"Blessed Is He, Whosoever Shall Not Be Offended"

O you think Joseph fully understood all the dealings of God with him when He allowed him to be mistreated by his brethren, sold into Egypt as a slave, and later, though perfectly innocent of the charge laid against him, thrust into an Egyptian dungeon?

Do you think Elijah fully understood God's dealings with him, when after the brook Cherith had dried up, in obedience to God's command he went to Zarephath, only to find upon his arrival that the widow whom God had appointed to sustain him, instead of being in easy circumstances, was herself at the moment preparing to share the last morsel of food she had in the world with her son and then die?

Do you think John the Baptist fully understood the dealings of God when, soon after the arrival of Him who was God's Anointed, he was shut up in

Herod's prison? Apparently he did not, and so he sent his disciples to inquire of Jesus. "Art thou he that should come? or look we for another?" In that same hour Jesus wrought such miracles, the news of which would certify to John that He was indeed the Christ, and He sent word to John—whom He still left in prison—"Blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in me!" There is a special benediction to those who believe and trust when they cannot understand the dealings of God with them.

God dealt with David in a strange way. He was chased from the land he loved and from the tabernacle of the Lord where he longed to worship! He saw the priests at Nob slain because one of them had been friendly to him! Those who should have helped, like the Ziphites, sided with his enemies! But David de-


clared, "What time I am afraid, I will trust;" and when in the place of danger he had trusted and proved the mighty deliverance of the Lord, he was able to further declare, "In God have I put my trust, I will not be afraid."

Infinite love backed by infinite wisdom has chosen and will choose all your experiences for you. The Master says, "In the world ye shall have tribulation." Do not be offended with Him when the tribulations come, but take the attitude: "What time I am afraid, I will trust in thee." In Him you will have peace—a peace the world cannot take from you. He will prove His grace is all-sufficient and will bring you through to the place where you will be able to declare, "I will trust, and not be afraid." He will never leave you nor forsake you, so that you will not need to fear what man shall do to you. You can boldly say, "The Lord is my helper."

Let us talk with this aged prisoner. "Paul, what are you doing in this Roman prison? You said, 'Woe is unto me if I preach not the gospel!' And here you are a prisoner of Nero. Your wonderful evangelistic ministry has terminated. Are you not languishing in this prison, fretting out your heart that your mighty ministry of preaching has come to such an abrupt and untimely end?" No, he is not offended. He says, "I have learned, in whatsoever state I am therewith to be content. I am learning yet more fully the message of Habakkuk, that message that has been the keynote of my ministry, 'The just shall live by his faith.' I have learned to constantly sing Habakkuk's psalm of faith, 'Although the fig tree shall not blossom . . . yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will joy in the God of my salvation.' And so I am sending out that word to others, 'Rejoice

in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice.' The things that have happened unto me have fallen out rather unto the furtherance of the gospel, and therein I dorejoice, yea, I will rejoice."

You may not be able to un-derstand all of God's dealings with you. You may have besought the Lord thrice and perhaps thirty times thrice to remove the thorn, the messenger of Satan-and the trouble has not disappeared. Learn to take the attitude of trust, and trust and trust and trust, refusing all the tormenting fears the enemy would bring. Do not be offended with the Lord. Think it not strange concerning the fiery trial that is to try youbut rejoice. He means it unto good. Joseph recognized this, many years after his trial. So will you. Elijah saw the Lord did not fail either him or the widow and her son, as the meal barrel and the oil flask received the daily replenishing. David (Continued on Page Five)





The Joy that Was Set Before Him

We read concerning the Lord Jesus that "for the joy that was set before Him" He "endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." Heb. 12:2. We have taken it for granted, without giving the matter much thought, that this joy consisted in the prospect of being exalted to the throne where, at His exaltation, He was given "a name which is above every name;" such a joy, for instance—only, of course, on a purely unselfish and much more exalted scale—as characterizes that man who is to be given a position of prominence and prestige, upon a pinnacle of power, above his fellow men, so that he will receive the plaudits and homage of the multitude. Evidently we have been mistaken.

