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Justification and Tribulation Ernest S. Williams

EING justified by faith we have peace with God." "And not only so, but we glory in tribulation also." The justified man must learn how to put these two Scriptures together and unless he does he may find himself in a place of confusion when tribulation comes. Go to your Bible and see how much is said about tribulation. You will find it in both the Old and the New Testaments. The stony ground hearer of the word did well until tribulation came, then, like the grass without soil, withered away. Jesus has told us that "in the world ye shall have tribulation : but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world."

Paul has cautioned that "we must through much tribulation enter into the kingdom of God." And we are told to be "patient in tribulation." But can tribulation separate us from our standing before God? Are we less His children when tested than at other times? Let the Scripture answer. "For what shall separate us from the love of God? Shall tribulation?" "For I am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature shall separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

God allows us to have tribulation to purify and perfect us, not to destroy us. "Knowing that tribulation worketh patience, and patience experience, and experience hope, and hope maketh not ashamed, because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us." Tribulation then is to work in us the subduing work for God, quieting those tempers and dispositions of our heart which manifest themselves in impatience, anger, and other sinful qualities, and producing in us Christian endurance that helps us to be faithful and steady when things are going wrong.

Could you see an oriental farmer pounding out his grain with the ancient flail it would give you some idea of the meaning of tribulation, for tribulation is taken from the thought of beating out the grain from the husk. The treatment is often severe, but the results are always good. We may not see the good at the time, but "afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them that are exercised thereby." Let us look at some of the fruit of tribulation.

"Tribulation worketh patience." Someone has interpreted state I am abased and or deterioration." Here is a good measure by which we may measure ourselves. Have you suffered any tribulation? Have you endured without "loss or deterioration"? Has your heart paul could been kept in the love of God? Is your life of prayer and suffer need."

faith and devotion as fresh as ever? Do you have the same tenderness toward others that once you had? How have you endured under tribulation? What was it other than tribulation that Jesus endured when He was tempted of the devil during the forty days in the wilderness?



He was tempted through every avenue of approach. And what was the result? He returned "in the power of the Spirit" to announce "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me." He had come through the trial "without loss or deterioration."

When the testing is on it is not always possible for one to judge oneself and know just how one is coming through. One may feel the continuing strokes of the flail and think that one is being pounded to powder, but if one still can say, "Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him" one may be well assured that only the husks are being pounded off, the wheat will be "gathered into His garner." But we must seek to live the Christian life while passing through our tribulation. Loss of temper, loss of faith, or loss of victory retard the work which tribulation is intended to do.

Out of tribulation comes patience, out of patience comes experience, or "full proof by trial." It is encouraging to read the lives of faithful men and we may receive much good from the same. There is danger, however, of admiring them for their endurance while lacking endurance of our own. Tribulation gives us a new picture. We are learning through experience, making full proof of our faith and fidelity, our life and character through trial, finding as the result Divine approbation. In tribulation we prove God and we prove ourselves. Out of his sorrows Paul could say, "But I know whom I have believed and am persuaded." And he could say also, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." Tribulation worked in him patience, endurance and contentment so he could say, "I have learned in whatsoever state I am therewith to be content. I know both how to be abased and I know how to abound. . . . I am instructed both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need." Many of us can stand promotion, but can we stand demotion ? Paul could—"to be full and to be hungry." "To abound and to ffer need." (Please turn to page three)

Divine Orders for the Servant of God

Baccalaureate Sermon by Aaron Wilson, of Kansas City, Mo., at Central Bible Institute Commencement

Scripture Reading: Joshua 1:1-9.

Our text is to be found in the 8th verse: "This book of the law shall not depart out of thy mouth; but thou shalt meditate therein day and night, that thou mayest observe to do according to all that is written therein: for then thou shalt make thy way prosperous, and then thou shalt have good success."

These are the words of the Lord to Joshua, a man who had been under the ministry of Moses since the departure from Egypt. Knowing the weaknesses of the people and their many problems, it was a great shock to Joshua when God said to him, "Moses my servant is dead, and you are to take his place." The Lord encouraged him by saying, "As I was with Moses, so I will be with thee. . . . Every place that the sole of your foot shall tread upon, that have I given unto you, as I said unto Moses." That you may be able to instruct My people, "This Book of the law shall not depart out of thy mouth."

As Joshua felt the loss of Moses out of his life, so you students will surely miss the fellowship of each other, and especially the loving leadership of the faculty and the homelike surroundings of Central Bible Institute. But as you go to your respective fields of labor, remember, the same God that was with Joshua will be with you. You are to take to a dying world a living message of the living Christ, for Christianity is Christ. Not a theory about Him, not a series of ethical statements concerning Him, not a system built upon the concepts of Christ, not a cold, dead organization, but a living organism. Christianity could not survive the loss of Christ, its living vital head, any more than a human body could survive the loss of its head.

