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The World and the Church When Jesus Comes

In the 3d chapter of Daniel, the Holy Spirit has recorded and hidden away a wonderful picture of the condition of the world and the Church when Jesus comes. God has said of the closing moments of this dispensation, "The wicked shall do wickedly . . . but the wise shall understand." Dan. 12:10. Truly the time of distress of nations is upon the earth today. As conditions close in around us, it is the purpose of God that the Church of Jesus Christ should stand in a place of illumination by the Spirit, and that our hearts should be stayed upon Him and kept in a place of peace through the blood of His cross. We are impressed with the swiftness with which prophecies are being fulfilled today, the old order changing, kingdoms falling in an hour, others rising from obscurity in an incredibly short time.

An Absolute Monarchy

There is possibly no character in the Old Testament that holds a greater significance for us than that of Nebuchadnezzar, because we form part of the dispensation which he stands to represent. This first great Gentile king was an absolute menarch. As Daniel interpreted the vision of the image to represent the different forms of government which should arise during the Gentile era, he said to Nebuchadnezzar, "Thou art the head of gold." His was an absolute monarch, and the Scriptures have drawn a picture of one who shall arise at the end of this age, having once more an absolute monarchy. How the finger of prophecy points to this one great truth that the conditions which prevailed in the opening chapters of this era will have their counterpart in its closing days, and the character of Nebuchadnezzar will have its reproduction in the last great Gentile monarch, the Anti-Christ. In Daniel 11:36 we find a clear portrait of this man of sin, "and the king shall do according to his will and he shall exalt himself and magnify himself above every god and shall speak marvelous things against the God of gods and shall prosper until the indigna-tion be accomplished." No one can doubt that the days are fast ripening for the fulfillment of this scripture, the whole trend of events in the world today pointing to corporate bodies gathering added strength and power to themselves-a system which can culminate in a head whose power shall once more be absolute.

Brother Greenwood, whose sermon we print below, is the pastor of the largest Pentecostal church in Australia, and the editor of the Australian Evangel. Complete Power

Here is a remarkable scripture, Daniel 3:2: "Then Nebuchadnezzar sent to gather together the princes, the governors, the captains, the judges, the sheriffs, the treasurers, the counsellors, the rulers of provinces to come to the dedication of the image which Nebuchad-nezzar had set up." In his pride and arrogance this great Gentile monarch had caused an image of himself to be reared in the plains of Dura and the edict had gone forth that all must come to worship. In this great company gathered together we find every form of administration represented, a clear type of another company who will yield their allegiance to the man of sin in the day when he is revealed. The princes of the earth, their dominion surrendered; the judges also, the captains, representing all military powers; the treas-urers, bringing the world's wealth to him; the sheriffs, empowered to lay hands upon the saints at his bidding; the rulers of provinces also, showing local government surrendered. No avenue of escape will be left open. Truly his power shall be absolute.

The Command to Worship

Come now to Dan. 3:4. "Then an herald cried aloud, To you it is commanded, O people, nations, and languages, that at what time ye hear the sound of the cornet, flute, harp, sackbut, psaltery, dulcimer, and all kinds of music ye fall down and worship . . . the image." Even as the great company are gathered together comes the command to worship. John catches the vision in Revelation of the whole world in the last days as they wonder after the beast. Rev. 13:13. Why will the man of sin desire worship? Come to Rev. 13:4: "And they worshiped the dragon which gave power unto the beast: and they worshiped the beast saying, Who is like unto the beast? who is able to make war with him?" The devil has not changed, neither has he lost his desire for worship. See him as he tempts the Lord in the wilderness with a burning desire that this Man of all men should fall down and worship him. "All these things will I give thee if thou wilt fall down and worship me." Matt. 4:9.

Can we face the seriousness of this word? How true are the words of Paul to the Thessalonians as he speaks of one who "sits in the temple of God to be worshiped," and because the world has not received the love of the truth, God will permit strong delusions to come upon them, that they shall worship this man not knowing that he represents the devil himself.

An Unsurrendered Testimony

How we can praise God that He has gathered out a people for His name. In the Hebrew children we have a type of a Church with an unsurrendered testimony. Refusing to bow down and worship, they are brought before the king, and the bitter hatred, the pride and arrogance in his heart is evidenced in the threat, "Who is that God that shall deliver you out of my hands?" Dan. 3:15. How that spirit is being loosed in the world today. The spirit of Antichrist has already reared its head in Russia, rising in all its hateful power in an anti-God movement, claiming that even as it has torn kings from their thrones, it will yet tear the Most High God from His throne. Who can fail to recognize the picture in Rev. 13:5, "There was given unto him a mouth speaking great things and blasphemies." Is the spirit of the Hebrew children being manifested in Russia today? Yes, even to the death. There was a cheerfulness in the answer of these Hebrews that must have further enraged and struck a deeper hate into the heart of the king, "We are not careful to answer thee in this matter . . . our God whom we serve is able to deliver us out of thine hand, O king. But if not, be it known unto thee . . . that we will not serve thy gods, nor worship the golden image which thou hast set up." Dan. 3:17, 18.

