The hour was late, but a wire was immediately sent for her to be brought to the Door of Hope.

As she crossed the threshold there was a look of great weariness on her face. She was lovingly welcomed, and after several hours of rest was introduced to the head of our Homes—the blessed Lord Jesus. With wonderment she listened attentively to all that was said, and then convulsively burst into tears, exclaiming, "Oh, but He couldn't, He couldn't, He couldn't save me!" For several days after each conversation and reading of God's Word in her presence, she would make use of the above sentence, clasping her

hands in apparent anguish of soul.

The conviction of sin so rested upon her that long into the night she could be heard pacing to and fro in her little room, until one morning upon entering the Home the matron met me at the door and asked that I might have another talk with the suffering girl, adding: "I have always thought I could help a sinner to find the Lord, but in this case I feel powerless. I was pleading with and praying for her till nearly 2 o'clock this morning, but though she sobbed and sobbed no relief seemed to come; and she would cry out again and again, 'But, oh, He couldn't He couldn't save me!"

Lifting up my heart in fervent prayer I sent for her. It hardly seemed possible that in only ten days such a change could be wrought in one's appearance. Her head, with a dejected look, was dropped on her chest, and her eyes had become bloodshot from almost constant weeping on account of her sins. I endeavored to open up to her mind the wonderful far-reaching process of God's love; but, throwing up her hand, she cried, "But, O Mother Whittemore, you don't, you don't understand! Can't I tell you my story?"

She was so evidently desirous to unburden her heart that I felt it was my place to listen. And this was her story:

"Father died when I was but a little girl, but though I was her only child my mother, who was a private drunkard, cared little of what became of me, and at an early age I mingled with those I had better never have known. When I had reached the age of fourteen there was scarcely any sin that I had to be introduced to. A great greed for gain had sprung up in my childish heart, and by the time I was eighteen others equally bad and I together

Natural Faith
SUGGEST that there
are three degrees of
faith. The first degree is what we might
call natural faith. A

will convince us that in every person living, saved or unsaved, there is a certain power of natural faith, a capability of believing. When you step

on a street car or board a train you have faith that it will go where it is scheduled to go. This simple power of natural faith is the basis of all our business life. One of the greatest assets of a business firm is the confidence of the people. When we order something at the store we order it in faith that the store will send it, and they send it in faith that we will pay for it. Faith is the very bedrock of the business world.

Mere natural faith is the thing that makes people feel so much more comfortable if they call in a doctor to see a sick loved one. Immediately the doctor comes they feel better. I am not talking about Pentecostal people at the moment, I am talking about those who do not know how to receive help from the Lord. It is just the same if they have a bottle of medicine to swallow; the nastier it is the better they feel. It is just the simple power of natural faith in the medical profession. Two of my sisters-in-law are nurses, and I learn from them that one of the first things to do is to inspire people with confidence.

This simple, natural faith, which we all have; this power of believing and hoping and resting in natural things, is the root of what is called faithhealing. Let me say that there is a profound distinction between faith healing and Divine Healing. Faith healing is based on the simple faith that by thinking and believing and becoming optimistic enough we can get better. But Divine Healing is based on a faith that God in heaven will reach down and touch us, so that we can be healed by an agency which is not natural but which is divine. Never confuse faith healing with Divine Healing.

This power of natural faith can produce some very striking results on certain lines, and it explains a great many of the healings which take place under Christian Science. Make some people cheer up, and they become better at once; it is purely natural faith. But natural faith is limited to the natural world and the natural sphere; it can never bring us to a knowledge of God. It can never bring us to the place where heaven is open and eternity is real. As the apostle says in 1 Cor.

Three Degrees of Faith

2:14, "The natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned." Don't be angry with your unsaved husband because he cannot understand why you enjoy religion. He cannot understand it, and that is just the whole explanation. Don't get irritable with your unsaved friends because they cannot understand why you like coming to camp meetings; their eyes and their ears have not been opened. There is a whole wonderful world that we are alive to, to which they are dead. The natural man cannot receive the things of the Spirit of God.

On board ship, where you have such splendid opportunities of conversing with people, you can talk to them about natural things—scenery, music, nationality, etc.—and they will talk with vigor and interest, but if you speak about the things of God in many cases you immediately find they are dead, they have no interest, they look at you dumb, you are talking about something of which they know nothing. Pentecostal fellowship is the richest fellowship of all, because we can talk about the deepest things, and find that we understand each other.

There is a realm of natural faith where the natural man can exercise faith in the natural sphere, and can produce some startling results. But when it comes to the divine, eternal, unseen things, the natural man falls back helpless. Apart from divine grace he will never know God.

Supernatural Faith

The second degree of faith is supernatural faith. In ourselves we are hopeless and helpless and cannot find God; yet He comes to us in our hopeless, helpless condition and He opens our eyes, our ears, and our hearts. "For by grace are ye saved through faith, and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God." Eph. 2:8. The faith that saves us was not in our hearts by nature. A lot of people think it was natural faith that saved them, but it never was. The faith that saves is something that comes down into our hearts by divine grace. I am frequently asked, "What is saving faith?" I answer that it is something different

from mere intellectual assent. It is not merely believing the historical facts concerning the Lord Jesus Christ. You can believe the historical fact of Calvary and yet not be saved. "The devils also believe, and tremble." The faith that saves is a faith of the heart. "With the heart man believeth unto righteousness." It is that attitude by which my heart ab-

solutely rests itself upon the Word of God. It is not necessarily feelings. Don't think that feelings are saving faith. You can be saved without having wonderful dreams and visions; you can be saved without having feelings at all,—but you will get lots of feelings afterwards. But the faith that saves is simply coming as a helpless sinner and lying flat down on the promises of God, and saying,

"Just as I am, without one plea, But that Thy blood was shed for me, And that Thou bidst me come to Thee, O Lamb of God, I come."

