
down as it did Saturday night in the Presbyters' meeting. I feel a rising tide in our midst, and I believe that God is here to meet our needs.

the coming of the Lord and His bride is making herself ready. It is like when a young couple are waiting for the day when they shall be joined together in holy wedlock. No one dares to get in the way of the preparation for that great day. So as we are looking forward to the day when the Lord Jesus Christ and His bride are to be united, we do not want to miss a word of His Servant, the precious Holy Spirit.

We find in 2 Cor. 13:14 the phrase, "the communion of the Holy Ghost." We have often heard this verse used in benediction, and we want to talk about what it really means. This scripture has been a source of marvelous blessing to me in these last days when many of my brethren with whom I have walked so many years seemingly think they have found a new revelation and that they have been mistaken concerning this blessed Baptism of the Holy Ghost, which is always accompanied by the Bible pattern of speaking in tongues.

I remember in a deep trial some years ago when we were pressed by foes and enemies of the Cross, we were driven to our knees with our Bibles; and not only hours, but days and weeks and months we were with Him carefully examining the precious Word of God. We found "in the beginning God," and that satisfied our souls, and there has never been a moment from that time on when we have doubted that this which we preach and see and hear is from the Lord. From that time to this I have never been moved by anything I have read against it. It was during those hours of communion that I came across some of the rich nuggets of Christian experience found hidden away in this sacred Word of God. There I banqueted with my Lord.

Communion has this meaning, "having things common." May we go a little farther and say that communion with God is having things common with God. Hallelujah!

Brethren, there is something more to the Baptism of the Holy Ghost than we have been commonly taught. It brings us to a rich, real deep place with God where He can speak to us. I am made to wonder in this the crisis of the church and the closing days of the age if this may not be the last Council in which we shall sit together, until we sit together with Him in the glory. To me, tonight, there is something more than that "blessing" that comes to us and settles the soul and makes the heart rejoice. I am looking for the burning bush, or the place of meeting with my Lord, that He may help us to settle down into Him; for



it will not be the man of marvelous experience, but the man who has been faithful up to the moment when the trumpet sounds, that will enter into that land of the Son of God. What a grand and glorious privilege it is today to adore and magnify the God of all grace!

The communion of the Holy Ghost not only brings us to God, but it brings God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit down into rich and real fellowship with us, and into our very walk with men. To have that fellowship takes an uncompromising, one hundred per cent "Yes," that will

be heard in the regions of eternity and through all the earth.

Communion with God—it is not only that we shall have Him who is called the Paraclete to walk by our side, but that the very God of holiness shall bring eternal things through the Spirit to our hearts until right in the common walk of life and conversation we are conscious of the movings and lead-

ings of the holy God.

Why is there such a lack of holy living on the part of our Pentecostal ministry and among the laity? Why is there the lack of confidence toward God and toward one another? Has God failed us in the last moment? I say No. We have failed God in so far as we have not yielded to Him or been true to the covenant we made with Him when He filled us with the precious Holy Spirit. Oh, when I hear someone speak in tongues before the interpretation comes, I know that He lives! I don't need to be troubled about His coming or the time of it. I am not concerned about all those things, but I am concerned that I shall know Him. Know Him!

Oh, draw your feet up to Father's table, sit down and feast upon Him, drink in the mercy and love and grace of God. There is a place of choosing with and for God, a place of separation. But you say, "I have said yes to Him. I have answered the roll call. I have told Him I'd go all the way with Him."

Sit still at His feet. It wasn't in the earthquake that God revealed Himself to Elijah; it was in the still small voice. Friends, I am afraid that we are so taken up with our desire to get the message to the public, and other such things, that we are not taken up enough with God, or with a longing to get away to that quiet still place with Him. The true fullness of the Holy Ghost can not be in operation in your life and mine, or in any assembly, until we recognize in the individual life the Lordship of Jesus Christ. We have the divine manifestation and op-eration of the Holy Ghost that blesses and brings edification to the people only as we are consciously under the dominion of the Holy Spirit, and have within us the Lordship of the Son of

Communion with God the Father, and with God the Son, and with God the Spirit! How I want you to get it—that Something—you can't name it, it is too precious to name—that the Lord Jesus Christ reveals to us in worshipping God. When we do find it, we say, "Why, Father, I have been playing around the very edges of this Christian experience."

We were born in the Pentecostal movement, and were filled with the

Holy Spirit in the first outpouring of the Spirit in Zion, Ill., and after all these years of working with the Lord He is more real than ever. The Word is more precious tonight, heaven is more real to my soul than it has ever been. It causes me to think more prayerfully of the trust that has been given to me.

