HAD my first awakening through my second eldest brother, who at the age of fourteen one evening knelt in a summerhouse and prayed to God to give him a pure

heart and to show him whether his name was in the Book of Life. At that time I was in my twelfth year. Yet as I was unwilling to confess my sins to those against whom I had sinned, I passed through the same experience as David: "When I kept silence, my bones waxed old through my roaring all the day long." Powers of darkness were constantly surrounding me and filled my soul with terrible fear, so that at times I was nearing despair, when in my sixteenth year I threw myself, all helpless, at the feet of Jesus and confessed my sins. At first I confessed to my dear mother that I had sinned against her, then I told our neighbors that I had stolen pears and cherries out of their gardens which I then had eaten in secret. And as I then, all helpless, lay before God I could accept for myself in child-like simplicity the word of God: "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow." His peace entered my heart like a river; the holy fire of the saving Love of Jesus began to burn within me and became ever brighter until the present day. It is true, the Tempter has often endeavored to make me stumble, and sometimes, I am sorry to say, he succeeded. But the Lord let me also experience that His word is truth: "Resist the devil and he will flee from you." It was essential to watch and pray, and this is what we must do right to the end of our life. We shall also experience: "Whosoever abideth in Him, sinneth not," and "They go from strength to strength." In those earlier days I had the privilege, besides the daily round of duty, to nurse my dear mother on her sick-bed for several years. Through God's grace and mercy she was restored to health because she followed the example of that "certain woman" of old: in faith she touched the hem of His garment. After her recovery I was released at home. At first I was allowed to be the handmaid of my Master in Rastenburg (East Prussia) for two years in meetings, Sunday school and house-to-house visiting. There I also became acquainted with the sufferings and misery of the people both inwardly and outwardly. After this, I did service as a nurse in Hamburg for three years and learned much in dealing with souls. Going from house to house I waited upon the poor God-thirsting souls, read the Word to them and prayed with them. I found much misery and distress in mansions as well as in base-

CALLED TO CHINA

When I was eleven years old, a leaflet, giving a short description of China and the great need of the heathen, had fallen into my hands. The injunction at the end was, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature!" Now I had been a missionary child from my earliest days, inasmuch as my mother who had received me, her only daughter, from the Lord in answer to prayer, had at once laid me again on the altar to be His in the holy missionary calling. And it has become a matter of necessity to me to win souls and to enlist them for our glorious King of Missions and His great cause. Yet years passed by ere I could go myself. I had to pass through difficulties and through much prayer; yet again and again I heard the word in my heart: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature!" There were defeats, but also much victory, until the Spirit of God had prepared me for the Master's plans. He first sent me to England in 1891, where I spent one year in China Inland Mission for training. In 1892 I was allowed through God's wonderful grace to go out to the mission field in China, where I served the Mission for seven years. When I returned home for furlough and visited my people, Pastor Coerper asked me to become a member of the newly-

founded "German Branch of the China Inland Mission," later known as "The Liebenzeller Mission," whose director he was. I was thankful to the Lord that I was sent to be a witness to many friends of the need of China's millions and to arouse missionary interest. Not only in Germany but also in Switzerland and wherever the Lord bade me go, in churches and chapels, in large halls and in the humble dwellings of country people, in barns and woods, before high and low, poor and rich, I became a witness of our Saviour's love. So I traveled and did service in the interest of the Mission year after year. In 1911 I followed the invitation of some evangelists to go to Russia to preach the gospel to the German colonists who more than a hundred years before had emigrated there. The Lord directed me first to Riga, Libau, Reval, Dorpat, Pernau and other places as far as Moscow. After that I continued my service in Samara and Saratow on the Volga, then on the Don River and finally in the Crimea until war broke out in 1914.

THE OUTBREAK OF THE GREAT WAR AND ITS TERROR

We read of the Day of the Lord that it will come unawares as a snare on all them that dwell on the face of the whole earth. So this war came. In the evening everybody, without anticipating the least danger, lay down to rest and at midnight the Cossacks rode through the streets shouting, "War has broken out!" And as in the last days men's hearts will fail them for fear and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth, so it was with the people of the large village of M. in the Crimea, where I lived with the German pastor, M. Pale and shivering for fear, many came only half clothed to the parsonage imploring, "Oh, pray, do pray with us!" Also such came to whom Christianity and going to meetings had been a matter of ridicule, even such as had openly been scoffers. But now their hearts' anguish was great; they per-ceived that the one thing needful was lacking in them. I have often noticed how at such times the mere outward show of religion and all adopted Christianity vanishes and how people will

lose their senses for fear. I saw also that at such times it is impossible for people to get converted and to free themselves from Satan's fetters. Oh, that in the time of grace which the Lord still grants us we may wholly take our stand on His side, before it is too late! Jesus, our great High Priest, offers us His grace freely and lovingly: "He that is athirst let him come; he that will, let him take the water of life freely!" How often, too, I was reminded of the foolish virgins who went "to them that sell" in order to buy oil for their empty lamps and vessels. But it was too late forever! And whenever I think of the lost I am reminded of the word, "Oh, that mine eyes were a fountain of tears, that I might weep night and day for the slain of the daughter of my people!" And after death, what will it be!—I have not enough tears in my eyes to weep over their misery and wretchedness when in hell.

