
There is one sentence in the 19th chapter of Luke that I fear is very much misunderstood. It is the parable of the pounds. The nobleman says to his servants, "Occupy till I come." People think that means occupying a comfortable seat in a nice church building, and enjoying the service. It has no such meaning. The true meaning is: "Trade you herewith till I come." "Go out and do business till I come." Most people take it to mean just to occupy a nice comfortable seat and enjoy the meetings, and to manage to keep from backsliding someway.

I have met with a great many of the Pentecostal people in America and my general impression in meeting with them is that they do not understand the vital importance of God's missionary program. They do not understand the nature nor the tremendous importance of the Lord's purpose for them for the present time.

They are content, as a rule, to do their best in building up their home assemblies, keep the meetings going, and keep the enthusiasm of the local assembly up to the boiling point, if possible. Then when missionary Sunday comes around they put in an offering of some kind, and "do my bit," as so many people express it.

But they do not understand that the Lord's appointment for *them* is to get the gospel preached to *every* creature during their generation. So few have the missionary vision. The Lord expects me to see to it with all that is within me, with all the possibilities of my being, that every man, woman, and child in this generation shall hear the

gospel. I believe that is the Lord's purpose for everyone of us, not for just a few missionaries. I see it, my Godappointed business during my lifetime is to leave no stone unturned in order to see that the gospel is preached to every creature. As long as there are some places yet unevangelized I have no business to stop my service, my labors, my toils.

The Life of a Palestine Shepherd

The writer of this article is a Jewess who has an intimate knowledge of shepherd life in Palestine. This article and a subsequent one, we believe, will give a new light to many concerning the Great Shepherd and His work.



MAGNIFY the Lord with me, and let us exalt His name

together.'

Every child of God should have an intimate knowledge of the titles or names by

which the Lord is made known to His own, so as to know Him in all the fullness of covenant relationship.

The great title which we are about to consider will be greatly enhanced to us, as we make ourselves acquainted with the customs of shepherd and sheep life in Palestine, and therein shall we come to better know Him who called Himself the Good Shepherd.

Great importance is attached to a name in Oriental countries. Names are not chosen haphazard, but are an indication of the character, position,

or circumstances of the one so named.
I am always glad that Moses asked God His Name. The marvelous reply has been a tower of strength and a stable rock for myriads of saints throughout the ages. I AM THAT I AM—He really and truly is all that He claims to be. I AM-present tense. He is therefore the very One for the need of the moment. The God of today! What are you most in need of today? A Provider, a Physician, a Shepherd, a Baptizer, a Peacemaker, a Warrior, a Companion, a Mighty One? These are the wonderful names by which God reveals Himself to man, and He is all of these today.

And if there should be a shadow of doubt concerning the I AM, God further says to Moses, "This is my name for ever, this is my memorial unto all generations." The word "memorial" does not refer to something which is past, but really means a reminder of what He still is, and will be to His people. One dispensation therefore may give place to another, generations may come and go, but God continues to be the everlasting and great I AM.

The particular name of the Lord which we are about to magnify (or examine in detail) is that of Jehovah Roi-The Lord the Shepherd, and having done so I am sure that we shall exalt it, and set it aloft as far above the types of Oriental shepherds (beautiful as they may be) as the heaven is higher than the earth.

The Lord Jesus had in mind the shepherds of Palestine on that ever memorable day when He made the stupendous declaration "I am the good Shepherd?

Who Are the Shepherds of Palestine?

Always the youngest son or sons. Should a man have only one son, then the daughters will care for the flocks, while the only son will stay at home. He is the warrior, and must fight his father's battles, having charge of the trained servants of the household. Caring for sheep is considered menial work, only fit for the youngest son of a family, or for the daughters. David being the youngest of the family had charge of the flocks, and of so little importance was he accounted, that no one bothered to see that he was at the feast to which the family were bidden.

Jethro's daughters looked after the sheep, and Rachel was a shepherdess. The hatred of Joseph by his brethren is explained by the fact that Jacob reversed the order, sending the older sons out with the flocks and, keeping the two youngest at home, proclaimed Joseph to be the heir.

Jesus, the first begotten of the Father, was not ashamed to announce Himself a shepherd, though He would know right well the popular feeling concerning them. It would be a hard saying to those who heard the gracious words, for how could He be at the same time both Messiah and a shepherd? To them that believed not the words were a real stone of stumbling. On the other hand faith must be prepared for some surprises, and be ready to launch out into deeper waters than was at first anticipated when starting out. The penetrating vision of faith discerns all the qualities of both eldest and youngest sons combined in Jesus. By faith we perceive Him in the hostile country of this world, the eldest Son, a Warrior, fighting alone, and single-handed His Father's battles. He triumphs over the foe, and returns to His Father's house by way of a glorious resurrection and ascension, with the keys of death and hell in His possession. Mighty Conqueror!

His Clothing?

Shepherds today wear the same kind

of clothing as in Bible times. In appearance they have changed as little as their sheep. A long colored cotton robe is worn with a leathern girdle round the waist, the head being protected from the sun by a brightly colored square of cotton which falls over the shoulders, and is kept in place by a cord of goat's hair. Over the robe is worn a long coat of sheepskin.

The flock always surrounds him when he appears, and are obviously delighted to have him in their midst. The coat of sheepskin enables them to recognize him at once, and must make them feel that he is one of themselves. At night in the midst of the flock he lies on the ground, completely covering himself with his sheepskin, so that it is impossible to distinguish shepherd from sheep.

