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Patient, Persevering, Persistent Prayer

But, David, even though you have been anointed, do you really think that you will ever come to the throne? Look how Saul and his great army are constantly after you. And Doeg, the Edomite, who is a great power in Saul's kingdom, who destroyed the priests at Nob, you know that he will be constantly seeking to bring about your death, so as to receive further honors from King Saul. You cannot trust the people around you, for even the Ziphites purpose to betray you to Saul. You know also the Philistines would like to slay you for destroying their champion, the giant Goliath. Besides you cannot depend on your own faith, for the other day, in utter discouragement you were saying in your heart, "I shall now perish one day by the hand of Saul."

"Yes," says David, "I know all these things, and I had fainted unless I had believed to see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. I am encouraging myself in my ever faithful Lord who cannot suffer His faithfulness to fail. I am saying to my soul continually, 'Wait on the Lord: be of good courage, and he shall strengthen thine heart: wait, I say, on the Lord."

The day came when Saul fell in battle, and the men of Judah crowned David king. But, David, you have only got a part of your inheritance. Do you really expect to get it all? Why Some Are Not Healed

It goes without saying that if any of us fail to get the thing that God has promised "there's a reason."

Indeed, there are many and various reasons why some of God's dear children fail to get their healing. I want to point out a few of these reasons, as the Lord Himself shall direct.

1st. Some will persist in "breaking the laws of health." Personally I regard the laws of health as God's laws. While it is blessedly true that we can be so filled with and led by the Spirit that we will spontaneously keep ourselves from presumptuous acts of disobedience relative to our bodies, yet the sad fact must be faced that comparatively few of those who have been born of the Spirit are among that class who are momentarily filled with and led by the Spirit in all the minute details of their daily lives. It is to this class that I am specially directing this message.

God has given us a measure of wisdom as to how we should conduct ourselves in life and actions, and if we fail to make proper use of this sense of rightness and propriety relative to the common and ordinary details of our lives and existence, we shall be the *sufferers*: and for this self-imposed suffering we cannot blame either the Lord on the one hand or Satan on the other.

For example, I knew a dear sister in California in bygone years who was greatly used of God in the healing of the sick, but who absolutely refused to carry an umbrella during a heavy rain storm. To all our persuasions she replied, "The Lord will take care of me." She preferred to get soaked to the skin, with the result that the day following she scarcely was able to speak owing to a severe cold she had contracted because of the folly and presumption of the previous day.

Then I have known others who were in the habit of over-loading their stomachs with rich and indigestible food, and by so doing brought upon themselves serious physical results from which they found it hard to get delivered.

Others again persist in sleeping in illventilated rooms and thus poison their systems with impure air, and then expect God to heal them, without even a thought of confessing the wrong they have committed, and still continue to commit.

Some permit themselves to overwork, and continue to do so in the face of the tender pleadings of God and the advice of Christian friends, thus planting in their bodies the seeds of disease and finally bringing themselves to a premature grave.

Then there are those who refuse to take exercise. They keep themselves cooped up and away from God's pure air, until their bodies become enervated, system out of gear.

Other ways of breaking God's laws of health might easily be mentioned, but I simply make these few statements to show that many are failing to get the healing which God has promised them because of their folly and presumption in thinking they can live and act recklessly, and still "get away with it," and get their healing from God.

If we really believe that our bodies are the temples of the Holy Ghost, let us treat them as such, with wisdom and dis-

Paul—mighty and Spirit-filled though he was—did not hesitate to say, "I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection." 1 Cor. 9:27.

Having said these things, however, I would not be true to the teachings of God's Word if I failed to add that there is a place to get to in Christ where we may be so indwelt by Him, and so habitually filled with and led by the Spirit that we shall be able so to walk in wisdom and so to draw upon the resurrection life of Christ for our bodies that we find ourselves kept in health and vigor sufficient for the joyful and easy accomplishment of all the work to which God has called up

2nd. Some have their eyes on "doctors and remedies." Doctors and remedies have their place for those who do not know God's way of healing, but for those who know their Bibles and have come into vital touch with the Christ of the Bible, there is assuredly "a more excellent way."

How shall we treat the familiar words of our "Jehovah-Rapha" as found in Exodus 15:26, "If thou wilt diligently hearken to the voice of the Lord thy God, and wilt do that which is right in his sight, and wilt give ear to his commandments, and keep all his statutes, I will put none of these diseases upon thee, which I have brought upon the Egyptians: for I am the Lord that healeth thee"? Surely when God says, "I am thy physician" that ought to be enough.

And yet many who know the truth will persist in tempting God by going to earthly physicians. If God be the heal-

er, then follow Him, but if the doctor, then follow him; but let us not halt between two opinions.

We are told in Jer. 17:5, "Cursed be the man that trusteth in man, and maketh flesh his arm, and whose heart departeth from the Lord." We know that Asa, king of Judah, made the mistake of his life when he resorted to physicians, and forgot or ignored the fact that God was the healer of His people. In 2 Chron. 16:12 we are told that "Asa in the thirty and ninth year of his reign was diseased in his feet, until his disease was exceeding great; yet in his disease he sought not to the Lord, but to the physicians. And Asa slept with his father, and died in the one and fortieth year of his reign." The inference is that had Asa sought the Lord, and not have gone to physicians, he would undoubtedly have been healed of his disease. When we have our eyes on doctors and remedies rather than on God, we need not be surprised if we fail to get the deliverance.

3rd. Some have not yet gripped the truth that "Healing is in the Atonement." Many have ceased to believe that healing is in the atonement. What then are we going to do with Isaiah 53:4, 5? Weigh carefully every word, for they are the words of God's anointed prophet. "Surely he hath borne (borne away) our griefs (Lit. sicknesses), and carried (carried away) our sorrows (Lit. pains) . . . and with his stripes we are healed." If these words teach anything at all, it is that Jesus on Calvary vicariously bore away our sickness just as fully and completely as He bore away our sins. Then in Matt. 8:16, 17, it is stated that Jesus "cast out the (evil) spirits with his word, and healed all that were sick: that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by Esaias the prophet, saying, Himself took our infirmities and bare our sicknesses." With respect to these verses in Matthew, some teach that they simply mean that Jesus bore our sicknesses sympathetically and not vicariously, seeing that these healings were wrought before He went to the

But seeing that it is impossible to separate these words from the clear statement of Isaiah 53:4,5, we are compelled to believe that the meaning is the same in both cases. *Both* pointed *forward to* Calvary, while the words of 1 Peter 2:24, "By whose stripes *ye were* healed" point *back* to Calvary. And, further-

more, we must remember that there is no past, present, and future with God, but that it is an eternal present—"I AM THAT I AM." And we must not forget that Jesus is "the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world" (Rev. 13: 8) which Weymouth translates as "the Lamb who has been offered in sacrifice ever since the creation of the world."

