# Chosen and Ordained by the Lord

# Ordination Sermon by P. C. Nelson at the District Council, McCook, Nebraska, April 9

"Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain; that whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it you." John 15:16.

We congratulate you and praise the Lord He has called you and prepared you to preach the gospel, and it is a joy for us to welcome you to all the privileges and blessings, together with all the labors and sorrows and sacrifices, of this holy calling, to the greatest work in the world. For the sake of good order and the furtherance of the gospel it is necessary for the assemblies to judge who are worthy of ordination, and it means much to younger ministers who are called of God to know that they have won the confidence and approval of those who are older and more experienced in the work of the Lord. Young Timothy was ordained by the laying on of the hands of the presbytery, and Paul left Titus in Crete to perfect the organization of the assemblies and to ordain elders in every church. 1 Tim. 4:14; 2 Tim. 1:6; Titus 1:5. Hence we know that ordination is Scriptural.

But while this is true, we recognize the fact that the real call and ordination comes from the Lord Himself. We have not chosen Him, but He has chosen and ordained us. If you are not sure of His call upon your life, we would advise you to wait till you know that He has called and chosen you and ordained you to this holy ministry. The church cannot choose its own ministers, neither can our good Bible schools make real preachers of the gospel. The function of our Bible schools is not to be ministerial "incu-bators," as some misinformed Brethern have supposed. While the schools cannot make ministers, they can train those who are called of God, and can give invaluable instruction in the Word of God. Spirit-filled teachers of mature experience can help their younger brethren to avoid some pitfalls, and can instruct and encourage them, as Paul taught and exhorted Timothy. And you will not travel very far in your ministerial career before you come face to face with problems which you would like to have help in solving. Let us not get too wise to seek instruction and counsel from others. Many a young minister has gone into "the scrap pile" because he would not take advice. The Lord has set teachers as well as evangelists in His church.

If trying hours should come; if disappointment and trouble should come, it will help you to remember that you did not choose Christ or put yourselves into the ministry, but He choose you and put you into the ministry, as He did Paul and the other Apostles. This will help you when discouragements weigh heavily upon you. You are simply servants of Jesus Christ. If it pleases Him to have His servants suffer want, to be scantily clad, to be neglected, contradicted, opposed, and hindered, it pleases you too. It takes more grace to keep you in prosperity than in poverty. Maybe you are not strong enough to stand much prosperity or success. It may be safer for you to be in an obscure place than to be up on a high pinnacle. It is easier to fall from a high than from a lowly place. He has chosen you, and He has chosen your place also. Be glad and satisfied.

True ministers are the love gifts of Jesus to His church. Eph. 4:10-16. He has given our movement great numbers of able, godly ministers, and that proves that He loves this movement which is growing so rapidly while some denominations which have money and standing appear to be dying. It is wonderful to be a gift of Jesus Christ to His church, even if we are not given to the largest and most conspicuous assemblies. We each have more honor than we deserve.

You are called to go and bring forth fruit. The Lord says, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" We answer joyfully, "Here am I, send me." Isa. 6:1-8. In His great intercessory prayer Jesus says to His Father, "As thou hast sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world." John 17:18. We are to go into all the world and preach this gospel. "They went forth, and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them." Mark 16:15-20.

This is a great day in your ministry this day when the hands of the elders are laid upon your heads and you are formally set apart for the work of the gospel ministry. There is no higher office among men than the office of a true minister of Jesus Christ. "And all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given unto us the ministry of reconciliation: to wit, that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them; and hath committed unto us the word of reconciliation. Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: we pray you in Christ's stead, be ye reconciled to God." 2 Cor. 5:18-20. This great text has now been appropriated by our young people's groups, but we can never agree to turn it over to them exclusively. Every minister of Christ, regardless of age or affiliation, is an ambassador for Christ.

As His ambassadors, we are to continue His work and ministry on earth while He is in glory, interceding for us. What higher honor could be bestowed on any human being? Paul recognized in his own call the amazing grace of God. Speaking of the Gospel he says in Ephesians 3.7-10, "Whereof I was made a minister, according to the gift of that grace of God given me according to the working of his power. Unto me, who am less than the least of all saints, was this grace given, to preach unto the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ: and to make all men see what is the dispensation of the mystery, which for ages hath been hid in God, who created all things: to the intent that now unto the principalities and powers in heavenly places might be made known through the church the manifold wisdom of God" (Am. R. V.).

Before Jeremiah was born he was sanctified and appointed to be a prophet of the Lord. "Then said I, Ah, Lord God! behold, I cannot speak: for I am a child. But the Lord said unto me, Say not, I am a child, for thou shalt go to all that I shall send thee, and whatsoever I command thee thou shalt speak. Be not afraid of their faces: for I am with thee to deliver thee, saith the Lord. Then the Lord put forth his hand, and touched my mouth. And the Lord said unto me, Behold, I have put my words in thy mouth. See, I have this day set thee over the nations and over the kingdoms, to root out, and to pull down, and to destroy, and to throw down, to build and to plant." Jer. 1:6-10.

The faithful, Christ-chosen and ordained minister of the gospel has many things in common with the Old Testament prophet of God. You likewise were chosen long years before you knew anything about God's plan for your life. The Lord can put His words in your mouth, and can give you His courage, as He did the hundred and twenty at Pentecost, and can give you a mouth and wisdom that cannot be withstood as He did the first preachers of the Christian era Luke 21:15; Acts 4:8-13, 18-20, 31; 5:27-32.

This gospel which we preach will work havoc with the devil's bulwarks. "For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war after the flesh: (for the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds); casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ." 2 Cor. 10:3-5. This gospel is mighty in its destructive power against all the forces of evil. In less than three centuries is subdued the hostile Roman Empire. It is equally mighty in its constructive power, transforming communities, towns, cities, and nations in its onward sweep.

So go in the strength of the Lord and the power of His might. "Go ye therefore and teach all nations," remembering the promise of Jesus, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Matt. 28:19, 20. The Greek is more expressive, "Behold, I am with you all the days, even to the end of the age." On the darkest as well as on the brightest days, His presence will go with you, even to the end of this age, and then we will go with Him! The Lord said to Moses, "My presence shall go with thee, and I will give thee rest." We soon come to the place where Moses was and with him say, "If thy presence go not with me, carry us not up hence." Ex. 33:14, 15.