Here lies the chief distinction between Christianity and all world religions. Buddhism survived the loss of Buddha, Confucianism the loss of Confucius, Mohammedanism almost profited by the loss of Mohammed, Christian Science could spare Mrs. Eddy, Russellism could spare Russell, but Christianity is wholly dependent upon the *risen, ascended,* and *seated Lord,* the *One who* was, *who* is, and *who* is the *coming* one. It is Christ on the cross, Christ at the Father's right hand, and Christ coming in clouds of power and glory. It is always Christ.

Three years of preparation plus your

Spirit-filled lives will enable you to take just the message of the living Christ to the utmost parts of the earth. You recall in the days of Elisha, when the sons of the prophets went to gather herbs to make pottage, one fellow got hold of some wild gourds and shredded them into the pot. As soon as one had tasted he cried, "O thou man of God, there is death in the pot." And you will find wild gourd gatherers all along the way, but you can use the pure meal of the Word to remove all deadly poisons.

The early disciples were sent forth to preach the gospel of power. On the day of Pentecost Peter had three thousand converts. Philip took the same message to Samaria and the whole city was filled with joy. As you preach the whole gospel, God will confirm his Word with you in signs and wonders and divers miracles and gifts of the Holy Ghost according to His will. Let me encourage you, "This Book of the law shall not depart out of thy mouth."

"But thou shalt meditate therein day and night," that the Word of God may dwell in you richly, that your message may be an outflow from the inflow you receive as you wait in the presence of God. Jesus said, "Without me ye can do nothing." Preachers are sure to fail when they think they have learned the art of preaching, but remember, "It is not by might or by power but by my Spirit, saith the Lord."

When Henry Ford wanted shatterproof glass for his new models he did not go to experts that knew too many reasons why it couldn't be done, he gave this problem to ambitious young fellows who think nothing is impossible. He got unbreakable glass. Have faith for great things, and nothing shall be impossible to you.

When God's people led by Saul and his trained army were so fearful before Goliath, David was sent to visit his brethren. He expected to hear shouts of triumph, but instead he found a contagion of fear among them. When the great giant made his appearance and defied the army of Israel, David asked, "Who is this?" And when they told him he said, "I have fought and protected my father's flocks and feel sure that God will deliver me from this man." And he volunteered to meet him and his victory was not in his own strength but in "I come to thee in the name of the Lord of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom thou hast defied. This day will the Lord deliver thee into mine hand."

Hear him as he strikes the chord on his harp and begins to sing, "Blessed is the man . . . whose delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night. And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper." As you meditate and prepare yourself I pray God will give you the "pray" of intercession, the "go" of preaching the Gospel, the "look" of compassion, and the "shine" of a holy character.

"That thou mayest observe to do according to ALL that is written therein." All scripture means the full Gospel, salvation from sin, the Baptism of the Holy Ghost, healing for the body, the soon coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, plus a clean life and a worthy walk. God told Joshua, "Every place that the sole of your foot shall tred upon." So we must take the whole of God's Word. There are too many penknives today as in Jeremiah's time cutting out different portions of the scriptures until there is nothing left for us, but the Full Gospel is God's answer to every kind of modernism in these last days.

Not long ago a good man said to me, "Brother Wilson, I have not heard a sermon for years on repentance, sin, restitution, judgment, heaven or hell." "What is preached in your church?" I ask him. He said, "For the most part a social gospel, mental philosophy, politics, etc." But I praise God the Gospel is bigger than that. Let's preach it till Jesus comes. "For eye hath not seen, nor ear heard neither hath entered into the heart of man the thing which God hath prepared for them that love him."

"Then thou shalt make thy way pros-This does not necessarily perous." mean financial prosperity, yet the promise is sure that God shall supply all your needs. In my early ministry I was invited to preach for a man. He in turn was supposed to help me arrange for a revival meeting, and if my ministry pleased, perhaps I should be called for The railroad fare to the place pastor. was \$1.25. I only had seventy cents of this, but someone took me part of the way in a car and I had just enough then to buy my ticket, but I had nothing to buy food with. I spent the day in the depot and for my dinner I read, "How to prepare sermons," by Evans, and my Bible. My stomach felt quite empty but my soul well filled. When I boarded the train I sat behind two men and heard them talk of their prosperous business. The devil said to me,

"You're a fool, why don't you give this thing up and get into business and accumulate something for the future?" But I was not looking for money or jobs, I was looking for the "center of the will of God and God's place for me." When I arrived in this town I preached, and was called as pastor. For nearly five years God gave us a continuous revival, and that was the prosperity my soul longed for.