A personal friend of mine in England was afflicted with a grievous running sore reaching from the wrist to the elbow. One day she was kneeling in prayer in her bedroom, when suddenly these words were spoken to her heart: "Surely he hath borne our sicknesses and carried our pains . . . and with his stripes we are healed." Looking up to heaven, she said, "Father, is that in the Bible?" The answer came, "Yes." "Where is it, Lord?" she asked. The answer came clear and comforting. She reached for her Bible and looked up the words and began to read.

The very first word gripped her heart — "Surely." She thought, "That means certainly, without doubt. Jesus surely bore my sicknesses and carried my pains, and by His stripes I am healed." She walked into the kitchen and said to her sister, "Hannah, take off these bandages." Her sister laughted at her, and told her that would be a foolish thing to do. However, she still insisted that the bandages be taken off. Her sister said, "No, the doctor will be here soon to dress the She answered in triumphant faith, "I have no sore, and I need no doctor. Jesus is my doctor and has healed me." Finally to satisfy her, the sister took off the bandages, and lo, there was not even a scar to be seen. In the twinkling of an eye, God had healed her as completely as He healed Naaman the Syrian after he had dipped seven times in Jordan. God had in a moment removed the sore and put on clean flesh, and had done such a perfect work that not a single sign of the sore remained. He met her simple child-like faith, and gave her a marlevous and instant deliverance. And "He is just the same today."

4th. Some have failed to realize their "Identification with Christ" in His death, resurrection, and ascension. Whether we believe it or not, it is a fact that we died with Christ, were raised with Him, and have been seated with Him in the heavenlies. But there is a vast difference between a fact and a realized fact. We may, indeed, have a mental conception of the fact that these things are so. But this is not sufficient.

We need to take our place in Christ by faith, and definitely reckon that we died with Him (Rom. 6:6. R. V.; Gal. 2:20 R. V.; Col. 3:3, R. V.), were raised with Him, and have been seated with Him in the heavenlies (Eph. 2:6), and

that Christ is now our Life for spirit, soul, and body.

In other words, the reason why many are not healed is because God is wanting to take them on to higher ground—from the plane of divine healing to the plane of divine health and life.

It is worthy of note that there is but little said in the Epistles about *healing*. Rather it is *life—abundant life*—that is emphasized.

Surely the stirring words of Romans 8:11 should inspire us to reach out for the mighty quickening of our mortal bodies. "But if," says the apostle, "the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you." Some apply these words to the future resurrection of the body. But the context gives us no hint that the apostle has the future resurrection in mind. And the fact that the Spirit shall quicken our mortal bodies-bodies subject to death-by His present indwelling, proves that it is a present quickening of the body that Paul has in view.

quicken means "to fill with life," and that is the great need of most Christians to-day.

5th. Sometimes sickness is permitted for "purposes of discipline or to get our attention."

Sickness was permitted in the case of Job. Read carefully chapters one and two of that wonderful book; and then note the remarkable outcome as brought out in chapter 42:10-17. It is well to note the fact that Satan could not have covered Job "with sore boils from the sole of his foot unto his crown" (Job 2:7) without God's permission; and it was when Job reached the place of utter self-abnegation, and cried out, "I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes" (Job 42:6) that God healed him and "gave Job twice as much as he had before." Job 42:10.

It is because we ofttimes fail to harken diligently to the voice of the Lord (Exodus 15:26) that He allows Satan to put us on our backs, so that He can talk to us, and get our attention. When sickness comes, make all haste to find out the reason why, for "there's a reason."

6th. With some "faith is being tested."

We must ever remember that "delays are not denials." 1 Peter 1:7 clearly states "That the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honor and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ." And in the 4th chapter at verse 12 he says, "Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you."

We would not know we had any faith if it was not tried and tested. With most of us it has been the case that our first healings came instantly and were complete in their nature. But later we found that our faith was sometimes severely tested before the full deliverance came.

7th. It is well also to note that "the gifts of the Spirit are not in full operation." Hence, many are left sick who otherwise could and would be healed.

The question comes searchingly to our "Why are not the gifts of the Spirit, including 'gifts of healing,' in full operation?" Largely because of sickness in the body of Christ. Because of the divisions and separations among Christians, the power that lies in Christ, our Head, cannot function through the members. In the early apostolic days. healing was universally accepted as part of the Gospel. Sad to say, today this is not the case. Hence many are deprived of the healing which would otherwise be theirs. We need to pray for a full restoration of the gifts of healing and of miracles, also for a return to the simple faith of our fathers.

"When They Had Sung an Hymn"

Jesus sang. There can be little doubt that His voice joined with all the others, perhaps led them, in the singing of the appropriate psalm for the Passover Feast on "the same night in which He was betrayed."

Imagination loves to picture Christ and His disciples enlivening many a weary march along the dusty road with songs of praise; or joining together in some evening hymn by the lakeside or in the home circle at Capernaum or Bethany. We who love hymn singing delight to think that our Lord loved it also. The Jews possessed a rich treasury of sacred song in the Psalms. Here, in these parallel passages in Matthew (26:30) and Mark, we have an authentic record that they sang "the hymn." It was apparently the special psalm appointed for the occasion.

The same word is significantly used again in Heb. 2:12—"In the midst of the church will I sing praise unto Thee"; or "I will hymn Thy praises." (Weymouth). The prophetic application of this passage to Christ is fixed beyond question. He sings, and He sings with us-"in the midst of the Church." Many a rich "Hallelujah" came from those sacred lips on earth; and the unseen Presence of His Spirit in the midst today still inspires to worship and adoration.

Judas had gone out to betray Him; and the Lord's Supper had just been instituted with its fullness of thought about His death. Immediately, upon the last strain of their hymn ceasing He personally led the way out into the night and to "Gethsemane, and beyond that -to Calvary. It was in such circumstances, and with a heart bursting with the consciousness "that His hour was come" that Jesus sang. These sacred facts have forever lifted that evensong into a place of spiritual significance rich with comfort and inspiration.

