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Coming-Up Jonah

ND the Lord spake unto the fish, among scientists and religionists as to the dry land. Jonah 2:10. The

Book of Jonah was written, not for our entertainment, but "for our learning." Jonah was a real prophet, he was cast into a real sea, and was swallowed by a real fish-a "whale" of a fish. But Jonah was also a type; assuredly, a type of our Lord Jesus Christ, in His death, burial and resurrection; in many respects also, a type of Israel, swallowed up by the nations.

Jonah was chosen of God and com-

missioned to preach repentance to that great Gentile city, Nineveh. He rebelled against the grace God had given him and took ship to go in the opposite direction. God sent a great storm; Jonah was cast into the sea; and was swallowed by a great fish, a "prepared" fish. And yet it was in some respects an unprepared fish, unprepared to digest Jonah, for after three days Jonah was vomited out on the land, re-commissioned to preach to Nineveh, which commission he finally obeyed, to the salvation of that city.

There has been much discussion

and it vomited out Jonah upon whether it is possible for a whale to swallow a man, many scientists claiming that it is not possible, religionists striving desperately to prove that it is, some even claiming to have evidence that it has been done in recent years. This is all quite beside the point, for this was no natural whale. It was a specially prepared fish, and any thing you prove about a natural fish has no bearing on this miraculous fish. There never was a fish like it, before nor since.

Even if you could explain the swal-

lowing of Jonah naturally, you would still be left in a maze of mysteries. The inability of the fish to digest Jonah in three days and three nights is a greater miracle than its ability to swallow him. Also, there would still remain unexplained the landing of Jonah alive, the one-night gourd, the "prepared" worm, etc. The whole book of Jonah is a record of miracles, and we must accept them as such, for our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ vouched for them.

It is not written whether God prepared this miraculous fish without a digestive

apparatus or whether Jonah was a peirritating culiarly morsel, and the digestive juices of the fish refused to flow. At any rate, God in His marvelous wisdom and power knew how to keep Jonah alive and intact, so that he did not become fish but remained prophet.

Now for the antitype. Israel was chosen of God from among all the nations of the earth to show forth His glory among those other nations. Israel was not chosen because she was any better than other nations, but according to God's sovereign grace He chose her. (See Page Six)

: "A City Without Walls"

"He that hath no rule over his own spirit, is like a city that is broken down, and without walls." Proverbs 25:28.

Has your imagination ever pictured that city? Once it was prosperous and selfrespecting: fruitful vineyards lay all around it; the opening of the gates morning by morning let a busy concourse of people into the market-place; peace and prosperity abounded among its contented citizens—all because the strength of its walls, and the wisdom and valor of its rulers, had spread a healthy respect for it in the hearts of all possible marauders.

But-whether by the sudden fierce and unexpected attack of a powerful robber chief from afar, or whether from the mere results of neglect through too much self-satisfaction, one cannot say-it has now become a place more or less in ruins, and only has a shadow of its former wealth and influence. Just a few sickly inhabitants live among the ruins of once comfortable homes; weeds and rubbish abound everywhere. Worst of all, and most significant of all-the walls are broken down. So now every robber and lawless wanderer can come and go as he likes. There is no government, no watchman, no self-respect, and no influence over the surrounding country.

This inspired parable is declared to be a picture of -a man.

It is, particularly and definitely, a picture of a man who has "no rule over his own spirit." A vital part of his personality has got out of control. Something in him that should stand firm and sure like the walls of a strong city has become broken down, ineffective, despicable, and pitiable. It is his *spirit*.

Do we think often enough about our own spirits? How many of even so-called "Pentecostal" people are there who scarcely recognize the reality of their own personal spirit, or its vital place in everything? Some even baldly deny the existence of a "spirit" of their own at all. They will admit of nothing but the indwelling Holy Spirit. Yet Romans 8:16 is crystal clear in making the contradistinction between our own spirits, and the Holy Spirit. "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit."

Our own spirit the highest part of our wonderful tri-partite nature. "I pray God your whole spirit, and soul, and body be preserved blameless," says the Apostle. 1 Thess. 5:23. Our spirits share in the redemption purchased by the precious blood of Christ, and need the sanctifying grace of the Spirit and the Word. Sometimes they have their own unhappy

"filthiness" to be cleansed from (2 Cor. 7:1): but they are capable of that highest and greatest of all exercises of the redeemed—worship (John 4:24). One day the spirits of the just will be made perfect (Heb. 12:23). For the present, we greatly need to take heed to our spirits.

In the exercise of the supernatural gifts of the Spirit bestowed as part of the Pentecostal enduement of power from on High, the redeemed and sanctified human spirit has an important and honorable place.

There are far too many who regard Spiritual Gifts, and especially those of more ecstatic and inspired utterance, as being the mechanical operations of the Holy Ghost, quite apart from our own personal.ties. Only God knows how much mischief has come through such an un-Scriptural and distorted view.

The New Testament is clear enough. Take, for instance, the gift of prophecy in the Church. The word says plainly that "the spirits of the prophets are sub-ject to the prophets." 1 Cor. 14:32; and with this clinching statement the apostle sums up all his teaching and exhortation. The ultimate responsibility for the use, or misuse, of the spiritual gift of prophecy is with the prophet himself. The prophet can misjudge the quantity, or quality, of his inspiration, and can allow his own enthus astic spirit to completely run away with him, until his use of the gift transgresses all the laws of love and wisdom. This is no imaginary hypothesis. It was actually happening at Corinth; and was the immediate reason why much of 1 Corinthians 14 was ever written under the guidance of the Spirit of Truth.

