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Russia and Armageddon

S Russia anywhere mentioned in the Word of God? Yes, it is very distinctly a subject of divine prophecy. In Ezekiel 38 and 39 we find something concerning Russia, "Son of man, set thy face against Gog, of the land of Magog, the prince of Rosh, Meshech and Tubal, and prophesy against him, and say, Thus saith the Lord Jehovah; Behold, I am against thee, O Gog, prince of Rosh, Meshech and Tubal." Ezek. 38:2, 3, R. V. Rosh was the name of a tribe of Cythians dwelling in South Russia in the Middle Ages whose name has been given to the whole land and people of Russia.

Let us note one thing in these verses: "Thus saith the Lord God; Behold, I am against thee." Here we find God is against Russia, and it is quite noticeable that Russia more than any other nation on the earth today is against God.

"And I will turn thee back." Verse 4. L. J. Dillon has written a book entitled, "The Eclipse of Russia." Russia suffered terribly during the World War in the loss of population, losing millions of men in battle, millions by famine and pestilence, and later by the official work of the Reds. Some years ago they reported that they had executed 1,800,000 of their people. They apparently want to get rid of those who might become leaders of a revolution against them. Since that time it is estimated that the number executed has increased to at least 3,000,000. I have seen the statement that some 20,000,000 of Russia have been executed. What is that to men of the stamp of those who rule Russia today? Lenin said, "If world revolution requires a sacrifice of nine out of every ten Russians, let it go on." That would mean out of 160,000,000 people a loss of 144,000,-

000. I think God will interpose before that takes place. But you can see the little value placed on human life by the present rulers of Russia.

Russia will not always remain in her present backward condition. She has already regained very much that she had lost through the break up of her transportation system, the dislocation of her manufactures and commerce. They have had one five-year plan and are in the midst of another by which they propose to restore Russia's power, develop her re-

sources, and prepare her for her future destiny as they design it.

When the War broke out the territory of Russia covered more than 8,600,000 square miles. The forests alone of Russia would cover all the United States. Imagine the potential wealth in those forests. Think of her coal mines, her iron ore. Russia produces nearly every mineral known to man. What a territory! What resources! What potential wealth in that great nation! Now such a nation cannot remain in isolation. Russia needs the world and the world needs Russia.


But with all her vast coast line Russia has no warm-water seaport. Most of her ports freeze over from three to nine months of the year. Her statesmen ex-tended her territories eastward to the Pacific, hoping to find there a warm-water port. They found one on the Yellow Sea, but Japan beat her back. She wants Constantinople. She fought her first war with Constantinople more than a thousand years ago. Peter the Great, over two hundred years ago, left to the Russian statesmen and people his will in which he outlined how they should first take control of all Europe and then of all Asia, and finally of the whole world. Possibly you see here the underlying purpose in the call for world revolution. It may give them a chance to step in and take control. You can see from all this how the world must reckon with Russia in the future.

"And I will bring thee forth, and all thine army, horses, and horsemen, all of them clothed with all sorts of armor." When Trotski was head of the Russian army he declared that Russia should have the strongest army in the world. Some military experts today believe that she

The Revealed Ways of God

In Psalm 25:4 we read, "Shew me thy ways, O Lord; teach me thy paths." With this scripture in mind, let us recall continually that the Pentecostal awakening of this generation has always maintained as one of its chief slogans, the phrase, "Back to the Bible." Only as Christianity today returns to its apostolic power and influence can it retain any degree of significance. Formalism on every side warns us that decay and death await twentieth-century Protestantism unless we seek His ways and His paths.

One must be fully convinced after perusing church history that man in the Christian faith degenerates spiritually as easily as did Israel under the Sinaitic covenants. How easily we depart from the simplicity which is in Christ Jesus. Rarely do we read in history or find in contemporary pulpits the purity and unadulterated preaching of the founders of our faith. How little of the zeal of Stephen, Peter, or Philip arises to warn and woo us back to Him whom we so easily forget "days without number."

Did not Jesus Himself rebuke the religious teachers of His day for modifying the laws of Sinai and the strength of Jehovah's written law? The apparent devotion and sacrifice of Judaism was not worship to Him, because the people taught "for doctrines the commandments of men." Of all that seems to be vigorous in the message and ministry of Jesus of Nazareth, nothing is more forceful than His violent denunciations of those who had refused to enter into the truth and had kept others from doing the same. Is it not significant that a religious city, holding the testimony of the law and the prophets, would have to be told of the birth of the "dayspring from on high" by the coming of three men from afar, both geographically and spiritually? Would the "man of sorrows" be one with the present-day Church in its worldly, self-satisfied religion?

Where do we find God's authority for such things as infant baptism or the worship of saints? Did He say that His church is His kingdom on earth, as many would have us to believe? Where shall we base the widespread Protestant notion that would teach us that the Baptism in the Holy Spirit is taken by faith at conversion or immersion? Did Jesus declare that hell is real? Modern theology has attempted to progress beyond such barbarous (?) tenets. A "second chance"

may entice some sympathy from the "Lots" in the Church, but it is not enunciated by the "Stranger from Galilee." Show us by book, chapter and verse the foundation for universal salvation, the devil's restitution, free-and-easy divorce and remarriage, and many other doctrines commonly written today. Will our Pentecostal people "fall for" doctrines of devils? 1 Tim. 4:1-3.

We know that our Father has revealed His ways in the indestructible and eternal Word. There we discover the unveiled Deity. Is it any wonder that our adversary should attempt to lead us from the truth or to be wise above what is written?

To find His ways we should constantly refer to His Word. He is there Himself. We may see His work in trees, flowers, birds, or even in the face of a dear friend, but the Lord is in the Truth; even more, He is the Truth. "The Word was God." The Logos is unchanged. 'Tis wonderful to read the letter from Home, to follow its directions and obtain its promised rest. As we study, read, listen, and assimilate the Bible, over and over again, the Holy Spirit will reveal the Christ in many of His innumerable relationships to us and to those about us. After all, the Holy Ghost Himself, is the one unchallengeable Bible expositor! To understand "Uncle Tom's Cabin" thoroughly one must read the "Key" writ-



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ten by the author. Here Mrs. Stowe makes difficult places plain to the reader. Let the Holy Spirit be your "key," He who "searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God."