James instructs the merry-hearted to sing psalms (James 5:13) as a fitting and profitable way to express the abounding joy of Christian living: but in this rare passage in the Gospels we are shown the place of hymns of praise in Christian dying.

Much of our Pentecostal singing is a very legitimate and thoroughly delightful outcome of being "filled with joy and with the Holy Ghost." It is an almost necessary emotional relief to sing hymns and choruses one after the other when the Spirit-filled life is running at flood tide. But a devastating lightness can quickly spoil the fresh beauty of it all if the deeper note is not experienced of singing that springs from a deeper death as well as a fuller life.

The way of the Cross willingly accepted because it is the Father's willthis it is that so introduces a song that it constitutes a "sacrifice of praise." It is noteworthy that it is exactly the same word that is used in these passages in the Gospels and the letter to the Hebrews that is also used in Acts 16:25. "At midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God" (Weymouth). No enthusiastic singing in the high emotion of a crowded convention that! It was praise when every natural circumstance was against it; lonely praise; praise with many an ache to accompany it; hymns in the dark; but a veritable oratorio of personal victory in the soul.

Singing like Christ's as He stepped out into Gethsemane; and like the apostles in the Philippian dungeon, is not only a blessed possibility of the truly Spiritfilled life, but is its sure accompaniment. The Eternal Spirit strengthened our Lord for Calvary, and the same Spirit strengthens the Christian to take up his own personal cross of death to self, and makes the victory of grace so complete that a song marks the pathway through the valley.

Those who walk in the Spirit are often a surprise to themselves, no less than to others, by their unexpected reaction to their circumstances. No discovery on this line is more delightful, or more profoundly significant, than to find one's self singing praises in the darker hours. We know then, as never before, that "Pentecost" is real.

The finest hymnology of the Church has always centered around the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the truest Pentecostal hymn singing has Calvary for its theme.

At first glance this may seem a sweeping statement; but the grandest hymns of worship touch their highest note when they call the angels to adore the mystery of Redeeming Love, and the most heart-satisfying hymns of Christian experience only throb with genuine beauty when they relate every blessing to saving grace. Even hymns of resurrection life and victory owe their unique inspiration to the fact that He who rose again and ever lives, first of all died.

It is a significant, and not unhealthy, fact that certain hymns and choruses quickly die. They do so because they

merely catch and express the passing emotion of the hour. For a few moments they may help to voice a passing light or shade of experience, but their roots do not go deep enough to stamp them with any quality of permanence. They were never born under the shadow of the Cross.

A useful measure of the spiritual depth of any revival can be supplied by the hymns it either produces, or loves to sing. The great hymns of Methodism provide a rich illustration of this interesting fact. One of the striking things about every place where this gracious Pentecostal revival has been true and deep has been the overwhelming preference for songs about the Lord Jesus Himself. Spirit-filled people love their Lord, and for that best of all reasons delight to sing about His wisdom, love and power. The deeper the river of Pentecostal blessing flows, the deeper will be the understanding that ultimately all springs from Calvary.

A regret has sometimes been expressed that there are not more really great and good hymns about the Holy Spirit. The regret may be allowed; but is not the omission significant? "He shall not speak of Himself" was spoken of the Spirit, and even where His Pentecostal fulness has been received it will be found that He inspires to songs about the Baptizer in the Holy Spirit rather than about the Baptism. Too much singing about our personal experiences always leaves the soul strangely unsatisfied, but direct praise to the Lord lifts the heart to the divine Source of every good and perfect

There will be singing in heaven such as we have never heard on earth; but the theme will be Redemption through the blood of the Lamb that was slain. The eternal fount of song springs from Calvary. Did the realization of this help to strengthen our Lord when He sang with His disciples before Calvary? We know that He, "for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross.'

Perhaps our own lips will falter in song as we approach some personal Gethsemane or Calvary. Yet in such an hour the Comforter will be alongside to help, and perhaps will bring to our remembrance the hymn our Lord sang on the threshold of His darkest hour, and the promise that in God's "afterwards" the chorus of song will burst out richer and fuller then ever, because of the hour when a single song meant a "sacrifice

The Holy Spirit helps us to sing not only in the crowded hour of the great congregation, or the day of unclouded sunshine, but also in the dark valleys of mysterious affliction and suffering in the will of God. The music of the truly

Spirit-filled life never ceases.



The Converted Jew

I was present at some Pentecostal meetings in London a couple of years ago when I noticed a very fine type of man who was singing and praising God in prayer and entering into the service in such a real and earnest manner that I could not but take notice of him.

He was so real about it and so unconscious of anyone noticing him that I felt I must get in touch with him and find out something about his past. This I did by introducing myself after the meeting. I found out that he was a Jew and had had a past, that he had been a great gambler and a very heavy drinker, and that he constantly used bad language. He had been suffering for some years from bad valvular disease of the heart. His happy expression and the joy light in his eyes seemed to have transformed him into a happy Christian man. Our conversation developed into a friendship which still remains, and this is the story of his wonderful conversion to the Christian faith and also of his wonderful and marvelous healing; both are miracles and he gives God the glory.

He writes thus:

"In 1926 I went into some Pentecostal meetings where services were being held, just to see what it was all about. I had heard of the sick, the lame, the blind and the deaf being healed. I did not believe what I had heard, but I went in just for fun and devilment. But what a sight I saw. I was really interested because I

was suffering myself.

"My wife who had been converted to the Christian faith was there and had taken with her our dear daughter Ruth, who was an idiot, and did not know me from another man, as her father. My dear wife, when she saw me by the door beckoned to me to come over where she was. Well that did it. I was in a terrible rage, for she had caused all eyes to be turned towards me, so I went out as quickly as I could, vowing vengeance on my wife. But something seemed to make me go back, and I saw people being prayed for. The Pastor asked a blind man if he believed that God could give him his eyesight, and he said yes, and his cry was heard by Almighty God, for when the Pastor prayed for him and anointed him with oil and laid hands on him in the name of the Lord according to the scripture, what I saw seemed to dumbfound me, for when the blind man opened his eyes he gave one loud shout, 'I can see, I can see,' and in the meeting I am sure there was not a dry eye, for a mighty miracle had been performed.