To many who have, unfortunately, imbibed false and unscriptural ideas about the gift of tongues, the plain statements of the Scriptures must come with something like a shock. But it will be a most healthy and saving shock.

Paul says distinctly about speaking with tongues—"If I pray in an unknown tongue MY SPIRIT prayeth." 1 Cor. 14:14. The language is too plain to admit of the slightest misunderstanding. He does not say (as we have so often heard people say today), "the Holy Ghost spoke through me in tongues." He recognized the conscious, willing activity of his own spirit, and placed the exercise of the gift where it belongs. Through this gift the Apostle personally spoke to God. (vv. 2 and 28).

In the same way, he strongly enforces the personal responsibility of the one with the gift of tongues only to use his gift in a proper way. Our own spirit can determine the amount of exercise allowed in any one meeting (verse 27), and can keep silent when advisable (verse 28). If the gift of tongues were the direct voice of the Holy Spirit, as some mistakenly affirm and believe, then these instructions would amount to a command to quench the Spirit—which is unthinkable and absurd. O, to come back to our Bibles in these things.

The recognition of the true place and importance of our own spirit in the exercise of these gifts does not destroy the glorious truth of Inspiration. They are the gifts of the Holy Spirit, and their proper use through us involves His "working" (1 Cor. 12:11). Through them God can, and will, speak when it pleaseth Him (1 Cor. 14:21). But all utterance in "tongues" is not in the nature of an inspired "message"; and the activity of our own spirits has to be watched with the utmost care and willingness to conform to the rules of love and wisdom. The *Holy Spirit* will *never* break those rules.

It only remains to apply the proverb before us. It teaches that our spirits are to be "ruled." Paul says they are "subject" to our own wills. That is to say we should never lose the God-given power to exercise perfect self-control, especially in public and in the assembly. We should always consider the fitness of the occasion, and the composition of the company present, before we allow our spirits untrammelled freedom. There may be legitimate times when we can become "beside ourselves to God"; but always in the secret place of communion, and never in public meetings of the Church.

Our spirits can be easily stirred, for they are that part of our being which *feels* most deeply of all. (Notice how Jesus was troubled in spirit; and how Paul was stirred in spirit). Therefore we have to watch with special care at all times when feeling is running high. Such times occur in meetings during powerful sermons, emotional prayers, or sentimental songs; or else when somebody else is exercising a spiritual gift.

And even when the touch of the Blessed Spirit has truly been upon us, perhaps in some spiritual song or prophecy, we still need to watch our own spirit carefully, lest it run on in its sheer personal enjoyment of the manifestation *after* the hand of the Lord has lifted.

Not long ago, I had an electric pockettorch which I had to discard for the simple reason that it was always going on in my pocket without my touching the switch at all. The slightest jolt as I went along—and off it would go! One result was that the battery was soon exhausted, and I had no power for lighting left just when I really needed it.

That is just like some of the Lord's people. The slightest "jolt" of emotion in the meeting will start them off; they will injure the testimony of a whole assembly, or the effect of a powerful sermon, by an ill-timed display of some spiritual gift which God gave to them to be locked up tight unless *He* wanted the use of it. And the sequel usually is that, when the power of the Spirit is really needed, they are found lacking. Surrender to mere emotionalism has caused all their true power to leak away.

At one time in a meeting I watched a poor man who was suffering from some nervous disease, so that every now-andagain his whole face would twitch and his frame shake. He obviously had lost control over his own body. Poor fellow! I pitied him. Yet I soon saw that there were some in that assembly in a worse plight; for as the meeting proceeded, it was easy to see that they had lost all control over their own spirits.

But on the way home I watched the superb self-control of the brother driving the car. There was no outward sign of strain, but every sense was alert and doing its appointed business, while every member of his body responded immediateto his will. I prayed God to make me, spiritually, like that chauffeur; and never, in His mercy, to let me get like the poor neurotic in the meeting. I wonder how some folk would get on if the Lord set an examination in their powers of selfcontrol before He gave them a Pentecostal driving license! We might have better order in some of our meetings.

There is a blessed remedy for those of us who have lost the rule over our own spirits, and have allowed the "walls" to be broken down. We can invite the Saviour to come and repair those walls once again, and to set up the gates in their appointed places. We can ask Him to "set a watch upon the door of our lips"; and then to teach us how to rule our own spirits—under Him.

An Incident of the Early Days

By the "early days" I mean the early days of the outpouring of the latter rain. I got my information from the widow of the man concerning whom I write. She was living in Los Angeles, and I called at her home one day. God manifested His presence and power in a mighty way in those early days, and if all that God did were written down for our learning and edification it is doubtless true that the books would occupy many shelves, and every one of them would be interesting. Some would be well nigh as interesting as the Acts of the Apostles, for if miracles, real miracles, were wrought in the days of Peter and Paul, real miracles were wrought in those early days when God in answer to prayer poured out His Holy Spirit in plenitude and power.

He was a Free Methodist, one of the leading members of the church to which he belonged. For years he had been a member of the official board, and was rcgarded as the financial backbone of the church. His pastor had the utmost confidence in him and consulted him often concerning matters that related to the welfare of the work.

Down at the Azusa Street Mission the Lord had been working; sinners had been saved, and large numbers had received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost. But the pastor of the Free Methodist Church and nearly all the people who belonged to it had been criticizing what was going on. They were sure, or thought they were sure, it was not of God; it was just wild fire; it was fanaticism of the rankest and

wildest kind. The pastor did not hesitate to denounce it as occasion offered itself, and he warned his people to stay away from the place; he even intimated that it was *dangerous* to go; they who went, he unhesitatingly affirmed, merited the displeasure of God and were often turned over to Satan who was allowed to deceive them.

