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Shall We Surrender the Fort?



IVINE Healing is one of the cardinal doctrines in our movement. Along with the outpouring of the Spirit in the first years of this century, the belief in the power of God to heal our bodies, and His willingness to minister to our great need on the physical as well as on the spiritual plane was revived and the practice of praying for the afflicted and anointing them with oil as the Word directs and commands was restored.

Before the outpouring of the Spirit in Pentecostal power there were a number, scattered over the country, who held tenaciously to the Bible doctrine of Divine Healing, and some suffered much

persecution for this faith. In fact, ever since the days of the apostles there have been some isolated souls who have been able by faith to lay hold on God for their own healing, and for the healing of others. The Moravians through whom John Wesley received light, held the anointing of the sick to be a Scriptural ordinance. In his Journals John Wesley records no less than two hundred forty cases of divine healing. Dorothea Trudel in Switzerland, Pastor Blumhardt in Germany, John Bolzius in Sweden, Dr. Cullis, Dr. A. J. Gordon, Dr. A. B. Simpson, Mrs. Carrie Judd Montgomery, Mrs. Woodworth-Etter, and many others in this country gave faithful testi-mony, and prayed for thousands whom the Lord healed in a miraculous way long before the great outpouring in Los Angeles in 1906.

With the outpouring came a new love for the Word of God, a diligent searching of the Scriptures, and a childlike faith to appropriate the beautiful teaching of Divine Healing, and to seek the face of God for the healing of untold thousands of sick and afflicted people. Wherever Pentecost was preached under the anointing of the Spirit, there miracles of healing resembling those in New Testament times were done. So far as this writer knows, all Pentecostal people everywhere, over the whole earth have accepted the teaching of Divine Healing as one of the four great pillars of the truth-salvation through the shed blood of Jesus Christ and a real experience and transformation in regeneration; the Baptism in the Holy Spirit as in the days of the apostles; the coming of the Lord to reign upon the



earth with His own; and the healing of bodily afflictions by the power of Jesus Christ on condition of believing prayer—these have been the corner posts of our doctrines.

It is through the ministry of healing that multitudes—perhaps the great majority of Pentecostal people have become interested in this wonderful movement. Many would never have heard the message of Pentecost if there had been no miraculous healing along with the preaching of this faith. Thousands of hard hearts have been melted and thousands of proud spirits have been subdued because they needed healing for themselves or for loved ones, when all

other help had failed. Thousands more have been convinced of the presence of God among us, convicted of their sins, or of the sham or shallowness of their profession by seeing the Lord work miracles among us. Thousands who are now enjoying health and strength to labor and toil in the service of the Lord would have died long ago, and their bodies would have been slumbering under the sod if they had not been healed by the Lord.

Divine Healing, important as it is, must always be considered of less importance than the salvation of sinners, but think how many have been won to Christ through this manifestation of His love and power! Jesus began to heal as soon as He began to preach and to teach. Matt. 4:23. And after he had preached His last sermon He healed the ear of Malchus. John 18:10; Luke 23:51. He sent out the Twelve, but first gave them power to heal the sick

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More Than Thirty Years Ago

This year, 1936, marks a period of thirty years since the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in Old Azusa Street Mission, Los Angeles, when the rich and the poor, the white and black, ministers of the Gospel, policemen, and hungry hearts from every walk of life thronged that simple structure, to witness and share in this great outpouring of God's Spirit. Soon the news was flashed around the world and revival fires seemed to break out almost instantaneously in various parts of Christendom. Such a time of waiting upon God—of old time prayer meetings, of searching the Word, and of humbling of hearts before the Lord can never be forgotten.

It truly proved to be a movement not started by an individual, for the revival fires were kindled in various parts of the world, even from those earliest days. Visions of Christ, prophecy, and other supernatural features have been familiar throughout the movement. There had been scattered showers even prior to 1906. The fire also began to fall in Winnipeg and other Canadian points, and spread rapidly in nearly all parts of the world. As an evidence of how quickly various parts of the world were sharing the outpouring I quote from the Apostolic Messenger (which I published

Apostolic Messenger (which I published in Winnipeg), 1908, the following:

"Our hearts rejoice to hear of many receiving the Holy Ghost . . in Jerusalem, Syria, Arabia, Persia, Armenia, and a number of places in China. In India in many places . . . hundreds have received the Baptism of the Spirit. Word also comes that in forty places in Scotland Pentecost has fallen. Also many have been baptized in England, Ireland, Wales, Sweden, Norway, Switzerland, Holland, Germany, Australia, Russia, Tibet, West and South Africa; Mexico; Cuba; Egypt, Italy, and Japan."

Perhaps those who come into the movement now, take it for granted that our message is familiar to the ends of the earth, but it is impossible to describe the thrill of wonder and worship that flooded our hearts in those early days as each new report came to us of the Spirit falling in some new corner of the globe. Then we knew how truly that it was the Lord Himself who was pouring out "that which ye now hear and see." We knew that it was not man's doing: it was so far beyond that. Our hearts were filled with gratitude and awe that the passing years have never erased. The days of which I write can be

remembered with me by many of the ministering brethren, who will confirm the fact of our great awe and gratitude for each fresh and new token that God was visiting the dry, barren ground with a deluge and flood direct from Heaven. One of our favorite choruses in those days was this:

Oh, I'm glad the promised latter rain has

And the latter rain is falling now on some! Pour it out in floods, Lord, on the parched

'Till it reaches all the earth around.

Another chorus sung a great deal in those days, in the tarrying services, was:

Let the Holy Ghost come in, Let the Holy Ghost come in; Make the consecration, Trust in God, and then Let the Holy Ghost come in.

That was our vision—"ALL THE EARTH AROUND"—sharing alike of the refreshing showers, and our spirits were quickened at fresh tidings of God moving, no matter where. It all caused fresh waves of praise tot he Name of Him who is worthy. Although the work of any one individual was as only a drop in the bucket, to what God was doing, yet one can remember and record most distinctly "the things we have seen and heard"—personal memories are perhaps the clearest, and the ones we can pass on most accurately.