I venture to make the suggestion that "the joy that was set before Him" was the joy of seeing souls saved and being instrumental in their salvation. Our Lord asserted that "there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth" (Luke 15:10), and we have assumed that Jesus meant that the angels rejoice when a sinner repents. But it is not said that the angels rejoice, although they doubtless do, but rather that the joy is "in the presence of the angels of God." It would seem that the joy is the joy of God: God rejoices when a sinner repents, and the joy is "in the presence of the angels." Perhaps we should have understood the passage in question better if it had been rendered thus: "There is joy of God in the presence of the angels over one sinner that repenteth." That the angels rejoice we can well believe, for, as in the days of David "whatsoever the king did pleased all the people" (2 Sam. 3:36), so undoubtedly in heaven whatsoever God does pleases all the inhabitants; when God rejoices the angels rejoice too. But the angels only rejoice in what God rejoices in. God is their source of joy; so if the passage in question is interpreted in the way in which we have been accustomed to interpret it, the conclusion reached must be the same: the salvation of a soul causes God to re-

John wrote that "as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up: that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." John 3:14, 15. The word rendered "lifted up," according to Thayer's Greek lexicon is to exalt. Thayer states that in John 12:33 the evangelist "himself interprets the word to the lifting up of Jesus on the cross, but a careful comparison of John 8:28 and 12:32 renders it probable that Jesus spoke of the heavenly exaltation which He was to attain by the crucifixion." The word rendered "lifted up" is rendered exalted in Acts 2:33 where we read concerning Jesus that, "being by the right hand of God exalted, and having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, He hath shed forth this which ye now see and hear."

We have usually thought of Jesus, in connection with the lifting up of the serpent in the wilderness, as having been "lifted up" to die on the cross that through His death upon the cross we might be saved from sin. That it was necessary for Christ to be thus "lifted up" we are bound to concede; that His death upon the cross was essential to our salvation we all believe. But that the exaltation spoken of in the passage quoted goes beyond the exaltation upon the cross seems quite evident.

Look at the preceding verse. There we read, "And no man hath ascended up to heaven, but He that came down from heaven, even the Son of man which is in heaven." Evidently John is the writer. The Master's words end, if I interpret the Scripture aright, with verse 12. John ceases to report what Jesus said, and proceeds to comment on it. Years had gone by. The Christ who had conversed with Nicodemus had ascended into heaven and taken His place there, a place of exaltation at the right hand of the Father, and so John was able to say that He who had "come down from heaven, even the Son of man," was now "in heaven." He had been exalted; His exaltation had taken place. John, inspired by the Spirit, was setting forth the fact that the exaltation was just as necessary to the salvation of sinners as had been the lifting up of the serpent in the wilderness to the saving of the lives of the people who had been bitten by the fiery serpents.

To whom do we look for salvation? Do we look to a Christ who is hanging on a cross? Do we not rather look to a Christ who hung there once, but who, having died for our sins, rose from the dead, and, ascending into heaven, sat down at the right hand of God? "This Man, after He had offered one sacrifice for sins forever, sat down on the right hand of God." Heb. 10:12. "This Man, because He continueth ever, hath an unchangeable priesthood. Wherefore He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them." Heb. 7:24, 25. So it is apparent that it is to a living Christ, a Christ exalted at the right hand of the Father, that the sinner must look in order that he may be saved from sin. In the exalted Christ the sinner will always see "a Lamb as it had been slain," ever bearing the marks of Calvary. The song of the redeemed will always be "Unto Him that loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood."

Doubtless "the joy that was set before Him," the joy that proved to be a great support in the hour of His rejection and suffering, an inspiration that enabled Him to triumphantly endure the cross and victoriously despise the shame, was the joy that He knew would be His, as sinners would look away to Him during the dispensation of grace that was soon to begin, and, looking, live.

And Jesus said to His disciples, "These things have I spoken unto you, that My joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full." John 15:11. He had been speaking of bearing fruit; He had just said. "He that abideth in Me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit," and, "Herein is My Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be My disciples." If some person says that by fruit-bearing He did not mean soul-saving, but rather the bringing forth of the fruit of the Spirit defined by Paul in Gal. 5:22, 23, I remind him that He meant, not only that, but also soul-saving, for almost immediately afterwards He said, "Ye are My friends, if ye do whatsoever I

command you." And one of His commandments was that they should go and "make disciples of all nations." On only one occasion do we read that Jesus "rejoiced in spirit," and that was when the Spirit moved Him to give thanks to the Father for the fact that the Father had "hid these things from the wise and prudent and had revealed them unto babes." And who are babes? Born-again people; in other words, souls that have just come to a knowledge of the truth. So it is evident that our Lord was made glad by the fact that souls were being

The greatest joy that can be experienced by a true minister of Christ, or by any true Christian, is the joy of seeing men and women saved. And it is a part of the plan and purpose of God that each of us should be a soul winner. "He that winneth souls is wise." Prov. 11:30. "And they that be wise," or, as Rotherham renders it, "they that make wise," i. e., the instructors who properly instruct the people so that, as a result of the instruction, the instructed ones are made wise unto salvation, "shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn may to righteousness as the stars forever and ever." Dan.