"And bring forth fruit." We are not to be shade trees to cast shadows on others, but fruit trees of the Lord's planting. "He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper." Psalm 1:3. "The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree; he shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon. Those that be planted in the house of the Lord shall flourish in the courts of our God." They are to grow like palms and cedars, but they are to be fruit trees. "They shall bring forth fruit in old age, they shall be fat and flourishing." Psalm 92:12-14.

In the verses preceding our text Jesus has been speaking of Himself as the vine, and of His disciples as the branches, while His Father does the pruning. Oh how those sharp blades of the pruning hooks and clippers hurt! And yet none of us can bear much fruit without the pruning process. Like the chastening of the Lord it does not seem joyous but grievous; "nevertheless afterward it yielded the peaceable fruit of righteousness." Heb. 12:11. We squirm and fret under the pruning, but later we see it was all done in love, and that without this pruning we should have been fruitless. Do you want to glorify the Father? Then bear much fruit. John 15:9.

But we must *abide* in the vine or we wither! How awful it is to see some who for a time were most fruitful, gradually wither away and come to nothing. Alas, examples are only too numerous! The words of the Lord Jesus must abide in us. How diligent we should be in study and meditation! The Psalmist's blessed

man who resembled the fruit tree that was so prolific meditated in God's law day and night. We must study to *know;* but that is not all, we must meditate to grow. God pity you if you neglect the precious Word of God and depend on your own "smartness" (I use this ugly word advisedly). God pity the flock whose shepherd keeps them in a coral and then comes two or three times a week with some dead grass and dry weeds and throws these over the fence to the starving sheep! Get something good and rich and juicy for your sheep. Better yet, lead your flocks out into the knee-deep clover and timothy along beside the still deep streams of God's grace. Jesus said, "Feed my lambs." "Feed my sheep." John 21:15-17. But the Greek word means to shepherd the flock, and the Eastern shepherd led his flock out into the green pastures and beside the still waters. In Acts 20:28, "To feed the church of God," the Greek word trans-lated "feed" means to shepherd, to pastor.

Oh that we might bear much fruit for His glory! A full consecration usually means a good fruit yield. And the fruit from a consecrated life is of better quality.

"That your fruit should remain." Under another figure-that of constructing a building—Paul speaks of "wood, hay, and stubble" built into the wall by those who simply wish to make a name and a show. 1 Cor. 3:11-15. But he warns us that every man's work is to be tested by the fire of judgment, and that if our work abides we shall be rewarded, but if the fire destroys it we shall suffer loss. May God give you much luscious fruit that will glorify God and bless mankind, and may it be of the abiding kind. We are going forth into the Lord's great harvest field. Others have labored and have sowed in tears, we reap in joy. "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal: that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together." John 4:35, 36. Yes, you may have to sow in tears-

"They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing seed for sowing shall doubtless come again with joy, bringing his sheaves with him." Psalm 126:5, 6. A. R. V.

"That whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it you." Does Jesus mean to imply that faithfulness in service—in fruit bearing—will give you a special claim to have your prayers answered in full? What else can these words mean? James lets his hearers into a valuable little secret when he says, "Ye ask and receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your lusts"—evil desires. James 4:3.

Ask and receive not! "That whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it you." Oh yes, I see. We ask in a selfish spirit and get nothing, because we as amiss—we miss the real purpose of prayer—that we may glorify God and bless mankind—not that we may gratify self.

If we are working for a firm, doing business and making money for the house, and make requisition upon the firm for traveling expenses and sub-sistence funds and supplies, we may expect prompt answers. But if we are loafing around, and shirking our duties and failing in our testimony-that is, becom-ing fruitless-and send requests up to heaven, they may not be given the most favorable and instantaneous consideration. Would it not be wonderful to be so faithful, so humble, so fruitful, so reliable, so self-sacrificing, so devoted to the interests of our Lord, that "Whatsoever" would be granted without ques-tion or delay? If we are living for God, working for God, and seeking His glory and not our own, we need not be surprised if answers to our prayers arrive hourly in carload lots. Loyalty to Christ pays big dividends here. And then the reward hereafter! "His lord said unto him, Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." Matt. 25:21. "When the chief Shepherd shall appear, ye shall re-ceive a crown of glory that fadeth not away." 1 Peter 5:4. "And they that are wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars, for ever and ever." Dan. 12:3.

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# How the Lord Saved Her Husband

She had been blessedly saved. Out of darkness into light, out of bondage into liberty, she had been brought by the saving power of God. The Spirit was bearing witness with her spirit that she was a child of God. All doubt had been banished from her mind, and her joy was great. It seemed to her that she had moved into a new world. And for a while she wondered if God had in His great storehouse any blessing she had not yet received. But she was told that there was more for her, that she had not yet received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit, and that she was entitled to it, her sins having been pardoned, her heart having been cleansed, and the Lord Jesus having moved in and taken possession.

And if there was anything for her that she had not yet received she wanted it. One of the reasons why some people seem to be satisfied with such a little is because they have received such a little. The people who have received much are thirsting for more. When, at the beginning of this mighty outpouring of the Spirit a multitude were marvelously filled with the Holy Ghost, everywhere the saints were hungering and thirsting after righteousness. The meetings were well attended then. Folk were not looking for an excuse to stay at home. The more the people got the more they wanted. Filled with the Spirit, they went to give out to others of what the Lord had given them, and then, that they might be refilled, they came back again and got down at the feet of the Lord and waited in His presence for a fresh enduement of power from on high.

And this was as it should have been then, and as it should be now. Some people criticise us when we express a longing for the days of old, and they tell us that these days are better than were those days. But this criticism does not usually come from those who were in the midst of the mighty revival at its beginning. Of course we know there were some things that brought reproach upon the work, things the leaders greatly deplored. But if it is right for us to look back to the days of the early outpouring in Jerusalem when the first disciples "were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance," it is surely all right for the folk who were in the midst of the outpouring in these last days when the Latter Rain

began to fall, and so many were marvelously filled with the Holy Spirit, to long for a repetition of those days, or for something that is at least just as good. And that worldliness has made its encroachments upon us, and that we are not where we ought to be, it is the greatest folly to deny or even question.

