

A Great Forward Step Chas. E. Robinson


The idea that improvements are needed comes of course after a lack has been realized. Some lacks are not the result of any one's fault, and when this is the case often the lack itself is hardly noticed. For instance there is a great lack in the matter of trans-oceanic flying. We have the planes which, with present motive power, can fly and carry loads at great speed, but the necessity of taking great quantities of fuel along greatly limits the flight of those planes. We need a device for utilizing ground-generated power, transmitted to the plane by radio, whereby its motors will be driven. But because no one knows how to transmit by radio the power of Niagara to the planes, the old way of producing power on the plane itself is still in vogue. The lack is scarcely thought about. For a similar reason the three lacks of the church I purpose mentioning are also scarcely thought about, people not realizing that there is a way to supply those lacks. I mention three great needs of the church, showing as to each need how it may be supplied, before passing on to the next one,

1. Our revivals need more direct connection with divine power to drive them.

If in a given community, at least in revival seasons, there were present such a deep and general interest in personal salvation that it would be the theme of thought and conversation throughout the district served by the church, as to cause the people to congregate in vast assemblages; if over the congregations thus assembled and reaching out in a definite way into the adjacent community there were deep and pungent conviction of sin, and, if as these convicted people sought the Lord for forgiveness there would be worked in them springing and active faith for conversion and Baptism as well as for deliverance from bodily ailments, the work of the church would be greatly lightened.

Let no one suppose these things are mentioned merely to tantalize our assemblies and call to their minds how frail they are. These things are entirely within our grasp at this time. We older ones can easily remember when cities knew no better way than to let the mighty power of the swift flowing river near at hand go unharnessed and to waste. The best they knew was to manufacture gas and light their streets and houses with it. Their vehicles were drawn by horses or propelled by steam. Their machines were run by hand, by steam engines or by gasoline motors. But a dam was built, a dynamo installed, and now the darkness is dispelled by the leaping fire from the river; the trolley cars swing along propelled by the power of the river, while the myriad machines of the shop and even the sewing machine, washer and sweeper of the homes seem to run as by magic, owing to the fact that the power of the river reaches them through a wire. The men of this world, wiser in their generation than the children of light, decided that the river power had gone to waste long enough and the world wonders at the results.

God has shown us that He is willing



and we all know He is able to do for the church the several things mentioned above. On the day of Pentecost He caused to spring up a mighty interest among the people that urged them to one place where they could hear the gospel, and when there He so convicted them through listening to the words of Peter, that an army of them sought the Lord and to such excellent purpose that 3,000 were born again in a day. The Acts abounds with evidences that this was no exceptional thing, but that God continued to do these same things, with similarly amazing results, and He also caused to spring up such faith for healing that they even brought the sick and, for want of better accommodations, laid them down in the streets where they were healed.


"But those were Bible days," cries some eager doubter, "you cannot expect things like that to happen now. The days of mir--" Go right on, Brother. No use to stop there in the middle of a word. Yes, that is the same thing they said to me thirty years ago when I was preaching that God would heal and pointed to the numerous instances recorded in the Word where God healed. One Scripture which it seemed every one knew in those days was, "The day of miracles is past." Or was that a scripture? I recall a Sunday school teacher in a denominational Sunday school who told his class he had been looking for that scripture all the week without success, and asked them to help him find it.

Our reply was, "The day of miracles is not past. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, to-day and forever." Now we add to this the testimony of an army of witnesses who testify, "God healed me." Likewise I say now as to God doing as I have mentioned in regard to revivals. The day of such doing by God is not past. He is the unchanging God. Thirty years ago we had very few cases of mod-

In 1 Cor. 14:1, we read, "Follow after charity," or, love, for that is what the word rendered "charity" means, "and desire spiritual gifts, but rather," or, to this end, "that ye may prophesy."

In the last verse of the 12th chapter we read, "Covet earnestly the best gifts, and yet show I unto you a more excellent way." Then follows that marvelous 13th chapter which we all love so well and that so many of us know by heart and all of us ought to know, and, not only know, but eat and digest until, like the words of the Lord that Jeremiah ate and digested, it enters into the very fiber of our being and becomes a part of us.

It is a mistake, however, to believe and teach that the "more excellent way" is set forth in the 13th chapter of 1 Corinthians. That chapter simply contains a marvelous flight of eloquence on the part of the inspired writer in praise of love which he clearly shows sustains a vital relationship to the spiritual gifts which apart from it are valueless. The chapter may be regarded as a parenthesis and, although we would not like to part with it, it could be dropped out of the epistle altogether without in any way breaking the connection or weakening the argument of the inspired penman.

The "more excellent way" is the way set forth in the passage quoted at the beginning of this article. It is twofold in its nature: there is something to "follow" and something to "desire" or covet. The Greek word rendered "desire" is the same word that in the last verse of the 12th chapter is rendered "covet."

We should follow after love. This is exceedingly important. Apart from love there can be no salvation. The great scheme of human redemption was conceived in love, is being carried out in love and will be consummated in love. John 3:16 has been called the epitome of the Gospel,-"God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." John says, "God is love; and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God in him." Jno. 4:16. Jesus said to the disciples, "A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another. Jno. 13:34, 35. Our Lord asserted that as the children of God it is imperative that we partake of the nature of God, and love, not only one another, not only the lovely, the loving and the lovable, but the loveless; our enemies: "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you; that ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven: for

He maketh His sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and the unjust." Matt. 5:44,45. Every reader of the New Testament knows how the Master asserted that the whole law is summed up in two commandments, the commandment to love God supremely and the commandment to love our neighbors as ourselves. That there can be no salvation apart from love must be apparent to any person who has even a superficial knowledge of God's ways.

But the "more excellent way" the inspired writer recommends includes not only a following after love, but a desire for or coveting "spiritual gifts," and for a definite or specific purpose, namely, that we may prophesy. And if you will study what the Apostle has to say about prophesying you will see that it is the great means, under God, of edifying or building up the church of God. It should be the ambition of every saint to be used of God in edifying others. Therefore every saint should desire to prophesy. All desire for self-exaltation, all desire to be seen and heard, all desire to be in the limelight, all desire for self-praise or selfglory, should be eradicated from the heart of every saint, and on the part of each there should be an ambition to see the church edified and the cause of the Lord prosper.