As Christians our supreme ambition should be to adequately represent Christ so that others will desire to know Him and to follow Him. We have been saved to serve; and there is joy in service if it is unselfishly rendered. The service of the Master was unselfish service; and ours should be like His. He, "for the joy that was set before Him," the joy of seeing souls saved, "endured the cross, depising the shame," and we, if we have the spirit of the Master, will count no sacrifice too great, no service too menial, no burden too heavy, no hardship too hard, no task too exacting, no experience too humiliating, if, as a result of it, we can be made soulwinners.

"The joy of the Lord is your strength." How often we have quoted those words, and we are sure they are true. The Spirit of God has so said. But is the joy of the Lord mere ecstasy? Is it not rather the joy of rendering efficient service? The great end of all Christian service is salvation.

Let us not forget that to be a Christian is to be a follower of Christ, and that Christ came, "not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give His life a ransom for many."

Make me like Thee, my Lord; I would In Thine own image shine; Dead to the world, to sin, to self, Lord, let Thy joy be mine. Give me that mind that Thou hast had, That mind that still Thou hast, And mine shall be true joy in Thee, Joy that shall ever last.


A Presbyterian Minister Receives the Baptism

people, yet diligently seeking to obey God's revealed pattern in each minutest detail, in the true humility of a servant in God's house. Then the miracle-working power of God was ever present for every need.

The Shekinah of God!

Cloud and fire! Of what do they speak? Clouds! How often has God appeared in a cloud! A cloud-covered the mount when Moses went into it for forty days and nights to meet God. "I will appear in the cloud upon the mercy seat," God's word later concerning the wilderness tabernacle. "The cloud filled the house of the Lord, so that the priests could not stand to minister because of the cloud; for the glory of the Lord had filled the house of the Lord," we read of the Shekinah cloud's appearance at the temple dedication. "The cloud filled the inner court," is Ezekiel's record. A cloud but the size of a man's hand told Elijah a great rain was coming. At the transfiguration of Christ, "a cloud overshadowed them." The Son of man is coming back with clouds. In the meantime, for our inspiration and to spur us on to faithful efforts, we are encompassed about with a great cloud of witnesses, says the scripture. Thus, the sign of the cloud by day.

By night, however, this sign was to be fire. The darker the night, the brighter the light. Are we not approaching the midnight of the world's history? Are we not too a supernatural people, to ever keep our eyes on the pillar of cloud and fire?

Fire! We are a people of Holy Ghost fire! Our ministry must be a fire ministry. "He maketh his ministers a flame of fire." A fiery ministry still startles and shocks the indifferent until still they run together crying, "What meaneth this?" People may be indifferent enough to an ice wagon passing down the street, but they never are indifferent to a fire wagon hurrying on its way. Still the crowds hurry to see where the fire is burning. Fire arouses curiosity.

Fire in the life and in the ministry! Who will have it, and who lack it? Scriptural accounts of great souls who most retained the fiery zeal throughout their life and ministry seem to suggest that there is a very close connection between taking a very lowly attitude before God, and having the fire of the supernatural come freshly, direct from above

The Shekinah fire fell thirty years ago upon a people confessing their own lack and failure, and entreating God for the Holy Ghost fire. Often it came most quickly upon some new convert, whose heart was tender with repentance over remembered sins, before it would fall upon a near-by seeker, who had lived a good life for years, and consequently expected it sooner on that account.

Of Whitefield it was said by Spurgeon, who made him his pattern, that he was "ever on the wing; and like a flame of fire." How did Whitefield retain this unction? Was it because he never forgot his great sins of blasphemy and godlessness prior to his conversion when he as a sixteen-year-old boy was a bartender?