This sister, having been saved, and, having been made to rejoice in her salvation, when she heard that the Baptism in the Spirit was for her, wanted it. And she began to tarry for it. We are told in some quarters that it is not Scriptural to tarry for the Baptism, that since the initial outpouring "when the day of Pentecost was fully come," tarrying is out of order. But I have observed that the most of the folk who have received have tarried. I am somewhat wary of new fangled ideas. And I am somewhat disposed to believe that the people who tarry get more than the people who do not tarry. Time spent in tarrying is never wasted; in fact time spent at the feet of Jesus is always profitably spent. And they who tarry for the fullness, tarry at the feet of the Master.

Several days went by, and she had not yet been filled. But her hunger was increasing all the time. Her husband was unsaved, and he told her that he did not believe in these late meetings; she was wearing herself all out, and it was sheer foolishness; he was not going to stand for it any longer. A quarter after nine is late enough for any woman to stay at a meeting; so he said, and she was told that he was going to come after her to the church at a quarter after nine that very night; if she was ready he would bring her home, and if she was not ready he would bring her anyway. It was his purpose to come right up to the altar, and get her, and lead her out. He was a determined man, and he meant what he said; of that she was fully aware.

So she said to the evangelist the next evening, "I had expected to receive the Baptism this evening, but my husband is coming after me at a quarter after nine, and he says that I must be ready to go at that time; if I am not ready he is going to come right up to the altar and drag me out. I see no chance for me to tarry this evening; you will be just getting through with your sermon, and making the altar call, at that time." And she showed by the look on her face and the tone of her voice that she was very much disappointed. The evangelist encouraged her heart. He said, "Why, you can get the Baptism while I am preaching. The Lord knows all about your husband, and He can baptize you in the Holy Ghost while the Word is going forth." And then he told her how the Spirit fell in the house of Cornelius while Peter was preaching. And she was told that others had been filled with the Spirit in a similar way in these last days, and that what the Lord has done He can do.

Sure enough! That very night while the evangelist was delivering the message the power fell in a marked way; the Holy Spirit moved mightily, and the sister was filled, and spoke with tongues as the Spirit gave her utterance. Her joy knew no bounds. It was just about a quarter past nine when the evangelist finished his message amid the shouts of praise that went up from rejoicing hearts.

Her husband was at the door. True to his word, he had come after her. She, like an obedient wife, was there at the door to go home with him.

The next night the evangelist preached, and he had a hard time. He seemed to be in the woods. Preachers reading these lines know to what I am referring. He made the altar call, but he had little faith; he felt that the message he had delivered would bring no one to the altar to seek the Lord. But the saints came to the altar to pray. Maybe some of them came to pray for the evangelist. It was not long until it was observed that a man had begun to cry mightily to the Lord for forgiveness. The evangelist went over to him, and began to make inquiry; he thought he would find out what had brought him to the altar, and why his conviction was so great. "My wife," the man said, "received the Baptism here last night while you were preaching. I came after her at a quarter past nine; I had told her that she must be ready to go at that time, that if she was not ready I was going to take her home anyhow; she was ready, and went home with me, but she was so filled with God that she could not speak English; she talked in tongues all the way home, and after we got into bed she continued to speak in tongues, and magnify the Lord, and again and again during the night the bed was shaken by the power of God. I can't stand it any longer. I must get saved! Please pray for me!" And he broke down and sobbed.

Of course the Lord saved him. His wife was not far away, and she was praying, "Save him, Lord! Save him now! Give him a real experience for Jesus' sake!" And the Lord gave him a real experience. That "God who commanded the light to shine out of darkness shined into his heart to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ." His home to-

day is a Christian home with a family altar from which the incense of prayer and praise ascends every morning and every evening to the Father of spirits.

When He answers our prayers He may answer them through the exercise of ordinary means or by the exercise of miraculous power. Certainly the God who made the heavens above and the earth beneath by His great power and outstretched arm, and who upholds all things by the word of His power, can work in any way He may see fit to work.

Through its efforts Palestine has been practically rid of malaria; a medical center has been established which will devote its efforts to the conquest of tropical diseases; the Institute of Chemistry has opened up the mineral resources of the Dead Sea; the Department of Geology, through its surveys in the eastern and southern regions, is enlarging the area of settlement for pioneers; and through its Department of Agriculture it is seeking by afforestation and irrigation projects, as well as extensive botanical work, to bring back to Palestine its fame as 'a land flowing with milk and honey.""

When Benjamin Disraeli (who later became Earl of Beaconsfield, and Prime Minister of England), first entered Parliament as an ordinary Member of the House of Commons, he was constantly subjected to the jibes of other Members, who scathingly referred to his Hebrew origin, and his despised race. On a certain occasion, one of those hostile Members, spoke in a highly offensive way of-"that Tew !" When finishing the speech which had aroused the intolerance of his unruly aggressor --Disraeli remarked: "The Member for ----has seen fit to make an insulting allusion to my Jewish ancestry. Nevertheless, I will not be tempted to respond to his ignorant taunt in the way it deserves, but-for his information, and the benefit of Members in general-I may be allowed to state: about one half of the CHRISTIAN world worships a JEW—and the other half worships . . . a JEWESS!"

# THE CHALLENGE OF BIBLE TRANSLATION

Comments *Datum*: "The Bible need of the world has recently been put thus. There are some 5,000 languages and dialects of mankind: in 954 of these languages the Bible has been translated in whole or in part; something like 3,000 are not urgent, the peoples who speak them being accessible through other tongues, or on the verge of extinction; but 1,000 languages are still Scriptureless."

