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The Crucifixion-a Meditation }

HE sun was laid to rest in her casket of purple and gold, and night, nature's undertaker, with dark-gloved fingers, had pulled the curtain that veiled the glory of the departing day. The moon and a myriad of twinkling eyes peered down upon a city wrapped in slumber. The birds were safely snuggled among the snarled boughs of the

olive trees while the little foxes frisked about in search for the ripe grapes.

The moon, sentry of the night-watches, had arisen far to the east, and in its pale light moving objects appear—a man stumbles along the rocky mountain path followed by about a dozen rugged fellows like himself. They push up the path for a short distance then disappear into a well-known garden on the slope of Mount Olivet. Mount Sinai might boast of her Law and Mount Carmel of her fire but more blessed the mountain where the Son of God, with bleeding heart, goes to pray His last prayer and to wrestle with death.

Just inside the gate He bids the disciples to wait but beckons three, Peter, James, and John to follow. He leads them farther into the gloom of that dark night. At length they also lag and with a tender voice He says, "Watch ye here while I go yonder to

pray." With deep amazement He hastens forward to fall upon His face in the most agonizing prayer ever uttered. Hofmann's *Christ in Gethsemane*, though beautiful, and loved by the Christian world, is not altogether the Christ of the garden. His groanings are unutterable. Tears burst from His kindly eyes and then His body becomes one mass

of sweat as every pore oozes His very life blood. "Such agonizing prayer is not denied; it moves the heart of Him who dwells above; He quickly takes the cup that holds the dregs and in its place presents a cup of love" for at this time an angel swiftly wings its way from heaven to strengthen Him. Three times He weeps out the words, "Not my will but thine be

done," proving to the world, the flesh, and the devil His absolute obedience to the Father's will.

Arising from the ground, with blood soaked clothing, He comes to the sleeping disciples —disciples with willing spirits but so weary in flesh. "Come now; we must be going," He says, and with this flickering torches can be seen coming across the little brook Kidron lying between Olivet and the city. Raucous voices of rough Roman soldiers grow louder. "Hey, Ju-das; hey, there—do you think we will have trouble finding Him? Will we have trouble as we had with the murderer in that garden the other day? You think He will try to escape or hide among the olive boughs?" On they come, Judas,

clinking the coins in his pocket, leading the mob. A mob composed of priests, politicians, long whiskered elders, and (See Page Three)

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& Encouragement to Holiness

There was a time when Sin was our Master, "Ye were the servants of sin." We may have "delighted in the law of God after the inward man, but we found another law in our members, warring against the law of our mind and bringing us into captivity to the law of sin which was in our members." Rom. 7:22, 23. Sin, our Master, held us fast. But now, being redeemed by Christ, our Kinsman Redeemer (Lev. 25:25), we have a new Master, Righteousness, and are no longer in bondage to sin. "Now being made free from sin, and become servants to God, we have our fruit unto holiness, and the end everlasting life." Rom. 6:22.

Though the Scriptures clearly teach that "Our old man is crucified with Him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin' (Rom. 6:6), the doctrine of eradication of all inbred tendencies to evil as an instantaneous work of grace has some difficulties which are hard to harmonize with some portions of Scripture, or with personal experience. Many have been disappointed because, after believing they had obtained an experience in which all roots of sin were forever removed, they found in the trying hour that there was still conflict with the flesh and, instead of fighting the good fight of faith, taking their Christian position, "for sin shall not have dominion over you," they have cast away their confidence and slidden back into doubt and darkness. There is need of an instantaneous taking of holiness by faith, but there is also need of constant watchfulness and yielding to God that that which is evil may be kept in the place of crucifixion. Holiness is a grace supplied moment by moment as one walks in faith, relying upon one's Christian position of being "crucified with Christ."

Israel failed to attain God's righteousness because they sought it not by faith, but by works of the law. "For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God." Rom. 10:3. They were trying to create righteousness by human effort, while one of the first important steps in righteousness is to learn that there is nothing dependable or worthy in self, "For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh,) dwelleth no good thing." 'Rom. 7:18. Righteousness is obtained and retained only as believers

maintain by faith their Christian position in Christ that "sin shall not have dominion over you." Rom. 6:14. It cannot be emphasized too strongly that holiness is not that legal experience which puts its followers into bondage, but is that free and gracious blessing which flows from the heart of a loving Father into the soul of His redeemed child who puts his trust in Him. Holiness is a walk in the Spirit, by the Spirit's putting to death the works of the flesh, and the law of its possession is "the law of faith." Rom. 3:27, "But if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live." Rom. 8:13.

Those seeking a life of holiness ought to know that there is always possibility of opposition from the flesh, "For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh." Gal. 5:17. knowledge ought to encourage, instead of discourage, putting us constantly on our guard and strengthening our determination to "fight the good fight of faith," knowing that the higher, victorious life in the Spirit assures constant victory over the flesh. In Romans 8:9 the Holy Spirit is spoken of as "the Spirit of God" and also as "the Spirit of Christ," because He comes from the Father to bring to us the life and nature of Christ, quickening even our mortal flesh and thus lifting us above bondage to carnal propensities which war against the soul.

The purest saint may be tempted to evil and solicited to indulge any or all the works of the flesh (Gal. 5:19-21), but temptation is not sin, and because one feels assaults of the flesh against one's higher spiritual nature, in no sense implies that one has lost one's holiness. One is tempted when drawn away of one's own lusts and enticed. There is something within that responds to the temptation, but the redeemed one finds there is also a higher, holier life, giving power to resist the impulse to wrong and enabling one to live unto God. "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love Him." Temptation is not sin and is to be resisted through faith in the atoning work of our Lord Jesus Christ. In the midst of temptation "there is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus." Rom. 8:1. Tempted through the flesh, the tempted one does

not walk after the flesh, but after the Spirit.

