OW He which stablisheth us with you in Christ, and hath anointed us, is God; who hath also sealed us, and given the earnest of the Spirit in our hearts." 2 Cor. 1:21, 22

When we turn to this subject of the anointing, you will find the foundation in the Old Testament. There are three classes of people who were anointed. First of all you find they anointed the priests. When Aaron was set apart for his highpriestly office, Moses took the oil and poured it upon him. They anointed men to be prophets. When Elijah had to appoint one in his room

he was bidden to anoint Elisha. Thirdly, they anointed men to be kings. Samuel was sent to the household of Jesse, and they had to bring in the youthful shepherd lad, chosen to be the future king of Israel. So we see that men were anointed to be priests; to be prophets; and to be kings. But all this wonderful anointing in the Old Testament was only typical; it led up to the great Anti-type; it centered, as everything centers, in the Lord Jesus Christ.

"The Anointed"

We sometimes forget that the name "Christ" simply means "The Anointed." It is not just a proper name. He is pre-eminently the Anointed One. When we say Jesus Christ we really say Jesus the Anointed One!

I think of that wonderful Sabbath day as He stood in the Synagogue. I love the quiet humility and the grandeur and authority of my blessed Lord, as He stands up there and opens the roll where it is written: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me; because he hath anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor." He stood there as the "Christ," as the One who was anointed. I remember the Apostle's words, afterwards, when he said how God "anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power."

Now I want you to notice when we come to the Lord Jesus Christ, there is some-The old priests and the thing new. prophets and the kings had been anointed by some other man; they were men with a Divine commission, but when we come to my blessed Lord-who anointed Him? "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because the Lord hath anointed me," . . . and the Apostle's words-"God anointed Him." . . . When I come to the Lord Jesus Christ I find there is a Divine anointing, God anoints Him.

With what was the Lord Jesus anointed? Was it with oil? I never read it; but I find this, He was anointed with the Holy Ghost.

Now I have something wonderful to tell you, and this is that we are anointed too! Oh, wonderful! When we are in Christ, we are anointed with exactly the same anointing that the Lord Jesus Christ

received; I don't mean in measure, but in its essence. The Lord Jesus Christ was not anointed by man, but by God, and so are we! "He which stablisheth us with you in Christ, and hath anointed us, is

I thank God for this wonderful, Scriptural truth that we are anointed by

The Anointing

God Himself. No man gave and no man can take away. Christ is the Head, and we are members of the Body, and the anointing that came on the Head is coming on the Body. That wonderful 133rd Psalm says "it ran down to the skirts of the garment." I think we are somewhere about the skirts of the garment, but the oil has reached us! If you want to know the secret of this liberty it is the oil,-We are well lubricated; I bless God for the oil. Hallelujah for the Oil. And it is God who is doing it. I look at the Lord Jesus Christ and I see how God anointed Him, and I say, "Lord, you are doing the same for me." When we see that God anointed His dear Son with the blessed Holy Spirit, and find God giving the same wonderful blessed Holy Spirit to-day, do you wonder that our hearts are filled with joy? Hallelujah!

Anointed for Priesthood

They anointed men with oil in the Old Testament for three offices. We are anointed with the Holy Spirit for these same three offices. First of all we have been anointed with the Holy Ghost that we may serve God as priests. We are a priesthood, and God has anointed us with the blessed Holy Spirit that we should be His priests. No man could serve God as priest unless he was anointed. I want to emphasize that. If we are going to serve God acceptably as priests in this dispensation, it must be under the anointing. "God is a Spirit, and they that worship Him must worship Him in Spirit and in truth, for the Father seeketh such to worship Him." That does not leave much room for that which is of the flesh and carnal. I want you to bear me witness; isn't there a wonderful difference when ministry is under the anointing? How many of you have detected the difference? There are some preachers (and I am not wanting to be critical, but I simply want to state the truth) who are not under the anointing of the Spirit, and don't we feel it? And there are some preachers that are and don't we feel it? I believe some of our ideas of reverence have been that which is acceptable to man; but when the anointing is on our

praise, however imperfect it may be musically, I believe it is acceptable to God. Oh praise God for the anointing! It makes our praiseful service acceptable to Him.

We can apply this to preachers and sermons. What is the good of a preacher without the anointing? I even read somewhere in the Old Book about speak-

ing with tongues sometimes being like sounding brass and a tinkling cymbal! We need the anointing for everything that is to be acceptable, and I bless God that the anointing has been richly poured out, and the humblest and the weakest of us can receive it! I thank God that the

anointing comes upon the humblest servant of God, and his humblest service then becomes acceptable with God. Oh friends, see that you get the anointing!

There was another result of the priest in being anointed,—it separated him; and I want to also emphasize that word "separation." I believe no one should be so separated as the one filled with the Holy Ghost. I believe no people should be so separated as Pentecostal people, because the anointing of God is on us! You say "This is drastic." When you come to the Spirit-filled life things are drastic! God is drastic! There is something more drastic needed to-day. We need drastic lives and drastic teaching. This anointing has come on us to separate us. You think God is going to anoint you with the Holy Ghost, and then let you go about the world as usual. God has anointed you to separate you. If you want to really enter into the will of God you will find it will demand a separated life as it never did before. He tells us to be separated. When we are tempted to go to certain places and mix in certain company, we must say, "The anointing oil of God is upon me, and I cannot do it, I dare not do it, and I will not go there." Do you think that my little girl, when she has a clean white frock on, would go where they are spraying tar on the road? Of course not. She has too much respect for her frock, and we must have too much respect for the wonderful anointing God has given us. Keep away from the devil's tar spraying! There are some places you cannot go when you are anointed with the Holy Spirit. God rivet it to our hearts and consciences.