# PALESTINE'S FIRST ROTARY PRESS

"Many will be surprised to learn that until a few weeks ago Palestine never saw a rotary printing press," writes Keith L. Brooks in Prophecy. The first ever to be installed in the Near or Middle East has just started producing the Hebrew daily paper-Davar, organ of the Palestine Jewish Labor party. The machine, which came from America, is capable of printing a 20-page paper at the rate of 30,000 copies an hour. The new press was secured through the efforts of Zalman Ruba-show, one of the editors, and Mr. Isaac Hamlin, Poale-Zion leader of New York. Work on installing the press in Davar's plant started a few months ago. The Labor daily has had an extraordinary career. Started in the summer of 1925 with a circulation of about 2,000, it rapidly grew in importance until it now has a paid circulation of some 18,000."

# IN A SEA OF ENEMIES

"Palestine stands like a pyramid upon its apex," writes Hillaire Belloc in Universe, "only prevented from falling if the natural effect of gravity is counteracted by some one holding up the sides. The only reason of this situation is mainly the attitude of all Islam towards the Zionist experiment. ... Though all Palestine were made Jewish tomorrow, and all its native inhabitants deported, the new State would still be a little island drowned in a sea of Islam. For hundreds of miles in every direction there is a Mohammedan world which regards the Zionist movement as temporary, and is determined to destroy it. The quarrel is not

to be appeased." "For I will gather all nations against Jerusalem to battle. . . Then shall the Lord go forth, and fight against those nations." Zech. 14:1, 2.

# HAILSTONES LIKE COCOANUTS

A letter recently reports that in Northern Transvaal, Africa, some weeks ago an enormous black cloud drifted over the section and let loose on a native village, three inches of rain within a few minutes time. This was followed by huge hailstones, some of which are said to have been as large as a cocoanut. Many natives were killed, hundreds were made homeless, and livestock and crops were destroyed. Hailstones piled up to a depth of three feet in some places and natives caught in the storm had to be dug out of the frozen piles.

Comments *Prophecy:* "We read in Rev. 16:21 of the immense hailstones that will fall in the Tribulation period. We have read of hailstones weighing 4½ pounds and stones weighing more than a pound have fallen in the U. S. One cannot but be reminded of what awaits men who are not taken when our Lord comes for His own."

# Music and the Spirit-Filled Life

# "Bring Me a Minstrel" By Donald Gee

The facts of the story in 2 Kings 3:4-20 are too plain to deny, whatever interpretation we may put upon them. Elisha is obviously disturbed in his spirit at the sight of the unholy alliance of Jehoshaphat with the idolatrous king of Israel in the campaign against Moab. So the prophet specially requests that a minstrel shall be brought. As the musician plays, the hand of the Lord comes upon Elisha, and he gives an encouraging prophecy that was strikingly and speedily fulfilled. The effect of the music on a direct operation of the Holy Spirit through the prophet provides a most interesting study to illustrate Scriptural principles in these things.

# To Soothe Rather Than Stir

One side of the matter that immediately emerges is that the purpose and result of the music was to soothe the troubled spirit of the prophet, *not* to stir and inspire. The playing of the minstrel was deliberately intended to quiet the disturbance of the natural; not to attempt a moving of the spiritual thereby. The very real power of music is remarkably illustrated in this incident but the direction in which that power was utilized in connection with a moving of the Holy Spirit is significant.

Consistently with this we note the same effect of the gifted playing of David before Saul. 1 Sam. 16:14-23. The liquid notes dropping from the harp of the sweet singer of Israel brought temporary rest to a spiritually troubled king. But it is to be carefully noted that the relief was only superficial. It effected no cure. A passing emotion of the soul, however beautifully and purely obtained by consecrated servants of God, can afford no remedy for deep rebellion of will and disobedience to light. David's music soothed Saul, but it did not get him right with God. It is easy to conceive of cases where we might even regard music as a dangerous "dope."

A fair exposition of the passage in connection with Elisha must admit that there might have been a positive effect of the music upon the prophet, as well as a negative. The facts point the other way however; for the servant of God was disturbed in spirit, and the instance is unique of music preceding prophecy in such a way. In any case the music almost certainly consisted of some sacred song of worship to Jehovah; and if it stirred as well as soothed the soul of Elisha it was only because the prophet was "walking in the light," and therefore in a condition to receive a genuine spiritual impulse from a psalm. There is certainly no suggestion that the music restored the anointing to a prophet temporarily out of touch with God.

# Music and the Soul

The whole subject opens up the relationship of music with the soul of man; and especially the emotional side of our natures. The supreme function of music in the natural sphere is to stir and express the emotions, or occasionally to soothe them.

Now in connection with doctrines about the soul it is necessary to clear away the rubbish that every activity of the soul is "fleshly" and "carnal" in a wrongful sense, and therefore to be utterly condemned and swept away from among those who long for pure movings of the Holy Spirit in their midst. Psychology is an unnecessary bogey to many Pentecostal people, if psychic or "soulish" manifestations are regarded as almost on a par with the positively demonic.

Actually speaking, our souls should be extremely active in all that pertains to divine worship. The book of Psalms is full of exhortations to stir up the soul; and the finest and fullest activity of the soul is contained in the great climax to Psalm 103, "Bless the Lord, O my soul."

The important principle to observe however is that it is the will that stirs up the soul through reason. When the soul is sluggish in praise and rejoicing then the will brings forth a multitude of reasons as to why the soul should awake to bless the Lord; such as His great power in creation, His wisdom in government, His lovingkindness in providence, and, above all, His grace in salvation. The Psalms all run on these lines, when they are concerned with stirring up the soul. There is a deliberate determination to rouse emotion, but it always proceeds from reason. It is sometimes difficult to distinguish between "soul" and "spirit" in the Old Testament; but if we assume, as we believe we may, that the human spirit represents the highest part of our nature, then we may truly lay down the principle that the soul should always be the handmaid of the spirit. It is the function of the soul to express both reasonably and emotionally the purpose of the spirit. An evil perversion occurs when the soul runs away with the whole nature by unbridled and unreasonable emotionalism.

The God given heavenly gift of music

is one of the choicest ways in which the soul of man can express its deep emotion when truthfully stirred by a spirit enjoying communion with the Lord. Thank God for music! It is to be welcomed as a boon straight from the heart of the Creator, revealing His wisdom in its science and His love in its blessedness. There are many occasions when only music can adequately express the pure emotions deeply stirred by His grace. And sometimes music can help to minister that comfort which flows from His side. Music comes to us out of that Eternity when the morning stars sang together; and will be with us in the Eternity when we gather around the Throne.

