His ardent desire was toward Him and, although in whatever direction he turned to find Him he was met with disappointment, yet his devotion to God and his confidence in God's devotion to him was enough to hold him steady, independent of his own feelings, until his testing time had passed and victory had come.

When love, desire, and devotion are combined in our hearts, we are in possession of that which will enable us to stand in any trial and which will hold us true to our course until it is finished, regardless of our natural human propensities and weaknesses. In the midst of the severest trial we can say:

"FACTS TO PONDER"

Is it well, about the time an offering for foreign missions is to be taken, to say, "Charity begins at home"?

Is it spiritual and Christian economy to argue that until the local work is well established it is folly to ask the church to give for missions, especially for foreign missions?

In 1832 the Baptists of Indiana separated on mission and anti-mission lines; each division numbering about 3,000 members. In 1852 twenty years later, the anti-mission Baptists still numbered about 3,000, while the missionary Baptists had increased to 37,-

In 1836 the Miami Baptist Association of Ohio divided on mission and anti-mission lines. Nineteen churches with 742 members excluded six churches with 441, for having the missionary

In 1888, fifty-two years later, the nineteen anti-mission churches had decreased to five (one has since died) the 742 members had decreased to 151, and not one of these churches had as many members as in 1836. Not only that, but not one had a settled pastor nor preaching more than once a month. But the six missionary churches, excluded fifty-two years before, had increased to sixty-five, were divided into two associations, and the 441 members had increased to 7,212.

In 1840 the Baptists of North Carolina separated on mission and antimission lines, the missionary Baptists numbering about 24,000 and the anti-missionary, 12,000. Fifty years later, in 1890, the anti-missionary Baptists of the state were still about 12,000, but the missionary Baptists had increased to 300,000.

Facts speak louder than words. "There is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty."-American Baptist Missionary Union.

AN EXPLANATION

We published a splendid article entitled "The Divine Purpose in Human Trial" by Ezra S. Gerig in the Evangel of April 6. This article was reprinted from the magazine *Christ Life* and through an oversight the *Christ Life* did not receive credit for the article. We wish to correct this matter.



The following brief suggestions are intended for the precious army of young men and women whose hearts are set toward the the whitened harvest fields. In the various full-gospel training schools, and in the homes of our people scattered abroad, there are hundreds of studious, enterprising young people who are earnestly endeavoring to prepare themselves for service upon the far-flung battle line. This is indeed encouraging, and augurs well for the future; but I would call attention to this well attested fact: We shall never learn to preach by going to school or by reading books. We may learn a great deal about it in this way, but We may learn a we can only learn to preach by preaching. Some one has said, "The only school that can successfully teach us the danger of fire is the one that raises

I would not underestimate the value of the splendid courses being given in the schools, nor the broadening effect of diligent study of the right kind of books; but I insist after all that the school of experience is the place where folk learn their most priceless lessons. In this school you are to spend, not a term of years, but, if Jesus tarries, the term of your natural life.

Learning to preach is like learning to play the piano-it requires practice as well as training, and the hours spent in practice are many more than those occupied with the teacher. Practice alone will not insure efficiency. Preachers, like musicians, are born, not made. Oh, it is possible to accomplish a measure of success by years of patient application; but, unless one is born with the requisite quality of soul, there will always be lacking that something for which no amount of training can compensate.

I have in mind now a certain individual with an ambition to be an accomplished musician. But it would seem that music was left out from among the component parts of her personality. She has labored for years, mastered all the rules, and studied technique under the best teachers; yet when she plays her hearers are conscious of a peculiar sensation, painful too, but impossible to describe.

But let us lose sight of the main fact that we started to illustrate. There are multitudes who will never be musicians although they are blessed with what might be termed the "born musician" talent, for the simple reason they will not apply themselves. In order to succeed in that field one must not only possess a musical soul, but have patience and perseverance in developing his special gift. Successful people in every walk of life are the ones with initiative and perseverance, those who have diligently applied themselves to the business in hand. Idlers and sluggards, however gifted, will always be found in the rear.

