's work. He had a very small assembly, not over a dozen people in it. Week by week he talked to the twelve and got to know them all very well. It was becoming a bit of a burden to talk to these twelve he knew so well. He said, "I won't minister to them any more. I will please myself and go out on Sundays. I will have a walk, and won't be bound to this mission." "What are you going to do, pastor?" I am going to put another man in my place and I shall be free. If I want to go to church I shall go, and if I want to go for a walk I shall do that." "Well, do you feel you are doing the will of God?" "That does

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA BIBLE SCHOOL OPENING DAY

The Southern California Bible School opened its seventh year of Bible training on Tuesday, September the twenty-eighth.

Its limited seating capacity was overcrowded with eager-eyed, serious-minded, stable Christian young men and women whom the Lord had led into the school to learn the deeper things of God through the power of the Holy Spirit, and to receive a thorough preparation for the Master's use.


In this quiet, restful atmosphere a small group of consecrated students learn to get quiet before God, to wait upon Him, listening for the faintest whisper of His will.

not matter. I have had enough of this place." His first Sunday had come to please himself. He said to his wife, "Come along and we will go walking in the country and enjoy ourselves." He had only gotten a little distance from his home on the first free Sunday when he was knocked down by a car and carried unconscious into a hospital, and there he lay unconscious for several days. Very slowly he came back. After lying in the hospital a long time he said, "Let me go home." Still weak and ghastly white he got home and the next Sunday he staggered into the meeting and stood up before the dozen people and said, "Friends, I have sinned before God." But it was too late. He never gained the work back again. It was almost wrecked by his successor and

a woeful story could be told by that struggling community.

Self-pleasing is the first step to degredation. Did our blessed Lord deny Himself? Look at His life and ministry. Did He not bear His cross? Did He not go into the very midst of suffering and persecution? And He calls us to follow Him. He does not drive His people. He leads them. He is the Good Shepherd. In denying ourselves we make room to receive Him. Self-denial is not self-destruction. If we could only see with the spiritual vision we would discover that self-denial is the very seed of self-development. The losing of earthly pleasure is the gaining of heavenly joy. The Lord dose not ask us to part with anything of any value. Himself our greatest prize!

"Then shall the King say unto them on his right hand, Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world" (Matt. 25:34). "Come, ye blessed of my Father," will be the joyous invitation that we as faithful believers will receive from our blessed Lord. On that great day He will not say to us, "There is the kingdom, my beloved, go into it." No, I should not appreciate that. He says, "Come into it." If He had said "Go," we should have said, "O Lord, I shall not be happy until you come." I know a very beautiful house in London with lovely carpets on the floor, beautiful pictures on the wall, the latest furniture, exquisitely designed. Money was not considered when that house was furnished. Whatever the lady of the house desired, she had, and she had all she wanted. Then she found that she wanted more than she ought to have desired. She had not learned to deny herself not even to do what is right. And that home is not a home, it is a house. It is a miserable place today. The solitary husband is trying to bring up his little boy alone. You cannot love furniture and pictures. People make homes. Furniture and wood and brick make houses. We should get tired of heaven's glory if He were not there. Oh, the difference between saying "go" and "come." He will take us Himself to our eternal dwelling.

He says, "Come into the kingdom prepared for you," but He says it to the sheep and not to the goats. Be sure you are on the right side. It is a place prepared as though heaven were not good enough! He has gone to get a place especially ready to receive His own. It is an invitation to everlasting joy in the presence of the Lord. The trials of earth will soon be forgotten. If we have any regrets there it will be that we have not followed Christ more closely, that we did not drink deeply enough of the Lord's Spirit.

A COMMUNIST'S CONVERSION

"You are a danger to society, and the sentence of the Court is that you go to prison for fifteen months with hard labor." With these words ringing in my ears I left the dock of the Glasgow Sheriff Court, after being found guilty by a jury on seven charges of sedition. Although amazed and a little staggered by the length of the sentence, I was enjoying the exuberant ecstasy which comes to every one of us with the fulfillment of a great desire. At last I was a martyr, and that counts for much in the revolutionary movement today. I was an Atheist-blind to everything that was pure, good, and Divine; alive only to the desires of my animal nature, thinking in terms of revolution with its attendant horrors of bloodshed and chaos-in short, an Atheist, at war with society and with God. From that day to the day of my liberation a card hung over my cell door with the word "Atheist" distinctly marked upon it. I will not dwell upon my prison sufferings, the awful loneliness and the mental torture.

