When God Sent the Latter Rain

A. H. Argue at the Springfield Assembly

"And it shall come to pass afterward that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh; and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions; and also upon the servants and upon the handmaids in those days will I pour out of my Spirit." Joel 2:28, 29.

In the year 1906 suddenly the news was flashed to the various parts of the world that many in Los Angeles were being filled with the Spirit, in the Old Azusa Street Mission, and they were speaking with other tongues. In Topeka, Kansas, in southern Texas, and up in Minnesota among a group of very godly Scandinavian saints, the same manifestation was in evidence. Instantly the attention of spiritual people everywhere was focused on the scripture above, and other scriptures related to it. The outpouring of the Spirit had come!

In regard to this particular verse, I once had the privilege of hearing Dr. W. B. Riley of Minneapolis say that the Hebrew text literally reads, "It shall come to pass in the last of the last days." When the Lord makes a statement, He confirms it. Jesus said, in Mark 16: "And these signs shall follow them that believe." A great host of believers began to expect to see these signs coming to pass because of these scriptural promises.

James 5 pictures clearly our own day; the heaping up of riches in the last days; the great strife between the rich and the laborers; then immediately (v. 7) we read, "Behold the husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the earth, and hath long patience for it, until he receive the early and latter rain. Be ye also patient; stablish your hearts; for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh." Here we see the coming of the Lord and the falling of the latter rain are inseparably connected.

In reading the commentary of Jamieson, Fausset and Brown, a Bible commentary issued in the last century, to my great joy I found it stated that the "latter rain" would be "another Pentecostal effusion of the Holy Spirit as the church received in apostolic days."

Manifestations of the Spirit's gifts have been seen throughout the centuries of church history. The French Huguenots had healings, speaking with other tongues, and prophecy. In the book, "With Signs Following," a chapter is devoted to the study of this. (Can be had for \$1.00 postpaid from the Gospel Publishing House.)

A volume published in 1875, written

by Robert Boyd, entitled, "Moody and Sankey in Great Britain and America," gives this inspiring account: "In the spring of 1873 Moody and Sankey left Chicago for England. In June they landed in Liverpool and sought a place to sing and preach the gospel. On July 27th they went to Sunderland, on the invitation of a Baptist minister, Arthur Rees. The other ministers generally hesitated, or opposed the work. 'We can never go on in this way,' was Mr. Moody's characteristic remark. 'It is easier fighting the devil than fighting the ministers.' At length a delegation of young men from the Y. M. C. A. of Sunderland waited on the evangelists to invite them to give an address in Victoria Hall Sunday afternoon. 'Oh, yes, I will preach for you,' said Mr. Moody. On the following Sunday night when I got to the rooms of the Y. M. C. A., I found the meeting on fire. The young men were speaking with tongues and prophesying. What on earth did it all mean? Only that Moody had been addressing them that after-noon. Many of the clergy were so op-posed they turned their backs on the revival, but afterwards when the flood gates of divine grace were opened, Sunderland was taken by storm."

In 1906 and 1907 Pentecost fell in a larger way. In a remarkably short time it had swept around the world. A great company of hungry hearts were praying. In those days the people of the Holiness ranks and others who were in earnest were crying out for God to open the windows of heaven and pour out of His Spirit. God heard their cry and answered. If you begin to pray for the Lord to pour out His Spirit, you must be ready to receive just what the Lord chooses to send, especially if the outpouring is according to the pattern given to us in the Acts of the Apostles.

So as they prayed, upper room scenes took place. Men and women were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance. There was prophecy and interpreting. They began to lay hands on the sick to be healed. The light dawned upon these scriptures: "They shall lay hands on the sick, and

they shall recover." "Anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord."

God mightily confirmed His Word; sick bodies were healed and people were filled with the Spirit. The truth that the coming of the Lord was drawing nigh had not come to the hearts of so many of God's people before that time. Since the outpouring, however, that message has been magnified and quickened by the power of the Spirit until thousands and thousands of people are believing that His coming is very nigh.

What a time of going down in humility before God! What a time of confessing, praying and most earnest worship! It was a time of laying aside all the things that hinder and meeting the Lord's conditions. I heard the Lord was pouring out His Spirit in Chicago. I was in business in Winnipeg. I felt I must go to Chicago. As I came in contact with those filled with the Spirit there came a holy awe upon me. I was there 21 days seeking the Lord. God marvelously met me and filled me with His Spirit, and I spoke with other tongues as the Holy Spirit gave utterance.

Coming back to Winnipeg the people wanted to hear what the Lord had been doing, and I felt I must tell them. Then we had some tarrying meetings in my home, and the Fire fell. Many in Winnipeg were slain under God's power, and filled with the Spirit. The news spread to Minnesota. It spread out across the western plains. It went 200 miles north to the Indian reservations, and the red men came down to Winnipeg and tarried at the altar. One night we tarried until two o'clock in the morning. (In those days it was not a matter of kneeling for a few minutes and then sitting up to see what was going on; it was a matter of tarrying until.) Some people thought it was time to leave, but the Indians said, "We came down here to get the Holy Ghost," and so they tarried until God met them.

