The Growth of the Seed of Life
"Having heard the word, keep it, (not hurrying it into forced growth), and bring forth fruit with patience." Luke $8: 15$. A. V. The seed need not be watched to see if it is growing! It need not be dug up to see if it has taken root! It can be left! "So is the kingdom of God, as if a man should cast seed upon the earth; and should sleep, and rise night and day, and the seed should spring up and grow, he knoweth not how." It can be left, for it will spring up of itself, and bring forth fruit in its season, " first the blade, then the ear, then the full corn in the ear." Patience is needed. Oh, the patience of Jesus Christ! "The Husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the carth, and hath long patience for it." He is patient over the stages of its steady development, "first the blade, then the ear." To the little green blade, just shooting out of the ground, He does not, speak of "falling into the ground to die." He is silent about this even when the green stalk appears, and begins to grow tall. When the green ear of wheat is forming, and is preparing to become the "full corn in the ear," when still in its put away sin, and to accept salvation on God's terms.

He has sent forth His Spirit to take personak charge of the one that receives His Son, and He will faithfully do His work as the silent, unceasing Operator within.

forth the life eternal from blade to ear, and after that the full corn in the ear.

But-"how far does He depend on me to co-operate with Him?" is the question here! Just so far as to ask thy utter abandonment to Him day by day, and implicit obedience to all the light He reveals. For it is true that "you can go no faster than a full dependence upon God can carry you." "God is always present, and always working towards the life of the soul, and its deliverance from captivity
but this inward work of God, though never ceasing or altering, is yet always, and only, hindered by the activity of our own nature and faculties; by bad men through their obedience to earthly passions; by good men through striving to be good in their own way, by their natural strength, and . ..: seemingly holy labors and contrivances."

The Husbandman is satisfied with the blade of wheat at its proper stage. He does not expect it to be "golden grain." Patience, patience, little green blade. "He that believeth shall not make haste."

Time goes on. The little green blade has left its growth to God and has almost forgotten about its growing, for it has just been trusting through the dark days, and rejoicing in the sunny ones when they came, accepting each from the Father's

It has given up toiling, and taken to trusting, when suddenly it awakens to find that it is a "full corn in the ear!" It thought it would never produce some real grains, the growth seemed so slow! Then when the grains came they seeemed at first so immature and so unfit for any use. The ears seemed all husk with no grain at all! Would it never be "golden grain," it said to itself. Meanwhile the days went on. The Sun of Righteousness shone into the heart, and there came the rain of the Spirit from the Father, until at last the fruit was ripe. In the sunshine there sways in the breeze on the top of the stalk, the full corn in the ear.

## The Ripe Grain of Wheat

"Fruit, thirtyfold, and sixtyfold, and a hundredfold . . . when the fruit is ripe, straightway He putteth forth the sickle." Mark 4:20, 29, m. Let us leave the group
of grains-the "full corn in the ear" to which the seed sown by the sower has matured-and follow the story of one little gain of wheat out of the hundredfold.

The little grain of wheat finds itself one of many, all bound together in cosy nests on the top of the stalk. Such a happy group, living in the sunshine, rejoicing in the refreshing showers and the lovely summer air!
'Is this the end of it all?" we ask. Is this the goal, is this the full purpose of its being? If the grain of wheat could talk we might see it looking down on the little blades of wheat just peeping out of the ground, and hear it say, "Come up here." Or it might forget them altogether, and become absorbed in its own beautiful life "far above all," for it left all of earth when it grew up to its present position, and nothing concerns it where it is.

On the top of that stalk there is peace from the strife of tongues, separation from the things of earth, and happy fellowship with its own group of grains. There is only room for just the hundredfold in the ear of wheat, and the little grain is apt to be limited to its own point of vision, and to think that no other "full corn in the ear," is quite like its own!

What a picture of many of God's children who have followed on to know the Lord, and have grown up with others in happy circles and favored surroundings. How bright the days, how happy the fellowship, how delightful the meetings! How easy to look out from cosy nests, and to pity less favored souls. How easy to become spiritually self-absorbed. "Holy yet hard" is the danger here, for it is possible to be a really sanctified soul, but shut in and narrowed within our own limit; a victorious soul, but severe on others not on our level of experience. We may know how to "work for God," and yet lack that passion for self-sacrifice which would lead us to be poured out upon the sacrifice and service of other's faith like the Apostle Paul.

Is the Husbandman satisfied? Nay, He has fuller purposes for the grain of wheat. It has not yet fulfilled the cause of its being. It has reached maturity it is true, and hitherto the main purpose has been its growth, for it has been getting for itself, and absorbing all the necessary nourishment that it might become the "golden grain."