But suppose in an hour of temptation the flesh should gain some ascendency; tempted to impatience one should show evidence of anger, or be provoked to speak hastily, has one then not lost one's holiness? If dependence is being put in any self-goodness, it is then gone, but if dependence rests in the holiness of Christ, He is still holy and He is still ours. "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee." Where one has failed, one ought to take the failure immediately to the Lord and, if any have been injured or wronged, one ought to seek their forgiveness, but "Cast not away therefore your confidence which hath great recompense of reward." Defeats are humiliating, but one defeat ought not to hurl one down. Think of the many victories! God knew that "all flesh is grass and all goodliness of man is like the flower of the field" and He has provided for even our failures, "For if we confess our sins. He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." 1 John 1:9. "These things write I unto you, that ye sin not. And if any man sin we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous." 1 John 2:1. Trust in Christ will always triumph.

Holiness is essential to heavenly citizenship and must be the standard of all who would be Christians. "Follow peace with all men. and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord." Heb. 12:14. Preservation of holiness requires careful watchfulness, "Looking diligently lest any man fail of the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up trouble you, and thereby many be defiled." Heb. 12:14. Roots of bitterness are the remains of the flesh life and are to be carefully watched lest they put forth their evil shoots. As the farmer removes the suckers from his plants, Christians must destroy any upspringing from the old nature. We are strictly admonished, "But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfill the lusts thereof." Rom. 13:14. If holiness has become the desire of the heart, and no provision is made for actions which are carnal, victory is assured. How essential holiness is to Christian citizenship and hope may be learned from the Apostle Paul, "I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway.' Cor. 9:27. "If ye live after the flesh ve shall die," and those who do the works of the flesh "shall not inherit the kingdom of God." Gal. 5:21. The fruit of the Spirit is to be cultivated, the works of the flesh are to be crucified. Christian grace, though inward, reflects itself in the outward life. It will be seen in the

modesty of one's apparel, the company one keeps, and in all daily deportment.

To obtain holiness, the soul must make its choice once and forever. Since it means a walk in the Spirit and crucifixion to the flesh, the will must choose righteousness at whatever cost, and covenant to live a life of full surrender to the will of God. Here is where dying out often takes place. It is in the will, the giving up and renouncing of those things which one's carnal nature might wish. The will must answer the question, "Lovest thou Me more than these?" Christ must be put first in our life if we would be what God would have us to be. And decision of the will must be repeated over and over again as through life things of earth seek to make their claims upon us. May we right now yield our all to Christ and from this moment forward "reckon ourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God, through Jesus Christ our Lord." "For sin shall not have dominion over you: for ye are not under the law, but under grace."

captains of the temple. What a night for Judas and what a night for Jesus! For Jesus it meant Golgotha, the grave and the glory. But alas, for poor Judas it meant ghastly gloom and gehenna—gehenna, the lake of the everlasting fire. Judas rushes forward and with a "Hail, Master" he plants an unsacred kiss upon a sacred brow. His thirty pieces of silver have been earned. He slinks away into the night—his night of endless despair. Like the notes of the nightingale come the words, "Whom seek ye?—I am He." They seize Him and roughly bind Him, and the mob starts down the rocky path that leads back over the little brook

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with their victim—the Christ, the Lamb prepared for the slaughter.

I stood at that very spot, and while standing there half dazed with the awe of it all, I found myself tearing away the curtains of time and space, and losing myself in that mob to see "what the end might be." Down across the brook and up the other side and through the gate then on to the house of the high priest.

It is cool, so a fire is built. We stand there with eyes upon the Man with the kindly face. "You are one of them," shouts a maid, and turning we see Peter by the fire. We see him quail and quiver at the very thought of identification with the Christ. "No indeed I am not," he snaps. Three times he is accused of being one of them but three times he stoutly denies the charge and the last time the Lord looks at him, and in bitterness of soul, he goes out into the night to weep and to repent.

The soldiers spend the night hours amusing themselves by tormenting their victim. As the first streaks of dawn appear in the east, Jesus is taken before the Sanhedrin for a religious trial. "Art thou the Christ?" "Art thou the Son of God?" they ask Him. "Certainly I am," said Jesus. With this they are completely satisfied that He is an impostor and shout, "He is guilty of death." Then burly men of the baser sort rush forward and cover His face with foul spittle. They push Him about the hall and smite Him with their hands. The lowly Nazarene remains speechless. After hours of this savagery, bound hand and foot, they drag Him to Pilate for a political trial.

Pilate, upon hearing that He is from Galilee, directs the mob to Herod for judgment. So the weary, suffering Saviour is hurried to Herod. Herod has heard of Him—heard of the miracles. Delighted to see Him, Herod questions Him at length but to every question Jesus answers nothing. Angered because of His silence, under the barrage of vehement accusations of the priests and scribes Herod sets Him at nought, making sport of Him and, wrapping Him in a gorgeous robe, sends Him back to Pilate. From hand to hand the heavenly Jewel is tossed but all seem ignorant of its true value.