Many are so concerned as to whether Cain married his sister, or whether Moses was antecedent to or contemporary with Job, that they pass over the great truths of the Word. Knowledge is wonderful, but it may puff us up. God desires to reveal His Son to us, in us and through us. A sinner discovers Him as Saviour. The believer may find Him as Defender, High Priestly Intercessor, Healer, Vindicator, Sanctifier, the daily Victor and the Bridegroom. Then, too, Jesus would shine through us as a light to a "crooked and perverse generation." God help us to be alive and progressive in His revealed

To make this perfectly clear, that is, our searching for His ways, let us take an example. Recently it has become quite popular for many Protestant denominations to teach and preach considerably about the Holy Spirit, hoping thereby to receive some semblance of Pentecostal power. Now, many to whom I have spoken have heard this teaching and are earnestly desiring the enduement. But their leaders distinctly let it be known that there is no tongues, no manifestation, nothing "indecorous." Now, who is There is only one manner in right? which we may settle the question. Turn away from the reasonings of man and look into the Holy Word. Here we shall discover the apostolic pattern in Acts. Men of old, received the third Person in the Trinity with a visible sign, the speaking in tongues. Then, forever the matter should be settled, and we should earnestly seek, not an empty stammering, but a baptism in the Holy Ghost in God's way, and He will surely speak again through us as at Pentecost. May God help us not to steer away from those things which are signs even though they be spoken against by religious profes-

If you will read Luke 10:21 you will discover that the "wise and prudent" are not seeing the revealed ways of God; but, rather, the guileless, trusting, loving "babes," who have become such to enter the kingdom, are perceiving His paths.

And oh, what bliss awaits those who wait for the further unveilings when God reveals "His Son from heaven." We shall see His glory, His universal peace in the millennium, His lion-like judgments, and His face. Another "Remarkable Dream"

A few weeks ago an article of mine entitled, "A Remarkable Dream," appeared in the Pentecostal Evangel. It has elicited quite a bit of favorable comment, but appears to have been misunderstood by some. We know of course that the Word of God teaches that if we build upon the true foundation, Jesus Christ, we shall be saved even though the structure we erect may be likened to "wood, hay, stubble." Paul says, "If any man's work shall be burned, he shall suffer loss: but he himself shall be saved; yet so as by fire" (1 Cor. 3:15). Somebody has made the suggestion that the word "condemned" instead of "damned" should have been used in my article. The reason I used the word "damned" was because I was relating the dream just as the dreamer had related it, and that was the word he used, that being the word he had heard the minister who had died use in his dream.

The minister who had died may have been in an unsaved condition at the time of his death, and may have been lost. Or, as seems more likely, he may have used the word "damned" as the word is sometimes used in our English translation of the Greek Scriptures. It does not always mean condemnation to hell. In Rom. 14:23 we read, "And he that doubteth is damned if he eat, because he eateth not of faith: for whatsoever is not of faith is sin." The word rendered "damned" is katakrino. In the Revised Version it is rendered "condemned." It may be interesting to our readers to learn that in Latin the word damnum means "loss, harm, fine, penalty," and that from this root we get our word damage. The minister when he said, "It is only one hour since I died, and now I am damned," may have meant that, having sought his own glory rather than the glory of the Lord and having been more interested in his own welfare in accumulating to himself the applause of men than in the welfare of the people to whom he had been commissioned to preach the Word, he had opened his eyes in eternity to make the sad discovery that his ministry had, so far as securing for himself a reward was concerned, been a dismal failure, and that he was now suffering damage as a result of that failure.

One thing is certain, and that is that we are safe only when we are seeking the glory of God and endeavoring to do and be what God would have us do and be.

The dream concerning which I wrote

was the dream of a minister. The dream concerning which I now write was the dream of an unsaved sinner. God warns ministers to be faithful, and He warns sinners to repent and turn unto God. The minister may not have been barred out of heaven, but certainly this sinner concerning whom I now write must have been consigned to the depths of hell or put into that place of punishment from which he will utimately be taken and sentenced to the lake that burneth with fire and brimstone.

He was a young man, a member of the congregation of Pastor G. Tennent of New Jersey. He was a carpenter who

In his diary entries like this are found: "Today I have been enabled to offer what I call the prayer of faith for the outpouring of the Spirit on —— church, and I trust God there will soon be a revival there."

Many answers to his prayers came during his lifetime, and after his death one place after another, at home and in various mission fields, were visited with revivals in the exact order noted in his diary.

became addicted to strong drink and who was on his way to a drunkard's grave. He had been remonstrated with, but all remonstrances had proven to be in vain; he went on from bad to worse. One night he dreamed he returned home in an intoxicated condition, and, after having climbed the stairs, fell from the top to the bottom, broke his neck, and opened his eyes in hell. Horrified at what he saw and heard, he besought the governor of the place for permission to depart. "No, said the governor, "there is no discharge from this place; you see thousands coming in, but none going out." The young man, however, in his dream. continued his entreaties, and he was at last told that on one condition he would be allowed to take his departure, and that condition was that he agree to return at the end of one year. Anxious to get away as quickly as possible he agreed to the terms, and was told that he might go. He began to flee, and the excitement woke him. He was greatly alarmed by the dream, and the next day he called on his pastor, Mr. Tennent, and told him of the dream. His pastor told him that it was a mercy that he was out of hell and urged him to reform lest he go there. The young man said he would do so; he forsook his old companions, he gave up the intoxicating cup, and for several months lived quite an exemplary life, attending the services faithfully and indicating by his conduct that a real transformation had taken place in his life.

About six months later the young man met some of his old companions, and they urged him to drink. He yielded to the temptation, and he was soon as bad off as ever. All efforts to get him back to the house of God failed; all of his evenings he spent at the saloon; much of the time he was drunk. One evening he returned to his home in an intoxicated condition, climbed to the top of the stairs, lost his balance, fell to the bottom, and broke his neck, and his spirit was doubtless hurried into that place that Dante saw in his dream, and over the entrance to which he tells us he saw inscribed, "All hope abandon, ye who enter here." God says, "No drunkard shall inherit the kingdom of God."

Mr. Tennent had made a record in his diary at the time of the dream, and when the news came of what had happened he turned to his diary and made the amazing discovery that just one year had passed since the young man had come to him and had told him of what he had dreamed the preceding night.

God says that "he that, being often reproved, hardeneth his neck, shall suddenly be destroyed, and that without remedy." The Spirit of God will not strive forever with souls that are stubborn and impenitent.



Rejoicing in the Lord

In his book "With Christ in Soviet Russia," Vladimir Martzinkovski tells of the grace that was given to a number of Russian believers who received long terms of imprisonment. He refers to one of his Moscow friends who was sentenced to imprisonment in the terrible Solovyetski Monastery on an island in the White Sea not far from the Arctic Ocean, which is used as a Soviet prison: "When he was brought from the prison to the railway station in Moscow, from which he was to be sent off, he was denied even the privilege of saying good by to his friends. Seeing some of them from a distance, as he stood upon the platform, he shouted from behind the gleaming bayonets of the guards just one word, 'Rejoice!' But how much of our present day 'Russian gospel' is expressed in that word—the gospel that rings forth to God in hymns in prisons and places of exile."

"With Joy"

"After about eight months this man was released from the Monastery-prison. It was during the time of the autumn ice drift in the White Sea, and the released prisoners were sent off in an old and leaky vessel. For three weeks they ploughed through the ice floes, hanging between life and death. My friend finally reached Leningrad and from there he wrote me: 'I have lost my chances of a career, my health, and the right to live in Moscow. But to me there is left the faith expressed in the words of Paul, "None of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy." 'Such is the faith of Christ confessors in our times."