### Where the Danger Lies

The danger with music, as with every other gift from God, lies in our wrongful use of it. Seeing that the spiritual realm is the profoundest of all, the danger there is greatest of all.

Music can powerfully move the soul. We have all proved that. There comes a consequent temptation to allow ourselves to be delightfully moved by its sensuous power for sheer enjoyment of the pleasure it gives us. In hours of legitimate relaxation this may be quite lawful. It is no sin to enjoy good music, any more than good scenery or good food; but the disciple of Jesus Christ never forgets that he is crucified with His Lord.

It is the bringing in of the sensuous power of music into hours of worship, or of ministry, that constitutes the danger where Pentecostal Experience is concerned. If music is always kept as the servant of the moving of our spirits by the Holy Ghost then we may rejoice in it wholeheartedly, and use it freely. But woe betide the believer, the preacher, or the assembly that allows sheer love of music to run away with them in the spiritual realm! They will soon find that it has run them out of the spiritual realm Constant watchfulness altogether. 15 necessary.

Not only in expression of emotion is watchfulness needed; but also in the stirring of emotion. We have seen that if we are to please the Father by worshipping Him in spirit and in truth then the emotional activity of our soul is to be stirred by reason of contemplating His work in Creation and Redemption. The chief danger in all such "revival" Movements as "Pentecost" is that we use music to stir emotion without giving adequate attention to the reasoning faculties. We rightly desire to see men and women moved; but there is a temptation to take the short cut of an appeal to emotionalism, rather than the more costly road of an appeal to the reason and the will through a revelation given by the Spirit and the Word in answer to prayer and

consecration. The danger equally lurks in the catchy and popular chorus; the oldtime favorite sung in a massed convention; the sentimental solo; the use of deliberate tonal effects of loud and soft; or competitive singing between the men and the women. All these things may be legitimate and can be used purely and genuinely "in the Spirit"; but they are sensuous thickets where a believer with spiritual discernment keeps a sharper watch lest he get out of the Spirit entirely. Instead of being revealed, Christ becomes obscured by the very means we have ostensibly used to lift Him up.

Many of us have become alert to the special danger of the intensely emotional spot at the close of some powerfully moving solo, or congregational hymn, where spiritual gifts are concerned. It is easy for babes in Christ to, at such a time, confuse the moving of their souls with the moving of the Holy Spirit. Manifestations which are essentially natural can quickly arise when music has powerfully swayed an assembly. Genuine operations of the Holy Spirit are far more likely to accompany a time of waiting upon God, or to follow the exposition and preaching of the Word.

It is for these reasons that we have drawn attention to the fact that the playing of the minstrel was for the purpose of soothing the troubled spirit of the prophet, rather than for stirring it up. To suggest that the use of music in a moving of the soul can produce genuine inspiration from the Holy Spirit is a reversal of the whole divine order. The whole of the Scriptures teach that it is the function of the Spirit of God to graciously move upon the spirit of man. It is for the spirit to then call upon the soul as its handmaid, and the soul of man may properly delight in music as a God-given means of expressing its truest emotion. In the Spirit-filled life we must always remember that it is inspiration that leads to music; not music that leads to inspiration.

out His soul, His life, His blood unto death. And Paul says to us, "Be ye followers (or imitators) of me, even as I also am of Christ." I Cor. 11:1. He beseeches us that we present our bodies —and that usually includes all that is within us—as a living sacrifice unto God.

Said the Lamb of God on His way to Calvary, "If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me. For whosoever will save his life (Greek, soul) shall lose it: but whosoever will lose his life (Greek, soul) for My sake, the same shall save it." Are you willing to pour out your soul to the Lord, as did Hannah? Are you willing to give Him your very best, as she did? Are you ready to pour out to Him that which is most costly, as David did? Are you willing to pour out your life as an offering to God, as did the apostle Paul? Are you willing to follow the Lamb and give your whole life, your whole soul, your whole being, as a glad sacrifice to Him? If you are willing, tell Him so. A willing mind is acceptable to Him. And as you give yourself to Him, He will not fail to put within you His mind, His nature, His disposition; and it will be a joy for you, as it was to the apostle Paul, to be a poured-out offering for Him who poured out His soul as an offering for you.

# BROKEN BACK HEALED

October 19th, 1935, I fell down a basement stairway, a distance of 12 feet, landing on my back, with my back across the bottom step, and my head hitting a post. A doctor was called. I was at once rushed to the hospital, and placed under X-Ray. This was between four and five o'clock p. m. I was on the X-Ray table until after eight o'clock. My husband called our pastor, H. A. Baines, as soon as I was hurt and they at once prayed for me. Sister Baines and daughter, Eleanor, came to the hospital, and they, with my daughter, prayed continuously by my side holding on to God for deliverance. Praise God for children and friends who know how to pray. The Z-Ray showed my back broken, one vertebra crushed and spine out of line. The muscles and ligaments were all torn loose.

I had known God as my healer for twenty years and realized that there was no help for me but in God and begged to be taken home from the hospital. I refused to take a hypodermic, which the doctor ordered, because I wanted to get home where there would be freedom to pray. The doctor told my husband he feared my head was so badly injured I would pass out very soon from a cerebral hemorrhage. But because I would not go to bed and continued to beg to be taken home, I was taken home at 10 o'clock that night. The pain in my back was so terrible no tongue can ever tell what I suffered.

The next morning the blood from the injury to my head, instead of settling on my brain, came down and settled in the loose tissues around my left eye until my eye was as large as an egg and blood red. (God knew a safe place to direct that blood where it could do no harm and was reabsorbed without any trouble whatever.) Bless His Name forever, Hallelujah! My head injury was not near my eye, but on top of my head, but God performed this miracle.

At first the doctors were going to send me to the hospital at Ann Arbor, then decided I would not be able to make such a trip. But they were going to put me in a cast here. I was hurt on Saturday and all day Sunday the doctor was so anxious to do the very best for me and would have had me back in the hospital but he is a Christian man and does not oppose healing and since I was determined to trust God, he could do nothing. Sunday evening at 9:30 I had a sinking spell, and all night faced death. The doctor had said, if I lived, I would be paralyzed from my arms down-no control whatever of my body-be cared for like a baby, and never walk again, yet, with this fact facing me, I had faith in God, and told the doctors I would walk again -God would heal me.