In the first year of my ministry I had only a Palm Beach suit and a light straw hat for the summer wear and had to wear that until late fall. One day when walking down the street it was so cold some school boys made fun of me and said, "Look at that fellow's straw hat." That surely pierced my pride and I prayed more for God to warm the weather than I did for souls to be saved. Yet God kept me there until I was willing, and then a Brother gave me a suit. It had been worn but I took it from the Lord and was very thankful for it.

Upon another occasion my wife said to me, "We have no flour for bread." So in our family worship we asked God to supply the need. As I went for the mail, as I passed a grocery store, a man from my Church called me and said, "A Brother left fifty pounds of flour here fore you." I lifted my hands and praised the Lord. When I had gotten my mail, in returning home I passed a grist mill where they made commeal. The owner stopped me and gave me a bushel of potatoes and a bag of fresh cornmeal, and I was made to go on my way feeling very prosperous. The Lord grant you prosperity, not as the Laodicean Church that was rich and increased in goods, but the kind that Peter and John had when they said, "In the Name of Jesus of Nazareth, rise up and walk."

"Then thou shalt have good success." The success which my text means is the carrying out of God's will into practice. That is the only success that is worth talking about or looking for. You may go out of the field beaten according to the estimate of men, and feel your work has amounted to very little, but if you are able to say in the strength that Christ gives, "I have finished my course; I kept the faith," your way has prospered, you have had good success. "We are more than conquerors through him that loved us."

A missionary returned after several years on the field. Opon arriving in New York there was no one to meet him. On the other hand one of our former Presidents returned to New York the same day from over seas—he was welcomed by hundreds of friends, silver bands, mounted police, etc. The missionary went to a hotel alone and feeling very despondent reminded the Lord of his years of toil and labor and

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suffering on the field for the sake of the Gospel and that on returning home there was no one to meet him or give him a welcome. He sobbed out his heart to God and the Lord said unto him, "My child you have not yet come *home*, you have just returned to the United States of America, but we are planning a great Home Coming for you. At that time I will have Heaven's choir and all the harpers meet you and give you an abundant entrance into the City of God."

Victorious Living





Wanting to Be First Lesson for June 12. Lesson Text: Mark 10:35-45

A selfish prayer. James and John, "Sons of Thunder," bold, forceful, direct, as befitted their name, make the imperious demand of Jesus, "Master we would that thou shouldest do for us whatsoever we desire." Real human thunder there—real crashing through to a selfish objective. Their request indicated that they had a measure of faith in the Master they believed in His coming glory and power—

but they selfishly wanted to be seated on either side of Him in the day of His triumph, dispensing ecclesiastical "thunder and lightning." What an example this is of the danger of being selfish in our prayers, so likely to overcome the best of us.

Our desires may not be needs. They prayed for the granting of their desires. God has not promised to supply our desires, our wants, except when we delight ourselves in Him; and we shall only desire His will. But He has promised to "supply all your needs." Phil. 4:19. There is often a "great gulf" between what we want or desire from God, and what we really need. God will faithfully supply our needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus.

An illustration from life. Sometimes we are like the little boy, whom the writer knew of, whose mother had been teaching him to pray. She informed him that if he prayed in faith God would answer his prayers. So one night he closed his prayer by saying: "Dear Lord, please send me an elephant. I would so much like to have an elephant." The wise mother did not rebuke the child

outright for the lack of wisdom characterizing the prayer. She realized that if she should, she might permanently injure the faith of the child. She reasoned with him, pointing out to him the fact that they lived in a small apartment in New York City, where elephants could not fit in. Didn't he suppose that the dear Lord, realizing how inconvenient it would be to keep house with an elephant in a small apartment, would deem it best not to answer that prayer? The little fellow saw the point, accepted it, and at the same time his faith in prayer was not hindered.

Sometimes God's grown-up children desire "elephants," but the Lord knows we don't need them. If we did get our "elephants," out of the will of God, they would prove to be the proverbial "white elephant" a burden rather than a blessing.

Our prayers may not be answered in the way we expect. At Bible school we used to

sing a chorus: "He answers every prayer. To some He says, 'Yes,' to others, 'No.' To some He says, 'Stay,' to others, 'Go.' In His own time, and way, I know He'll answer every prayer." To some requests God gives neither the outright "yes" nor "no," but, as in Paul's case, He says, "My grace is sufficient for thee."

The mother of the saintly Augustine begged God not to allow her wayward, unconverted boy to leave his North African home and go to Italy. Her boy was fast sliding down



sin's hill to eternal destruction, and she felt that if he went to Italy it would be the end. But early one morning that brokenhearted mother stood on the dock and gazed out to sea after her boy who had sailed for Italy. Satan tempted her to doubt God. "Had not God failed her? Had not her boy gone to Italy against her earnest prayers and wishes?" Ah, but there in Italy Augustine came face to face with his Saviour. In Italy he was gloriously converted. Thus his mother's prayer for her son's conversion was indeed answered but not in the way she desired.