The Furnace

We have a picture here of what hate can do. "Then was Nebuchadnezzar full of fury" and he commanded that the furnace should be heated seven times hotter than it was wont to be heated. "The mystery of iniquity" that has worked from the beginning has ever

sought to destroy a people with an unsurrendered testimony. Was not the furnace heated in the days of the early Christian church when, at the command of Nero, the Christians were thrown to the lions? Was it not thrice heated in the days of the Inquisition when every devilish means was used to cause men and women to recant? Their bodies became living torches to the witness of the gospel. But at what cost will the testimony of Jesus Christ be held in the day when the furnace is seven times heated? Nebuchadnezzar "commanded the most mighty men that were in his army to bind Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego." The devil does not underrate the strength of a Church that is standing in the power and demonstration of the Spirit, and the strongest resistance that the enemy can bring to bear upon the saints will be used in the last days.

The Clothed Church

"Then these men were bound in their coats, their hosen, and their hats, . . . and were cast into the midst of the burning fiery furnace." Not with weapons of carnality shall we conquer, taking up the sword only to cut off the hearing, but clothed upon with the righteousness of Chrst, having on the helmet of salvation, our feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace, we shall be made more than conquerors through Him that loved us and gave Himself for us. How swiftly retribution falls upon the one who lays hands upon God's anointed. Even as these men were cast into the furnace, their enemies were destroyed with the strength of the flames. God will avenge His own elect and the word, "He suffered no man to do them wrong: yea, He reproved kings for their sakes, saying, Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm," (1 Chron. 16: 21, 22), comes with a new meaning.

The Fourth One in the Fire

But with Nebuchadnezzar let us look into the fire. Not three men but four are there, and the king cries out in fear and amazement: "Lo, I see four men loose, walking in the midst of the fire, and they have no hurt; and the form of the fourth is like the Son of God." How did he know who it was that stood with them? Truly, the saints cannot be separated from the love of Christ by fire or peril or sword; and the devil can have little satisfaction as he is made to realize that the fourth One walks in the fire as the Stephens with angel faces look away from the present sufferings and endure, beholding Him who is invisible.

The Overcoming Church

"And the princes, governors, and captains, and the king's counsellors, being gathered together, saw these men upon whose bodies the fire had no power, nor was an hair of their head singed, neither were their coats changed, nor the smell of fire had passed on them." Praise God for the victory of Calvary. In the days when the Lord comes with ten thousand of His saints to execute judgment upon the ungodly, all principalities and powers that have arrayed themselves against Christ and His Church shall see that she has been preserved unto His coming.

Last Days-Fast Days

There was never a time when a clearer call to separation was sounded to God's people than today. Even as the enemy moves quickly, gathering his forces for that last great rush, God is moving quickly, calling out a people for His name. But a grave danger lies upon the one who refuses to obey God.

The angel's word to Lot as he drew him out of the doomed city of Sodom was not more imperative than it is to-day, "Haste thee, escape thither." Gen. 19:22. Men and women, get right with God. We dare not play with sin lest we be snared and taken with its conditions. Gross darkness is surely closing in upon the earth, but Paul says, "But ye, brethren, are not in darkness that that day should overtake you as a thief." "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." Amen!

"Skubala"

Let me call your attention to a word which is only used once in the New Testament, though quite commonly in profane writers—*Skubala*. Phil. 3:8.

Just before this, Paul has been warning the Philippians against that subtle danger of having confidence in the flesh. He speaks of those who "mind earthly things" as dogs, and then proceeds to describe the earthly things which he himself once minded: his family connections and pride of race, his attainments and zeal.

"But," he continues, "all these were but loss and dross, and sink into insignificance, now that I have Christ."

Ah Paul! You have now found the true riches. Your attention is taken off the achievements and glories of Paul, and for eternity you will be taken up with the surpassing excellencies of *Christ*. You may well count the rest but *affal* that you may gain Him.

It is not a nice word. And the Authorised Version makes it even worse than it really is. "Skubala" really means "That which is thrown to the dogs." You shake the table-cloth, and the dogs come to pick up the crumbs. Matt. 15:29. You dress

the fowl for the table, but you throw the head, legs, etc., into the garbage bin.