Profitable Praise

Another Moscow friend who was sentenced to imprisonment in this same Solovyetski prison, and who later was sent for ten years to the farthest district of Siberia's dark forests, wrote: "The Lord is near . . . we are glad not only to suffer but to die for Christ." This man had been quite a singer, but he wrote, "I now sing my hymns here in the wild forest only for Christ-and only the birds listen." But just as the praises of Paul and Silas at midnight were most profitable, bringing about an awakening in the jail at Philippi, so the praiseful attitude of these suffering saints in Siberia has a like result. Among the native population of Siberia, many of them Mohammedans, "Christian communities are being formed, thus the story related in Acts 8 is being repeated. 'At that time there was a great persecution against the church which was at Jerusalem . . . therefore they that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the Word.'"

"In the Garden of Eden"

Another saint in central Russia wrote of the joy of God given to him in his sufferings. Speaking of the time he spent in prison, he says: "I assure you that in my heart it was as though I were living in the garden of Eden, and eating the fruits of Paradise. Scarcely a single night passed when I did not rise from my bed and thank God. And what was that which moved me to praise Him? Why, the consciousness of His wonderful presence. The tears flowed from my eyes from this great and unspeakable joy. Then sleep flees from me, and the only thing for me to do is to get up on my knees and praise God for His faithful and unfailing presence with us. When one enjoys fellowship with God, life is sweet anywhere-in the poorest hovel, yea, even in prison. But without God life even in a palace has no meaning and holds no joy. We see how Saul in his royal palace found no peace nor rest after God's Spirit left him and the evil spirit seized him. And so we desire to remain in communion with the Lord and enjoy His presence with us.'

Israel's Praise

When the children of Israel went up to their feasts three times each year, they would sing that special portion of the Psalter (Psalms 113-118) known as the Hallel (hallel is the Hebrew for praise). A Jewish writer says, "The Hallel was turned by the worshipping throng of Levites and Israelites in the temple courts into one continuous Hallelujah. manner in which it was used on those joyous occasions was responsive. custom was for the people to repeat the whole of the line of these Psalms after the Levites, and then to respond with 'Hallelujah' after each of the subsequent lines. Thus the Levites would begin with the word 'Hallelujah' which formed the first line in the Hebrew, and the people would respond, 'Hallelujah.' Then the Levites would chant, 'Praise ye, servants of Jehovah,' and the people would respond, 'Hallelujah.' The Levites would continue, 'Praise the name of Jehovah,' and the people would respond 'Hallelujah,' and so on through the series.'

Rest and Refreshing

Further, "These feasts of Jehovah were, in the first instance, seasons of rest. In Exodus 12:16 we read that 'no manner of work' was to be done in them, which, in Lev. 23:7, is explained as 'no servile' (or slavish) work, nothing implying hard toil, bondage, or degradation. That did not imply idleness or inactivity. No. God's demand from Pharaoh was 'Let my people go that they may serve me.' Ex. 8:1. And on their weekly Sabbaths and annual feasts they were to be set free from their ordinary occupations and engagements so as to have leisure for God, and attend to His worship and His service. This blessedness is to be ours now all our life. 'Come unto Me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest'; but not that we may henceforth be at leisure to please ourselves. No, 'Take my yoke upon you, and learn of Me for I am meek and lowly in heart, and ye shall find rest unto your souls.' He frees us from the bondage of sin and care and gives us rest from our evil dispositions that we may attain to the highest rest of fellowship with Him in suffering and service."

Strength in Joy

In the days of Nehemiah the people assembled to hear the Word read and explained. They wept at the hearing of the law, but Nehemiah told them not to mourn, "neither be sorry, for the joy of the Lord is your strength." Said Mrs. Carrie Judd Montgomery to the writer: "That is a great secret. The Lord shows me that I must be continually filled with His joy if I am to continue to have His strength. If at any time I am not full of joy I go to Him immediately and say, 'Lord, I trust Thy precious blood to remove at this moment anything that is hindering the joy of the Lord within'; and with upspringing joy comes returning strength." We see, however, from the life of David that there is one thing which hinders joy-and that is sin. With the coming of sin the joy note dropped out of David's life. In that prayer of repentance given us in Psalm 51, he cried, "Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation." The effect of the restoration of the joy he had lost he knew would be, "sinners shall be converted unto Thee." The best recommendation of the gospel is a saint overflowing with the joy of the Lord. When sinners see a joyous saint they are inclined to say, "I want to sample the salvation that makes you so happy."

The Joy Recipe

Gypsy Smith tells of the first time he heard that song, "Count your blessings." It was sung by a company of blind children in South Africa! Afflictions may come, tests and trials, but the apostle

Paul shows us that even when we are sorrowful we can be "always rejoicing." The best recipe for joy I know of is in feeding on the precious words of the Master. In giving those gracious words which we find in John, chapters 14-16, He said, "These things have I spoken unto you, that my joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full." John later wrote, "These things write we unto you, that your joy might be full." I John 1:4. This was evidently Paul's experience. He wrote, "I am exceeding joyful in all our tribulation." 2 Cor. 7:4.

Abundant Benefits

In 1 Cor. 10:11 we have this solemn warning, "Neither murmur ye, as some of them also murmured, and were destroyed of the destroyer." In encouraging himself to praise rather than to murmur, David calls on his soul, "Forget not all His benefits." Let us early every morning take stock of all the benefits with which He daily loads us, and then let us send up our heartfelt praises and

thanksgiving to God for them. And the greatest benefit, the sum of all benefits, is God's gift of His beloved Son. Paul did not exhort us to rejoice in the material benefits bestowed (yet for all these, abundant thanks are due to our God, for they all come from His lavish hand), but to rejoice in the Lord Himself. He it is who is altogether lovely! He is our delightsome Canaan land of rest, filled with all the things we need for time and eternity. He is the Passover Lamb sacrificed for us, so that we need never fear the avenger. He is the Rock from which the Pentecostal rivers flow. He is the Saviour whose wondrous atonement at Calvary has purchased for us eternal life. Let us be glad and rejoice in Him, ever giving heed to the Psalmist's exhortation, "Let all those that put their trust in thee rejoice: let them ever shout for joy, because thou defendest them: let them also that love thy name be joyful in thee. For thou, Lord, wilt bless the righteous; with favor wilt thou compass him as with a shield." Psalm 5:11, 12.

The idea of the universality of Rome, says an Italian deputy must be based on two forces: religious power and civil power. "Fascism is the hope of the world," said Mussolini. The prophecy of Rev. 13 and its fulfillment in world-conditions are rapidly converging.

Lord Rothermere, editor of the London Daily Mail, the paper that boasts the largest circulation in the world, has become an advocate of Fascism. Comments one writer on Fascism in general: "The peace movement is definitely in eclipse. Fascism prances merrily on, like some fantastic centaur, half human and half beast, sending sparks across a world piled high with tinder."