"Pastor," said an anxious sister, "pray that the Lord will give me patience." "Dear Lord," prayed the pastor, "send this good sister lots of tribulation." "No, no, Pastor," cried the horrified sister, "not tribulation; it's patience I need." "Sister," said the pastor, "God's Word says, "Tribulation worketh patience." We should be careful how we pray. We need to see if we are willing to *pay the price*. Jesus reminded these two carnal pray-ers in our lesson of this fact, "Are you willing to drink of the cup?" Are you willing to endure tribulation?

The Baptism of suffering. v. 38. There are four New Testament baptisms. Water baptism, Rom. 6:3-4; Mark 16:16; 1 Peter 3:21. The baptism by the Holy Spirit, into the body of Christ. 1 Cor. 12:13. The baptism with the Holy Spirit, by the Lord Jesus Christ. Acts 2:32-33; 3:11. Much of Peter's first Epistle refers to the fourth, this "baptism of suffering." Read the four or five passages therein; they are most revealing. "If we suffer with Him," said Paul, "we shall also reign with him." 2 Tim. 2:12.

In olden days when the king desired to

elevate a commoner to the nobility, to knighthood, the favored person had to kneel before his sovereign while the king dealt him a blow with the suppliant's own sword. This blow was the sign of his promotion to the nobility. The English king to this day, observes this ceremony, although nowadays instead of a lusty blow being dealt, merely a light tap is administered. There is a spiritual lesson here. "Whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth." Heb. 12:6. Suffering is God's method of promotion to heaven's nobility.

Gifts versus rewards, v. 40. God can give us many things, but He cannot give us a reward. A reward is not a *gift*. It must be earned. Thus He said to James and John, "What you ask is not mine to give." Some individuals have earned or are earning the reward which the "Sons of Thunder" asked as a gift. Salvation is "the gift of God" (Rom. 6:23; John 4:10; Eph. 2:8-9); so is healing; so are a great many of His blessings; but rewards must be earned. "Behold, I come quickly; and my reward is with me, to give unto every man according as his work shall be." Rev. 22:12. Read also

Matt. 16:27; 1 Cor. 9:24, 25. Also note the following: "Every man's work shall be made manifest: . . . the fire (of God) shall try every man's work of what sort it is. If any man's work abide (the fire) which he hath built thereupon, he shall receive a reward." 1 Cor. 3:13, 14. Paul uses a wonderful illustration in 1 Cor. 15:41 to bring out the difference between a gift-of eternal life -and a reward earned by the individual. "One star differeth from another star in glory," says the apostle. They are all "in glory," they are all in God's heaven. "So also is the resurrection of the dead," he continues. All of God's redeemed children shall not shine with the same degree of reward in heaven. Each shall receive his own individual reward, differing from the rewards of every one else, even as one star differeth from another in glory, in rank, and in position near the sun.

"Nowhere in the Bible," he said, "can there be found direct testimony regarding the baptism of infants."

THE OUTLOOK IN BRAZIL

Although President Vargas has dictatorial powers in Brazil, says the Missionary Review, Christian churches will be allowed freedom of worship. While on the one hand the authorities cannot actively help the evangelical religion under the 1937 Constitution, they can and must stress its legality; on the other hand, they cannot actively support Roman Catholicism.

MUSSOLINI AND SPAIN

"Spain once was a part of the Roman empire," says Drew Pearson, Washington correspondent, and adds, "Mussolini already has laid careful plans to annex Spain. He figures that about one million civilians have been killed in Spain since the fighting beganespecially doctors, lawyers and others in professional occupations. After Franco's victory, therefore, Mussolini will make the magnanimous gesture of sending a million of his over-bulging population to help reconstruct Spain. They will never come back. They will remain to build a new Roman empire on the ashes of the old." And he also declares that Mussolini bargained to let Hitler annex Austria provided that the Germans would help Italian interests in Spain.


6. The twofold result in the life. "Joined to another, even to Him who was raised from the dead, that we might bring forth fruit unto God." Rom. 7:4, R. V.

7. The experimental pathway. "We had the sentence of death in ourselves, that we should not trust in ourselves, but in God which raiseth the dead." 2 Cor. 1:9. Note the death to self, that God's life might be manifested.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

From time to time word comes to us that money which has been sent by individuals direct to missionaries has never reached them; thus it is a loss to both the missionary and the one interested in his work. Under these circumstances there is no way in which we can recover the money.

The Foreign Missions Department is always glad to forward offerings to the missionaries and we have ways of getting it to them in the safest and most convenient form so that they are sure to get it and receive from it the best exchange. In case one of our checks goes astray we can stop payment on it and issue a duplicate, so that the missionaries receive all offerings intended for them, with nothing deducted for the handling of the same.