In like manner does Jesus the Good Shepherd appear as His sheep being made "in the likeness of sinful flesh. . . . Forasmuch then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, He also Himself likewise took part of the same. . . . In all things it behoved Him to be made like unto His brethren." How infinite then is His understanding of the sheep of His pasture. How fully we can trust Him! Touched with the feeling of our infirmities, tempted in all points like as we are! How perfectly He can succor those that are tempted. Wonderful Shepherd!

His Weapons

Every shepherd carries a rod, a staff, and a sling, all of which are in constant use.

The rod is the straight stem of a young tree torn up by the roots the bulb at the end being studded with iron nails, makes it a very formidable weapon of defense against wild animals or robbers who may attack the sheep. One blow on the head with the rod would soon render them senseless.

The staff is a long stick with a crook end; on it the shepherd leans while watching the flock. It is also used in helping to extract sheep from the thorn bushes in which they so often get entangled. The shepherd beating down the bush with his rod makes a way of escape for the sheep which he gently draws out of its dangerous position with the crook end of the staff.

The rod reminds David of God's protecting care over him, while the staff is the emblem of the God on whom we may lean, and cast all our care. No wonder he exclaims, "Thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." By these two weapons does our Good Shepherd protect us, and extricate us out of all our difficulties.

There are times when we are called to pass through valleys in which the shadows of death and darkness seem to lurk, and where enemies lie in wait for our souls. Be our valley one of trial to faith, loss, affliction, sickness, or temptation, our dire need at such times is for protection and support. Behold the Shepherd in that very valley in which you find yourself, armed with the rod of His protection, and the staff of His support! Can you not chant that note of exultation with David and exclaim "I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me."

There are sheep which are prone to wander, utterly ignorant of the dangers which surround them. At such times the sling is brought into requisition, a stone is placed in it, and with the accuracy born of long practice the shepherd hurls the missile immediately in front of the straying sheep, thus startling it into a sense of danger and causing it to return to the flock.

We often sing "I was a wandering sheep." Would it not be more truthful to sing, "I am a wandering sheep"? Alas, how the Lord's sheep do wander from the center of His will and plan for them. They will not obey His voice; others there are who will not go all the way through-will not pay the price, want to get to heaven on a bed of roses, instead of buckling on their armor, and going into active service. Then be not surprised should there come hurtling through the air a "stone" from the sling of divine chastisement. Something sudden, something startling, will come upon you, something which will cause a speedy return to the care and fellowship of your Shepherd.

All day long the faithful shepherd is in the midst of the flock, providing for all their needs; be it grass, water, protection, reviving, healing, helping along the way, he is right on the spot for the need of the moment. A great intimacy therefore springs up between shepherd and sheep. It is not surprising that Jesus the Shepherd could affirm, "I know my sheep, and am known of mine." How literally true is the 10th chapter of John's Gospel when read in the light of Eastern customs and manners.

Would we really magnify and exalt Him as Shepherd we must spend a whole day following in the tracks of the sheep from early sunrise to midnight's dark hour, and we shall see how literally true were David's words, "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever."

So next week, the Lord willing, we

will tell you a little of what a day in the life of a Palestine shepherd is like.

The Unique Christ

Jesus Christ was born in the meanest of circumstances, but the air above was filled with the hallelujahs of the heavenly host. His lodging was a cattle pen, but a star drew distinguished visitants from afar to do Him homage.

His birth was contrary to the laws of life. His death was contrary to the laws of death. No miracle is so inexplicable as His life and teaching.

He had no cornfields or fisheries, but He could spread a table for five thousand and have bread and fish to spare. He walked on no beautiful carpets, but He walked on the waters and they supported Him.

His crucifixion was the crime of crimes, but, on God's side, no lower price than His infinite agony could have made possible our redemption. When He died, few men mourned, but a black crepe was hung over the sun. Though men trembled not for their sins, the earth beneath shook under the load. Corruption could not get hold of His body. The soil that had been reddened with His blood could not claim His dust.

Three years He preached His gospel. He wrote no book, built no church, had no monetary backing. After nineteen hundred years, He is the one central character of human history, the perpetual theme of all preaching, the pivot around which the events of the ages revolve, the only Regenerator of the human race.

Was it merely the son of Joseph and Mary who crossed the world's horizon nineteen hundred years ago? Was it merely human blood that was spilled on Calvary's hill for the redemption of sinners and which has worked such wonders in men and nations through the centuries?

What thinking man can keep from exclaiming: "My Lord and my God!"

God's Protection of His Own

"Show Thy marvelous loving kindness, O Thou that savest by Thy right hand them which put their trust in Thee from those that rise up against them. Keep me as the apple of the eye, hide me under the shadow of Thy wings." Psa. 17:7, 8.

"For he that toucheth you toucheth the apple of His eye." Zech. 2:8.

God used this illustration to show the care He has for His saints. The eye is one of the most important members of the body, and is the most protected part. The eyelids have a constant flow of liquid to keep the eyes from dust; the eyelids above as an extra protection; and the bone protection above and below. And God likens His protection over us to the protection the eye receives. He says concerning us, "He that toucheth you toucheth the apple of His eye."

God protects us from both natural and spiritual enemies, and with this protection the saint can sally forth to fight the enemy. The weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but are mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds, and all that these strongholds contain. The serpent was condemned to crawl in the dust. Dust is to be the serpent's meat in the millennium. And the powers of darkness are to be pulled down to the dust of the earth.

Man was made out of the dust of the earth, and man will have power to bring down to the dust all the enemies. We are to triumph over them in Christ. Christ saw Satan fall as lightning as the disciples went forth with the message of salvation, healing, and victory. As David brought down the giant to the dust, and ran and put his foot on his neck, so God has commissioned His saints with power over all the power of the enemy.