These were days and hours of tribulation and suffering, especially for us German subjects, but also for all tradespeople, shopkeepers and the well-to-do. Villages and towns, houses and shops, all were searched; there was destruction, robbery and murder in many places. Many were sent into banishment in Siberia and all who were suspected to be spies were to be taken to certain places to be hanged or shot. O dear readers, I can assure you, at such times there are others things standing before our eyes and we no longer regard the rubbish the world offers us. Then we get awakened inwardly; we get out of the giddy life of this world. There eternity in all its stern reality arises before our soul and we no longer trifle with sin, nor with things divine.

Soon it was rumored, "All Germans who are not Russian subjects will be hanged or shot, and that whoever harbors a German without reporting him to the authorities will fare the same way." The next day the police began to make their own war in the most ruthless manner.

Just one instance—quite near to us a German family lived, industrious people with five dear little children. In the morning as the father was feeding the cattle, policemen arrested him and took him away. His wife could only just call after him: "Good bye, my dear husband!" In the evening of the same day the police also took the mother away. Her five children ran after the carriage with outstretched arms, crying in the courtyard: "Mother, mother, do take me along with you!" But she could not do it. How her heart must have bled at the sight of her children realizing that she per-

haps might never see them again! She was taken away in an opposite direction to that of her husband. Everything they had was taken from them, their camels, cattle, horses and everything in the house. The five children also were sent away into quite another district. Many houses of those who were thus transported were set on fire. Similar outrages were perpetrated in many other places. The misery was indescribable. All German subjects and many other people were thus treated. It was a cruel system to separate the members of a family and to send them into quite different parts of Siberia. Yet the great God Almighty permitted these things. If His goodness cannot lead us to repentance He will use the rod of punishment; but in all there is love. He tries by all means to draw us to Himself and to transform us into His image, as that alone will be acknowledged by Him. Many people I came in touch with were without a personal Saviour and therefore, being unstable in their inner man, lost all faith in God. Many put an end to their lives because despair laid hold of them, for mere outward religion and profession, "I believe in God and Jesus," does not carry us through, but we must really possess Him. "I in you and you in Me," saith the Lord.

Churches, schools and meetings, all were closed. Pastor E., in whose district I often conducted meetings, requested me not to show myself often in the streets but rather to remain at home. He hoped the war would end within a few months and that the Germans would win. After most anxious suspense by day and night for months some one betrayed my presence to the authorities. The sheriff appeared in the courtyard with three or four policemen and an official report was drawn up. He asked me: "You have conducted meetings?" I answered in the affirmative and being asked what I had been speaking about I was able to give a testimony. Then he said, "You are nothing but a spy, and I shall get at you." I was even ignorant of what spies were doing, yet I could not say a word in reply. I thought of the Lamb of God that opened not His mouth when He was reviled. In such situations you learn to keep silent and not to try to justify yourself with even one word; but why do we not learn to do so in our daily life? How much blessing the Lord would be able to bestow upon us if we would accept all adversities silently with thanksgiving out of God's hand and not out of the hand of men, thus being transformed into the likeness of the Lamb! We should indeed become a savor of life unto life to many.

TRANSPORTED INTO SIBERIA

A policeman with loaded rifle had to stand before my room while I packed up my things. I shook and trembled, but I was conscious of the sustaining and protecting love of my Saviour. The possibilities of being shot or hanged next hour brings eternity very near to you. When the official put my precious Bible into his pocket everything seemed to have been taken from me and I could have cried out in agony. This was in January, 1915. I had to get into a vehicle, into which the official also entered. After a while we arrived at his house where I was shut up in a very small cellar. I sat on my things till the next morning, and I could not sleep much; yet my Saviour sat beside me and comforted me as no man can comfort. Truly if I had not had Him in my heart I might perhaps have committed suicide, as many others did, and yet the assurance of His presence was my strength. In the early morning I was escorted by the police to the railway station, and now a journey of five to six days' duration commenced. We traveled day and night. Bread and water were my daily sustenance and I experienced again the word of God: "His bread shall be given him; his waters shall be sure." By day the policeman repeatedly opened the door of the compartment so that a great many people could look at me during the journey. These called out, "Spy, spy!" "German dog" was my common appellation. I could not but keep quiet and pray for these poor people, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." So I went on into an absolutely dark future. If I had not known the Lord as my light even in darkness, I certainly should have perished, like so many, in my misery. But I was able to trust the all-knowing, all-seeing Shepherd and Comforter who never forsakes His own. Finally the train stopped at a town where I, with many others who had been driven thither from all parts of Russia, was crowded into a prison court with high walls. I had to go to the second floor and there, in a corridor, I had to undress and a female prison warden searched me closely for money or gold which might be sewed up in my clothes. A door was then unlocked and I had to enter. There was a small hole like a bull's-eye in the door, through which I looked to see what they would do with my clothes and luggage. They searched everything and appropriated whatever they thought fit, the rest they threw into my cell. With me there were five other women. There were no beds or chairs nor a table in the room. 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The Purpose for Co-operation