Some scenes from those early days are worth recording.

While I was preaching one night, quoting Acts 10:44-46, under the anointing of the Spirit, "While Peter yet spake these words, the Holy Ghost fell on them that heard the Word . . . for they heard them speak with tongues and magnify God," a duplicate of that Bible scene was re-enacted. Suddenly the Spirit descended in like manner on two sisters in the audience, instantly filling them with the Holy Spirit, as the Word was going forth. Evangelist Miss Ella Goff (now the wife of George S. Paul of Van-couver, B. C.) and Mrs. Chafe of Winnipeg (recently gone home to glory), there at their seats were filled at practically the same instant in the midst of the preaching, the Spirit falling on them as it had so long ago under Peter's preaching. This was a great witness to me that the Lord is speaking the same today as then.

On One Occasion

in Toronto, in those early days, while in prayer in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Murray, returned missionaries from Arabia, suddenly the Spirit descended upon us, and I spoke in another language. At once both Mr. and Mrs. Murray, in different parts of the room, arose to their feet, stating that the words I had spoken were words of praise and adoration in the Arabic language. This was a modern confirmation to me at that time, of how they understood the language on the day of Pentecost. Since then we have witnessed similar scenes in various campaigns, as different ones have received the Spirit. In Vancouver, B. C., a young girl spoke in the Japanese language, and it was interpreted to us by a Japanese woman who was present, and who evidently was much moved upon by the incident. In Cleveland, a woman received, speaking in the dialect of South China, understood and interpreted to us by a returned missionary present. In Edmonton, and elsewhere, similar scenes have occurred, confirming our faith. Last summer during the Paris, Ontario, camp meeting, two such instances occurred, one who received the Baptism speaking in Italian, and one in the dialect of South China, both interpreted to us by those who understood them. in the latter case the eldest son of Brother Elmer Morrison, just back from China, heard the sister repeat five times Chinese words meaning, "Praise to Thee, Lord Jesus." This so melted his heart that he sought and received the Holy Spirit a few days

The End Is Not Yet!

The movement continues to grow by leaps and bounds throughout the world. It appears to carry the message for which hearts are so hungry in these last The movement as a whole has grown faster than any other religious movement of our day, according to statistics we glean from the Christian Herald, which, in a recent annual record of church membership increase on an adult basis, lists thirty-five major bodies having more than 100,000 each. Listed in the order of their percentage of increase for that particular year over the preceding year, stands the Assemblies of God (Pentecostal) at the head, with an increase of almost 13 per cent. The next highest in the colored Methodist Episcopal with a little over 7 per cent increase. There were very few denominations that had increased more than 1 per cent. In a very large number of denominations there was a decrease. The Assemblies of God is only a part of the Pentecostal movement. If all the figures were obtainable, the phenomenal growth of the movement would be astounding.

The Pentecostal Evangel says, with re-

gard to Pentecost in Great Britain, "Pentecost is not something that has been done in a corner of Great Britain, for even the conservative London press cannot overlook it." The London Daily Express, reporting a meeting held at Royal Albert Hall in London on April 17, said, "Three times 10,000 people assembled in the Albert Hall yesterday. There were 10,000 came in the morning, 10,000 came in the afternoon, and 10,000 came at night. Of those who testified, 72 acknowledged cures from cancer and malignant growth, 20 had been cripples, 17 had been blind, 70 had been afflicted with stiff muscles or useless limbs, 18 had been deaf."

During the Past 29 Years most of the time we have been in campaigns, conventions, and camp meeting work, and have been privileged to witness many wonderful altar scenes and visitations from God. During these last years over and over again the major campaigns have witnessed anywhere from fifty to well over a hundred in a single campaign or camp meeting, receive the Baptism of the Holy Spirit and when the power is falling it in turn always brings conviction on sinners and causes them to repent and seek the Lord. We have witnessed many other wonderful scenes. Once I was shaking hands with a sister and we were both praising when she was instantly filled with the Spirit. When the revival tide would be at its height, others have been filled when in bed; one lady while ironing; one while talking over the telephone. Sometimes a heavenly light has appeared to some, somewhat as Paul saw on the road to Damascus. The heavenly chorus when it has come forth in the power of the Spirit from a company of many hundreds of Spirit-filled saints, can never be forgotten. Prophecy has in a remarkable degree accompanied the outpouring of the Spirit throughout the world, warning of many events that have occurred; the world war, famine, pestilence, and still warning that other stupendous events are at the door, and that Jesus is coming soon, and our time here very, very short.

There Are Days Ahead in which we will need the Spirit. When I see the dark clouds gathering, I feel like urging men to pray, to seek the face of God, then He will rain down His Spirit, upon the old and young; upon the servants and upon the handmaidens. Do not desert the altar, nor the place of prayer, lest the Shekinah cloud leave us. There are dark days ahead yet, and we need the Spirit of God mightily to rest upon us.

While tarrying for the Holy Spirit almost thirty years ago, a wonderful vision of Jesus appeared before me. It was so real, that I lifed my hand before my face to see if that would shut the vision off, but it did not. My hand ap-

peared to become transparent, and through it still shone the beautiful vision of the Lord. But all these wonderful things from the Lord are not always in the past. Last summer at the Paris camp meeting one morning a Brother Steinman, just return from Palestine, was to tell the story of his visit to Jerusalem. I wanted to hear it, but my strength was so exhausted that I felt unable to sit up in the meeting. Our car was parked just outside the tent, so I went and sat in it, hoping to rest, and be able to hear at the same time. As I sat there a heavy sleep fell upon me, and I seemed to see the New Jerusalem. I heard sweet strains of heavenly music, and as our brother was speaking about the earthly Jerusalem, I saw the New Jerusalem descending from God, out of Heaven. It was a celestial, radiant city -a wonderful sight! Its beauty lingers with me yet, and still continues to refresh my spirit.

