In coming to this world our Saviour emptied Himself of His heavenly glory, but never of His deity. He was as much the Divine Son of God when He tabernacled among men as when He created yonder star. "God sent his Son." "He gave his only begotten Son." "This is My beloved Son." Being the eternal Word it was fitting that Jesus could say, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away." "The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life." "God who spake in times past unto the fathers by the prophets, hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son.'

Petition Based on God's Mercy

Supplication is a from of prayer, which is open to all

who will plead the mercy of God, and which has no reason to claim an answer, except that God is merciful. The woman who asked healing for her demon-possessed daughter (Matt. 15: 22), cried for mercy, realizing that although she was not one of the chosen people, yet God loved her and would respond to her desperate cry for help. When Jacob wrestled with the angel (Gen. 32), he knew that he deserved punishment from his brother Esau. He knew that he had no claim for deliverance because he deserved Esau's vengeance, but in desperation he clung to the man from heaven until he prevailed with him, and Jacob was blessed. This is desperate prayer—the cry of one whose life depends upon the answer.

Our prayer for unsaved people belongs to this class. We cannot claim God's favor for them, for they are rejecting Him. We cannot point to any act of obedience upon their part which entitles them to claim a promise, for they are disobedient. But when we realize what it means to God the Father and to the Lord Jesus Christ and to the soul for whom we supplicate, we cry desperately from hearts which are on the point of breaking, and God in His mercy answers prayer. But this kind of supplication requires a life and death earnestness upon the part of the one who prays.

When John Knox cried, "Give me Scotland or I de!" he had nothing on which to base his claim except the intense desire of his heart, which, of course he received through the Holy Spirit, and the mercy of God.

Sinners sometimes cry to God in desperation when in danger or great trouble, and God delivers them and gives them further opportunity to repent.

Even in cases where we are praying for those who will not seek God, or who are rejecting and fighting Him, God will hear our supplications for them as we come in desperate earnestness to beg for mercy for them. This kind of supplication is begging, and the only claim a beggar has on others is the claim for sympathy and the pitifulness of his condition. When we realize, by the help of the Holy Spirit,

the pitifulness and desperateness of the condition of those who are without God, we can come in supplication and claim an answer because of the mercy of God and because "no good thing will He withhold from them that walk uprightly." So Paul exhorts that supplications be made for all men, not because these men deserve anything from God, but that God's will may be done to the fullest extent.

Prayer Based on Obedience to God's Will

This kind of prayer is a petition which has a reason for being answered, this reason based on God's will and the petitioner's obedience. So when the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to "pray." He told them to say. "forgive us our sins; for we also forgive every one that is indebted to us." Luke 11:4. Here obedience is given as a reason why prayer should be answered. Jesus said the publican went down to his house justified. And what did the publican pray? He smote his breast and would not so much as lift up his eyes to heaven, but cried, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." This confession of sin was an act of obedience. It is written, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." 1 John 1:9. This prayer, based upon an act of obedience, had a reason for being answered, and although he was a publican he took home a heart full of the joy of the

This is the basis of most of our prayers, and as we do the w'll of God, we can claim His promises. The Apostle John adds a word on this subject when he says, "Beloved, if our heart condemn us not, then have we confidence toward God. And whatsoever we ask, we receive of Him, because we keep His commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in His sight." I John 3:21, 22.

Petition for the Welfare of Others

Another aspect in the prayer life is called "intercession." This is an experience in which we require the help of the Holy Spirit. Rom. 8:26, 27. Intercession is the act of coming be-

tween God and the people. When Moses said, "Blot me, I pray Thee, out of Thy book which Thou hast written," he was offering himself instead of the people. That was intercession. God refused Moses' offer because no one could give his life a ransom except Jesus. But there is an experience in which the Holy Spirit through us claims the

Spirit through us claims the atonement of Jesus for the needs of men. We do not understand very much about intercession, but we know that it is prayer in the Holy Spirit, and that it is always answered, for it is according to the will of God. Rom. 8:27. Intercession goes beyond our understanding of the need or of how God can supply the need, for when we know not what to pray for as we ought, then the Spirit helpeth our infirmities.