Now what would you think of the man who turned from the nicely cooked chicken on the table, and went after the *Skubala?* See the foolish fellow! The rest are enjoying their meal, but he must go outside and dive into the refuse of the garbage can, to see if he can find that old head and legs.

You say "He must be mad." See! He carries his prize around, and displays it as though he had found treasure indeed. He wants the rest of the family to leave their pleasant meal at the table, and to join him with his *Skubala*. "No, no sir! We are too contented with what we have."

But let me draw your attention a little more closely to the *Skubala* of which Paul speaks. Why the very first item is "Circumcised the eighth day, of the stock of Israel." Phil. 3:5.

Friend! Do you begin to recognize the picture that I have drawn? Have you not seen foolish people like that? They compile endless genealogies, true or imaginary. They draw all sorts of fancied comparisons, and stretch their powers of inventive conception beyond all bounds.

There they go again to the garbage bin. And after all their waste of precious time and money what do they fetch out? Some old head and legs of Anglo-Israelism! Throw it away man! That's Skubala. It may be fit for the dogs, but not for the children at the table. We have Christ, and His glories will suffice us for eternity, without our putting ourselves upon the vain-glorious pedestal of superiority to other races. I will neither boast in being British nor in being Israel. God forbid that I should boast save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me and I unto the world. Gal. 6:14.—Redemption Tidings.

The Vineyards of Israel

"'The vineyards of Israel have ceased to exist, but the Eternal enjoined the children of Israel to celebrate the vintage. A race that persists in celebrating their vintage, although they have no fruits to gather, will regain their vineyards.' This prophecy which Disraeli put into the mouth of his Tancred is finding fulfillment sooner than he could have dreamed." writes Dr. Chalmers in Jewish Missionary Magazine. "Today there are 120 Jewish settlements in Palestine and at least 27,000 Jews are engaged in agricultural work. In October, 1933 the 225,000 Jews constituted about one fifth of the total population estimated at 1,150,000. Some 50,000 Jews form the rural and agricultural population, and there are over 400 co-operative societies in connection with this 'back to the soil' movement.'



A Question and Answer

Christ spoke a parable to the chief priests and elders of Israel concerning "a certain householder," who planted a vineyard, and let it out to husbandmen. When the time of fruit drew near, he sent his servants to the husbandmen, that they might receive the fruits of it. And the husbandmen took his servants, beat some, and killed others. But last of all he sent his son, saying, "They will rever-ence my son." But the husbandmen said, "This is the heir; come, let us kill him and let us seize on his inheritance." And so they caught him and cast him out of the vineyard, and slew him. Then Christ asked these rulers, "When the lord there-fore of the vineyard cometh, what will he do unto those husbandmen?" They answered, "He will miserably destroy those wicked men, and will let out his vineyard unto other husbandmen, which shall render him the fruits in their season."

The Headstone

Then Christ said to these rulers, "Did ye never read in the scriptures, The stone which the builders rejected, the same is become the head of the corner?" They were all familiar with this scripture, for it is found in the last part of the Hallel (Psalms 113-118), which was sung at all the great Jewish feasts, at Passover, Pentecost and Tabernacles. There is an old Jewish tradition, with which all these rulers were doubtless familiar, that when the Temple of Solomon was built, a special stone was prepared in the quarries and marked to occupy the crowning position. But the builders looked at this stone and thought it was not good enough for the They took up stone after headstone. stone that they thought more worthy for the commanding position. But none of these stones fitted. At last they had to come back to the stone they had despised and rejected. This stone fitted beautifully! And so they sang, "The stone which the builders rejected is after all become the Headstone of the corner. This is the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes."

Identifying the Stone

The records of Scripture show plainly how the leaders of Israel rejected and mistreated the prophets God sent. And last of all they despised, rejected, and crucified His Son. After the day of Pentecost, when all Jerusalem was stirred by the healing of the lame man at the Beautiful Gate, Peter and John had to appear before all the leaders of Israel to answer to the charge, "By what power,

or by what name, have ye done this?" Peter had a special filling of the Holy Ghost for the occasion and replied, "Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole. This is the stone which was set at nought of you builders, which is become the head of the corner."