John Bunyan retained the fire of devotion and zeal for souls through the long years of his ministry and imprisonment. Was this because he never forgot nor lost the horror of his sins, when as a tinker he had blasphemed and broken the laws of God?

Paul the Apostle perhaps outdoes all the church when it comes to his matchless record of flagless zeal, unremitting toil, arduous journeys and the joyous abandon with which he pursues his heavenly calling despite stripes, frequent imprisonment, shipwreck, false brethren, hunger, cold and care for all the churches. How did he, as years passed by, continue to retain that first passionate love and touch of fire in his soul? I wonder if there was a secret in the fact that he never permitted himself to quite forget he had held the clothes of those who stoned Stephen while that

pure spirit was going back to God, the first Christian martyr? He recounts his former sins in writing to Timothy, "He counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry, who was before a blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious . . . Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief . . . I obtained mercy." He never lost the wonder of it, "I obtained mercy!"

Confession precedes fire!

Isaiah admitted, "I am a man of unclean lips."

It was when Isaiah made confession that the fire came to him. "Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips." We are told that *then* flew one of the seraphims having a live coal, and laid it upon Isaiah's mouth. Thenceforward it is claimed his flight soared the highest and the most sustained of all prophets.

Daniel too, who has revealed the deepest mysteries, said, "I prayed . . . and made my confession. . . And whiles I was speaking and praying, and confessing my sin and the sin of my people Israel . . . the man Gabriel touched me about the time of the evening oblation." Yet Daniel stands practically alone in that the faithful scriptures record no blemish upon his character.

Jeremiah was one of the

"Sinners whose love can ne'er forget The wormwood and the gall."

It was through this he was enabled to cleave true to his calling. Sometimes he felt bitterly the mocking of his associates, and was tempted to quit his daring prophesying. He complained, "I am in derision daily; everyone mocketh me. . . Then I said, I will not make mention of him, nor speak any more in his name." But immediately he admits, "But his word was in mine heart as a burning fire . . . it was as burning fire shut up in my bones . . . I could not stay (stop)." Jer. 20:9. In Lamentations 3:19, 20, the same prophet says, "Remembering the wormwood and the gall . . my soul is humbled in me."

Feter, who started out to follow the Lord rather over-confidently, later learned true humility. In the early part of his walk with Christ he said, "We have forsaken all," and later, "Though all men should be offended because of Thee, yet will not I." Christ, seeing through his over-confidence said he would be the one to deny him thrice. But later on, after the denial, after the crucifixion, after the disciples led by Peter had returned to their fishing, Christ met Peter at Dawn by the Sea of memories, the Sea of Galilee, and asked him three times, "Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou me?" Simon Peter's answer was full of humility. It was as if to say, "You ask me if I love you with a divine love.

After my deep failure I dare no longer say I do. I dare only humbly say I am deeply fond of you." It was a chastened and subdued answer. But its contrition brought an answer of fire a very few days later, and then how Peter preached!

When the Holy Ghost fire fell upon Peter, the onlookers were confounded and amazed. They marveled. They mocked. But Peter's former timidity was gone with his former self-confidence. His cowardice was conquered. Standing up, he was given a fluency of utterance that was as though electric power had been turned on. He now spoke with assurance. His words carried the power of conviction. No longer frozen of heart and of mouth, his words now were like a flowing gulf stream. They were simple, but warning, and resultful.

When the fire fell hypocrites were discomfited, as Ananias and Sapphira. Honest doubters were convinced, as Saul of Tarsus. National barriers were leaped, until Cornelius and all his household could come in. God send again the Shekinah cloud!

By night the sign of fire! Contrition and confession bring fire. Fire melts the frozen until the dumb can speak. Fire brings persecution, until the disciples are threatened after the healing of the lame man at the temple gate. But fire also brings daring, for they pray, "Stretch forth thine hand to heal," reckoning little that one healing had brought them trouble, they asked for many! Fire melts the congealed and brings the dross to the surface. Fire sends light into dark corners. "Our God is a consuming fire." In this day of dense darkness abounding, may He send fire—yes, the fiery pillar—to guide us through, and may we ever follow His Shekinah cloud.

saw the overthrow of all his foes. After being abased, he was exalted to the throne.

Paul from his Roman prison awaited his execution with joy, utterly unoffended with his Lord as he wrote his last instructions to his beloved son Timothy, declaring: "I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."