"How should one chase a thousand, and two put ten thousand to flight, except their Rock had sold them, and the Lord had shut them up?" This scripture comprehends all that church organization means. One, with God, can chase a thousand, but two with God can put ten thousand to flight.

Every one has his limitations and beyond these he is helpless. He must rely on others to do what he cannot do. Henry Ford alone could not build thousands of autos in a year, but the organization which he manages does. He knows his limitations and employs others to do what he cannot do.

No one of us can accomplish alone the command of Christ to evangelize the one billion seven hundred million souls on earth. Nevertheless, the challenge stands, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." But, the challenge is not to the individual alone—it is to the individual as a part of a growing and serving church. A pebble dropped on the surface of the sea will cause but a little ripple, but the upheaval of a mass of the ocean bed will cause a tidal wave. An individual ministry will cause a comparatively small stir, but the larger the combined effort, the more widespread will be the result.

In the local church, a pastor is a vital factor, but his ministry has its limitations. Were he to be Sunday school teacher, superintendent, young people's leader, board of deacons, and sole worker in a church it would follow that the growth of the church would be limited to the extent of his personal ability. But let him fill his God-appointed place of overseer and surround himself with those equipped to fill the various needs of the church and there is no limitation to the possibilities in the development and usefulness of the church.

Then, there is the larger phase—a world for Christ. One local church can only send out as many evangelists and missionaries as its membership is able to support, but combine that church with other churches in a larger cooperative effort and the possibilities are multiplied.

Of course there is the danger of too much and too complicated organization. It seems difficult for man to strike a proper level in these things. Either he is unwilling to recognize the value and purpose of organized effort or else the machinery of the organization absorbs his whole attention until he loses sight of the central purpose, which in the church is the universal exaltation of Christ.

The grave danger which has beset and ruined many church organizations spiritually is that, when the machinery has been set in order, the spirit of human self-sufficiency and dependence upon the machinery itself has supplanted dependence upon God. In these organizations ecclesiastical hierarchy has become the dominant factor and human zeal the motive power. Such a condition is not spiritual nor Scriptural, and it is not to be wondered at that many of those who have come out of such human inventions have swung to the other extreme through fear of ecclesiastical bondage.

But one extreme is just as dangerous as another. No organization means chaos and confusion; dependence alone on organization means spiritual stagnation. We must have an organization strong enough to establish right relations between each part. With this we must recognize that the vital spark which alone can quicken the church into life and action is the Holy Spirit.

Our task is clear—the challenge is before us, the challenge to co-operate to the fullest extent that we, under the unction, power and demonstration of the Holy Ghost, may give to the world the full gospel message. One can chase a thousand, but two can put ten thousand to flight.

Let intellecutal and spiritual culture progress, and let the human mind expand, as much as it will: beyond the grandeur and the moral elevation of Christianity, as it sparkles in the Gospels, the human mind will not advance.-Goethe.

Choosing Deliverance

"Wilt Thou Be Made Whole?"

The sun lay low and hot over Jerusalem. By the sheep gate, at the pool which is called Bethesda, was much suffering. All five porches, and every available bit of space between them, and indeed all the way down to the edge of the pool, it was crowded with a multitude of sick, blind, halt and palsied folks. The heavy atmosphere was weighted with the stench of open sores, and the moans of those whose pain cried out for relief could be heard afar.

One man seemed to be alone; crippled and deformed, he lay huddled in a disconsolate heap, waiting for the troubling of the waters, with the half-hopeful air of stolid patience. He had suffered this infirmity for thirty-eight years. Whatever were his inner thoughts, they were interrupted by the appearance at his side of a Man. He wondered if some one had come at last to befriend him, to help him into the troubled waters of the pool that he might be healed?

"Wilt thou be made whole?" asked the Stranger.

The cripple looked wistfully up into His face, and saw reflected there a look of compassion utterly new to him and a smile that so warmed his heart that his impulse to complain against his lot was changed to one of eager hope. Looking up into the face of his benefactor he said, "Sir, I have no man, when the water is troubled, to put me into the pool; but while I am coming another steppeth down before me."

Replying, the Stranger said, "Rise, take up thy bed, and walk!"