"Howbeit when He, the Spirit of truth, is come, He will guide you into all truth: for He shall not speak of Himself; but whatsoever He shall hear, that shall He speak." John 16:13. In all of His holy work, in His holy office of making Jesus real, and of wooing men and women to God, the Holy Spirit speaks not one word of Himself. What a lesson in humility!

Many people have asked me why I haven't interpreted "their" message in tongues. That's just the reason. It was theirs instead of God's. To be used of the Lord, to have Him move through you, to have His presence in your life, calls for a place of communion with God.

We have a doctor at home who prays and anoints over fifty per cent of all his patients, and they are healed. That man, with tears rolling down his face has said to me, "Oh, that I shall be able to keep my hands clean and this temple clean, that He will be able to relieve suffering humanity through me." Clean! Clean! Oh, the frivolity, the carelessness, the indifference to

holy things, the light living, the shallow walk, the unholy things that have crept in, and yet men go on and use this holy gift of God. I want to bring this Christian experience up and up and up in your vision until you will realize that this holy experience is the most precious thing that God has brought down into our lives.

"For He shall not speak of Himself, but whatsoever He shall hear that shall He speak." Where is He tonight? He is here incarnated in the church; and as Jesus Christ walked up and down the shores of Galilee and worked among men, He also was the Son of God in the presence of the Father's glory, so the Holy Spirit is in the church and is also in the presence of the Father in heaven.

Why is He here? He is here to be true to the trust laid upon Him by the Father to help us to be triumphant and victorious in these days of great persecution, trial, and test, and to enable us to bear to the world the message of the Father who gave His Son on the cross of Calvary, to pay the debt.

The Holy Ghost is incarnate in the church and is also there by the side of the Father and the Son, and if you will get close enough to God and go down in real consecration before Him, He will reveal some of the Father's sacred secrets of His love and make them real in your life. But God is not going to take real things, supernatural things, and turn them over to unregenerate men. Concerning the sacred things of God, He is only dealing with the new creation.


"Whatsoever things He shall hear." There are some things that my wife and I, without the children, love to talk over once in a while. We like to go out in the car and ponder over many things. And if in the natural there is given us a desire to be alone with one we love, will not the Holy Spirit be faithful in His office work of wooing us away to our Father, and there in the hush speak to us what we need to know for our inner life.

I paid a serious price some years ago for this precious outpouring of the Holy Spirit. There came a time in my life when, through the flattering of people, I seriously missed the Lord. I want to warn you tonight, because before I was restored I paid a price of sorrow and heartache. I fasted and prayed for three days and nights. But that "something" which was so real in the first outpouring of the Spirit had slipped away. Oh, how I cried, how I consecrated, how I plead with God. Occasionally He would permit a touch to come upon me and it would stay for a little while, then it would be snatched away. Just why it was so I have never been able to say.

But I went on pressing the battle, and one day in the midst of many weeks of fasting and weeping before the Lord I got up to preach in the early morning meeting. My text was, "My Lord and my God." I stepped to the pulpit, opened the Bible, and prayed. When I opened my eyes who should stand before me but my matchless Lord. In that sacred moment of my life there came again that precious, blessed, indefinable "something," call it what you will. God moved, and I gave Him all the glory. I went on, and one day in the midst of a hard battle He revealed Himself. I would rather have in my inner life the power of that blessed, marvelous, gracious Something, than to feel all the ecstasy possible for the natural man to receive. God will give it to every man and woman who will go down and go through with Him, and make a consecration, not for reward, but a consecration of love as a bond slave to our precious Lord. Hallelujah!

If there ever was a moment when we need men and women filled with the precious "something" as a result of the fullness and infilling of the Holy Ghost, it is now in these days when we need sober thinking and sober living. May I stir your hearts to look back and see if you have lost that "something" out of your life.

Editor's General Council Notes

Editor's Report Resumed

Where Will the Next Council Be Held?

A resolution was brought forth committing the matter of the future place and time to the executive presbytery. Brother Gortner stated that there was an understanding at the last General Council that since the brethren consented to bring this Council to the west coast, the next should be held somewhere on the east coast. He felt we were morally obligated to go east for our next General Council meeting. Brother Williams pointed out that more than a hundred letters had been received asking that Springfield, Mo., be the place where the future General Councils be held since that was very central, and since the assembly now had a building large enough to take

care of the Council meeting. Much sentiment was expressed that the East should be given the next General Council meeting.

A "Bomb"


In introducing the next resolution Brother Gortner said he was going to bring them a real bomb. This resolution was to the effect that there should be no national or district organizations of the young people, but that young people's work should be confined to their local assembly. At first when this came upon the floor there was a misunderstanding concerning it, some of the ministers and delegates feeling that someone who was opposed to young people's work had brought forth the resolution and they wanted to hear from the man who sponsored it. Brother Welch pointed out that the resolution committee had just framed it with the idea of bringing the matter to the floor so that there could be an open discussion on both sides of the question enabling us to come to a basis of unity, as there were so many different views concerning young people's work. If there was a full expression of opinion we could be in unity as to what is best. The resolution was brought forward to bring the matter to an issue.