Anointed for Prophets

Then we are anointed to be prophets; yes, praise God, we are. What is the special characteristic of the prophet? It is receiving revelation, and I praise God through the anointing we have had revelation. I think of that wonderful word in John, where it says, "The anointing abideth and teacheth us all things." Thank God for the spirit of revelation. Thank God, as soon as we have been baptized with the Holy Ghost the blessed Spirit shows us the difference between truth and error. I believe when you have the blessed Holy Ghost there will be a quiet voice inside which will always tell us the difference. A very humble and uneducated man came to me three weeks ago with a magazine in his hand, and he said, "I don't understand this, I cannot fathom it at all, but someone gave it to me to read, but I cannot make it out. I want you to look at it and tell me what you think of it. But," he added, "although I cannot understand it, there is something in here that tells me it is wrong." Praise the Lord! I have discovered that when I have taken up books and periodicals, before I

have had time to put them into the crucible as I have done afterwards, and compared them with the Word of God, before I have had time to do this something in here has said to me "This is error." There are hundreds who can witness to that truth. I bless God we have the inward voice that tells the difference between truth and error, and when I hear a man give forth the truth it may be something more than I have seen up to the present, but if he is giving forth the pure Word of God there is something in me that says "Amen" to it!

When I speak of revelation I always have to speak guardedly, because some precious people of God get a false idea of revelation. They say, "I have had a revelation," but I fear some of it is downright rubbish! You cannot call it

anything else. People bring their foolish ideas and say "The Lord told me this and that," I don't believe the Lord told them anything at all. I am opposed to fanaticism in any shape or form. My friends, we cannot have fanaticism in this movement, but we can listen to the Holy Ghost; and I will show you where the line of real wonderful revelation comes: "He shall take of the things of Christ and reveal them unto you." And I want to say this, you never will know the beauty of Jesus unless the Holy Spirit reveals it to you; you will never know the truth as it is in Jesus unless the Holy Spirit reveals it to you. You may listen

to the finest teaching, but until the Holy Spirit gives you the revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ you will still lack something! You can know much about Jesus Christ, you may hold doctrines about Him, and yet not know Him, but I bless God in the revelation of the Holy Spirit, you will know Him; He will reveal the fullness of the Lord Jesus Christ, and that is the line of revelation the Holy Spirit has been given to us for. stood black and bare under our bleak northern winter. Then the Springtime came, and what happened? Those black trees burst into leaf. There were the little delicate green leaves which grew until there came the lovely foliage which clothes them in the Summer time. This is how I think the revelation of the Holy Spirit comes to us in the Lord Jesus Christ. There is the tree of doctrinal truth which is alive but it awaits the quickening touch. I bless God that when the Holy Spirit comes there is a quickening of truth, and we are in our spiritual springtime and summertime. We are re-

ceiving the revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ

There is of course a distinct prophetic gift as shown by the apostle in 1 Cor. 14:1, "Follow after charity, and desire spiritual gifts, but rather that ye may prophesy." We must continually bear in mind his word to us in 1 Cor. 14:5, "I would that ye all spake with tongues, but rather that ye prophesied." For whom is this gift? He declares, "Ye may all prophesy one by one." v. 31. This is in accord with the promise of Joel quoted by Peter on the day of Pentecost, "And on my servants and on my handmaidens I will pour out in those days of my Spirit:

and they shall prophesy." Let us all covet and receive this precious gift of the Spirit.

Anointed to Be Kings

Lastly, we are anointed to be Kings! Now there is a present sense in which this is true. I thank God there is a sense in which we can triumph in Christ even now; but nevertheless I believe the real meaning of this type is for the future. As I turn to that passage in Corinthians, I see it is a forward look; we are "sealed," what for? "We are sealed unto the day of redemption." And it speaks about the Holy Spirit as "an earnest." An "earnest" is a pledge of what I am going to get in fullness later on! I bless God for the wonderful days I am getting, but it is nothing to what I am going to get there. What will it be like in heaven? We can-

not possibly bear anything like the glory which shall be revealed, but I want you to think of the time when you were most under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, when the Holy Spirit of God was most upon you in glory and power.

Yet remember this, it was only the earnest, the pledge of what is coming; and the anointing is for the future. We are going to live with Christ later on! We are anointed to be kings, and I think of that wonderful king in the Old Testament, that one who shone above all other kings, King David, and I go back to where he was anointed by Samuel years

The Call

The Angel of the Lord came to Gideon and declared, "The Lord is with thee, thou mighty man of valor." Gideon was disturbed. He had been thinking of the former miracles the God of Israel had performed in days gone by, and he questioned, "Oh my Lord, if the Lord be with us, why then is all this befallen us? and where be all the miracles which our fathers told us of, saying, Did not the Lord bring us up from Egypt?" It was the Lord who had performed all those miracles in days gone by who was now talking to Gideon. His arm was not shortened, and He who had wrought miracles in days gone by was just as willing to do His signs and wonders in Israel in Gideon's day as He was in the days of Moses. He has declared, "I am the Lord, I change not." The Lord looked upon Gideon and said, "Go in this thy might. and thou shalt save Israel from the hand of the Midianites: have not I sent thee?"

Endued with Power

When the Lord commissions, He empowers. When He commissioned the twelve to preach the gospel in all the world, He empowered them. And they did not go alone, He went with them; and as they preached the Word He confirmed the Word with signs following. He who wrought mighty signs and wonders when Israel came forth from Egypt, wrought mighty signs and wonders through the hands of His disciples who believed Him. And He will still perform mighty signs and wonders through those who believe on Him. He hath declared, "These signs shall follow them that believe; in my name shall they cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues." He showed them that they should have power over the powers of nature, and He declared, "They shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover." Whom shall these signs follow? The Word of the Lord is, "These signs shall follow them that believe."

Signs and Wonders

With faith there is nothing impossible. He says to His own today as He said of old, "Have faith in God." And He says very emphatically, "Whatsoever things ye desire when ye pray, believe that ye receive them and ye shall have them." He invites His own, "Ask." And He who cannot lie declares, "It shall be given you." He whose Word is ever true declares, "Everyone that asketh receiveth." His arm is not shortened, it is not with-

ered, it has lost none of its power. When His disciples prayed in the early days that His hands might be stretched forth to heal He answered their request. And His disciples today can make the same request with the full assurance that He will answer. His willingness to heal the sick has not changed with the changing days, and His power has not diminished despite the apostasy around. In fact, His disciples can expect greater signs and greater wonders, for they can pray the prayer of one of old, "It is time for thee, Lord, to work: for they have made void thy law." And they can confidently expect when they preach the Word that He will confirm the Word with signs following, as at the beginning.