There are now three courses open to the ripened grain of wheat-

1. It may be garnered alone into the heavenly garner. "He will gather His wheat into the garner." Matt. 3:12. Although sifted by Satan and tossed by sorrow and trial, the Father has promised "not the least grain shall fall." But to be one of the garnered ones in the

great harvest of the Son of man, is not the fullest development possible to the grain of wheat. Yet how many place their own salvation as the ultimate end of all their desires.
2. It may be used as bread-corn. "Bread-corn is bruised" (A. V), "nay, He will not ever be threshing it . . . He doth not crush it." Isa. $28: 28, \mathrm{~m}$. The wheat that is gathered into the garner is separated from the chaff, but it is neither bruised nor broken, and both are necessary for the further use or devolpment of the ripened grain. The Father's breadcorn must needs be bruised, but it is never crushed so as to be useless!

May this not mean fellowship with the sufferings of Christ, so as to be made "perfect through suffering," for "the disciple must be perfected as his Master"?
3. It may become one of the seed-grains, bringing forth much fruit. "Except a grain of wheat fall into the earth and die, it abideth by itself alone; but if it die it beareth much fruit." John 12:24. "That which thou thyself sowest is not quickened except it die." 1 Cor. $15: 36$. The bruised breadcorn, and the buried grain of wheat, may be but two aspects of God's working for bringing the "life of God in the soul of man" into the fullest development for His eternal glory.

The bread-corn may speak of the God-ward aspect, as the bruising and threshing brings conformity to the image of Christ. The "bread of . . . God" in the Holy Place signified the character of Jesus, and His perfect acceptance by the Father, as the One in whom He was well pleased. It is also written that "we who are many are one bread, one body." The bread is composed of many grains of wheat, ground and knit together by fire to form one loaf. Thus are we joined to Christ our Head; and in Him, and with Him, in the Holy Place, do we become the "bread of God"-"Accepted in the Beloved."

The buried corn may speak of the man-ward aspect of the breaking forth of the divine life from the broken grain, even as it is written," death worketh in us, life in you." This seems to point to the being poured out upon the sacrifice and service of the faith of others-the self-lessness of selfforgetfulness that others may be blessed.

## He Is Risen

There was no gainsaying the fact set forth by Peter on the day of Pentecost that our Lord Jesus Christ was risen. It was sufficient in any Jewish court to have the evidence brought forth by two or three witnesses, but here were 120 witnesses all ready to testify that Christ was risen indeed, and within easy access were some 500 who had seen the Lord after His resurrection. The devout Jews assembled from all parts of the world to take part in the Feast of Pentecost were amazed at the phenomena of these simple Galileans speaking in the various languages of different localities in which they were born, They inquired, "What meaneth this?" Peter| was able to explain that this was that foretold by Joel ; that this Jesus whom they had slain was risen and ascended and that He was now pouring out His Spirit from heaven. And that day 3,000 of those devout Hebrews yielded their lives to the crucified, risen, and ascended Saviour.

## The Mighty Conqueror

Ian Maclaren tells of visiting a picture gallery in Paris, and being struck by two paintings he saw there. The first was of a king who lay on his deathbed and had just expired. His servants, who a few moments before were obedient to his every beck and call, were now busy rifling his treasure caskets and his wardrobe. Under the picture were the words: "William the Conqueror!" I think the artist must have had a streak of satire in his make-up or he would have called his picture: "William the Conquered." The second picture was of our King Immanuel lying in Joseph's rock-hewn tomb, tended by a company of mighty angels. There was no designation under this picture, but I should like to have put one: "Jesus, the Mighty Conqueror!" For before He went to Calvary He had declared, "I lay down my life, that I may take it again. I have power to lay it down, I have power to take it again." John 11:27. And on Easter morning He exercised that power to take up again that laid-down life-that life laid down for our $\sin$ and our salvation. He is a mighty Conqueror!

## The Risen Ones

Matthew tells us in connection with the death of Christ, "The earth did quake, and the rocks rent; and the graves were opened: and many bodies of the saints which slept arose, and came out of the graves after his resurrection, and went into the holy city, and appeared to many." Can you imagine the scene when one of those loved ones returned to his home and told what things he had witnessed? What a story he would have to relate of Christ's descent into the place of the

dead. The Lord had declared when on earth that the gates of hades should not prevail against His Church, and now He had captured the keys of this domain and had opened the gates to release His own. Scofield tells us that he thinks all those revived ones went back to their graves again, but since the record does not tell us we cannot be dogmatic as to this. David, however, gives us a hint in the 68th Psalm where he prophesies of Christ's ascension: "Thou hast ascended on high; thou hast led captivity captive," or as Leeser translates this, "led away captives." Leeser further translates Psalm 68:21, "Our God is to us the God of salvation; and by the Eternal, the Lord, are the escapes from death." May He not have taken those captives on high as the first trophies of His Calvary victory?