Even as he heard the words, something ran through every fiber of his being, giving him the consciousness of strength. He knew he was made whole, and leaped to his feet. Picking up his bed, he left the scene of so many hours of hopeless suffering a happy, healthy man.

This man had his opportunity to choose between healing or sickness when Jesus asked him, "Wilt thou be made whole?" and he chose wisely. And you, too, dear reader, have your choice to make. "Wilt thou be made whole?" If you are sick or afflicted, the question is addressed to you.

But you say, "Of course, I want to be healed in God's time, but it is mine to wait until God moves, not to make the choice of time myself." But God has chosen to heal you now. His time is when you receive Him as Healer. It is your move next; you yourself must make the choice. Jesus stands before you as He did on the day He appeared beside this sick man at Bethesda, and His words to you are the same, "Wilt thou be made whole?"

Perhaps you are as one of the multtude at Bethesda who were not healed. Their expectation was fixed on the pool, upon which their eyes were fastened. Or perhaps you keep on in the way this man started out, with his "Sir, I." Forget that "I"! You are not a peculiar case. It is no harder and no easier for the Lord to heal you than to heal the rest of us. He neither makes a pet of you nor neglects you for others. Listen to His words of questioning, laded with love and touched with pathos, "Will you take the blessing I offer? Will you believe in Me? Or will you, like so many others, turn away to await the troubling of the waters of some pool where some one is said to have been healed some time? Will you go on in your sickness or will you listen to Me?" All this and more is wrapped up in the words spoken to this man.

But you say, "I have never understood it that way. I've been praying for healing, and wanting deliverance ever since my trouble began, and now you say I am to choose whether I am to be well or not. What do you mean?"

Simply this, faith is an act! Not a quart, a pound, or a yard of something of which one may have much or little, but it is your spiritual life acting. What kind of activity? Believing the Word of God actively. The little child measures its love as being "a bushel." But mature people know that love is not a quantity, but an act. Love is the soul in action. Similarly faith is your spiritual nature—quickened within you into action. You need not wait until God does something for you individually. He has done something for all sick people; and what He has done is ENOUGH. It is your move next! Your move is actively to believe His promise in His Word, when He says you are healed by His stripes.

"Oh, yes," you say, "I know He has paid the penalty and the work has been accomplished; but I am waiting for Him to do something in me."

He has already done something in you if you are a child of God. He has put One within you that is greater than he that is in the world. This new life that He has put within you is more powerful than your disease or infirmity, if you will but rise in His strength, in the name of Jesus Christ, and thrust the invader from his illegally held territory in your body. So confident is such faith that its activity issues forth in praise and worship towards the Lord for having granted deliverance. If faith finds that its testimony is challenged, it grasps the weapons of its warfare, and wields them valiantly, insisting that the enemy recognize the name of Jesus in whose power resistance against the invader is being made.

After the man in the Bible had made his choice, the way left for him to make known his decision was by obeying the command to rise, take up his bed, and walk. The next thing for the sick person to-day to do after he realizes his privilege in Christ, is the same—namely, to do the "impossible"—rise out of his spiritual lethargy and impotency, and in faith walk right on into full deliverance.

There is something about sickness, or any test in one's body along this line that tends to make one succumb, at least temporarily. Sometimes this is through a species of self-pity, and sometimes because the spiritual life has not been vigorous before the test came, and the effort necessay to shake off the attack in faith is too great. But like this man who had been so long "impotent" in his body, you can rise off the bed of your impotency by obeying Christ's command, and be doubly blessed in the healing of your body, and in the new tone of your spiritual life, to be realized through your rejuvenated activity of faith.

True religion must needs go a good deal deeper than sentiment. It must go to the heart and make it pure, to the temper and make it sweet, to the inward parts and make them true. Pure religion is more than feeling right. It is thinking right, living right, and loving right. Any structure built only of emotion is a flimsy thing. It lacks the stability and permanence of gospel rectitude.—Dr. Malcom James MacLeod.

He, the Holy Spirit, would come, like the Captain of the Lord's hosts who appeared to Joshua on the plains of Jericho, to lead the Lord's people to constant victory over all the powers of hell until there should be a people out of every tribe and nation in that blessed company that shall adore the King of kings on His return—the church. Yea, that world-wide His gospel should be preached until from the Gentiles there should be taken a people for His name. Acts 15:14.

We know how the Captain of the Lord's hosts among the children of Israel was slighted and grieved until finally there was no longer constant victory but shameful defeat instead, and removal from the land God had given them.

