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T THIS season of the year the world looks back to the first coming of Christ when He came as a Babe and was laid in a manger. But some of us have to confess that, even at this season, our hearts are more stirred at the thought of His second coming. There are parallels between His first and second coming which are worthy of our notice.
The scribes knew that the coming Ruler was to be born in Bethlehem Judea. They had it all down pat and told King Herod, when he inquired of them the declaration of the prophet, "And thou Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, art not the least among the princes of Judah; for out of thee shall come a Governor that shall rule My people Israel." They knew the details as to where He was coming, and told the king all about it. And this brought in the secular arm used by Herod to have all the babes killed.
To-day men are very glibly saying, "He is coming again in such and such a manner. Paul said this and Peter said that in his writings." The prophets were not like that. The Spirit of God was in them, but
they were puzzled and perplexed as they told of the sufferings of Christ and the glory that should follow. They could not understand and could not balance the seeming contradictions. It was far beyond what they could understand, and they left the matter till the Spirit illuminated it for those who came after. The Spirit within
these holy men showed them the twofold aspect of His coming, but it was very vague to their understanding. They had the letter and were perplexed concerning it even though the Spirit inspired the writing. We to-day have the letter, their writings of the glory that was to come after Christ's crucifixion, and we need the Holy Spirit to unfold the writings of the Old and New Testaments.
Peter is a good illustration of the mixing of the human mind with divine revelation. He had a revelation that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of the living God. It was a unique revelation from God Himself. Christ acknowledged it and said, "Blessed art thou, Simon Barjona: for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in heaven." But when Christ gave an illumination as to the crucifixion, the human interpretation of the divine revelation was, "Be it far from Thee, Lord: this shall not be unto Thee." Peter had his interpretation. He argued with the other disciples who should be the greatest in the kingdom, and he was not going to take a second place, not even to John. And then for the Son of God to (See Page Five)

We are told by some good folks who know a good deal more than we ever expect to know, that it is really quite uncertain whether we are actually celebrating the right day as the anniversary for our Saviour's birth. They tell us the Christians of the fourth century decided to celebrate the birth of Christ on the same day that the heathen held high festival to the sun-god. Well, supposing they made a mistake, we presume it is always in order to give God thanks for the gift of the holy Babe of Bethlehem. While some esteem every day alike, some esteem one day above another. And if some regard the twentyfifth of December unto the Lord as an occasion for bringing a special oblation of praise for the coming of Immanuel, we don't intend to take violent issue with them. Even though the date of the birth of Mary's first-born Son is uncertain, the fact of the coming of Him who was "to save His people from their sins" is certain; and for that we can tune our hearts and sing a hearty pealm of thanksgiving to Jehovah.

We are told by good authority that the "Gittith" was a Philistine instrument of music, but David captured one of them from the enemy and sang three of his sweetest songs of praise (Psalms 8,81 and 84) to Jehovah upon it. In like manner the early Christians took the day of a heathenish festival and drowned out the pagan's drunken songs to an imaginary sun-god with psalms of praise to God for the reality of the gift of His only begotten Son. And even though the world still makes this season an occasion of riotous revelry, we can make it one of adoration and worship to our ever-living Immanuel.

## Believing and Receiving

There is a wonderful lesson to be learned from the story of the angel Gabriel coming to the humble virgin of Nazareth. When Mary was told that a miracle without precedent would take place-"The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest
shall overshadow thee; therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God"-she did not quibble or question or doubt. She believed the message and with yielded will declared, "Behold the handmaid of the Lord, be it unto me according to thy word." Eve believed him who was a liar from the beginning, and the yielding of her will to him brought forth death. Mary believed the word of Him who cannot lie, and yielded her will to Him, and her yielding made possible the bringing forth of the Prince of Life. Here is the secret of all blessing-believing the Word of God and yielding to the revealed will of Cod. This opens the way for God to do what He will within us, and for a repetition of this same miracle-the Christ of God being formed within us. And salvation is just this, "Christ in you-the hope of glory." William Law once wrote, "A Christ not in us is a Christ not ours." And being in us, He is and ever will be all we need.