Be True

for soon this heavenly city, the New Jerusalem, will be coming down. May we each be found worthy through the Blood of the Lamb, to have a part in it on that glorious day! We treasure any personal connections with the earthly Jerusalem. For instance, I still have among my papers the first issue of a little paper published in Jerusalem, Palestine, in 1908, on page 1 of which appears an article I had written on "The Outpouring of the Holy Spirit." I have treasured that paper from Palestine for nearly thirty years. How much greater an honor to be associated with the New Jerusalem which will soon be coming down! Rev. 21:2. Countless others throughout the world have had visions of Christ and glimpses of that Holy City as the Spirit has been outpoured, making Christ and the glory world indescribably near to multitudes of hungry hearts.

One question comes to me as I close. Will history repeat itself? When the early rain was outpoured, there was a period of thirty-some years, or one generation, until the destruction of Jerusalem. Now, under the latter rain, nearly a generation has elapsed for

getting out the message. Is our task nearing its finish? From radio, press and pulpit, the message has gone out, and God will judge those who have rejected His call, as He did in days gone by. Meanwhile, may we work faithfully until Jesus comes, trusting Him to yet more fully confirm the preaching of the Word! He is able!

The Body for God

Dr. James M. Gray in a service one evening expounded Romans 12:1. Leaning over the pulpit, he said, "Have you noticed that this verse does not tell us to whom we should give our bodies? It is not the Lord Jesus who asks for it. He has His own body. It is not the Father who asks for it. He remains upon His throne. Another has come to earth without a body. God could have made a body for Him as He did for Jesus, but He did not do so. God gives you the privilege and the indescribable honor of presenting your bodies to the Holy Spirit, to be His dwelling place on earth. If you have been washed in the Blood of the Lamb then yours is a holy body, washed whiter than snow, and will be accepted by the Spirit when you give it. Will you do so now?"

Thine Health Shall Spring Forth Speedily

We will take a lesson from Isaiah 58. There are some wonderful promises in this chapter, and there are also certain conditions. Often in giving us promises, God makes conditions which must be met, and it is necessary for us to look carefully at these if we would claim the promises.

"Then shall thy light break forth as the morning, and thine health shall spring forth speedily." Many are sick and this is a blessed text for those who are in need of healing. "Then shall thine health spring forth speedily." The Lord Jesus is our Great Physician, and it is not His will that we shall wait and suffer, but He desires to bring us to that place of perfect yieldedness, and living union with Himself, where He can make true to us Proverbs 4:20-22. In this passage, we see that if we will attend to God's words, and keep them in the midst of our heart, they shall be, "Life unto those that find them, and health to all their flesh." What a marvelous thing to have God's words mean health to all our flesh, so that we will be every whit whole!

We often see people running about here and there to find a climate which will tone them up, also they try all sorts of medicines, tonics, etc., but all these often prove themselves to be without power to bring the desired result. God wants us to find the very elixir of life in the life of His dear Son, Jesus Christ our Saviour, made a reality to our physical life as well as to us spiritually. In the passage we have just quoted from Proverbs 4, the word "health" is translated in the margin "medicine." What earthly medicine could one find that would bring health to all their flesh? We read in Psalm 107:20: "He sent His word, and healed them." The trouble is that God's people do not feed upon His Word as they should. When we read this precious Word, we must ask the Holy Spirit to quicken the Word and make it life to us. The Holy Ghost will do this as He takes of the things of Jesus and shows them unto us.

Now let us look at some of the conditions in this 58th chapter of Isaiah. God has been talking about a "fast." The people had complained to God that they had fasted, and He had taken no knowledge of their fast, but God found fault with them and told them He had not been pleased with their attitude, because they had fasted for strife and debate, and to smite with the fist of wickedness, and He showed them He would not hear their voices when fasting in such a spirit.

Then in verse 6, He tells them the

kind of a fast that would be acceptable unto Him. "Is not this the fast that I have chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the heavy burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break every yoke? Is it not to deal thy bread to the hungry, and that thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? when thou seest the naked, that thou cover him; and that thou hide not thyself from thine own flesh?"

We read in the Gospels that the Lord spoke of certain demons: "Howbeit this kind goeth not out but by prayer and fasting." Matt. 17:21. We see from this chapter in Isaiah, that the fasting the Lord requires means a good deal more than simple fasting from food. Of course it is a very good thing to abstain from food, when we do it in the right spirit; we thus get nearer to the Lord, and hear His voice more clearly, but when we fast we must have the right attitude toward Him. We must be willing to live for others and not for ourselves. must be willing to give up selfish desires and pleasures, and to follow the foot-steps of Jesus in a life of sacrificial ministry. Perhaps you say you cannot do much for others because you have not had much light yourself. Beloved, pass on to others the light God has given you, and He will give you more. Be willing to be a little light for Jesus to light others on the way.

Years ago, we did not have any street lights in Beulah Heights, and one of the dear boys from the Orphanage used to come to the Beulah Station to meet us, and to light us on the roadway to our home. He had just a little lantern, but he held it in such a way that we would have one little gleam of light shining from it for each step of the way. That was quite sufficient, for we did not have to take more than one step at a time. As the light of God is shed

Now, by faith, the gift I claim, Bought for me by blood divine Through Thine all-prevailing Name, All Thy promises are mine. abroad in our hearts, God shows us how to light the pathway of others, and He pours out blessings on us while we bless others. It is when we live the kind of a life described in Isaiah 58:6 and 7 that we shall have the blessedness spoken of in the next four verses. Listen carefully, Beloved, to see what God has for you if you meet the conditions:

Light breaking forth as the morning.

Health springing forth speedily.

Thy righteousness shall go before thee.

The glory of the Lord shall be thy rereward.

Then shalt thou call, and the Lord shall answer.

Thou shalt cry, and He shall say, Here I am.