When the people of Israel came before Jericho all the men of war were to march around its walls, and when the time came all the people-not the officers only-were to shout. It was done and the walls sank down level with the ground. Likewise when the church was sent forth to overcome the world and rescue the lost sons and daughters of men, all the people were to go. It is perfectly plain that when the Lord Jesus said, Go to every creature. He was talking to "all the people." If one would say He spoke only to the eleven, then His command was foolish. It could not be obeyed. It was physically impossible. If you say He spoke to the ministers before Him through them to the ministers of all time, again the command could not be obeyed. If every member of the church obeys the command and strives with all his might and main to carry the news to every creature, one can see how the task might be accomplished. When every man obeyed before Jericho, God made their shouting so marvelously effective that the walls fell down miraculously. If in our day the people will all obey the command it would give God a chance to work such mighty revivals that soon the converts joining hands with their teachers in carrying the news to every one in their several worlds, could succeed in bringing the gospel message to all the

But we have not builded according to the pattern. They started that way. Everybody went about telling of the wonderful Saviour. Scattered from Jerusalem by persecution the laity went everywhere preaching the Word. It looked for two centuries as if the church would actually dominate the world. Going according to the pattern she was an invincible force. But the original pattern of an equal brotherhood was superseded by the idea of the clergy and laity. The nikao laos (Nicolaitaines) doctrine while hated by the church at Ephesus was tolerated by the church at Pergamos. Rev. 2: 6, 15. The nikao or rulers and the laos or laity were called clergy and laity, and the witnessing for Christ was given over to an ecclesiastical order, while the laity quit witnessing and served God by supporting the clergy. Departing so sharply from the pattern, the church became weak and the world well nigh smothered her.

Is the church of Jesus Christ today moving forward in His might and strength to constant victory and winning the world into subjection to Him who redeemed it? Alas, we do not see it to be so. Had Moses and later Joshua not gone according to the pattern, we cannot believe God's presence would have continued with the Israelites; neither, when we see our Lord's directions as to His church being neglected, can we be surprised that His precious Church is shorn of power.

The pattern of the church of the first-born did not call for many denominations, and man's working himself off from his fellow believers, thus forming exclusive and warring cults, is not, I am sure, a thing observed by God with pleasure. Man has bound himself by denominational ropes which prevent his being the free man that he was when the Son of God made him free. Not only that but his selfmade limitations begat plans of his own and quickly man departs yet farther from the pattern given by the Lord Jesus on the Mount of Olives.

Let us return to the old paths, brethren. Wherever we see that the church is not being carried on according to the pattern let us fearlessly and heroically stand for her reformation, thus



N beginning, I believe I am perfectly safe in saying that never before in the history of of the world was there a more wicked and devilish attack made upon the Word of

God than is being perpetrated to-day. Its authenticity and reliability are being questioned, not only by the worldly and ungodly, but there has by some means gotten into our schools and institutions of learning, from the lower grades clear through the high schools and colleges, and even into some of our theological seminaries, the most cursed forms of infidelity, hiding under a cloak of "higher learning," "evolution" and "modernism."

The result of this wave of modernism and infidelity is readily evident. Men are being graduated from colleges and seminaries who deny the deity of Christ and the inspiration of the Bible, and consequently as they fill pulpits from one end of the country to the other, the faith of thousands of good people is blasted and their hope in a living and miraculous Christ is explained away. Even our school children are being taught that we originated from a bit of protoplasm and that the faith of our fathers is a myth. God give us men who will dare to proclaim the whole truth of His eternal Word, which standeth sure.

"All scripture is given by inspiration of God," and "Prophecy came not in old time by the will of man, but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." The Bible testities to its own truth, and we find the words, "God said," and "Thus saith the Lord," repeated in the Bible 3,800 times, so we are compelled to reach one of two conclusions: either it is divinely inspired and God-given or it is a hoax, a lie and a sham—one or the other.

Let us at this time consider a few facts related to the miraculous origin of God's Word. It is a book comprising in its canon 66 smaller books, written by 38 different authors representing almost every vocation in life, including fishermen, herdsmen, statesmen, kings, poets, physicians, politicians and shepherds. The Bible was written over a great period of time, the first part being written probably 2,000 years before the last part. It was written under a variety of circumstances by men on thrones, in dungeons, on burning mountains, beside peaceable streams in quiet pastures, men in shepherds' tents and men in exile. With possibly a few exceptions none of these men knew of the others'

God's Light-Bearers

In the early days of Israel's history, before the time when kings held sway, conquests of the land were made by judges,—men chosen of God to deliver His people from the dread oppression of their cruel and intriguing neighbors.

In the time of which we speak, Israel was being sorely tried by the barbarous, grasping Midianites. But when she cried unto the Lord there was sent to her a deliverer, Gideon by name, Gideon the son of Joash the Abiezrite.

Now the thing of which we wish especially to speak is the peculiar weapons, if so they might be called, which the Lord their God instructed them to use.