The manifestations of the Spirit which are the gifts of the Spirit, or, "spiritual gifts," are given for the express purpose of edifying the body of Christ. Paul says, "The manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal." There are those who would have us believe that

shouting, jumping, dancing, shaking, etc., are manifestations of the Spirit and that where these are absent the Spirit is not in evidence. But Paul does not say that these are the manifestations of the Spirit! Not by any means! They may be a byproduct of the manifestations of the Spirit; but they may take place where the Spirit is not working at all. They may be simply carnal or fleshly in their nature. You will scarcely find anywhere such demonstrations as may be found at one of the great ball games of a national series or at a pugilistic battle in some arena where two big bullies are contesting in the prize ring for what is known as the world championship. There you will find excitement enough, shouting enough, demonstrations enough; the noise can be heard blocks away, but they are not manifestations of the Spirit of God. The Spirit is not in evidence there at all.

God has told us what the manifestations of the Spirit are; they are the gifts of the Spirit, (1 Cor. 12:7-11) or, perhaps I should say, they consist in the godly exercise of those gifts, for a gift of the Spirit unless it is exercised under the supervision of the Spirit can scarcely be called a manifestation of the Spirit. And the greatest of the gifts of the Spirit is the gift of prophecy, all the other gifts being subservient or subordinate to this gift. So he who speaks in tongues is exhorted to pray that he may interpret that others may be edified; and it is quite apparent that the Apostle teaches that speaking in tongues with interpretation is equal to prophesying, or, it would perhaps be more correct to say that it is prophesying, the design or end of which should always be the edification of the believers assembled together.

The "more excellent way" consists then, not in laying all the emphasis upon "spiritual gifts" and neglecting "love"-this it seems is what the Corinthian church was getting dangerously near to-nor in laying all the emphasis upon "love" and despising or ignoring or neglecting "spiritual gifts"-this is what some of our critics are insisting upon at the present time, and they criticize us because we do not agree with them-but it is twofold in its nature, and is expressed in language so clear that I am amazed that any student of the Word should have failed to see it and understand it,-"Follow after love and desire spiritual gifts," or, the gifts of the Spirit, "but rather," or, to this end, for this is evidently the meaning of the in-spired Apostle, "that ye may prophesy."

A returned missionary was once asked: "How many missionaries have you on your station?" "Three thousand," was the reply. "I did not ask how many converts, but how many missionaries." "I quite understand you," said the returned missionary, "and again I reply, three thousand; for all our converts are missionaries." This reminds one of the great Church of Christ mission station at Bolenge, on the Congo, Africa, in connection with the work of which every ten members support a missionary, so that awhile ago it was reported that the church of six hundred members supported sixty missionaries.

HOW TO CAST OUT DEMONS

In dealing with the enemy look well to your standing first. You are an heir of God and a joint heir with Christ. Relationship, inheritance, prerogative and equipment are all connected and associated with the truth that you are heirs of God and joint heirs with Jesus Christ. Stand on that vantage ground when dealing with the demons of the lower realm. We are aliens in an enemy's territory, but with this distinction, that He says to us, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end." But for that, the church of God would have been overwhelmed soon after its inception. The father of lies got his first step upon the church when he took possession of Ananias and Sapphira; but they went down under the power that was in Peter. The lying spirit was dealt with, the demon power overcome and defeated. Peter put the fight where it should be: "Why have ye agreed together to lie to the Holy Ghost?" They were not lying to Peter, to the apostles nor to the church. It was against God and against His Spirit. And it was dealt with by the Spirit of God. Peter was the channel by which the insulted Holy Spirit could be vindicated.

God wants such channels to-day, through whom He can deal with the evil spirits. An individual possessed by an evil spirit has a spirit that is antagonistic to the Spirit of God. If you come in contact with that individual it is a providence of God so that you can call upon the Lord and the individual can be delivered.

Are all delivered who are possessed? You don't come in contact with all, so the question is futile. It is not for you to know whether there are many who will be saved, many who will be delivered or not. When Christ was on the mountain the demon-possessed boy was brought to the nine disciples and they could not cast him out. They had not prayed, Christ was absent, the three spiritual ones were absent and the dominant leader of the nine was Judas, the treasurer. So they had failure. After Pentecost there was no failure, and there was no Judas.

Why are the demons so obstinate? Why was Goliath so persistent in his challenging of the Israelites day after day? Why are some cases obstinate, needing continuous dealing with? First, to prove you, to show you your helplessness, to empty you of self-confidence; secondly, to bring to the surface in the individual possessed the hidden, reserved reinforcements of demons, so that the reserves can be dealt with as well as the front ranks, as the saints call upon God for help. Thirdly, the defeat to the enemy is more complete and ignominious, and correspondingly, the relief to the victim who is possessed is all the greater.

What are the weapons with which we are to fight the enemy? First, confidence in Christ, in Himself, in His Name, in His position in the heavens far above all, untouchable by the demons. Confidence, assurance and knowledge that He overcame them all on Calvary. Confidence, and ability to handle His Name in the Spirit.

Second, the stultifying effect of His Blood directly upon them. It is not stu-

pefying, it is terrifying to them. Hell shudders at the Blood, therefore these imps from hell as the Blood is pleaded against them correspondingly shuder when they are occupying stolen territory, viz., Calvary's redeemed men and women, saved or unsaved, because it is written that Christ died for the ungodly.

Thirdly, the Word of God. "Get thee hence Satan, for it is written," was the Word: and hence he had to go. "In my name they shall **cast out demons"**—they shall be cast hence and thence.

What is the cause of cases of recur-Why do the demons sometimes come back? Wandering up and down, they inspect the vacant room, and they find it swept and garnished. The debris accompanying the demon's occupation has been removed, the deadly habits that the victim practiced are suspended and have ceased, and the individual is resting on his improvement, congratulating himself on his victory, on his moral attainment when there has been no moral attainment, but only the removal of the immoral attachment. The individual takes credit to himself, the departed evil spirit comes back with seven others to reinforce and reinstate himself so that he cannot be cast out so easily another time, and the last state of that individual is worse than the first. Moral improvement can never take the place of spiritual regeneration, of spiritual infilling-God's Spirit taking the place of the evil spirit

Spiritualists are clothing their teaching with a religious garb, even taking Scriptures to fortify their beliefs and claims, proving that they belong to their master who quoted Scripture in the wilderness-"He shall give his angels charge over thee, etc.," omitting whatever suited his purpose. Satan clothed as an angel of light! False light held in the hands of blind men, blind leaders of the blind!