Israel's Rejection

Christ uttered a notable prediction as to the judgment that would come to the husbandmen, and He applied it directly to these rulers of Israel. "The kingdom of God shall be taken from you, and given to a nation bringing forth the fruits thereof." To Saul, Israel's first king, the prophet Samuel said, "Because thou hast rejected the word of the Lord, He hath also rejected thee from being king.' And now the nation of Israel as a whole was rejecting the Word, the living Word; whom God had sent; and as a result God was rejecting them. Samuel said to Saul, "The Lord hath rent the kingdom of Israel from thee this day, and hath given it to a neighbor of thine, that is better than thou." And here we see the kingdom taken away from the people of Israel and given to "strangers and pilgrims" who have believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God, born-again ones who "in times past were not a people, but are now the people of God." 1 Peter 2:10.

A Stone of Stumbling

Our Lord further predicted, "And whosoever shall fall on this stone shall be broken." Years before, Isaiah had foretold the coming of the Son of God, "He shall be for a sanctuary." Thus He was to be a shelter, a place of refuge for those who would put their trust in Him. But foreseeing the rejection of the Son of God the prophet further declared that He should also be "for a stone of stumbling and for a rock of offence to both the houses of Israel. . . . And many among them shall stumble, and fall, and be broken, and be snared, and be taken." Isa. 8:14, 15. Thus judgment was to come to the nation of Israel as a whole, and also to the individuals in the nation who would reject Him. Contrast the place of those who accept His Word: "Great peace have they which love thy law (and Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone that believeth), they shall have no stumbling block." Psalm 119:165, Hebrew.

The Judgment of Gentiles

Christ had a further word to say concerning judgment. "On whomsoever it (the stone) shall fall, it will grind him to powder." This prediction surely takes us back to Daniel's prophecy concerning the stone cut out without hands, smiting the image that symbolizes Gentile dominion, which Nebuchadnezzar saw in his dream: "Thou sawest till that a stone was cut out without hands, which smote the image upon his feet. . . . Then was the iron, the clay, the brass, the silver, and the gold, broken to pieces together, and became like the chaff of the summer threshing floors . . . and the stone that smote the image became a great mountain and filled the whole earth." Daniel interpreted this to mean that in the last days, in the days of the last ten Gentile kings, "shall the God of heaven set up a kingdom, which shall never be destroyed . . . it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand forever." Dan. 2:44. This stone will fall on the nations that are rejecting the Son of God, and will make them as the chaff of the summer threshing floor; and it will also fall on the individuals who reject Him, grinding them to powder.

The Headstone in Place

In due time, thank God, the rejected Stone will have His rightful place, not only with those who now believe in Him, but also with Israel and the nations. When will this be? When the Spirit is poured forth from on high. In the 4th chapter of Zechariah we read of the golden oil being poured from two olive trees through golden pipes into seven lamps— to give a bright and shining light. The symbol of the oil is interpreted, "Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts." With the coming of the fullness of the Spirit all obstacles have to go. The mountain will become a plain; and the record tells us, "He shall bring forth the headstone thereof with shoutings, crying Grace, grace unto it." Thus shall our Christ, the Stone, once rejected, become absolutely pre-eminent in all things. As our God pours upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem the Spirit of grace and of supplication, they shall look upon Him whom they pierced. They will first mourn, but later their mourning will be turned into joy. Then will Israel cry, as it is shown in the last part of the Hallel, and as Christ indicated as He wept over the Jerusalem that was to reject Him, "Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord." Psalm 118:26; Matt. 23:39. And all nations shall recognize Him as the rightful Heir of the Heavenly Husbandmen. And abundance of fruit shall be rendered unto God.

Blessed Be Our Rock
While to some the Lord is a "rock of

offence," David prayed, "Be thou my strong rock, for a house of defence to save." He declared, "Goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life." But Paul personified that goodness and mercy when he spoke of the spiritual Rock that followed the children of Israel, declaring "that Rock was Christ." He is the Rock that will never fail to follow us, ever providing spiritual refreshment by the way. Drink deeply of the river of the Spirit that continually flows from the Rock. There is also

plenty of honey to be drawn from this Rock.

According to Solomon one of the things that is exceeding wise is the coney. Prov. 30:24. In what does the wisdom of the coney consist? If a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour, is in the vicinity, the coney does not go out and attempt to fight him. By no means. He is wise enough to run to the rock as his refuge. Learn from the wise little coney, and take eternal shelter in the Rock of ages. Run to this open Rock, this cleft Rock, right now.

The New Deal and New Hearts

A six weeks drouth in Clinton county has been broken but once before by a light shower."

Munitions

What is one of the elements that keeps the fires of war burning? Selfish moneymaking! According to Public Opinion the League of Nations reports as follows on the war between Paraguay and Bolivia: "The rival armies are using weapons, such as flame-throwers and automatic rifles, which are not manufactured locally, but are supplied by American and European firms. It is suggested that without these supplies from abroad the war would at least become less horrible and pitiless, and might come quickly to an end."