Protected by God, with God's guarantee of safety, we launch out in active fight against the enemies of God and our own enemies, bringing them down to the dust on their knees in subjection to Christ; for every knee shall bow to Him. Such honor have God's saints.

The Coming Glory .

Peter wrote of the Spirit of Christ being in the prophets, testifying beforehand both of "the sufferings of Christ and the glory that should follow." 1 Peter 1:11. We have become familiar with the sufferings of Christ for they have been depicted by the pen of the Holy Spirit through the Gospels. The sufferings of Christ have been the inspiration of poetry, prose, and painting all down the ages. These sufferings are a fact in history. The crucifixion, death, and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ have brought into being the church of the living God.

But the Spirit not only spoke of the sufferings of Christ but also of the "glory that should follow." If this glory has not yet been seen it will be, just as surely as the sufferings of Christ have been made manifest. What is the glory? It is that for which the Lord Jesus Christ asked when He cried to the Father, "Glorify Thy Son that Thy Son also may glorify Thee." John 17:1.

It is that of which the Son spoke when He told His disciples that He was coming "in the glory of His Father with the holy angels." Mark 8:38. It is that which the Son shall receive when He shall come "to be glorified in His saints." 2 Thess. 1:10.

Christ was glorified on His return to heaven, and as the Son of man received the promise of the Father. When He declared, "He that believeth on Me as the Scripture hath said, out of his innermost being shall flow rivers of living water," He spoke this of the Spirit which they that believe on Him should receive, for at that time the Holy Ghost was not yet given because that Jesus was not yet glorified. But when He ascended to heaven He received glory. We have the picture vividly given in the 24th Psalm, when those in the glory sang together, "Lift up your heads O ve gates; and be ve lifted up ye everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall come in." And on the Day of Pentecost we see the overflow of the glory bestowed by the Father on His beloved Son, as it overflowed on the hundred and twenty in the upper room. It was an *upper* room indeed. They magnified God and glorified His Son under the operation of the Spirit of God. That was an earnest of the glory yet to be revealed.

Christ is yet to receive many more manifestations or unfoldings of glory. He has been promised "He shall see of the travail of His soul and shall be satisfied."

It will be glory to Him when He will present His perfected church, without spot or wrinkle, to His Father. He says, "I am glorified in them." His saints are to form part of that glory which will help to fill up the glory of the Son of man. In view of this, what manner of persons ought we to be! He that overcomes shall inherit all things. Pay the price and be an overcomer, and thereby glorify the Son of God. It is worth while. Yet, after all, the sacrifice we may make does not pay the price. Every full sacrifice you make to God and His Son is simply the grace of God worked in your heart to enable you to do His will and good pleasure.

The most outstanding glory that will be brought to the Son will be on the occasion of the marriage of the Lamb. We see them singing, "Let us be glad and rejoice and give honor to Him; for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and His wife hath made herself ready." Rev. 19:7. Scripture is somewhat reticent about the details of this glorious event. The invitations to the grandest weddings of earth are often conveyed in a terse note: "Mr. and Mrs. So-and-So invite vou to the wedding of their daughter Mary," etc. etc. Little may be gathered from that note as to whether it will be a grand wedding or not. In a measure you are guided by the social standing and wealth of the parents or of the bridegroom, as to what its character will be, whether or not it will be a grand affair. This wedding of the Son of God, the Lamb, will be so wonderful that the Holy Spirit says, "Blessed are they which are called unto the marriage supper of the Lamb." Rev. 19: 9. If the invited guests are called blessed, how much more so the bride?

To get a slight idea of the magnificence of this wedding we must first look at those who send the invitation. Look at the resources of those who send forth this invitation. It comes from Him who made the earth with all its varied flowers, seas, rivers, mountains, and all the beauties of sound and sight, the One who created the sun, moon, and stars, whose angels excel in strength, whose ministers are a flame of fire. The whole of creation, visible and invisible, will then be on display for this event, for this gala day of the eternities, this day of the marriage of the matchless Son of God.

Who are the ones privileged to be the bride? The overcomers, those who by grace have surrendered, who have shared in the sufferings of the despised and rejected Jesus of Nazareth.

It is then, "in the day of his espousals and in the day of the gladness of his heart," that God's beloved Son will enter into the fulness of His joy. S. S. 3:11.

God Himself spoke from heaven as the Son came out of the waters of baptism at Jordan, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." He was well pleased when His Son was about to start on His ministry—that ministry of suffering which terminated in death at Calvary. How much more will He be pleased to do all that a mighty God and loving Father desires to do to glorify His Son at the marriage festival, the joys of which will last through eternity. It Happened in a Railroad Coach

I had taken my seat one afternoon in a train when a priest of the Church of Rome entered the coach and sat down opposite me.

Having long had a desire to speak to a priest, I felt that this was my opportunity. I said, "Sir, I have long had an impression on my mind, and I should take it as a favor if you would

allow me to ask you a question."
He very politely said, "I shall be most happy to answer you to the best

of my ability.'

I said, "Well, sir, if I am rightly informed, there is a very serious question at issue between you and the Son of God.

Indeed," he replied.

"The question is this, sir; the Son of God says (John 5:24): 'Verily. verily, I say unto you, he that heareth My words, and believeth on Him that sent Me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life.' Now, sir, I have been told that all you priests say, 'Verily, verily, we say unto you, he that heareth our words, and believeth on Him that sent us, can never know that he hath everlasting life-shall never in the present life know whether he shall come into condemnation or not, nor whether he has passed from death unto life or not.' Now, sir, I wish to know from you whether there is so flat a contradiction in your teaching to the words of the Son of God."