Truth forces itself back upon Pilate. Pilate for the second time must dispose of Christ. He asks, "Are you the king of the Jews?" "I am," says Jesus. At this the priests and scribes become infuriated. The Lord stands silently before the howling mob seething with religious intolerence and devilish derision. Pilate, seated upon his throne shouts, "Shall I release unto you Christ or Barabbas?" At festival time the governor was in the habit of releasing any one prisoner whom the

An Invitation

In Psalm 24 the question is raised, "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? who shall stand in his holy place?' The answer is given, "He that hath clean hands and a pure heart, who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity nor sworn deceitfully." There is only One out of all the children of men who perfectly fulfilled this word, and that One was Jesus of Nazareth. He met the conditions fully, and so we have the word going forth in this Psalm, "Lift up your heads, O ye gates; and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall come in." And the portals of the heavenly Zion swung wide open for the ascent and entrance of Him who was despised and rejected of men, but whom the heavenly hosts acclaimed as the "King of glory." And this despised and yet exalted One, who bore our sins in His body on the tree, bids all who trust in Him to enter with boldness into the heavenly sanctuary. How can we have access? Not by our own merits, but only "by the blood of Jesus." Heb. 10:19. The precious blood of Christ is the only acceptable passport into the heavenly tabernacle.

Retaining Citizenship

The "King of glory" as our Lord is called, has the right to set the standard of citizenship in His glorious kingdom. When an alien becomes a naturalized citizen of the United States, it is necessary for him to meet some stringent conditions. If he should not value living in this land and should take up his residence in another country for five consecutive years or more, he would forfeit his citizenship. If, however, he appreciates his citizenship and wants to retain the same, he will be careful to comply with all the conditions set forth. And so it is with the one who becomes a "supernaturalized" citizen of the kingdom of heaven. He will seek to meet the conditions the heavenly King has here set forth. David desired to know who would be the permanent residents in this heavenly abode and asked, "Lord, who shall abide in thy tabernacle, and who shall dwell in thy holy hill?" We are glad that the answer to this important question is on record. The conditions are set forth very clearly in the 15th Psalm, and at the conclusion we read, "He that doeth these things shall never be moved," that is, he will become a permanent dweller in these heavenly places. An examination of "these things" referred to here will show the saint that it is necessary to have a holy walk, a holy heart, a holy tongue,

holy hands, holy ears, holy eyes, and a spirit made holy and free from covetousness, in order to abide in this holy place. Open your Bibles and read this Psalm.

The Upright Walk

The first condition our King requires deals with our feet, "He that walketh uprightly." Spurgeon once remarked, "He only is upright in walk who is downright in honesty," and this is in harmony with Paul's exhortation that "ye walk honestly towards them that are without"; that is, as the context shows, that you take care of your business diligently, and work hard with your own hands so that you can honestly pay your way, incurring no debt, owing no man anything. The man who borrows and does not pay back, God designates as wicked. Psalm 37:21. One of the signs that God was working in the Welsh revival was that men who had outstanding debts were convicted by the Spirit that this was wrong in the sight of God, and they began immediately to pay these debts off. Our walk must be also one of purity. Peter writes, "I beseech you as strangers and pilgrims, abstain from fleshly lusts which war against the soul." Sanctified feet will steer clear of unholy places.

Doing the Right Thing

The second condition deals with the hands, "That worketh righteousness." It has been well said, "God's house is a hive for workers, not a nest for drones." The Master's standard is, "All things whatso-ever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." Matt. 7:12. Not the hearers of the law, but the doers of the law shall be justified. We are not saved by good works, but the man who is really well saved will be glad to observe the fast of Isaiah 58, dealing out his bread to the hungry, bringing the poor that are cast out to his house, and giving covering to the naked. The man who dwells on high will always remember the exhortation, "Whoso hath this world's goods, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him? My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth." 1 John 3:17, 18.

Truth In the Inward Parts

The third condition deals with the heart, "That speaketh the truth in his heart." It is out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh, therefore "keep thy heart with all diligence, for out of it are the issues of life." When the heart becomes a cesspool of iniquity,

that which exudes from it will be corruption and pollution. But when there is truth in the inward parts, the lips will speak forth that which will be edifying and will minister grace to the hearers. Our hearts, however, can minister only that on which they meditate. Don't feed out of the world's filthy garbage cans, its unwholesome magazines, its impure novels. They will greatly harm the soul. Feed on the Word of God, on spiritual books, on good biographies. The Psalmist said, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee.' "That is," as D. W. Kerr used to put it, "a good thing in a good place for a good purpose." In the first Psalm we see the blessedness of the man whose heart is continually feeding and meditating on the Word of God, and it is written of him, "Whatsoever he doeth shall prosper."

A Sanctified Tongue

The next condition deals with the tongue, "He that backbiteth not with his tongue." One outstanding title of that old serpent, the devil, is "the accuser of the brethren." He is to be cast down, and all who align themselves with him in condemning, accusing, and backbiting the brethren will surely share his fate. The Lord will not tolerate such in His kingdom. The old Book tells us that he that justifieth the wicked, and he that condemneth the righteous, even they both are an abomination to the Lord. Dr. Yoakum told the writer, "The devil surely got hold of my tongue at one time, but the Lord deeply convicted me, and I asked Him for His forgiveness. At the next meeting I attended there was an old, rude altar bench, and I went up to that altar and literally laid my tongue upon it crying, 'Lord, sanctify this dirty tongue of mine.' "The Lord says of His spouse, "Honey and milk are under thy tongue. Song of Sol. 4:11. Contrast this with the tongue of the backbiter of whom it can be said, "The poison of asps is under their lips." Rom. 3:13.

Purified Ears

Next, the sanctified ear, "Nor taketh up (margin, receiveth) a reproach against his neighbor." God's heavenly citizen will not lend his ear to calumny or evil report against the one God has called him to love—his neighbor. The Master says, "Take heed what ye hear." Mark 4:24. The devil often gets into man's soul by way of Eargate. There is such a thing as holy deafness. When the wicked were speaking mischievous things before him, David declares that "I as a deaf man heard not." We must learn to close our ears against evil speaking, calumny, and that bitterness that will surely defile many, if we desire to abide in God's holy tabernacle.