In the morning I was very weak and knew I would go unless God undertook for me. My family also knew only God could help me. One of my neighbors came in and asked me if I could see or hear her, and something in her voice told me she considered me dying.

While in this condition our pastor came in and asked me, "Are you still determined to

trust God?" I told him, "I have no other thought." He knelt and prayed and where all night I had had a sensation of going down, down, lower and lower, growing weaker and weaker, I now began to come back up. I knew, Hallelujah, that the great God, and Creator of all things had touched me and I was healed. Bless His Holy Name. In an hour I was laughing and testifying that I was healed. Many people came to see me and each time I testified I felt new strength come into my body. Many times the room was full of people who came to see if it could be true.

The doctor continued his calls and tried to persuade me to be put into a cast, but I insisted God had healed me and I would be well and walking again. On Wednesday, the doctor who had been with me through it all, had to leave town, and sent another doctor over. This new doctor came on Thursday, much more insistent on a cast, and when he found I was just as insistent on no cast, but that God had healed me, and that I would walk again, and would not go into a cast, he called the nurse into the living room and said he did not dare oppose me any more, because I thought something had been done for me, and "if we agitate her any more, it may be most disastrous, so we must not do any more urging today, becausé she won't have it, and it will prove very serious to urge her any more, because she is much worse than she knows. But I will leave her to think it over and I will not return for three days, unless she calls for me, and by that time she will have found out how she is and will welcome a cast." When he returned I had been walking and was sitting up in bed combing my hair. He threw up his hands and said, "Why, why, what does this mean?"

Both doctors have called to see me since I am well. A druggist said, he would not believe, but when he was calling at the hospital, he asked to see the X-Ray pictures and said he could hardly believe his eyes, when he saw the actual condition of the broken spine, but he could no longer doubt. I am well, praise God, and although 58 years old I enjoy the cold weather and find myself throwing my shoulders back and enjoying long walks. My back was broken on Saturday, October 19th, and I was prayed for and healed on October 21st, and up walking on October 28th. No medicine or opiates, but just the touch of the Great Physician. Praise God forever! The week spent in bed after I was healed was a most happy time. I shall never forget how I was filled with joy and laughter. My answer to all enquiries as to my condition, was to tell every one, "Oh, He maketh me to lie down in green pastures."-Mrs. Levi Generaux, Petoskey, Michigan.

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The Last Supper Lesson for May 31. Lesson Text: Luke 22:1-38.

# I. THE LAMB PROMISED

The Betrayal. Satan had just entered into Judas and he had gone to the chief priests and scribes and made a covenant with them to betray Jesus for thirty pieces of silver. Jesus had declared, "The prince of this world cometh, and hath nothing in me." There was no territory in Him in which Satan could lodge. But there was plenty of open ground in the covetous heart of Judas, and Satan came in. How we need to have our hearth completely cleansed from covetousness. Today men are money-lovers, self-lovers. pleasure-lovers. rather than God-lovers, and Satan finds plenty of territory on which he can come in and camp. The betrayal and delivery up to death of the Lamb of God was a part of "the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God." How blessed to know that all our sufferings, testings, trials, and crosses are determined and foreknown of God-that we may be made into the very image of the Son of God, entering into the deepest fellowship with Him in His sufferings, being made conformable unto His death. Phil. 3:10.

The Passover. The day came when "the passover must be killed." It was the time of the slaying of the passover lambs, all of which were types and pictures of the Lamb God had provided. Years before, at the instruction of Jehovah, Abraham was making his way up to mount Moriah to offer up "his only begotten son" (Heb. 11:17), and the son said, "Behold the fire and the wood: but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" To which Abraham replied, "My son, God will provide Himself a lamb for a burnt offering.' A ram was provided as a substitute for Isaac. Isaiah foretold of the Lamb that was coming, and in the 53rd chapter of his prophecy he showed us what that Lamb would be to us, One that would bear our sins. But it was given to that prophet, than whom none was greater, John the Baptist, to identfy this Lamb. Surely the weightiest utterance of all the prophets was made by John when he pointed to Jesus and declared, "Behold the Lamb of God that beareth the sin of the world!" John 1:29, R. V., margin. The time had come when THE PASSOVER, of which previous feasts were but types, was to be slain. Christ, OUR PASS-OVER, was to be sacrificed for us.

The Preparation. The Lord had many important things to say to His disciples, those truths concerning the Holy Spirit's coming which are recorded in John, the 14th chapter, and He wanted a place away from the jostling throng of people who had come to Jerusalem to the feast. He sent Peter and John with specific instructions as to how to locate the Upper Room where He would eat the passover with them. He foreknew the footsteps of the man with the pitcher of water (and it was an exceptional sight for a man to bear water, for this menial task was always allotted to the women), as well as He knew the location of the little ass that bore Him into Jerusalem, and of that solitary fish that

had a coin in its mouth. Samuel as a "seer" was able to locate Saul's father's asses, and a greater Prophet than Samuel was here.

### II. THE LAMB PROVIDED

"When the hour was come." The hour had struck for the most momentous series of events in the history of the world-the crucifixion, the rising from the dead, the ascension of Christ, and the sending down of the Holy Spirit from heaven-all of which crises were to follow in rapid succession. Jesus broke the bread, a wonderful picture of His body about to be broken for us, and He said, "Take, eat: this is My body." We are to be partakers of Christ. At the communion service we partake of that which symbolizes His death. In the measure that we know the power of His death, in that measure shall we know the life also of Jesus manifest in our bodies. 2 Cor. 4:10. How much there is in those two simple words, "Take, eat." Are you hungry for God's great salvation? He has provided the Lamb. He has provided the One who is the living bread. Jesus, who is God's salvation, offers Himself to you and says, "Take." Receive Him and say, "Lord, I take. I thank Thee with all my heart for Thy gift to me of Thyself and Thy great salvation." And then He says, "Eat." Receive Christ right into your being. He will come within and become more one with you than the meal you ate this morning. A priest took away a New Testament from an Irish lad, but the boy said, "There are ten chapters you cannot take away. I have learned them by heart and they are inside of me." There is a union that comes as we by faith eat and partake of Christ that is more wonderful than the mysterious union of our food within us. We become "one spirit" with Him. As Spurgeon puts it, "We are interwoven, intertwisted, intermingled." We do not have to fully grasp these things in our intellects in order to appropriate them. By faith we can receive even though we do not fully understand.