I shall never forget the man's looks.

He said, "May I ask, who you are?"
"Oh," said I, "through the mercy of God, I am one who has heard and received the words of Christ, and I have found them words of life. I do believe that God sent Him to die, the sacrifice for my sins. I do believe that God raised Him from the dead. I have redemption through His precious Blood—even forgiveness of sins. Yes, and His Blood cleanseth me from all sins. Oh, yes, I do believe these precious words, and I have everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation. I have passed from death unto life—hearing His words I have all this -what should I have if I believed your words?"

"Ah," says the priest, "you must be mistaken in supposing it possible in this life to know that you are saved, or

what could St. Paul mean when he said, 'No man knows whether he is worthy of favor or hatred"?"

I reached the Bible, which I had in my hand, towards him, and said, "Will you kindly show me where St. Paul says any such thing?"

"Oh," says he, "I think you know more about it than I do; you can find it sooner than I can."

I replied, "Indeed I cannot find what is not in his writings-but I will gladly read what he does say. In the Acts 13:38, 39, after speaking of the death and resurrection of Christ, he says, 'Be it known unto you therefore, men and brethren, that through this Man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins; and by Him all that believe are justified from all things." In Rom. 5:1, he says, 'Therefore, being justified by faith we have peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ.' In Col. 1:14, 'In whom we have redemption through His blood, even the forgiveness of sins.' Why, my dear sir, there is nothing makes a man so happy as to know that his sins are forgiven."

"But do you mean to say there is no such passage in the Bible as the one

I named?" asked the priest.

"On the subject of salvation there is not such a text," I replied. "Solomon, when speaking of the vanity of this life, did say, 'No man knoweth either love or hatred by all that is before them." Eccles. 9:1. He did not mean to deny the gospel by this passage.

"I think," said he, "that man must be very presumptuous, who thinks himself so holy and so good as to be quite sure he is saved. He may have many of the fruits of the Spirit in him, but yet it becomes him humbly to doubt.

"Yes, indeed," said I, "and if that were the ground of salvation, it would become him ever to doubt; but, sir, you make a fatal mistake in supposing that a Christian's hope is based on his goodness or holiness, or even on the work of the Spirit in him. There are thousands who are seeking peace with God in this way, I know, but there never was one that found it thus. No, sir, it is not my work or the work of the Spirit in me-but the work of the Son of God for me, on which I must rely. He loved me, and gave Himself for me. Now I ask, is it presumption to believe on Him whom God raised from the dead? He is the Rock that shall never be moved. Have you never read, sir, in chapter 10 of the Epistle to the Hebrews, that the offering of the body of Jesus Christ for ever perfects, and that the Holy Ghost is to bear witness of this? Heb. 10:14, 15. 'For by one offering He hath perfected

for ever them that are sanctified. Whereof the Holy Ghost also is a witness to us.' Yes, and however men may reject His witness, still it is true that we 'have boldness to enter into the Holiest by the Blood of Jesus.' This peace can never be interrupted. Now, sir, would you not be very happy if you were quite sure that God had for Christ's sake forgiven your sinsas He certainly had forgiven the Ephesian believers, and every believer mentioned in the New Testament? Then you will find that there will be a real work of the Spirit within you, after you have fully believed in the work of Christ for you."

"Ah," he said, "if you will come up to my house (giving me his address), I will teach you."

He said this as he left the train. My last words to him were these: "That would be poor teaching, where all is uncertainty and darkness.

Just as the priest had left the coach, a young man who had listened with the deepest attention, said, "Will you speak to me a little further of the difference between resting on the finished work of Christ for me, and the work of the Spirit in me?" He said that he had for many years been an anxious seeker of salvation, but had looked for a sufficient depth of the Spirit's work in him, to be sure he had the witness of the Spirit, and was

A friend of mine who was with me, showed him from the Word, that the Spirit did not bear witness how good we are, but how exceeding bad, how utterly ruined we are by sin. But that God Himself has sent His Son to be offered up for our sins—and that the moment we cease from our own foolish efforts to be saved by our works, and come to Christ with all our sin and misery, just as we are, then we have peace; according to His own words, "Come unto Me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will you rest." In short, that the Spirit bears witness to the glory and worth of Christ. Light burst into the young man's soul, and at once he found peace through the precious Blood of Christ.

Offerings of time-to do this work effectively you cannot run in, offer a short prayer, and run out again, but you must wait until every avenue of your being is subdued and the Holy Ghost prays through you. Offerings of strength-it takes real physical strength to intercede. Offerings of obedience—obedience to the many calls to prayer in the Word of God. Offerings of willing hearts-to give yourselves unreservedly to this work. These offerings will be gladly received by the One who sits on the throne of grace,

and He will take you into partnership with His Son in this great work. What a marvelous privilege! "And who then is willing to consecrate his service this day unto the Lord?"

Intercession involves prevailing prayer; prevail against every obstacle that hinders, enter into the conflict in the heavenlies, invade the kingdom of the enemy of souls. Long has he held sway over these women, leading them captive at his will, binding their

souls in chains of darkness, and dulling their consciences to sin.

To intercede effectively one must have faith in the willingness of the One with whom he intercedes to do what is asked. "The Lord is . . . longsuffering, not willing that any should perish." One must have faith in the power of His Word. "The entrance of thy Word giveth light." "He sent His Word and healed them." "What a Word is this, for with authority and power He commandeth the unclean spirit and they come out."