Pure Eyes

And then sanctified eyes, "In whose

Fulfilled Prophecy

"It remained for the motor-truck, one of transportation's newest tools, to finally fulfil the prophecy of Isaiah, by connecting Egypt and Palestine (Israel) with Irak, which State contains the major portion of ancient Assyria.

"Since last July a Wisconsin boy, driving a big FWD truck, has been traveling across this cradle of civilization, helping to build the forty-million-dollar pipe-line of the Irak Petroleum Company. This modern ship of the desert, with its four-wheel trailer, is hauling from twenty to thirty tons of steel plates and equipment per trip. It is assured that with improved economic conditions there will be a high-type road paralleling the pipe-line from Kirkuk to the sea at Haifa."

An Obstacle to Peace

Writes a British author in *Public Opinion*: "A grave obstacle to international peace are the great armament firms. Recently I made an exhaustive tour of those armament plants, and saw in design or manufacture prodigious quantities of lethal weapons being produced for most of the countries of the world. While the manufacture of such weapons of murder is carried on as a commercial enterprise, with the powerful backing of the bulk of the world's Press, what chance is there of world peace?"

is a false charity that condones the immoral. The Word says, "Ye that love the Lord hate evil." We are to hate it enough to turn away from it. There is much that is base and lewd and corrupt around us. Outside the moving picture theaters they frequently put posters designed to attract the lustful. When you are compelled to pass these places offer that prayer of Psalm 119, "Turn away mine eyes from beholding vanity." Many a good man has fallen through the lust of the eye. It were better for us to pluck out our eyes and cast them from us than to let them be the means of dragging us down to hell. Our thought life is largely affected by what we see. If we will look upon the pure and lovely, it will greatly help us in our thought life (Phil. 4:8), for, remember this, what we think largely determines what we are.

The Work of the Spirit

There are other conditions set forth in this Psalm. The heavenly citizen must be a man of his word, not failing in the promises he makes, even though it hurts him to fulfill them. He must not be a covetous or avaricious man, for no covetous man, seeking gain by unjust usury, will have any part in God's kingdom.

As they read these conditions some will say, "I have failed on many of these lines. What shall I do?" If you will yield your whole spirit, soul, and body to God, the faithful Holy Spirit will deliver you from your own way-which is the way against which you are warned in this Psalm-and He will put you into His way, into that way which is the good, the acceptable and perfect will of God.

A Call and Its Confirmation

I am glad for this opportunity to tell what God has done for me, "a sinner saved by grace." Feeling definitely led of the Spirit to go to England to study the English language, I left my home in Switzerland in April, 1931, and entered Elim Bible College in London. Previous to my departure from home, I was called of God to serve Him on the mission field, but the exact place of my service had not been revealed to me.

On July 18, 1931 I received the Baptism with the Holy Spirit, and with it came the word "Mongolia." This same word kept gripping my heart and ringing in my ears every time I knelt down to pray. I was at a loss to understand it. I had only a limited knowledge of English, and I did not know what Mongolia was. Finally after much prayer it was revealed to me that Mongolia was

Two weeks later during a prayer meeting at the college the power of God was being mightily manifested. People were lying prostrate under the mighty power of God, among them myself. There was a lady near me who was being blessed. and my spirit was so drawn to her that I shall never forget it. It seemed as if we were one, praising the Lord together, and all the time the word Mongolia was ringing in my heart. I somehow felt that she could help me, and that God had sent her along. She left the college before I could speak to her, but I afterward learned from the superintendent that she was a missionary from Mongolia. I began searching for her immediately. I think I inquired for her at every Missionary Society in London, but to no avail. I did not know her name so my task was difficult. At last I gave up in despair, and prayed that if it was God's will for me to go to Mongolia, He would lead me again to this

It was not until January, 1932 that anything else outstanding happened. Six months had elapsed, and during that time I had been sorely tested and was just longing for God to do something. I was confident He would for my hope was in Him.

On January 11 a lady from Finland came to the college to study English. Three days after her arrival I asked her to come with me for a time of prayer. Why I asked her I cannot tell, for I had not spoken to her before, and she knew only a few words of English. I believe God ordained that prayer meeting for while we were praying the power

of God fell, and this lady gave a wonderful message in prophecy in perfect English: "I know, I know that you are willing to serve Me and to follow Me. Yea, I know your longing to work for Me, and I will give you the place where thou shalt serve Me, yea, the right place. Yea, I will be with thee and will give thee souls to win. Yea, thou shalt go to Mongolia. I will lead thee out. Be not I will prepare the place. will work it out, yea, I will bless thee if thou wilt obey." This came from God, through a person who did not know me, nor did she know that I had a call. How I rejoiced! I kept praying that God would lead me to that lady with whom I had had such a wonderful experience six months previously.

(Here Mr. Joseph Payne tells his part

of the story.)
I entered Elim Bible College on Jan. 9, 1923, with a strong desire to serve God on the mission field. This was known to no one but a lady in London who was praying for me. While waiting on God one morning the Lord spoke to me, telling me I was not to go alone, but that He was preparing a partner for me, a young lady who was at that time in the Bible school, having come from Switzerland to study the English language. It was also revealed to me that she had received a call to Mongolia.

This all seemed absurd as I had never spoken to the young lady, and we were total strangers. I endeavored to put the thought from me, thinking perhaps I had made a mistake. However, I soon realized I was dealing with God. It seemed as if I was in an endless circle. I prayed, God showed me the conditions; I objected, the burden grew, making me prav more, only to have the same results.