We are told in Heb. 7:25, that Iesus is able to save all those who come unto God by Him, because He ever liveth to make intercession for them. He is their representative before God, and can provide grounds upon which God can act in their behalf. When we intercede, we are helped by the Holy Spirit to represent men before God in the name of Jesus. Through the Spirit we actually have a part in bringing them into the Saviour's redemption. We do not understand all about it, but, thank God, we can have the experience as we let the Holy Spirit have His way in our lives. Intercession is on a higher plane than ordinary prayer, for God Himself, in the person of the Holy Spirit, takes part with us in intercession. Oh, that there were more intercessors! Then, more would be done for God.

The Prayer of Thanksgiving

The last kind of prayer might not be called prayer at all, in a strict sense. Perhaps we may describe it as prayer in the form of thanksgiving. It is the experience of getting what we need even before we ask for it, and instead of praying for it and thanking God for it, we have to begin at once to give thanks, for the answer is already ours. This is the highest form of prayer, and is possible only in a life of perfect obedience. This is the kind of prayer Jesus prayed at Lazarus' grave, when He said, "Father, I thank Thee that Thou hast heard He." John 11:41.

Twice recently, people have come to the altar for salvation, here at Dallas who have been so dealt with by the Holy Spirit, that by the time they reached their knees it was too late to ask God to save them; they burst

out in praise because the work was done. This was possible because they had made such a complete surrender to God. In drawing the picture of what things will be like during the Millennium, when sin shall have been put away from Israel and righteousness shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea, the prophet Isaiah quotes the Lord as saying, "And it shall come to pass, that before they call, I will answer; and while they are yet speaking, I will hear." Isa. 65:24. This is the reward of obedience, for God has said, "No good thing will He withhold from them that walk uprightly." Psa. 84:11. Jesus had this experience because He could say, "I do always those things that please Him." John 8:29.

We cannot have the complete will of God done in us or through us until we learn to pray in all these ways, for we see that each kind of prayer meets a need that none of the other kinds can meet. May God bless us as, by His grace, we learn new lessons in the life of prayer.

### Like a Little Child Chas. E. Robinson

I once had a correspondent who was greatly disturbed about just how things are going to be in the future, and so on. I replied to his letter in part as follows:

If He makes me to lose everything and be saved barely, as Noah was, it will be all right with me, for whatever my Father does suits me exactly. # Does the Bible Need Confirmation?

"A visitor went to the British Museum in London some years ago," writes Dr. Trumbull in the Sunday School Times, "and asked the old curator who was there at the time, 'Show me some curios or other evidence here in this museum proving that the Bible is not true.'

"The old man answered, 'Sir, I can show you ten thousand curios that demonstrate the Bible as true, beyond the peradventure of a doubt, but there is not a thing in this museum that contradicts that truth.' That was a sweeping statement for one in the British Museum.

"By the way, let me pass on a word from Professor Melvin Grove Kyle, archeologist, for which I have always been grateful to him. We were speaking of archeological discoveries, confirming the Bible. He said: 'Mr. Trumbull, I never use that expression. I never like to say that any archeological discoveries confirm the Bible, because the Bible cannot be confirmed, it does not need to be confirmed. IT IS THE WORD OF GOD. I prefer the word "corroborate." Archeological discoveries corroborate the Word of God, they agree, but do not confirm it. Confirmation means adding strength, and man cannot add strength to omnipotence. You cannot strengthen God's Word, but you can find many ways of corroborating it."

The Bible is the most hated book in the world, because it does not flatter man, but shows him his own condition as in a mirror—a lost sinner needing a Divine Saviour.

The prodigal son in the far country was *lost*: and his other sufferings—poverty, hunger, rags—were merely the accompaniment of that condition of separation from his father. "I will arise and *go to my father*" gives the only secret of salvation—a return to God.

Though the prodigal arose and returned, he did not go all the way. His father was watching for him, and ran to meet him. Thus God in His infinite love and compassion meets every sinner who starts on his return journey, and assists his faith by the enablings of His Spirit. "Draw nigh to God, and He will draw nigh to you."

No one is too rich and no one too poor to be saved. Neither the wisdom of the learned nor the ignorance of the illiterate qualifies them to enter at Mercy's door. "The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." Your very need and help-lessness is your qualification.