The Coming Dictator

Rev. 13 is so near fulfillment that even newspapers glimpse the fact. "Democracy Rules No Longer" is the title of an article in the Los Angeles Examiner. Says the article: "It takes a long time time for the world to learn that it has changed, that men in millions, science with its new power, the entire gigantic wealth of whole nations, are subject to the will of the one self-appointed 'superman,' the dictator who 'wills it.'"

Jews on Farms

The Alliance Weekly declares: "The Jewish Agricultural Society reports 109,600 Jews on American farms as against 216 farm families in 1900. This society, during 1933, loaned to Jewish farmers in twenty states nearly half a million dollars. It has also obtained farm employment for nearly 18,000 Jewish young men since its establishment twenty-five years ago. One hundred and forty-five were placed last year as against a yearly average up to 1930 of 792."

Protest

According to a despatch from Berlin, 600 German pastors and laymen are determined to stand together in their opposition in refusing obedience to Hitler's Nazi bishop. They declared that the swastika emblem had nothing in common with the cross of Jesus, and that worshiping the god of Nazi "world philosophy" was plain idolatry. Thank God that there is still some "protest" left in Protestantism!

Whither America?

Congressman Hatch of Missouri is reported to have made the following statement before Congress: "Mark what I say! If the inexorable law of cause and effect has not been expunged from the statute book of the Almighty, unless a halt is called very soon, you may expect to see the horrors of the French Revolution put on the American stage, with all the modern improvements, and within the next decade."

Like individuals, nations reap what they sow. The only way our land can avoid reaping the harvest of lawlessness and ungodliness is by sowing repentance.

Mexico Bars Bible Broadcasts

The Mexican Radio Commission first demanded that all singing be eliminated from his program, and he complied. Then they demanded that all evangelistic appeals be eliminated, and he complied. Then they demanded that he eliminate all references to God and religion. They say they will not tolerate such in any station under their control.

It would certainly appear as if the prince of the power of the air has this Radio Commission under his control.

The Image Craze

A Miracle of Healing

"Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases." Thank God for this Word! It has become marvelously true in my life. What hope, what joy the message of salvation and healing brought to my darkened heart in the hour of pain and suffering! To God be all the praise for all that He has wrought in my life! I was born with all the organs in my body out of place. My heart, as well as being out of place, was too small. The X-ray showed that the stomach was several inches lower than it should have been. The intestines were a tangled mass. I was born with the diaphragm too low, and when an operation was performed to put the stomach in its proper position, it was found impossible to do so because of the diaphragm being too low. The doctors did their best, and had the operation been successful my condition would have been much relieved, but it was a failure, and in a short time my stomach fell again, and this time it twisted.

I had a severe case of adhesions following an operation for appendicitis. I had an operation to break down the adhesions, but they formed again and were worse than in the first place.

Owing to the stomach being out of place and twisted, and the intestines being a tangled mass, proper and natural elimination of the bowel contents was at times almost an impossibility. I would have attacks of suffering and pain from this cause, sometimes once or twice a year, sometimes oftener, when, for weeks at a time, natural elimination could not be obtained. At such times my skin would turn brown in hue; and when I would drop into a fitful sleep, a brown fluid oozed constantly from between my lips. The X-ray showed that the food lay in my stomach before passing into the intestines, anywhere up to forty-eight hours.

In all, I was under the X-ray some twenty times, had thirty doctors in actual attendance upon me, and had a number of operations, both major and minor.

When I was still just a child my eyesight failed, and I had to wear very thick glasses. I was told that I would eventually become totally blind. During the last year or two before my healing, a film formed over both my eyes, dimming and glazing them.

Nor was this all my trouble, for I also had tuberculosis of the bones of the right limb; the hip joint being first affected. My limb twisted till the toes of that foot

pointed in toward the center of the left foot. I lay in bed for seventeen long weary months, taking treatment for the disease. I had a twelve-pound weight attached to my foot for three months, and then the weight was increased to fifteen pounds for three more months. At the end of the six months I was placed in a plaster of Paris cast from the waist to below the knee. Finally doctors pronounced the disease quiescent. I was considerably better than before the treatment, but my limb never became entirely straight, and I had to wear a shoe with an extra thick sole on that foot. Shortly before my healing, the disease was again active, and I suffered a great deal.

Also, owing to a bruise, trouble had broken out in the same limb just above the ankle. For this I had an unsuccessful operation, and the limb was placed in a cast from the knee right round the foot. My limb would swell until it was half as big again as the other.

In 1918 when the Influenza swept the world, I was stricken with the disease, and also had pleurisy. A few months later it was found that I had developed tuberculosis in both lungs. I already had trouble in my throat. For sometime before my healing my voice was seriously affected. Even the nails of my fingers and toes were affected with the disease, especially the toes of the right foot. No sooner would a new nail begin to grow than it would begin to decay at the roots, and pus oozed out around the roots almost constantly.

I spent the greater part of several years in bed at home or in hospitals. Life was dark and hard. As a child I knew the Lord, but later drifted away from Him. Unbelief took hold of me. I wondered if there was a God, did He care for all the suffering and misery in the world! The day came when I found He cared. I learned that Jesus had indeed borne my iniquities and diseases. Praise His name!

Just in the darkest hour, when hope was gone, Dr. C. S. Price came to the city of Edmonton, Canada, where we were then living. I was prayed for one night during the first week of the campaign.

I knew positively that I would be healed that night. I had surrendered completely to the Lord, and had received the earnest of my healing that very morning while at prayer—the film had instantly and entirely left my eyes in the moment when I fully yielded to God.

When I arose to my feet after Brother

Price had prayed for me I found first of all that the swelling was gone from my limb. All stiffness of the joints was gone and my leg was perfectly straight. The fever had left me, and I had no desire to cough. How happy I was!

I went home on the street car. Everyone was singing the campaign songs, but I was not singing at all—I had something else to do; I was reading the advertisements in the street car! How wonderful it was to be able to do it!

I still had pain in my stomach and abdomen; and while I wondered at it, I was not troubled nor worried. I knew all would be well.

I arrived home and went to my bed and the pain still continued. About an hour later the power of the Lord again came upon me. The pain by this time seemed almost more than I could endure—and then there came another pain, different from any I had ever had before. It was a burning pain, and as it flashed through my body from one side to the other, my stomach and abdomen heaved upward, something inside me snapped and loosened and I felt every organ go to its place in my body. That was the last of the pain. I was healed! Praise God!

Will it last? The question was asked on all sides. All this took place over ten years ago, and it's still good, praise the Lord!