Can you see the procession? Leaders, eminent men, eminent women so-called all like blind bats, with false torches lighted with false lights—bats flying when the sun has gone down, blind leaders come out into the darkness with false lights when the sun has gone. When the Sun of Righteousness is rising in the opposite direction, turn about your eyes and save yourselves from catastrophe, from spiritual ruin, before it is too late.

BE KIND TO THE JEW

Kindness is a wonderful door into the heart. At the Jewish missionary conference held in Budapest in April, Miss Ruth Rouse said: "I have asked students converted from Judaism to Christianity in many countries throughout Europe what was the first thing that made them begin to move toward Christianity. Always the reply was the same: 'An act of disinterested kindness from a Christian." Dr. J. S. Conning backed this up by saying that a careful examination of 120 converts in America revealed that 98 per cent gave the same answer. Dr. Macdonald Webster brought up still heavier ammunition when he reported that out of over 4,000 cases in Budapest that he personally had handled, all save two gave the identical reply.

THE LAKE OF FIRE

Although the Bible says, "the devil that deceived them was cast into the lake of fire and brimstone, where the beast and the false prophet are, and shall be tormented day and night forever and ever," many people do not believe there is such a lake. Even many people who claim to believe the Bible do not believe there is a lake of fire into which they who do not accept Jesus as Saviour are to be cast.



Revival in England. Very encouraging news is reaching us from time to time from Great Britain. Brother Donald Gee writes from Edinburgh, "The Lord is wonderfully moving all over Great Britain now through both the Jeffreys brothers and others. Stephen Jeffreys has had a great revival in County Durham. At Bishop, Auckland, they lined up an hour or more beforehand to get in. Thousands saved. George Jeffreys had a great revival here in Scotland at Paisley and Glasgow in the early part of the year. Then he went to Leeds. I spent the last week end there, two weeks after he had gone away. We had 1400 in the Sunday evening meeting and about 25 were saved. On the Monday night I announced a Bible study on divine healing to be given at the Pentecostal hall, they lined up over an hour before the meeting to get in, and the place was packed to suffocation. The people literally seemed to eat the Word. I was at the Preston convention at Easter. We were packed there too. Twenty-seven were baptized in the Spirit. About 10,000 must have gathered in London on Easter Monday in the Albert Hall and Kingsway Hall, both of which were full. Brother Parr tells me that about 50 received their Baptism at the latter place. There were many other Pentecostal conventions going on the same day in many parts of the country, so it will give you some idea that things really are moving in the old country at last. Hallelujah!" A further Convention was held in Kingsway Hall, London, at Whitsuntide at which about 80 received the Baptism.

It is evident that the revivals being held in England are not of a superficial character for they continue after the evangelist has moved on. The work of Pastor Stephen Jeffreys at Bishop, Auckland, has been followed up by the Bible School Evangelistic Society, graduates of Mr. Howard Carter's Bible School. In a report of the work at Bishop, Auckland, in Redemption Tidings, we read, "Every meeting sees some at the feet of the Saviour, and many testify of healings during Mr. Jeffreys' visit, and since, revealing that God has marvelously visited County Durham. In one week since the revivalist left between 40 and 50 have professed conversion. People who have never attended a place of worship are coming regularly and enjoying the Bible expositions, gospel services, and communion. 'There is much joy in the city.' Paralysis, deaf ears, blind eyes, neuritis, rheumatism, pneumonia, are among the afflictions God had delivered from during the last few weeks since the campaign. Large open air meetings are being held and the revival is being extended by weekly services at the Welsh chapel, Spennymoor, and at Evenwood."

Wonderful healings. Brother Stephen Jeffreys has recently been in Louth, Lincs., and many remarkable cases of healing are reported in this meeting. The Louth Standard reports: "A young woman, Miss Hinch, of 83 Edward St., Grimsby, said to be suffering from consumption of the spine, in consequence of which she had not walked for ten years, nor eaten solid food for six, was brought by her friends in a spinal rolling chair to the service at Louth on Wednesday afternoon. She was prayed for by Pastor Jeffreys, and this is her account of her experience: 'As Pastor Jeffreys laid hands on me and prayed that in the name of Jesus I should be raised up. I felt hands placed underneath me, gently lifting me up. Mr. Jeffreys then asked me if the Lord had healed me and I said, "Yes." So he told me to get out of my chair, which I did, and commenced to walk around the chapel while the congregation sang, "All hail the power of Jesus' name."' Her friends then subscribed money for her to buy a pair of shoes, and, putting them on, she walked around the town, walked to the railway station, and went home by train to Grimsby, leaving the spinal chair in the chapel. Last week Pastor Jeffreys was called out to a case. at Grimsby to pray with a lady who had been an invalid thirty years. She had been five years indoors and three years in bed. Just before Mr. Jeffreys arrived her mouth was full of blood, her jaw began to droop, and to all appearances she was dying. Mr. Jeffreys prayed over her and our informant said, 'God answered that prayer; she is now going about and doing her own washing.' Eighty-three persons have professed salvation during the campaign and 33 cases of healing are reported to have occurred. The assembly formed in this Louth chapel will be affiliated with the Assemblies of God in Great Britain and Ireland." There are now about 140 Assemblies of God in Great Britain.

Other great campaigns. Pastor George Jeffreys has been holding great campaigns in Southampton and Brighton. Concerning the Southampton campaign, Brother G. J. Tilling writes in the Elim Evangel, "From the opening meeting, at which four lost souls found the Saviour and several bodies were healed of divers diseases, until the last meeting when 120 sought salvation and a great multitude came forward to testify to having received the healing touch of the Lord Jesus, one could follow the wonderful rising of the revival tide with its developing liberty and joy, commencing with what appeared to be a small beginning and gradually progressing until between 800 and 900 had been converted and had turned to serve the living God, and a large number had been healed." In a meeting held by Brother George Jeffreys in Brighton, according to the Elim Evangel, "Over 1200 were swept into the kingdom, and 300 gave testimony to the Lord's healing power." One writes, "Hundreds of people have testified in the meeting to having been healed. People who, only a few weeks ago, were bedridden or wheeled about in chairs. are to-day walking and praising God for His kindness in healing them. Lame ones, who moved only by aid of crutches, are able to dispense with these. Deaf ones have been made to hear, blind ones to see. Fourteen testified to having been cured of cancer, tuberculosis, or tumor."