For and Against

Brother Robt. A. Brown of New York stated he did not believe that any person here was opposed to young peo-ple's work. "No one loves the young people more than I do, but I am opposed to the multiplying of organizations. Our great danger is in legalism and in making of laws." He felt that that was the great danger in all the District Councils. In order to save the young people from duplicating the work of the District Councils he felt that this was a wise resolution to bring forward. He stated that in the Eastern District there was no district Now a Presbyter Again- Hugh M. Young People's organization; but that

every church had a strong young people's work. The young people are doing a splendid aggressive work for God, visiting the sick, and helping in missionary and personal work. Out of a roster of about a thousand in his own assembly there are about 450 young people. From an experience of thirty-three years he had come to see that the young people were the grandest arm of service. He felt that the developing of these young people was the preparation of the stones for the future building of God. He was opposed to District organization and said, "Please don't trouble us with the same, or we shall get the same spirit that has gotten into the Christian Endeavorers and the Epworth Leaguers."

A number spoke in favor of young people's work, saying that a great work was being done through the District organizations as well as in the local companies of voung people. Brother Frank Gray of Tacoma, Wash., said


they have no District organization in the Northwest; but are concentrating all their efforts on the local assembly organizations, and that God is blessing. He felt that if the young people were left alone they would be perfectly satisfied, but from some directions there was a tendency to inject the thought of pressing beyond the present organization. He felt that this was not good. He stated that in the Northwest District they had a satisfied and happy crowd of young people doing a blessed work for God.

Brother Albert Ott of Dallas, Texas, pleaded that since such a good work was being done by the young people, nothing should be done to discourage or hinder it. This motion was being discussed at the time of adjournment.

Wednesday Night

Because of a full house the meeting was started ten minutes early. After an inspiring musical time Brother Lief Erickson from Peru gave a short talk on the work in that needy field. The Lord has been blessing there in a marvelous way, and He has been making a way for the missionaries to preach the Pentecostal message in many places in that dark land.

Brother Stanley Cooke of Hagerstown, Md., brought the evening message from Luke 15. He likened the lost sheep to the sinner, the lost coin to the Christian whose fire for God has

died and who in a sense is where God can not use Him; and the lost boy to the down and out backslider. Many held up their hands for prayer, and many came to the altar.

Thursday Morning

The devotional talk was given by Brother S. A. Jamieson of San Diego, and then the discussion on young people's work was continued during the most of the morning. The committee on Young People's work brought forth a new resolution which was much more acceptable to all present than the one of the previous day. One of the recommendations of this new resolution was that the presidents of the District organizations should be young ordained ministers. Brother Williams spoke of a young man in one District who is a splendid worker, but who is a pronounced individualist, and who is running ahead and doing things independently, even suggesting that the young people have their own district camp meeting. The trouble is that this young man is not amenable to his District Council, as he recognized no link between himself and it. Brother Williams felt there should be a distinct link between the District Councils and the District organizations of young people; and if the Districts have one of their own ordained ministers who understands the principles of voluntary

co-operative unity, such a man would work in co-operation with his District officials rather than independently. The resolution which was brought forward at this time gave plenty of opportunity for full discussion of all sides of the young people's problems, and as a result we got a far better view of how to help the young people. There were several amendments made to the resolution, which may be seen in printed form in the Council minutes when the same are published.

Thursday Afternoon

This was the time arranged for the election of officers of the General Council. Brother Willard Peirce of Toronto, Canada, gave a short devotional talk, after which the ballots for nomination for general superintendent were passed. This afternoon session was one of the most blessed of the whole Council meeting. The presence of the Lord seemed to brood over the whole company. Each time before the ballot was cast during the elections, prayer was offered that the Lord would guide, and surely He was in charge of the whole proceedings.

While the ballots were being counted there were many musical selections, and the Lord helped those who gave them. Brother Willard Peirce spoke a word concerning his father-in-law. Brother D. W. Kerr, who had done

much to shape the course of the General Council in the early days. He sang a song which was one of Brother Kerr's favorites, "Even as He." Many others gave musical selections. Sister Cornelia Jones Robertson was asked to sing, "Behold I live," and the power of the Lord fell upon the people. The whole audience rose, and with uplifted hands sent up to heaven a chorus of praise that surely must have made the rafters of the glory realm ring.