The value of dogged determination while pressing toward one's goal is brought out by the following story vouched for by Arthur Dean. story is of an armless golfer. "When this young man was nine years old he lost both arms in a railroad accident, but the accident did not even scratch his spirit of determination. After the misfortune, this lad went on the golf links as a caddie, and soon decided he would learn to play the game himself. This armless golfer uses any regular club, which he grips between his shoulder and his neck, bending over and twisting his trunk to make the shot. While it took fifteen years of practice and patience to work it out, he can now shoot a six 300 yard course in ninetyeight, drive one hundred thirty-five yards, and play his short stops with uncanny accuracy." Such a spirit directed toward efficiency in gospel service, and with the divine anointing upon it, would turn the world upside down, or rather, right side up.

Since men will labor hard and submit to most rigid self-discipline in order to succeed in the common and fleeting things of this life, should individuals called to the highest service in the world be less diligent? God for-

A God-ordained ministry is taken from among those with inherent ability for particular service, upon whom the Lord has laid His hand and placed His gift and anointing. Matt., 25:15. Oh, wonder of wonders that He should put His hand upon any of us! But let us ponder this tremendous fact. We may have both natural and supernatural gifts, and yet fail to develop a worthwhile ministry. In fact, we are sure to fail to do so if we do not apply ourselves. Unless we use our talents and invest our capital, we shall prove a liability to the church of Christ instead of an asset.

How loaded with instruction are these words of Paul to young Timothy: "Neglect not the gift that is in thee. which was given thee by prophecy with the laying on of the hands of the presbytery. Meditate upon these things. give thyself wholly to them, that thy profiting may appear to all.'

Take advantage of every opportunity to speak forth the message that is upon your heart. If you fail - you probably will at times—don't be discouraged, but learn why. If you succeed, or at least feel that you have scored a real hit, then look yourself over for a peculiar "chesty" feeling, and read in your Bible once again the account of Herod's last speech.

We should remember that sermons that are really blessed to ourselves and others after all may not be quite perpect. Learn something from every sermon you preach or hear. When criticizing others, search yourself for traces of the same errors.

If you have no opportunity to preach, make one, but not by pressing yourself into another's place under the pretext that the Lord sent you to take his pulpit. I had the misfortune to meet a few preachers of this type a few years ago, and they are still nosing around looking for a place to minister. Angels, saints, and mankind in general should know that men or women who will resort to political intrigue in their efforts to make a preaching place for themselves automatically forfeit every right to respect as ministers or followers of Christ.

Jesus said, "Go into all the world and preach," and there is no inference that He expects us to wait for the world to send for us. We may go on the streets, into jails, private homes, or country schoolhouses. Go some place any place—but preach.

I heard not long ago of a man who insisted that God had called him to preach. His wife said to him, "Now, if you are called to preach, get up and preach to us; try yourself out at home." He promptly obeyed, and got a real

The Beauties of the Redeemer

Thou art fairer than the children of men: grace is poured into Thy lips: therefore God hath blessed Thee forever. Psalm 45:2.

David, the once shepherd boy, was well qualified to make such a prophetic statement. In his writings about the Redeemer he often referred to His sorrows and to His humiliation, but he also had much to say of His joys and triumphs. He loved the Lord and he could truthfully say, "My heart is fixed, O God; my heart is fixed; I will sing and give praise."

The Beauty of Christ's Person In the person of Christ we have beauty defined. In Him were assembled graces and truth that made Him indeed pleasing to the undefiled eye. In speaking of our first parents it is said that they were created in the image of God, which may be understood as saying that they were surpassingly beautiful, not only in form but in their moral and intellectual character as well. But through transgression man's person became defiled and polluted, so that throughout the generations there have been plainly visible upon men the deep-lined marks of sin. But God, in preparing a sacrifice for sin, a second Adam, produced again a perfect Man, even Christ the Redeemer. Through sin, the first Adam became spoiled as a thing of beauty; in the second Adam also there was no beauty that we should desire Him, but this was said after He, too, had been spoiled by the abuses wicked men heaped upon Him through sin.