A Supernatural It has been well said, Visitation "The virgin birth of Christ is the supernatural method of introducing a supernatural Saviourhood. The divine Redeemer came in a divine way." Everything in this story is supernatural. The angel's message to Zacharias was supernatural; and the conception of John the Baptist when Zacharias was an old man and his wife well stricken in years, was supernatural. The prophetic songs of Elizabeth and Mary when they met, were supernatural, as were the words of prophecy given to Zacharias and Simeon. The star the Wise Men followed, was supernatural. The angelic message to the shepherds and the glad tidings of peace and good will to men, brought by the heavenly hosts, were supernatural. The message of Gabriel to Mary was supernatural. And, mystery of mysteries, the most wonderfully supernatural thing of all was that the Son of God should lay aside His glory and come to earth as a weak and helpless Babe, via the womb of a virgin mother.

All this took place after a lull in prophetic vision, message and miracle, that had lasted for many years. And now, blessed be God, during the past few years, after many years of comparative lull as regards heavenly visitations, there has been a glorious return of the supernatural. We have heard the supernatural tongues and supernatural prophecy, and we have seen many supernatural healings and miracles. We have had supernatural dreams and visions. We have heard the message again and again in a supernatural manner, "Jesus is coming soon." A Chinese missionary told us he heard this message
given in English from young Chinese girls who knew no English, when they were filled with the Holy Spirit. We believe this is an omen of the soon coming of the Son of God from glory. The celebration of the coming of the Babe should stir our hearts to the anticipation of the coming of this same Jesus as He returns to earth as King of kings and Lord of lords. Speed Thy coming, O Thou great and only Potentate. This old sin-sick earth is sorely needing Thy presence.

Childhood's Christmas is a great time Opportunity for the children. Don't teach them all the fabulous nonsense about Santa Claus. It is a good opportunity to tell them of the Lord Jesus coming as a Babe. Make it simple enough for them to understand. Teach the children when they receive the visible gifts which you bring to them, to accept the invisible gift God has sentthe gift of His only begotten Son. While wise men stumble over the simplicity of it, the children understand and receive Him with a beautiful faith that we older folks might well emulate.

The Christmas season is again upon us and our hearts instinctively turn to the birth of the Christ child. We are all familiar with the record of His advent. The many phases of life and interest connected with this wonderful event have been brought to us in many forms. However, we never tire of hearing over and over again the story of His birth. This is no doubt due to its exquisite simplicity and deeply human interest and atmosphere. The record given by Luke is generally chosen as a favorite because it brings the event so near to the human heart and artlessly portrays the scene as it actually occurred.
The text before us, Luke 2:7, is very suggestive and fruitful because it bears testimony to two extreme facts. First, the great fortune and immeasurable blessing (she brought forth, etc.) and second, a most pathetic tragedy (there was no room for them in the inn). Is not the last phrase prophetic in its pathetic sadness and strangeness? It foreshadowed the spirit of so many in their attitude toward Christ. He came into the world as a Redeemer to save and bring back again to the heart of God the broken race of mankind. He came as light and life, but the world would not have Him. They crucified Him. Neither will the world have Him to-day. He came to His own, to Israel. "And His own received Him not." There was no room in the inn of the backslidden Jewish economy. He comes to the church to-day to bring to her a fresh outpouring of spiritual life and power. But again the material side of life has gained the victory and against its best interests, the pathetic and tragic answer is often given, "no room in the inn." But the loving; patient Christ in gentleness keeps seeking and now approaches the individual and according to Revelation $3: 20$, He desires to come in to make a feast. And still we find it possible on the part of the individual to answer "no room."

## The Innkeeper

It cannot be that so great a failure on the part of the innkeeper could have been due to mere accident. Before we consider what might have been possible causes of failure, let us note two facts which I believe are suggested. I do not believe the innkeeper desired to do the seekers an indignity.

sions drawn from careful study and investigation. It rather seems to me he was "earthbound" and material in his vision. This was caused by preoccupation which resulted in neglect. The city was filled with different members of the tribes. In response to the decree, they had come for registration. This called forth not only the humble and poor, but also the rich and influential. The innkeeper was wise and knew this was his money-making season. Places of entertainment were in demand, and at this late hour a single room was at a premium. Certainly the last room or two could harvest him more than this humble couple, worn and tired, could offer him. So why not reserve the best for others and put the couple in the stable? And (seeing Mary's condition) no doubt he thought it is safer and easier to avoid possible inconveniences. "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers; for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." Heb. 13:2. "For whosoever shall give you a cup of water to drink in My name, because ye belong to Christ, verily I say unto you, ye shall not lose your reward." Mark 9:41. The human heart and natural reason still act as hindrances too many times to the richest and best God has for us.
Let us not be too severe in our criticism of the innkeeper. It is one thing to preach to the dear sinners and feel pained and burdened that they neglect so rich a salvation by closing their hearts to Him. But, dear Christians, ours is to seek Christ, and again at Christmas time He is seeking a fuller entrance into our lives. He comes to enrich-not to rob.