One day in the early morning certain messengers were sent forth on an errand by their leader. The task seemed strange indeed,-surely one very ill-suited to men of valor. However, such was Gideon's charge. The errand was collecting pitchers,-pitchers to be used in battle to rout the enemies of the land. It seemed a foolish thing to think that foes could be vanquished with such strange implements of warfare. Yet God had commanded it,-He whose thoughts are far above man's thoughts. So Gideon did not question, but sent his men over the countryside in search of three hundred pitchers.

They went to homes of rich and poor alike, demanding pitchers for the battle. The collection when completed, surely was a motley sight,—pitchers of every size, color, and description. Some had served in palaces and some in poor men's huts. But there were none to be refused. The station in life had naught to do with Gideon's choice. The only question was this, "Were the pitchers breakable?"

This indeed seemed strange to those of whom the pitchers were required, who deemed their days of usefulness would surely then be over, and as for their ever serving more,—how ridiculous—for who in the households

of all Israel would want a broken pitcher?

They went to battle, carried the light placed therein, and when the trumpets sounded the pitchers were crashed. Oh, ruthless hand that did the deed,—but no, the light is shining forth, and all the camp of the Midianites—terrorized and running,—crying as they go. Jehovah's army won the day, and Gideon and his men, casting

their pitchers to the earth rejoiced in the victory God had given them.

God's messenger, the Holy Spirit, is searching the world for pitchers. He does not care if they be high or low. He does not ask if they be rich or poor,-merely that they bear the lights that He shall place therein, and at the time appointed suffer the breaking of themselves, that that light may be released. He is seeking those who are willing to leave their native shores and be carried to lands of His appointment,-darkened lands that need the Light. For there are those who "sit in darkness and in the shadow of death," waiting for they know not what, waiting, hopeless, yet longing, peering through the darkness, their tired, dulled eyes seeking-for what? Light. They do not know, but only long and wish and wait. Despairing, yet searching, an aching void they have,—unsatisfied, so suffering, so painful, and hearts dumb beneath their weight of woe. They ask the question, "Why?" Their only answer is the dim and distant echo of their own hearts' cry, "WHY-Why?-why?"

And still it travels on and on around the circle of the earth until it reaches those who know the why,—who in times past have also had that same intensity of heart's desire. But these have found the answer to their fears. Their hitherto groping eyes have sighted Him who is called the Sun of righteousness,—the Light that lights the world. As their eyes gazed upon His face, that vacancy within their hearts has filled with light and they have risen, running after Him who spoke to them in passing by, "He that followeth Me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." Now they are enjoying the smile of the noonday Sun and have its light reflected in their hearts. Where all once on a time was dark and drear, there dwells the light of life, with hope and joy and peace. Here again we face the question,—

Here again we face the question,—
"Why?" Are they more favored,
more deserving than those others there
across the sea? Is God a God of partiality? It cannot be! Then, why?
The answer can be found in word of
Holy Writ. To those with whom our
Lord has shared His light, He says in
words which freight themselves with
meaning: "Among whom ye shine as
lights in the world." "Let your light

so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." They are stewards of the manifold grace of God. Stewards! "And it is required of a steward that he be found faithful."

"But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God and not of us." Yes, in earthen vessels,—pitchers if you please,—that the power might not be of us, but of Him who shed forth light within. For is it in the power of pitchers to send forth light? Ah, no. But God has chosen vessels of clay, willing to be broken to bear His light.

Iesus our Lord took upon Himself the form of clay, and trod the paths of earth. "He grew," the Writings tell us, "in favor with both God and man." But this alone did not suffice to set men free,-to light their darkened hearts. As He well knew, He held within His heart the light to light a world. Yet there was no way to light it if the light remained hidden in His heart. The solution was this: The pitcher must be broken. Broken it was, as we well know. And the light which streamed forth out that broken vessel has even reached our darkened hearts. Now we who are partakers of His light are privileged to let Him shine again through us.

But some may ask, who wants to be a broken pitcher? What useful purpose can it serve? In eyes of men it speaks of but useless nothingness, perhaps quite rightly too. To those of evil deeds who love the dark, its mission is in vain. But to those whose uncertain paths are lighted back to God by that small gleam which shines from out its heart,—to those it is a blessing from heaven which guides them on their way, a light to point the way to yonder Light, that greater Light which by dark clouds is veiled.

He asks us to be broken. And who are we that we should say Him nay, or do we even dare to think that base refusal possible? Ah, no,—the very thought repells us. But is there joy in being broken? Not if the breaking were the end. The Scriptures say our Lord "endured the cross,"-yes, suffered it to be so,-"for the joy that was set before Him." Therein was His sustaining power. And so with us,—the joy of the Lord shall be our strength,-and not the joy of being broken. But this is our recompense: His glory shall be revealed in us, and not only that, but through us,—"Christ in you the hope of glory." Our glory? No, but the glory of His name. Future glory? Yes, but glory even now, a foretaste of that glorious day

Thrice blessed from above, we who bear His light. As He on earth gave

blessings rich to men, now He through us would bless them once again.