For several days I was very miserable and wretched, and my wife said, 'Won't you, dad, believe in this wonderful Jesus Christ for Ruth's sake? We want her healed and you are stopping it by not believing in Jesus Christ.'

"But one day shortly after, the wife and several friends were going again to these meetings and they got me to go with them. Again I went, more for devilment than for anything else; I would not sit with my wife and my daughter and their friends, so I sat on an outside seat. I noticed a terribly deformed girl about twenty-one, who had never walked, her arms, legs and body were twisted; she sat just near me. This poor girl made a terrible impression on me. The people in the meeting were singing that beautiful chorus which I shall never forget, 'Wonderful, wonderful Jesus, in my heart He has planted a song.' I looked at the Pastor standing on the platform, and as he prayed and spoke, I got mighty interested, and when he began to pray over the sick and afflicted ones and anointed them with oil in the name of the Lord, I could not shut my eyes, but looked straight at him while he anointed this poor girl and prayed over her. My body seemed on fire as I heard him bid her rise in the mighty name of Jesus Christ, and with these two eyes of mine I saw her rise and walk twice round that large building, and those words came direct to me, as he appealed to the people to come forward, who wanted to get right with God and be anointed if suffering in body. With tears I went straight up to the Pastor and told him that I was a Jew, and he just said, 'Praise the Lord, Jew and Gentile are all alike to Jesus Christ.'

"He asked me if I had made my peace with God. I knelt down and prayed for God to forgive me for my sins and the untold evil of my life and to save me from taking His holy name in vain. Then I told the minister of my own affliction, that I had been suffering a great many years with bad valvular disease of the heart. I dare not walk quickly or have the least excitement. If I did I suffered untold agony until my heart got a bit quieter. He asked me if I believed that God could heal me, and I said, 'Yes, I believe He is all-powerful,' so I was anointed with oil and hands were laid on me according to scripture in the name of the Lord, and as he prayed and I prayed the power of God came upon me.

"How long I was under the power I do not know, but I got up free from pain

and completely healed, and the same day I ran a long way after a motor 'bus. I should also like to tell you the news about my imbecile daughter Ruth.

The Sinday School Tesson

Jacob Away from Home Lesson for February 28. Lesson Text: Gen. 28:1 to 36:43.

Jacob's flight. The Septuagint version of Gen. 27:41 is, "So Esau harbored rooted hatred against Jacob . . . and in this agitation of mind Esau said, O that the days of mourning for my father were come that I may kill my brother Jacob!" Because of


from a family that worshiped God, Isaac and Rebekah sent Jacob to Padan-aram to take a wife from the daughters of Laban, his mother's brother.

Stern discipline. Jacob left his home and for twenty long years he was in exile. He had been his mother's favorite and was doubtless greatly pampered. How different things were now as he set out on his journey and had no bed but Mother Earth and no pillow but a stone. How homesick he must have felt on that first night away from all the comforts of home. But God met him and spoke to him by means of a dream. He saw "a ladder set up on the earth, and the top of it reached to heaven: and behold the angels of God ascending and descending on it." The Lord stood above the ladder (literally, the Lord leaned over it), and gave the pilgrim the gracious promise that He would watch over him and keep him wherever he went, and would bring him back home again. The Lord said to him, "And by thee all the tribes of the earth shall be blessed, namely by the seed of thee." Verse 14, Septuagint. And this Seed is Christ, at whose birth the angel declared, "Behold, I bring you good tid-

ings of great joy, which shall be to all people." It was this promised Seed who said to Nathanael, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Hereafter ye shall see heaven open, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man." There is no other ladder, no other way to the Father save through Christ. He Himself is the way, the truth and the life and everything else the pilgrims need.

The continued presence. The Lord said to Jacob, "Behold, I am with thee." And that is just what He says to us. He said to His disciples, "Lo, I am with you alway," and the apostle assures us, "He hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." Weymouth translates this passage, "I will never let go your hand, I will never, never forsake you," showing four negatives (actually, there are five in this passage).

So that we may boldly say, "The Lord is my helper"-an ever present help. In all your ways acknowledge Him, this ever present helper, and He will direct your path, leading you every day in paths of righteousness. For He is a Shepherd who loves you, who lives to ever make intercession for you, who promises that goodness and mercy shall follow you all the days I may kill my brother Jacob!" Because of of your life and that you shall dwell this, and in order to secure a wife for him in His house for ever. Give to Him



fullest confidence and your constant praise. Jacob's vow. Jacob made a vow that if the Lord would provide for him and bring him back again to his homeland, that He should indeed be his God, that the place where the Lord had met him should be to him God's house, and he promised the Lord "the tenth." The Lord who feeds the ravens and clothes the lilies so beautifully, who will not fail to pilot us to our desired haven, is worthy of our constant worship, and the least we can do is to give a tenth to Him. They did this under the law, how much more should we give under grace? A judge who lived in Jamaica told me of some natives who showed him the promise in Malachi 3:10 and said to him, 'Judge, we want the windows of heaven opened above us. What does it mean to bring in all the tithes?" He said, "It means to give the Lord the tenth of what you have." "Right," said they. They were only poor folk, but next Sunday they brought in from every home a tenth of what they had, and then they sat with open mouth waiting for the Lord to open the windows of heaven upon them and pour out a blessing that they would not have room to contain. He did not disappoint them-giving them a most gracious revival. They passed the word on to two other churches. They too brought in their tithes and offerings, and revivals came to them.

At Haran. Arrived at Haran, Jacob fell in love with Rachel, and offered to work for Laban for seven years for her. bargain was agreed upon-but Laban de-

ceived Jacob and gave him Leah instead of Rachel. Jacob had deceived his father and now he is himself being deceived. We always get what we give. Jacob loved Rachel and was willing to serve another seven years for her. By these two women and their handmaids the twelve sons of Jacob were born. Then for six more years Jacob labored for further wages-for flocks and herds. He was still much of a trickster as will be seen by the record (Gen. 30:37-43), and it might have gone ill with him if God had not spoken to Laban in a dream warning him to do him no harm. Gen. 31:24.