Grace abounding in Russia. In spite of all the efforts to propagate atheism in Russia, the work of the Lord continues to flourish. The atheistic Jew, Gubbelmann, who is at the head of the antireligious forces, recently admitted in a speech given in Leningrad, "We cannot conceal the fact that our enemies are rising up again and growing stronger. But the most dangerous thing is the growth of the sectarian movement. This reformed and purified religion is the most perilous thing for us. It is altogether impossible to take up a fight against it. They have flourishing young people's organizations and splendid song choruses, also women's organizations. It is noticeable that in these Christian young people's societies there are absolutely no dissolute fellows. Their conduct is altogether faultless. Cases have been noted where communist young people have gone over to the sects, and unfortunately the best of our communist young people." According to Lichtim Osten (Light of the East) an organization for Russian evangelism, the evangelical movement at the present time is spreading powerfully in the Caucasus, South Russia, and Siberia. In one county in Siberia 3,000 were recently baptized in one day, and along the line of the Siberian railway some 1,500 new churches have sprung up in recent years. Evangelical Christianity is beginning to get a foothold among the Mohammedan Tartars of Russia and the altogether heathen peoples. The white Russians and Ukrainians of Poland are coming into the movement. In Polish Volhynia hundreds of evangelical churches have come into being in recent years.

Pentecostal work in Egypt. Brother A. H. Post, who has just returned from Egypt, writes, "In a most marked and blessed way our God has made good His Word. On the 29th of September, 1926, just after our Minia conference, the Lord led us to go to the Assiout orphanage. I have known that work from the time the first child was taken, and we had a pressing invitation from Sister Trasher. From that time we gave ourselves diligently to prayer and the ministry of the Word. This was in real travail of the Holy Spirit, often far into the night, and then very early in the morning at other times. It was most definite for a Pentecostal revival. The Lord enabled us to reach a prevailing point on April 5, and from that point till we left Egypt this most blessed revival has moved in power. What the Lord has permitted us to see in this work of His grace is worth all the seventeen years or more that we have labored in and for Egypt. D. V., we hope to be at the General Council meeting to witness in all love to what our God has done." Sister Lillian Trasher who is broken down physically and needs the prayers of the saints, writes from Alexandria where she is resting, "I hear that God is still blessing in Assiout and 59 have

received the Baptism since the revival. The girls say that prayer goes on away on into the middle of the night or early morning and many are seeking the Baptism and are under the power."

Pioneer work in Abyssinia. Abyssinia is the only independent kingdom in all Africa and has hitherto been practically untouched by the gospel. Slave dealing still continues in this country, and Major Darley, a British officer, recently saw a caravan of slaves passing his hut in southern Abyssinia. He counted 3,000 slaves in two days. They were mostly women and children. The men had either lost their lives in seeking to defend their hearthstones or had escaped the slave raiding northeners. A new society known as the Abyssinia Frontiers Mission has been started and the first four pioneer workers are starting work in that land. Dr. T. A. Lambie, one of these workers, writes in Christ Life of the superstitions of the people and of the opportunities in that land. Many of the people are nominally Mohammedans. He writes, "In Africa the people often do not let the cattle out until after the dew is off the grass in the morning, with the mistaken idea that the dew will hurt the cattle." Seeing a kraal filled with cattle, though it was noon time and the dew was gone, he asked, "Why do they not let the cattle out to graze? The sun is high and the grass is quite dry." "Oh," they answered, "the cattle are praying to the man who lives there whose name is Tokitcha Rubee (God Almighty)." "You mean," he said, "that Tokitcha Rubee is praying for the cows?" "No, not at all. On other days men go and pray to him but on this day the cows go." Dr. Lambie held a meeting with some 70 natives who listened most intently. He asked them, "Have you ever heard of Christ?" "No." "Have you ever heard of Mohammet?" "No." "Well, whom have you heard about?" "We have heard of a God but we do not know much about Him." He opened to them the Scriptures from the beginning and led them through to Calvary. How intently they listened, drinking in every word. At last after two hours in which he sought to proclaim Jesus Christ as Saviour, the meeting drew to an end. An old man got to his feet. "We never heard it before," he said, "but we believe it is true. Cannot you stay here and tell us more of that good talk?" "No, I am afraid not." "Then cannot we go with you wherever you are going and you can take a little time every day and tell us more about Jesus?" "No, I am afraid not, as we are traveling fast and you could not keep up." "What shall we do?" Dr. Lambie told him of a little school two weeks' journey away over the mountains and that there they had a wonderful Book. Their boys if they sent them would learn to read in that Book and would bring it back to the village where men and cows prayed to a man. The natives said, "Here we are in the wild. We know nothing. We pray to trees, to rocks, to snakes. And if we hear a lion roaring at night we pray to that." They had never before heard of Jesus but when they heard they said, "It is

good. Tell us more." What an opportunity.

A visitation in South Africa. Brother Edgar D. Pettenger of Springs, Transvaal, writes in the Full Gospel Missionary Herald. "Sunday evening while we were having supper, rather later than usual, there was a knock at the door. Here were three men from the nearby compound. By the excitement I knew something was the matter. They desired me to come immediately to the compound and see what the trouble was. They said some power had come upon the people and they did not understand it. The place was only a short distance and we almost ran there What a scene greeted me as I entered the room where our people had gathered! Some were standing with uplifted arms praising God. Others were on their faces on the floor crying out in soul agony. Still others were sitting and praying. There were also the spectators, and still others who were afraid and as much as said, 'What meaneth this?' I immediately called every one to prayer and soon realized that God was visiting His people. What a prayer meeting that was! God had spoken to the people at the morning baptismal service and created a deep hunger in their hearts for more of Him. they gathered in the compound at five p. m. for their usual Sunday evening service. One of the Christian men read the Word and as he began to speak the power of God fell upon him. It soon spread like fire until many were the slain of the Lord. These had never seen the power of God manifested in like manner but they knew it was the Lord. Others doubted and did not understand. Then under the power of the Spirit one said that they should send for the umfundisi (meaning myself) to come and see what it was. By this time the meeting had been in progress for two hours.