General Superintendent Re-elected

When the ballots were collected for the nomination for General Superintendent it was found that Brother Williams had received 289 out of 341 votes cast. It did not take long for the whole assembled delegates to make this absolutely unanimous and a shout of praise went up from the camp. Brother Williams told us that it cost him much to leave his pastorate at Philadelphia where he loved the people very dearly, but that the Lord had brought to him the consciousness that he was needed to help in the general work, and so he had gladly yielded to what appeared to be the mind of the Spirit, and was very happy to serve the brethren in any way that it was possible for him to.

Assistant Superintendent


The question had been raised as to whether the office of assistant superintendent was needed at this time. It was pointed out that it is important to have an assistant, since thus succession is provided for, and should the superintendent be called to be with the Lord there would be someone to succeed him. Brother Gortner presented a motion that the assistant superintendent should serve without salary and continue in his present position unless called to headquarters by the executive committee. This was agreed upon without a dissenting vote. There were a good many names on the first ballot, and it might be of interest to know whose these were: Brothers J. R. Flower, J. W. Welch, H. Cadwalder, J. N. Gortner, S. H. Frodsham, A. G. Osterberg, B. Hardin, R. A. Brown, Frank Gray, J. D. Wells, M. T. Draper, C. Weston, F. Vogler, H. W. Cooksay, W. Peirce, Flem Van Meter, N. Perkin, P. H. Ralstin, F. Lindquist, Max Friemark, C. A. Lasater, R. H. Moon, S. Swanson, J. R. Evans, R. J. Craig, W. R. Steelberg, H. Steele, H. Bowley, P. C. Nelson, and A. Ott.

On the first ballot after the nominations the three highest were Brothers Flower, 104, Welch 96, and Gortner 33. On the following ballot Brother

Flower received 184, Brother Welch 107, Brother Gortner 25, and a large number of names were eliminated from the first and second lists.

Brother Flower Elected

On the next ballot Brother Flower received 226 votes, Brother Welch 96; and Brother Flower was elected to fill the office of assistant superintendent. This, too, was made unanimous, and again another shout went up in the camp.

Brother Williams said, "Well, if we don't quit soon, we shall all go up." Brother Flower thanked the brethren for their expression of confidence in himself. He stated he had been with the fellowship from the beginning, having been at Hot Springs for the first meeting of the General Council, and had held some office in the fellowship right from the beginning, with the exception of two years. He expressed his willingness to serve the brethren to the best of his ability.

A Veteran

Brother Jacob Miller stood to his feet and said that he too had been at the first Council meeting and was glad to be at this one. He had not missed a single one, and should the meeting

be held on the Atlantic coast next time if the Lord tarried, he hoped to be in that meeting. He said he was one of a committee of eight (and Brother Flower was a member of the same committee) who framed the first constitution of the General Council at Hot Springs. He praised the Lord for the Council fellowship and for the privilege of being in the Penterostal ministry. He said that twenty two years ago it was a joy to him to lay at the Master's feet \$25,000 worth of property that had been hardly earned, and go forth to preach this message, to bring souls to the Lord, and to see people filled with the Holy Spirit as at the beginning.

Secretary Re-elected

When the ballots had been collected for the nomination for general secretary it was found that Brother J. R. Evans had received 279 out of 313, and his election was declared. Brother Evans thanked the brethren for their expression of confidence and said that evidently some folks wanted him to be assistant superintendent, for when the ballots were cast at Eureka Springs in 1925, for this office, he received two votes. In 1927 at Springfield he received two votes for this office. In 1929 at Wichita, Kans., he again got his two votes. And now in the 1931 Council Meeting in San Francisco he had again received two votes for this office. He said drolly, "I don't think I will ever get it." He stated that at Eureka Springs someone suggested how the two votes had been gotten, that he himself must have put in one, and his wife the other. His wife could not be accused of complicity in this matter at San Francisco since she was not present. He said that away back in Pennsylvania when he was young a certain office was being contested and the man who was running for the office had received one vote in a particular district. He was much interested to find who had cast that one vote and offered to give a new hat to the particular friend who had shown such confidence in him. After considerable trouble he discovered who had cast that one vote. It was an old German who said, "I did cast that vote for you, but it was a mistake." Brother Evans said that evidently two people had made a mistake in San Francisco.

Thursday Evening

The meeting was opened with a song service led by Brother Berg of Africa, and there were several musical numbers. Then W. W. Simpson of China, the missionary speaker of the evening spoke.

Brother Simpson's Message

"It is a great privilege and the greatest joy of my life that I have been able to preach to the millions of China and to a few thousand Tibetans and Mohammedans, this glorious gospel that Jesus paid it all. I am able to report that I have proved the gospel to be the power of God unto salvation to thousands in the Republic of China. I don't know just how many thousands call me their spiritual father because I have begotten them by the gospel.