People from other churches came because they had been told we had received something wonderful from God. At one convention in Winnipeg, 147 were baptized in water, some of them receiving the Baptism and speaking with other tongues as they came out of the water. The sick were healed and demons cast out. One who attended the convention was S. A. Jamieson, a Presbyterian minister of Duluth, who later received his Baptism and began to preach the full Pentecostal message.

One night when I preached on Acts 10 I reached verse 44: "While Peter yet spake these words, the Holy Ghost fell on all them which heard the word." When I read, "the Holy Ghost fell," suddenly two sisters sitting in front of me threw up their hands, the Spirit descended mightily upon them, and they began speaking in other tongues. There

was nobody near them to "pray them through"; they were filled with the Spirit right there. Strangers were there who had been skeptical. They were convinced; it knocked all the props from under

I happened to be in Toronto and went to the home of Brother and Sister Murray, very precious saints. They had labored as missionaries in Palestine for the Christian and Missionary Alliance. She was blind, having lost her eyesight, but very spiritual. We were having prayer in their home. The Spirit of the Lord came on me and I began speaking with tongues. Suddenly they both rose to their feet, and said that I had spoken in Arabic through the Spirit. It was a confirmation that it was the supernatural power of God.

An old man dreamed there was to be a meeting in Winnipeg and that if he would go up there he would be filled with the Holy Spirit. He told his sons but they said he was too old and it was only a dream. But he insisted God had given him the dream, so they took him to Winnipeg. The second night of their visit, while the preaching was going forth in the power of the Spirit, the old man threw up his hands and in a moment was filled with the Spirit and began speaking in other tongues.

We are in a movement that is still young. It is full of young people. It is a live movement because it was brought into existence by contending for the faith, and it will only remain alive while we continue to contend for the faith. We read in Mark, "And they went forth, and preached every where, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following." He confirmed while they worked.

The saints were not asleep when this movement started. Great sacrifices were made. God opened the windows of heaven and the Spirit descended in answer to their faith. A great revival swept the world, and tabernacle after tabernacle was built. Think of the fact that in Springfield there are nine assemblies, and all working in harmony. And throughout the land there are others besides the Assemblies of God who have received the fullness of God's blessing. There are many Bible schools, filled to overflowing, where hundreds of young people are being equipped to go forth

with the glorious news. I read of a toll gate which was kept by a man in days gone by. It was midnight and it was raining when a man on horseback approached the gate. "Open the gate," he cried. "Coming," said the old man from inside his cabin. But he did not come. "Open the gate," again cried the rider. "Coming," said the old man. But he did not come. Again the man shouted, and once more the same reply came back, but still the old man did not come out. The rider became

impatient and entered the cabin. "You said you were coming; why didn't you come," he demanded. "Did I say that?" said the old man. "I was asleep. I get so used to saying it that I guess I just answered you in my sleep." Some peo-ple today have become used to that word answered you in my sleep.' 'coming" just like the old man. They have heard warnings time after time that Jesus is coming soon, and instead of being watchful they become calloused by the message. If you remain careless you will be caught napping, for He is coming at such an hour as ye think not. Now is the time to receive His Spirit so that you will be on Fire for Him.

We are living in a day when many are falling away from the straight and narrow way. But there is another company who are moving forward. God through the apostle Paul said that strong delusion would come upon many and they would believe a lie. Why? Because they received not the love of the truth. Today thousands are setting themselves against God's Word. They are departing from the faith and believing a delusion.

It was similar in the days of Pharaoh. God called Moses to lead Israel forth, and He sent miracles into their midst to convince the people. Note Exodus 7:3. He said he would multiply His signs and wonders in the land of Egypt, but that Pharaoh would not hearken. Pharaoh, in spite of the miracles, refused to believe; the people received not the love of the truth, but believed a lie. As long as Pharaoh refused to believe God's miracles, his heart was hardened more and more.

Today, when God in the midst of apostasy is sending a multitude of signs and wonders such as never were seen since the days of the apostles, we must be awake. There is no time for trifling or lightness. God demands reality and the world demands reality. If we want God's

best we must pay the price; then God will meet our hearts' desire and send continued revival. President Roosevelt made this state-

ment a short time ago: "No greater thing could come to our land today than a revival of a spirit of religion, a revival that would sweep through the homes of the nation and stir the hearts of men and women to real assurance in the faith of God and dedication to His will. I doubt if there is any problem, social, political, or economical, that would not melt away before the revival of such a spiritual awakening." This has come from the head of this great nation.

If we are in the place where God can speak to us, God has something for us to do, but if our ear is dull He will go to someone else. Are you in the center of God's will, should Jesus come just now? Have you received the fullness of His blessing? In the midst of this gracious visitation from God, do not fail to obey the Lord. Let it not be said to any group or any individual, "thou knewest not the time of thy visitation."

We have thought it best to have alternate quarters in the Old and New Testaments. The second quarter of this year we study the life of Christ as depicted in the Gospel of Mark.


From all parts of the country friends are writing to tell us they are receiving great blessing out of this new course.