Leon Tucker tells of meeting Dr. Griffith Thomas in a Southern hotel a short while before the latter went to be with the Lord. Their rooms were next to one another and they carried on conversation through an open door. Said Dr. Thomas, "Oh, Tucker, we don't know what is in the future, do we?" ## Practical Truth

I have before me the testimony of a very godly physician who said, "The words, 'I am the resurrection and the life,' have so gripped me of late that I find myself frequently repeating them; they minister life and renewal of energy to my whole being. It is not for us who believe in Christ to limit our capacity to the normal strength of our physical frame. As surely as I am in the living Christ-i. e., as surely as Christ is living in me (Gal. 2:20), I am being quickened, vitalized, energized, by resurrection life in this body of mine. Is your bodily presence weak? Paul's was. 2 Cor. $10: 10$. Do you feel your inability? If so, eat these words, 'I am the resurrection.' Ruminate over them.'

## His Life at out Disposal

This godly man further stated, "All you need to satisfy yourself about is that you are doing what God calls upon you to do ; and waiting upon Him, using His strength, you can do it. He-the Resur-rection-is in you. 'I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me.' He as the Resurrection will lift the bodies of the dead out of their graves ere long. But He lives now, and His life is at our disposal to live out by faith. In this vale of tears we may be so pressed out of measure above strength (i. e., above ours) insomuch that we despair even of life. 2 Cor. $1: 8$. What shall we do? Shall we give up our spirit? Certainly not. Listen to the Lord's word, 'I am the resurrection.' Just the one a crushed, despairing, dying man needs. Hallelujah!"

## A Contrast

When the brother of Col. Ingersoll died, the great apostle of unbelief came to pay his last tribute to his brother. He stood there by the grave, with the tears raining down his cheeks, and said: "Life is a dark and barren valley between the cold, ice-clad peaks of two eternities. We strive sometimes to look beyond the darkness for the light. Sometimes we cry for help but there comes back to us nothing but the echo of our own cry."

When a brother of D. L. Moody died, D. L. Moody, leaning on his elbow on the coffin, said, "I thank God that he ever gave me a brother. I thank him also that he permitted me to lead him to Jesus. I thank God that I can now look down into his face and know that I shall see him again."

## Now Is Christ Risen

There were three hours of darkness on the earth when Christ was on the Cross. What about the following three days? The Saviour of mankind was dead. It was the darkest period in the world's history.

At creation darkness was upon the face of the deep and the Spirit of God brooded upon the face of the waters. But now the darkest ones of hell brooded over the earth. Hell held high carnival on the borders of the earth. "The Heir is killed, the inheritance is ours!" The invasion commenced! The stone sealed! A guard set to prevent the inheritance being retaken!

But God was not dead, though the Heir was. The promise had been given, "Thou wilt not leave my soul in hell" (hades). God was true to His promise. The grave could not hold Him. The stone was rolled away, the soldiers had to go down, and Christ came forth.

No human witnessed it. The soldiers were as dead men. They never saw Him, though He was risen. And they fled. That place was no place for them. The supernatural scared those soldiers as nothing on earth could scare them.

God raised Him from the dead and loosened Him from the grip of death. He loosened those icy hands. He loosened Him from the tenacious grip that had snatched all mankind and held them all, with two exceptions. God raised Him from the dead, never to die again.

Christ is now become the firstfruits of them that slept, the first of the fruits, the first of the balance. He says, "Because I live, ye shall live also." "Every man in his own order: Christ the firstfruits: afterward they that are Christ's at His coming. Then cometh the end" and the final resurrection.

As surely as man went down into the grave, so surely must man come out of the grave. "For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive." No man is fool enough to dispute the first point. The elixir of life has never been found. Books on how to prolong life and on cures have to go. The writers die and the readers. The fact is universal -the death of the sons of Adam.

And the fact is also universal that in Christ all will be, have to be, made alive. As-so. You cannot veto the first, neither can you veto the second. Man's duty is to decide which class he is going to be in-the resurrection of life or the resurrection of damnation. That's the problem-the serious problem. Not how to prolong life, but the quality of life you are living. Seek to procure the eternal life.

It is appointed unto men once to die, and after death what? Don't shut your eyes, don't stop your ears, don't stultify your reason and stifle your conscience. After death, what? You have the power to say what.