Come along, sit with us for once, and then you will see the need and it will be easier for you to get under the burden of prayer. With Bible and songbook in hand, we shall go to the yard of one of the Christian women. We sit in the midst on a log. A crowd of women, a host of children, and a

few old men gather around. This time we shall tell them of the Samaritan woman to whom Jesus talked about the Water of Life—water that you don't have to draw from a well with a gourd and carry home on your heads in a earthen pot! Ah, that makes an appeal for water carrying out here is work indeed. And if you drink this water you will never get thirsty again! Then we go on with the story and its explanation. One old grandmother speaks up, "I don't do anything wrong." Only conviction of sin wrought by the Holy Spirit can enlighten this poor darkened mind. One woman is suffering with an immense goiter, but the truth that Jesus heals has never entered her heart. We come away praying that the Holy Spirit will take the Seed of the Word spoken

Building a house in Yako, French Sudan. The men are carrying mud in their baskets for mortar and brick making

into those hearts and trust that it shall be watered by the tears of many intercessors, so that God can bring forth a harvest of souls among the women of Yako.

If those who will give themselves to this work feel to write us, we shall be glad to tell them more about it and give them special requests for prayer.

What Shall We Answer? Emil Chastagner

In French West Africa the government has established schools to which they send children from all over the country. In this way it sometimes happens that some who have come under the influence of the gospel in their home town look up the missionaries and continue with the Lord. Sometimes, however, it works the other way, and those who have heard the gospel

are sent to school elsewhere where there are no missionaries.

Some months back two little fellows who had been sent to Kaya to school went to the mission and accepted Christ. They were instructed in the way and were faithful in attendance. Not long after the government transferred them to the school at Tenkodogo. From there they wrote to the missionary at Kaya stating they were still following the Lord and praying, but said, "It is hard to follow the advice you gave us when there is no one here to help us. The Catholics are building a church here, but there are no Protestant missionaries. Are not you going to have a mission here too?" What shall we answer?

Tenkodogo is a point at which the missionaries have long hoped to es-

tablish a station. There have been others besides these two boys who have longed for the coming of the missionaries to this place, but their prayers have not yet been answered. We believe in the spontaneous expansion of the church, and our native workers receive support only from the native church. The smaller towns and villages can be (and in fact, must be) occupied by natives, but the larger towns, which are government centers, need to

be occupied by missionaries, one of the main reasons being exemplified by a recent occurrence here at Ouagadougou.

Three of our Christians had been going to a certain village (the home of two of them), and witnessing to the people. The Catholics at once visited that village and told the people that there would be trouble for them if they consented to the coming of the Protestants and that they should refuse to listen to them. They even had one of the leading chiefs to warn them to the same effect. If left to the natives alone, this might have closed the door to that village as the natives fear the Catholics, knowing that most of government officials are Catholic as are also many of the chiefs. A visit by the missionary, who told them that the law allowed them to worship God as they chose, inspired confidence because he was a white man, but they would not have believed a native.

We need these stations at important centers that the work may be conducted and directed from them. This is one of five such places, and we have put in a request for a concession. We have also put in requests for concessions at Boromo and Koudougou, while at Ouahigouya we already have the land, but no building, and are praying that the needed funds may come in to build these stations and the missionaries to occupy them. Will you not pray with us?

Thirdly, we see God's revealing PROVIDENCE. Now the last character we want to look at is Rebekah. If Abraham speaks to us of the principles of righteousness, Eleazer of prayer, then Rebekah pictures Providence.

Oh, that this fact might sink into our hearts that our lives are not like leaves falling off trees around us, driven about by the wind. I believe my Heavenly Father watches me. God does look after His own. God rules every circumstance. In the providential arrangement of my circumstances I can see so much that sweetly indicates the will of God for me.

A woman came to Gypsy Smith in great trouble. "Brother Smith," she said, "The Lord called me to preach the gospel and I have a family of twelve children." But the Gypsy was not as concerned as she thought he ought to have been, "That is all right," he said. "But Brother, you cannot understand. I am called to preach but am married and have twelve children."

"No, you do not understand. No one does. I am called to be a preacher but have twelve children."

"Sister, can't you see the Lord called you to preach the gospel and has given you a congregation to preach it to?"

I always enjoy telling that little story. "If a man provide not for his own, he is worse than an infidel." We have duties to husbands, wives, etc. I don't believe the Holy Ghost leads us to fail them. If God calls; then God will provide, and make our circumstances providentially fit in.

How is this shown in Rebekah's life? Eleazer prayed, "Let the first girl be the right one. If she is the right one, let her offer me a drink, and my camels drink also."

Here is Rebekah. Perhaps she was busy washing dishes, or mending clothes, or laundering—a good girl helping her mother. I can imagine her getting a little restless and saying, "I feel I must go earlier than usual to get water. I want to go now."

I can imagine her mother replying, "No need to go now. Wait until the rest of the girls go."

"No mother, I must go now. I feel I cannot wait longer."
"Don't be silly! Wait."

"Mother, let me go now. I must go now."