... In Case of War...

We are living in days of "wars and rumors of wars." Many believe that, while it is probable that the nations of Europe will not engage in war during the present year, it may not be long before the world will again be enveloped in a great European, and probably worldwide, conflict. In view of what might take place in the near future it is well for us now, while free from the emotional effects of such events, to decide what we should do in the event that our country should call us to the colors.

The Government of the United States has been kind in the past in that it has recognized genuine "conscientious objectors" and has provided for them "noncombatant" service. It is our hope that it will be as kind in the future.

The Assemblies of God as a Christian organization does not claim control over individual conscience. It has, however, as a Church gone on record as follows relative to military service:

"While recognizing Human Government as of Divine ordination and affirming our unswerving loyalty to the Government of the United States, nevertheless we are constrained to define our position with reference to the taking of human life.

"Whereas, We as followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, believe in implicit obedience to the Divine commands and precepts which instruct us to "Follow peace with all men" (Heb. 12:14), "Thou shalt not kill" (Exod. 20:13), "Resist not evil" (Matt. 5:39), "Love your enemies" (Matt. 5:44), etc., and

"Whereas, These and other scriptures have always been accepted and interpreted by our churches as prohibiting Christians from shedding blood or taking human life; and

"Whereas, We, as a body of Christians, while purposing to fulfill all the obligations of loyal citizenship, are nevertheless constrained to declare we cannot conscientiously participate in war and armed resistance which involves the actual destruction of human life, since this is contrary to our view of the clear teachings of the inspired Word of God, which is the sole basis of our faith; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the General Council hereby declares its unswerving loyalty to our government and to its Chief Executive, and that we hereby restate our fixed purpose to assist in every way morally possible, consistent with our faith."

The important question for us to consider is, "How far ought we to assist the Government in time of war?" This should be decided for our own protection against unnecessary military pressure and hardship and in the interest of our nation which would have plenty to burden it without unnecessary annoyance at such a time.

In a time of war none can absolutely isolate themselves from activities connected with the war. The farmer who raises stock or grain, the workman who assists in building ships, and the rail worker who helps in the moving of commodities, all contribute their portion to the success of the military campaigns.

Since none can escape some relationship to the war, it then becomes necessary that the "recruit" who is called into military service determine what he is willing to do and what he feels he could not conscientiously do. Could not such a one serve as a cook, a helper in a hospital, a stretcher carrier, a driver of an ambulance, or of a truck? There are many services which one could fulfill without "armed resistance which involves the actual destruction of human life."

This article does not claim to be the voice of the General Council. It is but the voice of an individual and is written in these days of peace to assist the thinking of our youth in the event that they should be called for military service. We would rejoice should our nation never become engaged in bloody conflict with other nations, and we pray that our national peace may be preserved. Nevertheless the threatenings of coming conflict are ominous, and we know not when peace may have to give place to fury.

firstfruits of harvest. The promise in Joel is not confined to one city. As the Spirit is poured out, you see the resultant manifestations—heavenly dreams, heavenly visions, heavenly prophecies, signs and wonders, and such deep conviction upon men everywhere that they call upon the name of the Lord and are saved.

Daniel saw by the books that God had promised that in seventy years there would be a restoration. He set himself to pray. He fasted and prayed for twenty-one days. Was his praying in vain? No. From the beginning of his prayer until the end God was mov-

ing. In the unseen realm great things were happening in preparation for the fulfilling of the Word of God. The Master said, "Men ought always to pray, and not to faint." You say, "I don't see anything." You do not have to see anything. Blessed is he who does not see and yet believes. If men pray, great things will happen in the unseen, and those who are faithfully praying will be called of God, "greatly beloved." In response to prayer "the Lord will do great things." Joel 2:21.

When Christ came to earth there was a faithful remnant praying. Zacharias and Elisabeth were faithful, praying souls. So was Anna. So was Simeon. There was a small but faithful company looking for redemption. God sent a forerunner to prepare a people for the Lord. As they came down from the mount of Transfiguration the disciples asked Jesus, "Why then say the scribes that Elias must first come?" Jesus answered, "I say unto you, That Elias is come already, and they knew him not, but have done unto him whatsoever they listed." John the Baptist did not recognize himself as Elijah; but the Master clearly said concerning him, "Elias is come already, and they knew him not."

There are some saying today, "Is there not a promise of Elijah's coming?" Yes, but just as God hid Elijah in the days of Ahab, so He will hide His Elijah in the last days. Beware of any man coming, declaring that he is Elijah. The Spirit of power that was on Elijah was on John the Baptist. And the same blessed Spirit of power is on the people whom God has baptized in the Holy Ghost in these last days, whom God has called to proclaim the One who is coming. Again and again when people have been filled with the Spirit, they have given forth in the power of the Spirit the words, "Jesus is coming soon." Some have spoken thus in languages they have never heard, but which have been recognized by those present who understood these languages.