A letter has just been received from one of our missionaries—Charles E. Woolever —telling of a situation which might become serious. We quote from his letter: "I wish you would put a notice in the Evangel asking the person who sent three one dollar bills in a letter to one of the missionaries at Purulia, India, to inform us at once. The money was stolen from the letter by the postman on our beat and after some time he came to me asking me to buy these bills from him. I bought them and then reported him to the police and he has been removed from his position.

"Now he is accusing me of making a false case against him and is threatening to file a case against me. I have no fear that he will be able to accomplish anything but it would be well if we could find out who sent the money, the approximate date and the exact amount.

"This might be an opportunity for you to warn people against sending money direct in envelopes this way. There is a great deal of stealing in this manner and even when currency does get through to us we get poor exchange and much is lost in postage in getting it exchanged."

A good report of the work of Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy Williams, during the past several months, in Callao, Peru, comes to us in a letter from them. They write: "We are praising God for His blessings upon the various phases of the work. He wonderfully worked among the children during the summer months in the Daily Vacation Bible School. They were taught Bible lessons, gospel choruses, also how to conduct their own meetings and to lead in prayer. These children have been a great help in our Sunday School and assist in the evening services of the church.

"On March 19 the churches here on the coast had a joint baptismal service, with some from each church present. Twentytwo believers followed the Lord Jesus in water baptism. Several strangers looked on and asked many questions as to the meaning of this service. The brethren gladly answered their queries and told them the story of salvation, and gave out many pieces of gospel literature.

"It is encouraging to see how some of the believers stand true in the face of bitter opposition and persecution. One of the lady converts in our hacienda work came to the church and told how her husband treated her so cruelly because of her stand for the gospel of Christ, but when her life seemed unbearable she would talk to Jesus, and He would comfort her and give her peace in her heart. She walked a long distance in order to spend a little time among the Christians and to worship God on Sunday.

"Our native worker who was picked up of no and placed in the Peruvian army has been Meloon having some thrilling experiences. He has pictures.

been placed in some very dangerous places, but each day He asks God to protect him from the dangers. He was the only one in his battalion, who was not hurt or sent to the hospital with some injury while in training. The men are beginning to notice how God leads and protects him. He is able to preach and testify to a good many each week.

"Just now two of our brethren are in the South on a gospel trip. We should appreciate your prayers for their work."

GOMBARI SUFFERS LOSS BY FIRE

We are sorry to learn of the loss suffered by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Nilsen in Congo when the grass roofs of some of their buildings caught fire, destroying much of their equipment. In a letter from Miss Gladys Taylor we are given a picture of the scene, highlighted with the humorous as well as the tragic. She writes:

"The wood house with a supply of dry wood for two or three months caught first. Brother Nilsen's work shop was next to it so in a few minutes the roofs of both houses were a mass of flames and then another building began to burn. The garage was next in one direction and their house where they lived was in the other direction. Nothing could be saved from the work house, but the natives rushed in and began carrying things out of their dwelling house.

"Brother Nilsen told two natives to get up on the garage so they could put out any fire that happened to light there, but they stood there helpless because they did not have a ladder. Brother Nilsen said, 'Never mind that; I'll put you up there.' and with that he tossed one and then the other up on the roof. We were praying that the wind would change, and it stopped altogether so that the flames went straight up and the house did not catch. The garage did not burn either, but there was a loss of about a thousand dollars in other things—tools, lighting system batteries, stereopticon and slides, school supplies, chickens, and many other things."

No doubt friends of the Nilsen family and assemblies where they are known will want to help them replace their equipment and supplies. Offerings for this purpose should be designated as such and sent to the Foreign Missions Department, 336 West Pacific Street, Springfield, Missouri.

NEWS FROM CHINA'S WAR AREA

A letter from Miss Eva Louise Bloom says: "We are still refugees, living now in Shanghai, and as things look now it will be some time before we shall be able to get back to our sta-

tion at Ningpo. "The Ningpo harbor has been closed for a long time and communications have been greatly disrupted. Owing to the closing of the port there has been a shortage of rice with the consequent increase in price. Rice is one of our great needs at Bethel Home for there are so many little mouths to feed. Will you please pray that the Lord will undertake at this time so that the 'barrel of meal shall not waste nor the cruse of oil fail."

"The Lord is blessing here in Shanghai and souls are being saved and filled with the Holy Spirit. Last Sunday we saw the Spirit fall in copious showers. One of our Bible school students who came here with us was blessedly filled with the Holy Spirit."

GOD BLESSING IN MEXICO

An interesting letter has just come from Ruben O. Medina, Principal of the Bible school in Mexico City and pastor of a large assembly there. He writes as follows: "At the present time the Mexican Republic has its doors wide open to receive the good news of Jesus.