Hebrew-Christian Conference

The vitality of Jewish Christianity is reflected in the announcment made by Sir Leon Levison, head of the International Hebrew Christian Alliance, in which he calls a conference for the consideration of the following subjects: "the formation of a Hebrew Christian Church; the Hebrew Christian Colony in Palestine; (and an agricultural training center for Hebrew Christians in Poland); and a Forward Movement."

Growth of Church Membership

The Association of American Religious Statisticians reports that in 1933 the religious bodies of this country showed a total net gain of 655,482. The Methodists gained first place with an increase of 213,662. The Baptists were second, with a gain of 193,571. The grand total of membership in all denominations reached the impressive figure of 60,812,874.

If the figures represented the number of real, spiritual Christians there would be cause for rejoicing; but we fear that if a test of the Gideon type were put to this membership there would be a most concerting shrinkage. Judges 7:1-7.

Dictatorship

The world's trend toward dictatorship, and hence to the dictator, is described by MacNeal, in Capper's Weekly.

"There are two kinds of dictatorships: Communism and Facism. The only Communist dictatorship is Soviet Russia with a population of approximately 168,000,000. But there are a number of fascist dictatorships. Germany with a population of 66,000,000, Italy with 42,000,000, Poland 32,000,000, Turkey 14,000,000, Yugoslavia 14,000,000, Hungary 8,700,000, Austria 6,750,000 and Esthonia 1,150,000, a total of 184,600,000 population for the fascist countries. Apparently Fascism is growing much faster than Communism. Even in Russia the Soviet government is swinging steadily in the direction of Fascism."

It is best not to cultivate a habit of using too many endearing expressions when in prayer as we must remember the great dignity of Jesus in His deity. On the other hand if one's heart is overflowing with love and devotion to Christ it is far better that it be expressed in some endearing manner than for one to become a stilted formalist whose addressing Jesus as "Lord" amounts to nothing more than a stately expression. If we must choose between our head or our heart leading us in prayer let it be our heart.—E. S. W.

The Sunday School Jesson

Ahijah and the Divided Kingdom

Lesson 1, July 1: 1 Kings 11:29-39.

Our lesson centers around three persons: Solomon the king, Ahijah the prophet, and Jeroboam the king to be.

I. SOLOMON'S FAILURE

The Promising Beginning. 1 Kings 3. Solomon began his reign after a life dedicated to Jehovah. At an offering of a thousand burnt offerings (an expression of entire consecration) the Lord appeared unto him and graciously said, "Ask, what shall I give thee?" The king unselfishly asked the gift of wisdom in order that he might faithfully rule his people. This gift, and others, were granted, so that Solomon became the wisest man of his or any other time.

The Sad Ending. Colporteur Pantel, of Marseilles, France, once offered a Bible to an old man who angrily replied, "Wine is my god." "Indeed," answered Pantel, "then let me tell you that you have not imitated your god." "What do you mean?" "Well, the wine becomes better as it grows old, while you, as you have grown old, have become worse." Solomon's old age found him, not on the path of the righteous that shineth more and more unto the perfect day, but on the ever darkening road of apostasy. "And it came to pass, when Solomon was old" (1 Kings 11:4) that he turned from God to folly.

Let us briefly trace the path that led to his apostasy. On his accession to the throne he consolidated the empire of his father David and for a time gave the nation a measure of prosperity hitherto unknown. He established a magnificent court that became the wonder of the surrounding nations. But later he was moved with the ambition to become a mighty emperor like those of the Gentiles. In attempting to realize this ambition he burdened the people with taxation (1 Kings 12:1-4), and engaged in commercial enterprises that later introduced worldliness, immorality, and idolatry into Israel. In order to strengthen himself politically by securing the support of powerful fathers-in-law he married foreign princesses. These led him into idolatry so that Solomon the Wise became Solomon the Foolish.

The Inevitable Sequel. After the death of the priests Nadab and Abihu, who died for their sacrilege, the Lord said, "I will be sanctified in them that come nigh me." Lev. 10:1-3. In other words, those occupying high positions in Jehovah's kingdom need not expect to be excused from the obligations laid upon other people. Indeed more will be required of them, for the greater the privileges the greater the responsibility. It is written concerning Solomon that "the Lord loved him" (2 Sam. 12:24), but that did not save him from chastisement and judgment.