Jesus proved that He is still the "same yesterday, today and forever" in my life. He forgave my many iniquities and healed my many diseases, all glory to His precious name! I proved His word and found it absolutely true. And best of all, that which He has done for me He is able and willing to do for all who read this testimony of His power to save and heal!—Ethel M. Russia and Armageddon

has now. They are training millions upon millions, even tens of thousands of women are being trained for future warfare for the service of the state in one way or another. Russia is getting ready for an important future. But she will not be alone as the Word declares in verses 5 and 6. She will have her allies, "Persia, Ethiopia, and Libya with them."

Then we have "Gomer, and all his bands; the house of Togarmah of the north quarters, and all his bands: and many people with thee." Who is Gomer? In Genesis 10 there is the registry of the nations. Noah had three sons, Ham, Shem, and Japheth. Japheth's sons were Gomer, Magog, and so on. And Gomer's sons were Ashkenaz, Riphath, and Togarmah. Now Riphath is believed by Bible scholars to point out a land in Southern Europe known as Roumania. Togarmah has the same root as Armenia, point-

ing out a land directly northward from Palestine, Asia Minor and Turkey. In the future Turkey will be an ally of Russia. She belongs to the Roman empire at the first but does not remain in that position judging from this prophecy and from historical indications.

But who is that other son of Gomer, Ashkenaz? Since the Middle Ages the Jews have called Germany the land of Ashkenaz. When a Jew today speaks in modern Hebrew he does not say Germany, but Ashkenaz. In Germany, Jews have been known for several hundred years as the Ashkenazim. And this agrees with this verse. Russia doesn't like the present form of government of Germany, but that doesn't matter when it comes to the Word of God. Hitler and his gang may soon be brushed aside, and Russia and Germany will come together in alliance.

From verse 8 we have a description of an invasion of a certain land. "After many days thou shalt be visited: in the latter years thou shalt come into the land that is brought back from the sword." The expression "many days" is a technical one found frequently in the prophets and is applied to the times of the Gentiles of which our Lord spoke. We are now toward the end of these "many days." "In the latter years thou shalt come forth." We are in the latter years of the times of the Gentiles and of the Christian dispensation so that the time draws very near when this chapter with all that it means shall be carried into full realization.

"After many days thou shalt be visited." What does this mean? The word "visited" has a double meaning in prophecy. In many cases the visitation is one of blessing. Twice in the gospel of Luke we have, "The Lord hath visited his peo-But the other meaning is a divine visitation of judgment, and that is the meaning here. Why does God visit Russia in judgment? Now we get the answer as to why God is against Russia. Because of her ill treatment of the Jew. Egypt was the first nation to persecute Israel; Russia will be the last. If I could tell you how Russia has dealt with her Jews during the last hundred years you would be greatly shocked. More than a million Jews have been driven out of Russia since 1880. That is why we have so many Tews in the United States. In 1880 there were fewer than 240,000 Jews here; now there are 4,700,000-more Jews than in any other land on earth. God will visit Russia for all this ill treatment of the Tews.

The monarchists driven out of Russia by the Revolutionists and the Soviets, run into perhaps 900,000 of the better class of Russians who left the land and are scattered over Europe and the world. The monarchists say, "When we go back we will kill every Jew in Russia." Just

like Hitler! A recent writer has said, "The world may soon see a blood bath in Europe the like of which has seldom been known on earth." God will not permit the monarchists or any others to slay all the Jews, however. His eye is upon them. But what a bloody future is ahead of the Jews of Europe!

Let us note further. "In the latter years thou shalt come into the land that is brought back from the sword." What land has been under the sword? Has any land been delivered from the sword in our time? Yes, Palestine has been under the sword of the Moslems for 1200 years. But that land was delivered by General Allenby in 1917.

"Thou shalt come into the land that is brought back from the sword, and is gathered out of many people." Jews are going back to Palestine from all over the world. In a recent year they went back from forty-two countries. Last year between 35,000 and 36,000 returned to Palestine, the largest number since the days of Ezra and Nehemiah. The Jews are on the march, something is doing among them, and Russia will have her eye on that land.

"Against the mountains of Israel." Now the land is distinctly mentioned so there can be no possibility of a mistake. The manner of this invasion is given in verse 9, "Thou shalt ascend, and come like a storm, thou shalt be like a cloud to cover the land, thou, and all thy bands, and many people with thee." And down in verse 16 we have "Thou shalt come up against my people of Israel, as a cloud to cover the land." We find the same thing in Daniel. Why? In 1923 a statement was issued from Paris showing the advance at that time in the art and science of aviation. The statement was that a man could stand at a given point in France and merely by touching a button send forth a whole fleet of airplanes loaded with bombs, not a man in them, and he could direct them to any point he desired, and merely by touching that butten again drop the bombs on any place within two hundred miles. Now there are thousands of men the world around who are studying the building of better airplanes, larger, more powerful, able to carry men and munitions. In a half a dozen or a dozen years more (I don't think it will be a dozen years), some fine morning the inhabitants of Jerusalem will see a great cloud-in a few minutes the cloud will develop a great cloud of airplanes landing tens of thousands of men on the soil of Palestine. Note the expression "they shall ascend." How that describes the rising of a fleet of planes.

What is the Russian purpose in this great invasion? "It shall also come to pass, that at the same time shall things come into thy mind, and thou shalt think an evil thought: and thou shalt say, I will go up to the land of unwalled vil-

lages." In Russia and Europe the villages as well as the towns have been walled and many of them remain to this day. In Palestine the Jews are building their villages and towns without walls, a distinctive mark to the Russians. "I will go up to the land of unwalled villages; I will go to them that are at rest, that dwell safely, all of them dwelling without walls, and having neither bars nor gates." Note the purpose, "to take a spoil, and to take a prey; to turn thine hand upon the desolate places that are now inhabited, and upon the people that are gathered out of the nations, which have gotten cattle and goods, that dwell in the midst of the land."

How do the Jews get all this wealthcattle, and goods, and so on? A few years ago the British government reported that the mineral wealth in the Dead Sea was worth more than the combined wealth of the nations of the earth. For 5,000 years the Jordan and other rivers have poured into the Dead Sea, and the minerals have been washed up out of the soil. Six million tons of water pours into the Dead Sea every twenty-four hours. But the surface does not rise. It is a closed sea with no outlet. What becomes of the water? The sun evaporates the water, and the waters of the Dead Sea have become thicker and thicker until the solid amount of mineral stuff amounts to 26%. Imagine it! There are millions and millions of tons of magnesium and various nitrates, and so on, held in solution in those waters that are so priceless. Russia will set up her armies to take possession. The British government is seeking to find out the wealth of that Dead Sea. They are gathering out the salts today. They employ about four hundred men. They have great vats, basins one half mile or a mile square, and when the sun evaporates the water the great steam shovels scoop up the crystal salts and minerals and reduce them to the chemicals they desire. The nitrates are sold to the farmers of Palestine at cost price. These nitrates are mingled with the soil so as to revitalize the soil of Palestine.