Helpless, hopeless, absolutely undone, and not feeling anything, I just lie there on the Word of God. The faith that saves me is a faith that is the gift of God.

I think the phrase I love best of all is the one old John Wesley used concerning the moment when God saved him. He said, "I felt my heart strang-ly warmed." I remember the time when my heart was "strangely warmed," when everything seemed to burst into life. I may not know the moment when God saved me, but I know I am saved. I remember the testimony of a dear old Irishman who used to say, "At four o'clock in the morning, on the first Monday of May, 1889, God saved me." And then he would go on to tell how everything outside was like a new world, the sky was a wonderful blue, the grass was a richer green, the birds sang divinely, and his wife-well, he never knew before how good looking she was. He was not really in a new world, but he had gotten a new heart; God had saved him.

"Heaven above is softer blue, Earth around is sweeter green, Something lives in every hue, Christless eyes have never seen.

Birds with gladder songs o'erflow, Flowers with deeper beauty shine, Since I know as now I know I am His and He is mine."

This wonderful faith comes as a miracle of God's grace.

Whether you agree with me or not, I have found that God gives us this same gift of faith on other lines. A lot of people try to take the Baptism

in the Spirit by faith, and it is not a very satisfactory experience. And yet there is a real truth there, because the Word says we receive the Spirit by faith. But there is such a difference between trying to take the Holy Spirit with natural faith, and having God reach down from heaven and put a living faith within you. I believe it is the same with Divine Healing. I remember the case of one who was sick unto death, but God spoke the Word into her heart with power. "He sent His Word and healed them." Faith from God came into their heart and they were healed.

I don't think you will find fault with me if I bring us all down to the place of absolute dependence on the grace of God. I used to think I had to do a great deal, but I am finding more and more that it is grace, and grace alone. I am looking forward to going up when the Lord Jesus comes, and I am hoping to go up depending on grace and grace alone. We are far more dependent on God than we think we are. How easily we begin to pride ourselves and think we are little jugs of Pentecostal cream! Rather remember that God has been the author of all we have and of all we hope ever to be. If we have any gift it has been given to us by God Himself.

It is sweet to know that the God who gave us our first faith that saves us, sustains that faith day by day and keeps it to the end. In my pastoral work I often had to visit homes where such trouble and affliction had come, where all the waves and billows seemed to have rolled over them, that I have stood outside the door and trembled at the thought of going in, wondering whether they had lost their faith, and what I would do if they had. But God looks after His own! It is remarkable that the more the devil tries to crush us the more we grow. We are like inflated Indiarubber balls, the more they try to push us under the water the more we come up each time. The devil gives us a slap, and says, "Take that." But faith in God triumphs, and we come up saying, "Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him.

I have feasted on the beautiful picture John Bunyan paints of the House of the Interpreter. When Christian comes there he is shown a fire burning, and the evil one is pouring water on the fire to try to put it out. But the remarkable thing is that the more the evil one pours water on the fire, the brighter it burns. Christian says, "Explain it to me, I cannot understand it." And so Interpreter takes him around to the other side and there he sees Shining One pouring oil on the fire. As fast as the evil one pours on water, just so fast does Shining

One pour on oil. The God who saves us is the God who keeps us. I don't believe in what is called "eternal security," but I do believe in Godly security, I do believe we are kept by the power of God. I am not afraid of losing my salvation, I have too big a Saviour. I certainly believe that backsliding is so serious that you dare not minimize the consequences, but I believe in the power of God to keep. My Christian life is becoming more and more restful the further on I go. I used to struggle so much to keep it, but now I enjoy it.

Spiritual Gift of Faith-Divine Faith

The spiritual gift of faith is of vital importance to people baptized in the Holy Ghost. It is one of that won-derful cluster of gifts spoken of in 1 Cor. 12. "To another faith by the same Spirit." And now we are not dealing with natural faith-that is thousands of miles below. We are not even dealing with supernatural faith which is given to us by God to save us. If we are believers we have that faith right now, it is the heritage of all God's children. But we are dealing with that which is given only to certain ones. "For to one is given by the Spirit the word of wisdom; to another the word of knowledge by the same Spirit; to another faith by the same Spirit." One is given one gift, another is given a different gift; all are not given this special gift of faith. I suggest we might call this special gift of faith, divine faith. In Mark 11:22 we read, "Jesus answering said unto them, Have faith in God, in the margin we are shown that the literal Greek is "Have the faith of This is divine faith. How wonderful to think that divine faith can burn within our hearts.

"Jesus said unto them, . . . If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you." Matt. 17:20. That verse took my fancy when I was a boy. I got my faith out and put it on the chair in front of me, and I guessed it was not very much but I figured out it was at least as big as a grain of mustard seed. So one Saturday afternoon I took it out to Hampstead Heath and I began to experiment on moving hills. Fortunately for the sheep grazing there, and the people who lived around, I did not succeed. If I had had my way that day I would have had an afternoon's amusement altering the geography of London. But I went back home without having moved it an inch, which was a very good thing for other people although it bothered me a good deal. Since I have been older I have thought

much about it; I believe that the faith which will remove mountains is divine faith. It is what Jesus meant when He said, "Have the faith of God."

Every spiritual gift comes from an attribute of God. The word of wisdom comes from the wisdom of God. The word of knowledge comes from the very knowledge of God. The gift of faith comes from the very faith of God. The gifts of healing come from the life of God. The working of miracles comes from the power of God. The gift of prophecy comes from the emotion of God. Discerning of spirits comes from the understanding of God. Of course tongues and interpretation are simply prophecy coming in another form.