Transformed. God did not forget the vow Jacob made at Bethel, and said to him, "I am the God of Bethel . . . where thou vowedst a vow unto me: now arise, get thee out from this land, and return unto the land of thy kindred." Jacob obeyed, and as he went on his way "the angels of God met him." How blessed to know that God has given His angels charge over us to keep us in all our ways, lest we dash our foot against a stone-lest we should stumble on the pathway of life. When Jacob learned that his brother Esau was com-

ing to meet him he was full of fear, and arranged to make a great gift with which he thought to appease his brother's wrath. He sent all his companies ahead of him. Down at the ford Jabbok "Jacob was left alone; and there wrestled a man with him until the breaking of the day." Who was this man? In Hosea 12:4, 5 we learn that it was none other than the Lord God of hosts. That night Jacob became a broken man, for the Lord "touched the hollow of his thigh; and the hollow of Jacob's thigh was out of joint." He asked his name, and he answered, "Jacob"-Supplanter. And then the Lord said to this one who clung to Him so tightly and who declared, "I will not let thee go, except thou bless me," "Thy name shall be called no more Jacob (Supplanter). but Israel (Prince); for as a prince hast

Whole villages have come to believe in Christ, and with the guidance the very few Christian workers could give them, a number of chapels have been built by these believers.

THE SALT OF THE EARTH

Said Robert A. Millikan noted scientist: "My own judgment is that, if the influence of American churches in the furtherance of socially wholesome and forward-looking movements, in the spread of conscientious and unselfish living of all sorts, were to be eliminated, our democracy would in a few years become so corrupt that it could not endure."

THE FLOODS

Some of the signs of the end of the age are "earthquakes in divers places . . . famines and troubles." Mark 13:8. Surely the drouth of 1936 and the floods of 1937 can be listed under the latter head. "These," said the Master, "are the beginnings of sorrows," literally of "birth-pangs"-"the death-agony of this age and the birth-agony of the next," as Scofield puts it.

PROGRESS

Surveying the past year Palestine News reports: "Jerusalem at last obtained a modern water supply which, after a number of false starts, has proved workable. The Palestine Broadcasting Service was begun. In the very days of unrest, the Levant Fair was held on a greater scale than formerly. Industry, which might have been the first to suffer from the strike, stood its ground, and even expanded (Jewish factories sustain some 100,000 persons at present). Local market agriculture received a fillip and the citrous crop is better than the preceding year. Zionist settlers commenced to repay their establishment loans. A new port was added, the small beginnings of which have withstood the storm of politics and of nature. The year closes in the economic field with the award of a gas concession in Tel Aviv."

COMMUNIST TEACHERS

"Two weeks ago, a judge in the Supreme Court in the city of New York ruled that there was no legal reason why a Communist should be barred from teaching in public schools," reports America. "Therefore, if our boards of education cannot exclude Communists from the classrooms of the public school, they cannot exclude atheists, or any group of men and women who by indirection, if not by set purpose, inoculate the child with their anti-religious opinions, and implant in his mind suspicion, distrust, and hatred of a civilization that is based upon Christian principles."

ANGRY NATIONS

"Professor Gilbert Murray refuses to be dismayed by the cries of war pessimists," says Advent Witness. He believes that no European Government without assurance of rapid success will dare to face the horrors of a European War. They will attack ill-armed China or almost unarmed Abyssinia, they will stir up civil war in Spain, but they will not expose their own capitals to destruction and their industry to paralysis by well-armed counter attacks. But there are such things as mad men as well as mad dogs. In the prophecy of last day conditions, we read, "The nations were angry."

UNCROWNED KINGS

The Apostle John speaks of "Ten kings, which have received no kingdom as yet but (who) receive authority as kings" (Rev. 17:12), comments Dawn. "The Dictators who have suddenly sprung upon the horizon exactly fit the description: no monarchs could have greater power; yet not one of them is crowned. In 1917, Stalin; in 1922, Mussolini; in 1925, Kemal; in 1926, Pilsudski; in 1933, Hitler and Schuschnigg; in 1936, Metaxas and Franco. No man is vet authorized by God to say that these two groups of Dictators-those of Revelation and the modern-are one and the same, but circumstances may prove it at any moment. It is difficult to resist the conclusion that they are."

FIVE-YEAR EVANGELISM IN INDIA

It is reported that Christian leaders in India have united in a call for a definite Five-Year Evangelistic Forward Movement, inaugurated by seven weeks of preparation, in each district, with the following topics suggested, one for each week:

1. The primary duty of Christians to witness.

- 2. Successful personal evangelism.
- 3. Churches and united witness bearing.
- 4. Witness of the Christian home.
- 5. Evangelism by literature.
- 6. Education and evangelism.
- 7. Evangelism and social service.

Christains are to unite in one great army of volunteer evangelists each bringing his or her own talent to the task. Some will preach, others will sell Gospels, some will sing, still others will do personal work with individuals.

A CHALLENGE TO THE CHURCH

Like a voice of prophecy in a scholastic wilderness is the voice of Dr. James R. Angell, president of Yale, telling the American Society of Engineers that "the great task of our day and generation lies more in the field of morals and even religion, if you will, than in the field of engineering and economics narrowly conceived."

THE MILLS OF GOD

"The mills of God are grinding in Spain today," observes Evangelical Christian. "These are the mills of which it is written that they grind exceeding small. The horrors that have come upon that country have shocked the conscience of the world. What many people are prone to forget is that the root cause of the trouble in Spain has been the Roman Catholic Church. It is this institution that has held the country back, as it holds every country in bondage where it holds sway. Out from Spain came the 'Holy' Inquisition that shed the blood of multitudes of Protestants, and it would seem today that all the blood shed in past ages is to come upon this generation."

A TIME OF TROUBLE (Jer. 30:7)

Jewish leaders are using the very language of Jeremiah to describe their present situa-Some time ago Rabbi Neches in Rosh Hoshona Magazine wrote: "The more one examines the chaos rampant in Jewish communities, the more perplexed he becomes. He can see no way out of this morass. It seems all hope is lost for the Jewish people. Yet, despite all this, we have not forgotten our task as Jews. We know that Israel does not suffer in vain. Yes, we are indeed facing a time of trouble unto Jacob, but says the prophet, out of it we shall be saved. The Jew will emerge stronger, more conscious of himself, more willing to do his duty as a Jew, with increased vigor and strength for the rebirth of his people in the Holy Land."