"It was impossible to say how many received an infilling of the Holv Spirit. One man went around the room praising the Lord and repeating in pure English over and over again, 'Glory to Jesus Christ!' As far as I have been able to ascertain he had never studied English and I have known this man for several years myself. That was not all. They desired another meeting the following night, this time at the church. In the meantime word was sent to the various other compounds and so a good crowd gathered. I had prepared a short message but could not preach. As I began the power fell. One man was slain right off his seat. Another arose and walked back and forth and Without urging, everybody prophesied. flocked to the altar and God surely worked. The previous night at the compound one man had a vision. In this vision he saw that God was completing His church. It had taken a long time but He was coming soon to take it away. As best he could he had drawn it out on the blackboard so that people could understand."

Congo natives open for the gospel. Pastor Thomas Moody tells in the Sunday School Times of some matondas, or thanksgiving gatherings, of Christian Congolese in the Sona Bata district of the Congo. "Our first matonda was at Mselo. where we have 8 churches. Twenty-five hundred people came together from Friday till Sunday. Three hundred and seventy-three were baptized. The offering was 1388 francs. The next matonda was at Kinkindu. Six churches were gathered -3300 people; 633 were baptized; offering 1352 francs. At Makengo 400 Bayaka Christians; 58 were baptized; offering 352 francs. At Kinkosi, 300 kilometers distance, we had a great surprise. These Bambala people are being evangelized by native Christians from Sona Bata. A large house with three rooms had been built in readiness for the missionaries' coming. Two days were spent in examining candidates, and the first fruit of the Bambala were baptized. We organized a church of 81 members with pastor, deacons and deaconess. The offering was 374 francs. The long return journey brought us, after a strenuous week, to the matonda at Kitempa where we had two churches. When we reached home at Sona Bata we had been gone 71 days, of which 47 were spent in traveling. We had baptized over 1400. The home matonda at Sona Bata was the largest ever held, with over 2000 people present. The offering passed 10,-000 francs, to be devoted to home missions, church erection, and help towards teachers' expenses."

Blessing in Japan. A revival has broken out in the city of Hirosaki in northern Japan. This began with open air meetings in the parks at cherry blossom time, and according to the Sunday School Times about 700 have decided for Christ: 500 of these are residents of Hirosaki, the remainder live in the country about. Among the converts is the daughter of a Shinto priest, a girl of twenty-one, noted for her dress and dashing appearance. The day after her conversion she cast aside toilet articles and fine clothes and began testifying in Priest Street, where her father lives together with many other heathen priests. This made a great sensation. Her family beat her and another priest threatened her with a sword. She is now testifiying in open air meetings. A study of 2 Cor. 10 led her to abandon her father's table, since she could no longer eat her food bought with money offered to idols. An abscess on her face, lanced in the form of a cross, was once a great mortification. Now she looks on it as an emblem of the cross of Christ. When the way opens she hopes to go into training for Christian work.

A subscriber in Honolulu, Hawaii, sends us a letter from a friend in Okayama, Japan: "Last Sunday the Lord poured out His Spirit upon us in a wonderful way. My Bible woman was prostrate on the floor, speaking in other tongues, and she spoke in English, praising God and saying over and over again, 'Jesus is coming again very soon, very soon. Get ready, ready. He is coming to take me, me, me.' Then she broke into awful travail, crying 'Oh, save my people, save my people.' She cried so loud that all the neighbors came and looked out of their windows to see what was the matter. That same evening when we sat down to eat supper, one of my little girls began

ern day healing to mention but we did have a few and we made much of them. So now we have not many instances of God doing to-day as to revivals what He did in Bible times, but we have a few, and we thank God for them as we bring them forward.

In the days of Wesley, God so interested the people in divine things that 10,000 of them gathered regularly every morning at five to listen to one of those dry sermons that he preached. If you have read Wesley's sermons you know how dry they were. They did not listen in vain either for this preaching of Wesley to these multitudes so made interested by God, through the Holy Ghost, was so effective that Wesley's work, as this work of grace is often called, astonished the world. In the days of Finney, God made whole districts to think and talk about salvation. In some places the people became so preoccupied in the consideration of this paramount subject as to be unable to open their stores and other places of business. When they came together to hear the preaching God brought down upon them such overpowering conviction that great numbers were saved.

THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL

Sometimes the feeling was so intense that Finney dismissed them without calling them to decide for Christ, lest there be a collapse of the congregation. He is accredited with having been used to the salvation of more than 500,000 persons. In the life of Jonathan Edwards who lived in New England (1703-1758) we read: "In 1733 : revival of religion began in Northhampton, and reached such intensity in the winter of 1734 and the following spring as to threaten the business of the town.

Such illustrations of God's moving mightily to interest communities and convict them unbearably until they turn in great numbers and get saved, could be multiplied, but if one illustration be found in modern times it is enough to show that it is still God's will to do as He did in the Bible days. God stands ready to-day to again do what he did in Peter's day, in Wesley's day, in Ed-wards' day, in Finney's day.

How may He be induced to do it? That is the question of overpowering interest. The answer is, Just as He was induced to do it in other days, He may be induced to do it to-day-by prayer. At Pentecost the church had been praying for days on end; Wesley was a remarkable man of prayer; nearly all know how much Finney prayed and also know of that mysterious minister who followed Finney from meeting to meeting and, renting a room with word that bread and water be left daily at his door and that he be not disturbed, prayed for the meeting. Jonathan Edwards was a remarkable man of prayer, and the title of one of his booklets, "An Humble Attempt to Promote Explicit Agreement and Visible Union of God's People in Extraordinary Prayer for the Revival of Religion and the Advancement of Christ's Kingdom on Earth," gives important information as to the how of his praying.

There are many ways for a company of people to pray but the best way is as much superior to some other ways in use, as mother's methods of making pies is superior to those of little Lizzie mixing mud in the back lot. To stir the church up to begin praying for a great, overpowering, community-sweeping, sindestroying revival in that best way to pray is the hope that actuated my soul as I began writing this article. It is a vast and crying need just now, and the church is ready. May God give us grace to think the thing through together.

God has said, "If ye shall ask anything in my name I will do it." At once the mind springs forward with conditions and exceptions. Very well, there are conditions, but they can all be complied with. Before He will do it there must be active and unwavering faith for it; but when that faith is present He will "do it." I trust no reader will have the hardihood to deny that statement, for God has said that even in so difficult a thing as the removing of a mountain of rock and earth, if there is no doubt, the thing will be done.

It will be seen then that the only difficulty to be overcome is in the acquiring of that necessary unwavering faith.