But think now for a minute of the faith of God. That divine attribute of the Almighty can be manifested through a Spirit-filled vessel. How marvelous is the faith of God, that faith which was in His heart when on creation's morning He said, "Let there be light." That faith which was in the Lord Jesus, who, even though He was going through the dark tunnel of Gethsemane and Calvary, endured the cross, despising the shame—for the joy that was set before Him. When He was standing before His accusers He said, "Thou shalt see the Son of man coming in the clouds of heaven." There is one who knows He is coming again, and who is rejoicing in that fact, and that is the Lord Jesus Himself. Oh, He knows He is coming, He is glad He is coming!

We have sometimes wondered why when we have prayed and longed for things, they have not come to pass. There is a principle which is so sweetly summed up by A. B. Simpson in these words:

"Once I tried to use Him, Now He uses me."

We try to use God, to use the Holy Spirit, and to use spiritual gifts, but we never get anywhere that way. Some loved one has been very sick and we have longed for their healing and deliverance. We have gathered all our resources of faith to pray that they might be healed, and we have sent out letters and telegrams all over the country; we have gathered our united forces and have said, "Now let's all pray together." We have brought all our faith to bear upon this one thing, and have tried to shake the very throne of God. We have said, "Let us believe for it; we will believe for it until we get it." We have tried to get a crowbar and break the pearly gates open, to get a lever and move the very throne of God. But we have not succeeded, and we have wondered why.

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How I Received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost

It happened to me through sheer necessity. God had driven me into a corner. Seventeen years prior to my seeking the Baptism, I had been gloriously converted to God under very humble preaching in the Methodist Episcopal Church. I then studied for the ministry and, though for a time deflected into Y. M. C. A. secretarial work, I again took up the ministry in this city less than ten blocks from where I am writing these lines, where the Lord has definitely called me for the past more than eighteen years.

Having gone through the thrilling experience of the great fire and earth-quake of 1906, in this city, out of which the Lord miraculously delivered me, shortly thereafter, I found myself a sick man. Forced to retire from my work for the definite purpose of seeking health, I tried the various schools of healing but all to no avail. God had previously brought me in touch with members of my own family who believed in Divine Healing, but for four years I proudly resisted it in my spirit. God graciously would not permit me to be healed until something was wrought out in me.

My neurasthenic affliction persisting, I finally decided after four years seeking health, that I would give up all thought of the ministry, and I bought a piece of land at Compton, California and determined to become a poultry man. While engaged in preparing this place God brought me in touch with a man on an electric train en route to Los Angeles who told me of God's healing sickness through prayer. He was then on his way to the place. In desperation I asked if 1 might accompany him, to which he readily assented. Lo, and behold, I was conducted right into a Pentecostal meeting on South Spring Street.

At the close of that meeting I was introduced to the leader. Prayer was

immediately offered for my condition. With such confidence and assurance did those dear people pray that it seemed as though they were inspired. I had never heard such praying before. God answered by fire; it ran up and down my spine to my utter amazement. Here was something of which we proud Methodists of the early twentieth century knew nothing, though I now know that in his day, John Wesley understood it. Oh, how wonderful are God's ways! How I have thanked Him a thousand times for those four bitter years of humbling and suffering.

In the fullness of time, when I was ready to receive healing from heaven, He led me to those despised Pentecostal people, catching me as it were by guile, but now I am one of them—Glory! The first taste was so good that my prejudice was vanishing, having received a deadly wound. After twenty years, as I think of it now, I marvel how God had a precious Brother and his wife in that very Sunday morning meeting to invite me to their home for dinner. They lived ten miles in the country-I went, and my going with Brother Finley Berry (now in the Glory) and his dear wife was the finish of Methodism for me, and the coming in of a new light. After dinner we chatted and by and by prayer was proposed. This practice must be revived in Pentecostal circles. The result was that soon Brother Berry, who was mighty in prayer, was praying in stentorian tones, in an unknown tongue, which sounded to me as though it might be Chinese. While he prayed in this language, for the first time in my life I was slain under the power of God.

There I must have lain for hours, lost to all but God and there for the first time in seventeen years of my Christian experience I saw and felt the tremendous cost of Calvary. I was

carried in the spirit through every stage of Christ's Gethsemane, His cruel scourgings, His trial, the unjust accusations, His bitter agony, His voluntary going to the cruel cross, His prayer for His accusers, His welcoming of the dying thief, His commending His Spirit to the Father, His giving up His Spirit, His dying in my place, the just for the unjust. God was dealing with me there. He was preparing the soil of my soul for something new.

I was broken now, I wept, I suffered. It seemed I could not have suffered more had I been nailed there myself. HIS LOVE HAD BROKEN MY HEART AT LAST. My heart was liquid, my eyes were tears. Every fibre and every department and cell of my triune being was responding to such love. Oh, how I repented, how I loathed my pride and my sin that drove my adorable Saviour to such a death. Shut away from the world, sounds about me were heard as though miles away. I was now preoccupied and enamoured of His love. What a fiend I would be to withhold anything from such a Friend and Lover. Had I ten thousand lives to live I felt He must have them all. He had won my heart at last.

Brother and Sister Berry had invited me to Sunday dinner. I did not leave that humble home until I was made a multimillionaire in the Spirit and a recipient of the mighty Baptism in the Holy Ghost and Fire. After hours alone with God I retired to adore, worship, and love Him all through the night. After breakfast the next morning I began at once an intensive search for the Baptism in the Holy Ghost. I gave my whole time to God. I spent this time out among the waving corn or in a near-by dry river bed but always seeking God. He quickly showed me that He was no respecter of persons.