## ( uestiongand Answers

Does the soul live after the death of the body? If so what is meant by the expression "asleep in Christ"?

One of the leading exponents of the doctrine which is commonly known as "soul sleeping" teaches that the soul is but a part of our natural organism the same as are the flesh and bones, and that at death all perish together, to be reorganized at the time of the resurrection. It is, however, almost universally believed among Christians that the soul, the selfconscious life with its faculties of feeling, thinking, remembering etc., is eternal and that at death the soul leaves the body, the soul of the righteous ascending into Paradise, 2 Cor. $12: 4$, and the soul of the unrighteous descending into Hades. Luke $16: 23$. At the coming of Christ the souls of the righteous will He bring with Him, 1 Thess. $4: 14$, to enter into their perfect state in their bodies which will then be resurrected, 1 Thess. $4: 16$, while the unrighteous will remain in Hades until the time of the final judgment when they will come forth in resurrection, at which time death and Hades will be cast into the Lake of Fire. Rev. $20: 14$. That the soul departs the body at death seems clear from such scriptures as Gen. $35: 18$; 1 Kings $17: 21,22$. It is only in the light of belief in separation of the soul from the body at death that some of Paul's expressions can be understood. "Willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord." 2 Cor. $5: 8$. "Having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ ; which is far better." Phil. $1: 23$.-E. S. W.

## Meeting Christ

"Face to face with Christ my Saviour! Face to face, what will it be,
When with rapture I behold Him, Jesus Christ who died for me?"
The answer to this question is faintly foreshadowed by a remarkable incident which occurred at a wedding in England. A young man of large wealth and high social position, who had been blinded by an accident when he was ten years old, and who won University honors in spite of his blindness, had won a beautiful bride, though he had never looked upon her face. A little while before his marriage, he submitted to a course of treatment by experts, and the climax came on the day of his wedding. The day came, and the presents, and guests. There were present cabinet ministers and generals and bishops and learned men and women. William Montague Dyke, dressed for the wedding, his eyes still shrouded in linen, drove to the church with his father, and the famous oculist met them in the vestry. The bride, Miss Cave, entered the church on the arm of her white-haired father, the admiral, who was all decked out in the blue and lace of the quarter-deck. So moved was she that she could hardly speak. Was her lover at last to see her face that others admired, but which he knew only through his delicate finger tips? As she neared the altar, while the soft strains of the wedding march floated through the church, her eyes fell on a strange group. Sir William Hart Dyke stood there with his son. Before the latter was the great oculist in the act of cutting away the last bandage. William Montague Dyke took a step forward, with the spasmodic uncertainty of one who cannot believe that he is awake. A beam of rose-colored light from a pane in the chancel window fell across his face, but he did not seem to see it. Did he see anything? Yes! Recovering in an instant his steadiness of mien, and with a dignity and joy never before seen in his face, he went forward to meet his bride. They looked into each other's eyes, and one would have thought that his eyes would never wander from her.
"At last!" she said. "At last!" he echoed solemnly, bowing his head. That was a scene of great dramatic power, and no doubt of great joy, and is but a mere suggestion of what will actually take place in heaven when the Christian who has been walking through this world of trial and sorrow, shall see his Saviour "face to face."

dN no place is it more evident that the Holy Spirit glorifies Christ than in the memorable sermon preached by Peter on the Day of Pentecost. Beginning with the Man Christ Jesus, Peter moves along under the guidance of the Spirit until, in the climax of his utterances, we find this same Jesus highly exalted, given a name which is above every name, and pouring out the Holy Spirit upon those who dare to follow Him.

First of all the Holy Spirit emphasizes the humanity and holiness of Christ. He is "Jesus of Nazareth, a man." He who gave Himself a ransom for our sins was in every sense human. He was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without $\sin$. The difference between Him and others of the human family rests in one great fact; He was divinely approved, while we have been divinely disapproved; He knew no $\sin$, while we were born in $\sin$ and shapen in iniquity. To be approved means to be shown forth; to be accredited. Both the character and works of our Redeemer in showing Him forth did so with credit. His character was approved of God, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased," and of man, "I find no fault in Him." His works were equally approved, for they were benevolent "miracles and wonders and signs, which God did by Him." This approval was public and before all for it was "in the midst of you, as ye yourselves also know."

The Holy Spirit exalts the atonement made by Christ and glorifies Him in His resurrection and High Priestly administration. Wicked were those instrumental in His crucifixion. Roman soldiers became but "the hands" by which He was "crucified and slain." Back of His crucifixion were hearts which were far more responsible before God for His death than those who, obeying orders from those over them, nailed Him to the cross. Peter puts the burden of guilt upon those who had the law and the prophets and shows them to have been the ones responsible, while the Roman soldiers were but the executioners of their desire. "Ye have taken."