"SATAN SHALL DECEIVE THE NATIONS" Rev. 20:7, 8.

Communists are changing their tactics. They have learned that fierce, outspoken propaganda leads to reaction in the form of Fascism. Fascism means the suppression of free speech, and free speech means the suppression of Communistic activities. Therefore Communists are siding with popular social and democratic movements in order to keep the way open for their rise to power.

The following words were spoken by Dimitrov, secretary general of the Communistic International (world organization for promoting Communism, supposedly separate from the

Russian government):

"The formation of a broad People's Front is a necessity. Cannot we unite the Communist, Social-Democratic, Catholic, and other Workers? Comrades, you will remember the ancient tale of the capture of Troy. Troy was inaccessible to the armies attacking her, thanks to her impregnable walls. And the attacking army was unable to achieve victory until, with the aid of the famous Trojan Horse, it managed to penetrate to the very heart of the enemy's camp. We revolutionary workers, it seems to me, should not be shy of using the same tactics."

ways partake of the Lord's Supper on Christmas day, and this year we had the greatest number in the history of our work to partake, in any one meeting, of the bread and the cup. We sensed the Lord's presence with us in a very sweet way.

"The Sunday after Christmas was the great day for our many Sunday School children. We have three Sunday Schools here in Mukden. The children in the two street chapels had their Christmas program Sunday morning. One hundred twenty-three children attended in one mission and one hundred ten in the other. The programs were good and

we were thankful for what these children had been able to store up in their hearts of the lessons for the year. In the afternoon we opened the doors of the main tabernacle for the larger Christmas program. Children had waited in the streets nearly two hours before time for the doors to open. We had more than three hundred children in attendance; the balance of space was taken by some of the parents and others of our Christians. The doors had to be closed twenty minutes after they were opened as all available space had been taken, leaving a large crowd out on the street who could not get in.

"The Christmas program had been arranged along the same line as you have it in the homeland and it was very interesting. One little girl came to the platform and repeated an entire chapter from the Gospel of Luke; others were also able to quote from memory long portions of the Word of God. We are thankful for the good seed of the Word that has been sown in the hearts of these many children and know that in due time it will bring forth fruit unto everlasting life.

"We have entered the new year with a good start and many of the meetings have been attended by record crowds and new souls are coming forward for prayer. A woman who had been bound by the awful opium-morphine habit for more than twelve years and had also been an addict of other drugs, received a real touch from God. Tears of repentance were flowing and her testimony had great effect on many others at the prayer meeting."



A MIRACLE OF HEALING

The remarkable testimony of Mrs. J. A. Turner, 1514 Lewellyn Ave., Norfolk, Va.

The climax to my long and serious illness came on October 24, 1936 when I began to have terrible convulsions, one right after another, so severe that at times it took five people to hold me on the bed. It was necessary to keep something between my teeth to keep me from chewing my tongue. My head would draw back and the suffering was almost too great to bear. Following the convulsions I would be totally blind for hours. I had had attacks like this at different times since 1932. In the earlier stages I went into a coma and lay in what appeared to be a heavy sleep, unable to be roused. In 1932 I lay this way for three months. But as I grew worse I went from this heavy sleeplike coma into the most violent convulsions.

Over the entire period of my sickness I had the best medical help we could afford, being treated by doctors in Dayton, Ohio; Tampa, Florida; at the Johns-Hopkins hospital in Baltimore, Maryland; and here in Norfolk. But they were able to give me only temporary relief. They diagnosed my trouble as pus in the blood due to diseased internal organs, and five times they punctured my spine to give me relief from the pressure of the fluid which collected at the spine and pushed up until it pressed at the base of the brain. When the pressure reached the brain the convulsions followed.

In April of 1936 I was taken to St. Vincent's hospital in the midst of convulsions. There I was given temporary relief and after being taken home my spine was punctured and I spent six weeks in bed before being able to get around again. Even after this I was not well for the hospital examination showed that the pus was still in my blood and my head felt dizzy and I kept going with great difficulty, having to lie down often.

The doctors who treated me advised a very serious operation to remove the diseased organs, but could promise nothing, for my condition made the operation especially dangerous. I was taking a series of electrical treatments when the convulsions came on me last October. After the convulsions began the doctors made repeated visits and did what they could but I kept getting worse instead of better. I had short periods of relief but grew weaker and the convulsions kept coming back. The operation was again urged but I was too sick to be moved.

We had asked our Christian friends to pray for me from time to time, and once before an attack had been cut short in answer to prayer. But we were not fully trusting in the Lord until on Wednesday, November 4th. Mr. Turner and I decided to commit my case entirely to God. He had telephoned the doctors not to come any more and we began to pray more earnestly. Our pastor, Arthur H. Graves, and several others came to my bedside November 5 to hold on in prayer for my healing. Several times the con-

vulsions stopped as they prayed but I was not yet healed. However, on October 26, I had had a vision of Jesus. He came near to me and said, "Have faith." Between then and the time when we committed the case fully to God, Jesus appeared to me again and encouraged me to trust Him. As I saw Him in the vision I tried to reach out and touch the hem of His garment, but I couldn't reach Him.

I told the friends who had come to pray that I felt a drawing near the base of my spine and they said, "Perhaps the Lord is going to operate.' This drawing continued and on Friday night the Lord spoke to me again and said, "I am going to operate on your back Saturday morning the folks in the morning." came about nine o'clock to pray and I told them what the Lord had told me. They began to pray and I began to have convulsions. Then Jesus appeared to me again and this time He came closer and I reached out and touched the hem of His garment. When I did that, He said, "The work is done." My back opened and I could feel a fluid gush out. Relief came; the convulsions stopped, I turned flat on my back and rested. Before the back opened it was so painful that I could not lie on it, but as soon as the opening was made the soreness disappeared and I was comfortable lying on it. My back continued to drain until Monday morning. The folks thought I should have the opening dressed but I felt that God was working and that He must do it all. Nothing was done to it and no hand touched it, except that the cloths on which it drained were changed from time to time. Several of the women who were waiting on me saw these cloths and the fluid

Our faith was tested, for a friend's doctor told us that if my back drained too much I would be paralyzed. He offered to close the incision but I felt that since God had opened it He must close it. We continued to pray and Sunday night Jesus appeared to me again and said, "Tomorrow I will operate on you and close the incision." When the folks came Monday morning to pray I told them what the Lord had told me, and that He had said, "Only believe."