Then I saw that as He was as willing to baptize me as He was any other living person, that it was my duty to be diligent and intense in seeking Him. With each new day God dealt with me on some one thing in my life that must be put away. I did not ask

to have a new difficulty shown me until I had prayed through upon the one already revealed. With every one I prayed through and obtained a definite witness that this particular obstacle was removed. This went on day after day for six consecutive days. At the close of the third day my joy was overwhelming as a third great battle was fought and the victory won. I said to the folks, "Oh, I must have the Baptism now!" But with great sagacity and divine wisdom they encouraged me to go right on seeking God. But how could I hold more was the question? However, I took their advice and for three more days I communed with God and He with

In the annals of eternity, that cornfield and river bed, a veritable Bethel to me, must be a sacred memory. On the evening of the sixth day of intensively seeking God, much more I now know than seeking the Baptism, suddenly, as we knelt in prayer in the evening, after the Lord for days had been preparing my vocal organs for a new language, and my body for a new Occupant, He burst forth from my innermost being as though a giant cork had been pulled from a bottle. He gushed forth in a new language that I had not known. My objective consciousness sat back in wonderment at what another Person was doing through me. It was indescribably wonderful. Could it be possible that in less than one week such a radical change could come into my life?

After the Spirit had been speaking in a clear language for perhaps half an hour I remember my mind said, "Now you can stop this," and gathering my will together, I did shut off, so to speak, the heavenly outgushing, but it was as though a river was damming up in my being and was ready to burst the physical; I yielded again to this delightful enchantment. It went on and on for perhaps two hours. A holy heavenly hush filled my being. was spoiled that night for my church, but God had spared me for another little place in His unfolding kingdom purpose, for the last great revival in the Gentile age.

In thirty days I was as strong as ever. God awakened me morning after morning at a certain hour and manipulated my body as with a giant invisible hand. My friends marveled as they saw the hand of God upon me. He was performing a gradual healing

Soon after this, when alone in the desert, God put mighty intercession upon me in tongues and in English for various parts of this dying world and one morning He called me definite-

ly to return to San Francisco, assuring me that if I would return and be faithful to Him, that He would give 100,000 souls to shine with Him in the Glory, because of our co-operative labors. I quickly obeyed and for nearly nineteen years He has proven faithful beyond all imagination.

The realization of the vision is gradually unfolding in God's way through nightly meetings for the past eighteen years, through the establishment, under God, of the Glad Tidings Temple work, through the Glad Tidings Bible Institute with its one hundred and ninety earnest students in attendance, and with three hundred and fifty having already graduated and gone forth into many lands with this last day message. Act upon it, and you will have the Kingdom.

A healthy body is what the living Christ can operate through. He ever liveth, and He wants you to be living in every detail, every part. Submission to and acting upon the divine commands means that deadness will have to give way to life, failure give way to victory, weakness to power. The people that know their God shall be strong and do exploits. A spiritual body filled with spiritual diseases cannot be vic-

torious for God.

The Mystery of Iniquity

The New Testament has much to say about "the mystery of inquity." Our Lord taught His disciples to pray, "Deliver us from evil," or as it is translated, "Rescue us from the wicked one." Peter warns us, "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour; whom resist steadfast in the faith." In the 13th of Matthew we are told that "the kingdom of heaven is likened unto a man which sowed good seed in his field, but while men slept his enemy came and sowed tares among the wheat, and went his way." In explaining this parable the Lord said, "The field is the world; the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the tares are the children of the wicked one; the enemy that sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the consummation of the age."

He further tells us, "The son of man shall send forth His angels, and they shall gather out of His kingdom all things that offend, and them which do iniquity; and shall cast them into a furnace of fire." In 2 Cor. 11:13 we are given some light on these children of the wicked. Paul speaks of them as "false apostles, deceitful workers, transforming themselves into apostles of Christ. And no marvel; for Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light. Therefore it is no great thing if his ministers also be transformed as the ministers of righteousness."

Evil Men and Seducers

Paul wrote to Timothy, "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly that in the latter time some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of demons."

We have just received a letter from a young woman who was badly burned, the flesh dropping off to the bone. While suffering agony an elderly man came to her, saying that if she would let him lay his hands on her and pray for her, she would be healed. She consented; but immediately he laid hands on her she began to scream, and nearly went into convulsions. It took her husband and two women to hold her in bed. As one of the women tried to hold her down, this woman began to writhe and wriggle like a serpent. When the elderly man heard her screams and saw her increased suffering he stepped back and

said, "This is strange, I never had my spirits act this way before. I am a high graduated Rosicrucian, a very high-class Spiritualist." The woman writes that although she has always been truthful, yet since then she lies terribly. And her husband was almost too frank, yet now he too lies. She writes that she knows a tormenting demon entered her when this old man laid hands on her. Those who tried to hold her down also became demonpossessed. Let us pray for these poor victims of Satan's malice.

* * * Demon Doctrines

Paul warns us of two of these doctrines of demons. The first is "forbidding to marry." Marriage was an institution given before the fall, and no wonder that Satan hates it.

In Isa. 14:4-17 we are given a remarkable picture of Satan, who is there called Lucifer. We see his ambitions, "I will ascend into heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God; . . . I will be like the Most High." But we also foresee his doom, "Yet thou shalt be brought down to hell, to the sides of the pit." In this chap-ter in Isaiah Satan is referred to as the king of Babylon. In Jer. 51:7 we see that Babylon has been a golden cup that has made all the earth drunk-"The nations have drunken of her wine; therefore the nations are mad." Babylon became in ancient times the seat of all false religion. The Babylonian cult later transferred its headquarters to Pergamos, and it will be remembered that in writing to the church there the Lord said of that place, "Where Satan's seat is." Rev.