Elijah was called to pray. He prayed earnestly. James speaks of the Lord sending the early and the latter rain that He might receive the precious fruits of the earth. He points to the example of Elijah, a man subject to like passions as we are, who prayed earnestly. The result of his praying was a great rain. The results of great rains are great harvests. Elijah prayed, and there came in the heavens a cloud as it were the size of a man's hand. And if men of like passions to Elijah pray earnestly there will come in the clouds of heaven One whose hand shall be seen, and not only His pierced hands but His pierced feet and pierced side. The promise is, "They shall see him whom they have pierced." They shall wail and mourn and

repent because of Him. It is said of Him in Psalms, "He shall come down like rain." As a result of that rain there will be a great ingathering. Paul tells us that all Israel shall be saved. And not only that, but "life from the dead," a great revival for the Gentiles.

God's Annas and Simeons were not greatly honored in Israel, but they honored God and were honored of Him. The humble lowly ones today can be as Anna and Simeon, praying with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit for all saints, and watching thereunto with all perseverance.

There is a special need and reason for prayer. The Master warned His disciples, "Pray that ye enter not into temptation." There came a dark hour when He said to the forces opposing Him, "This is your hour, and the power of darkness. In that dark hour all the disciples forsook Him and fled. It was the dark hour before the Easter dawn. There is a dark hour coming over all the earth when gross darkness shall cover the people. There is need of prayer, much prayer, "Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one." Pray that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that are coming upon the earth, and to stand before the Son of man. Watch and pray, for in the hour that ye think not the Master will come. It will be the midnight hour. In Psalm 134 we read, "All ye servants of the Lord, which by night stand in the house of the Lord, lift up your hands in the sanctuary.' are they who watch and pray through that darkest hour before the Sun of righteousness arises with healing in His God's benediction will be on such: "The Lord that made heaven and earth bless thee out of Zion.

The disciples saw how they had failed in praying in the garden, but later on they said, "We will give ourselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the Word." They now knew the importance of praying always and not fainting. Give yourself to prayer for rain and for the subsequent ingathering of which the "feast of ingathering" is but a type.—S. H. F.

"Strengthened . . . according to the might of His glory, unto all patience." Col. 1:11, R. V. M.

Paul wrote to the Thessalonians, "Your faith groweth exceedingly." There is nothing needs so much to grow as our faith (personal faith and collective faith). At the family altar, as you read the Word together, and as you pray, the capacity for knowing and trusting God will be developed in your whole household.

In every household the truth of Malachi 3:16 can be experienced: "They that feared the Lord spake often one to another: and the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the Lord, and that thought upon his name.'

Concerning such—and this can be true of your household-He says, "And they shall be mine, saith the Lord of hosts, in that day when I make up my jewels." Not one left behind, for they are all very precious to

The Sinday School Tesson

Gideon's Victorious Three Hundred

Lesson for March 27. Lesson Text: Judges 7. Gideon's first act, after the angelic visitation calling him to God's service, was to destroy in his home property all the images of Baal (6:27). There could have been no clearcut revelation from God, no further divine guidance, had he tolerated this idolatry, even though renouncing it in his heart. "If I regard iniquity in my heart the Lord will not hear me." A certain ship carrying iron ore

went persistently off its course although the captain was steering painstakingly by his compass. Finally he discovered that his compass was affected by the magnetic attraction in the iron ore. He removed his compass, as far from the iron as possible and thus avoided shipwreck. The compass of our soul, is often wrongly directed and affected, if we are cherishing in our hearts some carnal or worldly desire, and at the same time attempting to ascertain the will of the Lord.

Not of Works. "Lest Israel vaunt themselves against me saying, Mine own hand hath saved me" (7:2). God asked Gideon to reduce the numbers of his recruits until it would be evident that Israel was not being saved by her own power, her own "good works," but by the grace of God alone. "For by grace are ye saved, through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God. Not of works lest any man should boast." Eph. 2:8, 9.

The Fearful Eliminated. 7:3. Fear is the opposite of faith. "Whatsoever is not of faith is sin." Fear is one of Satan's most effective weapons in his fight against God. Fear and unbelief are twin evils, Siamese twins,

closely linked together. Again and again when God wanted to come to the help of His people, He had to begin His communication with the injunction, "Fear not." If only men feared sin as much as they fear God and things godly!

The Fearful. Notice the first class to be forever barred from God's heaven. "But the fearful and unbelieving . . . shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone. Rev. 21:8. They are consigned to eternal loss, even ahead of the abominable, the murderers, and others. Fear keeps many men and women from Christ. Fear of ridicule, of what their fellow workmen will say about their conversion. Fear of persecution, fear of family opposition. "He that loveth father and mother more than me is not worthy of me, and he that loveth son or daughter more than me is not worthy of

me." Read prayerfully the entire passage in Matt. 10:34-42. And remember "Perfect love, casteth out fear." 1 John 4:18.

"Fear Hath Torment." A widow with a brood of little children, about to be dispossessed from her home because of non-payment of rent, locked herself and family into the house, barred all the windows, pulled down the blinds, and refused to answer the persistent ringing of the doorbell, because she feared it was the sheriff, come to oust her. Actually, it was her pastor calling, with a love-offering from the congregation, sufficient

to meet her obligations! Fear acts just like that; it closes every avenue of our being through which God is striving to enter, and reveal His grace and power in our lives.