II. AHIJAH'S MESSAGE

(1 Kings 11:29, 30, 39)

Judgment's Messenger. As Jehovah many years ago sent Samuel to anoint a successor to the rejected Saul so He now sends Ahijah to hand over Solomon's kingdom, or ten tribes of this kingdom to another. The prophet occupied the official position of Chronicler at Solomon's court (2 Chron. 9:29); but, with the word of Jehovah in his soul, loyalty to a backslidden king would mean disloyalty to God. He obeyed the divine command to select the successor who should punish the king's rebellion against God.

Judgment Signified. "And it came to pass at that time that when Jeroboam went out of Jerusalem that the prophet Ahijah the Shilonite found him in the way; and he (the prophet) had clad himself with a new garment; and they two were alone in the field. And Ahijah caught the new garment that was on him and rent it into twelve pieces: and he said to Jeroboam, Take thee ten pieces: for thus saith the Lord, the God of Israel, Behold I will rend the kingdom out of the hand of Solomon, and will give ten tribes to thee; but he shall have one tribe for my servant David's sake." With this acted parable Ahijah predicted the secession of the ten tribes under Jeroboam as a divine punishment for Solomon's personal secession from God. Notice that the judgment is limited for "David's sake"-a faint type of the truth that God stays and delivers from judgment for the sake of David's divine Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.

The following question naturally arises: "The prophet rent the garment into twelve parts; but in giving ten parts to Jeroboam and reserving one for the house of David he accounted only for eleven. The following appears to be the explanation: the tribe of Simeon, which lay south of Judah, had become assimilated with and its territory attached to Judah. Compare Gen. 49:5, 7. Therefore, while there were twelve tribes as to indentity, there were only eleven sections of tribal territory. A short time after the division of the kingdom the greater part of the tribe of Benjamin sided with Judah—a

The Judgment Explained. "Because they have forsaken me, and have worshipped Ashtoreth the goddess of the Zidonians, Chemosh the god of the Moabites, and Milcom the god of the children of Ammon, and have not walked in my ways, to do that which is right in mine eyes, and to keep my statutes and my judgments, as did David his father." The deities (rather, devils, 1 Cor. 10:19, 20) mentioned here had this one thing in common, that they were nature gods upon whom the people depended for agricultural and pastoral increase, and part of whose worship consisted in the performance of acts of impurity. These acts, imagined the heathen, would bring the god's blessing upon their crops. In those days idolatry and immorality were practically synonymous; and a knowledge of the religions of the Canaanites will impress upon us vividly why God insisted on Israel being a "holy nation." No doubt Solomon "fixed" his conscience, sprinkled his corrupt policies with some philosophical perfume, and probably reasoned thus: "Well, we must be broad-minded, and meet these nations half way; after all we must not be so narrow as to suppose that we have all the truth and that we cannot learn anything from other religions, etc." But woe unto the engineer who feels too broad-minded to keep on those narrow tracks laid by the railroad! Solomon, the guide of Israel, ran the nation off the track of God's laws, and the result was political destruction—the division of his kingdom. And what is true of a nation is true of the individual. The Gospel train runs on a narrow-gauge track but it gets you safe to heaven!

III. JEROBOAM'S OPPORTUNITY

(1 Kings 11:37, 38)

Said Jehovah to Jeroboam: "And it shall be, if thou wilt hearken unto all that I command thee, and walk in my ways, and do that is right in my sight, to keep my statutes and commandments, as David my servant did: that I will be with thee and build thee a sure house, as I built for David, and will give Israel unto thee." As in the case of Saul, God gave Jeroboam the opportunity of becoming the founder of a permanent dynasty over the kingdom of Israel; but like Saul, he forfeited his opportunity. makes two kinds of promises: unconditional promises and prophecies, for example, the promise that a descendant of David should always occupy his throne, in spite of the sinfulness of any of his descendants (Sam. 7:12-16); conditional promises and prophecies, according to the principle stated in Jer. 18:7-10 and illustrated in Jonah 3: 4-10. In the case of Jeroboam the conditions were not met and therefore the promises were not fulfilled. His family was removed and destroyed in the second generation. If he had only obeyed God-"If" what a tragic word that is, a word that will render more unbearable the pains of hell, that place of unavailing remorse and futile regrets. God help us, while there is yet time, to turn the future tense of opportunity into the past tense of achievement.-Myer Pearlman.

GOSPEL PENETRATING TIBET

In a recent letter Brother Plymire tells of taking the message of Jesus Christ into many villages of Tibet. By following a plan which he has worked out he hopes to be able to canvass the entire district. He writes: "We have an extremely strong feeling that our time for the evangelization of these people is drawing rapidly to a close. God has been blessing us greatly during the past few months in helping us to spread out and reach many new places with the gospel. In February we journeyed to the south and canvassed the villages there. Then, turning eastward and northward, we reached many more new places, and finally our westward turn led us back home. Thus we have been able to practically cover the district to the southeast of us.