After three months of praying I approached the young lady, and to my surprise she told me she had been going through a similar experience; she likewise had been praying for three months that God would work it all out. Several weeks passed by in which we were both praying earnestly. The burden grew, and one night I decided to wait upon God until He gave me something definite. Holding out the Word of God I asked God to speak to me through its pages. I told Him I was willing to stand on His Word and trust Him wholly. The last words of my earnest prayer were, "Lord, do I have to go to Mongolia or not?" Praise God, He answered. The word I received was Deut. 3:18, "I have given you this land to possess it." Feeling there was more to follow I remained in prayer.

As dawn began to break I asked God if I had to take this young lady with me or not. I had forgotten my surroundings and was very conscious of the divine Presence. Upon opening the Bible I was confident God would speak to me, and this was the word, "Joseph (my Christian name) shall have two portions." Ezek. 47:13.

That morning I told the young lady the two Scriptures I had received, and with joy she told me that she had received the same two verses while waiting on God for a confirmation of the call. Satan raised obstacles again and again, but the incidents of confirmation were too numerous to mention. One however was so outstanding I must tell you. One of the greatest battles I had to fight was fearing what friends would say, fearing lest the Lord would not provide. One morning I had to take a meeting in an assembly in London. The meeting was dry until a lady, unknown to me, stood up to pray. After praying she gave a message in tongues. Instantly my whole being was quickened. I felt that God was speaking directly to me. How eagerly I listened for the interpretation. Clearly it was spoken, every word sinking deeply into my heart. "My son, my son, why dost thou fear? Have I not called thee! I will lead thee out, for I have called thee to establish My name in this place. Fear not, my son, for I will lead thee.

Mrs. Payne continues: We wrote to Mr. Noel Perkin as we did not know any missionaries in Mongolia, and he gave us the address of Mr. and Mrs. Hindle, and also advised us to get in touch with Mrs. Wyns who had recently left Mr. Hindle's station and was at that time staying in London. We wrote to Mrs. Wyns and then went to see her. Imagine our delight when we discovered that she was the lady whom I had been praying to meet since July of the year previous. She told us there was room for us with the Hindles, so our preparation be-Within six weeks the Lord sent us nearly \$450, including our missionary We sailed for China arriving Dec. 17, 1932. We are now in the promised land. Please pray for us that we may be kept humble at the feet of Jesus so that we may be a channel of blessing to these poor souls who are in the grip of Satan's bondage and who have a never-dying soul.

notorious criminal.

Before the people make answer a messenger is seen rushing toward Pilate. In his hand he holds a letter. He shoves it at Pilate. "Here," he says, "this is from your wife." Pilate quickly opens the paper and to his astonishment reads, "Pontius, oh Pontius, please have nothing to

do with that just man. I have had a terrible dream about Him today; please do be careful."

The loud cry of the maddened mob calls Pilate back to his duty. Long and loud rings the cry for the release of Barabbas. "What then shall I do with Jesus called the Christ?" Like the noise of a Niagara comes the demand, "Let Him be crucified, let Him be crucified." Then Pilate rising from his throne dips his hands in a bowl of water, washes them before the throng, saying, "See, this cleanses me from this innocent man's blood." They heckle Pilate and howl, "Let His blood be upon us and our children." His blood, holy blood. The blood of the covenant; the blood of the Son of God. Let it be on us and on our children-for cleansing? Ah, no, but for condemnation. It might have been for cleansing but "ye would not." The Jew reaped a portion of this prayer when Titus razed Jerusalem and the Jewish blood flowed like a stream down the sacred steps of the temple. This prayer will more fully be granted during the great Tribulation; the last week of Jacob's trouble.

Upon hearing the cry, Pilate leaves his throne and leading Jesus away lashes Him to the post and orders his men to scourge Him. They find the whip made to use upon criminals. It was an ugly instrument made of heavy leather straps with rough chunks of metal tied at intervals. With this the flesh was laid open to the bone. One-two-threethe strokes were being placed upon the bare back of the sinless One! On and on they drive the mighty lash with merciless strength. Would they never stop? Could the tired, quivering form stand it longer? Like a lamb He was dumb. After the scourging the soldiers drag Him into the Prætorium. Two soldiers hurry to an old closet where Pilate disposed of his old garments. They rake over the pile and choose an old purple one. Hurrying back they drape the bleeding body of the Lord.

Another soldier hurries out and soon returns with an arm full of cruel thorns. They hastily weave them together into the shape of a crown and force them upon His brow. Blood trickles down His haggard face. The sight of flowing blood enrages the beastly natures of the Romans. They clutch at His face; they seize His beard and pluck it out. One clinches his fist and strikes the Christ in the face. Again and again he deals blow after blow until the face becomes shapeless, beyond recognition—beat into a jelly -more marred than any man's. Isa. 52: 14. With a reed they beat Him over the head. They pass Him, their king, as if in review, and as they pass they cover His swollen face and body with foul spit. They circle back and one by one they kneel before Him in mock worship. What shame!

Look! there comes Pilate out again. He is making his way toward the seething mob. The howling is terrific-deafening. Pilate waves for silence. He is saying something. "Behold I bring Him forth to you that you may know that I find no fault in Him." He beckons to the soldiers and forward they come leading a man. Could it be the Christ! Was He the man they had so recently led away for scourging? What is the matter, He looks so different. In fact is it a man? With amazement the mob stares. No, that is not the man to be crucified. "Bring us the Christ who is to be crucified," one shouts. Then Jesus comes forth with a visage so marred and thorn crowned. A purple robe is partly draped about His blood-soaked body. Pilate cries, "Ecce Homo." "Behold the Man." The crowd is silent. "Yes, this is your man," Pilate calls, "take Him and crucify Him."