His Wisdom and Knowledge

Even at the early age of twelve the doctors of the law and the other men of learning in the temple, as He sat among them "both hearing them and asking them questions," were thoroughly astonished at His wisdom. To Him the Law was an open book. The prophecies concerning Himself and concerning His ministry He could readily explain. But more than this, we read that after the temple incident at Nazareth, where He was subject to His parents, He still "increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man.'

In His moral nature we see humanity in its glorious perfection-not a flaw, not a trace of weakness, not an error. He was reviled but He reviled not again. Notwithstanding all the guile by which His enemies sought to trap Him in His words time after time, they successively failed. At His

trial even the Roman judge declared, "I find no fault in Him." Indeed Paul says of Him that He is the "wisdom of God.'

His Conversation

"Grace is poured into Thy lips." Christ is our perfect example in the proper use of words. Indeed God anointed Him as such, "poured grace into His lips." The Holy Spirit rested on Him. His were not idle words. His conversations were not upon useless, valueless subjects, but always were full of grace and truth, accompanied with mighty convincing power. His words cheered the down-hearted and faint, and brought light to the benighted. "Wonderful words of life."

One day as Christ sat alone at Jacob's well, there came a woman of Samaria for water. At once from anointed lips Christ began to pour forth to her words of truth. Deeply moved, forgetful of her waterpot, she hastened to the village, broadcasting the message, "Come, see a man that told me all that ever I did." Thus this little conversation with the woman became the means of a great revival. His words were powerful.

On another occasion shortly after the Resurrection, two disciples were walking, very sad. Christ joined them and began to speak words to them that fairly burned in their hearts. They did not recognize Him to be the Christ until they sat at meat; but when He blessed the bread they knew it was He. He is our example in conversa-

His Reign

"Therefore hath God blessed Thee forever." Not only was the Christ who was sacrificed for our sin, perfect in beauty, and our perfect example in morals, in wisdom, and in conversation, but He is our coming King. He is yet to complete the work the Father willed that He should do.

Our Only Pattern

In this beautiful text, as also throughout the Book of Psalms, I see that Christ is our only pattern. It is the natural tendency of the human family to pattern after one another. From patterning after each other it is only a step to laying on others the responsibility that is our own. God called on Adam to give account for his sin he answered, "The woman Thou gavest me." Ask a non-churchgoer the reasons for his neglect, and usually he will refer to some one who has stepped aside from the path of duty.

Brother, Christ is your example. Who has not thought with scorn of the way Adam sought safety from the frown of God by laying the blame on Eve? In the breast of the true man there is something that makes him prefer bearing the evil results of his own sins, rather than to try to escape responsibility by implicating another. Even an ordinarily decent crook will refuse to give the name of his partner in crime, even though he is told that thereby his own wrong will be overlooked. Christ in setting us an example went beyond quietly bearing the punishment for sins of which He was not guilty. Not being guilty He bore the punishment of those who were

My message to you is that you begin looking upward. Do not look at your fellow men nor to any church organization for your pattern, or for some one to bear your blame, but look to Jesus, the perfect sacrifice for sin, the perfect example, the perfect burden bearer, the One who bore the punishment for your sins and stands eagerly ready to let you go free. Thousands, yea, millions have accepted Him, why not you? Is He sufficient for you? Are you willing just now to cast in your lot with Him?

change. No longer did the light spring from some outward source, a reflected glory, but now it came from within, an inherent beauty, bursting forth from a soul just born. A new day had indeed dawned, a brilliant, radiant, glorious day, for the Sun of righteousness had at last arisen in her heart.