Babylon and Rome

The Babylonian cult later moved its headquarters to Rome and the emperor became Pontifex Maximus, that is, the head of the Babylonian order. Later this title was transerred to the Pope of Rome, and he bears it to this day. Practically all of the idolatry of the church of Rome, its worship of the virgin, its high masses, its various feasts, are part of the old Babylonian cult. One outstanding feature of that cult was that it insisted on celibacy for its clergy; and today we see all the priests of the Roman Catholic church forbidden to marry. No wonder Rome keeps the Bible from her people, for if the people read it for themselves

they would see that this very forbidding of the priests to marry is a doctrine of demons, against which the Spir.t expressly warns.

Commanding to Abstain from Meats

Matthew Larsen, who was for many years a Seventh Day Adventist preacher, told the writer that in the original writings of Mrs. White, the "prophetess" of that movement, there were these two doctrines of demons—the forbidding to marry, and the commanding to abstain from meats. In modern editions of her writings these have been edited out. Seventh Day Adventists have accepted most of her other false doctrines. A precious missionary from India spoke to us with much feeling, saying that a great deal of their work is being undone by the Seventh Day Adventists; that when they have brought precious souls into the glorious liberty there is in Christ through the gospel of grace, immediately Judaizing Adventist teachers come along and bring them into the ironclad bondage of the law. A great many of the Seventh Day Adventists advocate abstaining from meats, and so do the Spiritualists.

In Religions and Philosophies in the United States of America there is an article on the Rosicrucian fellowship, written by Mrs. Max Heindel, their leader, from their world headquarters at Mount Ecclesia, Oceanside, California. She writes, "There is a cafeteria where vegetarian food is served for those at headquarters. As it is a part of their religion to be kind and compassionate to the lower life wave, the animals, the Rosicrucian students are strictly vegetarians." When God supplied Elijah with food He provided him with bread and flesh; not bread and vegetable soup. Paul brands this commanding to abstain from meats, which is taught by many of the false cults of today, as a doctrine of demons.

* * * Many False Prophets

Paul warned Timothy, "Keep that which is committed to thy trust, avoiding profane and vain babblings, and oppositions of science falsely so-called." The word science here is gnosis (which means knowledge), and Paul is here warning against some who professed superior knowledge, who were known as Gnostics. This "science falsely so-called," or Gnosticism, according to Dr. James Orr was a "heretical system of thought at once subtle, speculative, and elaborate, which endeavored to introduce into Christianity a so-called higher knowl-

edge which was grounded partly on the philosophical creed in which Greeks and Romans had taken refuge consequent on the gradual decay and breaking up of their religions, partly on the philosophies of Plato and Philo, and still more on the philosophies and theosophies and religions of the East, especially those of Persia and of India." According to Bousset there were many "little Gnostic sects and groups who believed they possessed secret and mysterious knowledge, in no way accessible to those outside, which was not to be proved or propagated, but believed in by the initiated, and anxiously guarded as a secret. It was laid down in wonderful mystic writings which were in the possession of various circles. All these sects and groups boasted a mystical revelation and a deeply veiled wisdom." This is exactly what most of the cults of today claim.

Trying the Spirits

John also gives very strong warning against the "spirit of error" which was in these ministers of Satan. He wrote, "Little children, it is the last time; and as ye have heard that Antichrist shall come, even now there are many Antichrists; whereby we know that it is the last time. They went out from us, but they were not of us; for if they had been of us they would no doubt have continued with us.' This warning of the first century needs to be repeated in the twentieth. The most dangerous men are those who have been in the church of Christ and who have departed from the faith. One of the most prominent Spiritualists that the writer has met was formerly a Salvation Army officer.

In the days of the early church these Gnostic teachers preached a Christ who was not the Christ of Calvary. They preached a fantastic Christ entirely different from Him who is the Word of God, who was in the beginning with God, and who was God, the Word that became flesh and dwelt among them. These Gnostic teachers denied that Jesus Christ had come in the flesh. John stood firmly for the truth that Jesus Christ the Son of God had come in the flesh, a flesh which he had handled, a flesh which was pierced at Calvary. John declared that he saw blood and water flow from that flesh. The Gnostics had no use for the blood of Calvary. The redemption they taught was, as Dr. Gwatkin puts it, "rather a redemption of the philosophers from matter, than a redemption of mankind from sin." They certainly did not teach that "the blood of Jesus Christ God's Son cleanseth us from all sin.'

Modern Criticism

In studying Mr. Weber's new book, Religions and Philosophies in the United States of America, we have been struck with the extraordinary similarity between the teachings of the cults of today with those of the Gnostics of the first and second centuries. In the article on Theosophy we read, "Theosophy teaches that every man is essentially divine, a god dwelling in a human tabernacle." Contrast this with John's statement, "He that committeth sin is of the devil." This article on Theosophy further says, "Jesus teaches us that we are all Sons of God." (The capitals are theirs.) That is absolutely untrue. He told the Pharisees who claimed to be children of Abraham, "Ye are of your father the devil." This is the reason why He said to a ruler of the Jews, "Ye must be born again."

Gnostic Occultism

The spokesman for Theosophy states that they believe in the doctrine of reincarnation, "that the real self or soul of man passes many successive lives on earth . . . Closely allied with this doctrine is the doctrine of Kar-'In another chapter of this same book we see what members of the Karma and Reincarnation Legion believe. Their leader states, "Ours is the age of science, reborn from the ancient Egyptian time of the Pha-Their principal doctrine is that of reincarnation. They identify themselves with the Gnostics of old by saying, "There seems to be good historical evidence that the Gnostics who were cast out of the early church. and the Essene community, among whom Jesus spent some years, were believers in these doctrines (those of reincarnation.) When the Gnostic doctors were cast out of the early Christian church they carried with them a body of occult knowledge which from that time was lost to the church." It is with this occultism that the Theosophites, the Karma and Reincarnation Legion, the Rosicrucians, and other similar cults, are trying to attract unwary souls.