But back of all a Sovereign mystery was fulfilled in this rejection and crucifixion of Christ. From the beginning God has foreseen that "Christ must needs suffer and be rejected and on the third day should rise again." From the early promise "The seed of the woman shall bruise the serpent's head" down through the prophets God had been unfolding the sacrifice which Jesus must make at Jerusalem. Explicitly had He detailed the happenings, and when it came, it was all done "that the scriptures might be fulfilled" according to "the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God."


But Jesus did not remain long in the tomb after His crucifixion. That same Sovereign God, by whose "counsel and foreknowledge" Jesus had been slain, brought Him back from death. Such is power which is infinite. Our reading in Acts the second chapter speaks of "the pangs of death." Psalm 18:4, from which this is quoted, mentions the same as "the cords of death." Here is a warning lesson to sinful man. The counsels of God are daily being fulfilled. Many a man has been lost who might have been saved had he not resisted against his Maker. We are all fulfilling God's eternal purpose. We are either accepting His grace in Christ, finding our place in His eternal plan of salvation, and working together with Him, or we are resisting His will in grace, to find ourselves arrayed in opposition to Him and finally to drink of the cup of His eternal displeasure and fury. "Even the wrath of man shall praise him, the remainder of wrath he will subdue."

ing man his prey, comes to bind him to the shades of eternal night. Who has looked this enemy in the face without pangs of travail? There are no tears in the eyes of the dying; there are times when human emotions get beyond tears. Death must lose its power which it had received through $\sin$ in the fall of man, if man is to have hope beyond the grave. None but a sinless One on whom death had no claim could wrestle with this monster, conquer it and rob it of its dread and power. In this Jesus championed our cause and in this He triumphed. But as He looked into the valley of the shadow of death, and as there was laid upon Him the iniquity of us all (the cause whereby death has been made master over us), He sweat as it were great drops of blood so great was the agony of the fearful conflict.

Death is no small power to face. He who faces it alone goes away "into everlasting darkness." We need One who can make us conquerors over death, and that One is Christ. Sin must be dealt with, and that thoroughly, if we are to avoid its penal wages. "O death, where is thy sting, O grave where is thy victory? The sting of death is sin, and the strength of $\sin$ is the law, but thanks be unto God which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

Because Jesus is the sinless One "God hath raised him up, having loosed the pains of death." Triumphantly came our Saviour forth from the grave leading "captivity captive and giving gifts unto men." Now death has lost its pangs to those who believe in Jesus. Sin, the sting of death, is gone. The happy soul of the redeemed goes at death to be with Christ which is far better. God, who loosed the cords which bound Jesus, has loosed the cords for every one who will believe in Jesus. Until the resurrection of the Church, the bodies of saints will go downward to the grave, but the liberated soul, the real man, ascends to the happy heights of Paradise.
"Jesus is risen and ascended into the heavens! He is both Lord and Christ! His enemies shall become His footstool!

Moreover He is shedding forth that which ye now see and hear!" These are the exultant words of the Spirit through the holy Peter. The announcement almost tumbles over itself as the Spirit seeks to impart to the world the greatest message ever given to man. Let us be glad and rejoice! The Holy Spirit has come into our hearts enabling us to appreciate the great work of Jesus, and bidding us tell the message to the uttermost parts of the world. Happy is our lot that we have been filled with the Spirit, the earnest of our inheritance until the redemption of the purchased possession.

When the Spirit came at Pentecost there were spiritual demonstrations. Both physical acts and human voice responded to the urge of the Spirit within. To some the divine blessing was looked upon as only an emotion caused by an over-indulgence in intemperance. But to others it brought an awe of reverance and deep conviction. They were pricked to their heart as Peter laid before them responsibility for the death of Christ and revealed to them that through Him was remission of sins and everlasting life. Those who gladly received the exhortation were baptized, both men and women, and there were added to the Lord on that day about three thousand souls.

Blessed Holy Spirit, gift of God! May He so enter our hearts as He entered the hearts of those who first accepted our Saviour that we, in our turn, may under His guidance glorify Him who loved us and gave Himself for us. To glorify means "to ascribe glory to ; to elevate in honor; to declare worthy of worship." All glory belongs to Christ, and we know Him to be worthy of highest worship, but do our lives elevate Him in honor? When Jesus came forth from the tomb He was declared to be the Son of God with power according to the Spirit of holiness. It is only as by that same Spirit we walk in holiness before God even our Father that we elevate Him in honor. Sin crucified our Christ and $\sin$ is a reproach to any people. We need power that we may be witnesses to the uttermost parts of the earth, buit that power must be the fragrant power of holiness and love.