Then shall thy light rise in obscurity.
Thy darkness be as the noon day.
And the Lord shall guide thee continually.
And satisfy thy soul in drought.
And make fat thy bones.
Thou shalt be as a watered garden.
And like a spring of water, whose waters

And like a spring of water, whose waters fail not.

What a wonderful list of blessings, and we may have them all by meeting the conditions. This does not necessarily mean that you must bring the poor into your house, for perhaps you have no house into which you can bring them, but we must first of all get the spiritual interpretation. The Lord Jesus is our house, and we abide in Him, and we are to help others to believe in Him and to shelter under His care. He is our bread, which we must feed to the hungry; His robe of righteousness is covering for naked souls.

Of course it is very blessed also to take this literally, in doing these things for the needy, and if we trust God, He enables us to share our blessings with the poor. Even when people seem to have very little with which to enrich others, yet in answer to prayer He will send gifts as it were from Heaven for us to pass on to them. I often think of that word which Jesus says about the needy ones: "For ye have the poor with you always, and whensoever ye will ye may do them good." Mark 14:7. This seems like a blessed permission to do good to the poor whenever we will, and seems to imply that God will supply the means with which we may do them good, but this is true to those who really trust God.

What a great commission God gives us, when He tells us to "break every yoke." When we look at ourselves and our weakness, we say, "Who is sufficient for these things?" But when we look at the greatness of our God and the power of His Word, we see that in the Almighty Name of Jesus, we may set people free, loose the bands of wickedness, undo the heavy burdens and let the oppressed go free. The Lord Jesus has told us that what we loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. What a marvelous ministry He has for us if we will

only let the faithful Holy Spirit work

through us to bless others.

Beloved, we will not try to go over in detail every part of this wonderful chapter, but we would like to have you study it carefully and make it your very own. Would you not love to be "like a watered garden" in which the Lord can delight? We have seen a garden in which were many choice plants, but because of lack of water the plants were dried up and showed very little signs of life or beauty. When that same garden received an abundant supply of water, all was changed, and the leaves and flowers came forth plentifully. God wants us to be filled with the blessed Holy Spirit, and then we shall continually be watered with the river of life, until every plant of His planting within us shall become beautiful and fruitful for our God.

and to cast out demons. Matthew 10, and Luke 9. Before He sent forth the Seventy He gave them the same power (Luke 10), and before He ascended to glory He gave the same power to believers in general. John 14:12-14; Mark 16:16-20. Stephen and Philip, who were of the Seven, but not of the Twelve and perhaps not of the Seventy, were mightily used of God in a healing ministry (Acts 6:8; 8:6, 7), and doubtless the same was true of many others who were not of the apostolic college. The last full directions given in the book, is that classic text on divine healing, James 5:14, 15. The sick are not advised to send for the apostles, but for the elders, and all ministers of the gospel are elders.

But why did James advise the sick to call for the elders, if any other believers could pray for the sick? We answer, because the elders were specially chosen by the early churches because of their fitness for this service, and those so chosen were supported and backed up by the prayers of the church. For the sake of good order, so far as possible, it is better to ask the elders, and the more experienced among us, if they are men of faith, to anoint the sick, than to ask new beginners in this glorious "way." But when I was lying near death's door in Detroit, Mich., nearly sixteen years ago, and wanted some "elders" to come and anoint me and pray over me, I could find none who were officially appointed by any church, but I called some Pentecostal believers whom God had appointed, and I was healed.

Is it not true that in the early days of Pentecost more was made of Divine Healing than there is at the present time? Sixteen years ago while groping toward Pentecost, and while pastor of a Baptist church in Detroit, some copies of *The Pentecostal Evangel* fell into my hands.

I found much about Divine Healing in those numbers, and one had a very full account of the General Council meeting in Springfield, Mo., and of an amazing healing service in Convention Hall. That thrilled and inspired me as nothing else I had read outside of the Bible.

In those days, great prominence was given in many of our larger gatherings, to the anointing of the afflicted, and through this ministry hundreds of people came to hear the Pentecostal message, and great numbers have become able and consistent leaders among us. Has there not been a tendency in many of our gatherings to give this ministry a secondary place? Special preparation is necessary to conduct services of that kind with marked success. We need to fast and pray and read and re-read the great texts in God's Word and build up a mighty faith which can reach out and take hold of what the Lord offers. This cannot be done by praying for people

incidentally, and thoughtlessly and in the midst of confusion. A service of that kind should be well announced, and all the willing people who understand the importance of the service should fast and pray and call upon the Lord to stretch out His hand to heal, that signs and wonders might be done in the adorable name of Jesus. Acts 4:29-33.

But alas! many who advocate Divine Healing, as soon as a test is applied turn to the arm of flesh, and not a few are weakening in their testimony and faith in this great cardinal doctrine of Pentecost. Shall we surrender this fort, this stronghold of our faith? Never! May God grant that we may come into a deeper knowledge, and a higher faith than we have ever known in the mighty miracle-working power of our Christ. If we cannot trust the Lord with our bodies, how can we trust Him with our souls? May God give us a real revival of divine healing, and along with that will come the mightiest wave of spiritual power we have ever experienced or witnessed. When the apostles were charged to speak or preach no more in the name of Jesus, they answered the council, "We cannot but speak the things which we have seen

and heard." Acts 4:20. That was real conviction. May the same Spirit of truth and grace and power rest upon us.

Wait and See

"I never let bairns or fools see my pictures until they are done," said a Scottish artist to me once, quoting a familiar proverb of his countrymen. We are all but "bairns" in God's sight, and we sadly play the fool in regard to His providential dealings. As no artist is willing to have a judgment pronounced on painting or statue until the work is completed, so our heavenly Teacher bids us to possess our souls in patience. "What I do thou knowest not now, but thou shalt know hereafter." We must wait and see. This world is but the preparatory school, in which character is on the easel or under the chisel; exhibition day will come in another world.