The Water Test. 7:5. Many Christians fail at the water test! The waters of baptism are often a real test of the humility and yield-edness of the individual. Many Christians refuse to be immersed in water, because of their pride, some stubborn carnal resistance left in their hearts. If our Lord was immersed in Jordan, should any of His followers claim exemption from the "water test," which is "the answer of a good conscience toward God"? 1 Peter 3:21.

The "deep-water test" is also required of God's children. A true diamond will not lose its shine when dropped into "deep water," but an imitation diamond will lose all its brilliance! What kind are we? "They shall

be mine saith the Lord in the day when I come to make up my jewels." True Christians know how to "stand fast" in the water test. "Are these colors fast?" asked a lady of a peddler, attempting to sell her some colored material. "Lady," he replied, "they'll run faster than any colors you ever washed!" That kind of "fast" is not desirable among Christians.

"As a Dog Lappeth." 7:7. Did you ever watch your dog drink water? He "throws" the water up into his mouth, with his tongue. While drinking, he is watching, nothing around him is escaping his watchful eye. This is the quality God demanded of Gideon's army. Watchfulness, alertness, as found in the three hundred, who "threw the water" into their mouths, with just one hand, with the other hand, still retaining their weapons, the while

looking alertly about them, lest the enemy ambush them unawares. The rejected host, let go of their weapons, and dropped on their knees. Had the enemy attacked them thus, they would have been killed, unarmed, unprepared. God wants a people who know how to "watch and pray."

Watching. Brother A. A. Blakeney, of India, once told the writer of an experience he and a party of friends had while picnicking in an Indian jungle. First, they spread their lunch out on a tablecloth and, feeling devoutly thankful to God for the privilege of the little outing, they had a protracted time of praise and prayer when they asked the blessing over the food. Upon opening their eyes, to eat their repast, they discovered it was gone. And looking up into the trees round about they found the thieves, a troop of monkeys, who had swooped down and stolen everything, while the folks had their eyes closed in prayer. Brother Blakeney said they decided thereafter, to watch and pray!

Broken Vessels, Flaming Torches. 7:20. What a Pentecostal lesson we have here. The "pitchers," or vessels, are typical of our lives, the human instrument. The

fiery torch is typical of the Holy Spirit's power. "Tongues of fire came and sat upon each of them." The human (the pitcher) must be "broken," humble, yielded, submissive, before the glory of the Shekinah fire will shine forth and vanquish the enemy. Many of us can remember our days of "seeking" the Baptism. How God dealt with us! How He melted us down! How small He made us feel! How He broke us! Then how glorious it was when the Comforter came to abide!

Break me, melt me, mold me, fill me! Spirit of the living God, Fall fresh on me!

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Present Day Events in the Light of Scripture

BACK TO THE LAND

It is reported that "The population of 203 Jewish villages was 98,300 in 1936, of whom 54,000 are engaged in agriculture, compared with 41,300 in 124 such settlements in 1931. In the year 1922 the figures were: 14,800 persons in 75 rural settlements.

EXTREMITY AND OPPORTUNITY

Reports Revelation: "Arab landowners, feeling the present depression which has struck Palestine, are reported to be offering their land for sale in thousands of acres. The Jewish National Fund is expected to purchase most of it."

BIBLES IN CHINA

The British and Foreign Bible Society reports that a well known Chinese leader purchased 12,000 New Testaments and 6,500 Bibles at a cost of over \$19,000 and gave them to government officials, officers, and friends. On the cover of the books he had printed, "This is the greatest Book in the World."

MUSSOLINI AND THE WALDENSIANS

According to Sunday School Times, Mussolini has called off the Romanist persecutors of the Waldensian Church and has granted to the latter entire religious freedom. He wrote: "I know that the Waldensians are Italian by race and heart, and I am an admirer of their history, for their endurance, their sacrifices, and the spirit of idealism they have demonstrated." Mussolini's personal physician is a Waldensian, and Il Duce has himself appointed two Waldensian chaplains to work in Ethiopia.

WHAT IS TRUE PROSPERITY?

"How shall we measure prosperity?" asks The Presbyterian; "by what we make, or by what we spend, or by how we spend it?" and then adds: "Statistics show that the income of the American people for 1936 exceeded 1932 by fifty-one per cent. But the sad part of the showing is in the further figures which would make one weep. Forty-one per cent more was spent at theaters; forty-eight per cent more for cigarets; three hundred and seventeen per cent more for beer; thirty per cent less given to churches; twenty-nine per cent less to benevolences; eighteen per cent less to colleges."

THE POWER OF LITERATURE

Comments The Presbyterian: "A serious and persistent need of American Protestantism is an adequate periodical press. With the disappearance of literally hundreds of Protestant journals in less than ten years, this need threatens to become acute. The Watchman-Examiner, long awake to the gravity of this situation, says with respect to Catholic journalism in this country: "The Roman Catholic Church in the United States has 134 religious papers with a circulation of 2,395,516, and 197 reviews with a circulation of 4,000,000 These printed pages are, in large measure, the secret of its growth. When will our Protestant people begin to manifest good horse sense?"