One of the saddest verses in the Bible is Jer. 6:30, telling of the Refiner's melting and all His labor being in vain, because His people so hardened their hearts against the melting process and refused to humble themselves, that He could only reject them as reprobate silver.
"Prevailing or effectual prayer is that prayer which attains the blessing that it seeks. It effects its object."-Finney. Jas. 5:16.

The same writer gives seven characteristics of this effectual prayer: (1) It must be for a definite object. (2) It must be in accordance with the revealed will of God.

(3) Effectual prayer for an object implies a desire for that object commensurate with its importance. There is such a thing as being so in harmony with the will of God that it is with us a matter of life and death to see it accomplished.

Other characteristics of effectual prayer follow: (4) It must be offered from right motives, with a supreme desire for the glory of God. (5) It must be by the intercession of the Holy Spirit. Rom. 8:26, 27.

The two last are perhaps the most important now: (6) It must be persevering prayer. How many fail here, like Joash in 2 Kings 13:15-19. (7) It must be the prayer of faith. Jas. 1:5-7.

# The Sunday School Tessons 

Confessing and Following Christ<br>Lesson for April 1: Matt. 16:13-26.

Misunderstood by the nation and bitterly opposed by the religious leaders, the Lord saw that it was time to prepare His disciples for the crisis of the Cross, the shadow of which was beginning to fall on His pathway. For this purpose He took them to the seclusion of the Gentile town of Cæsarea Philippi, where He made the first plain announcement of His coming death.

## I. THE REJECTED CHRIST.

Matt. 16:13, 14.
Christ's question. "Whom do men say that I the Son of man am?" Our Lord asked this question, not because He was unaware of popular opinion, but because He was planning to prepare His disciples for truth concerning His claims. His purpose was to use current opinion as a dark background for eternal truth.

The disciples' answer. "Some say that thou art John the Baptist: some, Elias (Elijah); and others, Jeremias or one of the prophets." The answer reveals the sad truth that the nation as a whole had not come to the conclusion that Jesus was the Messiah. They conceded that he was a great prophet, on a level with the Old Testament prophets. Perhaps some went as far as to admit that He was a forerunner of the Messiah.
How explain the fact that the nation whose supreme hope was the coming of the Messiah failed to recognize Him when He appeared?

Some time ago I was waiting for the St. Louis train. I had already pictured it to my mind as a long train, with many coaches, entering the depot with great commotion, and discharging a multitude of passengers. Some time before the scheduled arrival of my train, there pulled into the station a short train of insignificant appearance. "That cannot be the St. Louis train," I said to my wife; "it must be some local." To make sure, I enquired, but unfortunately referred to the train by the wrong title, and consequently received a negative answer.

After the train had left, I continued to wait. Time passed, and stillness reigned in the depot. A look at my watch gave me an uneasy feeling that I had missed the St. Louis train. An enquiry confirmed the impression. I had been waiting for a train that had already arrived and departed!

This experience is a parable of Israel's experience. I had missed the train for three reasons: I was misled by the appearance; it was not as magnificent as I expected. I was misled by the time; it came before I expected it. I was misled in my enquiry; I called it by the wrong title. The Jewish people expected a conquering King; but a humble CarpenterProphet appeared instead. Careless in their inquiries (John $5: 39 ; 7: 52$ ), they failed to recognize the time of His coming (Luke 19:42, 44), and consequently today they are like a man who waits for a train that has long come and gone!

## II. THE ACCEPTED CHRIST. Matt. 16:15-20.

A personal question. "But whom say ye that I am?" were words that made a searching appeal to the faith of those who knew Him best. It is a question that needs to be asked today. Because-(1) We are in danger, as were the disciples, of being affected by the crude opinions of men about our Lord, and His religion and His church. (2) It is the question of Christianity, for if people are wrong concerning the nature of Christ, they will be wrong concerning the other fundamentals. The Deity of Christ is the hub in the wheel of Christian doctrine.

An inspired answer. "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God," answered Peter. Those who desire a true answer to the question, "Who is Jesus?" will do well to go to those who, like Peter, have been touched by Christ, have served Him and given up all for Him . And how do such people know who He is? When a backwoods preacher was being examined by the conference committee he was asked how he could prove the Deity of Christ. "Why, bless your soul, by brother, He saved me!"