God only lets us see His providences "in part," and then we only see them as through a glass darkly. Why that coffin was carried like a specter up our stairway; why the pillow in that empty crib is unpressed today; why that income on which so many hungry mouths depended is dried up; why this and that staff was broken—our poor, blind, ach-

ing hearts cannot understand.

God keeps His own secrets; all the answer He vouchsafes now is, "All things work together for good to them that love Me." Impatient and rebellious as we may be now, we cannot displace God's hand from the canvas. There is no help for us but to wait until the picture is completed. (Some of the colors He is laying into our lives are frightfully sombre, but by-and-by in the revealing light of the last day, they may be only a background on which faith and submissive trust and victorious strength will stand out in hues of golden glory. Let us wait and see.)

A great deal of our work in this world is night work. Weary with rowing, we even get frightened by the apparition of the Master, and cry out, "It is a ghost!" until He reveals Himself in the words, "It is I, be of good cheer; be not afraid." The history of every discovery of new truth, of every enterprise of benevolence, of every Christian reform, of almost every revival, is the history of long working, waiting and watching through seasons of discouragement. . . . The lesson for every missionary, every pastor, every teacher, and every sorely tried child of God is in these heaven-taught words: "I wait for the Lord, and in His Word do I hope; my soul waiteth for the Lord more than they that watch for the morning."—Dr. Cuyler.

"And Jacob called unto his sons, and said, Gather yourselves together, that I may tell you that which shall befall you in the last days." Gen. 49:1.

The Sunday School Tesson

An Ambassador in Chains

Lesson for November 22. Lesson Text: Acts 25:1-12; 28:16-31; Romans 5:1-11; Philippians 1:12-14; 4:22.

I. THE MESSAGE TO JEWRY

Bound, yet free. Paul was in Rome-and in chains. But the Word of the Lord was not bound. Said he at the beginning of his letter to the saints at Philippi, "The things which happened unto me have fallen out rather unto the furtherance of the gospel." Phil. 1:12. He concludes this epistle with the words, "All the saints (doubtless all of them personal converts of his) salute you, chiefly they that are of Cæsar's household." The gospel had penetrated into the heart of the world's capital and into the very palace of the ruler of Rome's vast empire. They put John into a prison on Patmos, but they could not keep his spirit from soaring into the heavens and receiving the wonderful visions given us in the Revelation. They thrust John Bunyan into the Bedford jail, but they could not prevent his having that wonderful dream given to us in "Pilgrim's Progress." All things—with no possible exceptions-work together for good to them that love God. Learn to praise God for every hard thing that comes into your life.

Jewry's opportunity. Paul sent for the leaders of Jewry, and a day was appointed when from morning until night he expounded, with the Law and the Prophets as his textbooks, the kingdom of God and the things concerning Jesus. Was his message accepted? Yes, by some. But it was rejected by others-evidently the majority. Then Paul reminded them of the word of judgment that Isaiah prophesied concerning the rejecters of God's messagegross hearts, deaf ears, blinded eyes, darkened understandings. There are two sides to God's character, and the apostle would have us seriously contemplate them both, declaring: "Behold therefore the goodness and severity of God: on them which fell, severity; but toward thee, goodness." Rom. 11:22. Joseph Parker used to say, "Men are inventing a great big kiss of a God." Review the history of Jewry for the past 3,000 years, and you will see the severity of God. Contemplate Pentecost and the great awakening that followed, and you see the goodness of God. You can have either His severity or His goodness. Which will you choose? Severity is surely coming to every rejecter and neglecter of God's great salvation -for such there is nothing but a lake of fire ahead.

II. THE MESSAGE TO ALL COMERS

Paul's personal ministry. From this prison home went forth Paul's Epistles to the Ephesians, Colossians, and Philippians, also his letter to Philemon. According to Graham Scroggie, the first imprisonment of Paul lasted two years, from A. D. 61 to A. D. 63. He was rearrested and taken to Rome again in A. D. 68. In this year he had two trials and was condemned to death. From here he wrote his second letter to Timothy in which he stated that the time of his departure was at hand. A day came when the prison door opened and the jailor led him to the place of execution.

What a joyful release to say goodbye, to all earth's prison cells and to be forever with Christ!

The kingdom of God. To those who came to see him, Paul preached "the kingdom of God" and the things "which concerned the Lord Jesus Christ.' Christ preached the kingdom message. His is a heavenly kingdom and it requires the new birth before we can This heavenly kingdom will one day be established upon the earth. Then He, the Man that was crowned with thorns at Calvary, shall be crowned with many crowns and exalted as King of kings and Lord of lords. As citizens of the heavenly kingdom we must learn to walk worthily of our Heavenly King. Those in the days of Saul who left all and joined in the exile of David, whom the Lord had anointed, held high position in his kingdom in a later day. For a little while we are to share with our Lover-Lord in His rejection; at a later date it will be our privilege to reign throughout eternity with Him. "The saints of the most High shall take the kingdom, and possess the kingdom for ever, even for ever and ever." Dan. 7:18.

Not yet completed. The four Gospels all finish with the word Amen. They are com-Note the absence of this word in the last chapter of Acts. Why? The ministry of the Holy Ghost through Spirit-filled saints is not yet complete. A noted bishop was reading the story of the labors of John Williams in the South Seas. As he finished it he said, "This is the 29th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles." If that good bishop had read Hudson Taylor's story I think he would have said that that was the 30th chapter. If he had been in our office last week and heard Sister Marie Stephany from China telling some of the wonderful things she has witnessed, that good bishop might have said that that was the 31st chapter. In the centuries since Luke finished his work the Spirit of God has continued to write millions of additional chapters.

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Most of them are unknown to men but God knows them.