One day he and this leading official member of his church were engaged in conversation concerning what was going on at the Mission, and the official member who was not altogether sure that his pastor was right said, "I have made up my mind that I will find out for myself just what this is. I am going down to the Mission tonight. If this is fanaticism I want to be in a position to warn our people; I want to be able to tell them that I know for I have been there; all I know now is what people tell me, and some say one thing and some another." His pastor tried to persuade him not to carry out his "It is unsafe to go there; others plan. have been deceived, and you may be deceived too. Be satisfied with what you've got. We know that what we have is the Baptism, and it must be that this that is going on down there is wild fire. Why, if God had wanted to do anything new here in Los Angeles He would certainly have chosen our church in which to do it, for you know that we have never compromised, and we have always laid emphasis upon separation from the world and upright living. If God had been go-ing to pour out His Spirit as He poured out the Holy Ghost in the days of the

apostles He would have done it in our church."

But the man was not quite convinced. "I am going down tonight," he said, "and you can come over tomorrow morning, and I will tell you what my impressions were. I know God, and I am sure that if this is just wild fire I shall be able to detect the fact very soon. You need not worry about me, "Pastor. I am God's child, and God will take care of His own. He knows why I am going and that my heart is honest. I am not afraid, and you need not fear." The Pastor saw that the man's mind was fully made up. So he simply said, "Well, I shall pray that God will not let you be deceived, and that He will show you just what He would have you see."

Down to the Azusa Street Mission that night the man went. God was there in mighty power. Sinners were seeking and finding the Lord. Believers were being filled with the Holy Ghost. There was a shout of victory in the camp. The dear Free Methodist brother had been in many meetings where the glory of the Lord was in evidence, but he had never seen anything like this. He knew God, and God spoke to his heart. God said, "This is the real thing; this is what you have longed to see and have never seen before; this is what took place in the days when Peter and John lived; what these people are seeking and receiving is the real Baptism in the Spirit."

Our Free Methodist brother forgot all about the fact that he had believed for many years that he had the Baptism. His heart was hungry for God's best, and up to the altar he went, and down he got on his face before God. He was seeking the Baptism. All around him the power was falling, and it soon fell upon him and he was gloriously baptized in the Holy Ghost, speaking with other tongues as the Spirit gave him utterance.

He went home at a late hour, or, rather, at an early hour the next morning, and told his wife what the Lord had done for his soul.

It was about nine o'clock, and family prayers were being said. It was customary in those days for Free Methodists to have family worship. Would that there were a family altar today in every Pentecostal home! If we want the old time fire to fall let us do what Elijah did before he called upon God to send the fire from heaven-let us repair the altar of the Lord. The pastor had come over to find out what conclusion his official member had come to as a result of his visit to the Mission the previous evening. When he came to the door he heard the voice of the man in prayer. He waited outside and listened. Suddenly the Pentecostal fire that had been kindled in the man's heart the night before flamed up anew and he began to pray in tongues as the Holy

Light Through the Gloom

There seems to be a general apprehension of evil days ahead. Many national and international leaders have recently uttered grave statements as to the future. The Scripture tells us that in the last days evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse. Our Lord Himself warned us that because iniquity shall abound the love of many-not of just a few-shall wax cold. He pointed back to two intensely evil periods in the earth's history when God had to intervene with judgments-the days of Noah and the days of Lot-and showed that we may expect days of wickedness parallel to these. But, thank God, the picture is not all black. In showing forth things to come the prophet Zechariah tells us that the Lord gave to him "good words and comfortable words." Zech. 1:13. And in Psalm 45, which is a picture of things ahead, the Psalmist tells us, "My heart is inditing (literally, bubbleth over with) a good matter." When apprehensive of the threatening shadows of ever increasing iniquity, let us constantly read and meditate on the "good matter" of this "Song of loves," as the 45th Psalm is called.

The King All Glorious

The "good matter" with which the Psalmist is bubbling over concerning "the King." What King? If this Psalm is read in the Hebrew Targum we shall have no doubt as to who this King is, for this version renders the second verse, "Thy beauty, O King Messiah, is greater than that of the children of men." The transcendently beautiful, the altogether lovely One who is coming, is He who said to John, "I am he that liveth, and was dead, and behold, I am alive for evermore." Dear old Samuel Rutherford, of whom his Scotch friends could truthfully say, "Yon man is aw-ful thick wi' t' Almighty," once wrote, "O fair sun and fair moon and fair stars and fair flowers and fair roses and fair lilies! But O ten thousand times fairer Lord Jesus! Alas! I have wronged Him in making the comparison. O black sun and moon, but O fair Lord Jesus! O black flowers and black lilies and roses, but O fair, fair, ever fair Lord Jesus! O black heavens, but O fair Christ! O black angels, but O surpassingly fair Lord Jesus!" The Psalmist points to one outstanding thing about our lovely Lord, "Grace is poured into thy lips." When some of the disciples went back and walked no more with Him, Jesus asked

the twelve, "Will ye also go away?" Peter answered, "Lord, to whom shall we go? *Thou hast the words of eternal life.*" Have you listened to *the words of eternal life* that come from His gracious lips?