Friends, does the story of Mrs. Tseung as depicted here seem too dark? It is not, for I personally have witnessed the triumphs of the gospel in many such cases. In truth she is only one of earth's millions who at this present moment are experiencing these very pangs of paganism-infanticide, child slavery, opium suicide, and demon possession, yea, and other pangs also—pangs unthinkable, unmention-able. Ah! "the dark places of the earth are full of the habitations of cruelty."

Should not the sobbing of a thousand million souls stir our own hearts to more intense sacrifice, that those living in this darkness might have the chance to hear what we have heard the glorious gospel of eternal dawn! Of these thousand million souls, fifty million die every year—one hundred thousand every day, sixty-six every minute. Every tick of your watch records the passing of a soul into eternal night. And they die in this darkness because they have never heard of Him who is the Light.

Do we say that we have no funds with which to evangelize them? Protestant Christianity holds in its possession more than thirty billion dollars. One per cent of this would be three hundred million dollars. This sum could equip an army of one hundred twenty-six thousand workers, who could evangelize the world in one year, giving every one at least the oppor-

tunity of being saved. If they never do have that opportunity, who shall be held responsible? Listen! God says, "Thou shalt hear the word at My mouth and warn them from Me. When I say unto the wicked, O wicked man, thou shalt surely die; if thou dost not speak to warn the wicked from his way, that wicked man shall die in his iniquity; but his blood will I require at thine hand." Ezek. 33:7, 8. "God save us from the crime of crimes—the blood of souls."

In sending your question for this column address your letter: Question and Answer Editor, 336 W. Pacific St., Springfield, Mo.

96. Please explain Ecc. 5:1. "Keep thy foot when thou goest to the house of God, and be more ready to hear, than to give the sacrifice of fools: for they consider not that they do evil."

It means that one should be careful of one's conduct and remember where one is going when one goes to the house of God. Let there be sobriety, spiritual mindedness, reverence, and a desire to learn spiritual things, and to enjoy spiritual worship. The sacrifice of fools may be foolish talking about spiritual things.

97. Please explain Gen. 4:7. "And unto thee shall be his desire, and thou shalt rule over him."

Many believe these words contain a promise that, if Cain were obedient to God, he should not lose his rights as first-born over Abel, but would be forgiven for his past failure if he brought a sin offering. The Revised Version, which I now quote, seems strongly to indicate that it is sin which Cain is exhorted to overcome, "If thou doest well, shall it not be lifted up? and if thou doest not well, sin coucheth at the door; and unto thee shall be its desire; but do thou rule over it."

98. Please explain Rev. 19:10; 22:

These verses do not mean that the angel was a redeemed sinner, but that he was a fellow servant of God, doing His will, as were also God's servants, the prophets. John in both these instances made the mistake of doing homage to an angel, while only God is to be worshiped.

99. What scriptures show that oil represents the Holy Spirit?

Some of the places where oil is used as a type of the Holy Spirit are: Oil for the lights in the candlestick. Ex. 27:20. Oil for anointing the priest. Ex. 29:7. Oil in the wafer of fine flour. Lev. 2:5.

100. Please explain, "But woe unto them that are with child, and to them that give suck in those days." Luke 21:23.

The remaining part of this verse, and verse 24 show clearly that the time referred to was the destruction of Jerusalem. It warns of the added burden and difficulty which these conditions would bring. This verse does not in any sense mean that a mother, either real or prospective will be rejected by the Lord for that reason when He comes for His own.

and baptized with the Holy Ghost has drifted back, but has then repented, ought he to seek the Holy Ghost the second time? I have never been satisfied since I have repented again, and always seem so weak.

The restoration of the backslider is often much more a step of faith with less of feeling, than when he first came to the Lord. Having known the way of faith, God requires that he exercise the same rather than depend on feelings. But such a person should press on through in faith unto full assurance of faith and to the fullness of the Holy Ghost.