Paul in this the last word he wrote to his beloved son Timothy said to him, "Endure afflictions." Don't be offended when the many afflictions pile up, one upon another. Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the dear Lord, in His own time, and in His own way, delivereth them out of them all. Even though the furnace be heated to sevenfold heat, you will have One with you who is none other than the Son of God. "In all their affliction He was afflicted."

Fortify yourself for the "much tribulation" (literally, "Many tribulations") that the Apostle warned the saints would be theirs before they would inherit the kingdom. Fill yourself with the Word of God, for "great peace have they which love thy law: and nothing shall offend And be filled with the Spirit, with the mind, the nature, the grace, and the disposition of your Lord, who endured the cross and despised the shame, knowing that there was an eternal joy set before Him. Thus will you inherit the special benediction given in these words of the Master, "Blessed is he whosoever shall not be offended in me.' Though your lot be like John the Baptist's, and your prison life, your test and your trial continues, fill the prison house with songs of praises. The Lord will teach you to sing on all occasions the song of the prophet: "Although the fig tree shall not blossom, neither shall fruit be in the vines; the labor of the olive shall fail, and the fields shall yield no meat; the flock shall be cut off from the fold, and there shall be no herd in the stalls: yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will joy in the God of my salvation.' —S. H. F.

The Sunday School Jesson

Jesus and the Samaritan Woman

Lesson for April 25. Lesson Text: John 4:4-30. "Needs must." Jesus was well aware that the leaders in Jerusalem were despising and rejecting Him, and so He returned to Galilee. He did not take a roundabout course to avoid going near the hated people of Samaria as did most. He "needs must" go through Samaria. Why? He purposed that a great-

er awakening should come to Sychar.

"The gift of God." The ways of the Lord are different from our ways. He did not

hire a hall at Sychar and start nightly preaching services. No, when His disciples were out of the way He sat wearily waiting by the well for the poor sinful woman who came at hot noontide to draw water. He made request of this woman, "Give me to drink." She was full of wonder. "How come?" she inquired. A Jew, a member of the race who counted themselves so superior, asking her, a Samaritan woman, for a favor? The Master had not come so much to take from her as to give to her. The devil tries to persuade us that He comes to rob us of our best. Oh, no, He comes to deliver us from our worst-our sins; and to bring us His best. He said to this woman, "If thou knewest the gift of God . . . thou wouldest have asked of him." We have not, because we ask not. He has blessed spiritual gifts for us, and the Apostle says concerning them, "I would not have you ignorant." If we knew the profit of these spiritual gifts we would earnestly covet them. If we knew what a great outpouring of the Spirit would do to this world, we would not cease to ask for rain in the time of the latter rain. Zech. 10:1.

Limiting Him. Jesus said, "If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee, Give me to drink; thou wouldest have

asked of him, and he would have given thee living water." The woman did not realize that He was speaking of the water of life that brings salvation, and could only think of natural water. How could He, without a bucket and a rope, procure water from this well? She little knew that the One before her was the Creator and Upholder of all things, the One who had "measured the waters in the hollow of his hand" (Isa. 40:12)—the waters of all the vast oceans.

The Satisfying Fountain. Then He showed her that those who drank of this earthly well would thirst again, but that they who drank from the eternal heavenly spring which He gave would be completely satisfied and never more thirst. Nothing of earth can permanently satisfy. Some of us can testify, thank God, that we have found Him who completely and eternally satisfies. Our answer to the ever

uppermost question of the day, "What think ye of Christ?" is just this: "HE satisfies." Is your soul longing, as the hart after the waterbrook, for a spring of living water? You will find such in our lovely Jesus. He satisfieth the longing soul, and filleth the hungry with goodness. He HIMSELF is all we need—the Fountain of living water. Alas, that so many forsake Him, and hew themselves out cisterns, broken cisterns, that can hold no water.

Uncovering sin. The woman made request, new a right spirit within me." But there

"Give me this water." But even then she did not understand. He was speaking of the heavenly and not of the earthly. Then He said to her, "Go, call thy husband." She answered, "I have no husband." He said, "Thou hast well said, I have no husband: for thou hast had five husbands; and he whom thou now hast is not thy husband." We must all face the problem of our sin and face it in all its hideousness, before we fully realize our need of the Saviour. He uncovers sin that we may see it in its awful blackness and cry to Him: "Wash me throughly from mine iniquity, and cleanse me." He will wash us in His allatoning blood and make us whiter than snow.