A Mighty Conqueror

He is next set forth as a mighty Warrior, girding His sword upon His thigh to execute judgment. When our Lord, in the synagogue at Nazareth, read from the prophet Isaiah, He chose the 61st chapter of that prophecy, and beginning at the first word read until He came to the words, "to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord." Then He closed the book and sat down. In His first advent He had come to fulfill the prophecy up to this point. But it reads on, "And the day of vengeance of our God." Later in the same prophecy the Lord says concerning the wicked, "I will tread them in mine anger, and trample them in my iury." Isa. 63:3. And here in Psalm 45 the Psalmist declares, "Thy right hand shall teach thee terrible things. Thine arrows are sharp in the heart of the king's enemies whereby the people fall under thee." In that day of the wrath of the Lamb "they shall go into the holes of the rocks, and into the caves of the earth, for fear of the Lord, and for the glory of His majesty, when He ariseth to shake ter-ribly the earth." Isa. 2:19.

The Anointed King

And then from the battle we are taken to a throne room. Who will crown One so great as this? None other than God Himself. What does He say to the King? "Thy throne, O God, is for ever and ever: a scepter of righteousness is the scepter of thy kingdom. Thou hast loved righteousness and hated iniquity; therefore God, even thy God, hath anointed thee with the oil of gladness above thy fellows." Heb. 1:8, 9. Notice here that it is the Father Himself who calls the Son "God," and declares alike the eternity of His kingdom and also the character of it, for He who loves righteousness will establish righteousness on the earth, and He who hates iniquity will remove it from the same. Thus will our glorious Saviour reign as King over an earth that shall become all glorious. The nations shall become His inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth His possession.

The Marriage of the Lamb

The strains of "Hosanna to the King!" have hardly died down before we are listening to wedding bells. God declared

concerning the first man, "It is not good that the man should be alone," and He provided a helpmeet for him-one taken from his side. And here we see like provision made for His Son, and we are introduced to the royal bride-the queen in gold of Ophir. It is a blessed compensation to Him for the great suffering He bore when on earth, that here from the earth He shall find a bride without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, meet to be His companion through all eternity. She has listened to the words of grace that came from His lips. She has, like Rebecca of old, left her own people and her father's house, and has said, "I will go," when she heard the blessed things the Holy Spirit said concerning the waiting Bridegroom, whom not having see she loved. Like Esther in her days of preparation, she has accepted all the things for purification so bountifully provided by the king. She has learned to pray that prayer in Psalm 90, "Let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us," and now does the King "greatly desire her beauty." She has already learned to know her heavenly Bridegroom as "Lord," and to worship Him. She is not only all glorious without but, better still, all glorious within, so that the heavenly Bridegroom, as He surveys her, can declare "Thou art all fair, my love, there is no spot in thee."

Witnesses to His Grace

There is special mention of one present at this marriage-the daughter of Tyre. Read carefully the 26th and 27th chapter of Ezekiel, and it will be seen that Tyre (or Tyrus, as it is here called) is essentially the territory of the enemy, and a careful study of the one called "the king of Tyrus" will cause us to believe that reference is here made to the enemy of souls himself. But in the days of our Lord's ministry on earth. He went right over into the enemy's territory at Tyre and here it was that He healed the daughter of the woman of Canaan who was "grievously vexed with a devil." See Matt. 15:21-28. They who have been victims of Satan, grievously tormented by demons, but now delivered, and glorifying Him, are to be present at the nuptials of the Bridegroom King and the queen, and to testify to the exceeding grace of the King. There will be press "virgins many" to extol His matchless grace.

Eternal Praise to the King

And then, concerning the children of the King, the Psalmist shows that He will make them "princes in all the earth." Thus will be fulfilled the promise given to the Son in connection with His sufferings at Calvary, "He shall see His seed." Isa. 53:10. And it is here prophesied concerning our glorious Warrior Bridegroom King, "The people shall

praise thee for ever and ever." It is down here in the midst of the gloom and increasing cloudiness that we learn to lisp the first notes of this eternal anthem of praise to the King. Is your heart attune to give to Him the glory due to His name? The first stanza in this heavenly anthem runs something like this, "God be merciful to me, a sinner!" But later it swells out into the words, "Unto him

that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father; to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen." When you have learned to sing this song you will know that the Psalmist here is indeed bringing us a "good matter," for you will have tasted and seen how good and how gracious the Lord is.

The Passing and the Permanent

Anti-Semitism

Here and there are gathering small clouds that will finally darken into "Jacob's Trouble." Agnes Scott Kent reports that in England a 15-foot iron cross bearing the words, "Perish Judæa" was erected in a London park, and oil-soaked rags enwrapping it were set on fire making the slogan visible over an extensive area.

Fears

Another indication of "men's hearts failing them for fear" in thinking of the future, is seen in the following statement (quoted in *Messiah's Advocate*) made by Mussolini's General Balbo, who said that he "hoped prehistoric monsters would appear this year if necessary to distract the public mind from disasters and crises."

Rome Seeks Supremacy

Frank Simmonds, a leading writer of the *Review of Reviews* writes: "It must be clear that the stake that Mussolini is playing for is European leadership and if skill and daring could win it, Rome might one day soon again become the capital of Europe, politically, now that Geneva has definitely lost title to that rank."

The Jews and Mussolini

The Jewish Missionary Magazine quotes from a Palestine journal called the *Deror*, edited by Ben Avi, the son of the scholar who revived the Hebrew language. Ben Avi, in this paper, addresses Mussolini as follows: "From the moment ten years ago, in which you consented to receive me for an interview in Rome, I felt that in you a Saviour has risen for all persecuted people." After emphasizing the need of a man to bring peace to clashing nations, he says, "And you are, according to my opinion, this man in the world today. 'Ecce Homo' (Behold the man) . . . I dare to declare that if you will solve the problems of Judæa and the Arab, no greater than you will ever be in the coming generations."