So you know what happens. went earlier than usual-earlier than the rest of the girls. She went first, fulfilling unconsciously the will of God. As she arrived at the well she probably thought, "How hot and thirsty that traveler looks," and offered him a drink after filling her pitcher; and then offered drink to his camels also. I am certain Eleazer thought, "What a kind-hearted lass!" Unconsciously to herself, she was answering his prayer. I am sure the man looked at her wonderingly. I think he was having the treat of his life as he saw his prayer being fulfilled. I often wonder when I have seen God's hand at work in people's lives for whom I had been praying. It always brings a little fuller contact between yourself and God; and as you see the answer coming to pass, you look on and wonder and have a good time. How providence fitted in that

The crowning point is in verse 58, "And they called Rebekah and said unto her, Wilt thou go with this man? And she said, I will go." Providential! Everything fitting in! All things working together! When the final conclusion came did she go? Yes. Brother and Sister, I am persuaded when I am moving in God's will things will fit in. You don't have to get a crowbar to open God's door. "A great door and effectual is open for me," said the Apostle. Don't you remember in Acts 16 when Paul and Timothy tried to go to Bithynia, tried to preach but had no anointing or lib-Paul had more sense than we When we are hindered, we get a crowbar or dynamite, and we say, "Don't care if God is leading or not. I am going ahead." If we had done what they did in those days, we should have saved money and precious lives. But when we get an idea, we go ahead, Almighty or no Almighty. But they waited until they got to Troas, and then the door opened. When I move in God's will, I do not go to the places where I have to push and shove. When I go in God's place, God opens the doors.

Some years ago I wanted to go to a certain country and I wrote a letter. But it was not God's place for me. If I hadn't been so pig-headed, I could have seen from their reply it was not God's will. But no, I had made up

my mind I wanted to go, so I wrote another letter. Another very courteous reply came asking if I could come later, as the time was not convenient then, they were having a convention later. But I had made up my mind I wanted to go. Someone wrote a letter and with it enclosed \$25.00. When I got the \$25.00, I was independent for I could pay my own fare. I went. They were kind, arranged meetings for me, and gave me an opportunity. But what a dry old time I had! No anointing at all! Out of God's will! The first time I preached there were 300 people present, the next 200, the next 100. Eventually I got home like a whipped dog with its tail between its I learned my lesson. I hope I shall never need to learn that lesson again. That is an experience from a preacher's diary. You may not be a preacher, but take it from me and the Word of God, when you are in His will, things will work smoothly. Everything will dovetail exquisitely.

Remember the three things if you want God to lead and guide you— first, principles of righteousness—the principles of the Word of God; second, prayer; every part and step of your life soaked in prayer; third, providence. If you are stepping in His will, He will make circumstances fit in. One of the loveliest things to do is to see God work in a life. I believe He has a plan for every life. I know He has for my life. I know He has for your life. Sometimes I must worship Him for the wonderful way He leads in my life and fills my soul with praise. I never enjoyed a job so much. The best comes at the end of the journey. Won't it be good when we get home and look back at our lives, like finished stories, and see how God guided every step of the way? That was the joy of Isaac and Rebekah.

I think the loveliest part must have been when Isaac and Rebekah talked it over after they got married. You know Isaac loved her. It was love at first sight. They were a happy couple after marriage. When walking in the cool of the evening she would say, "Come and let us go into the meadow where I first saw you when I jumped off the camel." And Isaac would say, "It is wonderful how God brought us together. Father would pray, 'Lord, guide Eleazer. Let him bring the right girl back.' We would pray each night. As soon as I saw you get off the camel, I knew you were the right one."

And then Rebekah would say, "I shall never forget the afternoon when I was so busy about the house, but I somehow felt I had to leave and go to the well, and when I saw the man,

I felt I should give him water: now I can see it was God guiding our lives."

I trust you will have the joy and peace of knowing you are in the will of God. If not, bring to God the broken pieces, the tangles of your life. He will straighten it all out. Bring it to Him. Jesus will be the Master of the situation.

The Greatest Thing in the World

is the Lord's program committed unto His people. Our receiving power from on high by the Baptism in the Holy Spirit and our witnessing unto the Lord unto the uttermost parts of the earth, are inseparably connected in the mind and heart of the Lord.

The Book of Acts is really a history of how the Lord's purpose was carried out during the first few years of this dispensation. Acts 5:42 shows how the Lord's purpose concerning Jerusalem was accomplished. "Daily in the temple and in every house they ceased not to teach and preach Jesus Christ." This was their one business. In this manner the work was finished in Jerusalem. Jerusalem was filled with the gospel. Everybody in Jerusalem heard it. But the next step was

Judaea and Samaria. "And at that time there was a great persecution against the church which was at Jerusalem; and they were all scattered abroad throughout the regions of Judaea and Samaria, except the apostles." Acts 8:1. "Therefore they that were scattered abroad went every where preaching the Word." Acts 8:4. And so the Lord's purpose concerning Judaea and Samaria was carried out. How? Through the persecution concerning Stephen. Every member of the church in Jerusalem, except a few who had been shut up in prison and the few apostles, were scattered abroad throughout all the regions of Judaea and Samaria, and they went everywhere preaching the Word.

There was some delay in carrying out the "everywhere preaching" part of the Lord's program, and that delay was caused by the slowness of the apostles to take the lead to go forward. After Jerusalem was filled with the gospel they should have gone out, but they didn't. And that was the first failure in the early church. The apostles didn't head the procession into the regions of Judaea and Samaria. Instead of the apostles leading and enthusiastically carrying on—that was the Lord's chosen method—the Lord had to let a persecution come and scatter the entire assembly throughout the regions of Judaea and Samaria.

The 19th chapter of Acts tells how Paul came to Ephesus, and how he dealt with the twelve men there who had believed. Paul's first word was to ask if they had received the Holy Spirit-if they had been endued with power from on high. Then Paul went into the synagogue and taught for the

space of three months.