They began to pray and the Lord told me to tell them to hold on in prayer for three hours. The convulsions began again and in the midst of them, the friends said, a smile suddenly came over my face and I said, "I see it, Jesus, I see it." What I saw was this: Angels appeared and took the corners of the sheet on which I was lying and carried me up to the presence of the Lord. I saw Jesus take a knife and, beginning at the base of my brain He scraped all through my body. I could feel Him scraping and when He had finished He said, "Now you are clean." Then, after one final outpouring of the fluid. He closed the incision in my back and not even one drop has ever come from it since. Before He closed the incision He made me promise to be a witness for Him. I call it an incision because that is exactly

what it was. It was not an abscess which formed, for the fluid which came from it was not the kind which comes from an abscess. All soreness and swelling left when it wasopened, it drained freely for all those hours and then after a large outpouring stopped immediately and completely. But most wonderful of all, the mark which is left on my back has been pronounced by those who have seen it, including experienced nurses, to be, not the mark of an abscess, but the perfect mark of a skilled operation, the healed scar of an incision about an inch long, called by one nurse who saw it, "The most beautifully closed incision I have ever seen." It was an operation performed without hands, for no human hand touched my back until more than a week after it opened. It opened without hands and closed without hands, and the mark is there today.

The friends who were with me watched the time, and exactly three hours after I told them to hold on in prayer, I came back to consciousness. I was resting then but the Lord told me to lie still for twenty-four hours. I had a numb feeling all through my body and really was unable to move. This gradually disappeared and I felt normal.

Again the next day the folks came to pray. I told them the Lord had told me that the last hour of the twenty-four would be my weakest, and asked them to hold on in prayer. Sure enough, about one o'clock I had a sinking spell and lost consciousness. They kept praying and at just two o'clock I came out of the weakness and sat up in bed and had something to eat.

We had expected that this would be the end of the work of healing and that I would be raised up out of bed. But it was not so. While the Lord had so wonderfully operated on my back, some of the organs of my body which had been so terribly diseased and which had been producing the pus, were not yet functioning normally. As we continued to pray from day to day, I was conscious when, one by one, these organs were restored to normal condition. The Lord continued to speak to me and told me that my strength must come back by faith as my healing had come by faith. The test of faith was not yet over.

On Thursday, while the friends prayed, I was taken with convulsions again. They held on in prayer and during these convulsions the Lord finished the healing of the organs of my body. Of course the news of how God was working in my life spread and I began to have a good deal of company. So that night, Nov. 12, the Lord said to me, "You cannot get strong unless you keep your mind on Me, and you cannot do that with so many things going on around you. So I am going to take you up with Me." Again in vision I was taken up into the presence of Jesus. Friday morning the friends could not waken me. I appeared to be in a heavy sleep. From appearance it looked as if I might have gone back to the old condition and was not healed after all. But they kept on praying and the Lord revealed to some of them that I was in the Spirit and was all right. Different ones tried repeatedly to rouse me but could get no response.

And then suddenly, at three o'clock in the afternoon I came back to consciousness. I

knew that now I could get up. It had been so wonderful to be with the Lord that I did not want anyone to touch me, so I got out of the back side of the bed and walked around through the room and into the next room where I dressed. All this without any help, and I felt clear-headed and seemed to have almost double strength. This was the moment for which we prayed so long-and it was wonderful. Those who were with me rejoiced even while they could scarcely believe their eyes. I called for something to eat and enjoyed a hearty meal of meat and vegetables. finishing up with pie. When Mr. Turner came from work that evening and I met him at the door, the first thing he did was to drop on his knees and thank God. I had never come out of an attack like this before, always taking weeks to get able to be about again. But this was different. This time I was healed.

That was Friday afternoon, Nov. 13, 1936. The following Sunday I went to Glad Tidings Church and gave my testimony. From the day I got up I have done the housework for my husband and two children, attended church regularly, walked down town and back, and am well for the first time in all these years. To prove that I am really well, I have a certificate from St. Vincent's hospital in Norfolk, dated January 4, 1937, stating that the test they made on Dec. 22, 1936 shows no trace of pus in my blood. Two previous tests at this same hospital had shown the pus there, as had all my other examinations. But God has healed me, all glory to Him.

Ed. note.—Mrs. Ethlyn Graves, wife of the pastor, tells in a letter concerning the above testimony that she saw the incision mark, in the early part of January, 1937. It was a perfectly clean-looking scar about an inch long. Mrs. Hattie Tysor, who for years has been office assistant to Dr. George West of Norfolk, says, "I should not hesitate to show that to any doctor or nurse, for it is a perfect incision mark and could not have been made by an abscess. It is the kind of mark that is left after a good operation." All this information from Mrs. Turner and the other two women is vouched for by Arthur Graves, 1317 Old Street, Norfolk, Va., the pastor.

MIRACLES OF HEALING IN INDIA

Brother Ketcham writes: "You will rejoice at the encouraging news which I have just received from Brother Munshie. His wife was in a very serious physical condition and was taken to a hospital in Calcutta, expecting to have a major operation. Brother Munshie was led to go to the hospital and lay his hands on her, claiming definite healing and deliverance from the surgeon's knife. Relief was immediately forthcoming and Sister Munshie was able to rise and dress and leave the hospital the same day, much to the amazement and consternation of the doctors.

"Some Christian people, who were in the hospital, witnessed this healing and sought out Brother Munshie, asking if he could heal them, too. Our brother prayed the prayer of faith for them and they were definitely touched. This has created quite a stir in Calcutta and several Indian Christians have been drawn toward the glorious Pentecostal power. Brother and Sister

Munshie have now returned to their work in East Bengal, with gladdened hearts and a firmer tread of faith."

A note from Miss Sophie Erhardt, also in India, says: "A few months ago upon entering a village, a sadhu met us with the request that we would come and look at his boy who had been sick for a long time. His body seemed swollen all over and he surely was a pitiful sight to behold. I told him that I could not do anything for him but he should be taken to the hospital. The man looked very sad and replied, 'No, if you can't do anything for him, they can't, for we have tried many things.' We then told him of One who was able and if they would believe, He would heal him. With the promise that we would pray for him we left them.