How to Overcome

John tells us, "Whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world, and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. Who is he that overcometh the world but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God." There is victory through faith. We see in Rev. 12 there is also victory over Satan through the blood of the Lamb. The biographer of Billy Bray

tells how one time he stood up and cried, "The Blood!" And then he cried again, "The Blood!" And then cried again, "The Blood!" And the power of the Lord fell in that meeting, bringing mighty victory. The pleading of the blood of Christ in faith, will bring victory every time. The all-victorious blood of Christ speaketh. Heb. 12:24. It is eloquent on our behalf to bring victory over all the power of the devil. Let us speak and sing of the Blood continually. Let us constantly magnify the blood of Calvary's Lamb. I love the words of Frances Ridley Havergal:

"Precious Blood, by this we conquer In the fiercest fight, Sin and Satan overcoming By its might.

"Precious, precious blood of Jesus, Ever flowing free, Shed for rebels, shed for sinners, Shed for me."

The Only Way of Salvation

In reading of the various religions and philosophies in U. S. A., including Christian Science, Spiritualism, and a score of others, there is one thing that is very noticeable—there is no mention of redemption through the blood of Jesus Christ. But apart from the shedding of that blood there is no remission of sin. Heb. 9:22. At a Congress of Religions held in Chicago some years ago, when the advocates of Buddhism, Taoism, Confucianism, and other religions had told of the beauties of their various doctrines, Cook of Boston rose and said, "You may say all you like about your various religions, but I want to tell you there is only one thing that can cleanse the blood from Lady Macbeth's hands, and that is the blood of Jesus Christ.' There is salvation in no other. All these religions and philosophies which leave out the blood of Christ, come from the enemy of Christ, from Satan himself; and they and their advocates will have the fate of Satan-they will be cast into the lake of fire.

One night shortly after John G. Woolley, the drunkard, later the famous temperance orator, had come to Christ, he was going down the street staggering from weakness. As he came to the corner where stood one of his old haunts the temptation to take a little liquor to buoy him up was the sharpest, he says, "The Lord Jesus came and whispered, 'John G. Woolley, do you want help?' I looked up and said. 'No Lord Jesus, I don't want help. I want You.'" From that moment he had the victory.

(Continued from Page One) had secured the lease of quite a large establishment, and everything that was wicked that the devil could invent was faithfully carried out in it.

"One day I was told that my mother was seen reeling around on the streets like any common drunkard. That hurt my pride, although I furnished all the liquor she craved. I became most tortured in mind, till I heard of a mission way down in the lower part of the city, and was told that there a drunkard might be helped. I never was in such a place, but down I hastened, and was told by the one in charge that everything that could be done for my mother would be attempted. Then, just as I started to go, the man to whom I had been speaking took me by the hand, saying, 'Oh, you poor child, you are a sinner and need to know Jesus!' And, believe me, I have not had a happy moment since! If I could only now go and tell other wicked women who have not fallen so low as I have, some little good might be done, but as for me hell keeps staring me in the face night and day. If it was only some personal sin indulged in that affected me individually, I believe God might forgive, but No! I truly don't see how I would dare to ask Him to receive such a fearful sinner as I am. How could He? I have enticed more than one young girl from her home fireside, laughed their scruples away when pressing the wine cup to their lips, and through my wicked influence helped to hurl them down, down, until some of them," she added, with a most heart-rending cry, "are in hell now, and it's their blood that keeps crying out against me every moment. Oh, no! God could not forgive such atrocious sin as that! I can't see how He ever would or could!"

She clutched her head with her hands, as her despairing blood-shot eyes looked into mine, and she awaited my reply. Taking her by the hand I said, "Well, you poor girl, to tell you the truth I; too, cannot comprehend how God's love could forgive such hideous and abominable sin as that, so it is not to be surprised at that you are unable to fully grasp what that marvelous love will accomplish when fully accepted. But we are told in the Word that our thoughts are not His thoughts so let us see what His Word has to say." I then quoted "Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Through the mysterious workings of the Holy Spirit the light dawned upon her. She dropped on her knees, and, with a tearful face, lifted her head and cried, "O God, be merciful to me a sinner!" Quickly she was told to put in, "For Jesus' sake." With trembling lips she repeated the words, and instantly the Spirit of God bore witness with her spirit that she had been forgiven all. The matron and myself, as we knelt beside the repentant and forgiven sinner, could not but rejoice as we perceived the look of wondering joy that broke upon her face.

A few minutes later, hearing the sewing-room door open, I looked out of the room she had left and saw and heard what took place. Ehad entered and with tears running down her face she was saying, "O girls, God's just saved me, and if He could do this for such a wicked, sinful girl as I've been He can surely save any one of you! Oh, let Jesus come into your hearts!"

Two days later she came to me in great distress. With much surprise, as I knelt by her side, did I listen to what was said. It was concerning the love in her heart for one which she felt must now be relinquished. After some battling with herself and prayer the victory was won.

A letter came the following morning from the very man she had thus, as it were, placed upon the altar, entreating us to allow him at least to have an interview with her, stating he never knew how deeply attached he was to her, as wicked as he was, etc. But to this we could not consent. In refusing, however, we pleaded with him to yield also to Christ and assured him of our prayers in his behalf.

The next communication we received from him, a week or so later, was of a decidedly different tone. He had become deeply convicted of sin, and so distressed in mind that he could not sleep, and had lost appetite and interest in his business. Suddenly he felt impelled to go and see that dear old mother he had for years most cruelly neglected, after running away from home when still but a boy.

This brings us to the scene with which our story opened. To be so warmly welcomed, and to have such affection bestowed upon him, when, as he felt, he deserved nothing but blame and reproach, overwhelmed him with a sense of his wickedness and kindled in his heart a great desire to find

After a few days of quiet in that little old-fashioned home he bade his mother good-by and started on his way to New York, with a heart bubbling over with thanksgiving to God for such a mother. Several of us had interviews with him, and we agreed in the belief that God had indeed taken, as is described in Jeremiah, the marred vessel into His hands "to make it over again into another vessel."