A blessed promise. After blessing Peter for this heaven-inspired testimony, the Lord said, "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock will I build my church; and the gates of hell (hades) shall not prevail against it." (1) The Builder and the building. The Lord foretells the organization of a spiritual society that shall perpetuate Peter's inspired testimony. (2) The foundation. Roman Catholics contend that Peter is the rock-foundation of the church. But we prefer the explanation given by Peter himself. See 1 Peter $2: 4,5$. The foundation of the church is the truth that Jesus is the Messiah and the Son of God. (3) The opposition. As Satan withstood Christ, so he, the leader of the invisible powers of darkness ("gates of hell"), will oppose the church. His business has been, and still is, to destroy God's work. (4) The victory. "Shall not prevail." Do we desire a miracle proving the divine nature of the church? Then study church history, and see what God has done in spite of the devil, and in spite of the miserable weaknesses and failures of the professing church! (5) The ministry. "I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven." At his graduation the Jewish scribe or rabbi received a key, symbol of his knowledge of God's law. Therefore by "keys" Christ referred to those truths that bring salvation to men. Every Christian should have two keys-an experimental knowledge of Christ and a doctrinal knowledge of the way of salvation. The powers of "binding" and "loosing" refer to disciplinary authority given to church leaders. After confessing a natural reluctance to deal with cases of discipline, the godly M'Cheyne said: "I now feel persuaded that two keys are committed to us by Christ-the one the key of doctrine, by means of which we unlock the treasures of the Bible: the other the key of discipline by which we open or shut the way to the sealing ordinances of the faith."-Baptism and Communion.

## III. THE SUFFERING CHRIST.

 Matt. 16:21-23.Peter rebukes Christ. Having prepared the way by the inspiring of the apostle's faith, the Lord for the first time plainly told them that He must suffer humiliation and death. Peter, emboldened, and probably puffed up, by his revelation and blessing, became over-familiar with the Lord, took Him aside and presumptuously intimated that His teacher was wrong. "Be it far from thee, Lord: this shall not be unto thee." (There was quite a little of the "Not so, Lord," in Peter! John 13:8; Acts $10: 14$ ). In Peter's rebuke there was a mingling of love, pride, presumption, selfishness and ignorance. And Satan attempted to use it in order to hinder Christ. After spiritual exaltation, be viligilant! Satan will strive to kick our feet from under us even while our heads are uplifted in rapture.

Christ rebukes Peter. "Get thee behind me, Satan." Behind Peter's attitude the Lord discerned the spirit of the Enemy who more than once had attempted to put a stumbling-block in His way. Let us learn from His rebuke, that any influence which would turn us from the plain path of duty, is not of God, and must be uncompromisingly resisted.

## IV. THE CHALLENGING CHRIST. <br> Matt. 16:16-26.

A sterns duty. Peter had just suggested that the Lord take the easy way to glory. To counteract these words the Lord Jesus taught that, not only for Himself, but also for His disciples, the way of the crown is the way of the cross. Real Christianity will never be popular, for in an age that loves ease and comfort, selfdenial and self-sacrifice are not popular. But while the man of the world may reject a religion of exacting demands, in his heart he will not respect an easy, spineless, sickly-sweet faith that presents no stern challenge.

A worth-while reward. The Lord does not advocate self-denial and cross-bearing in order to make life miserable for us, but in order to lead us to a higher life. It pays to take this way, for: (1) Loss for Christ's sake is gain. Show me a person who is forever occupied with self, and I will show you a miserable person; show me a person who forgets himself and loses himself in God's cause, and I will show you a happy person. A selfish person cannot be a truly great person, for "the man who is all wrapped up in himself makes a very small package!" (2) The eternal life of the soul is the supreme value. Said a small boy, "Father, is your soul insured? I heard Uncle George say that you had your house insured, and your life insured; but he did not believe that you thought about your soul. Won't you get it insured right away ?" Soulinsurance is vitally important, for "what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"-Myer Pearlman.

MISSIONARY SUFFERS SERIOUS ACCIDENT


We have recently recieved word from Miss Katherine Cooke, one of our missionaries in India, telling of the terrible accident that befell her, and which, had it not been for the protecting care of the Lord, might have been fatal. Miss Cooke is now recovering after a long period of suffering but her condition is still such that she is in need of much prayer. She is trusting God to complete the healing and restore her strength and health, and asks that her many friends in the homeland pray earnestly.