His love constraineth us, and our hearts say with the poet:

"O Love that wilt not let me go, I rest my weary soul in Thee; I give Thee back the life I owe, That in Thine ocean depths its flow May richer, fuller be.

"O Light that follow'st all my way, I yield my flick'ring torch to Thee; My heart restores its borrowed ray, That in Thy sunshine's glow its day May brighter, fairer be."

And when they answer, "Yes," those vessels of clay are carried far to lands where Satan's forces reign, and souls are kept in cruel vassalage. The battle being in array, an Unseen Hand breaks the earthen bearers of His light in ways unknown to them. And as the light, released, shines forth, the powers of darkness flee. Dark clouds which veiled the Sun are torn away. And as the light reflects in those chained hearts, the shackles fall, and they arise to follow Him who set their captive souls at liberty.

Broken pitchers lying on the field of conquest, crushed and entered into dust again, shall on that resurrection morn be molded anew into vessels "unto honor," "meet for the Master's use," and in that other world hold forth the Light of God eternally. had to lie on the floor. One of the women lamented her husband; the others cried, "Where may our children be?" There suddenly I felt the presence of Jesus who called to me within my heart: "Child, I am also here, do not weep!" I knelt down and began to pray aloud, upon which the one German woman crept along to me on her knees with folded hands; the other four were Russian and neither did they understand me nor I them, yet they too crept near with folded hands. Wherever a soul approaches Jesus with childlike simplicity there is a heavenly atmosphere which attracts others. So we went on our knees for six days every morning and evening and took everything to our heavenly Father in prayer. The German woman had killed her husband with an axe because he was a drunkard and threatened to murder her. Five and a half years she had already spent in prison and six months more she had to spend

It nearly broke my heart to see all this misery.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR MISSIONS SERVICE

In attempting to define what should be the special qualifications for missionary service, I shall seek to set forth not so much my personal opinion but rather the substance of the thoughts of many who have had experience on the mission field. With the hope, therefore, that these suggestions may be of some practical help to prospective candidates I would suggest the following:

1. An Appreciation of the World Commission and the Purpose of God.

It is very essential that we do not get a limited view of our responsibility. We are commissioned to go "into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." An unreached soul is ever a challenge to our faith and obedience and the written Word of the Lord urging us on will ever stand when visions, revelations, or impressions have faded away and perhaps are held up to question. Paul did not feel himself limited to one particular town or country but every door of opportunity that opened before him he entered and preached Christ. Especially did he strive to preach the gospel where Christ had not been named. Rom. 15:20. The purpose is not to save every one but to give all an opportunity. God is no respecter of persons and He wants to give every man and woman as good an opportunity as we ourselves have had,

2. An Acceptance of the Fact That Only Through Christ is There Redemption.

This may seem an unnecessary statement to make to our Evangel readers who, generally speaking, fully recognize that Christ is our only hope; yet many forces are at work in the world to-day, trying to undermine faith in the old gospel message and place the Lord Jesus on a level with other teachers, while His doctrine is compared with that of other religions as though it were of a similar nature. We are, however, working on a plane different from that on which the missionaries of any other religion work, in that the messengers of the gospel take life to their hearers instead of a creed, Good news which is more than good advice.

It is said that there are over 700 different religions, sects, and creeds, each one clamoring for attention as the truth, but one majestic voice rings clear above them all, "I am the way." Not a way, but the only way. Christ Himself is our message. Therefore, if our ministry is to be effective we must above all things be possessed of Him, so that "flowing through us, He may use us every day and every hour." Then shall we be able to say with the great apostle, "whereunto I also labor striving according to His working which worketh in me mightily."

3. A YIELDING OF ONE'S LIFE TO SERVE GOD, WHETHER IT BE AT HOME OR ABROAD.

thing more will have to move us than a desire for adventure or the romance of a missionary's life. Perhaps it is needless to state that we must not be tempted to go to the foreign field simply because it provides an opportunity to secure a position or to escape a difficult situation at home. One young married man offered to go as a missionary, but later it was discovered that things were not very harmonious in his home. The wife was willing for him to go while she remained at home and possibly both felt that this was a good way out of what was undoubtedly an unpleasant situation. Another who was supporting his aged mother was willing to go as a missionary to Africa and commit his mother into the hands of the Lord, although she had no other means of support above what her son supplied.

If we let God choose our field and we are as willing to go as to stay, and as willing to stay as to go, then He will surely see that we are brought into the path of His appointment.—Missionary Secretary.