III. THE MESSAGE TO YOU AND ME

A substitute. In the epistle to the Romans Paul sets forth the way of salvation. Christ died for the ungodly. That includes every one of us. Adam was created in the image of God. Sin entered and man from that day forth has been ungodly. The history of the world is a story of ever-increasing corruption and ungodliness. But Christ came, and died as a substitute for all of us ungodly ones. Said Moody, "If you take the teaching of substitution out of the teaching of Paul, Peter, John, James, Philip, and all other holy men, you take out all they preached.

For his enemies. Did we deserve the work of our Substitute? No. When we walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, fulfilling the lusts of the flesh and of the mind, we were truly enemies of His. But He who went to Calvary and died in our stead brings a pardon to all of us unworthy enemies and rebels. It is written, "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." Ezek. 18:4. We have all sinned, but this glorious Substitute offers to us a remission of the penalty due us. He died in our stead. The story is told of a man in ancient Rome who was pursued by his enemies. His slave, who loved him, took his master's clothes, put them on, was captured and put to death. The master in gratitude for that faithful slave's love, put up a monument to him. Christ died for us, the Righteous One for us unrighteous In gratitude we should even now yield our lives to Him. Said Sir Walter Scott, "The greatest letters in the English language are N-O-W." Now is the time to accept the pardon purchased at so great a price. Now is the time to render glad, whole-hearted yieldedness to Him who died for us.

Saved by His life. Reconciled, or brought back to God by His death at Calvary, we are now "saved by His life." He, the living Vine, makes us partakers of His own very life, pouring the sap of His blessed Spirit into our beings to enable us to bring forth an abundance of fruit. How can you tell a Christian? By his fruit. Those who do not show forth the evidences of the Lamb-life within need to take heed to the apostolic warning: "Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves. Know ye not your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you, except ye be reprobates (counterfeits)."

Joy. The saint's portion is one of joy. Do you know where to find true joy? David tells us, "In thy presence (the presence of the Lord) is fullness of joy; at thy right hand there are pleasures for evermore." Psalm 16:11. Are you a pleasure-seeker? Do you go to the world for its thrills? There is the sting of the serpent in all the pleasures of sin. Turn to the only source of true joy, to the One whom the Psalmist speaks of as his "exceeding joy." Psalm 43:4. You will find that He will give you to drink even here and now of the river of His eternal pleasures.—S. H. F.

UNIVERSAL WEEK OF PRAYER

The World's Evangelical Alliance has issued its ninetieth call for the annual Universal Week of Prayer, January 3-10, 1937. The suggested subjects for prayer are Thanksgiving and Confession, The Church Universal, Nations and Their Rulers, Missions, Home Life and Education, Home Missions and the Salvation of the Jews.

AN INTERNATIONAL BRAIN TRUST

Reports New York Times: "One of the most vital discussions at the recent Harvard University tercentenary celebrations dealt with the suggestion that if the thinkers of the world could unite and form an advisory body and state their views on the vital issues which trouble the world it would be of great advantage. To sum up, a—League of Nations of Thinkers."

But man's wicked heart has generally thwarted man's brilliant brain.

THE RED HAND

More than 5,000 priests, nuns, and missionaries have been slain by the communists in Spain, acting under orders from Moscow "to kill as many priests as possible," Father Don Carmelo Blaj, administrator of the Spanish college in the Vatican charged today (quoted in a news despatch).

Official Vatican records placed the death toll at 2111, with 181 churches and convents destroyed, but Vatican sources said the figure would reach Father Blaj's estimate when verification of mass executions has been completed.

THE TERROR OF WAR

"Every day that passes shows us war a more terrible master than ever before," declared George Lansbury, British statesman. "The devilish ingenuity of man excels itself in creating fouler means for destroying and mutilating men, women, and children. We pacifists refuse to sit down quietly and allow this process to continue unchecked and without a protest. We refuse to believe the fatalistic theory that, because all other civilizations have decayed, so also must ours. Neither do we think that force and domination, greed and avarice, and all the evil which the present-day world gives us are incurable and an integral part of our human nature. . . . Europe and Asia are armed camps where no one can say how soon a spark from one country or the other may set the whole ablaze."

"THOU SHALT FEAR DAY AND NIGHT" Deut. 28:66

Moses' grim prediction given above is being fulfilled today. Witness the following words from the Jewish periodical B'nai Brith Magazine.

"We hear the Jews being frightened when they pick up their morning papers these days. The Jews are in the headlines, not by reason of anything they themselves have done but on account of the aspersions of their enemies.

"American blatherskites are heard challenging the Jews with false innuendoes.

"Hitlerites spew venom at Jews and Bolshevists in one condemnation.

"Fascist (Italian) Editorial Hits Jews, reads a black headline that admonishes Jews of anti-Semitic infection in Italy, which until now has been free of this disease.

"Jews tremble: 'What does all this mean to us in America? This tumult of voices raised against Jews?"

"Only inhabitants of a fool's paradise could laugh this off. It would be child's talk for us to say that unthinking minds will be impervious to a multitude of voices crying, 'Jew! Jew!' through the press."



What does it mean in the Revised Version where it says the rich man was in hades—not hell?

Hades is the place to which the rich man went to await the final judgment. At the final judgment "death and hades" will be cast into the lake of fire, Rev. 20:13, 14.

Briefly, God here shows that from the time when the Jews returned to their land from their captivity, which they did under Nehemiah and Ezra, there should be 490 years divided as follows, 49 years from the time they began to return from their captivity to the time when their city and temple should be restored, then another 434 years to the time when Christ should be offered for sin. Then there was to be another seven years which was to begin with a covenant made between Israel and the Roman prince, the Antichrist, which covenant the Antichrist should break in the midst of the week. This last 7 years has not yet begun. During the period of time between the cutting off of Messiah and the coming of this Roman prince there has been fulfilling a New Testament mystery, the outcalling of the Church. Eph. 3:3-6. When the church age ends Antichrist will make his covenant with Israel and the last seven of the 490 years will begin.-E. S. W.