Coming-Up Jonah

Israel rebelled against the grace God had given her to represent Him among the nations, fled away from God, was dispersed among the nations—swallowed up of them—and has been in the "belly" of the nations for nearly three days (a thousand years is as a day with the Lord).

But the great fish has not been able to digest the Jew. In Russia, in Poland, in Germany, and even in the great melting pot, America, the Jew is still Jew. He has in the main obeyed God's command to be a separate people, and has not intermarried, to any great extent, with the Gentiles. He has been oppressed, persecuted, slaughtered, but not destroyed. There are more Jews now on earth than ever before. The nations have not been able to destroy the Jew nor to dilute him. There is no such thing as a Russian Jew, a Polish Jew or a German Jew; they are all just plain Jew, all with the same characteristics. Study the children playing in the streets of Jerusalem today, their ancestors having lived perhaps for hundreds of years in Russia or Poland, and you will find exactly the same characteristics as are evident in the children play-

ing in Jewish sections of Chicago. Their dress is far different, but scratch the skin and underneath you find only Jew. Jewish pupils with whom I was acquainted in the Medill School in Chicago thirty years ago had exactly the same traits as pupils in Jerusalem schools today. The Jew is unchangeable and indestructible, and soon Israel will come forth to be recommissioned as God's earthly people, and to be God's evangels in the world.

There is a lot of silly sentiment wasted on the Jew, under the misapprehension that he is a righteous, gentle, holy, lovable character, abused by all the rest of the world. True, he has been much abused and the nations that have persecuted him will suffer for it. But talk to one of the older Jews in Jerusalem today and you will find him proud, arrogant, boastful, intolerant, sure of his destiny as the chosen of God, sure that the Promised Land is his, because God said so (which is right enough), but not a word about the unbelief of the Jews, their rebelliousness, their sin and God's punishment by dispersing them among the nations, not a word of repentance.

Some one has said that if you wish to keep in touch with the fulfillment of prophecy you must keep your eye on the Jew. You would have had both eyes full of him constantly, had you been with the writer yesterday (March 1) during the great Purim carnival in Tel Aviv, commemorating the deliverance of the Jews from the machinations of Haman, through the intercession of Queen Esther. Jews to the right of you, Jews to the left of you, rivers of jostling Jews filling Allenby, Herzl, and Nahlat Benjamin Streets from shop window to opposite shop window, laughing, pushing, shouting, shooting toy pistols, all in good-humored carnival mood. Every wall, every little tree, every window, every balcony, every roof crowded to the danger point, all vehicular traffic stopped for hours, the police only with great difficulty opening up a narrow way in the midst of the milling thousands for the culmination of the carnival, the great "Adlojada" parade.

The Purim Festival really began the evening before, with the reading of the "Megillah" (the Book of Esther) in the Great Synagogue, amplifiers carrying the words of the cantor to thousands in the streets for many blocks around. Every time Haman's name was read it was accompained by the noise of many crackers, pistol shots, and the "booing" of the people. In fact, all during the carnival Haman and Hitler vied with each other in the executions of the multitude.

The parade was led by groups of colorfully attired Yemenites representing the twelve tribes. Other features were Queen Esther, riding a gorgeously caparisoned camel, followed by a large camel train; various groups representing colonies, industries, schools, etc.; a huge blue figure of a cow, representing Palestine, being

Jonah was a good man in a bad place a disobedient servant, which ought to be a contradiction in terms.

"It took an obedient fish to catch and cure a disobedient preacher. Was the fish 'great' because of its size or because it obeyed orders?"

God's dealing with Moses and with Jonah show that He has to deal very severely with those who have had more privileges than others. Privilege increases responsibility and guilt.

The prayer meeting in his interior must have been somewhat disturbing to the fish; but it made Jonah a new man.

"Only drastic treatment could cure deliberate disobedience." Can you praise God for the severity which brings you back into the pathway of His will?

Some have spoken even boastfully of the fact that they have disobeyed God's call to service again and again, and that He has had to whip them. It is not a thing to be proud of, but to confess with shame and sorrow.

Young people, do not follow the multitude of Jonahs in the path of disobedience; but put yourselves irrevocably on God's altar, for Him to do just as He wills with your lives.

Those who are dissatisfied in God's service are those who are serving halfheartedly or following afar off, like Peter did.

The path of wholehearted obedience brings joy, satisfaction, and a deep peace which the world can neither give nor take away.

This peace will endure even in the midst of fierce trials and raging storms of persecution, and those who have it will not deny their Lord. milked continuously, the milk being pour-

ed into an enormous milk can labeled (in Hebrew) "British Treasury"; America, represented by a gigantic bespectacled figure of a Jew holding with the tips of his fingers his empty pockets turned inside out, followed by representations of the falling dollar and the crash of businesses (these in connection with contributions to the Jewish National Fund); and Hitler, represented by a huge threeheaded dragon, which brought many "boos" and yells from the spectators.

According to estimates based on recent census and immigration figures, there are now nearly 250,000 Jews in Palestine. If that is a true estimate, it would seem that practically all were in Tel Aviv this week. Official government figures for 1933 give the number of immigrants received into Palestine as 29,303, a vast increase over preceding years. The Zionist organization estimates the 1933 immigration at more than 40,000 (including illegal entrants and tourists who remained without permit). After participating in the Purim festivities this week the writer's guess is that the above figures are all far under the mark. He has seen nowhere else anything so closely resembling the New Year Rose Tournament parade in Pasadena, with its color, excitement, and good-natured crowds (not a single rose in this parade, however).

It is evening, and as this is being written Jerusalem *Haluzim* are marching and singing in the streets, older Jews with flowing robes and beards, with wide brimmed fur hats, are dancing the *Hora*, forming a circle by clasping hands, dancing about in apparently unrestrained joy.