"Crucify Him, crucify Him," is the ribald song on every lip as the mob mills away from the hall of "Injustice" and divides into the narrow streets of the city. They reach the gate and move en masse toward a hill north and east of the city wall. In the midst of the crowd moves a lonely Figure bearing a cross. His love for dying humanity forces Him on. A colored man is seized and forced to bear the cross; thus making three continents to share in the crucifixion. Romans from Europe, Jews from Asia, and an Ethiopian from Africa.

"Which way?" shouts a soldier and the answer comes, "To the place of the skull." Every eye is lifted and there in the distance one beholds the handiwork of nature. In the mountain side a human skull is depicted. The crowd surges on. They reach the slope of Mount Calvary.

The metallic voice of the gong in the temple vard is sounding out the hour of the day as the sweating mob reaches the top of the hill. One-two-three-four it rings until nine peals have vibrated on the ear. The old wooden cross is dropped upon the rocks and a soldier hurries to Him with a mixture of bitters. "Here, drink this; it will ease the pain." Jesus refuses. A number of soldiers seize upon Him, expecting the scene of the ordinary crucifixion; expecting the struggle, the cursing and the fighting. They thrust Him down upon the wooden beams. An arm is stretched outward. A burly Roman grips the hammer while another places a cruel iron spike upon the palm of the only holy hand this world has ever known. A hand brimful of blessing for a needy world. One blow forces that jagged iron peg through the tender hand of the Son of God. The bones are forced apart. Another hand is nailed fast to the wood. The feet are forced back against the tree and a spike sent ripping through with one blow from the sledge. The spike comes out the heel thus fulfilling the Scripture of Satan bruising the heel. Crucifixion is the only death that bruises the heel. But the same spike that ripped the heel of the Saviour ruined the head of the serpent.

"Up with the cross," shouts an officer. Strong hands suspend the cross between heaven and earth and carry it to its resting place. With a deathly thud it falls into the hole that has been digged for it out of the solid rock. The weight of the body of Jesus coming down with such terrific force rips the flesh about the spikes. The joints of His bones are dislocated. In agony of death He looks at the city; yonder huddle His friends; on either side two malefactors raving under the pain of crucifixion; beneath Him are the soldiers gambling over His clothingthe pay for a deed well done. For three long hours jibes from the mocking priests are hurled at Him. Heads were wagged in derision as strangers pass by. The Son of God dies alone, alone.

At high noon the sun refuses to shine and darkness settles down like å dark blanket. Terror stricken the bulk of the mob hustles down the mountain and into the gate of the city. A centurion exclaims, "Surely this was the Son of God." In the darkness the demons hold high carnage. The Christ is defeated! The plan of God is smashed into smithereens! For three hours the sun holds tight her veil of mourning. The stars that blinked at Him the night before hide their face from the spectacle of dying Grace. The whole of nature is paying its respects to its Maker while man, the creature of His care, carelessly mocks on.

There He dies alone. Dying for Pilate and the priests; dying for the soldiers and the scribes; dying for you and for me. See Him hanging there in ignominy and shame, grief-stricken and heart broken. Love personified. Calvary is God's way of saying, "I love you." A spear is pushed into His side and blood and water come mingled down. Come, sinner, your safe-

ty lies under that stream.

Oh how can I from such a Friend Withhold the life for which He died? Oh make my selfishness to end In Thee, oh Christ, the crucified.

We Christians, who have gazed upon this picture of the atoning sufferings of Christ, must face this question and chal-

> "All this I did for thee; What hast thou done for Me?"

Let our answer be, in the words of Wesley's beautiful hymn,

"Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were a present far too small. Love so amazing, so divine, Shall have my life, my soul, my all."

Looking Forward to a Great Revival Hettie Steffen

In 1919 the Lord began to deal with me regarding my soul's need, and one year later I heard of the Pentecostal movement. I went to Indiana to Mrs. Etter's meetings and was there converted. One week later I received the Baptism with the Spirit.

I was healed when I was saved of blood poisoning in my foot. The doctor had told me to come back the next day

for an operation. I never had the opera-tion. The thought came to me that if I went to the meetings maybe God would heal me. I went to the meeting and was healed even before I was saved. It was an instant healing. I had not worn my shoe for five weeks when I was prayed for, but after that I could wear my shoe.

After remaining in Indiana for three months I returned to my home in Northeast Missouri and stayed with a friend. We began holding prayer meetings, and a number of people were saved and baptized in the Spirit during the summer months. In the fall of that same year I went to California and attended the Southern California Bible School. At the close of that year of training I returned home and with two friends we continued holding meetings, and within two years three assemblies were established. (These assemblies were the ones that stood behind me when I went to India.) Then I came to Springfield and finished my training, graduating in 1925.

When I graduated I had no call to the mission field, but had always been interested in India. There was an opening for me to go to Palestine, but feeling definitely that the Lord was calling me elsewhere, I did not accept the opportunity to go to Palestine. About six months after I graduated the Lord gave me a definite call to India, and I began to make preparations for the field. I had saved fifty dollars from my summer's work, and I sent this in to Springfield to be held toward my fare. I had to send in the first-all that I had-and the Lord sent in all the rest later. A year later I sailed for India, and by the time I was ready to sail all the money had come in for my fare. I do not know where it came from but the Lord directed if to be sent for that purpose. At that time the fare to India was about \$450.

I did not feel the least bit sad in leav-

ing for India because the Lord had ministry was in the home where this sordefinitely called me. All the time there was a great joy in my heart. When I arrived in India I went to Laherai Sarai, North India, and worked at that station during my whole term in India which was five and one-half years.

One of the most blessed promises which the Lord gave me from His Word during my time in India was Rom. 8:28, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose," and day after day the Lord

proved this promise to me. When your best dress mildews and the moths eat your books, it all works together for good. We learn to take joyfully the spoiling of our goods. When things occur that are great disappointments, they must be His appointments.