His Promise

When Gideon was commissioned he spoke disparagingly of himself, saying, "Oh, my Lord, wherewith shall I save Israel? behold, my family is poor in Manasseh, and I am the least in my father's house." And the Lord said unto him, "Surely I will be with thee." Gideon looked at himself. What could he do? Nothing. What can you do by yourself? Nothing. But the promise came that the Lord who made heaven and earth, He who held all the waters in the hollow of His hands and weighed the mountains in scales, and the hills in a balance, who takes up the isles as a very little thing; the All-Sufficient One, the All-Powerful One, the Omniscient One, the One who is always enough for His own-He would be with His servant. And this same Lord to whom has been given all power in heaven and in earth declares, as He commissions His disciples today, "Lo, I am with you alway even unto the end of the age." And His promise, His Word, cannot fail. He declares to His own, "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." He will not suffer His faithfulness to fail, but will be with His own even unto the end.

A Fearful Heart

Gideon went forth. There was an army raised, but there were many fearful ones. These the Lord told him to send home, and twenty-two thousand went home. God cannot use those who are filled with fear. Fear is not begotten of the Word, but faith cometh by the Word. And those who do not live by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God, and are occupied with the words of the enemy who declares, "Yea, hath God said?" that enemy who definitely contradicts the Word of God, these

are full of fear. God hath not given that spirit of fear, but He gives the spirit of love, of power, of a sound mind. The fearful and the unbelieving are not needed in fighting the battles of the Lord. But God has a prescription against fear. He declares that perfect love will cast out fear, and He will shed abroad His love in the hearts of His own through the power of the Holy Ghost if they will come acknowledging their fear, if they will come and listen and hearken to His Word. Those who hearken unto Him shall dwell safely and shall be quiet from the fear of evil.

The Trial of Faith

After the fearful and unbelieving had been sent home, the Lord declared concerning the ten thousand that were left, "These be too many for me." He knew the heart of man, He knew the pride of man, and they would boast that they had won a great victory, and He was content to have just a handful of believing ones. He took them down to the water and there was a test. Today He gives a trial, not a trial of water, but a trial of fire. But the Word of God assures His own, "Think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: but rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy." His own can definitely say, "When he hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold."

The Sword of the Spirit

It was but a little flock, a flock of three hundred who followed G'deon, but the Lord was with them. They followed Gideon and did as they were told. And those who follow a greater than Gideon need to be obedient to His Word for He hath declared, "Whosoever heareth these savings of mine, and doeth them, I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house upon a rock: and the rain descended, and the floods came, and the winds blew, and beat upon that house; and it fell not: for it was founded upon a rock." The three hundred cried, "The sword of the Lord and of Gideon.' There is a sword of the Lord, the Word of God which is the sword of the Spirit, and that thou canst make thine own so that thou canst say, "The sword of the Lord and my sword," for He would have thee live by every word which proceedeth out of His mouth. Said one of old, "Thy words were found, and I did eat them, and they were unto me the joy and rejoicing of my heart." He would have thee eat; partake of the Word of the Lord so that it is thine own, and thou canst say, "The Word of the Lord and my Word, the sword of the Lord and my sword."

A Solemn Warning

With this handful a great victory, a great deliverance, was accomplished. And with a little flock the Lord, who is a Deliverer of His own, a mighty Deliverer, will win the victory over all His enemies. All His enemies shall become His footstool, and His own who follow Him shall reign with Him; and their enemies, the enemies of their Lord, shall be under their feet. There were some who did not follow Gideon and did not help; the men of Succoth, and the men of Penuel came not to the help of the Lord, and would give no aid to Gideon. The same

came under mighty judgment. And there will be a judgment upon all who come not to the help of the Lord against His mighty foes in these days. "Curse ye Meroz, said the Angel of the Lord, curse ye bitterly the inhabitants thereof: because they came not to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty." The challenge still goes forth, "Who is on the Lord's side?" There are many indifferent ones, many lukewarm ones, many slothful ones. The same shall have great judgment; the same shall have the curse of God. Concerning the lukewarm He hath declared, "I will spue them out of my mouth."

Atheism in the Kindergarten

World Dominion makes a quotation from a Russian paper, on anti-religious education in schools. This article speaks with regret that "Religion still holds many millions of our workers, especially in the villages, and a great number of our children are still under the influence of religious ideals. The children, thus, have still to get the poison of religion out of their hearts. I visited 129 preparatory schools in the Saratov and Moscow districts. Our seven and eight year old children are completely free from the superstition connected with the consciousness of a God. Here are some of the answers of eight year old children: 'I know nothing of God, there is no God.' 'Grandmother speaks of God, I do not believe. 'I do not pray, what have I to be afraid of?' Many would bring our children to similar denials. Christian parents, bring up your children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

"Evil Men Shall Wax Worse and Worse."

Fortune states that "An inhabitant of the U. S. is murdered every 45 minutes. Last year the homicide rate was 10.7 per 100,000, the highest in the civilized world. England's is 0.5. The nation's crime bill is estimated at \$13,000,000,000 a year. Some 140,000 Americans are in prison, and some 400,000 regularly engaged in criminal activities."

Fascist Theology

There is a strong Fascist movement growing in Great Britain, and the outstanding feature of it is a hatred of the Jew and of the Bible. The following appeared in the Fascist of April, 1935, the official organ of the British Imperial Fascist League: "The Noah story is quite ridiculous. There is no reason to think that Moses ever existed. The Israelites at the invasion of Canaan were a ragged band of gypsies dancing naked before their gods. This stuff is not history, and it is a crying shame that it is taught to Aryan children in British schools." Back of such statements it is easy to recognize the moving of the same red dragon that inspires Communism.

A Frightful Picture

A news correspondent pictures the destruction that will be effected by the new robot Aeroplane in the next war. He visualizes 200 of them poised in mid-air above the city guided by control planes that are hovering high above them. Suddenly they begin to rush toward the ground at the speed of about 500 miles an hour. They crash. The total load of 400 tons of high explosive detonates. Bodies, bricks, and mortar shoot up like a fountain, and leave miles of the city as barren as the shellpacked field of Verdun.