One writer on prophecy declares that something "very terrible" is going to happen by September, 1934. Perhaps. Anyhow, it seems clear that something very delightful is going to happen before very long. We see "nation rising against nation"; we see "distress of nations with perplexity"; we see "sea and waves roaring"; we see "men's hearts failing them for fear and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth." Jesus Christ said in connection with the above, "When ye see these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh." Luke 21:25-28.

The return of the Jews to the Promised Land is another sign of the approaching end of the Gentile age, and of the coming again of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, the King of the Jews. Surely, God is speaking to the fish and we see the Jew coming out of his "grave" in the "belly" of the nations. Indigestible, indestructible Jonah is coming up.

We have assumed responsibility for the care of the little children until such time as their parents are released or some other provision is made for them, so that we appreciate all the offerings that have been sent in by our friends for this purpose. We thank God for answered prayer this far, but let us continue in prayer that the parents also may be freed and the family again united.

Mr. F. E. Baltau of North China asks prayer that the Lord might raise up support of ten dollars per month for a native worker in his district.

Mr. Martin Kvmme of Manchuria would like help for the support of native workers. Ten dollars a month will help although it will not meet the full need of a worker in that field.

LISU CHIEF CONVERTED

Brother Bolton relates the following testimony of the conversion of a chief of the Lisu tribe. Ba-si's life has been wonderfully changed in answer to prayer. Years ago the Chinese soldiers burned the whole village of which he was head, causing him to flee with his people into the mountains. In order to obtain a living they robbed and killed travelers who came their way. He told me that he was guilty of every sin that could be committed.

Finally he was captured and thrown into prison for two years, where he was horribly beaten and then chained by the feet. He still bears the scars on his back and feet. While in prison he realized that the devil is a hard task master, and thus his heart was prepared for the entrance of the Word of God. It was a happy day for him when he first heard of Christ. Although he did not accept Him at once, he pondered the Word in his heart and finally made the decision.

God has richly blessed him, and although he is past seventy years of age, he is well and strong, getting around over these high mountains better than we can. For some time he was convicted about his pipe, after he gave his heart to the Lord, but he said he could not give it up. However, the Lord answered prayer and made it possible for him to get along without it, and his family have all given up their pipes.

As a headman he has to collect taxes. Formerly he would rob the people, yet he was always poor, but now the Lord has blessed him since he does not deal unfairly with the people, so that when he cannot collect the full amount, he makes it up from his own money. He tells about Jesus wherever he goes and testifies to what God has done for him. He has a wonderful influence over all the village, and they all love and respect him as he rounds them up to pay their vows to the Lord, and brings them together to worship on Sundays.

A-Wu-Ma Becomes Faithful Worker

A-Wu-Ma, a dear old Lisu woman, is another precious jewel won for Christ. Brother Bolton writes that she was one of their first converts of the Lisu tribe, and has always been very earnest in her faith, even though she has had to endure much persecution. For a long time her son persecuted her dreadfully, but when trials began coming his way, and in many ways he suffered reverses, he saw God's hand in it all, and no longer troubles his mother. She believes he will soon turn to the Lord. The village people no longer scorn her, knowing that what she claims to have in her heart is real. Often they call her in to pray for them when sickness comes, and God answers her prayers.

One time she was taken by Tibetan robbers but they soon let her go, as she was on her knees praying all the time, and even though they beat her she continued to pray. She told them they could beat her to death and her soul would go up to heaven.

She goes from village to village preaching, and teaching the children to sing hymns and

to read the Book, and prays for many who are sick. She asks for no support as she goes out, for she says she wants to give herself an offering to God. Her daughter's family often send her food, and God blesses them for it.

A-Wu-Ma is shown in the accompanying picture holding a copy of the book of Acts which has just been translated into Lisu, and to her it is a great treasure. Brother Bolton asks that we pray for her that she may be filled with the Holy Spirit. She is a faithful and valuable worker and can go into homes and have more influence than the missionaries themselves.

GOSPEL CAMPAIGN IN INDIA

3,500 Gospels Given Out Near Sharannagar We have recently received a letter from Miss Zaida Harvey, daughter of Mrs. Esther Harvey, superintendent of our Sharannagar Mission, telling of the concerted efforts of the workers to place a copy of one of the Gospels in the hands of every person who can read or can get someone to read it to him.

A party of fifteen, composed of workers, Bible women, school boys, and Miss Harvey, in company with another missionary, made their headquarters about fourteen miles from the mission station, then divided into groups to go out preaching and giving out the literature. Some went into the bazars and market places, while others went into the near-by villages. When going into the villages, the workers speak to the first person they meet and ask them to go and call all the villagers together, whereupon a good crowd soon gathers to hear what the stranger has to say. In most places the workers were given every courtesy and good attention. They ask the friends in the home land to stand with them in prayer that many hearts may be enlightened by the Word of God, and find Christ as their Saviour.

Miss Harvey tells of many amusing incidents and also of hardships in connection with their trip. Their method of travel was by bicycle, bumping along for hours over rough roads and sand. The camping equipment was transported by ox cart. Meals were prepared and eaten in true Indian fashion, workers and missionaries sitting together on the ground or porch eating rice and Indian bread. The stove they used was a tiny affair made of mud.

The morning after they arrived the police official sent word that he wanted them to visit him. Miss Harvey says, "He spoke a mixture of English and Urdu which was very amusing. My coworker has red hair, and he evidently associated the word 'red' with something he had heard of the Russian Reds. He said to her, 'Excuse me, but are you a Russian?' She told him she came from New Zealand, so in a little while he asked her if she came from London or one of the little villages." Although he was a Mohammedan he was very courteous to the party and gave them freedom and protection while working in his city.