Worship. This word was decidedly personal, so the woman tried to switch the subject. There was a never-ending controversy between Jew and Samaritan as to whether Jerusalem or Gerizim was the proper place for wor-

ship. What was His view on this point of controversy? He revealed this truth that where you worship the Father is not important. The question is how you worship. God is a Spirit and there is only one acceptable way to worship Him. "They that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth." What did our Lord mean by this? There were some worshiping only with the lips, but their hearts were far from Him. were those even in Jerusalem who like that Pharisee who went up to the temple to pray, were congratulating themselves on their fasting and praying and paying their tithes, but their religion was a mere outward, formal thing. Such never sent up the heart cry, "Create in me a clean heart, O God; and re-

were some like that poor publican, the man with a broken spirit, who were conscious of a great need, and who could but humbly cry, "God be merciful to me a sinner." This cry from the heart will prove a prelude to the incoming of the Lord, bringing with Him into us the righteousness of God and everything else we need in our lives. God will give us the blessed Holy Spirit who will lead us into true spiritual worship.

Worship in spirit. There is an acceptable way of worship that few Christians understand. Paul said: "He that speaketh in an unknown tongue speaketh not unto men, but unto God: for no man understandeth him; howbeit in the spirit he speaketh mysteries." 1 Cor. 14:2. Paul said later in the same chapter, "For if I pray in an unknown tongue, my spirit prayeth . . . I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding also: I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also." The Spirit of God will come so fully into our yielded spirits that He will enable us to truly "pray in the Holy Ghost." He will anoint us to utter acceptable praises in the Spirit, in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in our hearts to the Lord. He, the Spirit of truth, who will lead us into all

truth, will see that we worship "in truth"—that is, in reality, in contrast to the dead, formal and unreal thing that passes for worship with those who have but a form of godliness and deny the power thereof.

Confessing His Messiahship. The woman began to think of the promised Messiah and said, "I know that Messias cometh . . . when he is come, he will tell us all things." Jesus said to her, "I that speak unto thee am he." Her eyes beheld Him who was God's salvation. Looking, she lived. As one has aptly put it, "Jesus first revealed this woman to herself, and then, Himself to her." And she went forth from His presence as a missionary. Her sermon was not a long one. Most preachers end with an invitation. She began her message with one: "Come, see." Come to

ANTI-GOD STAMPS

THE WAGES OF SIN

All this is achieved despite the law of the state as well as the commandment of religion."

Signs of the Times reports that "more than one billion dollars was spent by American moviegoers in 1936, according to figures released in a survey. The number of tickets totaled 4,180,000,000. The American people paid an average of 25 cents to see a motion-picture show." Alas the people of this land are "lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God."

A FRIEND OF ISRAEL

"The evangelization of Israel has met a severe loss in the death of Sir Leon Levison," writes Ernest Gordon in Sunday School Times. "He was the son of a distinguished rabbi in Safed, Palestine, and was knighted for important diplomatic services during the war and for his relief work in Palestine at the same time, in the course of which he raised \$1,000,000 for refugees. After his conversion he worked two years in a factory, giving his spare time to mission work."

A MODERN SAVONAROLA

Dr. Uhde, a Catholic priest of Austria, started a campaign against liquor, even urging the use of unfermented wine in the celebration of the Mass. He was fought by the powerful drink interests and finally silenced by the Pope. But the result was unexpected. Scores of protest meetings were held, and the church threatened to excommunicate all who would attend. Thousands left the Catholic church

MOVING THE MOSQUE OR OMAR

Graham Scroggie writing on Zechariah 14:1-11, says: "Verse 10 predicts the exaltation of Jerusalem in that day, literally and spiritually. It would appear that there shall be a change of that part of the Land by means of an earthquake (4, 5). In no other way can the Mosque of Omar be got rid of. Britain cannot remove it, but heaven will. In verse 11 we get a glimpse, in three brief sentences, of the blessed condition of the inhabitants of Jerusalem in that day: they shall abide in the city in peace; there shall be no more curse, and the unwalled city shall itself be secure."

GETTING READY FOR THE YEAR 8114 A.D.