"The Protestant church is divided into three castes today. There are the Modernists and the Fundamentalists. We Pentecostal people used to belong to the Fundamentalists, but they have even legislated us out of their camp. So we are the Fulfillists, because we believe not only in the inspiration of the Bible, but we believe in its fulfillment. I am so thankful to say that

we have seen the Word of God fulfilled on our mission field. The very things, that both the Modernists and Fundamentalists find it hardest to believe, have been enacted on our mission field.

Filled With the Spirit


were a failure because I could not point to one instance where it was the Lord Jesus Christ unmistakably working through me. The last 19 years of my service in China have been a glorious success simply because 19 years ago last May the Lord Jesus Christ not only anointed me with the Holy Ghost, but He empowered me for service.

"In traveling up and down in this country from Maine to California I find that Pertecostal people as a rule are looking to the Lord for more power. Brothers and sisters, I have also found that in China, as we have put ourselves unreservedly under the control of the Holy Spirit, we have all the power we know what to do with.

The Cross Made Real

"Soon after our return in 1918 we began our first Pentecostal convention. The Spirit was poured out, and frequently for half a day no one was able to preach. The Spirit had complete

control. In that convention in 1918 there was a deaf mute-a half breed Tibetan—who came to the meeting. They do not have the sign language among the deaf mutes of China and Tibet, and there was no way whatever in which I could convey to his mind the truths of the gospel. He couldn't read, he knew no sign language, he couldn't hear, and the only gate we had to enter was through his eye gate. We had no way to tell him that Jesus died for Him on Calvary. But I do praise God that there is not only something to hear, but there is something to see. The Holy Ghost by His mighty power demonstrated the crucifixion of the Lord Jesus Christ to this deaf mute in such a way that he understood that Somebody had died for him on the cross. So one day when the altar call was given this deaf mute came to the altar and knelt down;

and my son, a boy of 16, prayed with him, until God who knows the heart bore witness to him and gave the deaf mute the knowledge of sins forgiven and the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. He spoke in other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance, just as clearly as any other speaking person. And not only did the Holy Spirit give that deaf mute the speaking in tongues, but immediately gave him the interpretation in the Chinese language. We who heard him supposed that the Lord had performed a miracle in his vocal organs, but when he finished giving the interpretation he was again a deaf mute. Since that time when the Spirit comes upon that man he interprets just as clearly as any of us.

The Lepers Cleansed

"One of our Chinese pastors one day took me to see a leper. His head, face, and feet were so covered with leprosy that I didn't dare lay my hands on him, but this Chinese pastor full

of the Holy Spirit laid his hands on him and prayed for him, and in three or four days he was perfectly clean. The power of God is just the same today!

"The power of God was so mighty on that mission field and His leader-ship was so definite that during these years the work has spread until it covers an area of 120 thousand square miles, with a population of over five million. It has been made possible for everyone living in that region to at least hear the Pentecostal message. There have been about 50 assemblies raised up with a total membership of three thousand, of whom three fourths have received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. The Spirit has called and equipped nearly 100 Chinese men and women to go out and evangelize their own people.

New Fields Opening

"I just received a letter from one of our leading evangelists speaking of a company of seven of our evangelists and pastors in China, most of whom have been in my Bible school. He says that they have been definitely called by the Holy Spirit to take the Pentecostal message throughout the entire valley west of the city of Nanking. No witness to Pentecost is in this whole valley.

"They have written me of a plan that they have of reaching all the different villages. They want a motor boat to travel up and

down the river, thus reaching the different cities and preaching there until an assembly is raised up and set in order by the Word of God. Then they will train those people and send them out to the surrounding villages to tell them of Jesus. Then they will go on to the next city and do the same thing in that one. They have written to me asking if I can provide a motor boat and come out myself and be leader.

A Motor Boat

"The very same day that I received this letter I met a brother who has built a motor boat and has been trying to sell it all summer but can find no buyer for it. In the meantime the Lord has called this man and his wife to go to China. He said to me, 'It must be that the Lord wants this boat for China.' He has it all ready except the engine, the wireless equipment, and the electric lights. It cost him about \$4,500 in labor and materials to build

Joy of Ministry in South India Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Burgess