SIX BLACK DIAMONDS

I wish to tell you of six African lads between the ages of twelve and nineteen black lads, as lively and full of mischief as white boys. They are known as Yardse. Yardse are Mosies whose parents have become Mohammedans, and because they no longer follow the Mosi customs they call themselves Yardse. Two of these six boys came here to Kava with others two years ago from a bush town about 112 miles away, looking for work. Here they heard of Jesus for the first time, and after hearing the message for some time, they gave their hearts to Him and began to learn to read. After a while one went home and told his people of Jesus, and last year, another group came, stayed several months, then returned. A few of them too were saved, and this year one of the first two mentioned came back with about eight others. Soon these were attending services, God began to deal with them, and one by one they accepted the Lord. Two of them got work here and there in the bush, and we did not see them much, but six stayed near by and did any kind of work they could get in order to be here so

they could learn to read God's Word before going back to their heathen bush villages. Their names are Wind'yam, Wind'woga, Somteda, Konfage, Somsegia, and Dasablaga. Wind'yam is the leader. Mr. Wilson has given him special training so that he can be the teacher in the bush. He can read and write fairly well and has learned to teach. Dasablaga was given the name Sunshine by Miss George and Miss Hill because he always had a smile.

It was a strange sight to the Mosies to see these boys carry their water and grind grain and cook like women. They had the use of a hut in the Christian village and so had a place to sleep. There was not much work to be had this year as money is scarce, so the boys did whatever they could to get a little food. Some had work some days, and others did not. At harvest time some would get work from daylight to dark for a few peanuts. Sometimes one would get fifty shells for a day's work, about one-fourth of a cent. But even that was enough to buy a few beans to boil over a fire of grain stalks and all would have a little. Wind'woga had worked a while for Miss George who taught him how to wash and iron, and so we gave him work four mornings a week. He was soon considered quite well-to-do, as he got about twenty cents a week. Dasablaga got work taking care of a black doctor's horse and received his food and twenty cents a month for about three months. When he learned to read enough to have a book, it meant real sacrifice to buy the book as he was trying so hard to keep his twenty cents to buy clothes which he surely needed.

After the harvest was all in, there was very little work, and our cheery lads' clothes became more and more ragged and their food became less and less. They would divide whatever they had, but it was never enough to satisfy their hunger. When we asked them when they were going home, they would reply. "When we learn a little more." They wanted to remain here till time for the convention in Ouagadougou, and from there go on home. There was never a complaint from any of them, but as we would hear through the other Christians, who were too poor to help them, how little they had, our hearts ached for them. As convention time drew near, some of them got work here in the mornings repairing the buildings, and continued their classes in the afternoons with the other Christians. They pooled their funds and bought cloth as they were in rags and made sleeveless shirts for themselves according to the cloth they had and not according to their sizes.

They did well in their clases, and were looking forward with great joy to the coming convention, and thought nothing of the 65-mile walk to get to Ouagadougou for it. Little did they realize the disappointment just around the corner.

Just two days before they had expected to leave for the convention the fathers of three of them walked down from their village, 112 miles away, to see if the boys were really here or if they, like their older brothers, had run away to English country. Their happy smiles fled, and it was with heavy hearts that the boys came and told us that the old men demanded that they go home at once with them. The boys pleaded with the old men to let them go to convention first, but the old men would not believe that they would come on home then. Mr. Wilson talked with them, but they could not be persuaded. They were determined to take their boys. As the old men's feet were swollen and sore from the long walk, they rested two days here. We all prayed and hoped that God would change their minds, for we knew what the boys had suffered to get to attend the convention. On the very morning that a crowd of the Christians left for convention, we were awakened about four o'clock by Wind'woga's voice as he sadly called good-bye and said they had to go home. How they felt, no one but Jesus knows, as they took the road of obedience to their fathers instead of the one their boyish hearts craved.

They have gone back into a heathen sin cursed village but with a light within that car. be kept so bright by your prayers that many will be attracted by it and led to the giver (Continued on Page Twelve)

The Lord Jesus Acclaimed as King Lesson for May 6: Matt. 21:1-14.

Up to this time Christ had not made a public proclamation of His kingship. In fact He had retired when the people attempted to force rulership upon Him; and after Peter's confession He forbade His disciples to publicly proclaim His Messiahship. Why was this? Because of the people's misunderstanding concerning the nature of His Kingdom, a public proclamation of His Messiahship would have been the signal for a revolt against Rome that would have ended in a bloody massacre and His arrest as a political offender.

Yet, the Lord Jesus must enter the capital city as King in order to fulfill Zech. 9:9, and so make it impossible for the Jewish nation to say, "He never claimed to be King and Messiah."

The time for that event has come. There is no danger of a tumult now, for by this time both Jews and Romans know that He is no rebel but the leader of a spiritual kingdom. John 18:33-37.

I. THE KING'S TRIUMPH

The preparations for the proclamation. They suggest the following truths: (1) The King's foreknowledge. "Go ye into the village over against you, and straightway ye shall find an ass tied and a colt with her: loose them and bring them unto me." This command implies that Christ knew beforehand that immediately on entering the village the disciples would find a colt; that it would not be loose, but tied, and so ready for service; that it would be an animal never before ridden (Mark 11:2); that it would be outside where they could see it and not in the courtyard. Throughout the Gospels the Lord is set forth as One who is consciously following a divine program even to its smallest details.