"THE COMER"

"The Comer" was one of the names of the Messiah in the Old Testament. "He that cometh" might be translated "the Comer" in a number of passages. For instance, "Blessed is the Comer in the name of the Lord." And again in John the Baptist's question: "Are you the Comer, or must we wait for another?"

What a proper and beautiful name this would be for our Lord in the New Testament,—that is, with us, in the Church of to-day! What a difference it would make in the attitude of the Bride to the Bridegroom.

RELIGIONS OF THE WORLD

The 1937 World Almanac gives the following statistics concerning leading world religions: Christianity, 682 million; Confucianism and Taoism, 351 million; Hinduism, 230 million; Islam, 209 million; Buddhism, 150 million; Animism, 136 million; Shinto, 25 million; Judaism, 15 million. Only 207 million of the "Christians" are Protestants; 475 million are Catholics. There are 1,166,785,359 non-Christians in the world. Only about one-ninth of the world's population is Protestant.

Another authority, says *Prophetic News*, points out that from 1890-1935 Christianity made a net gain of 200,000,000, whereas the heathen population made a net gain of 470,000,000. Not one believer should fail to Go! Give! and Pray!

CHURCH UNION

An attempt to form a united Protestant Church of England is under way. Anglicans, Methodists, Baptists, Congregationalists, Presbyterians, Quakers are conferring over the proposal.

But can there be real union without spiritual communion?

SCORCHED EARTH

Commenting on the fact that the Old Testament speaks of the earth as suffering with the people of Israel, a writer in *The Presbyterian* says, "In addition to the ravages of the actual fighting, the Chinese themselves have systematically destroyed territory sure to fall into the enemy's hands. Cities, towns and farms have been burned. Railroads have been dynamited. Dikes have been blown up, letting floods in upon the crops. Desolation has ensued. The land verily mourneth when man's rage is let loose."

CORRUPTING AMERICA'S CHILDREN

The Covenanter Witness reminds us that the Committee of Child Welfare of the League of Nations analyzed two hundred fifty American films and found in them: 97 murders, 51 cases of adultery, 19 seductions, 22 abductions, 45 suicides. Of the characters in these 250 films there were: 176 thieves, 25 prostitutes, 35 drunkards."

Also, "the Chicago Censorship Board some time ago eliminated from 788 pictures: 1,811 scenes of assault with guns with intent to kill, 175 scenes of assault with knives, 231 scenes of hanging, 757 scenes of attacks on women for immoral purposes, 929 scenes of nudity and semi-nudity, 21 scenes of jail-breaking."

PENTECOST AND PERSECUTION By O. S. Boyer, Brazil

Our camp meeting, which has just closed, has been greatly blessed by the presence of God, and six were gloriously baptized with the Holy Spirit according to Acts 2:4. Many more were also brought under the mighty power of God. One brother carried the fire in his heart to Crateus where the seventh was filled with the Holy Spirit a few nights later. All praise to our Lord!

Because of our victory, Satan got busy again, inciting the anti-Protestant faction, so that without the least excuse, two believers were cast into prison. Then during a service in a residence when we were being greatly blessed in prayer, another effort was made to hinder the Lord's work, a big rock being thrown through the roof,

falling not far from a sleeping child, with enough force to have killed it if it had struck the child. The incident instead of discouraging the believers or breaking up the meeting only encouraged them to pray and praise more.

Another victory was very marked when we were openly insulted and stoned by a mob in our baptismal service at the river that flows by the main part of town. A stone was thrown, hitting a young girl beside me with a thud, and the feelings of many were deeply stirred at the sight of the blood that flowed down over her face. The girl found her Saviour at the night service and there was such joy in the hearts of all that few could restrain their feelings.

As persecution increases, the believers are spurred on to greater consecration. The testimonies of the brethren have been very impressive. Almost unanimously they have set themselves to give their tithes to support Brother Domingos as their evangelist. One of the brethren baptized in the Spirit promised the Lord to make a trip proclaiming the Word if He would enable him to catch a forty pound fish so that he could pay his rent and leave food for his family while gone. This is not the season to catch much fish and everyone is amazed, for our brother first caught a twenty five pound fish that day and then in a few minutes another weighing forty-five pounds! Surely the Lord is doing all He can to get the gospel message out into this field, and to give these people a chance to be saved.

Brazil is again under a dictator and immediate danger of a revolution seems past again, but the authorities have ordered us

to close our meetings by eight o'clock each night in one part of the city, so we ask you to pray with us that His will may be done. Pray also that He will continue to give us all peace and joy and love in facing this persecution.

THE HAND OF GOD MOVES R. D. Williams, Central America

A few months after reaching this Republic of El Salvador in 1929 we climbed the pine-covered hills rising a little to the north of the city of Santa Ana to visit a group of ten or twelve believers we heard were living there. Since that time the gospel has been preached continually in those hills and now there are two established assemblies with their own church buildings, and about a half a dozen other preach-

ing points in the neighboring villages. All glory to the Lord!