### Own-Way or God's-Way

Dan Crawford wrote in his diary concerning a large crowd of Africans hearing the gospel for the first time, "They gave the usual earnest response of first hearers, but to go near to God means to go far from heathendom, and over this they were stolid and glum; yea, rebellious." If they could have accepted the benefits of Christianity without the necessity of becoming separate from all their evil ways, they might have eagerly closed in with the offer of salvation. Men in every part of the world love their own way, the way of the flesh and the way of the devil. And "own way" is the very essence of sin. The natives in some parts of Africa call salvation "God's Way," in contrast to "own way." Whether in Africa or America, salvation means living no longer to the will of the flesh but to the will of the Father. I fear this is where many popular evangelistic campaigns fall down. Amid much that appeals to emotions men "hit the sawdust trail" and shake hands with the preacher, but the majority of them do not realize that their acceptance of Christ means and must mean their separation from all that is of the world.

## What Salvation Is

Salvation means receiving Christ and becoming vitally united to Him. Romans 6:5 has been given a free translation like this, "For if we become vitally connected, He with us and we with Him, by the likeness of His death, we shall be vitally connected with Him by the likeness of His resurrection." There is no salvation apart from a definite union with the Lord Jesus Christ. As Handley Moule puts it, "All is bound up, not with the tides or waves of emotions, but with the living rock of our union with our Lord. Union with the slain and risen Christ, in faith, by the Spirit—here

is our inexhaustible secret, for peace with God and for life to God."

# Buried With Him

One very hot sultry night I passed by a lodge belonging to a secret society where they were about to initiate new members. On account of the heat all the windows were open, and I could see the members, dressed in their regalia, pulling a coffin out of a secret chamber. The initiates were to be put into this coffin where they were supposed to become dead to their various personal interests and to come forth with just the interests of the secret lodge as their main pursuit in life. I thought to myself, "What a devil's travesty of baptism!" Baptism is becoming united with Him in His death and burial, to come forth united to the Risen Christ, henceforth to walk in newness of life, having the same testimony as the apostle, "I live, yet not I, but Christ lives in me."

# One Spirit With Him

Baptism in the Spirit has always been to the writer a yet more wonderful picture of becoming united to our precious Lord. Have you been along a thoroughfare where new rails were being laid for the street cars? There you saw two rails placed together, but still they were separate. A worker came along with an electric welding machine, subjected the two rails to the most tremendous heat, and the two were welded together, made one by a tremendous baptism of fire. And the Baptism in the Spirit is spoken of as a baptism of fire—it is a time when our own spirit is welded together with the Spirit of Christ so that henceforth it can be said of us that we are "one spirit" with our Lord. In the most holy place in the tabernacle, the cherubim were one piece with the mercy seat, surely a beautiful type of all in the new creation becoming "one piece"

with Christ and united to one another in Him.

### Grafted

Some years ago I spent some time on a California fruit ranch and learned some precious truths from the nurseryman. One day I went with him to the orchard and together we dug up some tiny bitter almond trees. Then we went to the spot where a man had been pruning an apricot tree, and there we picked up a number of the twigs which he had cut off, brands that were destined for the burning, but which the nurseryman rescued. He brought the small bitter almond trees into his nursery, together with the twigs of the apricot. With a knife he gashed those young bitter almond trees close above the roots; and making a similar gash in the young apricot twigs, he grafted the two together, then bound them round very carefully at the place where the union was made and went out again and planted them.

# For Fruit

He explained that apricots grown on their own roots bring forth no fruit to perfection, but that grafted on to bitter almond roots (the best of all roots than can be provided) they will bring forth abundance of luscious fruit. I asked whether almonds would grow on these trees, since the root was the bitter almond. He replied that though the sap, the hidden life of the tree, was that of the almond, yet the fruit would have the individuality of the apricot. All the life from the almond roots would flow into the branches of the apricot tree when it grew, causing it to produce abundance of fruit. I saw in symbol our union with Christ. We are as brands plucked from the burning, but He has rescued us and united us with Himself. Grafted into Him, and through this vital union with Him, we shall bring forth fruit that will glorify God. Severed from Him we will have no life. Independence means death. Union means life and fruitage, fruitage that glorify our Father which is in heaven.