The day following, a wedding took place at the Door of Hope. When the service was concluded we all knelt around the library table and praised the Lord for what He had wrought.

The next question was where they should begin their married lives. The husband left it to E- to decide. She retired, upon my suggestion, to her room to wait upon God for His guid-

About twenty minutes later she returned, and stated that she felt it was the Lord's thought for them to return to that very Southern city from which she had come and let the people see what He had wrought.

They left with hearts of gratitude, and earnestly desiring we should pray for E-'s mother, who had disappeared during their absence. This we did, and in less than a week she was found, and a room was fitted up for her in their new home. With such love and patience did they deal with her that ten days later she wrote, stating that she had seen Christ so live Himself out in her daughter's life that it had simply broken her heart with grief and penitence, and she had decided to give herself in full surrender

One small room in their comfortable home was kept open for any young girl who needed a helping hand, and thus there was in this home for Christ a Door of Hope on the quiet, and more than one who was in danger was cared for and prayed with and helped back to friends.

From time to time would I go, when journeying South, to see mother and daughter and husband, so gloriously redeemed, and learn how things were progressing with them, always coming away with blessing in my heart which was a tonic to my soul and encour-

agement in my work.

Some time elapsed since the last brief visit, when one night suddenly I was awakened with the sense of some unknown need in connection with -. Oh, the hid-away service that can be rendered one for another, known only to God and the recipient! And how important is the ministry of prayer! So I waited in her behalf on God, desiring to be of assistance if possible. After continuing in intercession I felt prompted to stop on my way further South, where arrangements had been made for me to speak, and see her. When I reached their home the door was opened by the dear girl herself. Throwing her arms around me she sobbed and sobbed as she led me into their little drawingroom, exclaiming over and over again, "O Mother Whittemore! What brought you here to-day?" As I promptly told her it was the Lord alone, she answered, "Oh, yes! I know it was! I know it was! And so I thank Him, but my heart is broken,'

and then she endeavored to explain how that three Sundays before upon entering church, she had noticed two ladies looking at her and whispering together. Then, catching the glance of a few others, she was made to feel most uncomfortable. "But, O Mother Whittemore," she said, "the next service I attended many seemed to avoid me. It was unbearable."

Someone who knew of her previous life had spread reports concerning it among the members of the church where they were workers. This had resulted in their being ostracized, and the pastor had called to say he felt it would be best for all concerned if they stayed away for a time. May I not be permitted to plead that no one who reads this story will ever give way to the temptation to treat the redeemed of Christ as this dear girl was treated? Surely no matter how great the sinner, if pardoned and cleansed through "the Blood of the Lamb" so as to be made acceptable unto God, they should, for Christ's sake, be received into fellowship by us. If ever a thought arises as to what they once were, may it immediately be banished in rejoicing over what, through the atoning Blood, they now are!

Though sad and trying experiences have been E—'s lot, never has she withdrawn from the solemn committal made that day to be more than ever subservient to the will of her Lord.

And we have said, "Has God forgotten to be gracious?" Never. "Does God not answer prayer?" He does. "Does God not reward faith?" Most

assuredly. But there is a deeper lesson we need to learn, the lesson that we cannot use God, it is God who uses us. I am impressed by those verses in Rom. 8:26, 27, "We know not what we should pray for as we ought." Do you agree with that? How we need to learn that lesson.

I am helped in reading the Bible, to find men praying for things when it is very evident they did not know what they were asking for. The very man whom God intended should never die was the one who prayed that he might die. What a lesson for us! I guess Elijah is glad God did not answer that prayer. We know not what we should pray for as we ought. One of the things we are going to thank God for when we get to glory will be our unanswered prayers.

The Scripture goes on to say, "But the Spirit Himself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered." He makes intercession for the saints according to the will of God. There is a place in prayer—I have been there sometimes, and would to God I were there always—where you lose all desire of your own whatsoever; where as you wait before God your own desires and your own will are left a thousand miles behind, and you come by divine grace to a place of absolute surrender and emptiness. And then the Holy Spirit takes hold of you and He begins to fill your heart with desires that are the will of God; and you are caught in a stream of intercession in the Spirit which is simply God Himself desiring and longing through you. Oh, that marvelous place! I have found that when the Holy Ghost is praying through me He is also believing through me. And as I pray according to the will of God I find there is in my heart an absolute certainty that the thing I am asking for will come to pass.

I believe we would not face some of the problems we have, some of the disappointments, if we waited awhile before God to find out what is His will, for then we should not ask for things which are out of His will. Our prayer life would be inspired by the Holy Ghost, and being inspired by Him we should also have the faith of God operating in our hearts—the faith that laughs at impossibilities, and cries, "It shall be done." You ask us to explain the wonderful movement of God in Eastern Europe, those wonderful waves of divine blessing which are rolling over Poland and Russia and sweeping hundreds of thousands into the kingdom. I believe the explanation is that somewhere God has hidden servants who are praying in the Spirit and are exercising the gift of faith. until the very gates of heaven are swung open.

We are naturally sad at losing her, but rejoicing that another soul from this dark land has been safely landed in glory.

Times of Refreshing in Shanghai

The missionaries at Shanghai invited me to come up there for a convention, which was scheduled to commence October 28, lasting for ten days. As I made preparation to go, it seemed that Satan did everything he could to make my going impossible. But by God's loving hand, He who called us to this field made possible a way, and I arrived the day before the convention was to open.