This story could be repeated as the history of the spread of Christianity in many other sections of this Republic, for at the present time there are many believers in almost all parts of the country. You may ask, "Who have the workers been? How many missionaries have you there? How has it all been done?" for it would appear that a large force has been at work carrying the gospel hither and you over the hills and through the valleys, making disciples, baptizing believers, and building churches. Yes, there has been a force at work but not many foreign missionaries; the workers have been for the most part the native Christians themselves, inspired by the Holy Spirit, hearts burning with love for the Master and with understandings enlightened through the teaching of the Word of Life.

We soon felt the urge to teach these people the Word of God and so each year we have gathered together twenty or twenty-five whose hearts the Lord had touched for His service, and held a three or four months Bible school. We had no regular building, no proper furniture, no diplomas; it was a very simple beginning but it enjoyed the blessing of God.

One of those who studied returned to Nicaragua where Brother Hodges is laboring and has been used to open two new assemblies. Two others are pastoring in Guatemala where Brother Franklin has charge. A line of assemblies up to and over into Honduras have been opened and are being pastored for the most part by former students, while most of the forty assemblies of this Republic are being cared for at the present time by workers who

have gone forth from our yearly Bible school. Having seen such precious and practical results from this branch of our work, it is no small wonder that we are emphasizing it at the present time.

Great Opportunity to Help A Word from the Missionary Secretary

Realizing the importance of training native workers to carry forward the work in Central America, and feeling it to be the will of the Lord that a place be established where these native brethren may receive this training, Brother Williams has been erecting a building in Santa Ana for this purpose as funds could be sent. About two hundred dollars will complete the building and enable our brother to continue the Bible school work—the most ef-

fective way of getting the gospel to the people of Central America. We should appreciate it greatly, and we know it would lift a tremendous burden from our Brother's shoulders, if our Evangel readers would be interested in helping to meet this need. BRIEF NOTES FROM FAR AND NEAR Manchuria

Word has been received from Mr. and Mrs. A. Wingard that nineteen more have followed the Lord in water baptism—nine women and ten men. Along with the faithful and persistent sowing of the gospel seed, precious sheaves are being gathered here and there.

EVANGELIZING IN SOUTH INDIA

Letters have been received recently from several of our missionaries in South India bringing encouraging news of the various phases of missionary work being done among many classes of people. Miss Ginn, who teaches in the Bible school writes of evangelistic work being done by the graduates of the school:

"The students have returned from their tour joyful and triumphant though weary and footsore. There have been many victories for them to relate for the glory of God-victories along various lines. The group visited some of our assemblies and God blessed their ministry. In Nyeckinal four were baptized in the Holy Spirit and four were baptized in water, while in other places the power and blessing of God came down. They also went into new fields to preach the gospel. In one place they learned that they were the first in seventy years, who had been allowed to come in to preach, the last man who attempted it having been stoned out.

"A victory over self and pride was one that had to be gained at the beginning of the tour. One of the first year students was proud of his family connections and was not accustomed to carrying any kind of load. He quite willingly started out with his pack, but their line of march led by his uncle's home and he wanted to avoid meeting his uncle while doing such humiliating work. It so happened that he met his relative face to face on the road—with victory in his soul.

"The students have now scattered to various places, and we ask the prayers of God's people that they may be used of God wherever they go."

An interesting letter from Mr. and Mrs. Maloney brings news of their work both in South India and the island of Ceylon. They write: "From our bungalow we can see the high ranges of the mountains about thirty-five miles to the east of us where we find the large rubber plantations and thousands of Hindus working on them. Last Sunday morning we started out

very early to spend the day there at our outstation, where the Lord has done a gracious work in saving some of those people.

"We climbed a narrow, winding mountain road as far as we could go in the car and then had to finish the distance on foot. The people had gathered and were waiting for us. This station away back in the hills is taken care of by one of the native pastors, but it is an encouragement to these simple Christians when the missionary is able to visit them. We hope to go back there for services again soon and no doubt hundreds of these Hindu mountain people will come to hear the gospel message of Christ. Please pray with us that God will save many of them. The touring season is here now and we shall be kept very busy in conventions at the various stations in this part of Travancore in an effort to reach many people with the gospel before the hot season when such work is impossible here on the plains.

"Just three days before Christmas I re-

turned from the Island of Ceylon where I had held evangelistic meetings for about a month. I left home on a bicycle and pedaled to a place where I could get a bus, more accurately described as worn-out truck with board seats. On this I rode thirty miles in three hours. From there I went on a narrow gauge train which averaged less than ten miles an hour across the entire breadth of Southern India. The next night and part of a day were spent on a boat before I finally reached Colombo, Ceylon. Colombo is a large city, but the darkness of its heathenism is heart-rending. It can be called one of the crossroads of the world and into it flow the people of many nations.