### III. THE LAMB PROCLAIMED

The Blood of the Covenant. In giving His disciples the cup Jesus said, "Drink ye all of it (or, all of you drink of it); for this is My blood of the new testament (or covenant), which is shed for many for the remission of sins." See Matt. 26:28. The wine that was in the cup was just a picture of the lifeblood that was so soon to be shed to bring us complete cleansing from all of our sins. In Leviticus we read, "It is the blood that maketh an atonement"-that completely blots out our sins, so that God in the new covenant rela-tionship can say to us, "Your sins and your iniquities will I remember no more." The old covenant of the law given on Sinai was ratified by blood; and here the new covenant of grace that brings us new hearts and new spirits, that new covenant that Christ writes in our hearts and in our minds, together with the gift of the Spirit to cause us to walk in full accordance with His perfect law of liberty, is ratified by the precious blood of the Son of God. Speaking of the communion service, Dr. J. H. Jowett says, "We should go away from the feast as Covenanters. We have entered Page Nine

into a new covenant in His blood, and there must be something about us akin to the Scottish Covenanters when they emerged from the Grey Friars' churchyard, having entered into holy bond and covenant with the Lord. There must be something in our very manner that tells the world that we have been at a great tryst, and our lives must be bravely, grandly quieted, confident in the glorious Ally with whom the covenant has been made. There must be nothing dubious in our stride."

Looking Forward. This memorial feast Christ instructed us to keep "in remembrance of Me." At the British legation in Peking, China, a piece of wall which withstood the attack of the Boxer rioters is left in its warworn condition, and there is a tablet, "Lest we forget." So when the saints gather in the holy communion service the symbols that speak of the broken body and the poured-out blood speak these words to our hearts, "Lest we for-As oft as we eat this bread and drink this cup we remember the Lord's death till He come. He is coming for His own; and this simple communion feast which we now keep is just an earnest of that glorious marriage feast in days to come. He will drink of the fruit of the vine with all the redeemed in His kingdom, and that hour will ever remind His bride of what He paid-His own very lifeblood-to secure her redemption.-S. H. F.

### ALLIANCE BETWEEN ISRAEL AND ENGLAND

Lord Melchett is a leader in English Jewry, and incidentally a prominent figure in British Chemical Industries. In a letter to The Manchester Guardian (quoted by Ernest Gordon in Sunday School Times), he calls for the closest relations between Palestine and the British Empire. He points out that Haifa is capable of becoming a naval base for Great Britain and that Palestine itself is the natural air base for the eastern, and possibly the southern, air routes of the British Empire. "No military protection of Palestine and Transjordania," he says, "can be the equivalent of a loyal population of three or four million Jews ready to defend their country and to uphold the great Commonwealth of the British Empire which has given them their freedom. This situation creates a common, practical interest between the Jewish and the British people for the development of Zionism.'

As the hosts of Gog and Magog approach Palestine, Ezekiel tells us that "the merchants, of Tarshish, with the young lions thereof shall say . . . Art thou come to take a spoil?" Ezek. 38:13, Is there here a reference to the British empire challenging the invaders?

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# GOD BLESSING NEW STATION

An interesting account of the progress being made in the assembly at Port Arthur, Manchuria, now about two and one half years old, comes to us from Miss Inga Peterson. She writes: "A short time ago Brother Kvamme paid us a visit at the close of his itinerating journey through the district. While he was with us we had a baptismal service at which time eight souls were buried with Christ in baptism, arising to walk in newness of life.

"Mrs. Chiang, one of the women who was baptized, had suffered with a very painful spot on her back for some years and about which she had been much concerned. Sometime ago we sent home a prayer request in her behalf that she might be delivered from this affliction. Her relatives

and friends strongly urged her to have surgical attention but as she had been attending the Mission Hall about a year and had seen and heard of God's healing power upon others, she determined to put her case into the hands of the Lord. Now. since she took this outward step of following the Lord in baptism, the pain has entirely left and she claims to be well. This healing has been a special victory inasmuch as she had already received persecution through following the Lord in baptism.

"It is interesting and precious to note how God deals with individuals to establish them and prove to them personally that they have truly

found the way unto eternal life. Doubts do come in some subtle form, for even Jesus, having come up out of the baptismal waters was led into the wilderness there to be tempted forty days. Mr. Ch'in, one of the men baptized, had a peculiar experience. Before being baptized he had had great joy and assurance that the gospel of Jesus was the right way but after baptism an inexplainable sadness and depression of spirit came over him for days which he could not understand. Had he fallen into worse error by following the precepts of the religion of Jesus Christ?

"One night he had a dream. He thought he was in great danger, in fact that a flood was coming upon the earth and that a terrible enemy was pursuing him, bearing weapons with intent to kill him. He was fleeing for his life from this dread enemy and flood but he knew not where to go to find safety; the mountains were not a solution to his problem for the water would soon reach their tops. In his great perplexity it seemed he suddenly happened to approach the Fu Yin T'ang or Gospel Hall. The missionary stood in the door and beckoned for him to come in and find safety which he hurriedly did. As soon as he had entered he realized he had reached the haven of safety from the flood and the dread enemy without. Then he awoke.

"Immediately his sadness and darkness were dispelled and once again he became happy for by this dream he was made assured that through believing in Jesus and the 'Gospel Hall Doctrine' he was safe. So we praise God that He is proving Himin a short time. Then we hope to print the first epistle of Peter. The Christians here in Yendi have composed seventeen different songs which they sing to tunes of their own. Mr. and Mrs. McConchie were out last week and we had some of the Christians sing these songs so that they could hear them. They began at once to write down the tunes as they were sung.