## Tyrant World Spirit

In dealing with young people and helping them through many trying places and crises in life, I have noted a few possible reasons for closed doors. One of the first is the Tyrant World Spirit. I do not mean by this the coarse, vulgar spirit manifested in outbreaking $\sin$ and disorder. But rather the tyrannical world spirit as it makes its demands in the forms of recognized customs of life, its laws, habits, conventionalities, ideas and even ideals. How prone the human heart is to fall into bondage to these and allow them to control and build the life. It takes real courage to stand true to the spiritual convictions one has in regard to the world and its standards. We are not only Christians but baptized Christians and the church and world are expecting and has a right to expect spiritual lives lived under higher and
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"Jesus said unto him, If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth." Mark 9:23. This was said to the man who brought his son to the nine disciples. The other three were up in the mount with Jesus at that marvelous transfiguration. These nine could not cast out the demon. Jesus came and said, "What question ye with them?" This man came up and said, "I brought my son here for them to cast out a devil, and they could not do it. If thou canst do anything have compassion on us and help us." Jesus said, "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth."
Let us look at Mark 11:23,24, "Therefore I say unto you, What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them." Take these two verses together, and they form the first clause in our Father's will to us. God has made a will and He has included everything necessary for the life which now is, and for that which is to come. The Holy Spirit has said "All things for the life that now is and for that which is to come," are included in that will.
"What shall we then say to these things? If God be for us who can be against us? He that spared not His own Son, but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not with Him also freely give us all things?" Romans $8: 31,32$. You remember that Jesus said, "Don't find fault with your brother. To his own master he standeth or falleth." What has the world to do with me? What has the devil to do with me? He cannot judge me. Oh! if I go back and walk in sin where the devil is, then God may say to the devil "You judge him" and it may be rheumatism, or cancer, or a carbuncle. The devil has many instruments of destruction, for he destroyed practically everything Job had. The only way to get out is to confess out, and if we confess, God is "faithful and just to forgive us our sins." God will forgive you for Christ's sake and He will heal you for Christ's sake. "All things" to the believer. If God be for me, what do I care for all you can do against me? Nothing can prevail or prosper against me if God be for me. There is no match for God.
All things to the believer are given because of Christ. See Luke 1:37. "For with God nothing shall be impossible." The Revised Version reads "No word from God shall be void of power." All the power of God is in it, and the Word that God spake back there thousands of years ago, or the words that Jesus spoke on the Sea of Galilee or in the upper room have just as much power in them to-day. They have the life of God in them. "It is the Spirit that quickeneth, the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit and they are life." John
$6: 23$. I wish you would see this as yours, and make it yours. See it with your two eyes, "the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit and they are life."
If you have faith in Christ, you can go out with the Word of God in your mouth, and it will be that sharp, twoedged sword that John saw coming out of the mouth of Jesus in Rev. $1: 16$. If you speak in the Holy Ghost, the power of your words will have as much power as when Jesus spoke them. If we do not have the Holy Spirit we would use our own words and would fail. I am not to prove to a man that he is a sinner. I am to use God's Word, and sometimes the gentlest, sweetest word that God has ever spoken, when they come forth as I quote them in the power of the Holy Ghost, will convince the greatest sinner. "No word of God shall be void of power." Be sure it is in the power of the Holy Ghost, and let God speak.
All things are in Christ, and all things are made over to us in Christ. "For all things are for your sakes." 2 Cor, $4: 15$. When the devil disputes you, say, "But here it is." Get the Word. Make it yours. Get it instead of a fortune. Get it instead of shoes. God made the shoes of the children of Israel last for nearly forty years. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God." "For all things are for your sakes, that the abundant grace might