"One of the greatest triumphs we had last year was the opening of the public meetings of our church in this city. All things seemed to be against us because of the decrees of the president, but at last the Lord gave us the victory. Since September of last year we have had regular services without any interruption. Our Sunday School has an attendance of between three and four hundred, and the night meetings average between seven and eight hundred.

"The graduation service of our Bible

school was held on the twenty seventh of March; diplomas were awarded to ten at that time—four young women and six young men. The graduation was followed by the First Southern Conference and some of the graduates were given credentials to preach. Immediately they left their homes to work in the Lord's vineyard. They will meet many trials because they will be going into new fields and they have practically no support—only a great confidence in God to supply all their needs, and a real call from God to love the poor sinners and to take them out of darkness into light.

"From the beginning of this year we felt that the Lord was going to work in a special way and He really has. Children and adults alike have prayed and prayed until the Lord has filled them with the Holy Ghost. We are paying special attention to our childhood and youth. Our Bible school will reopen soon. Most of the students are very short of funds and others have nothing with which to buy their books or to support themselves while in school. We are looking to God to supply."

In the prime of his youth he volunteered to be a pioneer missionary for Christ and the message of holiness. He lifted up his voice with a fresh message in the old land of the Pharaohs. This was about fifteen years after Dr. John Hogg, who was first to declare the message of "justification by faith," had gone to his reward.

A tall, rather slender young Canadian, clothed in black apparel from head to foot, with a brown beard, walked the streets of Assiout with Bible and song book under his arm, holding meetings. These meetings were mostly attended by children sitting down on spread mats brought from their homes for the occasion, and ladies looking down from their attics. The song went out in the Arabic, "They who choose Christ as refuge shall in Him find rest." This drew more people to his meeting and then the plain message of salvation and holiness was proclaimed. When he was through with one meeting he went on to the next street. So


the day ended with several of these street meetings and the usual church night service.

For the first seven years as pioneer missionary for the Canadian Holiness Movement he never left the Upper Country all the year round except twice when he made trips to the Capital on official business. Thus he served well his first term and went back to Canada for a much needed furlough. It was the time of the outpouring of the "latter rain," and to his heart's yearning the promise of the Father was given.

Although he spent some time in Canada and the States, yet his goal was Egypt again, for Egypt also must have a larger portion of the blessed gift.

Sixteenth school year draws to close. Been a remarkable year. Largest student body in history—nearly 450. Biggest graduating class —114. Possibly best year for loving unity and spiritual power. Dozens of missionaries among the visiting speakers. Lilian B. Yeomans and Donald Gee each lectured a week. Revival fires burned often. Now many students have faces set toward foreign and home missionary fields.

By Saturday afternoon many visitors arrived. Parents here to see children graduate. Some pastors too. Former students galore, returning to scenes of fond memories, renewing friendships rich and lasting. From far and near they gather here. Some assortment of license plates—nearly every State represented. A ball game on the school diamond—Gospel Publishing House loses to C. B. I. boys.

Saturday evening. C. B. I. auditorium packed out. Last chapel service, a red-letter occasion. Beautiful ceremony as composite photograph of graduating class was unveiled and presented to school. Over 500 pictures of C. B. I. graduates hang on C. B. I. walls.

Sunday morning. Usual services at eight other assemblies in city, but at Central Assembly an extra crowd gathered. Ernest S. Williams, General Superintendent, struck the triumphant keynote that characterized the week-end, preaching on "Jacob's God."

Sunday afternoon. Baccalaureate! Weather delightful—cool but bright. Entering the huge Shrine Mosque auditorium, met many young lady ushers in white dresses—42 in all. Front of platform was beautiful with its white lattice, green ferns, brilliant flowers. Huge emblem prominently displayed in center—an open Bible surmounted by the gleaming silver letters, C. B. I.

Trombone choir marched out, raised instruments precisely, played three lovely selections. Suddenly curtain went up, gorgeous spectacle fascinated the audience. Behold nearly 450 students, seated in tiers on platform. Boys in dark suits, girls in blue uniforms and white ties, graduating girls all in white. Ernest S. Williams, president of school, occupied chair. Song by all students, "All Hail Immanuel," surely grand. Not "Hail Hitler," but Hail to Him whose throne is forever and ever. Pastor A. A. Wilson of Kansas City gave stirring message. Very free in Spirit.

Sunday night. Crowd at C. A. meeting; ringing testimonies from visiting young people. Then a great evangelistic meeting at Central Assembly. House packed. Brother Wilson brought splendid salvation message.