On March 1, 1924, I was liberated, and on the following day I again stood upon the revolutionary platform giving expression to the soul-destroying doctrines of Communism and Atheism, for the two go together. On I went for several weeks, influencing, instigating, and also enrolling recruits for "The Day." During the six weeks immediately following my release I addressed over thirty meetings. I accepted the offer of a two weeks' holiday at Dunoon. I was now on the threshold of the greatest event of my life; but I was unaware of the fact, except for a growing restlessness of spirit. I attended the funeral of a young woman, and at the graveside the hymn that God was using to bring me into His kingdom was sung. "Safe in the arms of Jesus" rang out as the coffin was lowered, and instantly an overmastering appeal for that security rang out from my soul and reached the ear of Him who sitteth at the right hand of God the Father. The stupendous sense of unseen realities at that supreme moment and my burning desire to know more about the Lord Jesus, cannot here be described. I was conscious of my awful sinful state, and knew that the righteous indignation of a holy God constantly rested upon me; but that day, standing by that open grave, the whole story of God's love for the sinner in the gift of His Son to the Cross of Calvary passed in review before my bewildered mind. I rested my soul for time and eternity on Jesus Christ and His atoning work, and I entered into peace (Rom. 5: The age of miracles is not past. I 1). had been an avowed Atheist pouring down ridicule upon God and His blessed Son; yet here was I down on my knees giving myself, body and soul, to Him I had scorned and denied. Blessed be God, and blessed be Dunoon, for I arrived at that place an unbeliever, and I left "safe in the arms of Jesus."-Thomas Hindle.

A MARVELOUS CASE OF HEALING "Be not afraid, only believe" (Mark 5:36).

One Saturday afternoon the man who serves us with coal, called on business, and during our conversation I asked him how his wife and children were; he looked very sad and said, "They are all very well with the exception of our baby, and he is very ill indeed." I asked the trouble, and he said no one really knew, it was a puzzle. So I expressed my sympathy, longing all the time to tell him of Jesus the Healer, but let him go without doing so. I felt very troubled that I had let the opportunity slip by, but the next time he came around I asked how the baby was, and he said, "He is no different, just lying there as though he were dead." He also told me the doctor had completely given him up, saying it would be all right if they wished to call in another doctor, as he had done all in his power to cure him and could do no more. I said to the father, "Praise the Lord! man's extremity is God's opportunity," and the father said, "Every time I go home from work I glance at the window quite expecting to see the blinds drawn," and he said he had been like this for five weeks.

I was moved with compassion and said to the father, "Would you let me come and pray for your baby, for Jesus can heal him?" He said, "If you think that, come by all means." I went round that afternoon, after telling the Lord how utterly weak and helpless I felt, but I recognized it was His work, and prayed the Lord to confirm His own Word with signs following. So taking my Bible and a fittle bottle of anointing oil, I knocked at the door.

The dear mother, looking weary and utterly worn out, showed me inside, and there lay the dear little mite on a cot, his eyes closed, and looking like death. So I asked the mother to tell me what was the matter. She said, "He has never been right since he was born; he has a lump on the left side of his head that fills up with a fluid and now and then bursts internally; when it is swelled up he screams, pulls my clothes and his own to pieces nearly in his agony," (the lump was about the size of a pullet's egg), "And the doctor says that lump will cause him to be an imbecile all his life even if he gets better now." She also said, "His backbone is an inch and a half too long, and the doctor says before he will be able to walk he must have an operation and have part of it sawn off, for he is nearly two now and has never tried to walk; then again, his lungs are bad, in fact the doctor said one has gone and the other filled with a fluid, so that he dare not stop the terrible cough that he has or it would fill up altogether." The mother said, "You can tell how the poor little child is suffering. I have prayed for the Lord to take him out of it, for it is terrible to watch him night and day, and we have never known what it is to have a good night's rest since he has been born, for he not only cries, he screams with pain."