102. Is it wrong for a saved person to listen to worldly music over the radio?

I believe there is music over the radio other than sacred which one might properly listen to. But there is also some that one is much better off by tuning out. One's own heart must become largely his moderator as to

this. But let me warn, be careful about wasting precious time by spending too much of it with the radio.

(Continued from Page Five) response from his wife and mother-in-law. That is what I would call a real test. A man who can preach his first sermon to his wife and mother-in-law with any degree of inspiration should be a great success in the pulpit.

While it is true that the Lord delivers "His goods" "to every man according to his several ability," it is also true that God-called men are often slow in stepping out in gospel work because they cannot recognize in themselves the qualities which they regard as essential for leadership. Even Moses argued with God about his deficiency. I was impressed by the testimony of one of my friends who for some time had been feeling the call to preach. He told the Lord that he was not the type of man who should be called for that service. He also volunteered the information to the Lord that the Lord should look for strong, wise men for such an undertaking, and that he on his part would work hard and help support such a ministry. The Lord, however, would not accept this very reasonable compromise, and the burden to preach kept increasing. Finally he opened his Bible at the first chapter of First Corinthians, and his eyes fell upon these lines: "For ye see your calling, brethren, how that not many wise men after the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble, are called, but God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise, and God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things that are mighty, and base things of the world and things which are despised, hath God chosen; yea, and things which are not, to bring to nought things that are, that no flesh should glory in His presence!" He closed the book and said, "Lord, I'm your man."

Men of extraordinary ability are a great blessing to the world when they are wholly yielded to God, but the world has developed only a few such men, and they have wrecked its civilization as often as they have saved it. There is a measure of encouragement in considering the fact that the big end of the world's work has ever been done by the common people.

Ordinary men, with concentration of purpose and unflagging zeal and devotion, have often accomplished extraordinary things. Shall we not stir into flame the gifts that are in us, and move forward with renewed determination to be and to do our best for the Lord and a world in need?

CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE AND MISSIONS F. M. Boyd

Central Bible Institute continues to make its contribution to the work of extending the kingdom of God in obedience to the great commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Wherever a group of Christian people are associated in home, assembly, or school, there is in consequence of this very contact, character development. This is vitally important. But in addition to this the paramount reason for our existence as a school is to send the gospel to the regions where Christ is not named. This was the ambition and purpose of the great missionary apostle Paul and if ever we as a Pentecostal fellowship cease to function in this direction it will be fitting to write over us Ichabod—"the glory is departed."

Out of the student body of Central Bible Institute since its

Out of the student body of Central Bible Institute since its inception there are twenty-five missionaries, mostly members of its five graduating classes, now laboring among foreign peoples; seven in India; seven in Africa; three in Japan; three among the Mexicans; two in Palestine; one in Hawaii; one in Russia; and one in Porto Rico.

The year just closed was a banner missionary year. Of the class whose picture appears on this page twenty-five have definite calls to the "regions beyond" and the way is beginning to open for a number of this class of '29, with several of the classes of '27 and '28, to go to the field this year. Miss Blanche Appleby, Miss Esther Bender, Miss Lula Bell Hough, Miss Ellen Birch, Miss Pearl Pickel, Miss Martha Thompson, and Mr. Lawrence Mc-Kinney are looking to the Lord for support, passage, and outfit for China; Miss Anne Eberhardt, Miss Lydia Vaux, and Mr.

Donald Foote are hoping to reach India; Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Collins and Miss Una Keeling to Latin America; and Mr. Emil Bernaldes to his native land, the Philippines.

This year the C. B. I. student body pledged \$6,250 for missions. Pledges made in previous years, with the exception of a very small amount, are all in, and up to the close of the school year over \$3,000 of the current pledge had been paid in. The balance will be realized during the summer months. This money, through co-operation with our Foreign Missions Department, has been and will be used to meet pressing needs on the field and to assist prospective missionaries to reach the field.

Our students who are not specifically called to foreign lands leave the atmosphere of the Institute burning with the fire of evangelism and purpose, to establish home centers here and there from which sinews for the missionary war at home and abroad may be supplied.