## Andrew Murray's Experience

I have recently been reading the biography of Andrew Murray. In 1879 he went on some lengthy tours for special services, and through using his throat so much it became relaxed. A physician advised him to stop preaching at once as the condition of his throat was serious. However he continued to fill his engagements, with the result that his throat became in such a bad condition that during the following two years he was able to preach but little. His congregation at Wellington, So. Africa, arranged for him to take a trip to England in order to consult a specialist. While in England he came in touch with some people who believed in divine healing, and he decided to enter Bethshan Home where the truth of divine healing was taught. After about three weeks, he left the place completely healed. His biographer says, "Never again was he troubled by any weakness of throat or voice. His throat, in dependence constantly upon the Lord for its use, in spite of the heavy strain imposed upon it for the rest of his life, retained its strength to the end." He was still preaching at eighty-seven years of age. The healing was not instantaneous but was gradual. Mr. Murray wrote, "One of the things here at Bethshan that struck me as being in conflict with my expectations was that in most cases slow progress is made with the healing process. I thought, and others have expressed the same opinion, that if healing is an act of God's almighty power there can be no reason why it should not be perfected at once."

# The Secret of Healing

Concerning this Mr. Murray consulted Dr. Boardman, the head of Bethshan Home, who said, "Experience has taught that at the present time most cases of healing are subject to this rule, so that even though we cannot understand why it should be so, we have merely to observe what God actually does. We have to notice that this gradual recovery stands in close connection with learning to trust in the Lord and to continue in constant dependence upon Him. It is as though the Lord, by this slow and gradual process, is educating His child to the increasing exercise of faith and to a continuance in communion with Himself." In speaking of the lessons that he personally learned when the Lord healed him, Andrew Murray said, "It fills the soul with holy fear and reverence when we ask the Lord to impart to the body the eternal youth of His heavenly life, and when we ex-

press our readiness to receive the Holy Spirit in order to infuse health into the body He inhabits, so that we may live every day in complete dependence upon the Lord for our bodily weitare. We begin to understand how complete the surrender of the body to the Lord must be, down to the very smallest particulars, and how the Lord in thus giving and preserving health by faith is really effecting the most intimate union with Himself."

# The Secret of Holiness

The best illustration of the relationship between the Lord Jesus Christ and those who are His, was given by the Lord Himself when He gave the picture of the vine and the branches. When the branch uninterruptedly abides in the vine it partakes of the very life of the vine. As we uninterruptedly abide in Christ, His holy nature will be imparted. Holiness is not a matter of externalities. I have writhed as I have heard some preachers putting all the emphasis on external things when attempting to preach on the subject of holiness. Holiness is an internal condition. Holiness is the very life of Christ imparted within, the branch receiving from the Vine the very nature of the Vine itself. Restful abiding in Christ, in faith, will never fail to bring glory to the Father, because of the fruit that the branch will of necessity bring forth.

# Knowing Christ

An elocutionist who was giving an exhibition of his ability was asked to recite the 23rd Psalm. There was a preacher present in his audience and he requested that the preacher might recite it after him. The elocutionist with his beautiful voice, excellent emphasis and measured tones recited the Psalm, and the audience applauded. Then the preacher arose. He was unable to recite the Psalm with the faultless intonations of the elocutionist, but as he repeated it his whole audience was made to realize that he was living in vital union and communion with the One of whom he was speaking. There was no applause for him, but nearly every eye was wet. The elo-cutionist said, "I reached your ears, this man reached your heart. The difference is just this—I know the Psalm but he knows the Shepherd.'

# The Indwelling Shepherd

It is possible for us to mechanically utter the scripture and yet not be in living union with the Christ of whom the scripture speaks. Salvation means the appropriation of the Shepherd as our own, as "My Shepherd." We shall

not want when He is within supplying every need. We find in Him the green pastures and the still waters. His very presence restores our soul, and He is the guide within who will lead us all the way. We shall not fear as we pass through the valley of the shadow of death, for He is within; the all-sufficient portion, Himself preserving us from all evil. He not only provides the table but He Himself is the bread that satisfies our every need. He supplies the wondrous oil of the Spirit so that every day we can be anointed with fresh oil. In Himself He provides both the goodness and mercy that will be with us all the days of our life. And in eternity the union with our Shepherd will be only the deeper and the more profound. Independence is infidelity. Salvation means absolute dependence upon Him.