through the thanksgiving of many redound to the glory of God." 2 Cor. $4: 15$. That is what God gave it for. God is trying to get glory for His Son, and how will He do it? By just giving you all things, and letting you live like princes and princesses. Sons and daughters of God. How shall I go? Begging of people? God says, "I have given you all things," that the abundant grace may abound to His glory.
Oh! friends, don't live skimping all the time, and hiding something for a rainy day. You lack faith in God if you do that, for God will meet all of your needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus. Then you can turn your pockets out. Have some faith in God. "How shall He not with Him, also freely give us all things?" "For all things are for your sakes." It will bring God glory if you get a big slice.
"All things are of God who hath reconciled us to Himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given us the ministry of reconciliation." 2 Cor. $5: 18$. He has given unto us the message of the gospel of His grace. This includes repentance and I am to go out and proclaim the grace of God. Not to try to make them repent. Give them the good news. The Holy Ghost has convicted them long before you came. I must preach reconciliation to all men and that all things are yours in Christ. Praise the Lord!
He has reconciled us to Himself. Reconciled us to the conditions that are about us, to our environment, and has reconciled all things to us.
"And having made peace through the blood of His cross, by Him to reconcile all things unto Himself." Col. 1:20. I am in Christ, therefore they are reconciled to me. I don't touch the world now except through Christ; and the devil and the world cannot touch me now except through Christ. So all things are reconciled to me. I quoted this verse to a person who was afflicted with a cancer. It was as big as my head. "He has reconciled all things to us through the blood of Christ." She said "It is dissolved," and in less than twenty-four hours it was gone. But it is to be God's doing it, not ourselves. We are to get it by believing what God says. Don't beg God to do something He has already done. Believe it.

Romans $8: 28$. "We know" praise the Lord! We know. You may think you need to look at your pocket book before you can say this. It is true just the same, even if you haven't any pocket book." "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose." What was His purpose? It was to make me like Jesus, and to be found in Him, not having my own righteousness which is by the law, and by works. This was God's purpose, and unto this we are called.
"Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that believeth on Me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do ; because I go to My Father. And whatsoever ye shall ask in My name, that will I do, that the Father may
be glorified in the Son." John $14: 12,13$. This is the work God has called us to do and you can do these things in spite of the forces of darkness, and in spite of your circumstances. We have been delivered from the power of darkness and translated into the kingdom of His Son. If we would only see all that God has done for us in Christ Jesus!
"And hath put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be the head over all things to the church." Eph. $1: 22$. The only life which the body has is that which flows down from the head. If we have anything from God, it is through Christ. This is the only way we get faith. Are you God's child? Yes. Is Christ formed in you? Yes. Then you have all the faith in the universe. How can we let this faith operate? If you will just quit trying to get healed, and quit trying to do something and let the Son of God who lives in you operate, He will do something.
Christian Science is as far from Christ as heaven is from hell. It has no Holy Ghost in it. It has no God in it. It has no Christ in it. I recently saw an entire family of Christian Scientists turn to Jesus. What did I preach to them? I preached Christ. I would not preach Christian Science or against it. They needed Christ. Christian Science is the spawn of hell, and it will entangle you, and it will cover up the blood of Jesus, and it will trample it under its swinish feet. Christian Science says that the blood of Jesus is no better than the blood of any one else. God help you to spue it out of your mouth forever.
"Therefore let no man glory in men. For all things are yours." 1 Cor. $3: 21$. Don't glory in the man who is teaching you. "Let no man glory in men for all things are yours, whether Paul or Apollos, or Cephas, or the world or life or death, or things present or things to come; all are yours and ye are Christ's; and Christ is God's." It is a marvelous combination. You are born again and you are "in Christ and Christ in yoa, and Christ in God." Glory! Praise the Lord! Then why are you sick? I am trying to bring out this marvelous Christ that you may see what deliverance you have. Just say "Lord, I thank You that You have all this and I am free." If the enemy brings anything against you, just say "I am free." It is my place to abide and live in. Did Christ only pay your debt? No, He gave you enough to live on also. Go to bed and get up strong. How do we have all that? We see in Mark that we have it by faith. All things are yours and all things work together for good.