"We are working along the line of sectional evangelization. We believe by doing this we save much time and money, and can accomplish a great deal in a short time. We are now planning another section and hope to be out in a few days. We are hoping to reach every village in this district and in this way everyone will have the opportunity of hearing the gospel message at least *nce. We also leave at least one Bible or New Testament in each village. We can travel westward for months without coming near any other mission.

"On our trip just referred to we stopped at the most famous and largest lamasery in eastern Tibet for several days. This place houses some 3,600 lamas. It was fair time and we took advantage of this opportunity to give out the message, gathering the people together in little groups at the side of the rushing crowds.

"Immediately upon return from this trip we took one well into the North. This was rather hurried and difficult because we feared by delay we might get snowed in on the north side of these high mountains. One pass was 18,000 feet above sea level and several others not far below. There was much ice and deep snow, making travel rather hazardous, but we were happy being in His will. We preached in many villages and gave out considerable literature. Many were very eager to receive a Bible. This is still a time of sowing, but we know if you will pray, God will cause the seed thus sown to bring forth fruit.

"We wish you could just come in some Sunday and see our Sunday school here. The place is crowded with boys and girls. These have been learning portions from the Word and some do very well. God is also blessing in the special meeting held for the women. Some are being moved upon to come out for the Lord, but fear seems to be holding them back. Please pray that God will send mighty conviction to the people of this city and the surrounding villages, and that many will turn to the Lord.

"Pray much that God will strengthen our bodies and that the coming summer months, should Jesus tarry, may be fruitful ones.

We need your earnest prayers as we travel still another place five were saved and three among these people, that our lives may be preserved for His honor and glory. We do not ask for ease, comfort, luxury, nor for extended time in which to accomplish our task, but we do ask that you pray God to help us to labor now with all our might, for the time is short.'

GOOD REPORT FROM PERSIA

In a letter recently received from Brother John Warton, now home on furlough from Persia, he tells of the splendid work being carried on by the native workers in his absence. He says: "Last week I received a few letters from my native workers in Persia, and the good reports brought great joy to my heart. As we have been supporting these faithful workers, who are preaching the gospel in our absence, the Lord has been graciously blessing and using them for His glory and the salvation of souls.

"In Rezaeah, where most of our Pentecostal assemblies are, there is no missionary at present, but the work is being cared for by the native preachers. Their zeal and love for God and His work is great, even though their support is very small, and the Lord is honoring their efforts. They write me that they have been having some special services in different places with good results. In a village called Mushavah ten have been saved and thirteen received the Baptism with the Holy Spirit. In another village ten were saved and five received the Baptism. In received the Holy Spirit, and nine were saved in other villages.

"There is a real hunger in the hearts of the people, and many villages and towns are just waiting for the gospel, but the workers are so few that it is almost impossible to reach these hungry souls. Many of the workers have been compelled to leave the gospel work to go into secular work in order to support their families. Please pray that the Lord will supply their need so that they can give their whole time to the preaching of the gospel. Pray also for us that we may soon be with them again on the field."

DELIVERED FROM SCORPION STING

The following testimony of the mighty power of God to care for His own even in heathen lands comes to us in a letter written by Miss Anna Helmbrecht, upon her arrival in the United States from India:

"Just one week before sailing, while down on my knees one night praying, I felt a prick just below my knee. At once I suspected what it was, and there found a large scorpion. As I was alone I had no one to stand with me in prayer. Scorpion stings are not fatal, but those stung suffer intense agony, and sometimes become unconscious for a time. I realized there was no time to be lost so set to work to battle through in prayer. At first there seemed to be no relief and the swelling began to rise. Pains began shooting all through my body, but the need of the hour constrained me to continue the battle.

"I continued in prayer for about two hours: then I decided I could retire. The spot remained very sore and there was a sensation like that of a scorpion crawling around the spot that was stung. My nerves were badly upset but there was no intense suffering. For more than twenty years the Lord has spared me any such experience as being stung by a scorpion, but this time the Lord showed me His hand of deliverance when I was in need. Sometimes we do not realize how much His protecting hand means to us until it becomes necessary for Him to stretch it out in deliverance."

NEWS NOTES FROM IVORY COAST Arnold C. Weston

The attendance at all services in the little church is from two to three times what it was when we came—all praise be to Him. Never before have I seen such working of the Lord, and never before have I felt so disassociated with the results. We pray and give out the Word, to be sure, but it is the Lord that giveth the increase.