I am writing a brief account of a few of the places visited recently. We first took a trip to South Travancore, not far from the Cape, India's southernmost point. We held evangelistic meetings in Matandam, where interest was good and the Lord's presence manifest. We slept in the same place where we preached—a crude, typical Indian structure. From a near-by hotel we had our first meals of curry in this place. It burned my tongue with its chilli heat. I wish I had a picture of the hotel to send you—a tiny hut built of cocoanut leaves. One must not see how the food is prepared if one is to relish it at all. Yet in this land one learns to eat what is set before him. However, I must not give a wrong impression, for some preparations of Indian food are really delicious. From here we went to a station not far off, called Malpuram. How happy the Christians there always are to see us and how we always enjoy being with them! On Sunday, the last day of the convention there, after Mrs. Burgess had spoken on "I am the Lord, I change not," there were testimonies of those who were to be baptized in the afternoon. What testimonies and what confessions! Our eyes filled with tears of wonder and amazement at the marvelous change in these lives, realizing what they were formerly. One boy of ten or twelve years of age arose to testify, for he was to be baptized that afternoon. One of his confessions was, "I praise the Lord for saving me from stealing school pencils." Next to him sat his teacher with wide open eyes. In the afternoon I was privileged to bury seven in the waters of baptism. After such a solemn service, could anyone question if missions pay? If you could be with us and see the gross darkness of this great land and then to see the vast change that comes to many a life and behold them in the waters of baptism in spite of fierce persecution, surely you would exclaim with us, "Yes, missions pay a thous-and times over." Though we had urg-ent calls from other stations in the south, we had to return home as other meetings were calling us. However, one of the evangelists stayed long

ern wedding has little similarity to the Western. An Indian wedding generally takes almost a day, preceded and succeeded as it is by feasts.

A recent day spent in our main station, Mavelikara, will be one long remembered by us and all the Christians. On the Sunday morning we gathered for worship and truly a time of worship it was. In the afternoon we held our annual Sunday school meeting. It was preceded by a feast for the children. What a picture! Two long rows of children seated upon the floor conveying the rice and other food to their mouths with their little hands. They form the food into balls with their hands and almost throw it into their mouths. That night we gathered with the Christians to observe the Lord's Supper. Of all the blessed meetings I have witnessed and been privileged to take part in in India, I think this gathering excelled them all. I tried to minister, but the glory of God so filled the meeting and the Lord so had charge of it that several times I was compelled to stop and wait. Everyone was melted and broken as we looked back to the Cross and forward to the time when we shall eat anew with Him at the great marriage supper. Please pray with us for great things in India before He comes.

> Evangelizing in Japan C. F. Juergensen

Again we wish to write you of God's abundant mercy and love to us here in this needy field and want you to rejoice with us, for great is our God, and He will do great things for us even among the heathen. Our blessed Lord gave His life for all and that includes the dear Japanese. He loves them, cleanses them by His precious blood, and presents them spotless before the Father.

A week of special meetings in our Fujimai station have just been closed, and we do thank our God for His wonderful presence and blessing. In the street meetings many stood to listen to the Christians testify to God's grace, and of what the Lord had done for them. Then being led of the Lord, many of the listeners came into the station services each night. The very first night, after a soul-stirring message and altar call were given, five came to the altar to accept Christ as their Saviour. His Spirit truly dealt with souls, and we praise Him for saving many precious Japanese, transforming their darkness into His glorious light.

Sometime ago we wrote you how the Lord laid His hand on several of the dear natives, and ever since the Spirit has been dealing with them to give up all for Jesus. We are sending you a picture of two of the young men who have a zeal for God and lost souls. They have given up their positions and have stepped out in faith to become workers in His vineyard. Our native pastor has taken special interest in them, and every morning teaches them the Word of God. While they sit at Jesus' feet daily, the Lord sends His showers down upon them. In the afternoon, they are seen marching the streets with drum, cornet, and tambourine, stopping here and there to give their ringing testimonies to the crowds who gather. The evening during their street meetings and prayer, from among the listening throng, seven stepped out for Christ and kneeled right down on the street. calling upon the living Saviour, and went home rejoicing. Truly God has heard our cries and this is an answer to your and our prayers, for our greatest need in Japan is native workers to send out to the untouched districts. We long to see the gospel spread and more stations opened, for we have a vast field before us.

Dear ones, stand with us in believing prayer that the Lord will supply this need. We have taken this step by faith, together with them, looking up to God who promised to supply all our need. Suzuki San is a very true boy and as you read his testimony we trust the Lord will speak, causing you to pray earnestly for their support and training. His mother has become a fine Christian, and they have opened their home for prayer meetings in that neighborhood. Also, Maru-yama San is an earnest soul and studies faithfully, and we believe the Lord will use him for lost souls.

The Great Missionary Commission

Jesus appeared at different times to His disciples after His resurrection, but only on one of these occasions did He appear according to an appointment made with them before His suffering and death on the cross. He had said in Matthew 26:32, "But after I am risen, I will go before you into Galilee." It was in connection with the Great Commission that He met them, in fulfillment of this promise which He had made. "Then the eleven disciples went away into Galilee, into a mountain where Jesus had appointed them. And when they saw him, they worshipped him, but some doubted"

From this it appears that the Great Commission held, next to the resurrection itself, a place of highest importance. Many things were essential that the faith of the disciples might be established in Him as the Christ who came to save, who had been raised from the dead to die no more. The Great Commission was essential that His plan for salvation to the ends of the earth might be carried out.