Now I want you to notice that the thing that preceded this growth was the tragic incident of Ananias and Sapphira. There was a cleaning up and after the cleaning up the church grew again. When I was in a great General Council meeting in England just before I came to America a preacher announced his text from the second chapter of Acts. From all over the crowd came Amen, Praise the Lord, etc. A few days later the same preacher got up and announced his text from the fifth chapter of Acts, and you could have heard a pin drop. The book of Acts has a fifth chapter as well as a second, and we might occasionally preach a very solemn sermon from the fifth chapter.

It was a dramatic and terrible scene. Ananias and Sapphira had agreed together that they would try a little experiment on the Spirit of the Lord. They didn't like Peter very much and they said, "I don't believe that he is as full of the Holy Ghost as he pretends to be. Let's try a little trick on him. We'll sell that land and we won't say how much we have got for it, and we'll pretend that we are giving the whole amount but we'll only give a small part. We'll get the glory for giving the whole price and we can spend the change"

So they decided on this thing of deceit. Ananias came into the assembly and brought part of the price of the possession, and laid it at the disciple's feet. And Peter full of the Holy Ghost with the gift of discernment sees through the whole thing like a flash. He says, "Did you sell it for so much?" "Yes," telling a brazen lie in the presence of God. Then Peter becomes transformed for the time being into a man of steel. Mark you, there comes a time in the church of God when the leaders need to be transformed into leaders of steel. This is the loving, emotional Peter who was delighted to say to the man at the temple gate, "Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee; In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk." That very man who was so full of the love of God, when it came to a need of cleansing, was transformed into a man of steel. He said to Ananias, "While it was thine

own couldn't you do with it as you pleased? Why are you trying to bring this lie into the church of God?" I see the man turn ashy pale. I see him reel. There is a crash. He falls to the ground. His eyelids flicker. Then there is a corpse. A solemn hush comes over the people like the silence of death. It was a tremendous thing to belong to that church! The young men carried him out and buried him.

A few hours later his wife, Sapphira, comes in not knowing what has happened. As soon as she comes in the door I can see a tightness grip the throat of everybody. Sapphira comes up immediately to Peter. Now Peter is the judge upon the bench, a man of rock because holiness and revival—the life of the church and the honor of the Lord is at stake. "Tell me, did you sell that land for so much?" "Yes, so much." "How is it that ye have agreed together to try this experiment? The feet of those who have buried thy husband are at the door and shall carry thee out." The woman goes deathly pale. She drops to the ground, a few convulsions, and she is dead. The young men pick her up and carry her out amid a hush that is as solemn as eternity, and bury her by her husband.

But you say, "Brother Gee, that sort of thing happened under the law." Yes, but this was under grace. You say, "But that sort of thing happened in the Old Testament." But this happened in the New Testament. You say, "That sort of thing hapepned before Calvary." This happened after Calvary. You say, "That sort of thing happened before Pentecost." This happened after Pentecost. I don't know one single dispensational reason why that couldn't happen in this meeting this morning! I sometimes think that it is only the mercy of God that lets some of us get out of a meeting alive instead of dead. It is a solemn thing to belong to the Church of God.

My brethren, it is holiness that we must have before we grow. Let us never deceive ourselves into thinking that a revival can go on without holiness. Any revival that lets down on holiness is doomed. You can dig a grave, for before very long you will have to bury it. "Though I speak with the tongues of men and angels, and have not love, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal." You think you can have holiness by increasing the missionary offering! "Though

I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not love, it profiteth me nothing." You think you can have holiness by increasing your training and preaching, "Though I have all knowledge and have not love . . . I am nothing." I do thank God that He is showing us that if we are going to have revival we must have holiness.

I want to say to you people that when the need comes in the church of God for the exercising of church discipline, please, in the name of Christ, don't make it harder for your leaders by turning around and criticizing them and say they ought to have more love. Remember Peter. One of the most lovely things in that story is that after it was all over I don't hear one word of murmuring and complaint. I don't hear, "Peter, you ought to have had more love. Let's turn him out and get another preacher." They recognized that the leaders were responsible for the holiness in the camp. But we do read (v. 12) that "they were all with one accord in Soloman's porch. This blessed unity was not broken by

I am one of the executive presbyters of the General Council in Great Britain, and one of the hardest things we have to do is to discipline a preacher who has failed God. When a preacher has failed on the moral line, and the only thing we could do is to discipline him, God knows we have done it with broken hearts. And then the people turn around and say we should have had more love and that we only did it because we were jealous of him. God help us to obey them that have the rule over us. It is time for us to have discipline in the army of the Lord. Unless we have it we cannot advance. I do stand for Pentecostal leadership. Obey them that have the rule over you. Heb. 13:17.