Defunct Darwinism

There is no conflict between true science and the Bible. It is reported that Sir Ambrose Fleming, 85 years of age, in his presidential address to the Victoria Institute of Great Britain startled the scientists with a challenge that the Darwin theory of evolution of "man from monkeys" is a product of the imagina-tion. Sir Ambrose, long one of the outstanding scientists and philosophers of England, also declared his belief in the bodily resurrection of Christ. He asserts this miracle was one of the most certainly attested facts in human history and that consequently it certified all the previous miracles of the Lord. cussing Darwin's evolution theory, he said: "I cannot consider that we have any serious proof of the evolution of modern man from an animal."

A Great Idol

The Daily Telegraph of London states: "A monster chromium-plated statue of Lenin, twice as big as New York's Statue of Liberty will before long dominate Moscow. This glittering Colossus will stand where once was the great golden dome of the Cathedral of Christ Saviour, which was blown up at Christmas 1931, to make way for a vast palace of the Soviet. The Lenin statue will surmount this concrete Tower of Babel, which will resemble a wedding-cake in form, and will itself be 180 feet high, and the building nearly 800 feet. Thus the head of this huge idol will stand nearly 1,000 feet high." The world is being prepared for the idolatry of which Revelation 13, 14, 15 warns us, when all the world will worship an image of a coming world emperor known in Scripture as "the beast."

Church Statistics

The Christian Herald of New York has made its annual statistical report of the churches of America. The Roman Catholics head the list with a membership of 20,398,509. The Baptists have a total membership of 10,027,929; the Methodists total 8,976,492. Men print statistics, but only God knows how many of these dear souls have the new birth. Many churches boast big gains, but this comes largely through the pernicious practice of making thousands of Sunday School scholars church members on Easter Sunday-and alas in many churches without any evidence of their becoming new creatures in Christ. The Assemblies of God, like a little David in the midst of many Goliaths, has a membership of 158,908. Ten years ago the membership was 50,386. God Himself, whose eyes are as a flame of fire, alone knows the actual condition of every church and of every member, and whether they are hot, cold, or lukewarm. Let us continually pray that we become not lukewarm.

The Testimony of a Seventh Day Adventist

To continue my story of how the Lord opened up His Word to me after delivering me from Seventh Day Adventism, I will ask you to turn to Matthew 5, our Lord's own words in the Sermon on the Mount. He does not make a distinction between the moral and the ceremonial law, but He speaks of it all together, saying "Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time." Why did He call the Ten Commandments old? Because they were to be done away in Christ. 2 Cor. 3:7, 11, 14. "Christ is the end of the Law for righteousness to every one that believeth." Rom. 10:4.

Does that mean that we are to have no standard of holiness, but can live just as we please? Far from it, our Lord says, "Except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in case enter into the kingdom of heaven." Matt. 5:20. So here we have Christ's own standard for His saved people—they are to be holy as He is holy. Matt. 5:48; 2 Cor. 7:1; 1 Peter 1:15, 16; 1 John 3:1-3. But who can measure up to this standard? "I know that in me (that is, in my flesh) dwelleth no good thing; for to will is present with me, but how to perform that which is good, I find not." Rom. 7:18.

Turn to the next chapter, Rom. 8:3, 4. "What the Law could not do, in that it was weak through the flesh, God sending His own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and for sin, condemned sin in the flesh (of Jesus); that the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not after the flesh but after the Spirit." Only in the power of the indwelling Spirit of God working out the righteousness of Jesus in us, can we live a holy life and come up to God's standard. It is Jesus in us living out His holiness,

To return to Matthew 5, let us note how Jesus takes up one commandment after another to show us that His requirements under grace are different and higher. The law looked at the outward acts, but Jesus looks at the thoughts. The sixth commandment said, "Thou shalt not kill, and whosoever shall kill shall be in danger of the judgment; but I say unto you, that whosoever is angry with his brother without a cause shall be in danger of the judgment; and whosoever shall say to his brother, Raca, shall be in danger of the council; but whosoever shall

say, Thou fool, shall be in danger of hell fire."

The seventh commandment was, "Thou shalt not commit adultery"; but Jesus said, "That whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart." The old Law said, "Thou shalt not forswear thyself, but shalt perform unto the Lord thine oaths." Jesus said, "But I say unto you, Swear not at all; neither by heaven, for it is God's throne; nor by the earth, for it is His footstool; neither by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great king; neither shalt thou swear by thy head, because thou canst not make one hair white or black. But let your communication be, Yea, yea; Nay, nay; for whatsoever is more than these cometh of evil."

The law said, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor and hate thine enemy." But Jesus said, "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you and persecute you; that ye may be children of your Father which is in heaven; for He maketh His sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust. Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect."

Under the old law there was a penalty of death for every violation of the commandments. Why is this not exacted today? If the Adventists are keeping the law according to the Old Testament, they should be stoned to death every time they lift any burden on the sabbath, or break any other of the Ten Commandments. We have our national and municipal laws and ordinances. If you are convicted of a traffic violation, you have to pay the fine. Where is the penalty for the Adventists' violation of God's Law? Not one of them has ever fulfilled it perfectly, as they must confess; and yet none of them has paid the penalty in expiation.

This whole question came up at the first Church Council in Acts 15. The Judaizing teachers had been telling the Gentiles that they must be circumcised and keep the law in order to be saved. After much discussion the apostles wrote to those who had believed in Christ without ever having kept the Jewish Law, "It seemed good to the Holy Ghost and to us to lay upon you no greater burden than these necessary things: That ye ab-

stain from meats offered to idols, and from blood, and from things strangled, and from fornication; from which if ye keep yourselves, ye shall do well." There was no mention of circumcision, no command to keep the sabbath, but just an exhortation to refrain from the prevalent idolatry and its customs, and to live a holy life because they had been saved by faith in Christ.