When the mother told me this I thought what a need, but told her, "Don't despair, I believe Jesus will heal him, for nothing is too hard for Him." While talking like this the minister came to see how baby was. He looked at him but shook his head and said, "I am afraid he won't be in this world long," and he prayed that God would bless the parents in this trouble and help them to say "Thy will be done." So he went, saying he would call again. After he had gone I said, "That's all the hope he can give you, but listen to what Jesus says," and I opened my Bible and read the story of the father bringing his boy to Jesus, and the father in his despair crying to Him "If thou canst do anything, have compassion on us and help Then Jesus calmly turned to him and us." said, "If thou canst believe. All things are possible to him that believeth" (Mark 9:20-27). I also read Isaiah 53: 4, 5, and Matt. 8:17, where the prophecy was fulfilled by Jesus healing all that came to Him. I then turned to James 5:14, 15, showing the parents the Lord's remedy for the sick. They began to realize that Jesus was the great Physician, and I dealt with them gently about salvation, showing that all this was in the full atonement on Calvary. Bless the dear Lord! I said, "Shall I pray that Jesus will heal baby?" and they said, "Yes, do," and so believing that Jesus hears and answers prayer I anointed the little one, and laid on my hands in the name of Jesus, praying that He would heal every ailment in that little body, carefully mentioning each one to Him; and then I told them not to worry but to leave it with Jesus, for we had laid the burden at His feet, and I went home.

A week the following Monday I called again, and the mother said, "Why he began to mend a week ago," and the baby was bright and was smiling quite happily. She then said he had slept every night since being prayed for. The doctor was amazed and couldn't understand what had happened, but said it was a miracle, and the mother told him it was through prayer.

I said to her, "Come, let us get on our knees and thank Jesus for all He has done," and we did give God the glory. Weeks have gone by since then, and as the father calls on business from time to time, I ask him how the baby is. He says, "The cot has been removed, he is eating splendidly, and getting as fat as butter, and he is not like the same child. The lump on his head that was filled with fluid has completely **gone**, and he is beginning to **walk**, we have never been disturbed at all in the night, he sleeps soundly. The neighbors and friends are all amazed, and all say it is a miracle."

I shouted "Oh, Praise the Lord," now you know who is the Great Physician, and he said "I do that," so I said, "He has just the same power to save, Hallelujah." TWENTY RECEIVE PENTECOST



Brother Niels P. Thomsen writes: "Our hearts are indeed thankful to God for His faithfulness to us during the past month. Ever since our return to India we have been praying very definitely that the Lord would break through the hardness and indifference, and save souls for the glory of His name. For a long time it seemed as if nothing definite was being done, but we held on in prayer claiming the promises for our need. We are glad that our God hears prayer.

"On August 3rd we were privileged to bury three in the waters of baptism, which seemed to be the beginning of the break. From that time on there was not a week that we did not baptize one or more, until at the end of the month, eleven had confessed Jesus as their Saviour and sealed their testimony in baptism. It has been a real breath of revival, and our own hearts have been stirred afresh to a deeper consecration; also the Indian workers have received new inspiration. But the end is not yet, praise the Lord, for many have begun to inquire earnestly concerning the Way of Life.

"One of the new converts is a high caste Hindoo, and is the firstfruits of an outstation, opened up just 4 weeks ago. His family are in possession of a large estate, but he has forsaken all cheerfully for the sake of the gospel, that he might have the peace and happiness that is in Christ.

"The very morning that he was baptized he went to a lawyer to inquire the possibilities of retaining some of the property should he become a Christian, and was informed that his chances were practically nil. However, he did not draw back but is with us today; a pauper in this world's goods (only receiving what we give him from day to day) but rich in the wealth that endures.

"We hope to train him, so that some day he may become a witness to his own people. He appears to have gifts that only require developing, since he has had experience as a lecturer among the different Hindoo societies. Pray for him as well as for all the others that have stepped out to follow their Lord. Pray also that the revival may not cease with these but continue until Jesus comes. For ourselves we have but one desire—to win precious souls for our Saviour, who loved us and gave Himself for us."

DEVIL DOCTOR SEEKS TO PER-VERT THE WAY OF THE LORD

Brother F. Knoll reports real times of blessing attending the ministry of the Word in Liberia. However, wherever God is working the devil is also busy. Brother Knoll tells of a devil doctor who came into their district recently: "This man carries a Bible with him and says he knows all about it; that there is nothing to it, and that the Ju-Jus (idols) that he makes are the right thing. So people are buying his idols, paying large sums of money for them. He is perverting the minds of the people, and I am told the government has given him license to go anywhere he may please to practice his devilments. He tells the people that we also have idols, but we keep them hidden from the people, and that is the reason why the missionaries do not get sick. Again he tells the people that they must not go to their farms on Sunday, but stay at home and make medicine for their Ju-Jus. This of course is just a plot to keep the people from coming out to meeting. I wish the whole assembly of God's people would pray that the Lord would deal with this man so that the work of the Lord may go on unhindered."