COMMUNISM

In its effort to banish from the minds of the people all thought of Christ and God, Communists in Spain recently changed the statue of the Christ Child, which stood in the portal of the historic church of San Jose in Madrid, into that of a child Communist. The Watchman-Examiner tells that the new representation has a pistol in his uplifted right hand, and a red banner in his left.

ATHEISTIC AIMS

In the Atheistic Conference held in Moscow in May of the present year, it was determined, says World Dominion, to take up an aggressive attitude everywhere to religion especially to the Christian religion. To achieve this end it was resolved to create an international Atheistic Fund for the purpose of organizing world-wide propaganda. Summer camps of the Revolutionary Communists in the United States reached over 20,000 children this summer, and organizations are specially active in schools and colleges. The major industries have been penetrated by "cells" and a definite program, aiming at armed revolution, has been prepared and published.

CHINA'S ONE-TIME CHRISTIAN GENERAL

Marshal Feng, one-time "Christian general" of China repudiated his Christianity some time ago in favor of Communism. But his love for the needy Chinese is unabated. Brother L. M. Anglin writes that "General Feng has the poor and needy on his heart and he is always thinking of some plan to help them. During his short stay he opened thirteen schools for the poor children in different villages in and around the sacred mountain, Tai Shan.

"I hope that our readers will pray earnestly for General Feng. He has recently been appointed Vice Commissioner General of the National Military Affairs Commission and he is next in power to General Chang Kai Shih. He is in a position to do the country a great deal of good if only he will let the Lord use him."

CHRISTIAN EPITAPHS

The highest and lowest are on one level in the grave, and, if Christians, are embalmed in one creed. Andrew Jackson, the seventh President of the United States, wrote his own epitaph:--"I have prepared an humble depository for my mortal body beside that wherein lies my beloved wife, where, without any pomp or parade, I have requested, when my God calls me to sleep with my fathers, to be laid; for both of us there to remain until the last trumpet sounds to call the dead to judgment, when we, I hope, shall rise together, clothed with that heavenly body promised to all who believe in our glorious Redeemer who died for us that we might live, and by whose atonement I hope for a blessed immortality."

In a churchyard at Henbury, near Bristol, is an epitaph of a slave: "Here lieth the body of Scipio Africanus, negro servant to the Earl of Suffolk: died, Dec. 21, 1720, aged 18 years. "I was born a pagan and a slave,

Now sweetly sleep a Christian in my grave. What tho' my hue was dark, my Saviour's sight Shall change this darkness into radiant light; Such grace to me my lord on earth has given To recommend me to my Lord in Heaven, Whose glorious second coming here I wait With saints and angels Him to celebrate."

NEW CHURCH FOR COLOMBO W. H. Clifford

We are sure that you will be glad to know that we laid the corner stone of our new tabernacle August 24 in the presence of between 200 and 300 people. The stone was inscribed "JESUS CHRIST, THE CHIEF CORNER STONE." This was a day of great rejoicing for we have prayed and longed to have a tabernacle of our own for years and now this is being made possible by a gift of land from one of our families and by the sacrifices of our friends in Ceylon, America, England, and India. The walls are going up fast and have reached the tops of the windows at this writing.

We shall be grateful for the prayers of our friends that the remainder of the needed funds will come in for the building. We also need benches, hymn books, pulpit, etc. We wonder if any of our friends who read this will help us. We need about 150 hymn books "Songs of Praise" for our English speaking congregation. These can be obtained from Springfield at \$45.00 per hundred

f. o.b. Postage to Ceylon would be extra. Benches cost \$10.00 each. Offerings for these needs may be sent to Springfield, designated for this purpose. The land and the building are being held in the name of the General Council of the Assemblies of God. The people here are mostly poor people and they are sacrificing a great deal in order to put up this building for the Lord. One of our members, who is a servant girl getting only \$2.00 per month, gave her month's salary toward the building. I talked with our finance committee yesterday about the building and the funds we had on hand and they asked, "Will our American friends help us?" could only reply that I hoped they would.

Reaching the Villages

Last week we were out in some Buddhist villages about 30 miles from here where they are hearing the gospel for the first time. One of our Sinhalese evangelists and his wife went there about two months ago to live in their midst and to give the gospel message to them. We found the people very eager to

listen and several women expressed a desire to become Christians. Please pray for the work in this place (Benmulla) that many may be led to know and love the Saviour.

I expect to go up country shortly to visit a Tamil work among the tea and rubber estates for two or three days. This place is some 70 miles from Colombo and the work is among Hindus chiefly. There are many hungry hearts among the people and we shall be glad for your prayers for this work and for all the efforts we are putting forth for the Lord. If we are all faithful, some day there will be a reward and a glad welcome from those who have been redeemed because we prayed, gave and labored to give and send the gospel to them.

We wish to thank all who are praying, giving and helping us in any way so that we may continue to proclaim the gospel message in this island. God is hearing your prayers, souls are being saved, some bodies have been healed and great interest is being shown. Large crowds gather to listen to the singing and preaching in the open air meet-

ings that are held near the market place in Colombo. A few nights ago when the message was being given (one brother speaking in Tamil and another interpreting it into Sinhalese) a man came into the circle, began abusing the brethren and threw sand into the face of the interpreter. The brother kept on preaching and the interpreter just patted the offender on the shoulder. The crowd were ashamed of the man's actions and were greatly impressed by the spirit shown by the brother who was treated so badly. They finally quieted the disturbance.


Week of Special Meetings

We have just closed a week of special meetings in Colombo. Missionaries and other brethren came from Galle in the South and a number of Indian brethren came from up country to be with us. We held seven meetings a day—early morning prayer, Bible study, tarry service, prayer again, workers' conference, open air service and night evangelistic meeting. It was one of the sweetest and most profitable times of fellowship that I ever remember. God bless-

ed in a very real way. It was supposed to be a Tamil convention but all classes were reached, interpretation being given to reach the people in two languages and a short message was given in a third language in order to reach those who did not understand the other two. Hindus came and gave their hearts to the Lord, policemen came and asked all kinds of questions. The large hall was packed and great interest was shown. Many wanted us to continue for a longer period but the brethren felt that they must get back to their own congregations and so we closed on the seventh night, praising and thanking God for His goodness.