In the matter of healing, for people to have their attention drawn to the promises of God about healing was half the battle in their having faith for that healing. People formerly didn't think about healing and so got along with the things the men of this world had devised for the alleviation of pain and the healing of disease. But when some one stood up and said, The Bible promises healing to all who believe and God will keep His Word. a few began searching the Word and by this means soon became sure that it is the will of God to heal. These few by their successes in getting healed attracted the attention of others until to-day there is a vast army of people who have trusted the Lord for healing and have been healed.

It should be the same in the matter of which we are speaking. Now that some one has begun to say that God is willing to interest and convict people broadcast, as in the days of Peter, Wesley, Edwards and Finney, bringing about revivals in which not dozens merely but hundreds will be saved and filled and healed, there should be a general searching of the Bible and of church history to see that these things are so. When people have become sure that God wants to thus miraculously empower their churches for them, the battle is already half won.

Knowing that God wants to do these wonders they may come to Hirs without the "If it be Thy will" with which so many have in the past been accustomed to destroy the efficacy of their pravers.

The man who doubts need not expect an answer to prayer, but he who puts "if" in his prayer not only doubts but blazons the fact abroad by the use of the word which is ever and only a word of doubt-if. Having got rid of the "if" in praying for these mighty showings-forth of God's power in the church there remain but two other things to look after, so that the unwavering faith which God says shall bring the desired results may be experienced.

In mentioning those two things I call attention in passing, to the fact that God has indicated His special pleasure in people assembling to pray, saying He will attend every such meeting, and when there is an agreement of faith for something, that faith shall be irresistible. It may be that far greater difficulty would be experienced by one man asking God to bring His power into the church than would be encountered by the membership of the church meeting to ask Him for this boon.

The first of these two things is a matter of toilet. It makes a vast difference how one is dressed when, to make a request, he comes into the presence of the King eternal. If every sin and shortcoming is confessed and gotten under the Blood so that the eye of the Almighty directed toward the suppliant sees nothing that is not covered with the blood of His Son, then those pray-ers will find grace in His sight. This is a great desideratum. Brethren, I am convinced that right now there is a great need for a mighty going down before God. Let us dissolve our starch in tears. How formal we have become, how wise in the things of the Spirit, how sophisticated and—how powerless. God loves simplicity. Come, let us take time and break our hearts before God.

Where are the pastors who will get the vision of this article wrought into their souls, who will pray and preach and exhort the people, setting before them the example of contrition? Where are the assemblies which will stand with their pastors in going down, down, down, before God until their tear fountains are once more opened, until compassion for sinners lost and dropping into hell again grips their souls and causes their voices to break in prayer, until they feel near enough to God to ask of Him a great thing. Where are the assemblies who will thus come into the presence of Jehovah asking Him to produce an interest in salvation and a conviction on the public like that which gripped the people in the days of Peter, Wesley, Edwards and Finney? Where are they? God waits to be gracious. He waits to do mighty signs and wonders if we will get in position to pray and then ask Him. Get at it at once so the report can come down to the General Council and fire the souls of the brethren gathered there and send them home to spread the fire, producing the greatest revival in modern days.

Besides what have been mentioned there remains but one other thing needed to make such prayers effective and bring It is that the kind of revivals sought. the people shall covenant faithfully before God and with each other that they will not cease humbling themselves, drawing near to God, and praying for this thing until the desired answer comes, that is, pray without ceasing, or "tarry until," as Jesus taught us to do by His two parables, that of the friend at midnight and of the widow and the unjust judge. To be able to make such vows of course presupposes our having become entirely sure that it is the will of God to do the things we are asking.

2. Our churches and revivals need the assistance of the human element. This is ordained of God. In new-born souls who are well born there springs up spontaneously the urge to tell others that there "is power in the Blood." Usually these zealous new converts speedily find that to tell others, which is preaching, is not the way the older members of the assembly do, and so they stop. Any one will grant, the moment they are faced with the question, that every one should do all he can to save the lost ones of his acquaintance from lives of sin. That is the natural outworking of the Golden Rule, when it is sought to be applied to the matter of warning sinners. Jesus said, Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, but tarry first at Jerusalem until you are endued with Those who obeyed this dual power. command were men and women, ministers and laymen. That the command was addressed to them all, ministers and laymen alike, is shown by the fact that when they all obediently went in to tarry, they were all filled, and all began speaking forth the wonderful things of God. Later

on when the church was scattered by persecution and all had to flee save the apostles, the record tells us they went everywhere preaching the Word. The very words translated preach lack the idea of a congregation gathered and a public address. They mean narrate, publish or declare the news. From these various hastily mentioned Bible considerations it is plainly the duty of every redeemed child of God to preach the Word in season and out of season. The command, enforced by the extra solemn sanction given by its being in the Revelation, "Let him that heareth say, Come," would show, if nothing else did, that every one is to be actively engaged in spreading the news that Jesus saves from sin.

But the idea is everywhere prevalent that laymen are not expected to tell sinners about Jesus. Some have even gone so far as to say a man must be called before he has a right to preach. They mean of course that for a man to be set apart to some office of the ministry he must be called thereto by God. Of course this is true. But while this **meaning** of theirs is sound, in so speaking they misuse the word "preach," for every one must preach. From among the preaching believers God calls some to the public ministry.

Like the matter discussed under section one of this article, it is necessary that the ministers first and then the people become thoroughly convinced that God calls every saint to preach faithfully to the people of his acquaintance, as he goes about his usual duties. Occasionally one sees such a layman. His secular work is not hindered at all, but utilizing the time others use in idle or less important talking, he tells men about Jesus. Who can understand what prosperity a church would have in which every saint was a faithful preacher?

When it is thoroughly understood that every one must preach, the necessity of saints living holy lives will be greatly accentuated, the churches would see more clearly the necessity of requiring at least outward holiness of life from its members. Thus not only would the church grow prodigiously because of this great increase in the number of preachers in it, but its members would also become better in quality as well.

That the people generally should expect the ministers to do all the preaching, both that done in public addresses and that done in private conversations, is as absurd as it would be for the operatives in a factory to sit down comfortably and as interested and sympathetic spectators watch the officials of the factory turn out the product. The children of this world are far too wise for that, but not the church, which is actually doing so.