The accident occurred when our sister was getting into a tonga (native cart). The horse for some reason became frightened and ran away. Miss Cooke states that her foot got caught in the vehicle and she was dragged for some distance face downwards on the stony road. It is unnecessary to relate that she suffered unspeakable agony and when the horse was at last stopped by some men our sister was almost unconscious. For many days after she lay on her back in intense suffering, but God has graciously answered the prayers of her many friends so that she is once more able to get around. Nevertheless she needs our prayers for a complete recovery. Miss Cooke since her return to India this last time has ministered at the Girls' School in Bettiah and also has helped Miss Flint in the Bible school at Unao. She is a very efficient missionary and we trust she may very soon be in full active service once again.

## VILLAGE WORK IN INDIA

Brother and Sister McClay give us a little glimpse into their work in the village near Ranchi. They write: "Yesterday we went to some villages where a missionary had never been before. When the people saw us coming they ran and hid, trembling with fear, never having had a missionary visit them before, and not knowing why we had come. We managed to detain two or three women but even they were so frightened they urged us to go on to the next village and not bother them.
"We sat down on a broken mud wall and told them we had come to tell them about the Saviour and that they should call the whole village to come out to hear. When they saw that we did not intend to move on just then and also that we were not going to harm them, they called the people to come out. We began to sing and jingle a tambourine and in a short time quite a crowd gathered.
"They listened very attentively and many had tears in their eyes as we told them about Jesus' suffering that they might be saved. There was only one man who could read so we left a gospel with him to read to the others. Many

## A SACRIFICED LIFE BRINGS FORTH FRUIT W. R. Williamson

Some years ago when the Spirit first began to fall in the United States a young man heard the call to the regions beyond and came to South China to preach the gospel. At that time he was not very popular nor well known, but the good seed which he planted at that time is now bearing fruit and perhaps he is now looking over the portals of heaven rejoicing in the sight he beholds.

He came to this great city of Canton, rented a hall and preached the gospel. It was here where an obscure person called Yau Cheung Yan heard the gospel and decided to cast in his lot with the despised foreigner and to follow the lowly Nazarene. The lone missionary going one day into the country to sell Gospels, was shot by some irresponsible soldiers and his body was later found in a shallow grave. The
 fact that this missionary laid down his life for the gospel made a lasting impression on Yau Cheung Yan and remembering at what cost the gospel had been given to him, he had a vision of a church in Canton where many more might have the gospel.

Now on one of the main thoroughfares of Canton there stands a beautiful church to the praise of the great name of Jesus Christ. Three times each day-at 7:00 A. M., at 12:00 noon, and at 7:00 P. M. the joyful sound goes forth from the large bell in the steeple and several hundred people gather for worship and to hear God's Word. Who can deny that the gospel seed sown years ago and that life laid down for the gospel is bringing forth hundredfold fruit now? Do missions pay? Eternity alone will tell how well.

As the people gather in there are the old, the poor, and the blind, coming together to worship the Lord. What a praise it brought to our hearts as we realized that in many beautiful churches in other places only the famed, the rich, and well-dressed are allowed.

Night after night during the special meetings with Brother Yeung from Peking hungry hearts came to hear the message and when the altar call was given there was ready response and many seeking ones found the Lord.

Tonight while on my way to the meeting I spoke to a mother who was on her way to the meeting with her entire family. In the course of the conversation I learned that she was saved seven years ago in the Hoh District for which we had been so burdened that the gospel might be taken there as at that time there was no one to give them the message of salvation. Many times we agonized in prayer for those people over there and who knows but what she was born again because we travailed in prayer.

God answers prayer! So keep on praying. We may not meet

In this condition they took him home to die.

One Sunday night our pastor went to pray for him, and the Lord gave witness that the child was healed, though as yet he could not walk.

## THE COMMON BOND

A Chinese Christian who was a sugar merchant was called from home in Swatow to Shanghai on business. The cities are not far apart, but in language are so entirely different that a native of either cannot understand a word of the other's tongue. When the man returned, he was called to pay his respects to a lady missionary, who asked him: "Is the church in Shanghai doing well? And did you see any

Christians?" "Well, teacheress," said he, "after I had finished my business, I looked around and discovered a building which I thought was a Christian church. I opened the door, and found that it was all still, and only one man was sitting there. When he saw me, he shook hands arid seemed glad to see me, and began to talk in the Shanghai language. I could understand nothing he said except the name Jaso (Jesus). When he said that, I knew he was a Christian, so I answered him in the Swatow language, and when he heard me say Jaso, he knew that I was a Christian. So we sat down and talked together for an hour and the only word we knew was Jaso, but we had a beautiful time together; for that was all we needed." A. B. Simpson wrote:
"Jesus only is our message, Jesus all our theme shall be; We will lift up Jesus only, Jesus only will we see. "And for Jesus we are waiting, Listening for the Advent call; But it will still be Jesus only, Jesus ever, all in all."