"A few days ago as some of our Christian workers visited that same village they recognized the boy, a lad of about twelve years, running about and playing. They asked since when he was feeling better and he said, 'Ever since you people promised to pray for me.' The father, too, came with the same words. They both realized that it was nothing else but the power of our God that healed him. To God be all the glory. More than half of that village have expressed their desire to become Christians, but they are still afraid that they would be put out of their places and would not be able to make their living. Pray for these people that God will set them free. They love to have us come and tell them the Words of Life, and they believe that Christ is the only one who can give them salvation."

A CHINESE PRAYER WARRIOR

Madame Kai-Shek will be remembered by her heroic conduct in connection with the recent kidnapping and release of her husband, Marshal Ching Kai-Shek, China's "strong man." Madame Kai-Shek is a Christian and she explains why in the following words: "I knew that my mother lived very close to God. And I believe that my childhood training influenced me greatly even though I was more or less rebellious at the time. It must often have grieved my mother that I found family prayers tiresome and frequently found myself conveniently thirsty at the moment, so that I could slip out of the room. I always had to go to church, but hated the long sermons. But today I am grateful. That church-going habit established a stability for which I thank my parents.

"One of my strongest childhood impressions is of mother going to her third floor closet to pray. She spent hours in prayer, often beginning before dawn. When we asked her advice about anything, she would say, 'I must ask God first.' And asking God was not a matter of five minutes to ask Him to bless her child and grant the request. She waited upon God until she felt His leading. And I must say that whenever mother trusted God for her decision, the undertaking invariably turned out well."

MEXICO'S NEED


The land question has had a close bearing on the whole religious situation in Mexico. One of the powerful landowners has been the Church. The total value of the real estates held by the clergy in the nineteenth century was about equal to half the total for the whole country. The Constitution of 1917 has made the possession of property by churches illegal. On November 25 last a bill was passed making this land available for landless peasants. the peasants of Mexico need more than land, they need the Lord.

ATHEISTIC EDUCATION

One article of the Reformed Mexican Constitution reads as follows:

"Education which the States shall impart will be Socialist, and moreover, to exclude all religious doctrine, it shall combat fanaticism and prejudices. For this end, the school shall organize its teachings and activities in such form as will permit it to create in the youth a rational and exact concept of the universe and of social life."

This means that the State aims to kill religion in the people by educating youth to a completely materialistic view of life. In excluding God from national life the State is practically claiming to be God. That will be the politics of Antichrist.

Further Flood Flashes



Prayers of thanksgiving and sighs of relief are being uttered as the crest of the flood passes Cairo on its southern journey to the Gulf of Mexico. Now that the flood waters of the Ohio River are subsiding, news is leaking out pertaining to the welfare of our own people in that section. Here are the latest flashes, received just before this issue of the *Evangel* goes to press:

Cincinnati, Ohio. "I spent the most of yesterday (Feb. 3) viewing the ruins across the river in Dayton, Ky., Bellevue and Newport, also along the river fronts on the Cincinnati side. The river is not yet back in its banks by any means, but you can begin to see some of the devasting effects of the flood. We contacted some of our own people on this trip and though they have suffered beyond measure yet they are rejoicing in Jesus Christ and it does one's heart good to see the faith manifested in spite of all the calamity. Here is what we saw: houses moved off their foundations; in several places houses piled together blocking whole streets; wreckage of all sorts strewn everywhere; mud and filth on every hand. I enquired how many houses were swept away at Dayton, Ky., the little city just across the river, and was told that as nearly as they could estimate, sixty-eight are gone altogether. Besides this, there are scores of homes that are so wrecked that you would think the people would never undertake to try to fix them up again-yet they are doing it, and as fast as the receding waters will permit. What we see here locally is being multiplied in every city hit by the flood. We have received from different sources \$58.50 to give out among the people wherever needed. We are thankful for this help from those who want to assist their brethren of like faith in the flood section.' O. E. Nash, District Supt.

Paducah, Ky. "We were rescued by the U. S. Coast Guard late yesterday (Jan. 28) afternoon. Paducah is practically ruined. I believe we have lost most everything in the flood. I don't think my car will be worth much after this. Pray for us in this trying hour." Pastor Gobel Lawrence in a card sent from Jackson, Tenn.

Taylorsville, Ky. "The flood came in two sections here in Taylorsville. We just got our rooms shoveled out and came back to town on Sunday prepared to do some more work on the mess when we were advised that another flood, worse than the first, was on its way, and that everyone had to evacuate. The flood came all right, but whereas the first one reached about eight feet in the Tabernacle, the second reached only about half that height. However, we had our cleaning to do all over again. All my books were under water, and the most of our best clothes. Everything is a mess, but we are praising the Lord that none of our people lost their lives as a result of the flood. All of our song books are ruined. The piano floated off the platform and finally came to rest on its back in the mud out in the tabernacle proper. Brother Edgar Goodlet and I stayed at the Tabernacle with the water rising all around us, and we put the new lumber in the old building to keep it from washing away. Coming out we had to wade water waist deep in places. Please pray for our people as their morale has been weakened and they are just about a little bit discouraged. However, we are going forward for Jesus for we know that all things work together for good to them that love the Lord." James and Wilma Humphries.

Louisville, Ky. "At this present writing (Jan. 30th) we are surrounded by water and we have no communication with the outside. I don't know when I will be able to mail it. We were fortunate to have one of the very few high places in the entire west end of Louisville. We are housing four houses of furniture and thirtytwo people. We do not get anything to eat, or coal and such necessities except by boat. Our lights, water, telephone, gas are all out of order. There are evidences of a plague following this flood. Pray for this needy district." Theo. E. Gannon, Dist. Secy. This letter reached Springfield on February 6th. The first long distance call came through to Brother Nash from Brother Gannon on February 3rd. The tabernacle was then still in use for refugees, but no word had reached Brother Gannon as to the fate of other Pentecostal brethren in Louisville. The Red Cross was faithfully caring for the most pressing needs of the refugees in the tabernacle building

No appeals have been received from the flood stricken assemblies for financial aid. The pastors and congregations are cheerfully going about the task of rehabilitation as best they can. But some help is being sent in to head-quarters to assist our unfortunate brethren. All such funds should be sent to Noel Perkin, Missionary Secretary, 336 W. Pacific St., Springfield, Mo. and will be disbursed through the District Councils in the flood-devasted areas,

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
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