During these years of service on the field the Lord has enabled me to give His Word to hundreds of pilgrims and villagers in the District, and I have seen many find Him as their personal Saviour. Just before I returned home I was in a certain village where the people had never seen a missionary or heard the gospel message. Upon arriving in the village we learned that a Hindu man had died and it would be better if we would come to that village later, but we went into the village and found that our first

row had come. We were first privileged to witness to the son of this man and then we were invited into the home to speak to the women. My heart was touched as I saw the old man lying on a bed of straw in that Hindu hut, knowing that he had never heard the name of Jesus, and that he had gone on alone to meet God.

After speaking a few moments to the women we held a village meeting. At this meeting a certain woman inquired if we had come from the hospital and

could we give her some medicine for her son who was lame. We told her we had not, but that we knew of One who could touch him. Upon hearing this she asked what we would do. We told her we would pray. We knelt down upon the village road and offered prayer for the healing of this woman's son, and the Lord marvelously touched him. When the people saw this, many of the village people came to us for prayer, and remained in that village until dusk. We were asked to return again, and although it was not my privilege to return before I came home I am sure that the gospel has again been taken to that village.

One evening we were called to come and pray for a Bengali woman whom the doctors said could not live. She had a relative who was a doctor and he had been attending her, but he said her case was beyond him and he could not help her. The Bible woman and I went. We were taken upstairs where she was lying on a little wooden Indian bed. We told her we had come to pray for her and

if she would believe God He would heal her. She had heard the gospel for many months, and as we gathered around her bed and anointed her with oil in the name of the Lord, He immediately touched her, and she was made whole. She had not eaten for three days, but after prayer was offered she asked for food and began to mend. Her husband was convinced that God had healed her, and every time I met him afterward he testified to me of his gratitude to God for hearing and answering prayer for his wife. She was made whole, absolutely healed, and the doctors marveled at the instant healing. Her husband always says, "I thank God Almighty for healing my wife through your prayers." I believe when I go back to India that that will be

If therefore any are wondering why they do not receive an acknowledgment from our brother this is probably the reason, as he will have to wait for a duplicate letter giving the necessary information.

Looking Forward to a Great Revival

(Continued from Page Eight) the first thing he will say when I meet him again.

We have a district of 3,105,000 people,

and we are the only missionaries of any denomination in the whole district. We had a little day school connected with our mission station which Mrs. Mueller started, but after the depression started it was so expensive to keep up, so we were not able to carry it on.

The Lord was definitely calling me to evangelistic work. The first home I visited after I arrived in India was that of a high caste Hindu woman. Although I could not understand or speak the language the Bible woman ministered to her, and just about six months before returning home the Lord dealt with her and as a result she called for me to come to see her. Upon arriving at her home she told me she had been having medical attention but was no better. She said she had confidence in God that He could heal her. After talking with her for more than an hour regarding the need of her soul and her body, we prayed for her. She did not know how to pray so for a few moments she repeated my prayer. But when I came to the sentence, "Touch me and heal me," she added, "And save me, Lord." At that moment the Lord did a definite work in her heart and body. She was saved and healed. Before I came home I called to see her again and she told me that the Lord had healed her and had given her peace in her soul. Although her husband did not understand about her healing, and wanted her to continue with her idol worship, she asked, "How can I when they have done nothing for me? The Lord has healed me and saved me."

In the cool season we do village work or district work. In the summer months and during the hot and rainy season we always visit the nearby villages and also the zenanas. Two months we go away. The Lord graciously kept me while I was on the field. During the whole time I was in India I never had fever or was sick, except one time when I was ill for a couple of days with a touch of the sun and flu.

The people are open to the gospel. We really feel and believe that the time is coming when we are going to have a real revival in India. All of our Assemblies of God have set Friday aside for prayer and I believe the Lord is going to send a revival. We had been praying at our station. Within four days the three of our workers who had not received their Baptism did receive. I believe it is God's time to give an outpouring of His Spirit. Souls are being saved, but we want to see them come in as they are in Africa and China. It is a hard country, but nothing is too hard for God. The caste system is the thing that hinders. When one is converted the whole caste turns against him, and they would just as soon take his life.

I expect to go back in November, the Lord willing. Pray for me as I go.

The Sunday School Tesson

Review: Some Early Leaders of Israel

Lesson for September 13

For the purpose of review we shall group the characters studied during the last quarter under three divisions. Observing the order, "Ladies First," we shall begin with:

THREE GREAT WOMEN

Deborah—the National Leader. One writer has called attention to the fact that while Deborah was a public woman she was not a private failure. In other words, she was faithful in her home. How do we know that? She refers to herself as a "mother in Israel," as much as to say, "Though I am a prophetess, I am no flighty eccentric. I am just a plain domestic woman like yourselves—a mother in Israel." Her success in public life was surely not built upon the neglect and ruins of home life.

Ruth—the Woman of Decision. All the blessings and rewards that came to Ruth, and all the glory connected with her name were the result of her loyal, self-sacrificing decision to follow Naomi into Canaan. One writer has said that God has not given us the power to foresee the results that follow from a single human act, but He does give us light enough to know the next step to be taken. Ruth did not see what was ahead of her; but she made a right decision—and God took care of the rest. A seemingly trivial decision may become a mighty force in shaping character and destiny.

Hannah—the Consecrated Mother. Hannah is the type of multitudes of mothers in whose lives godliness has been the dominant power. Putting God first in their lives, they have placed their children upon the altar and consecrated them to God's service. Lord Shaftesbury had this type of mother in mind when he said, "Give me a generation of Christian mothers, and I will undertake to change the face of society in twelve months."