The burden of the unoccupied territories here in West Africa is heavily upon me. All northern Togo and Dahomey are without a single witness to Jesus Christ; Mauretania is without a witness; and there is no work north of the Niger River, though there are hundreds and hundreds of towns with thousands of people—and Jesus said to preach the gospel to every creature!

God has many times placed His seal upon our ventures into the bush; literally scores and scores have been saved already. Just last week fully 50 were born again and they are still coming. Each one is dealt with individually and knows well the foundation teachings of the Bible on Salvation. At first we attempted to keep a record of those who are saved, but have given it up as a hopeless task. When we commence to baptize, we expect to keep accurate records, showing the name, town, and date of baptism.

We are especially encouraged by reports which come to us from out-of-the-way villages where there may be but one or two Christians. Invariably they continue on in the light they possess. In fact the most of the Christians in this section show evidence of going on with the Lord. Surely they make mistakes and backslide somewhat, but

with humble confession they make known their guilt and ask for prayer.

Two boys, Dawoko and Tiaga, from the Bible School at Ouagadougou, have come to help us here. Without exhortation of white men they came to the conclusion that the Lord wanted them to help us here, so we praise the Lord for sending help at this time.

During the past month we have been visiting three new towns. The number of people who listen to the message in these places each week is between 750 and 800. Their interest is great and we expect a harvest of souls from these villages shortly.

We have assumed this new work under pressure of the Spirit and in faith that He will provide for His work. The new step requires an additional distance of 130 kilometres to be traveled each week. Already we are sending Miss Hill's car down the Gold Coast road each week on Saturdays and to either the road toward Fada or to Ouagadougou on Wednesday. With gasoline at about seventy cents a gallon all this counts up, but our faith is in Him. To date we have not been without means to provide the necessary gas. We fully believe that as we move forward in His will He will provide.

BRIEF NOTES FROM FAR AND NEAR Kaya, French West Africa

We are glad to report twenty-three converts for this month, also that three received the Baptism with the Holy Spirit, and several have been healed by the Lord.—Arthur E. Wilson.

Amichow, Southwest China

The women of our church are receiving the Baptism with the Spirit one after another, and some of the men are very near to being filled. A lady past seventy years of age, recently received the Holy Spirit, speaking in other tongues. An old couple have completely destroyed all traces of idol worship, have hung Christian pictures and Bible verses on their walls, and now are rejoicing in the Lord. It is wonderful to see these dear old people coming to Christ after years of idolatry. We are having blessed times in our village work and the people are becoming more friendly each time.—Grace Agar.

Tamale, Gold Coast, W. Africa

These eight represented six different tribes, scattered from the coast to the upper boundary of the Northern Territories. Plans are now under way for the erection of a church near here to accommodate four or five villages. This will meet a real need and give the interested ones a definite place to gather to hear more of the Word. The Christians who have been baptized are now tarrying each week for the Holy Spirit, and it is wonderful to hear them pray and praise the Lord.-H. B. Garlock.

EXILED FOR CHRIST'S SAKE

The first letter from Mrs. J. E. Voronaeff who was arrested last year and more recently sent into exile has been received by her boys who are with us in Springfield. She writes: 'Gracious and dear children: I arrived here at . . . March 24, and here I am living and

working. We are staying in a damp cellar and I am occupied in sorting potatoes. In several days I shall be put on different work outside planting onions and different vegetables. My health is very bad, and I am told that I have heart trouble and that I might drop dead at any time without warning. The work makes me feel so ill, but I cannot get any excuse from working. I suppose I shall have to work on till I drop. There are few that return from here; the life is so hard. I do not know whether I shall ever see you any more. Do your best to learn and take good care of little Timothy and Hope. With kisses, your loving Mama."

It is easy to understand that our sister has to be careful what she writes. Another letter from a friend in Russia tells of the urgent need of doing everything possible to get our sister out of Russia at this time, otherwise she is almost certain to die. We are active in every way we know in soliciting the help of the authorities and we trust that God may yet answer prayer and deliver this poor soul, but like the three Hebrew children we are sure that if deliverance is not to be granted she and her husband are ready to die rather than to yield up their loyalty to God and their trust in Jesus Christ as Saviour. Beloved friends let us not fail these dear ones in failing to pray for them in this time of need. The money sent for the family is being used to send parcels to Brother and Sister Voronaeff and also to help bring little Hope and Timothy to the United States where they will be provided for by the General Council until they may be returned to their parents or are old enough to take care of themselves. All offerings sent to help meet these needs are deeply appreciated.

During the past month I visited Foo Yung and Kom Chong, and in both places spoke to about two hundred people, sold a number of Gospels, and visited many of the homes. 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