Farmers from Missouri and California and elsewhere have gone over to look over the land and see the country and they have decided that God gave the Israelites a raw deal when He gave them the Promised Land. But read Deuteronomy 8 from verse 7. The Lord calls it a good land full of valuable things. Isaiah says it is to be like the Garden of Eden. There are millions of tons of phosphates. When these are ground up and mingled with the soil, Palestine will be a garden indeed. About one hundred thousand acres are capable of producing oranges. (To be Continued)

Christ and His Church

"Christ . . . loved the church, and gave Himself for it." Ephes. 5:25. He considered that the prize was worth the sacrifice. "Those that Thou gavest me have I kept," said Christ. The Father's present to Christ was the church, and Christ made it doubly His own by giving Himself in sacrifice for it. The price that Christ paid was nothing less than Himself and all His fullness on the cross. In the crown of thorns upon His head we see His mind was brought into the sacrifice. Every part of His body was brought into the sacrifice in order that every part of the church might be fully redeemed.

He loved the church and gave Himself for it. But He did not stop there. He did not leave the church redeemed but devoid of everything else. She was not like a shipwrecked man, stripped of everything, saving only his life. Christ tends, nourishes and cherishes His church.

Remember the fact that Christ is the risen and glorified Saviour who has power to carry out His full purpose of love. He was crucified in weakness but raised in power. He gave Himself for the church to perfect her for Himself. If He gave Himself, His life in all its fullness in His humanity, for the church, how precious is the fact that now in His glorified humanity and Godhead He gives Himself and all His fullness to the church. The impoverished church is the one that only sees the crucified Christ upon the The church has now a glorified Christ, in whom dwells all the fullness of the Godhead bodily. All power is given unto Him. He has received gifts for men. He has received for man the promise of the Father, the fullness of the Holy Spirit, which He desires to bestow upon His own.

He loved the church and gave Himself for it. That which cost Him so much He values accordingly, therefore He cares for, nourishes, protects, helps, maintains, and He will ultimately glorify His church. Each individual member of that purchased church has a right to the individual care and love of the Saviour who gave Himself for the whole church. Paul wrote, "Christ loved the church and gave Himself for it." He also wrote, "Who loved me, and gave Himself for me." Let there be an individual appropriation of Christ, not only as the Saviour who died on the cross, but as a Saviour who lives, loves, cares and nourishes the individual members of the church, His body.

An Ominous Outlook

The Christian Monitor quotes Morgenthau (American statesman) as say-

ing: "War in Europe is indicated by signs ominously similar to those which were clearly visible in Europe in 1913. War would have come, I think, during recent months, but for two facts: Firstthe nations wanted this year's crops in before facing the inevitable test. Second -there has been much talk of 'war guilt.' Dominant leaders wish to avoid the stigma of 'aggression.' They have sought what might be made to appear, before the eyes of the world, 'just' cause for a war of 'defense.' When that is found, and it is likely to be created, war will break with spectacular suddenness. There will be no interval permitting mediation. The 'hair-trigger' situation will not permit that.'

A dark outlook, but—"when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads, for your redemption draweth nigh."

Believers in Christ ought to be baptized in water. Nevertheless baptism is not a saving ordinance, and were one to die unbaptized who had not knowingly refused to obey the Lord, he would be saved

Shall we know one another when we get to heaven?

Jesus, said, "Many shall sit down with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven." Matt. 8:11. Paul declared, "Then shall we know even as also we are known." 1 Cor. 13:12. In the vision on the Mount of Transfiguration, a little foreglimpse of the Kingdom, the disciples clearly knew Moses and Elijah. Matt. 17:3, 4. There is no doubt about our knowing one another in heaven, and, from the lesson learned from the vision on the Mount of Transfiguration, it appears clear that we will know each other instinctively, even those we have not known before.

What does it mean where it says "Else what shall they do who are baptized for the dead?" 1 Cor. 15:29.

There was an ancient custom which evidently had crept into the church at Corinth of baptizing for the dead. This practice Paul uses as an argument against a doctrine which had been introduced among them that there was no resurrection, showing them that, if there was no resurrection, it was folly for them to wish to baptized for the dead. There is no saving virtue in baptizing for the dead and in no place in the scriptures is such a practice encouraged. Salvation cannot be obtained by proxy.—E. S. W.

God's Judgment

A revival was sweeping through an English town, and a saloon keeper was doing everything in his power to oppose it. First he sent the men who frequented his place, the worst characters in the town, but they one after the other got converted and never returned. At last driven to desperation he determined to go himself, and he did.

The evangelist had been asking God for a text, and finally God gave it. "Set thy house in order, for thou shalt die and not live."

"Why, Lord," cried the revivalist, "I can't preach on that text. I don't know a thing to say about it. Give me something else." But nothing else would come. And at last came the moment to preach. In despair the evangelist asked the congregation to sing another hymn, and while it was being sung he besought God again for a different text. But no other could he get.

Now the saloon keeper had planned to let the preacher announce his text, and then to spring up and wreck the service. The building was densely packed. White and trembling the evangelist in a solemn voice gave out his text, "Set thy house in order, for thou shalt die and not live." And no sooner had he uttered the last word than the desperado who had found a seat in the center of the auditorium sprang to his feet and let out such a volley of oaths and blasphemy that everyone was shocked beyond expression.

Suddenly he paused, a moment later a gurgle was heard in his throat. Then came a great mouthful of blood, and the next moment there was a crash as he fell heavily to the floor. The man was a corpse. God had judged him on the spot, and had used drastic means. The papers reported it. Far and wide the news was spread. Men almost feared to look the evangelist in the eyes. Conviction settled deeply, and large numbers were swept into the Kingdom.

The Sunday School Tesson

Our All for the Kingdom Lesson for April 22: Matt 19:16-30.

Our lesson deals with the problem of a young man who enquired concerning the very highest spiritual possession—eternal life. Christ's dealings with him will provide an excellent lesson on consecration and illustrate the high standard of discipleship required by Him.

I. THE QUESTION. Matt. 19:16.

"Good Master, what good thing shall I do, that I may have eternal life?" The questioner was a rich young man, prominent in society, moral in conduct, attractive in appearance, respectful and earnest in attitude, and though a young man, an elder (or ruler) in the synagogue. Notice what his question revealed:

A worthy quest. For thousands of years thinkers have pondered the question, "What is the greatest good?" or, "What shall we live for?" The question is important, because if we can discover what is the greatest thing to live for, we can seek and find it, and thus secure real happiness. The young ruler rightly concluded that eternal life was the supreme value.

A spiritual lack. The applicant was really a poor rich man. Rich men—in the sense of self-satisfied men—did not come to Christ. "The rich hath he sent empty away" (Luke 1:53)—that is, those who are full of themselves. The coming of this rich man indicates the consciousness of spiritual poverty. With all his money and attainment, he lacked life. Walking along a street with a friend, one remarked of a certain man whom he passed, "That man has nothing in the world but forty thousand dollars." Poor rich man!