Another teaching of the Adventists is that the souls of the righteous sleep in the tomb until the resurrection and the final judgment. But if we study the Word of God we find that it is the *body* which sleeps in the grave, and not the soul. During the intermediate state, between death and the resurrection of the body, the spirit or soul is in paradise with Christ, not in a state of absolute perfection, because it is not yet reunited with its resurrection body; but in glory and peace, conscious and happy, waiting until the Second Coming of Christ to be once more united to the body. Eccl. 12:7; Phil. 1:23, 24; Luke 23:43; 2 Cor. 5:1-8; Heb. 12:23; Luke 16:19-31.

The teaching of annihilation is not found in God's Word. We see there that the wicked dead are to be judged according to their works. To annihilate them would be to treat them all alike. Moreover we are told that their punishment will be eternal, the same word being used as that which describes the bliss of the saved in heaven. John 3:36; Matt. 25:46; Mark 9:43-48; Rev. 14:10, 11; 20:10; 22:12, 15, 19.

How I praise God for delivering me from these errors and for opening to me the plain teachings of His Word through His Spirit. Dear reader, if you have been trying to keep the law and thus to fit yourself for heaven or for the Coming of Jesus, study the above quoted Scriptures, and let the Lord fill your heart with the joy and gladness of a full and free salvation that is all of grace, to be obtained by simple faith. Do not let man-made theories hide from you these glorious truths, but accept what Jesus worked out for you and now offers to you as a free gift. Then, when you have been saved by faith, you will go on to work for Him and to live a holy life, not in order to be saved, but because you are saved.

"Upon All Flesh," by Donald Gee

Brother Gee tells us at the beginning of his latest book, recently off the press, that in a large number of assemblies he has given a talk entitled, "100,000 Miles in Pentecost," and that there has been a demand for this message in printed form. We are very happy that he has complied with this request and that he has given us a splendid up-to-date story of the latter day outpouring of God's Spirit "upon all flesh." He remarks in his book, "Pentecost' is not a mere Welsh or American or Eastern revival, it is a WORLD WIDE revival."

In this new book he takes the reader a personally conducted tour around the world, and shows us "Pentecost" in every corner of the globe. It is a book full of stories of signs and wonders "as at the beginning." When the Pentecostal reader reaches the last page he will doubtless say, as did the writer of this review, "Thank God for 'Pentecost,' and thank God, I am in it."

Brother Gee begins his story with the work in Europe. He relates how the fire fell at the beginning in an Episcopal church in Sunderland in the north of England, and tells of a later revival in Sunderland through the ministry of Stephen Jeffreys, in which over 3,000 accepted Christ as their Saviour. Blind eyes were opened, crooked backs were made straight, the lame walked, and lifelong infirmities were healed. He tells also of some of the remarkable campaigns of Mr. Fred Squire, in which the blind have received their sight, the deaf have heard, and many miracles of healing have taken place.

He then takes us to Scandinavia. He speaks of Sweden as the most "Pentecostal" country in the world in proportion to its population. He describes the great church in Stockholm where Brother Lewi Pethrus is pastor. He tells of the 600 Pentecostal assemblies with an approximate membership of 70,000. In Sweden there are 1,500 Pentecostal evangelists, and there are 125 foreign missionaries, supported by the assemblies there. At their last Bible school in Stockholm 645 were registered.

Brother Gee then takes us to the lands of Eastern Europe, and his figures concerning the work in Finland, Latvia, Poland, and the other lands of Eastern Europe are simply amazing. He tells especially of the work in Bulgaria and Roumania and of what has been accomplished in Russia. He also gives a good deal of space to the work in Germany, Switzerland, Southern Europe, Holland,

Belgium and France. There is a most gracious revival now taking place in France. At one place alone in France, Le Havre, over 1,000 have been baptized in water and 500 baptized in the Holy Ghost.

Then Brother Gee takes us East to Asia and into Bible lands. He tells of the gracious revival in Es Salt in Transjordania. He has personally met Um Saleem whom he speaks of as a humble and devout Christian woman, to whom the Lord appeared one night in a vision, warning her of tribulation, giving her gracious promises, and then putting a sign upon her forehead, a sign in blood in the shape of a bird with outstretched wings. He tells of the great impression that was made upon the Moslems through this extraordinary sign.

Then he moves us on to India and gives us a splendid account of the work there, and then moves us on to China and tells us of a number of gracious revivals that have taken place of late years. He gives the latest reports from Brother Baker telling of a remarkable ingathering among the Ka Do people, and also from Brother W. W. Simpson.

We are then taken to Japan and are told the story of Pentecost there. Then to the isles of the sea and the story is told of how Pentecost came to the Fiji islands, and also how God is blessing in New Zealand and Australia. He gives a description of the work in the East and West Indies and also the islands of the Atlantic

Then the story moves on to Africa, and begins with Egypt. Both Brother Randall and Brother Doney tell of gracious revivals taking place there, and Sister Trasher tells the story of God's gracious provision for her great orphanage in Assiout where every day more than 2,000 meals are provided. Sister Trasher's report is very encouraging as she tells of some of the children she took into the orphanage now preaching the gospel.

The work in the Congo is described. Besides the 37 white missionaries there are 500 native missionaries, and sunrise prayer meetings are held each morning in about a thousand villages. Every Lord's Day about 20,000 believers assemble around the Lord's table.

Then Brother Gee takes us to South Africa where he was last year, and gives a very encouraging report of the work there. He also tells the story of the work in West Africa, and in the French Sudan and Mossi land where God has been graciously pouring out His Spirit. Brother Perkins in Liberia contributes a very interesting story of the work in that land.

After this the story moves to South America and Brother Gee has the latest figures concerning the remarkable revival in Brazil where our Swedish brethren have been doing splendid work. The Assemblies of God in Brazil have some 30,000 members. In one assembly alone there are 2,000 or more members, and in another work there are 1,500. There are about 100 Brazilian native preachers, and about 250 helpers, he tells us. The work in Argentina is described, and also the glorious Pentecostal revival which God sent to Chile where there are 125 congregations with a total membership of some 10,000. The work in Peru and Venezuela is also reported at length.