FOUR MIGHTY WARRIORS

Joshua-the Warrior of Faith. Joshua was a leader who was called upon to perform very difficult and seemingly impossible tasks. He was commanded to cross the Jordan when it was a raging flood-tide, to take the mighty fortress of Jericho by the apparently ridiculous method of marching round the walls, and above all, he was to conquer the land of Canaan, the inhabitants of which outnumbered those of Israel. But Joshua obeyed God; and as he obeyed, God made the way. Let us then ponder the following lesson: If God has commanded us to do something that is very difficult, let us obey; for as we move forward in faith, He will divide the waters of difficulty, tear down the strongholds of evil and drive away our spiritual foes. Even though he belong to a small minority, circumstances and difficulties will make way for the Christian who knows where he is going.

Caleb—the Whole-hearted Warrior. "I wholly followed the Lord my God." This sincere testimony means that the biggest thing in Caleb's life was the service of God. These words do not mean that Caleb was faultless,

or that he never made a blunder. When a man is whole-hearted in his business, that does not indicate that he is a perfect business man. But it does mean that he puts business first. When pleasure clashes with business, business is given right of way. A real Christian is one who makes it the supreme business of his life to serve God and follow Christ. All else is secondary and subordinate. That is what Christ meant when He said, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness." Doing this, the Christian will not have to say, like that English churchman of the seventeenth century, "O had I but served my God with half the zeal with which I served my king He would not in my old age have left me naked to mine enemies."

Gideon-the Warrior Who Conquered with Strange Weapons. If, when this country entered the war, President Wilson had said to General Pershing and his staff, "Your army is entirely too large; I want you to reduce it to about three hundred, and with that number I'll see to it that you win the war," those who know the explosive tempers of military men can readily imagine what a scene there would have ensued. But that is what Jehovah told Gideon to do, when He reduced his army from 32,000 to 300 men. But Gideon had sense enough to know that an army of 300 men plus the divine Ally was invincible. And the outcome was that by the breaking of three hundred pitchers, the waving of three hundred torches and the sounding forth of a lusty battle cry the Midianites were completely routed. Victories for Christ are won by a small but select company, often using means that seem ridiculous in the eyes of the world. Let us therefore sing, in the words of the negro "spiritual,"

"Here's my heart, here's my hand, For I'm a member of Gideon's band."

Jonathan—the Friendly Warrior. The story of Jonathan's friendship for David would teach us that God wants us all to exercise the ministry of friendship. That ministry means the saying of an encouraging word, the performance of a gracious act to some discouraged brother, so that he will be able to say.

"My friend, to you I never took a care But that the burden lightened; what you said New hope infused. I left you unafraid, Resolved to onward press, to do and dare."

FOUR OUTSTANDING RULERS

Samuel—Prophet and Judge. Our lesson emphasizes the fact that Samuel served God from his earliest years—a rebuke to the false teaching that a young man must "sow his wild oats." The late William Jennings Bryan told the story of a father who, in order to impress his son with his recklessness, suggested that he drive a nail into a certain post every time that he committed a sin, and then pull out a nail every time he performed a worthy act. The nails finally became so numerous that the boy in shame repented, and by his changed life began to withdraw the nails one by one. One day he stood by the post from which every nail had been withdrawn, but he was weeping bit-

terly. When his father comforted him with the thought that all the nails were gone, he replied, "Yes, but the scars are there." Even after it has been forgiven, sin leaves its scar. When Samuel reached the close of his life he could look back to a life that had no wasted years and that was not marred by thoughts of "what might have been."

Saul—the Man who Lost His Crown. The record of Saul's failure was not recorded to feed the spirit of self-complacency or to inspire the "O what a good boy am I" feeling. It is set in the inspired Word as a lighthouse to warn us away from the dangerous rocks of self-will and disobedience. "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall."

David-the Empire Builder. David was not a perfect man; rather his record is stained with a very ugly sin. But we must judge him according to the standard mentioned by the Lord when He first chose him: "The Lord looketh on the heart." We cannot judge a person by isolated acts of righteousness or by isolated acts of wrong-doing. The supreme test is: In which direction is his heart set-towards God and righteousness or toward self and wickedness. Like a compass needle that is deflected because of some interference, David turned from God; but when the hindrance was removed by God's rebuke, his heart turned instinctively towards God as the compass needle turns toward the north.

Solomon-the Temple-Builder. Solomon's request for wisdom, his love for Jehovah, his building of the temple, his bringing back of the ark-all supply a beautiful opening chapter in his life. But the last chapter is disappointing. In his later years he departed from God, became inflamed with worldly ambition, made entangling alliances, and burdened the people with taxation. There was outward prosperity, but it became hollow prosperity; there was resplendent magnificence, but it became lifeless magnificence. At the beginning of his reign Solomon possessed that spiritual life, God-given radiance and winsome simplicity that the Lord Jesus illustrated by the lily. Matt. 6:29. Toward the end of his reign he may be compared to a festering lily, reminding us of the saying, "Festering lilies smell worse than weeds." In other words, the higher a saint ascends in the spiritual life, the lower he falls when he fails God. Let us as a movement retain the simplicity of Christ. 2 Cor. 11:3. If we lose that then we shall be driven from the garden of the divine blessing, spiritually naked (Rev. 3:17, 18), and bearing the reproach of "they-used-to-have-the-power" movement.-Myer Pearlman.

Eddie Pfaff, Pleasant Hill, Mo.: "Sister Inez Lasley, our former pastor, has given up the pastorate here and entered the evangelistic field. Brother Caleb McAfee, of West Plains, has taken charge. This work was organized 2 years ago by Sister Lasley; it has a membership of 135 and about 50 have been filled with the Holy Ghost. ROCKY MOUNTAIN DISTRICT CAMP





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
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