3. Our churches and revivals need the assistance of our literature, tracts, periodicals and books, to be sown everywhere and often. A piece of literature if faithfully carried by a consecrated, prayerful saint, will readily find access to hearts at times when no person would be permitted to communicate with them. People who cannot be induced to listen to testimony even, much less attend public

We have much fine literature, written under the sanction and by the assisting grace of the Holy Ghost, which even without any general effort to get it into the hands of the public, has produced very great results in the turning of men and What results. women to righteousness. would follow if our 100,000 saints would all fare forth regularly to supply some one with an Evangel, either by sale or Where is the assembly that could gift? not distribute regularly in the community five times as many Evangels as there are saints in the assembly? What do you think would be the result of 500,000 Evangels a week going forth as compared with the pitiful little 30,000 or so now going *

Like the other things mentioned, the vital importance of this arm of the church needs to be fully appreciated, and the saints one and all get faithfully to work carrying our literature to the people within their reach. While it is, as we have said, true that mighty things would be accomplished by the people reading this literature, still that good would be less than that which would result from saints using the pieces of literature as entering wedges to enable them to get into conversations about Jesus with the people they meet. The printed page itself does good, but the witnessing of the consecrated saint, made convenient by offering the piece of literature, would do even more good. The total would be of incalculable size.

Now these are brave words, and they will fail to convince people who read. "You'll have to show me," is the reception every proposal to advance has met with, whether in matters material or spiritual, political or social. Knowing this I close my article with an appeal to ministers and assemblies, asking them to put the thing to the test. My soul is stirred about a mighty revival and I feel that God has given me a clear vision of just how it is to be brought about, as I have sketched it forth in this message. I hope and pray that a score of assemblies will take the thing to heart; get the idea worked into their souls by painstaking study and prayer, and then get to work and make a demonstration of the truth of the plans outlined. When you come to General Council and are able to tell of immense results attained in the few weeks now to intervene before the meeting of that august body, by following the thoughts outlined here, if anyone is to be praised for bringing something grand and wonderful to the church it will be you, for you will be the ones who will be able to "show." the people from Missouri.



HUNGRY HEARTS IN POLAND Fordinand Ewald

I am glad that we can say the Lord is in our midst; souls are finding their way to the foot of the Cross and others are receiving the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. Last week we had some services in a large barn some distance away from here where the Lord sent a revival last fall, and it was estimated that about four hundred people attended the meetings. They came from long distances in their wagons, on bicycles, or on foot. The Lord gave us a glorious day together. Several asked for prayer, among whom were a teacher and his wife. Many testified to their joy in the Lord and one man said he had never before been so happy. We took some of our singers and musicians with us from Lodz, so besides giving out the Word of Life we played and sang the songs of Zion. We were also invited to come to other villages, but this time we had to hurry back to the work here while some of the young people went to another village to win souls for Jesus.

In our absence the saints in Lodz got together and had a tarrying service one day. They tell us that the power of God had never before been so mighty in their midst, the slain of the Lord were all around and some received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. Next week we expect to have water baptism, but we do not know yet just how many candidates there will be.

THE BLESSING OF GOD IN SOUTH CHINA

Mrs. George M. Kelley

"What shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits?" "I will love the Lord because He hath heard the voice of my supplications."

Mr. Kelley and I have just returned from a trip to the country where we visited some of the stations. Our hearts rejoiced to find the work of the Lord, which is so dear to us, moving forward. The dear Chinese workers are faithfully witnessing and souls are being added to the Lord.

At Sainam, there are several men and a number of women ready for baptism and on June 26th we are to go back for that service, also a Bible conference at Canton. How the Lord worked for us on this trip, even providing a pass on the train, for the return trip, a saving of \$8.80 which will feed two of the aged Christians we furnish rice for, for a month. On Tuesday we were at Slim Tong. They have turned over a large idol temple to us for the mission work. It is well built, has plenty of room and is an ideal place for a school. God's own provision. The ancestral tablets which belong to the village clan have been moved back into a small room. Once a month some one comes in through the back door, feeds the spirits in these tablets, shoots fire crackers, mumbles a prayer, and slips out the back door again. While praises and thanksgivings go up to God every hour through the day from all over the court.

There were 8 converts to be baptized and baptism means so much to the Chinese. It was pouring rain. They like to have a big crowd witness their burial with Christ. It seemed impossible to get to the river through such a driving rain but these converts were unwilling to wait for another day. They said, "We can't tell what may happen if we wait, so no matter how hard it rains we want to follow Jesus to-day." So just as all were ready to start out it ceased raining and the sun shone. What an inspiration to their simple faith, even the heathen said "The Christians' God has power, for He stopped the rain for them to be baptized." After we came back it began raining again. There are two old grandmothers here who were saved last year, 84 and 66 years old. They have tiny bound feet not over $2\frac{1}{2}$ or 3 inches long. They had to be brought to church on other women's backs. How happy they are with the fear and superstition removed from their lives and a light on their faces that never was seen on land or sea. At evening time the light has come to them.

The evangelistic band has reached Hoi Kin District with its 75,000 souls without the gospel-not one mission in all that district. En route there, they have worked hundreds of villages. God has indeed been with them and now in many homes the idols have been burned and prayers go up to the living God. They have had many healings, too. In some places they were persecuted with guns drawn on them, with threats to kill them if they did not quit preaching, but God gave them grace and courage. We hope to see many lighthouses opened in Hoi Kin District. Now, when the missionaries cannot travel about freely, and over 3,000 have left China's shores, we do thank God that He is letting some of us remain for a while longer and as we pray for laborers to be thrust forth into the great white harvest fields, our hearts rejoice that native evangelists are catching fire and becoming fearless witnesses for God. Four of our young people from our Canton mission felt they must go out into the

Halska country and witness concerning this Pentecostal message. The District into which they went has been worked by the German Berlin mission. When they reached there no one received them, and there was no place open for them to preach. They went to an inn, prayed and felt they should go out and witness from house to house. The Lord immediately began to work. Now 12 churches are open to them, the fire is falling, a revival is on, Hallelujah!

A Chinese man educated in U. S. A., who teaches in a seminary in Canton at a salary of \$120.00 per month (Mex) has written us (without our saying anything to him) that God has definitely led him to leave his position and give his life to preaching the gospel and to translation work, and that at the end of July he will be with us as a co-worker in our Pestecostal ranks. How we thank God, for he is just the man to help us turn out Pentecostal literature to reach millions with this message of the hour. I somehow feel China's greatest day of revival is near, a sweeping wave of prayer by God's people everywhere will bring a sweeping wave of revival to China. Help us pray. We came back from this trip determined to pray as never before. Our oldest boy, George Jr., was baptized in the Holy Ghost two weeks ago. Our other two boys prayed and wept over their sins until Gaylor said, "I've prayed fru, and feel so happy." Thank God for answer-ing our heart's desire. Let everybody pray for China now. We won't turn back in the day of battle.