Monday morning. Busy time at Gospel Publishing House. Staff of over 100 employees gathered at 7:45 for daily devotional period. Many visitors crowded in too. Pastor David H. McDowell of Jeannette, Pa., spoke briefly. Many parties of visitors inspected the establishment. Among others visiting we noticed a number of District Superintendents: W. D. Burris, G. F. Lewis, V. G. Greisen, O. E. Nash, E. L. Tanner, W. J. Mitchell, F. C. Woodworth, S. L. Johnson, F. D. Davis, Roy E. Scott, and Carl O'Guin.

Monday afternoon. At Central Assembly fellowship meetings were held for Spring-field District. Fine services morning and afternoon, meals served for visitors.

Directorate, graduating students, visiting alumni, met in C. B. I. dining hall at noon for annual reunion. Splendid meal came first. Looked in to see Brother Whitford the busy baker and chef who mentioned that in the past eight months the supplies have included 20,047 two-pound loaves home-made bread, 2,113 pies, 23,539 cookies, 482 large sheet cakes, 1,475 cream puffs, 17,152 baking powder biscuits, 4,291 doughnuts, 10,525 rolls, 178 large sheets corn bread, 1571/2 gallons mayonnaise, 15 gallons mincemeat, besides many tons of potatoes, abundance other vegetables, hundreds pounds of meat, much milk, cereals, fruit, About 250 present at reunion, including etc. over 100 former students. Every C. B. I. class represented, year by year. Four students of old Bethel Bible School present too, and also some from old School at Auburn, Nebr. About fifteen missionaries present, representing the 100 or more Council missionaries who were trained at C. B. I. and Bethel. Three C. B. I. instructors also among the alumni-Myer Pearlman, Rollin Burns, Chelsea Melvin-proxies for numerous other alumni now teaching in various Bible schools. Brother Williams, speaker of the afternoon, gave words of encouragement to all.

Monday night. As crowd gathered, continual buzz of excitement heard. The great building quickly filled; crowd of 3500 or more people present, besides students. Students and audience stood as directorate, faculty, and graduating class marched up aisle in double file to platform.


Brother Evans took the chair, first leading congregation in hymn, "How Firm a Foundation." A solid beginning! Then school sang a glorious anthem, "The Great Coronation Day." Like rest of music it was memorized, a feat which took patient practice but brought added blessing to hearers.

Scripture reading by Myer Pearlman from 1 Corinthians 13. Very fitting as graduating class had chosen as their name, "Disciples of Love," and as their motto, "The love of Christ constraineth us." In keeping also was the illuminated cross which crowned platform behind and above the students. It spoke of constraining love indeed, also reminded of the cross-and-cup theme in C. B. I.'s beautiful year-book this class produced.

Brother Evans introduced the lady representative of graduating class, Ruth Schoonmaker. He spoke of two widowed mothers still carrying on in India: Sister Cox, who has two sons in C. B. I., one graduating this year; and Sister Schoonmaker, who has sent five children to C. B. L, three now returned missionaries and two more, Ruth and Paul, graduating this year. A remarkable message given.

Edward Robison was introduced as the graduating boys' representative speaker. His subject, "Christ Glorified," was inspiring.

The speaker ended by quoting, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," then literally "leaped for joy." At the same time whole audience stood instinctively, raising hands in homage to King Jesus, praising with heart and voice. Then that triumphant "national anthem" of God's people, The Hallelujah Chorus, began. Students sang it lustily. No earthly monarch worthy of such worship. A genuine taste of millennial glory, and before audience was seated again there was a message in tongues and interpretation.

God is gracious, but He will not force the acceptance of His grace upon men.


In 1829 George Wilson, in Pennsylvania, was sentenced to be hanged by a United States Court for robbing the mails and for murder. President Andrew Jackson pardoned him, but this was refused, and Wilson insisted that it was not a pardon unless he accepted it.

That was a point of law never before raised, and the President called the Supreme Court to decide. Chief Justice John Marshall gave the following decision:

"A pardon is a paper, the value of which depends upon its acceptance by the person implicated. It is hardly to be supposed that one under sentence of death would refuse to accept a pardon, but if it is refused, it is no pardon. George Wilson must be hanged."

And he was hanged. Provisionally, the gospel of Christ which is the power of God unto salvation is for every one irrespective of what he may be or what he may have done. Potentially, it is only to "every one that believeth."


Their nine children, seven sons and two daughters, all became missionaries in that land, so that by this time the Scudders have given almost 600 years of continuous missionary service for India.

"The ability to start is worthless without the stability to finish."

The French have a proverb which says that it is only the **first step** which costs.

In some senses that is true: that when you have made the effort to begin (for instance to testify or to speak to someone about Jesus) it becomes easier every time afterwards.

But in another sense it is far from true; for while the newness and excitement of a new start give momentum, that first enthusiasm tends to die down little by little.