Already preparation had been made. A large church had been secured by Sister Moomau and her coworkers, the church being made accessible to us through the healing of one of the members of its organization. For ten days the Lord blessed in these meetings, and the singing, praying, and testifying sounded like the OLD-TIME Pentecostal meetings we used to enjoy years ago. But the Lord had much more in store for us than some had anticipated. There are seven different branches of the Pentecostal work in Shanghai, and this ten-day convention was sponsored by only one of these. The Lord began to work in a mighty way, putting a realization of a need for a united convention in Shanghai upon the hearts of the people. At the end of the ten days the convention was reorganized with these other saints cooperating, and to express it in the words of the Shanghai saints, "Only eternity will tell what has been accomplished in Shanghai.'

The young people brought out their instruments, two violins, two mando-

lins, a guitar, and one trombone, and our Sister Moomau played the organ, while the rest of us used our harps of ten strings. Oh, how the praises in song and hallelujahs did ring out, especially in the afternoon meetings on Sunday! Practically every other church was represented in the audience and many for the first time got a real glimpse of what Pentecost really is.

Yes, prayer changes things. It also changes human beings and human made programs. The meetings lasted about one month instead of ten days. Fellowship was restored to God's people, and many sick were prayed for during the campaign. Some sought and received the Holy Spirit, some were saved, but best of all-a fellowship meeting of the Pentecostal saints in Shanghai is to be called periodically, where in the spirit of Pentecost the Chinese and missionaries meet together and discuss their common problems. Some one expressed himself at one of these meetings thus, "Brother, I have never seen anything like this in Shanghai for 21 years." To GOD be all the glory for the mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit in this convention.

The climax of the campaign was ushered in by a most pleasant surprise for me. I was to leave on Monday and the preceding Saturday I was unexpectedly ushered into a large hall brilliantly lighted, where I saw the missionaries, leaders, Chinese workers, men, and women standing in a circle around three long tables laden with food. I had been invited as guest of honor. Songs were sung, and then we ate together the appetizing food. But after the food had been eaten, we took this opportunity to have a tes-timony meeting, and it was one that I shall long remember. Every one seemed to be too full for words, and many of the testimonies ended up with a flood of tears, and it was only after the time had sped away into the late hours that, with much reluctance, the meeting was brought to a close. I was also surprised that same evening by being presented with a ticket back to Hongkong.

On the next Sunday afternoon, it seemed that the best talent in Shanghai had been organized for this last afternoon meeting, and the songs of the choir, the music made by the orchestra, the hallelujahs of the Christians seem still to ring in my ears. On Monday morning a company of the saints, Chinese and missionaries, went with me to the wharf, and the colored paper strings were thrown me while they stood their ground holding these as long as they could, singing Pente-costal songs until the boat was so far away that every paper string had been broken, and the last word I heard from

the shore was a united responsive shout "Hallelujah." The Lord united our hearts so that there will ever remain in our minds the fragrance of those blessed days spent in Shanghai when the Lord worked miracles for His people.

Hints to Missionary Bands



We have been showing from time to time illustrations of some missionary banners which prayer bands might be interested in making in order to increase missionary interest. These banners were made by the students of Central Bible Institute. The banner of China which is illustrated above is very expressive of the need of that land, for it is only the light of God's Word which can dispel the awful spiritual darkness that is China's.

For this banner it will be necessary to purchase 11/4 yards of bright yellow or orange satin, 11/4 yards of light weight black material for the back of the banner, 1 yard black fringe for the bottom, ½ yard of 54" black felt for the map and letters, 11-3 yards black cord, three black tassels, and one curtain rod. Secure a pattern of the map of China including the islands of Japan and Formosa, as well as patterns of the letters required to form the words given on the banner. Cut the letters and the map out of the black felt. Arrange these on the satin as shown in the illustration and stitch.

The most difficult part of the banner will be making the Bible. Take a piece of light weight card board and cut in the shape of an open Bible. Then cut a piece of white sateen the same size as the card board and paste the cloth on the card board. Bind the edge with black ribbon. Inside the black

binding on the two sides and on the bottom, apply some gilt to represent the edges of the leaves. Then with India ink put on the necessary printing or lines representing printing. The Bible is attached to the banner only on the corners and some cotton was placed underneath it to give the right

Then sew the facing on the back, the fringe on the bottom, and make a hem at the top for the rod. Insert the rod, attach the tassels and cord, and the banner is finished.

Incidents of Daily Occurrence FRENCH SUDAN

A young Christian boy about fourteen years' old, who has undergone much persecution, was told by his father, who is the chief of the village, that if he didn't give up this way something serious would happen to him. The boy was heard to reply in all humility, "My father, I will do any kind of work that you give me. Every day I pray to God and ask Him to help me to take good care of your sheep and goats, that nothing will harm them, and He helps me. In all of these things I am only too glad to obey you, for so God's Word teaches me, but to give up Christ, and to make sacrifice as before, I cannot, even though you beat me or kill me, for Christ is more than life to me."

A small Christian boy, also of the village of Touega, was bitten by a scorpion and he lay on the ground writhing in pain. The townspeople stood around, some laughing at him, and some trying to persuade him to send for the medicine man, but we sent for the native preacher and had him pray for him. Although the pain did not leave at once, by morning he was able to go to work. His own father came and looked at him and said, "You believe in Jesus and won't send for the medicine man, then you can just lie there and die." But Jesus took him up when his father forsook him, and now the townspeople are saying, "Just wait until a snake bites one of you who believe in Jesus, and we shall see what your God will do about

One night when the native teacher was escorting his flock back to Touega after being in here to service, he was impressed to step to one side of the path at a certain place, and, of course, all the children stepped aside at the same place. After all had passed, he thought he would go back and see why he was so impressed. He looked and saw a deadly poisonous snake coiled up in the path. Many such incidents could be related of God's faithfulness to us and to these people.

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