A mistaken conception. Notice the error implied in the words, "What good thing shall I do?" (1) His question implied that eternal life was a commodity to be purchased by good deeds. It was like saying, "What premium must I pay in order to secure a \$10,000 life insurance policy?" But he had to learn that eternal life is a gift of God. Rom. 6:23. It is not a question of "What shall I do," but of "What shall I be?" A Divine gift of transformed character is necessary for the never ending life. Compare John 17:3. (2) His question implied that he had power to do something for the attainment of spiritual life. But his refusal to accept Christ's condition proved that he did not have that power. "Without me ye can do nothing."

II. THE ANSWER. 19:17-19.

A correction. "Why callest thou me good? there is none good but one, that is God." These words, uttered as a rebuke of the Jewish tendency to almost worship their rabbis (Matt. 23:5-14), seem like a denial of Deity on the part of Christ. But let it be noted that the young man (unacquainted with His Deity) knew and addressed Him simply as a human teacher, and used words implying that Christ, as a mere man, had been "good" enough to earn eternal life. The Lord desired to teach him that no man was good enough to earn eternal life. If you were a Christian worker, how would you reply to the following question: "Most righeous and holy evangelist, what

righteous and holy thing must I do in order to be saved?" See Acts 3:12, 13; 14:15; Rev. 22:8, 9. If Christ had been addressed as "good" by one who knew Him to be the Son of God, He would have accepted the attribute. See John 10:11.

A prescription. "If thou wilt enter into life, keep the commandments." Why did Christ send this man to the Law? (1) Because the law represented the standard or measure of conduct in those days. When dealing with Jews the Lord naturally made it the starting point. (2) To make him feel and confess his need. The young man as much as said, "All these I have always observed, yet I am not satisfied. What else must I do?" (3) To prepare the way for the deepest meaning of the law. The Lord told him to perform that which would prove his perfect love for God and man. Compare verses 19 and 21. Notice how Christ tested those who claimed to observe the law of Moses. Matt. 5:20-37.

III. THE TEST. 19:20, 21.

A high standard professed. "All these things have I kept from my youth. What lack I yet That is, the young ruler was a moral man. We must not despise morality, for, as far as it goes, it is good. Yet, it does not go far enough for man's salvation. If a person who owes us \$100 offered \$50 in full payment, we would say: "My friend, your money is good, but there is not enough of it." What then is the difference between a moral man and a true Christian? The moralist is concerned mainly about deeds; the Christian, about the condition of the heart. The first often owes his morality to careful upbringing and to a naturally pleasant disposition; the second, to a deliberate choice of God's standard even though that standard may cross his desires. The moral man often takes his standard of living from society; the Christian, from the Word of God. The first is usually self-satisfied; the Christian is continually advancing to a higher plane.

A higher standard indicated. "If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast and give to the poor." The Lord Jesus is not teaching the abandonment of wealth as a condition for eternal life. See 1 Cor. 13:3. Neither does He imply that all His disciples must sell their property and give it all to the poor. For example, Luke 8:3. But in the above words the great spiritual Physician lays His finger on that disease which is hindering the ruler from wholly following Him—the disease of covetousness. And as a spiritual surgeon He prescribes a painful operation—the amputation of the young man's riches. How little the ruler knew his own heart! Jer. 17:9.

A rich reward promised. "Thou shalt have treasure in heaven." After a dentist has drilled the decay out of a tooth, he does not leave it hollow, but fills it with gold, silver, or cement. After recommending the excision of the young man's earthly wealth, the Lord Jesus promised to fill that void with heavenly treasure. He is not a negative Saviour; if He asks us to give up something it is a sure sign that He has something better for us.

IV. THE FAILURE. 19:22.

"But when the young man heard that saying, he went away sorrowful: for he had great possessions." The truth of the matter is that great possessions had him-and he knew it. There was something he loved more than Christ. In his case, material things were the great possessions; in the case of others, their sins are the great possessions that they hug to themselves. "He went away"-tragic move! No one who deliberately goes away from Christ goes by a good way or comes to a good end. Where did he go? back to the old life? But that could not satisfy him in the first place. We know not what became of this young man, but may we not hope that like Peter he decided: "To whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life." John 6:68.

V. THE WARNING, 19:23-26.

The sad comment. "A rich man shall hardly (with difficulty) enter the kingdom of heaven." The illustration of the needle and camel was a proverbial description of that which was humanly impossible. The disciples were astonished for they had thought so much of the advantages and so little of the perils of riches that they, like many Jews, considered the rich blessed of heaven. But the Lord explained that riches constitute a spiritual peril, because men are apt to make an idol of money and trust in it, and mistake material prosperity for moral and spiritual prosperity.

The encouraging hope. When the disciples asked, "Who then can be saved?" The Lord said, "With men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible." God has power to deliver a man from money-lust. See for example, Luke 19:1-8; Acts 4:34-37. Cortes, the Spanish invader of Mexico, cynically told the wealthy Aztec chief that the Spaniards were troubled with a disease of the heart for which gold was the specific remedy. He was wrong; not gold, but God, is the remedy.

V. THE ENCOURAGEMENT. 19:27-30.

"Behold we have forsaken all, and followed thee, what shall we have?" asked Peter as he watched the retreating figure of the man who had refused to give up all. After gently warning Peter and his fellows against the spirit of self-satisfaction and selfish calculation (Study carefully verse 30 and 20:1-16) the Lord Jesus assured them that every sacrifice should be abundantly rewarded in this life and in the world to come. Loss for Christ is always gain. And, after all, how insignificant does human sacrifice appear when compared to the eternal gain! After pouring out life and strength for Christ, David Livingstone said, "I have never made a sacrifice." Said Henry Ward Beecher: "Supposing that Newton, talking with a blubbereating Nootka Sound Indian, should say, 'Come with me to England and I will educate you and make an astronomer of you;' and suppose the Indian should say, 'No, I will not; I am not going to give up this delicious blubber and comfortable wigwam of mine.' But what would he give up/compared with that which he would inherit?" At every step in the Christian life we have treasures that are infinitely greater than those which we lose.-Myer Pearlman.

FURTHER REPORTS OF INDIA QUAKE

With each mail from India for the past several weeks there has come a new description of the earthquake which rocked a large portion of North India on January 15.

Brother Boyce reports: "It would be difficult to ascertain the death toll, since Hindus throw their dead into the rivers, but from ten to twelve

thousand in North Bihar would be a conservative estimate. Men who had been in the World War said that the cities and villages looked like those in France after they had been heavily shelled, so total was the destruction. Such confusion and wreckage are hard to describe. It must be seen to be fully realized. The Hindus and Mohammedans in the affected areas, I found, take this visitation to be a judgment of God upon them for their sins, and thus they began getting more religious in their respective religions. One man told me the cause of the disaster was the killing of so many cows.

The cow, to the Hindu, is a most sacred animal and an object of worship."