"We had some good meetings in Ceylon in which we realized the blessing of the Lord, but oh, how our hearts yearned over the heathen. It was a joy to see some of them coming to Jesus out of their sin and darkness. In one meeting seven Buddhists came to the front for prayer, expressing their desire to become Christians, but it is hard to give an accurate report of the results of such meetings, for the darkness of

their hearts is so great. It remains for the future to reveal what has really taken place in their lives. We also held a series of meetings in Galle (about seventy-five miles south of Colombo) working among both Tamil and Sinhalese people."

Please explain how we may "try the spirits whether they be of God." 1 John 4:1.

"Every An answer is given in verse 2. spirit that confesseth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is of God: and every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is not of God." Your attention is called to the fact that John did not say, "Every person that confesseth." Persons when not under the influence of a spirit might confess that Jesus Christ was come in the flesh. It is when the person is under control of a spirit that the test becomes effective. Will the spirit confess the incarnation of our Lord Jesus, acknowledging Him to be the Son of God come in a human body to redeem man through the shedding of His blood? If the spirit controlling the person will not confess this, it is, according to John's epistle, not of God.

Another test is given in 1 Cor. 12:3, where Paul says, "No man can say that Jesus Christ is Lord, but by the Holy Ghost." Here again it is not just the human being confessing the Lordship of Christ, but the person when under the influence of a spirit. The Holy Spirit will ever acknowledge that Jesus Christ has come in the flesh, and also that Jesus is Lord.

Does Rom. 6:3-6 refer to water baptism? Can one be in the Rapture who has not been baptized with water?

Water baptism might have been in the mind of Paul when he wrote Rom. 6:3-6, seeking to show that when they were baptized, they were baptized into Jesus Christ. The water would not put one into the relationship described in Rom. 6:3-6, as there is no saving virtue in the water. Peter tells us baptism "is the answer of a good conscience toward God." What Paul wished to teach was our identification with Christ. We are buried with Him into death (of which baptism is a sign) that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. It signifies death to the old life through faith that henceforth we should "have our fruit unto holiness, and the end everlasting life." —E. S. W.

A CRUSHED HEAD HEALED

Three weeks ago when our baby was two years old, our trailer tipped over and crushed her head. She was a child of promise. God had rebuked me for my stand against having any more children, and after I yielded to God she came.

Three months before her birth God called on me to dedicate her to the foreign missions field. After the accident I picked her up, and rushed with her for help while the blood streamed from her mouth, nose and eyes. We rushed her to the nearest hospital, but were dissatisfied with the unconcerned way they treated her.

We took her to the Assembly of God people and requested prayer. Not obtaining healing we took her to the Liberal, Kansas Hospital, to our old family physician, Dr. McCreight. He said, "Prayer is the only thing that can save her." He put ice packs to her head, but said she would probably be dead in a few hours. The X-ray photograph showed two major fractures, one above the left ear, the other across the back of her head.

We sent word all around to praying people to pray. I and others fasted and prayed, and God heard and answered. He not only spared her life but He healed her. Her hearing is perfect, her mind is clear, and she is in perfect health. The only mark left on her is one eye being slightly crossed. I cannot understand why this was left, but God no doubt has a purpose in it to be worked out later. God has impressed upon me the importance of my receiving the gifts of the Spirit. Will everyone who reads this please pray for me.—Mrs. Marion Carter, Sunray, Texas.

Ed. note—This testimony was written July 31, 1937. We held it several months and then wrote Mrs. Carter. January 24, 1938 she replied saying she had taken the child to the doctor for a thorough examination for our benefit, that she might send us his report. He reported that she had only one defect, one eye being slightly weaker than the other.

She enclosed with her reply a letter from Mrs. Earl E. Gunther, Sunray, Texas, who says she was present the night the baby was brought for prayer; that they had no pastor but they prayed, and that later, after the doctor had given the child up, the Lord healed her. The Golden Text illustrates the thought so perfectly. "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels (fragile vessels of clay—Weymouth) that the excellency of the power may be of God and not of us." 2 Cor. 4:7. What a "fragile vessel" was blind Fanny

Crosby, and yet she contributed 3,000 hymns to the treasury of God's church. What a "fragile vessel" was David Brainerd, who died while still a young man-died as a direct result of his superhuman prayers and labors among the American Indians; but how wondrously did Gideon's God use him! What a "fragile vessel" was Robert McCheyne, of Scotland, who died in his early thirties, but in the short span of his life moved thousands toward the kingdom of God. What a "broken, fragile vessel of clay" was the body of the Apostle to the Gentiles, Paul ("the little") who ever carried about in his body "the dying of the Lord Jesus"; who learned that His grace was sufficient for his thorn in the flesh. Paul's body must have been "broken" and yet divinely sustained, "for," said the Corinthians (as Paul quotes them), "his letters are weighty and powerful, but his bodily presence is weak and his speech contemptible." 2 Cor. 11:10. Some think, from this, that the great Apostle had some defect of speech, some repugnant physical deformity, so that he was never able to depend on brilliance of speech or oratory to convince his listeners. He was never able to depend upon the charm of physical personality to draw men to Christ, but his courageous spirit, occupying the tenement of a "fragile vessel of clay" had always to depend upon the excellency of God's power. "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit saith the Lord of hosts." Zech. 4:6.—Harry Steil.