We wish that our fellowship might drop in on us and witness the enthusiasm of the student body in their high calling as ambassadors of the coming King. Will you not pray for those whose names have been mentioned that their needs will be speedily met, so that they may go forth to herald the glad tidings of Christ's saving grace and of His soon return. How much this groaning world needs His visible presence to right its wrongs and to govern it righteously. There are still some to be called out to be associated with Him in the place of rulership in the millennial age. Shall we not rally our forces, our prayers, our every resource to speedily fulfill our evangelistic mission?

The Gospel in Foreign Lands

OPPORTUNITY George M. Kelley

Shakespeare was correct when he said, "Better three hours too soon than one minute too late." The Chinese have a saying translated as follows: "The gods cannot help a man who loses opportunity.' These statements have been proved true in every walk of life, for opportunity comes to us once and is gone forever. "May he be the first fruits of a great harvest," is the prayer recorded in Robert Morrison's diary. This man, one of Scotland's noble sons, the first Protestant missionary to China, revealed his heart-longing in the short sentence quoted above, and all those who have followed him during the eighty years which have elapsed, say with him, "great harvest Lord."

The year 1900 was a crisis year in the history of Christian work in China and the people pledged themselves, that the thousands of Chinese and the 221 missionaries who sealed their testimony with their life's blood, should not have died in vain. The church seized the opportunity, resulting in more centers being opened in twenty years after the Boxer movement, than had been established in the previous ninety-three years. The years 1925-28 have also been crisis years—but shall we make good the oportunities afforded us in 1929?

God raises up government officials to carry out His purposes. The Chinese Government is no exception to this rule. Hundreds of miles of public roads are being built, and over three million dollars worth of automobiles are imported in one year. Two large wireless stations have lately been completed, and radio fans in China find great pleasure in listening in on their powerful radio sets to the Manila band or Japanese Orchestra. So fast have come the reforms in South China since the bloody days of December, 1927, that the most optimistic among us, are overwhelmed with amazement. We did not think it possible-but in two short years the impossible has been done, and, we believe, in the ordering of the Lord. Will the church awake to this time when the Lord is calling for reapers to gather in the "great harvest"?

The Chinese people have been worshiping idols for hundreds of years. Taoism was founded B. C. 570 and hase been debased into a ritual embodying a polytheistic mixture of demonology and witchcraft. Buddhism was introduced into China in the first Christian century. It is not easily distinguished from Taoism, for often the Buddhist borrow the deities of Taoist temples in order that their temples may be more popular. Imagine the consternation caused in the little town 20 miles above us when the soldiers under direct orders from their commander, entered the temple where 10,000 people come yearly for hours of devotion, and trained their machine gun on the most famous idol of the temple, and emptied a belt of cartridges! This is not an unusual case, but one of the daily happenings all over

these districts. Superstition is being trampled out by the strong hand of the government, and we feel the way is being paved for the answer to the prayers of the missionaries to send "a great harvest." Shall we be able to arise and meet the present challenge?

In the year 1928, 63,000 tracts, 7,500 New Testament portions and 1,500 New Testaments were distributed from our Sainam headquarters. Our missionaries making these distributions did so with discrimination. Our Chinese magazine is visiting every province and the dependancies of China but one. This monthly is the only Chinese Pentecostal magazine published in China, therefore we have an unlimited field of service in this sphere alone. Time and space will not permit my recording the unsolicited testimonials of our readers in ten different denominations who speak of the paper as filling a great spiritual need. We have seven assemblies, the oldest of these being sixteen years old. Our evangelistic effort outside our church has been signally blessed of the Lord during the past two years. The largest churches of the province, the university and largest high school of Canton City gave me an invitation to speak in their precincts, and audiences amounting to 1,000 in number came to hear the messages from the Lord. I have invitations now to Baptist and Presbyterian churches but cannot accept them. In the convention conducted at Canton this past summer it was a beautiful sight to see hundreds stand to their feet in this denominational church and ask for prayer that they might be filled with the Holy Spirit as the apostles were on the day of Pentecost. Are we as a movement holding forth the last day truths, ready to take advantage of the opportunities offered us in South China at this moment?