(2) The King's need. "And if any man say unto you, Why do ye this? say ye that the Lord hath need of him." The Lord hath need -strange combination of words! Yet it is true that the King looks to us, His subjects, to supply something needed for His triumphal march through the world. Every act of obedience to His commandment and teaching is such a preparation. Notice further what a lowly instrument the King uses -an ass's colt. As we read through the Scriptures we are amazed at the humble means God sometimes uses. Let us then be encouraged, and learn (without unduly comparing ourselves to an ass's colt) that however humble our station in life we may have the honor of bearing Christ through the world in triumphal procession, by our testimony and faithful service.

(3) The King's authority. Like a true King the Lord Jesus commands, not requests, implicit obedience on the part of His disciples. Verse 6. The following incident is related concerning Admiral Robley Evans, who took sixteen battleships around Cape Horn to the Golden Gate. He said, "Friends, I cannot proceed until I answer the question I see written on your faces. 'Why did you

take those battleships around Cape Horn to the Golden Gate?' I do not know; I did not know then; I do not know now. There was one man—the President of the United States —who had a right to order me to take those battleships around Cape Horn. In the fortyfour years of my experience in the navy I have learned my lesson, and that is to **obey orders and ask nonquestions.**"

(4) The King's peacefulness. He entered, not as a warlike king riding upon a horse, the symbol of war, but as the Prince of peace, mounted upon an ass, which is the symbol of peaceful royalty. This was done according to the prophecy, "Tell ye the daughter of Sion, Behold, thy king cometh unto thee, meek, and sitting upon an ass, and a colt the foal of an ass." The prophet as much as says, "When you see a king proclaim Himself and approach you in this fashion, accept and trust him; for a ruler who enters the city in this manner will never be an oppressor."

The response to the proclamation. (1) The bright side. At Christ's approach to the city the disciples began to praise God for the wonderful works of the King. The multitudes caught the infection of this enthusiasm, and soon a mighty procession wended its way through the Holy City. "Hosanna: blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest!" they cried. That is, "God save the King! Hail to the God-sent Messiah who has come to set up the kingdom of David!" Notice the result: All the city was moved, saying, "Who is this?" When the power of Christ moves in triumph through a city, and there is the "shout of a king' (Num. 23:21) in the camp of the saints, people will be stirred to ask, "What meaneth this?" It takes a cheering, enthusiastic church to make people "sit up and take notice." (2) The dark side. While accepting all this homage, which was His rightful due, the Lord knew that most of this same multitude, incited by the priests, would soon be crying, "Crucify Him." He was not deceived by shallow and transient enthusiasm. Yet, knowing that He was in the center of the divine program, He was calm and unmoved. If we can imagine a President of our country who knows positively that he will die a violent death a few days after his inauguration, and who notwithstanding, goes through the ceremonies perfectly calm and unmoved, then we have a slight idea of Christ's situation at this time.

II. THE KING'S AUTHORITY Matt. 21:12-14

The Lord follows up His public entry by an act of authority permissible only to a great prophet or to the Messiah Himself; namely, the cleansing of the Temple. See Mal. 3:1-3.

The need of the cleansing. The temple was violated by the spirit of worldliness: that which was set apart for sacred use was profaned by secular practices. It was violated by the spirit of covetousness. In the court of the temple, money was exchanged for foreign pilgrims and sacrificial animals were sold. It was violated by the spirit of dishonesty. The words, "Ye have made it a den of thieves" imply that much of the trading was "crooked."

The justification for the cleansing. Christ regarded the temple as the house of God. and the house of prayer; hence it should be reverenced as the dwelling place of the Almighty-the place that He has graciously appointed where people may find Him "at Reverence for the church as the home." house of God is a lesson sorely needed in many quarters. We need to get quiet there, so that like Moses, we shall hear a voice saying to us, "The place whereon thou standest is holy ground," so that, like Jacob we shall reverently exclaim, "Surely the Lord is in this place, and I knew it not. . . . This is none other but the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven."

The lessons from the cleansing. (1) We have a picture of Christ cleansing the temple of the heart. A mother came to visit her son in college and found on the wall in his room pictures of actresses and prize fighters and others of a like character. She made no comment, but hung a copy of Hoffman's Christ on a vacant space in her boy's room. Six months later, on her second visit, she discovered that the objectionable pictures had all been removed. On enquiring as to the reason for this she received the reply : "Why, mother, I could not have them there and His face among them." When Christ comes in, defilement goes out. (2) We have a picture of Christ purifying His church. It is a sad but true fact that a divine institution like the church has from time to time become defiled and abused, like the temple of old. This has occurred when the church has lost the vision of its God-given purpose and calling, At such times the Head of the Church has sent the purifying fires of a revival to restore it to purity of worship and to true spirituality. Compare Mal. 3:1-3 and Eph. 5:25-27

The sequel of the cleansing. But Christ's work here was more than negative; He did something positive, "And the blind and the lame came to him in the temple; and he healed them." It is not sufficient to criticize, however just the criticism may be; we must also do something positive. It is not sufficient to tear down; we must also build up. Very often, those who criticize their church the most, are the ones who do the least work and give the least help. What Marion Lawrance said concerning the Sunday school will also apply to the church. "Well often does the writer recall that on numerous occasions in conventions, he has been asked the question in public, 'Our school is dead. What should we do?' Christian people are supposed to believe in the resurrection of the dead. It is not always out of place to say, when some one informs you that his school is dead, 'Better say nothing about it, for there is an unwritten law in the land that wherever a corpse is found, those next to it are under suspicion." He that hath an ear, let him hear !-- Myer Pearlman.