American Consulate Reports

Miss Anna Helmbrecht writes: "I have the following statement from the American Consulate regarding the extent of the earthquake: 'It seems that the most affected area was in the district of Bihar. Certain parts of Bengal and the United Provinces have also suffered rather serious damage.'" Miss Helmbrecht sent some very interesting pictures which she took at Jamalpur and Monghyr, two of which appear in this issue.

Damage Light at Unao

Miss Marguerite Flint writes: "The earth-quake did little damage here aside from a crack across one arch in the dormitory. Reports continue to come to us telling of the awful condition of our poor India. This quake has taken heavy toll, indeed, leaving millions homeless, and causing unspeakable suffering. We are praying that through it all India may turn to God."

Terror Scenes, Laheria Sarai


Miss Hettie Steffen describes the event as follows: "It all happened so suddenly, lasting only about a minute and a half, but I cannot begin to tell you what occurred in that time. As the quake ceased we could hear the cries of people who were injured from falling buildings and the screams of others who were filled with fear. Hundreds were buried alive under the debris, there to die, as no one would venture to dig them out.

"For more than twelve hours the shocks came at intervals of every thirty minutes. Water veins under the earth broke, and sand and water were belched forth, the flow continuing for more than four hours. The earth cracked in thousands of places, some of which cracks were four feet wide. Many houses sunk six feet into the ground.

"Wounded were brought to a large playground in the center of town to be cared for, where tents and thatched huts were hastily

erected. The Medical College and Hospital were among other buildings which collapsed, burying under its debris more than 75 patients. Yesterday four cartloads were dug out and burned. In some sections the stench from dead bodies is almost unbearable, but disinfectants are being used to prevent disease breaking out.

"Immediately after the quake we went out to help take care of the wounded, and witnessed some terrible sights. As we were under a tree dressing wounds five dead were brought out of one house while the father and eldest son were still buried. We saw arms that had been cut open to the bone and flesh

torn off; broken bones protruding out through the flesh; heads scalped and the skull visible; eyes out of their sockets, almost too terrible to look at, and many other sights of horror.

"Our chapel and some of the workers' quarters were demolished. Our bungalow is damaged and as soon as tremors cease we shall have it examined to know whether or not it is safe for occupancy. At present we are living in a grass hut and eating out in the open. We thank God upon His every remembrance of us and that we and our people were saved. These signs must surely precede the coming of our Lord, and our one prayer is that we may be ready for that day. We know not what the coming days may bring for us, should He tarry a while, so pray for us."

PERSECUTION IN BULGARIA

Word comes to us from G. V. Nickoloff of the awful suffering some of the Christians have had to endure for the sake of the gospel. He says: "Many of our village believers are going through some terrible hardships. Four of our village folks were arrested and beaten, upon the false accusation of the priest. When the police saw that they were not to be discouraged by the beating, they rearrested them and drove needles under their finger nails. The pain might seem to be unbearable, but our dear brethren stood faithful. Their hands are still swollen but victory is in their hearts."

FAITHFUL THROUGH PERSECUTION Bella L. Seale

Mr. Chui was my first convert in Shek-Kok. When I first came to China some of the missionaries and I made evangelistic trips here to hold services among these people. God graciously blessed our ministry among them, and in one of the services Mr. Chui stepped out on the Lord's side in response to the altar call. He became an earnest follower of Jesus and was soon baptized in the Holy Spirit.

It was not long before his friends and associates knew of the transformation which had taken place in his life, and immediately the persecution began. He lived with some of the workmen in a carpenter shop where they worked. They did everything they could think of to torment him. When he went to meetings they would sometimes put ink in his bed. When he returned and went to bed they would often throw blocks of wood and bricks at him, taking advantage of the darkness of the room so he would not know who did it. For days they tormented him with all manner of mockery, trying to cause him to lose his temper. However, God was faithful in allowing him to be tempted for only a certain length of time, and when his persecutors saw that he was earnest in serving Jesus, they abandoned hope of causing him to weaken.

His wife also became a Christian soon after he took his stand. Now he wants to go to Bible school and prepare for the service of

the Lord. Please pray for him that the Lord may use him for the salvation of many precious souls.

Grandmother Ts'an is another faithful soul here in Shek-Kok. Over a year ago the only place they called their home was burned, and she nearly lost her life. She was so badly burned that one could hardly bear to look at her, so swollen and disfigured was her face. We took her to the Lord in prayer and in a very short time the burn was so completely healed that one could not tell that she had ever been burned. She is nearly seventy years old and is a real shining light, always testifying to the wonderful healing power of God.

CARING FOR WIDOWS AND ORPHANS

In a recent letter Miss Trasher writes: "Can you imagine what it means for me to have to see that 2000 meals are provided every day, here in Assiout Orphanage, as well as all the books and clothes and all of the needs of hundreds of children and the needs of the home in general? This, in itself, is a heavy job, even if one had all the money needed; but it is impossible to have money for even one day in advance.

"Then, perhaps, you can understand that where there are so many children coming from so many different homes, and with no training at all before they come to us, there will always be many difficulties to settle. The Lord has been very gracious to us, and has recently been wonderfully working among the girls. Many have come to the Lord and some are now filled with the Spirit."

PORTO RICO CONFERENCE BLESSED

Brother Frank Finkenbinder reports a glorious conference this year for the Porto Rican District. He says that they rented one of the largest halls in Humacao, yet it was packed each night and hundreds stood on the outside trying to hear the message. 

THE CHOICE

On the day in 1874 that David Livingstone was buried in Westminster Abbey, the streets of London were lined with thousands seeking to pay respect to the memory of the pioneer missionary. In the crowd was noticed a poor, old man, unkempt, poorly clad, weeping bitterly. Some one went up and asked him why he was weeping when all were seeking to honor the illustrious dead. "I'll tell you why," the sad old man replied. "Davie (Livingstone) and I were born in the same village, brought up in the day school and Sunday school, worked together at the same loom. But, Davie went that way and I went this; now he is honored by the nation, and I am neglected, unknown, and dishonored. I have nothing to look forward to but a drunkard's grave." The choice comes to each one, and that choice determines the course of his life in time as well as his destiny in eternity.

A CONGREGATION OF ONE

We never know what the results will be of a piece of work faithfully done, even though apparently unnoticed. In the early part of his career, Dr. Lyman Beecher once arranged to preach for a minister whose church was in a remote district. It was mid-winter; the day was stormy and cold, and the snow lay so deep that he could scarcely find his way. On his arrival, although the church was empty, he took his seat in the pulpit. Presently one man came in and sat down, and the preacher began. As the service closed, the solitary hearer departed and left the preacher alone. Twenty years later Dr. Beecher was traveling in Ohio, when a stranger accosted him. "Do you remember preaching twenty years ago to one man?" he

asked. "Yes, yes," said the doctor, grasping his hand, "that I do; and, if you are the man, I have been wishing to see you ever since." "I am the man," came the answer. "That sermon changed my life and made a minister of me, and yonder is my church. The converts of the sermon, sir, are all over Ohio!"