be crucified and buried-why, his plans would be all thwarted! No, this could not be! Never! And right behind in the background Satan was the prompter. The apostolic interpretation of the Saviour's revelation was Satanic! A startling statement, but true.
Satan saw what the crucifixion would mean and he was using Peter to try to stop it. The leading apostle to try to stop Christ's going to the cross! Satan was right behind him instigating it.
The greatest event in the world, next to Calvary and the resurrection, is the appearing of the Son of God from heaven. Who is Simeon? Obscure! Ancestry not known! No official position! He wrote no books! He never lectured on the Lord's coming! But he had a receptive mind, not for the news of earth but for the news from heaven, and it was revealed to him that he should not see death, before he had seen the Lord's Anointed.
Anna? Poor old widow! But she had a revelation which eclipsed all the knowl-
edge of the scribes of those days. She spake of Him to all them that looked for redemption in Jerusalem. These two represented the great mass of those who preceded them, who, having obtained a good report through faith, received not the promise but laid hold of it in faith. Simeon and Anna were a direct link with all those who had gone before. Therefore Simeon could say, "Lord, now let Thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word: for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation." They saw in reality what others saw in the Spirit, and those who saw in the Spirit will see in reality what Simcon saw in the Spirit and with his cyes.
God still has His Simeons and Annas, unknown ones, who have had a revelation that they will see the consummation. You don't know them. They don't advertise. Were they to advertise what God has shown them in the Spirit, they would betray a confidence and bring ridicule on the revelation. These people are the real spiritual barometers, they are the real forecasters. What they have had in the Spirit, God can also give to others who love Him and love His appearing.
There is a beclouding of the minds of many people concerning the Lord's coming. Peter had the revelation that Jesus was the Son of God, but at the revelation of the crucifixion Peter stumbled. And there is stumbling to-day. The real issue regarding the Lord's coming is beclonded. We have consulted books, and we think we are wonderful scribes. Folks come and consult us. But if we only know the letter, and reason only with our natural minds, we are blind leaders of the blind.

The Lord had Simeon and Anna at the Birth of Jesus Christ; and He also had John the Baptist, a mighty heralder. A hidden Simeon and Anna, and also the publicity man, John the Baptist-the wilderness ranter that even the scribes and Pharisees had to go out to hear! Oh, how those phylacteries would get mudded going to the wilderness! ## CHRISTMAS DAY IN THE CONGO

What a strange Christmas Day I have had. I am two days journey from Mwanza, on my way to place two young evangelists among the fishing villages of the Kisale swamp. The Congo River is rapidly rising, and the marshes over which we have come are almost impassable even now, while in two or three weeks the villages where I am placing the lads will just be little islands, and will be completely marooned and cut off from the outside world till May or June. I do trust that God will enable them to skillfully angle the souls of men out in these marshes. Yesterday as we were plunging and splashing our way through the mud and long grass, the natives came out from a little village to beg me to shoot the hippopotami which every night trample and destroy their gardens. After two or three hours' watching, I managed to kill the biggest of the school of ten hippos. What shouting and excitement there was in the village when the little canoes towed their great enemy to land. It took fully seven hours to hack the last of the flesh off, and to-day the village is busy smoking the flesh over papyrus-root fires, while my portion is two big earthware pots of fat, for cooking or for soap. There is blood and flesh wherever one looks, and quarrels and arguments in any number are going on as to whether that bit of the entrails is mine, or whether that chunk of the lungs is yours or whether Ilunga has any right to smoke his piece over Kumwinba's fire, or whose fault it was that Ngando's dog took a piece out of Bala's pot. However, despite all this we have had some delightful services, and talks with individuals, and I believe that these people are hungry for God's message of salvation. I expect to move on to-morrow, but I hope it will not be long before I am able to visit these villages again, and possibly take some lads back to Mwanza with me.

In one village a chief came for the Government to force natives to go and
work on the copper mines. The villagers were angry with him, and when I, the white-man arrived, they thought I had come to compel labor. They surrounded the village with armed men, set an ambush at the ferry (which was the only exit from the marshes) and had determined to kill me and the chief together. However I called the elders of the village, held a service, and afterwards shot two antelopes, and gave them to the villagers to "whiten their hearts." I don't know whether it was the effect of the Gospel message, the accurate shooting, or the friendly present of meat, but anyhow they let me leave the village unmolested and even sent a messenger, after me saying, "Please come back and tell us more of God's words."
I made a most interesting find in one of the villages out in Lake Kisale. A lot of old pottery about four feet below the surface of the ground, in a bank which has recently been washed away by the Lualaka River. The pottery is far superior to anything Lubin. It was evidently made on a potter's wheel. I wonder what vanished race once inhabited these islands. In visiting some of our evangelists, on the way back from the marshes, I was delighted to find blessed progress, ten to be baptized in one village, fourteen in another, and so on, women as well as men. While in one or two places our little mud and wattle chapels are far too small for the number attending. In another place, owing to the seizure of most of the young men, to work on the railway and copper mines, our work has been scattered and apparently destroyed. But praise God, somewhere the seed is bringing forth fruit, and we know that the work done cannot be in vain.