Do you know that in some European countries like Finland every week they have a church meeting for members only and admission is by ticket? When I go there they grant me the privilege of going. I can tell you they are meetings in which the power falls, because if you backslide your ticket is taken away from you. I shall never forget a meeting I was in where a sister was having to be put out of the assembly-a sister who had sinned morally. The consequence was that the testimony of the assembly was at stake. They pleaded with her to repent, but she refused to humble herself. The only thing they could do was to put her away from themselves. I personally believe in a membership roll, for unless you have one I don't see how you can tell who is yourself and who isn't.

How can you put away from yourselves the wicked person when you don't know who is yourself and who isn't? 1 Cor. 5:13.

They got up and explained the case. They said that there was no other course; they had tried everything else. She would have to be put away from the membership. Never will I forget that meeting. Those people are so intensely earnest. Oh, the groan and cry that went up from that congregation that God would bring that woman to repentance! If you had been there when they officially and publicly put her out of that church you would have thought you were back again in the New Testament. God give us church discipline!

Notice what happened to the early church after this. In verse 11 we read, "And great fear came upon all the church, and upon as many as heard these things." Fear and grace are the things we need. Will you misunderstand me if I say I think people can become too gracious? You can be so gracious that you are sticky with it. God knows we need a little bit of fear to balance. Some people have so much grace that it doesn't matter to them if someone brings dishonor to the name of Christ. You ought to have more fear. Some people are so gracious that they are even wanting to find a way to get the devil into heaven. What we need is not only grace but some fear along with it, some godly holy fear-the sort of fear that made Noah build the ark-the sort of fear that makes us realize that it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God.

Some people say, "But Brother Gee, if we raise the standard as high as that nobody will join us." Why there are flocks just waiting for you to raise the standard. Because you don't is just the reason they don't join. I solemnly believe that there are thousands who would love to join us if we were more holy. Holiness attracts people.

When I was a young, struggling pastor in Edinburgh I did so want to see my church grow, and in my anxiety to see it grow I am ashamed to say that I admitted to the membership some who were not worthy. Didn't I suffer for it? They were a constant trouble ever afterwards. Didn't I learn my lesson? Don't lower your standard to get in some person just because they happen to be a rich banker. It was when the people had great fear that multitudes both of men and women were added to them. If we stand for holiness we may lose a few people at the beginning, but it will be worth while.

"Be still and know that I am God." The Lord is looking for chosen vessels to whom He can speak. Those who hear His voice are changed. The entire future of Moses was changed at the burning bush, the shrinking shepherd became the mighty prophet.

The Burning Bush was a symbol not only of our Lord, but also of His Chuch. The Church of Christ is humble, a desert plant. "Is this vile world a friend to grace to help me on to God?" "Know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God?" The world which crucified our Saviour will certainly not do less than persecute His followers. Of Himself He said, "Me it hateth, because I testify of it, that the works thereof are The Church of Christ is to know its lowly and unworldly position, to be enveloped and indwelt by the Spirit of the holy God, to carry on the mission of Him who is "the brightness of the Father's glory." As she fulfills her mission the prayer of the Bridegroom will be answered, "And the glory which thou gavest me I have given them." The conquering Church is filled with and radiates the glory of God, the compromising church is without glory, formal and dead. How greatly is Holy Ghost energy needed today! Amid growing apostasy the Lord seeks a "Glorious Church" anointed with the Spirit and filled with the love of God that it may be a true witness to Christ, the mouthpiece of God in this sinful age.

God has a great purpose in enduing and infilling the Church. At Pente-

cost its message led the multitude to a sense of sin and the salvation of a Saviour. In apostolic times the Church blazed its way through the forests of superstition and degraded idolatry. Those who made up its members had waited before the Bush of God's planting until holy fire fell from heaven. There is need of those who are not of the world, even as He is not of the world, who will seek that they might be enveloped in that which is Divine, and filled with the Spirit of burning. Who will consecrate his life says, "Here am I Lord, send me"?

An Indian Mela (Religious Festival) Fred Merian

I am sending you a few pictures taken at the last mela held on the other side of our District about forty miles from our mission sation. The name of the place where the mela was held is Kaffara, meaning the "sacrifice for sin."