"And this continued by the space of two years; so that all they which dwelt in Asia heard the word of the Lord ' Acts Jesus, both Jews and Greeks.' 19:10. How deeply interested the Lord is in the carrying out of His program. Why did the Lord have the apostle Paul stay in the synagogue three months teaching, and then two whole vears in Ephesus? So that all who dwelt in that entire province of Asia should hear the gospel. It was not just simply to build up a great church at Ephesus, so that the members should have a nice time, be built up in their spiritual lives, made strong Christians, and be prepared for the coming of the Lord. All of that took place, but the apostle continued there that the entire province of Asia should be evangelized and hear the word of the Lord. It is recorded that we may keep it before us that the Lord's purpose all through the early years was that everybody should hear the gospel.

How did they hear? We know that Paul remained in Ephesus teaching, but there were churches formed all over the province of Asia—Smyrna, Pergamos, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia, Laodicea, and others. How was it done? Simply by keeping before them all the time the vision of the evangelization of others. Paul from the very beginning in the work at Ephesus got the people to receive the Holy Spirit, and then go on with the work. There is no doubt that those twelve men were sent right out in a very short time. Paul continued in Ephesus looking after the work there. After the separation from the synagogue occurred, a glorious revival started, and in two years the whole province was evangelized. Hallelujah!

In Rom. 15:23 Paul speaks of how his own work was finished. "But now having no more place in these parts, and having a great desire these many years to come unto you; whensoever I take my journey into Spain I will come to you." Here Paul speaks about his own program. Above in the same chapter he speaks of how through the power of the Spirit and by mighty signs and wonders he has been able to preach the gospel around in a circuit from Jerusalem to Illyricum. In all this region he has fully preached the gospel of Jesus Christ. How? By the power of the Word and the power of the Holy Spirit.

"Having no more place in these parts." What does he mean by that? He means, "I have evangelized all of this region." He hadn't done it all himself. He had not only devoted his whole time to the evangelization of that region, but he had also in all the assemblies that God had established through his ministry faithfully taught them the principle of going and telling others, so that everyone of them was a missionary. In all this region he had fully preached the gospel of Christ. So it was understood in the apostolic church that the Baptism in the Spirit was for the express purpose that they might be witnesses in all the surrounding regions.

Well, this has been the program on our mission field on the Tibetan border. When I received the Baptism in the Spirit in 1912-19 years ago-I realized that I must not occupy a nice comfortable position till Jesus comes. I realized the Lord's purpose for myself was that I should witness. I received my Baptism on the fifth day of May and on the eighteenth of Mayjust thirteen days later-I was on my horse going, and I have been going

ever since.

On that mission field, we have fifty assemblies established and most of them set in order according to the Scriptures. Others are in the process of formation. But in those fifty assemblies the Spirit has been poured out, and everyone understands why the Lord has baptized them in the Holy Spirit. You don't have to be after them all of the time. They volunteer to go. On our mission field we are glad to let the Spirit have His way and let the Spirit speak to us. I have heard the Spirit speak a thousand times in the Chinese language, "Go, go, go,"
"Preach, preach, preach." "Preach
quickly, quickly." The Spirit will not let us settle down and enjoy life, and that is the secret of the success on that mission field!

By October of the year that I received my Baptism I had finished touring the field with which I was connected, and we came home to get a change of clothing and new supplies. While there we had a convention, and we gave our reports, and told how the Lord has been with us. Many had received the Baptism, some had been healed, and demons had been cast out; and we were rejoicing before the Lord, asking Him to lead us. The Spirit put a burden upon many hearts and they began to weep before God because of the condition of other parts of the province. While we were waiting before the Lord the Spirit spoke and called my name and that of one of our Chinese evangelists, who has been used very much over central, south, and north China. The Spirit said that we were to go north and hold

Now north of us was the China Inland Mission field. I knew that they were opposed to these manifestations of the Spirit even more than was the society with which I was connected. So I looked to the Lord and the Spirit spoke again and said, "The Lord has already opened the way to the north." So I believed the voice of the Spirit,

and we got ready to go.

I got my books and correspondence set in order, and by that time I had a letter from a missionary of the China Inland Mission. They had heard that we were having a revival and invited us to come to the capital of the province and hold a meeting for them. As soon as we received the letter we started, and the Lord worked mightily, even with the missionary himself. He had imbibed the teaching that every physical sensation in the body is caused by demons. But when the Word was preached in the power of the Spirit, and he saw the tremendous conviction that rested on the people, it caused him to question this teaching in his own mind. He went to the Lord in prayer about it and the Spirit fell on him and there were sensations in his body that he knew were not from evil spirits, but from the Lord Himself.

Once we were having a meeting in a very cold room. We had a fire to begin with, but the meeting lasted so long that the fire went out. We were kneeling in prayer and the Spirit fell on that missionary so that his body was drenched with perspiration. He thought the fire had been rekindled. But it was not the fire, it was the Spirit! The Spirit did such a work in that place that other missionaries coming there later said, "Why that church was dead before you came, but now it is alive." Now that church is one of

the largest in the province.

Another missionary, still farther north, wrote me asking if I would come there. Everything was fulfilled just as the Spirit had said. The Spirit often speaks to the Chinese workers also and points out to them where to go. They go ahead because the Spirit has spoken. And so that is the way the work on our mission field has gone on so wonderfully. And I believe, that if all of us who have received the Baptism in the Spirit will put our amen to the program mentioned by the Lord Himself with all that is in us and say, "The Lord baptized me in the Spirit for the express purpose of seeing that every man, woman, and child in the world hears the gospel," and if we will take this program and put ourselves in the hands of the Lord and let Him give us any place in the work that

He sees we can fill, then the work will

be accomplished!