Canton City's population is reckoned at one million two hundred and fifty thousand. It is the terminus of the West River Valley. This valley has a popula-tion of over eighty-three million souls. Two assemblies are now being conducted in Canton City, the largest of which will not accommodate all of the Christians. In our congregations the leading denominations are represented, and among the attendants at early morning prayers are some of the foremost Christians of these churches. In conducting one of our special meetings for Christians in this city we were compelled to borrow a Baptist church as the hall was too small to accommodate the people who desired the truths we present from the Word. We believe therefore, the time is here when we must make a forward move in this great Eastern metropolis. As Canton is strictly a cosmopolitan city-every language of China and of most Western and European countries are to be found here -we know of no better place to secure help for the evangelization of the region assigned to us. Already a start in the direction indicated has been made. A

band of energetic young people are organized, the two assemblies have assented to the proposition to unite in one great battle line in this important center, and we have the endorsement of sixteen mission stations in South China. Now is the time to act.

Reverend H. K. Needham of Los Angeles, California, knowing that we were making plans for a forward step in the work of the Lord in South China, approached a man who had a Radio Broadcasting station, and the owner kindly consented to make us a present of his station, valued at about \$7,000. His son is also willing to come and install the plant and possibly take charge of it for us. How wonderfully the Lord has arranged this matter without our making public our desires for such an instrument. In the same way we are confident He will arrange for everything connected with this work of aggressive evangelism.

It will be an easy matter to raise the funds to finance the building of our tabernacle in Canton. We have never seen such enthusiasm as was manifest by the constituency. With the meager allowances given our workers monthly, one would find it difficult to meet one's daily need, yet they gladly gave a month's allowance to the building fund. Many of the elderly people have given their life's savings. One business man in Hongkong, a Baptist brother, gladly gave us his offering of \$300. We have now over \$2,000 toward the new church, all given by Chinese Christians. They have done their best, they can do very little more than they have done-it remains therefore for those of God's people who have been our supporters for these eighteen years, to get under the burden with us. Don't say that it is too risky-over 30,000 business people from across the sea are risking their capital, yea, their very lives in China and they call it an "investment." These men have nothing in view but worldly rewards -can we remain inactive and give as an excuse, that it is too risky in these days of uncertainty? Have we less faith than they? May I ask, Do they have more love for the uncertain riches of life than we do for the eternal souls of men? Tobacco companies will "risk" more than fifteen million dollars (local currency) in ready-made cigarettes, in one year, and send their agents broadcast throughout China. How long shall we wait-or shall we be able to shake ourselves from our lethargy and prove to the world that we are equal to this present opportunity? I answer-"YES."

A young business man in the South Sea Islands recently gave \$30,000 toward the erection of a church in Canton City, as a memorial to his father. An ex-priestess, member of the church of Sainam, gave \$10.00 for the church building in Canton and though she has had to eat banana peelings in order to save the amount—the man who gave the large amount will hardly get more joy out of contributing than she got out of making her gift. I am quite

sure that Jesus will say of her, "She hath given more than ye all." Whatsoever He saith unto you do it.

over the head and thus breaking up one of our classes entirely. We just looked to the Lord, knowing that as He stilled the wind and the sea, He could stop their mouths, and surely He did. We haven't seen or heard of them since, and all of the boys are back. How they do drink in the Word. Pray especially for these children.

Hongkong, South China Ralph Phillips

The sister I wrote of last month who was dying, passed away to be with the Lord a few days after we last visited her. She left a testimony behind her that all was well, and that she knew God had accepted her. She had asked for a Christian burial, but as her folks would not accede to this, they all being heathen, we were not permitted to have a Christian service for her. 