His disciples worshipped Him in reverence and holy awe, and as they did so "Jesus came and spake unto them, saying, All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth." What a remarkable statement! Only a brief few days before He had been seen by them on the cross in suffering and agony, jeered by the thoughtless throng that passed by. Now the stone was rolled away from the tomb. The promise of meeting them in Galilee was fulfilled. He stood before them and spoke announcing Himself supreme in heaven above and in the earth below. Wonderful supremacy of Christ!

The authority of Christ provides every spiritual blessing to those who trust in Him. There is pardon for the guilty, entire renovation of nature to him who is born again, and hope of eternal life through the promise, "Because I live ye shall live also." His authority is no less on the earth than it is in heaven. He who has now ascended to the right hand of the Father is with those who go in His name, to lead them, protect them, provide for them, and preserve them. Through all the changing circumstances of a faithful Christian life He will never leave such nor forsake them. He will also be the establisher and confirmer of their message among men.

Based upon this universal authority which is His, the Lord has commissioned His missionaries "Go ye therefore." They are to go because He has all power, because He has sent. They are to go to all nations and preach the gospel to every creature.

The heathen are in need and misery. The gospel has a message of blessing for them. These two reasons alone for missionary work ought to be enough. But there is yet a higher reason. It is the direct command of Christ, "Go ye."

Hardships and privations must be endured by each real missionary. None ought to venture forth who are not willing for such. If one goes from the thrill of romance, the thrill will be of short duration. "But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself," needs to characterize him who would dedicate his life for missionary service. As William Carey looked upon the vast regions depicted on the map of the world, he began to ponder on the spiritual darkness which brooded over so many of the inhabitants. Facing almost insurmountable obstacles he set his face toward India to which country he sailed. Upon his arrival, "Difficulties of various kinds surrounded them. Poverty, fevers, bereavement, the sad illness of his wife, jealousy of the government, all combined to render it necessary that for a while Carey should betake himself to an employment in the Sundarbunds, where he had often to use his gun to supply the wants of his family; and eventually he went to an indigo factory at Mudnabully, where he hoped to earn a livelihood." We cannot now further trace the course of this man of God, but he stands out before us an example. His going to India was the result of definite convictions of his own heart that the Great Commission was the duty of the Church, and that he felt it to be his duty in particular to

The object of the Great Commission is the making of disciples to Christ. Preaching merely the benefits of a Christianity of culture, its civilization, or its advancements and advantages, is entirely to miss the mark. The missionary is to bring the message of a personal Christ, a Saviour and glorious Lord. Men are to be taught to find Him and follow Him, "Go ye therefore and disciple all nations."

The heathen have long sought to satisfy their gods of evil omen, demons which they fear. The gospel of Christ brings to them a loving Father, and into their divinely appointed relationship to Him as sons and daughters they are to be brought. Beautiful is the cry of those born of God, "My Father, which art in heaven."

The deity and saving grace of Christ are to be known, appreciated and honored. He who came to save with His own blood must be extolled and exalted. It is through Him that our relationship to the Father is assured. It is His Spirit by which we cry Abba, Father

The person and gracious influences of the Holy Spirit are to become a part of Christian discipleship. Equal with the Father and the Son, the Holy Spirit is to be equally regarded in the believer's relationship. Thus the blessed Trinity each has a definite place in the plan of Him who gave the Great Commission. "Go ye therefore, . . . baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost."


The promise of the Great Commission is the living and continued presence of Christ to him who will obey and go. "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Wherever the missionary may go, the Lord Jesus will be with him there. But the end of the world also means the end of the age. This means that missionary work is to continue as long as the Church remains here.

Missionaries must go, but the Church cannot all go in person. The Church is to be, however, a place of missionary industry. It is an evidence of infant weakness on the part of any assembly when it keeps itself busy with little further outlook than trying to preserve its own joys of excited emotions. Awake thou sleeper! The field is the world. The Commission is to all of us, "Go ve therefore." The church with a proper missionary vision is the truly prosperous church. We feel that too many of us are like Jonah of old. God told him to go to Nineveh that great and wicked city, which was without hope and without God in the What a rebuke when the heathen sailor had to arouse him from his slumbers, "What doest thou here, O sleeper?" If the Author of the Great Commission finds us unconcerned for the lost world for whom He died what may He say to us?







tion which supported him. It then decided to call a pastor who could devote his entire time to the work. There then arose a fear that their doing this might greatly reduce their missionary giving. The one whom they called had an interest in missions. Did the missionary giving cease, or the support of the pastor suffer? Missionary giving increased until in a short while that assembly was giving thousands instead of hundreds to missions. The pastor's support likewise grew. An alive assembly, awake to its duty toward the Great Commission will make its financial presence felt to the ends of the earth. It will likewise care for its pastor well, and will not neglect other responsibilities connected with the work at home.