We spent several days at the mela, sleeping at night under a grove of trees in the very center of activities. There must have been between sixty and seventy thousand people present, many of whom had come long distances in order to become ceremonially clean by bathing in the tanks and

also to worship their

gods.

With such a large crowd of people you may readily understand how we were kept busy from the first rays of the sun in the morning until late at night preaching, giving out tracts and gospels, and talking with inquirers.

Early in the morning I would be awakened by crowds standing around my cot, calling to me to wake up and explain what my object was in being among them. This meant that a meeting started right away and continued until we had to stop for a meal. Even then some would lin-

ger to talk while we were eating. Fortunately I had three Indian workers with me so we could take our turn in talking to the people until we moved out among the crowd. Our party would then separate and hold several meetings at a time in different places so as to reach as many people as possible. The picture of the "holy" bathing tank was taken after the crowd had moved away. Otherwise one could not have discerned what it was.

The second picture shows a crowd that was shut out of the temple since it was already full of worshipers. What a solemn lesson this might bring to us concerning the day when the gates of glory close and the day of grace is past.

Throughout our ministry among the people at the mela, we enjoyed a very real sense of the Lord's presence. We trust His Spirit may water the seed sown and cause it to bring forth fruit.

Bishop Wilson says of that great missionary Henry Martyn that the thing that impressed him most in reading Henry Martyn's journal was the


spirit of prayer that pervaded it and the time Martyn devoted to this ministry.



# True Conversion, an Inner Experience

"But when it pleased God, who separated me from my mother's womb, and called me by his grace, to reveal his Son in me, that I might preach him among the heathen; immediately I conferred not with flesh and blood." Galatians 1:15, 16.

The apostle Paul is here describing the process used by God in the conversion of his own soul. We know that the light above the brightness of the noon-day sun shone on his path when he was persecuting the Church and the disciples of Christ, and yet he says that, "It pleased God to reveal his Son in me."

Why does he say "in me" and why did he not say to me? Was not this light which he saw an outer vision? Did it not stop him in his mad effort of persecution? Did it not cause his old nature and self to pause in the midst of the Damascus journey? Surely this vision was a real outward appearance to his eye of the Lord Jesus

in glory.

Paul could say that Christ was revealed in him, because an outward revelation and vision, when earnestly responded to, leads to an inner experience. Are nature's beauties on which we gaze revealed only to our outward vision? Could that be true, they would not be properly revealed at all. There can be no recognition of beauty without unless it is connected with a sense of beauty within. Music is not only a revelation to the outer ear. There could be no appreciation of harmony without unless we had a sense of harmony within. So it is in the matter of true conversion -it is essential that there be a revelation of Christ within.

The artist's picture of Christ outside the door of the human heart expresses this very thought of the necessity of opening up to Him. There can be no true knowledge of Christ except through the inner channels. Did not the Master rebuke the outward religious system when he said, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye make clean the outside of the cup and platter, but within they are full of extortion and excess"?

How often have we envied

those who were privileged to know our Lord Jesus Christ in the days of His flesh on earth, who beheld that blessed face, who beheld the thrill of His voice, who saw the luster of the beam in His eyes, and yet do we not hear the very leader of the disciples ad-dressed from His sacred lips, "Flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee"? It was not merely Peter's eyes that behold the beam, nor merely his ear that heard the thrill of His voice; but it was the heart, the soul, the inner man, the inner life, the spirit that responded to the witness of God's Spirit. Peter found in Christ not only salvation, but all of his soul's desire. And does not this transformed fisherman speak of our relationship to Christ in his epistle, "Whom having not seen, ye love; in whom though now ve see him not, yet believing, ye rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory"?

May God reveal His Son in us today. Our desire should be for more than the audible, articulate sound to the ear, for more than the vibrations of the voice which quaked Mt. Sinai, it should be for the revelation of the Spirit which will penetrate into the very secret chambers of our hearts.

Then the outward will become merely the A. B. C. of our Christian experience. We must come to realize the glorious fact that Christ is indeed within us, the hope of glory. Faith will realize His presence in the time of trial. Our confidant hearts will hear Him say, "Lo! I am with you alway." George Williams tells in his "Tales

PIONEERING IN WEST POINSETT