HEARTS HUNGRY FOR THE GOSPEL

Miss Bertha Dommermuth of Liberia, West Africa, writes: "God continues to bless in our midst, and we find people here and there who are really anxious to hear the story of Jesus. While on a trip through the Palipo towns, I met a man who was hungry for God. He had heard a little about Jesus but wanted to hear more. It was 10:30 when a knock came to my door and a voice said, 'Please, I have something to say. Please, you must tell me about Jesus.' I told him to come in and he brought his wife, and we talked about Jesus and His love until after midnight. These people walked for three hours to attend services here and now have come with their three children to live in the mission. This man's name is Matthew and his wife's is Helen. He said that when we write to our country. we must tell the people to pray for him. He had been very sick for two years and his wife always carried him on her back wherever they went. She said that if God would heal her husband she would believe God and do His fashion, but if her husband should die then she would not believe God, but she said, 'God He make my husband well, so that is why we do God-way. This time we believe God.'

"A short time ago we discovered that one of our boys, Jonah, about twelve years' old has that dreadful disease leprosy. He is one of the four sons that the king has in the mission. He has just been to the door

crying and said that his feet hurt him so. His toes looked as though they might drop off. Please pray for this child. When Jesus was on earth He healed the ten lepers who came to Him, and He is the same yesterday, and to-day, and forever.

"As I read the letters from our missionaries in India, I see how different that country is from Africa. Many of their children are cast on the roadsides to die, but you will not find that so here. The parents are very fond of their children, and it is sometimes hard to get them. The children that we have in the mission have been put here by their parents 'to learn book.' They think, too, that if they have a son in the mission that he will set palaver between his family and God by begging Him for them when he reaches God's country. We try to show them that there is no remission for sins except through Jesus' blood, that He is the only one that can beg for us, but they think that when their son gets there and begs God hard that He will hear. One day I was speaking to a man in town

With joy and gladness all waited for this day, but especially those to be baptized. The Lord was good to us in that He gave us nice weather. A large crowd had gath-


ered and the candidates in their white robes looked very impressive as they marched in line to the water.

WHO WILL LAY THIS TO HEART? Alice Wood

The total population of the Argentine Republic at the close of 1927 was 10,622,348. Buenos Aires, the capital, is now estimated at about two million. This great and beautiful city is just 8,045 miles from New York City. When it is twelve o'clock there, it is twelve forty-three in Buenos Aires. The fastest steamers make the trip in seventeen

days. There are supposed to be more than four million inhabitants in the Province of Buenos Aires where I live. 25 de Mayo, one of the principal cities in this province, has a population of 14,000. This city, and the district round about, called "el partido" has a population of 57,758. The district has some 18 villages and railroad stations. The other denominations have left this for the workers of the U.S. and Canada Assemblies of God to evangelize and we are doing what we can at it with great delight and there is a great work to do. El Imparcial, our local paper, recently published the following: "80% of the young men in 25 de Mayo are victims of sickness developed from corrupt lives. 50% of the births in the Republic are illegitimate. 20% of the

people in Buenos Aires Province are illiterate, 168,777 children are without schooling. This is considered a grave problem which the government is taking measures to rectify. More than 50%, in some Provinces, are illiterate."

There are some 700 towns in Argentina where there is no Christian worker. I know a city of 41,000 without a missionary. As far as my knowledge goes, the whole Republic of Uruguay has no Pentecostal or Spirit-filled missionary. There is an immense territory in the interior of South America where not even the Roman Catholic priests have gone. This is equal to the combined states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, California and Nevada. But for the grace of God, we might have been born in that territory of spiritual darkness.

We know of but 25 Spirit-filled foreign missionaries in the Argentine and Paraguay which means a population of about twelve millions of people. The need is appalling. I am dumb as I contemplate these numbers. "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?"

"Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that He thrust forth laborers into His vineyard." The people have lost confidence in the priests and their religion. God is preparing the millions of South America for a gospel which satisfies, but one's heart sinks over the lack of witnesses. Hundreds of young men and women in our Pentecostal Bible schools are preparing for Christian work, but the years roll on and on and no one comes to our aid in spite of our continuous appeal for help. Many have written of their call to come, all these years, but they do not materialize on the field. Millions upon millions in South America can truly say, "No man cared for my soul." "Hereby know we love, because He laid down His life for us: and we ought to lay

down our lives for the brethren. But whoso hath this world's goods, and beholdeth his brother in need, and shutteth up his compassion from him, how doth the love of God dwell in him? If you want to know what real pleasure in life is, just come down here in one of our meetings and hear our dear native Christians in prayer and testimony praising the Lord for sending His messengers of truth and light: and that they heard the gospel and are saved through the precious blood of Jesus. No monarch ever experienced such real joy as that brings. The honors of no ambassador are comparable to those Christ bestows upon His ambassadors.

Note: In addition to the twenty-five missionaries mentioned above

there are about 330 missionaries of other denominations in Argentina and 50 in Paraguay but there are only 4 organized churches registered in this latter Republic. However, there are multitudes in this country, as stated, without a witness of any kind at all. Pray for the needy continent lying at our door.

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