SCORES OF ASSEMBLIES CALLING FOR PENTECOST IN POLAND

God is blessing us here in Poland; souls are being saved, and others are pressing on into a closer walk with the Lord.

Our mission hall is rapidly nearing completion. Already the roof is on, and we are trusting that we may be enabled to finish the building and move in before winter. What a relief it will be to worship the Lord in a little church of our own. The old hall is so overcrowded; at times it becomes almost stiffling for the lack of proper ventilation. He who has begun a good work for us; will surely finish it.

A few weeks ago we had a conference. The brethren came from all parts of the country, and a time of real blessed fellowship was enjoyed. Every report was encouraging, but how great the harvest is, and how few are the laborers. I listed 137 mission stations that are in favor of Pentecost but our workers to fill this need are but a handful. Our hearts are crying out to God for more workers, God-chosen and God-equipped, to minister to these hungry people. When I think of all the workers in America. I cannot help but wish that at least 50 of them would come over to Poland. There are many towns and villages where the full Gospel has not yet been preached, and daily we hear the Macedonian call, "Come over and help us."-Julius D. Rieske, Warsaw, Poland.

"IN PERILS OF ROBBERS"

Brother Hindle, who has been laboring in Mongolia for nine years without a furlough, tells in a recent letter of the difficulties confronting them at this time. "The war situation is growing more tense. It looks as if there may be fighting at Chang Pe Hsien, where our outstation is located. If this happens our property will possibly be destroyed, unless the Lord should intervene miraculously. Miss Danielson, who was in charge of the work there has joined us in the work at Gashatay, not censidering it safe to remain any longer in the former place.

"Last evening, over fifty armed robbers came to Gashatay; but praise God, they soon left without doing any damage. The poor Chinese girls flocked to our house for refuge; they are the ones who have most to fear from such visitors. In addition to the constant danger of robbers, we have also to face the perils of deadly disease. Already sixteen children have died of some kind of plague that has broken out in a little village to the north of us, and we understand they are dying in corresponding numbers in other places around. Please don't forget to pray for us. A qualified doctor at the Mongol mission, says he does not understand the disease, but the symptoms are very much like those which accompany scarlet fever and dysentery. When the poor natives flee to us for protection against the robbers, they bring their infected children with them, thus endangering our own children by their presence, but we are here to help these needy people and cannot turn them away. Pray for Mongolia."

ARRIVED IN FIJI ISLANDS

Brother and Sister Heetebry write: "The Lord gave us a very pleasant journey, and brought us in safety to our destination. We had many opportunities to witness for the Lord while on board ship and conducted two services. Our last night on board the passengers gave us a farewell meeting and sang in closing, 'God Be With You' Till We Meet Again.' On a lower deck the orchestra was playing, but the people did not seem to want to go down, but stayed with us to join in the singing.

"Sister Saunders met us at the landing stage. She has been here but five months, and God has surely been working in that time. Some fifteen or twenty have already taken a stand for the Lord. As the young people and children nearly all understand English, we are able to give out the Word while learning the language. Last Sunday evening we had the joy of seeing one Indian boy surrender to the Lord, and again last night we had a very precious meeting. Four or five Fijian men came forward for prayer. There is a very blessed spirit of prayer in the meetings and we feel very much at home among the natives. Do not forget to remember us at the throne of Grace.'

BEGINNINGS OF A CHRISTIAN VIL-LAGE IN INDIA

I am having some land laid out for the beginning of our Christian village. Already we have two families ready to occupy the houses which we are hoping to build as soon as the rains are over and when more families desire to settle we can acquire more land.

The two families who are waiting, are so happy at the prospect of being in a Christian environment, since where they were situated formerly they did not have any garden and were subject to much persecution from their heathen relatives and neighbors. All big things have small be-'ginnings, and we trust that many more may turn to the Lord and our village increase accordingly. Brother Harvey had planned this village before he died and had already named it "Sharanpore" which means the "village of refuge."

There is a big Mela on this week, and Brother McClay, together with other workers, has been busy selling gospels among the crowds. Over 400 have been sold during the Mela, and eternity alone will show the results of this seed sowing. This Mela is a special one and is known as the "Swing Mela." Swings are erected and old and young alike swing together with their gods, while dancing girls and demonpossessed people dance around them. Oh, the awful darkness and superstition of India! It makes our hearts fairly bleed at times, and to think that at such a time we have to dismiss one of our preachers for lack of funds to support him. Will you not pray with us that the Lord may undertake and the gospel not be hindered.-Esther B. Harvey, Nawabganj, Gonda



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
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