We are glad to welcome our precious Brother Barratt from Norway, who is visiting our country at this time. When Pastor Barratt came to America in 1906 he was a Methodist minister, but he received the Acts $2: 4$ experience over here, and returned to Norway a Pentecostal preacher. He carried the fire to Norway, England and Denmark, and the Lord made him a great blessing in India and Syria in the early days of the Pentecostal outpouring. is all for His service." It may be study. Such a passion for study (even for His Word) may do damage when the letter killeth and the soul becomes absorbed in the theoretical side of the message. An uncontrolled or unbalanced desire for study and more knowledge has closed the doors of more than one student's heart to the "fuller revelation of the Spirit."
Business is often a passion and object in the life of even a Christian. It so occupies the heart and attention that the inn of life is cluttered with business propositions and adventures. "But seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Matt. 6:33. Even our Christian service may so fill the inn that He , the very one we serve, is sadly neglected. Let us always remember the worker is greater than the work. There are times when the individual heart and personal interest are the desired portion of Christ. Did you ever notice in the Revelation the salutations or greetings Christ gives to each of the Churches? It is as if their works were the first thing which came up for recognition. He instantly brushes them aside with the one remark for each, "I know thy works-" and proceeds at once to the personal attitude and responsibility. You remember when the Temple became too cluttered, He cleansed it. It is also good to know that the hand that used the scourge is a pierced hand.

## Misjudgment

Another reason I have found which fills the inn of one's life is a Misjudgment of Christ's purpose in seeking a fuller entrance. Sometimes I find a heart with an unsharable secret or a difficulty in which one does not think the Lord could be at all interested. I have not time to develop this thought. I wish you might know in your hearts that God is love. Christ does not intrude upon our personal lives to rob us or make us unhappy. He comes to bless. We do not understand His motives and purposes and do not have the faith to trust Him. Unbelief and self-pity slink back into the inn of our hearts and when He seeks an entrance, we feebly or even coldly say, "No room in the inn."
We may not want to insult Him. We may in our refusal treat Him with courtesy and respect. Many dear hearts today would not do Him an indignity. But alas-when He knocks we fail and through neglect or indifference we pave the way to loss and tragedy.

It is Christmas time and again He is seeking. Shall we not for a time consider prayerfully the hindrances which clutter the inns of our lives? Let us not repeat the $\sin$ of the innkeeper, but joyfully and wholeheartedly say,

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## THE ELEVENTH ANNUAL LATIN-AMERICAN CONFERENCE OF THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD

EVER before in the history of the LatinAmerican Conference have we experienced a sweeter spirit than that which prevailed in the session which has just closed. The Lord graciously kept us from the beginning to the end in the spirit of Psalm 133.

More than 60 ministers assisted in the work and ministry of the Conference, and 30 delegates with more than 100 visitors registered. In this number we are not including the members of the local assembly. In the night services the hall could not contain the crowds who came together, so that in order to provide more room we had to remove the pulpit, the communion table and the secretary's table and the flower stands. We rented more chairs, but even then many people stood up in such available space as they could find inside, while a large number more were standing outside the hall listening to the service through the open windows. One thing was made very clear at this Convention, and that was that when we have another Conference in Texas we shall have to find a larger place in which to hold it, whether it be a church or rented hall.
The presence of Brethren Gaston, Perkin and Cad-walder-the Superintendent of the General Council, Missionary Secretary, and the Superintendent of the District Council of Texas and New Mexico respectively -was of great encouragement and inspiration to us. Brother Gaston presided on the committee which dealt with some of the more important matters, and his decisions and advice seemed to us as both just and wise. The greater part of the congregation were very much surprised when Brother Perkin commenced to speak to them in Spanish, since they were ignorant of the fact that he had been a missionary in Argentina some years ago. Brother Cadwalder with his usual enthusiasm, appealed to the young people to consecrate themselves to the Lord and received a response that was truly marvelous. We believe that the Lord is going to call a multitude of young people into His service during these last days.
Brother Ball was re-elected Superintendent of the Convention. All the presbyters of the past year were
re-elected with the exception of the Central District which now has Brother Blaisdell as presbyter.