LAVADA MORRISON SAFE

We are glad to learn through the Secretary of State of the safe arrival of Sister Lavada Morrison in Rangoon, Burma. Our sister and her husband had to leave Yunnan Province, China, where they had been carrying on their ministry, because of the unsettled state of affairs over there. Owing to the fact that it was too dangerous to try the eastern route home, they went through Indo-China and Burma, and are now in the care of the American Consul at Rangoon, awaiting financial help in order to proceed with their journey.

BUILDINGS WRECKED IN ES SALT

Miss Laura Radford who has been working in Transjordania, Palestine, with most encouraging results, has just cabled us that the buildings in which they conducted their meetings have been wrecked by the recent earthquake. Pray that the Lord may move upon the hearts of those who can help in this emergency.

to weep and weep in the Spirit, and was praising God and saying in Japanese, 'Jesus is soon coming.' One of my little boys also began to weep. Another boy was dancing on the floor, talking in other tongues. This is the first time we have had such an outburst of the Spirit. As the Japanese as a rule are very modest people, they would not do anything like this of themselves."

Pentecostal work in West China. Miss Victoria G. Bolton writes that their hearts are broken as they are compelled to leave their work in Yunnan. She says, "It was a consecration to offer ourselves for this service here in China, and yet it is even a much harder consecration to leave the Chinese in God's hands and turn toward the home land again. The Lord has been saving and blessing souls by the families, in fact by the villages they have been recently turning to the Lord. The Lord has been showing us that He can still keep the Christians from falling and can still pour out His Holy Spirit and save souls. This work has become more or less self-supporting as far as the natives are concerned. The natives have built and are still building their own chapels at their own expense. All the evangelists, with the exception of two head ones, are helped by their own people and not by our money. My brother and an evangelist have only just returned from a long trip, going all over the mountains and preaching the gospel, and many have been turning to Jesus. Two new outstations were established. They are selfsupporting. Pray for China's perishing millions.'

Amidst all the persecution the native Christians are being subjected to in China at the present time, news comes that most of them are holding out wonderfully. Mr. Cook of the China Inland Mission, who writes of the converted headhunters of Yunnan, says that he recently had a visit from seven men from the borders of Yunnan and northern Burma, who had been trudging eight days to reach him at his station in Yunnan. He asked after the Christian community and was told, "Most of us have stood true. They have threatened to kill us and take away our c.ws and property but here are the names of those that have held out." The head man pulled from his clothes a long strip, saying, "None on this list have planted opium. We have been throughout all the villages to see who stood firm." Mr. Cook counted the families. He found 62, made up of 310 individuals. He asked how many of the 40 people who were baptized the previous spring had gone back to heathenism. He was told, "Not one." He commented, "It is almost too good to be true. We were inclined to criticize the Lisu teacher who baptized these 40 people, because the custom is to wait about a year after confession of faith before baptizing, but if out of the 40 baptized, not one went back, even though threatened with death, I guess we shall have to admit that Lisu teachers may be led of God even when they break the rules made by the white man."

God's work in Costa Rica. There is an evangelical awakening in Costa Rica. It is so strong that it is being called Costa Rica's "second revolution." God is greatly blessing the labors of Angelo Achrilla, a native evangelist, who is having wonderful campaigns and at the same time tremendous persecution.

The Lord is also blessing in that country on Pentecostal lines. Brother Paul K. Derr writes, "Jose Maria Barrontes, whose address is Cartago, Costa Rica, is the first native in this country to receive the Baptism of the Holy Ghost. The first two evenings he tarried he received beautiful visions of the dear Lord, and the third night was filled like the disciples of old. Mr. Barrontes is on fire for God and feels called to preach to his own people as soon as God opens the way."

Distributing Bibles in Brazil. Mr. Frederick C. Glass writes in "The Christian" of a 5000 mile tour, distributing Bibles and Testaments in Brazil. He says, "One of the main objectives of our journey was Canudos, situated in a region of very difficult approach. It is now but a small village of a few hundred inhabitants, but it is in the site of what, but thirty years ago was a big city of fifty thousand souls, then despotically ruled by an aged irregular priest, who was worshipped as a holy miracle-prophet of God. He drew the whole illiterate countryside to his standard and soon defied the armies of the newly formed republic. Time and again the flower of the Brazilian army was defeated by these ill-armed, untrained peasants who fought with a fierce fanatical persistence worthy of a better cause. This terrible happening was one of the darkest tragedies in the history of the country, and when the final massacre of its miserable inhabitants was followed up by a complete destruction of their city and stronghold, the whole country was left in an almost depopulated state, and under a ban that remains to this day. All this was but the fruit of ignorance and Romanism at its worst, and the utter lack of the Word of God which Rome has banned and barred from the people.

"From that day to this nothing has been done, materially or spiritually, to introduce a new breath of life and hope into its dark places. We brought the first message of peace and good will to Canudos. The chief man of the place received us indifferently, his wife being very opposed to us, and this spirit determined the attitude of most of the inhabitants. Nevertheless, an empty house was put at our disposal on the outskirts of the place, and thither we made our way. We soon found that next door lived two Catholic ladies who seemed strangely excited at our arrival and who welcomed us as friends. It seemed that only the previous night they had prayed God to send somebody with the Word of God. They could not read, but years before, in another town, they had become remarkably interested and blessed by often hearing the Bible read aloud by an army officer. We canvassed the place thoroughly with Bibles, leaving free copies of John's Gospel in every house. Two open air meetings were also held, besides several others in our hired house. Best of all, before we left, four days later, the two Catholic ladies, and a friend of theirs, kneeled with us in prayer, and received the Lord as their Saviour. Throughout the whole expedition we disposed of 205 Bibles, 600 Testaments and 2092 Gospels, including several hundred books given away to indigent Catholics. There were six who professed conversion."

MISSIONARY REST HOME IN LON-DON, ENGLAND

The Missionary Rest Home at 73 Highbury New Park, London, England, that was founded by Mrs. Margaret Cantel and has been so richly blessed of God during the years gone by, will still be continued, we are glad to hear. Brother Gco. 