It is reported that, "According to plans from Oglethorpe University, an imperishable vault is to be constructed on the campus, in which phonograph records, motion pictures, books, magazines, drawings, and photographs will be placed. This vault is to be sealed, with instructions not to open until the year 8114"

These well meaning people have doubtless overlooked the word of 2 Peter 3:10, 11: "The earth also and all the works that are therein shall be burned up. Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be?"

RAIN IN RESPONSE TO PRAYER

Albert Widmer writes from Joinville, Brazil: "There arose a very difficult question as to how to baptize, as this region was very poorly watered and only a small brook ran through the place. The brethren cut big lumps and made with them an artificial basin, filling up the holes with clay. But all efforts seemed in vain; there was insufficient water to baptize a large number of converts. We prayed to the Lord, that He would help us in this unfortunate situation. A mighty thunderstorm was the immediate answer to the prayer: a whole day and night heavy rain fell, and our basin was transformed into a vast deep lake, with plenty of water to bury hundreds of old Adams! We immersed 10 by 10 and within half an hour 150 new converts were baptized according to the Scripture. The joy was so great that they sang aloud, and various ones left the water-grave receiving the Baptism in the Holy Ghost!"

Questiong and Inswers

Where does the Bible teach that the grave is hell?

Some have thought that sheol of the Old Testament, and hades of the New Testament refer to the grave. This seems incorrect since the rich man lifted up his eyes in hades, which would indicate that in hades he was in a conscious state. Luke 16:23. Sheol or hades, "is revealed as the place of departed human spirits between death and the resurrection" (Scofield Bible).

Is it possible for a born again person to sin and yet be saved?

It would be impossible to "wilfully" sin and retain one's standing, but were one "taken in a fault" "we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous." The best of us always require the atoning blood of Christ and His high priestly intercession because of the many infirmities which hinder that absolute perfection which divine holiness would require. We usually speak of our weaknesses as infirmities to distinguish them from carelessness of walk, or indulgence in things which we know to be evil. See Rom. 8:26; Heb. 4:15, 16: 1 John 2:1, 2.—E. S. W.

JAPAN WANTS CHRIST

Dr. George W. Truett, president of the Baptist World Alliance, said a few weeks ago: "Whenever our testimony for Christ is backed by the right sort of life, men will seek our Saviour,

"In Japan I saw keen Japanese students in the great university, as I spoke on the Scripture 'I am the light of the world,' confess Christ, saying, 'Yes, we take Him to be our Saviour.' If I were a young man, I wonder if any power in the world could keep me in America."

JUDAH'S CRISIS

In the New York Times, Otto Tolischus, writing from Warsaw, says that the situation of Jews in Eastern Europe is approaching "a final disaster of truly historic magnitude."

To him it seems there is nothing left for these Jews save another Exodus (and whither are they to go?) or slow death by economic strangulation.

God's answer to all Israel's troubles is found in Romans 9, 10 and 11. Is your attitude that of God's holy apostle, "My heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is that they might be saved"?

A SIGNIFICANT TRADITION

A Jew narrated the story of an Arab king who was told that when the Messiah came he and the Moslems would be killed, and also peoples of other nations. He asked how the Messiah could kill them all. A wise Jew said he would answer the question. He built a wall with doors and windows, and enclosed inside eighty cocks. They were left for three days. After that the Arab king came to see them. All were dead except one small cock. The Jew explained that they had fought and killed each other. He said: "So shall it be when the Messiah comes. The nations will kill each other, and after the slaughter the Messiah alone will be left to reign over the remnant."

A JEWISH RABBI'S TESTIMONY

Dr. MacInnes, Bishop in Jerusalem, reports an interview with Rabbi Stephen Wise in New York: "I was surprised to see a picture of an incident from the life of Christ; then I looked round and to my surprise every picture in his drawing-room was a picture taken from the Gospel. When he came into the room, he said, 'I see you are interested in my pictures. I expect you are surprised to find these pictures from the life of Christ in a Jewish Rabbi's room.' I said, 'It is very surprising to me. I had not the least idea that that would be your mind. Tell me what it means.' 'We regard Him,' he said, 'as not yours only but ours. He was the greatest Jew that ever lived. We want to venerate Him; we do venerate Him.' I said, 'Yes, that I can understand entirely, but what beats me are these pictures of the Crucifixion. What do they mean to you? Why have pictures of the Crucifixion? Who was He whom you crucified?' He looked very grave. 'Well,' he said, 'that was the most tragic blunder we ever made. But there are bad men in every age. Caiaphas was a bad man. We have suffered for his iniquity ever since. But you want to know more of what I think of Him whom we crucified. I think the position is this. We regard him not so much as God come down to man, as a Man who lived so near to God that He drew others with Him into the Holy Presence."