Among many incidents in that crowded week there is one that stood out. The last service was over and I was praying with a pastor from up country who was leaving early the next morning when a young man about 23 years old came and said that he wanted me to pray that his sins might be forgiven. I asked, "Have you prayed for yourself that they might be forgiv-

Her distress relieved, we longed to just once satisfy the hunger of a few and also to bring the happiness of Christmas to the hearts of the orphans whom He had entrusted to our care.

Christmas, all over India, is called in the Indian languages "Great Day." But why

the name, the multitudes do not know. What an opportunity to tell them the reason; namely, that it was on this day, many years ago, that God in heaven gave us the great Gift, yes the greatest ever heard of, and in gratitude to God for the gift of salvation we are giving our little gifts to the needy. This little girl was not just an isolated case. Thousands of children in India never know what it is to have a square meal. This is true also of poor, heathen children in other lands.

The mystery of life, its uncertainty, our sense of impotence and ignorance, the taking of our loved ones within the envelopment of the unseen, the strange sense of incomprehensible enigma—these are some of the mists that help to soften our characters."—Fuller.

"So the gracious influences of the Holy Spirit gather on our souls and refresh us. We know not whence or how, but we do become sweeter, gentler, tenderer, as we yield to our Gardener's beneficent care. The sun does not scorch us, and the heat does not exhaust.

"Let us enter into a holy fellowship with God in His antagonism to whatever is unworthy and evil in our lives, asking Him to search out the sin that is there and to put it away. Then shall we blossom and bud, becoming His pleasant vineyard, and so shall we bear refreshing fruit." Isa. 58:11.

A MESSAGE OF HOPE

A message of hope and confidence has been sent to the Jewish people throughout the world by the Executive of the Zionist organization and the Jewish Agency in Jerusalem.

"In these days of grave trial, we find deep consolation in the consciousness that the whole world Jewry is concerned about the fate of the Jewish work of resettlement in Palestine, which is the creation not of the Jews of Palestine alone but of the entire Jewish people.

"We realize that you are moved not only by anxiety for the life and well-being of 400,000 Jews now in Palestine, but for the realization of the great and historic hope of our race for the upbuilding of Eretz-Israel.

"This is not the first time that our peaceful creative effort has been interfered with by assaults of instigated rioters. The danger is not yet over, but the Yishuv no longer feels itself helpless. On the contrary, it is firmly confident that no hostile force can shatter the solid foundations which we have succeeded in laying for our renewed Homeland."

Israel must and will ultimately learn that "salvation is of the Lord."

THE LOST TRIBES

Where are the ten lost tribes—the northern tribes that were carried into captivity and that never returned as a nation? (2 Kings 17.) Well, if we knew where they were they would not be the *lost* tribes! However, there is a

group of interpreters who claim that the tribes are found. According to their teaching, the northern tribes began to move westward, reached Europe and turned up as the Anglo-Saxon race. Consequently, the people of England and America are the descendants of the ten lost tribes. They claim that the English are the descendants of Ephraim, and the people of United States are the descendants of Manasseh. Alleged Scriptural and archeological evidences are brought forth to bolster up this theory (known as the Anglo-Israel or British-Israel theory), which, however, in the light of sober interpretation appears utterly unfounded.

Comments F. W. Pitt: "One text said to support British Israelism is, 'The kingdom of God shall be taken from you, and given to a nation bringing forth the fruits thereof.' Matt. 21:43. But this text is against the British Israel theory, for the kingdom was taken from Israel and given to another nation. Whatever nation was meant by the Lord in these words it is 'another,' and not Israel. If Britain is Israel, then it was taken from Israel and given to Israel, and not to another nation."

"Lo, the people shall dwell alone, and shall not be reckoned among the nations," declared Balaam in an inspired prophecy concerning Israel. Num. 23:9. This is certainly not true of England or America.

NEW DISTRICTS FORMED

We are happy to announce that new Districts have been formed of the territory which was once the North Central District Council. Each of the five states which once made up the North Central District coun-

cil has now grown to the extent that each state is now a District, well organized and functioning with much blessing.

It was in 1922 that the North Central District was formed in Brainerd, Minn. Brother E. N. Bell officiated at this meeting, and about 23 names made up the ministerial list. Then Brother F. J. Lindquist was elected as Superintendent, and held this office until the present time, making about 13 years in all.

JEW AND ARAB

Keith L. Brooks quotes the following from a letter by W. L. Clenahan, for thirty years a missionary to the Mohammedans.

"A recent letter appearing in one of our local papers from Sir Flinders Petrie, the veteran archæologist, is illuminating. He says the real trouble is in the incapacity of the Arab to make use of his land. The horrible destruction of good land that goes on is all a criminal waste. In the rich Shephlelah the deep water courses are witness to the scandal. This is the real trouble, and is increased by an ancestral preference for the desert; leading to destroying trees by Arabs on Arab lands as well as on the property of others. Sir Flinders says he has improved Arab land five-fold, only to see it left to destruction. For 1300 years the Arabs have kept the land desolate. Is that a title to have the right to keep it so?

"Co-operation with the Jew and learning from him will save more to the Arab than any other policy. In many other countries today those who do not make use of their land are pushed out. Landowners have been compelled to hand over what was not being properly used. Sir Flinders Petrie appeals to the Arabs to help

themselves if they intend to make any claim to being treated as a nation and not a horde. They must make better use of the land they have so long misused or make way for those who will."

A BIBLE STUDY DEPARTMENT IN A MODERN STORE

A few months ago, reports Christian Herald, a young lady, Miss Harriet Louise Patterson, told a manager of a Cleveland department store that she wanted to start a departmentstore Bible study class for customers. 

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
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
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