The last chapter in the book deals with North America, first telling of the work among the Latin Americans, and then the work throughout the United States and Canada. Brother Gee devotes a good deal of space to telling of what he saw in Springfield, for he had been much impressed by several visits to "head-quarters."

We are very happy that this book is published for it is one that should be circulated far and wide. Many will remember that in the year 1916 a book "Apostolic Faith Restored" was published, and some 5,000 copies were soon in distribution. Then in the year 1927 we published the book "With Signs Following," telling of Pentecost in various parts of the world. Five thousand copies were circulated during the first year of this book being introduced. But now this book "Upon All Flesh" is in a cheap edition for sale at 25c (although it is practically the size of many of our 50c books), and we trust that it will have a circulation of at least 10,000 this year. Those of us who have been blessed by the Baptism of the Spirit should let others know of what the Lord is doing in this glorious Pentecostal revival, and we know of no better way of circulating the Pentecostal message than of giving it in the form of an inexpensive book. The present low price-25c-plus three cents for postage, or four copies for a dollar, postpaid, we trust will make it possible for us to put a large number into circulation in a very short time.—S. H. F.

MIRACLE WROUGHT IN MANCHURIA Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Ahlberg

We first made our acquaintance with Mrs. Yin in the month of March of this year, when a group of the workers from the missions here in Mukden were asked to go to her home to see the miracle the Lord had performed on her body.

Six months previous to this time Mrs. Yin had had a quarrel with her husband and had taken poison to end her life, but instead of accomplishing her purpose, she was left a helpless cripple with both arms and hands, legs and feet paralyzed. She had remained in this condition with no improvement even though she had spent more than

thirty days in the hospital under the care of physicians.

Her husband brought her into the city here to spend a few days with her mother, and upon her arrival she found that both her mother and brother had been saved in the mission and were regularly attending the services and believing the whole gospel. As she was then suffering in body they exhorted her to turn to the Saviour and yield her life to Him. They told her they would pray for her according to the promise of the Word and that they believed Jesus would touch her. Mrs. Yin consented and turned to the Lord; her brother laid hands on her, and with the united prayer of the mother they lifted their hearts and

voices to heaven. The Great Physician heard and answered that simple, earnest prayer of faith; her suffering ceased at once and in a few days' time she was using her hands quite normally and able to stand on her feet and take a few steps at a time.

She then returned home to her husband but with fear and trembling for she knew he was an unbeliever and that the house was filled with idols. She realized that she could never live in that kind of atmosphere again. But when she arrived there she found that the dear Master had been working at both ends and that her husband had secretly been attending the meetings at one of the mission halls. When he saw what God had done for her, he gladly turned to the Lord. They immediately had a good housecleaning, destroyed all the idols, and the joy of the Lord entered that home!

As we came upon the scene that day in March, we found them living in one room of a mud house with a straw roof, with almost nothing of this world's goods to call their own but, oh, how their faces shone as

they told us all about their experience with God!

Their home is situated a mile or more beyond the last of the city dwellings, in a group of mud houses which form a small village. We wish the Evangel readers could have seen how those neighbors came crowding in to hear what we had to say about this God who had performed such a miracle. They filled the room till we scarcely had a place to stand; they crowded into the doorway; some were on their knees outside, trying to look in through the low window, and many others filled the yard, craning their necks to see and straining their ears to hear. As one of the workers began to tell them about

we opened a Bible school for the purpose of instructing and grounding native Christian young men in the Word of God. Much has already been accomplished, but on account of the low rate of exchange of the U. S. A. dollar in Hong Kong currency (it now being little more than one-third of what it was three years ago) the continuation of our Bible school seems almost impossible without additional help.

Our Missions Department in Springfield is aiding all it can with the limited funds available. Some of our missionaries on the field are supporting one or two students in the school, but these combined funds are insufficient.

Therefore, we appeal to you, our brothers and sisters in the homeland, to help us with your prayers and your means. Especially do we call, through the pastors of our assemblies, upon the young people of our Sunday schools and Christ's Ambassadors for assistance.

The estimated popula-tion of the Kwang Tung and Kwangsi Provinces, the territory covered by the South China District Council, is fifty millions, in which vast region we have only one small Bible school. At home you have not only the Central Bible Institute, the capacity of which, we hear, is being doubled, but ten or twelve more Bible schools in different sections of the country. While planning, praying and paying to as-

sist these Bible schools in America to give Bible training to its Christian young people, please do not forget the native Christian young men of China, who should have an opportunity to become "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" that they may help to reach the millions in China "such as sit in darkness and in the shadow of death."

The expense of a student in our Bible school in much less than in America. Sixty dollars, U. S. A. money, will pay the expense of one student for a whole year. Only five dollars per month will be sufficient, even at the low rate of exchange, to give a young man Bible training and preparation for the ministry.

How many brothers and sisters, how many Sunday schools and Christ's Ambassador classes will send five dollars per month for a year, designated for the South China Bible School? Surely some can give this small amount for the work of the Lord and the advancement of His blessed work!

You have prayed for some soul; tears of agony have been shed; you have pleaded with him to accept Christ; there has been no response. The heart has grown harder and colder and finally there has seemed to be an utter rejection of Christ. Have your prayers and your efforts been wasted?

Missionary, you have labored on the mission field for years in the boiling sun; you have encountered indescribable dirt, filth, and disease, yes and also unspeakable loneliness. You have seen so little fruit for your labor. You count the money it has taken to keep your mission station and its workers. There is so little to show for it. Has it been waste?

You have rejoiced over a soul won for Christ. You have nurtured that soul as a mother her sucking child. You have spent of your best to see it develop and grow sturdy for Christ. It has sickened and withered and died. The little plant has had no root in itself. It has endured for a while but when tribulation or persecution has arisen because of the Word, by and by it has been offended. Has your effort been all in vain? Was it wasted?

Perhaps the servant of Christ can know no deeper sorrow than this. It is a great joy to see souls saved-it is still greater sorrow to see them turn back. Our Lord, Himself, knew this anguish. It is written that "from that time many of His disciples went back and walked no more with Him." Do you think He was ever tempted to look back upon His life's work as a waste? How much did His disciples understand His teaching? How much did they appreciate what He was doing for them on Calvary? Influence of a Quaker Mother's Prayers

Recently I wrote of visiting the dying ex-gunner boy in Toronto, and of his triumphant home going. A few weeks later we had a very similar experience, which also has become a memory that we highly prize.