I do not wish to end this report without mentioning that Sister H. May Kelty was elected as President of the Ambassadors, and will have the responsibility of teaching and directing them. She has taken the place which was formerly filled by Sister Aurora C. Viales. Sister Ball was re-elected as President of the Women's Missionary Council.

The last night of the Convention was a fitting consummation to the Conference. Brother Caraballo of San Francisco had preached an excellent sermon which was followed by the farewell messages of Brother Gaston and Perkin. As the brethren finished speaking, Brethren Ruesga and Orozco of Mexico advanced towards them and presented them with a beautiful banner of the Republic of Mexico, made of pure silk, on which was embroidered the words: "Mexico para Cristo," which being translated is "Mexico for Christ." It was a scene that we shall never forget. Afterwards the new ministers received their license to preach the Gospel and the candidates for full ordination were ordained.
During the Convention a number of people were saved and several received the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. Also a special service was held to pray especially for the sick. At the conclusion of the Convention we were all very tired, since we had worked from early morning until late at night, but in spite of our weariness we were very happy and satisfied, and are looking with fresh courage and vision on the fields which we mean to occupy for Christ. We believe it will not be so very long before we celebrate the great Convention in the air, when our Christ will call to Himself all those who are His, from the North to the South they will come, from China, from Africa, the white as well as the colored. Yes, thousands will come and surround the table over there. And with one accord we all cry: "Amen, Even aso Come Lord Jesus."

with no Pentecostal work at all. At last the Lord told her to go there to the home of her sister, and in obedience to this leading she went, at once starting some, meetings. ## SAILED FOR CONGO

Brother and Sister Leader sailed for Gombari, Congo Belge, Nov. 12. The Lord graciously undertook in helping them to get their fare almost at the last moment. Let us accompany them with our prayers that they may have journeying mercies, and all needed equipment both physical and spiritual for the work that is ahead of them.


In law and reason the wool on sheep belongs to the owner of the sheep. If a man owned sheep, and sold them, he could not afterwards enforce a claim on the wool they might grow. The right in the wool follows the right in the sheep. The wool is an appurtenance growing out of the sheep. God's people are God's sheep. They are His by creation, by preservation, by redemption, by their own consent. There never was a better title to any property. This title holds the sheep and the wool. The sheep cannot hold property because they are property themselves. The wool is theirs only as their skins are theirs and their eyes and feet by way of accommodation. The supreme title is in God and this title holds against all comers.
We have made a poor study of the Bible if these simple truths have not lodged themselves in our hearts. Conversion comes simply as a recognition of the Divine ownership in us. It is an acceptance, on our part of our proper relation to our Creator and Redeemer.
The urgent question in the world today is: Who owns the wool? Or, to drop the figure, to whom does the property, the gold, the silver, the cattle and all belong? If that is settled on the right principle, the whole question of Christian living is far advanced towards a glorious settlement. Until it is settled, nothing is settled right. Or, in other words if we settle our financial relation to God on the right principle, our lives are bound up with God's in such a way that we can never go far wrong.
The mightiest controversy of the age is over "rights in wool." It is, or ought to be a controversy both in the pulpit and among Christians in the pews of every church in Christendom till God's right is admitted and acted on. To flinch on this fundamental doctrine is to trifle with the greatest practical question the world confronts. Let God's right to the wool of His own sheep, to say nothing of the hair of the goats-I say let God's right be settled, and we are at the opening of a new era. The triumphant march of God's army is slowed up, waiting for us to settle the wool question. There can be but one adjudication, and that is, that whosoever owns the sheep owns the wool also.