"This week the town is full of strangers. All of the important chiefs and their followers from all over Dagomba are here for the annual conference. We try to have as many services with them as possible. We will not be able to visit all of their towns so here the Lord gives us the opportunity of reaching them by bringing them to where we are. It is just another proof to us that the Lord led us to choose this

place.

WORK AT YENDI GOING FORWARD Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Shirer write from the Gold Coast field: "We believe that steady progress is being made in the work here; preaching services are being well attended and the Christians are all making definite progress in the knowledge of the Word of God. The Gospel of Mark is now being printed and should be finished all worked together and all shared in the joy of the catch. So it will be with the faithful ones in the homeland and us here on the foreign field when we appear before the Lord in the Day of Rewards. If we have worked together faithfully, we can expect joy at that time."

# LETTER FROM NEW MISSIONARIES

A very interesting letter has come to us from two of our new workers in Liberia -Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Simmons, who already seem to be in the harness and active for God in that far-away corner of Africa. We pass the letter on to you: "Dear Home Folks:

"It is with glad hearts that we greet you again from this part of the world. A short time ago we took a little preaching trip to another part of this tribe among whom we are working. Sixteen hammock men, a boy to carry our tin trunk and a girl with the lunch box made the caravan for the two of us. By noon the first day we had reached the town where a boy had gone ahead to cook rice and soup for the men in our company. The Christians of that place gave us a hearty welcome and provided us with chairs and the table from the church upon which to eat our lunch. After satisfying our hunger in the midst of a large audience of native children and grown-ups we went into one of the mud houses to pray for a sick mother and her baby. Praise God for the power in the Name of Jesus!

"That night we stayed in one of the mission stations which has been closed because of lack of workers. In the town chapel there we had a service that night. The Lord always quickens our bodies for His service even after a day of hard travel.

"The next morning we went to a nearby town to dedicate a new little white clay church. It was decorated with palm branches and plants. An arbor of palms outside the door provided accommodation for the crowd that could not get inside for the occasion. Before the service began the chief men came to give us "How do" and a welcome speech. They had killed a goat and they wanted us to feast with them after the meeting.

"God graciously met us in that place. The presence of the Lord came down upon us like sweet incense. The native worker broke down and wept as the heavenly dew fell. Pray with us that an eternal harvest may be reaped from that town and that the prayers of the people for a worker to be stationed among them may be granted.

"That night found us in a service in another town where a number of Christians from a distance had gathered. From here we returned to the abandoned mission station; another busy day, another meeting at night; then up and off the road for the return trip home.

"Now we are 'putting strong' to prepare for the opening of school, preceded by a three-day meeting next week. As I write a group of men are in the yard putting up a cook galley for the school boys; some small boys are cutting grass and cleaning the yard with the one implement for all kinds of work—their cutlass. Girls have been carrying pails of water from the small river some distance down the hill in exchange for a piece of candy. Other men are doing carpentry work on the house and still others are cleaning "tie-tie" the African substitute for rope and nails.

"Our day begins about five-thirty. It is someone's turn to boss the cook. One of us has the sores to care for and the ministry to the sick that line up on the back piazza morning and evening. Someone takes charge of the buying of rice and native vegetables, bananas, fowls, etc., which are brought to the door. There are always multitudinous demands for clothing, advice, work, and palavers of many descriptions. There is always a meeting in town at night --then rest!

"Last night Brother Simmons had his first experience fighting the driver ants. They attacked the house by the millions about bedtime. Calling some boys who were sleeping in the boys' house, we all built fires, lighted torches and burned into the many lines of the persistent raiders. It was one o'clock in the morning before we felt it safe to go to bed.

"Fire is the weapon against the powers of darkness also, as we seek to press the battle on in the name of the Lord. We are counting upon the faithful ones at home to keep on the firing line. We thank you for the gifts you send that enable us to represent you in this land of darkness. May God bring forth a harvest for His glory and your eternal reward.

### GOD BLESSES DENOMINATIONAL CHURCH IN SOUTH INDIA

Carl D. Holleman in a recent letter relates an unusual opportunity and experience which was his a short time ago. He writes: "It was my privilege to speak in a denominational church here in the city of Poona two weeks ago on Sunday night. The pastor has been quite ill and various ministers of the city have taken the services for him. On this particular evening the church was well filled, and there were present many of the girl students from the High School.

"We went praying that the Lord would reveal Himself in some wonderful way and manifest His own glory. I gave a simple God-inspired message on Luke 19:10 which the Lord used in a remarkable way. Before I had finished speaking tears were rolling down many cheeks and sobs could be heard. At the close of the service I turned toward a group of these girls who had come to express their gratitude for the service. I took the opportunity to ask them to give their hearts to the Lord Jesus and to take Him into their own lives. I had spoken only a few words when about fifteen of them began to weep as if their hearts would break. I prayed with them and God's blessing rested upon them. Eternity alone will reveal how many of them really accepted the Lord, and God only knows the true effect of the service upon their lives.

"There was a great deal of comment upon the service in general. Some said it was the most wonderful thing that had happened in many years. One Indian young man spoke to me and said, 'I wish to thank you for the sermon. My father is a minister of the gospel but in all of my life I have never heard him use such words as you have spoken tonight.'

"I mention this only to show the great need of the true gospel of the Lord Jesus being preached among the people of India. We are praying each day that the Lord will open new doors for us to get to the people with the message of salvation for the lost, and that they may be filled with the Holy Spirit. Please pray with us that the Lord will manifest His glory in the midst of the heathen. Many are hungry and are seeking for the true Light that has come down from heaven. We sow the seed of the Word upon many hearts, not knowing what it will bring forth, but with prayer that the Lord will give the increase.

"The Sunday night services here in Emanuel Hall are very well attended and the Lord is blessing the Word to souls. There are several soldiers who are seeking for the fullness of the Spirit at the present time. Please pray that God will speedily answer prayer and send them out to win others for the Lord. We all feel our need of more of the power of the Spirit."

# NEW AFRICAN WORKERS SENT OUT

Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Weston say in a recent letter: "Our two months of daily Bible classes have just come to a close and so our whole thought and effort shall now be to the end of the salvation of the lost souls in our district. 



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
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