We had just begun the services in the city of Wilmington, Delaware, when we received a letter saying in part:

"No doubt you may be surprised to some extent in receiving this letter, but I imagine you receive similar ones in almost every city where you hold evangelistic campaigns. I am a sufferer in the Delaware Hospital. It seems to me my condition is steadily growing worse. I am not a saved man, but would like to be.

"Your name was given me by a friend who calls to see me every night, and who also attends the meetings. I would like if it is possible for you to do so, if you would call at the hospital to see me, and have prayer with me. I will greatly appreciate this favor if you can grant it. No trouble to find me at the hospital, in the men's ward, first floor.—Sincerely yours, George Hill, Delaware Hospital.

My father and I called together, and easily found the writer. He welcomed us warmly, then told us something of his history. He said, "My mother was a woman strong in faith and prayer. She was a Quaker. My grandfather was a Quaker preacher. When I was younger, I knew the Lord, but I have wandered far away, and really want to come back to God."

His hunger of soul was very real, and he wept many tears as he freely told the Lord of his repentance, and soon was able to offer words of praise and thanksgiving for pardon and peace. As we prayed the man in the next cot wept too, and indicated his desire also to come to the Lord.

We called different times, and always found Mr. Hill triumphant in soul, never wavering in his thankfulness to God. He became greatly burdened for others, and would sigh, and say to us, "I'm not the only one. There are so many others, many men walking the street, not knowing where to turn for hope. They too long for help. If someone would only tell them how Christ can help them."

At our last call we knew he was very low indeed. He had had an amputation, and was not rallying. However, low as he was, his spirit was triumphant, and he was giving thanks to God for victory.

About twenty-four hours later he was called home to his glorious rest. The

gentleman in the next cot said his home going was so peaceful he did not realize he had gone. His sister and her husband, with whom Mr. Hill had lived, sent word saying that it was his wish that my father conduct the funeral.

As we met the relatives just prior to the service, they choked up, with tears of gratitude, and said, "The greatest change came over our brother in the last few days of his life. He spoke constantly of your visits, and those of others from the church with great appreciation. He did not ask to get well. He only asked prayer that the pain would not be too great." The sister then opened her hand bag, and showed us a photograph, many years old. "This," she said, "was our Quaker mother, a woman of prayer.' The service was held in very humble surroundings, but was full of victory, and all felt the effect of the peace and victory still evident in Mr. Hill's countenance. Just before the casket was closed, the sister slipped again to her brother's side, and laid the time-worn photograph of their godly mother beneath his coat, next to his heart. She told us, "He is being laid beside his mother."

Amid the beautiful springtime flowers he was laid to rest. Beside him was a gray granite stone, that of his praying Quaker mother, "Hannah R. Hill, Entered into Rest October, 1911." Her prayers had availed, and beside her, her wandering son was laid away, his body to await the glorious resurrection morning, when together they would rise to meet the Lord in the air.

I may wonder how we are going to survive such repeated and subtle attacks; but God is going to look after us. Hallelujah! I hear that wonderful promise, "Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm" many a time when Satan would wreak his worst upon us. I thank God, God has anointed us. "He which stablisheth us with you in Christ, and hath anointed us, is God."

Seed houghts' Gathered by Alice E Juce

An old Scotch preacher used to say to his audience: "You are like children sitting on the curb picking up rubbish out of the gutter; while behind you stands a kingly palace open and inviting you to enter."

Bunyan pictured the same truth when he described a man with a muck-rake scraping together the mud and dirt of the streets, never raising his head to see a holy angel above him offering him a golden crown.

Paul, the aged apostle, chained in the loathsome Mamertine dungeon, wept as he wrote to his beloved Philippian converts of those who mind earthly things.

Does not our beloved Lord in the glory weep today over those of His redeemed ones (not merely the sinners) who are setting their heart's affections on things of this world?

It is one of the enemy's most subtle devices in these days when earthly things are clamoring so loudly for recognition, to get Christians to pay undue attention to them.

Satan has a double purpose in this: first to defile the purity of Christ's bride, and secondly to get her mind diverted from the imminence of His Coming.

When the year of Jubilee was near, the price of Israel's land decreased; and when that year of rest, release, and redemption was far away, the buyer had to pay more for it.

The Sinday School Tesson

Barnabas

Lesson for August 25, 1935. Read Acts 4:36, 37; 11:19-30.

It is quite possible that Barnabas was one of the devout Hebrews who was in Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost and heard the striking phenomenon of speaking in tongues that could be understood by the various Jews who had come from the different parts of the world. At any rate we find him with the disciples at a very early date in the history of the church.

I. HIS GRACE

The Grace of Giving. The law commanded tithing, but under the law the people failed God. Through the prophet Malachi He reproves the people for robbing Him of their tithes and offerings. But in the days of the early church the apostles had to say nothing about tithing. The grace of God was so heavy upon the people that as many as were possessors of lands and houses sold them and brought the price of the things sold and laid it down at the apostles' feet. Our introduction to Joses, later called Barnabas, is the declaration that he, having land, sold it and brought the money and laid it at the apostles' feet. One outstanding characteristic of the early church was its freedom from the curse of covetousness. They did not want treasure on earth, but they were happy to lay it up in heaven. Someone has said, "We cannot take our money and lands with us, but we can send them on before."

A New Name. A new name implies a new nature. God delights to change and transform Jacobs (supplanters) into Israels (princes with God). The new name of Barnabas, says, Alford, means "son of prophecy." And we learn from Paul that the prophetic gift is for edification, exhortation, and comfort. As we follow Barnabas' history we find that from that time he had a ministry of exhortation, encouragement, consolation, and comfort to the saints. When an African is baptized in water he invariably takes a new Biblical name, for the baptismal service to him means death and burial of the old and a resurrection to a new life and a new nature in which Christ is all in all.