NEW STATIONS IN JAPAN Marie Juergensen

In July of last year the Lord enabled us to open a new station in Sendai (a large city three hundred miles north of here) and also an outstation there. During the fall we were very busy in evangelistic work. In seven weeks we were in four different evangelistic campaigns in four different places. Our hearts rejoiced to see God work.

It was my joy to visit Sendai recently for the first time and to encourage our dear workers up there, and to hear Shoji San—our Bible woman in charge of the outstation—who entertained me in her little house, tell how God has given her souls, though at first she went out on the street corner all alone, and it was very hard for her. Later I looked into the happy faces of ten or more converts—the fruit of only a few months!

It was also my joy to tell the blessed story of Him crucified in the Sendai station where Brother and Sister Omaki are located, and to see hands raised in every service. This is a fine, spacious native house and yet all the partitions had to be removed to make room for those who came to hear. One of the pictures shows this fine Sunday School with Mr. Omaki sitting in the center with the old man, upon whose heart God operated, inducing him to rent us his building. He faithfully at-tended every one of the evangelistic services. Pray for His salvation.

The vision of the rural towns and villages, which are practically unevangelized and lie so thickly all around us, has come to us afresh these past months and especially to our Brother Yumiyama, our native pastor. He, with our Bible school students, has gone out on several trips, and each time their hearts have been more stirred with the need of the whitened harvest fields. Tremendous possibilities and blessed opportunities for God lie at our door! Recently a small car was rented for this evangelistic work and one record day they reported with radiant faces that they had traveled one hundred and forty-five miles, passed through about ten towns and about thirty-five villages, distributing tracts, and stopped to bring the gospel message in seven of these towns. All this within a radius of sixty miles! We feel so much could be done for Him and for souls if we had a gospel car to use freely at all times. Will you please pray with us for this need?

Miss Agnes Juergensen writes a very interesting letter, telling about the tent meetings held in a different section of the city from where the mission is located.

We quote a few of her paragraphs: "On the main street of this upper eastern district we found a perfect lot. A working man with pick and shovel leveled the ground for the tent and your missionary, herself, weeded out part of the lot. As I pulled hard and long at stubborn weeds I thought, 'If only souls could be pulled out of darkness as easily and in such great numbers as the weeds!' Surely winning souls in Japan is far more than just preaching to them!

"Our Brother Ogawa of Kyoto City was our evangelist for the campaign and he brought his new tent. It was delayed in transit so we had to begin the meetings on the lot, with benches and platform arranged, but no roof over us. So it was under the clear blue sky we welcomed more than one hundred and fifty children to occupy the benches and began the meetings. Oh, how quickly the children learn to sing. Their voices brought many curious grown folk to see and to hear. When the children's hour was over we invited the adults, standing around, to come in and take their places, but it is hard to move them. But each evening a few more dared to come in farther and occupy the benches under the electric lights and to listen more closely to the gospel message.

Eternity only can reveal the true results of such crowds from night to night. We pressed a few personally to a deciding point and have taken such names and want to follow them up personally. In dealing with one man, I learned that he was seventy-two years old and was hearing of Christ for the first time, then, with a new light in his eyes he exclaimed, 'I never knew that the Jesus God was the true light of man. Thank you teacher, I want to believe in this light.' Now he has a portion of the New Testament and with dim eyesight he is reading the good news for himself.

"I am sure that God has touched many, many others who will be in that good line of redeemed ones in the day of the Lord. Japan with all her education needs Christ and His message of love."

This is the second loss the Boltons have had in Yunnan, their other baby having died of pneumonia at Wei Hsi just before they went home for furlough."

The Lord calls us all to be heralds and to lift up our voices in crying, "Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat." The Samaritans responded. The Master had to stop two days in Sychar to give help and instructions to those who came and saw.

Meat. The disciples came back with their provisions and said, "Master, eat." He said, 'I have meat to eat that ye know not of.' He was not speaking of earthly meat, any more than He had spoken of earthly water. He explained, "My meat is to do the will of him that sent me." It was ever His delight to do the will of God. 