Christ warned us against not counting the cost before setting out to follow Him. See Luke 14:25-33.

The Lord Jesus Christ must be FIRST in every thought, word, and deed. This is the meaning of being ready to bate all others

meaning of being ready to hate all others. It does not mean to have any lack of love towards them, but rather to renounce them and refuse to give them the first place in our hearts.

It is a warning against idolatry—against allowing any person or thing to occupy the place which is God's alone.

This absolute and eternal renunciation of all else for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ is exemplified in Paul. Phil. 3:7, 8.

So we see that the cost of being Christ's disciple means "forsaking all that we have," and letting nothing stand between us and Him. Are you willing to count it and pay the price?

Only those who are ready to pay the price and to go all the way with Him will have that stability to finish.

THE REST OF FAITH

Moses brought the people out: Joshua brought them in. Accept Jesus as your Joshua. Let past failure and wandering and sin not cause either despair or contentment with what you are. Trust Jesus who, through the sprinkling of the blood, brought you out of Egypt,

to bring you as definitely into the rest. Faith is always repose in what another will do for me. Faith ceases to seek help in itself or its efforts, to be troubled with its need or its weakness; it rests in the sufficiency of the all-sufficient One who has undertaken all. Trust Jesus. Give up and forsake the wilderness. Follow Him fully: He is the rest.

was confined in and around Assiout which lies in the middle south. But he received a call from heaven to the Capital Cairo, which was counted then the Paris or Boston of Egypt. Why would he leave a fruitful field where his saintly life had lingered long since his first ministry to open work in a city which was the graveyard of true religion? The wisdom of the transaction was questioned, but he fought all hardships with prayer and patience until victory came at last after a year of seemingly fruitless labor. The next year a mighty revival broke out and for the first time Cairo became the scene of a wonderful work of God. Plans were then made for Lower Egypt and several centers were considered -Alexandria, Tanta, Port Said, etc. The latter two stations were closed owing to lack of ministers but the first is still going on.

This was not all, but free literature must go where the missionary and minister could not. Thousands of free tracts and a monthly periodical, once as "The Good Report" and later as "The Morning Star," went as silent messengers to Syria, Palestine, Transjordania, Iraq, India, and all Arabic speaking countries.

Since the Pentecostal work was associated with the General Council a District Council has been established in Egypt, and in the providence of God Herbert Edward Randall was made Superintendent. He was well acquainted with the Arabic language, had the tact, the deep concern and the

glowing heart, the necessary qualifications of a successful missionary leader.

Even his long illness which deprived him of sleep and almost every other physical comfort was transformed into a blessing in that more prayers for the cause went up to the Throne, and revivals broke out in places that had not seen the face of a Pentecostal evangelist, and hundreds received a blessed Baptism in the Spirit. The sad part of it is that we have not ministers enough to visit these groups of believers.

Herbert Edward Randall, besides being the means of bringing thousands to the saving knowledge of Christ, was also the means of leading great numbers into the deeper Christian life by word, pen, and a holy, Spirit-filled life.

With bowed heads and broken hearts we laid his remains in a grave, but he will ever live with us and through us to the generations yet unborn, should the Lord tarry.

ENID, OKLA.—This city has been stirred by the manifestations of the presence of God at the closing exercises of the eleventh year of Southwestern Bible School. At night a great missionary service was held in the Gospel Tabernacle, which was packed in spite of constant rain. His officers respectfully stayed in the background that the General might partake alone, doing this in honor of his high rank. In the midst of the sacred service a humble farmer, feeling his need of God, came into the church on the same errand on which the Duke of Wellington was engaged. He started to kneel at the altar near the duke, when the duke's horrified aids-de-camp forcibly held him back, telling him he must wait until the duke had finished. Wellington, turning about and sensing the cause of the commotion, said: "Let him come. All men are alike at the Communion rail. God regards neither rank nor distinction, but in His sight high and low are the same." "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free: . . . ve are all one in Christ Jesus." 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

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

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

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THE CENTER CUT shows a miniature of our 2-color wall chart, size 12¹/₄x19 inches, which lists the twelve points of "Our Sunday School Goal." Without charge, hundreds of

these attractive charts have been mailed to Sunday School Superintendents. In many instances Pastors and Superintendents have measured their Schools by this Standard of Measurement and have found some points which could be corrected with little effort, lacking in their Schools. Some have discovered their School has made no increase in attendance during past years, while nearby are many who have not been won to Christ. Others have found that Pastors, Superintendents, and Teachers, were often absent during sessions of the School. The need for *Teacher Training Classes, Cradle Rolls, and Home Departments* has been discovered. It has been found that little attention had been paid to *Child Evangelism*, and that regular and missionary offerings were not increasing as they should. Thoughtful Superintendents, observing such conditions, have held Workers'