Shear the sheep? Yes, frequently and close. The pastors are the shepherds; and it is their business to feed the sheep, care for them, and shear them. A shepherd who neglects to shear the sheep ought to be turned off. He is an unfaithful servant of the Great Owner. Pastors need to face this question. They must face it for the time is at hand when pastors will be judged according to their works, not by their dignity or their pre-
tenses, but their work and one of the works is to shear the sheep.
But the question has two sides: God's side and our side. Is it not hard on the sheep to shear them? Not at all. It is good for them every way. If sheep are not sheared, they become unhealthy. How many of God's saints are surfeited with the things of this world! Their spirituality is smothered by a plethora of the things of this life. Many are sick because their lives have no outlet. Their affections are turned after their earthly possessions, and not set on things above. One of the best things a pastor can do for his people is to induce them to give liberally to the cause. He is doing the best thing for his people when he brings them to recognize their obligations to God in theit financial affairs.
So important is this matter in the churches and in the lives of the people, that it demands special and extremely earnest treatment. Some of the sheep must be cornered and crowded before they will submit to the process clearly taught in God's Word; but they must be sheared.
The question takes on another practical turn. Where our treasure is, there will our hearts be also. This is Christ's word fulfilled in every life. If sheep are not sheared they drop their wool, or the devil picks them. Alas! for the waste of God's money in the service of the world, the flesh and the devil-and this to the hurt of God's people. Sin costs more than religion. Bad habits cost far more than the most liberal giving to God's cause, if we count money, and what is more than money. Robbery of God is a horrible and undoing $\sin$. Giving to God has a wonderful power to bind the life to Him.
Next to redemption the greatest question in the Christian world to-day is the question of rights in wool. If God's sheep are properly sheared, they would abound in health, and countless missionaries could be sent, as torch bearers, to every benighted region of the globe. The tears of widows and orphans could be dried, the sick cared for, pastors supported, homes illuminated by the Word of God, and the world belted with the light of truth. This wool question is a tremendous issue in the hearts and lives of Christians and churches. If we settle God's right to the wool of His sheed. we settle the world's destiny. -J. B. Gambrell, in "Examiner."

## THANKSGIVING IN HUNGARY

Brother and Sister Raroha are now in Hungary, and are rejoicing that God has kept faithful a little company of people, who have passed through trying times of persecution from one of the denominational churches. But the Pentecostal fire is still burning in their hearts.

The first night that our brother and sister were at Darany Somogy Megye a number came to hear the truth, and as a result God worked, and encouraged the people to take their stand boldly for the gospel, three asking that they might be baptized. This meant a great deal since the public sentiment was very strong against the Pentecostal people, especially among those who belonged to other
churches. It was stated that if an attempt was made to baptize these converts our people would be chased out of town. However as Brother Raroha states: "Our God is able to deliver and can protect us from all the power of the enemy." The little procession started out towards the lake where the baptismal service was to take place, singing one of their favorite hymns as they went. "Paul the apostle did not tremble." The singing naturally attracted attention, until about 300 people must have gathered by the time the procession reached the water. Not a word of protest was raised as Brother Raroha preached to the crowd the blessed truths of salvation, the new birth and the Baptism in the Holy Spirit.
The devil however, sought to prevent from being present one earnest young girl of fifteen, who desired to be baptized. Her parents learning that she was planning to be baptized, locked her in her room, but like Elijah she prayed unto the Lord earnestly, and just as Brother Raroha was about to commence the service she came running breathlessly into the crowd, and soon reappeared from the tent with her white baptismal robe on to take her place with the rest. As she stood forth in turn to give her testimony concerning what the Lord had done for her, her brother who was standing back of her, tried to pull her away, and pleaded with her saying that she would disgrace the family, but the native preacher stepped up and asked the man to leave her alone, and not disturb the meeting, since the young woman was doing this of her own free will. God kept His hand on the meeting and prevented any further disturbance. At another village the people crowded into the house of an unconverted man where our brother and sister were staying, until there must have been about 150 present who had come to hear the "glad tidings of great joy that is to all people." Pray for the work in Hungary. Our brother and sister are in need of a folding organ for their work. If any one is able to donate this we are sure it will be a great help in their ministry.

## GOD'S FAITHFULNESS

Sister Harriett Dithridge, who has been laboring faithfully for a number of years in Tachikawa, Japan, states:-
"This work is not so well known in America, and very little money comes from over there in comparison with our needs. But yet always in some miraculous way God answers prayer and meets our requirements. Our needs amount to $\$ 272$ per month in addition to the missionary's living expenses. In the face of this consider that we get regularly from America about $\$ 150$ per month (which includes the missionary's allowance).
"In addition we need funds for the assembly (the Christians cannot meet all the expense), the kindergarten, the children's work, the village work, literature, etc. Considering all this, is not our God wonderful when I can truly say that He supplies every need? He lets us send a tenth of all to India. We pay cash for everything and are never in debt."