Look the field over. Examine the places where the least is being done for missions. It will be found that in most such places the pastors receive the least consideration. Go then to the places where missions has been stressed and where missionary interest is wide awake. There you will find pastors properly supported, healthy Christian character among the saints, and substantial places of worship. It cannot be otherwise. The promise is sure. All power in heaven and in earth belongs to Christ. He can therefore touch the hearts of men. The promise is abiding. He is with His missionary church, whether it be the missionary who goes or those who

make his going possible.

Thou Church of Jesus Christ, give for missions! Let each member give. Give systematically. Give through the church. Then let the church give through the proper missionary channels. In this way we can arrive at the most practical and consistent method of meeting the needs and bringing to pass the purpose of the Great Commission, "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

Healed of Smallpox

My husband and I were exposed to smallpox in April 1930. One evening I took dreadfully sick. My thought was to call Pastor J. S. Saunders and his wife, as my custom was. I was saying, "Yes, Lord, I do thank you from the depths of my heart for healing me, but how shall I tell or testify of it, there being no marks on my skin?" I was rejoicing in the Lord. Having to make a left turn I looked into the mirror, and lo! I was covered—face and neck -with pockmarks. I then knew that God had allowed this so that someone could see it. As I entered the drive of my daughter's home she came out and at once cried, "Oh, Mamma, you are all broken out with smallpox.' Then I told her all, and she invited me into the house, saying she was not afraid. I had brought her up to know the worth and power of prayer and she had not departed from it. Praise the Lord!

These marks stayed on my face and neck for about thirty minutes. Then they left and my skin was as clear and smooth as ever.

it. It will take about \$3,500 to outfit this boat and get it ready to take to China. The Lord has already provided \$1,000 toward the engine and equipment. We are still lacking about \$2,500.

The Pentecostal Gospel

"I have just mentioned this to show you how the Lord is leading us. If the Lord is calling any of you young people you had better be in a hurry to get to China. If you don't you will be too late, for the Lord is calling the Chinese and equipping them to go out to their own people. The Lord has provided us with an automobile to take back to China, and the Lord is opening the way for our return. We expect to leave next January to go wherever the Lord leads in giving forth this gospel in the land of China.

"China is perishing! We have been in the northwest and the south; and we have been in the midst of three years of most terrible war, rebellion, and persecution. We have been through it all. We know what hardship is. We know what danger is. But the Lord has brought us safely through and He

has done it for a purpose.

"The time has come when all China must hear the gospel regardless of the opposition of men. The gospel must be preached in the power of the Spirit of God accompanied by signs and wonders so that people throughout all China may have the same chance that you and I have to get ready for the coming of the Lord Jesus. Pray that nothing may hinder us from returning to China."

The Evangelistic Message

Brother Simpson's talk was witnessed to by a number of messages in tongues and interpretation. Following him Brother Floyd C. Woodworth of Pueblo, Colo., gave a very strong evangelistic message, at the close of which about twenty hands went up for prayer, and men and women came to the altar to seek the Lord. You remember when all your life was consecrated to the Lord. You remember as you arose out of that place with God in the fullness of the Spirit, that you walked into a new place in God. But the day came when you lost that new place. It somehow slipped away, and you were left alone. Then you began to plead and to try to get a manifestation from Him. You wanted the feeling that you had. But God was wooing you by His Holy Spirit from your babyhood to manhood and womanhood in Christ. He was trying to bring you to a deeper, fuller place in Himself. In that great, crucial moment of your life you missed God and asked Him for something different for your soul; and that precious, glorious, wonderful, "something" backed away.

Where are you tonight? You know what I am talking about. You know that thing you have lost out of your life. Preacher, you know where you have failed God in your prayer closet. Christian, you know what it is going to take to be ready to meet your Lord.

God is speaking to men and women who have once known God and His power. You have once known the glory of God on your lives, but for these many weeks and months, and perhaps years, you have been dryeyed and there has been no moving of the Spirit upon your souls. Let me plead with you to get back into that place of broken tenderness, where God can break up the fountains of the deep and bring you to the old-time consecration.

Brother Cragin began his message



and by whom he had never had any children; but by the second woman he had four children. IN THE STRENGTH OF JEHOVAH