During the years since 1918, working in just this way, fifty assemblies have been planted in twenty-five districts of that province of Kansu. A district in China is larger than a county in America. By obeying the Spirit and carrying out the Lord's program we have made it possible for five millions of these people to hear the gospel. So there is a sense in which I could say with Paul, "Having no more place in these parts," because I have made the gospel accessible in those re-

On the west there is Tibet, which is almost unevangelized. There is Brother Plymire's station, and four other stations under the charge of my son. But the land of Tibet is almost entirely unevangelized except for that region in the northeastern border. The Lord has definitely called many of our Chinese men and women, trained in our Bible School, to this field and they are

now with my son.

The Spirit is leading us and is expecting us to send evangelists into Chinese Turkestan. There are a few Scandinavian missionaries in Turkestan and two missionaries from the China Inland mission, but there is no one who has been baptized in the Holy Spirit and that is one of the things that is on my heart.

Then there is Southern Mongolia. We believe the Spirit has already made plain to us, two or three places there where we must send mission-

The largest province of China with a population of sixty millions (some estimates go even higher than that) is without a single witness to Pentecost. The Spirit has spoken to us to go into this province, and that is how we came to leave our station and go down there.

Our mission field is in very high altitude, in the Min mountains, from which our city got its name, Minchow. The mountains are very high and four large rivers rise in them. One flows east, one north, one southeast, and one south. I have often used that as an illustration with the Chinese workers and Christians. As these four streams rise in this region and flow into the four directions, so the Lord Jesus Christ has poured out His Spirit in this region and endued us with power from on high in order that we may go forth in all directions and carry the water of life to everyone.

Pray that we may have some kind of stable government.

Since I left China it has been more peaceful in Kansu province than it has been for years. But only recently war has begun again in China. The left wing of the People's Party, which is almost communistic, has established a different government in South China in opposition to the National government and war has begun. Then there is the real Communistic party. They have their strongest support in three or four provinces of Central China and at present the President of China is engaged in war with them trying to subdue them. Three generals in North China have formed a coalition against the central government. This last war began on the very road that we will have to pass on the way to our mission field, and so far as men's resources are concerned it is nearly impossible for us to return to the field.

China has great unrest. There is no settled government. Because of that our American Consul refuses to grant passports to the interior. I have written to him asking whether he will be able to grant passports to our mission field. But I want all to pray that some way or other will be opened by the Lord for us to begin this great work of training men and women who have already received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit and some of whom God has already called into other regions. Pray also that the Lord will open up a way for us to return. I want to open our Bible School again for the training of our Chinese workers on the mission field.

The Lord has called a number of young men and women in this country. But there is a great hindrance to their going, and that is the lack of funds to pay their traveling expenses and to support them while on the field. Pray that the Lord will stir up peo-

ple here at home.

When the European war was so severe that America was finally drawn into it, our government practically mobilized the entire resources of the nation to fight that war to a successful finish. They called men in the prime of life. There were four million young men who were sent to the colors preparing to take part in this war. American government not only did this, but also mobilized the financial resources of the nation, the food supplies, and the earning capacity of those who remained at home, in order to bring that war to a successful conclusion.

The American government is now considering a scheme whereby in case another war should come they would have four millions of men ready to rush to the front immediately the first year, and a reserve of seven millions of men ready to be called out to take their places as fast as needed. only that, but they are considering a scheme that every bit of money will be at the disposal of the government in

case there is another war. Brother and sister, I believe the Lord Jesus Christ has just as much right to His blood-bought people as the American government has to its citizens. The Lord Jesus Christ has just as much right to mobilize everyone of His blood-bought followers, and He has just as much right to mobilize our earning capacity. That thing was done in the assembly at Jerusalem. There was not one among them who said aught of the things he possessed was his own. They had all things in common. Why? The Holy Spirit led them to do it. It was not a command, or teaching, or rule, or resolution in an annual convention, but the Spirit simply led them that way. For what purpose? Because every one of them was to become a missionary. The Spirit knew that they would all be scattered abroad and that was why the sinews of the great missionary program were prepared beforehand.

I believe the Holy Spirit would do the same thing today if we would only put ourselves in the hands of the Lord to obey Him. The great revival for which we are all praying, and which we are almost unanimous in expecting, will come in this way: that we not only recognize the Holy Spirit as our power for service, but also as our leader for service. It is not only that we receive power from the Spirit, but the Spirit is given to be our guide. He is our "guide into all truth." We ourselves should become embodiments of truth, clothed with truth.

Many Bible teachers take the passage in Matt. 24:14, "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come,' to mean something other than the present evangelization of the world. Well, that may be true, but here I want to give you what I consider a parallel passage in Luke 24. Jesus, when He appeared, found the disciples discussing the various things about His resurrection from the dead. He opened their understanding and He expounded the Scriptures to them. "Thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day: and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem."

Now what does that mean? That repentance and remission should be preached in His name among all nations beginning with Jerusalem. And the scriptures concerning these two things are just as necessary to be fulfilled as the other part. I used to be a great student of the Book of Revelation, and I am still, and I am deeply

interested in every exposition I run across concerning the prophecies of that Book, but I am more interested in something else, and that is that I may do my part and prepare the way for His return.

If the Lord tarries I shall return to China in January to go as far as I can to make Jesus and His salvation known far and wide, and wherever my voice can reach and wherever my language can be understood I am ready to go. All that I can do to help others to get the Baptism in the Holy Spirit I shall gladly do, because I know that when we get the work done, we can look up and say, "Lord, Jesus, come quickly."