II. HIS MESSAGE

Whole-hearted Cleaving. A gracious revival was taking place in Antioch, and the apostles at Jerusalem with great wisdom sent down trustworthy help. Barnabas was their chosen representative. He was very happy as he saw what had been accomplished, for the hand of the Lord had been with the saints at Antioch and a great many had believed and turned to the Lord. We are not given any of his sermons, but the divine Record has summarized his exhortations, "that with purpose of heart they would cleave unto the Lord." Said a pastor to the writer, "It seems no difficulty to get folks started Godward in our city, but oh, how difficult it is to get them to continue." And yet how solemn are those words in Hebrews, "Whose house are we,

if we hold fast the confidence and the rejoicing of the hope firm unto the end." And again, "For we are made partakers of Christ, if we hold the beginning of our confidence stedfast unto the end." How often the warning needs to be sounded forth, "Take heed, brethren, lest there be in any of you (and the apostle was writing to the saints) an evil heart of unbelief, in departing from the living God." God has ordained that the just shall live by faith, but declares, "If any man draw back, my soul shall have no pleasure in him." When Barnabas was on his first missionary journey with Paul, we find the two of them with a similar message. The Jews and Gentiles who had begun to believe in Antioch and Bithynia they persuaded to "continue in the grace of God." When he with Paul went later to Lystra, Iconium, and Antioch, confirming the souls of the disciples, they exhorted them to "continue in the faith." We need men like Barnabas to exhort and encourage the saints to continue steadfast, unmovable, and always abounding.

Not a Signless Gospel. There are many preachers today who belittle a ministry of the miraculous. But neither Paul nor Barnabas were of that caliber. In Iconium the Lord gave testimony unto the words of His grace and "granted signs and wonders to be done by their hands." When these two were at Jerusalem at the great Council meeting, they were able to tell of miracles and wonders that God had wrought among the Gentiles by them. The Lord is ready to confirm His Word with signs following today as at the beginning.

III. HIS CHARACTER

A Holy Man. The first qualification for a minister of Christ is a holy life. Barnabas is spoken of as "a good man." A good tree brings forth good fruit. Our Lord shows us concerning prophets that it is by their fruits we shall know them, and when we see corrupt fruit we know it comes from a corrupt tree. Barnabas could commend himself to all who heard him because he was a man with an exemplary life, a man who was pure and true. Said one to a preacher who was living a life that did not commend the gospel, "What you are speaks so loud I cannot hear what you say." The Holy Spirit shows us that godliness with contentment, which really means freedom from covetousness, is great gain. Ungodliness and discontent and a covetous spirit are a great loss to those who possess the same. Unless there is a repentance from such there will be eternal loss.

Full. We do not read that Barnabas was one who received the filling of the Spirit and then leaked out. No, he was one who was "full of the Holy Ghost." The Lord means us to be continually full. We must continually come to the Rock from whence the river of the Spirit flows, to Him who declares, "If any man thirst, let him come unto me and drink," and He will fill us so full that we will be overflowing; and rivers of living water, rivers of the blessed Spirit, will flow from our innermost beings. And whereever those rivers flow there will be blessing.

A Man of Faith. Here we have the secret of the ministry of the miraculous. Barnabas was a man of faith. With faith there is nothing impossible. The signs follow "them that believe." Said a Jewish friend to the writer, "The thing we need is a revival of faith." A few days ago a brother said to the writer, "God has given His prescription for healing in the Word of God. It is through faith in Him who bore our sicknesses that we have our health. But the devil has many substitutes and, alas, many of the saints are going after the substitutes, after pills and potions, instead of believing the Word of God and standing firmly upon it." When Paul was stoned at Lystra, there is no doubt that his miraculous recovery was due largely to the faith of Barnabas who, with the disciples of that city, stood by him, after he had been drawn out of the city and was supposed to be dead,

Freedom from Covetousness. One province of the Holy Spirit, according to Christ, is Through the to show us things to come. prophet Agabus, who ministered at Antioch, it was made known unto the saints that there would be a great dearth throughout the world, and the saints at Antioch decided to send relief to the brethren that dwelt in Judæa. Who could be trusted to take their funds? The saints chose two men who had the qualification suggested by Moses for rulership, "able men, such as fear God, men of truth, hating covetousness." And so they chose Barnabas and Paul. It was a question whether anyone hated covetousness more than Paul, judging from his writings, and Barnabas seems to have been of the same mind with him.

IV. HIS MINISTRY

His Missionary Calling. When the saints at Antioch were giving themselves to fasting and prayer, the word came through the Holy Ghost, "Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them." And the two of them set forth, hazarding their lives for the gospel. There is no higher calling than that of a missionary. Said William Carey, the pioneer missionary to India, concerning his son who was appointed British ambassador to Burmah, "Felix has shriveled from a missionary to an ambassador." Mrs. Howard Taylor tells of pioneer work in the Kaye-Chow province of Western China. A number of inquirers came a six days' journey over the mountains and appealed to the missionaries, "Come back with us and teach our mountain people about Jesus." One missionary came within a day's journey of where they lived. These mountain people came to him. They were much impressed with his dog who was so clean and friendly, who understood his master's word and would obey his commands. It was so different from their dogs. When the missionary told them he could not come to them they said, "If you really cannot come, will you let the dog go with us? Please send the dog with us. Why if people would only see that dog they would know that this message is from heav-Mrs. Taylor comments, "O shame upon us that such a thing as this could be; that in this twentieth century after the supreme sacrifice on Calvary, people should be asking for a dog to come to them. They have

But there arose a contention concerning John Mark. Paul did not want to take him and Barnabas did. I can well remember a dear old preacher who did not like contention, saying, "I often pray, 'Lord, make me easy to live with." This separation, however, made for the furtherance of the gospel, for Paul took Silas and went on their missionary trip, and Barnabas took John and returned to evangelize his beloved country of Cyprus, and so there were two missionary parties instead of one. The patience of Barnabas with John Mark, who had forsaken them on their first trip, doubtless contributed to the tribute which Paul at a later date gave

this young worker, stating that he was "profitable for the ministry."—S. H. F.
