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Gathering the Nations

"I will also gather all nations and will bring them down into the valley of Jehoshaphat." Joel 3:2.

In 1 Chronicles the fifth chapter we have before us one of many references in the Bible where nations repeatedly reject the commands of God. The time finally arrives for Him to pour His punishment upon them.

The Assyrians of the north at that time were considered the most fierce and warlike nation. We read in 1 Chron. 5:26: "And the God of Israel stirred up the spirit of the King of Assyria and the Israelites were overcome in battle and taken captives."

This narration is used to convey to the reader the truth that it is a small matter for God to do that very thing. And no wonder, after we read Isa. 45:12 and learn that with His hands "He stretched out the heavens and commanded all their host."

When we fully realize what a small speck of dust this earth is, compared to the billions of other worlds and planets in the boundless space called

the heavens, surely we should "seek out of the Book" (Isa. 34:16) with respect and fear, and learn what we must do in order to escape the calamity soon coming upon this world -and above all to escape "the second death." "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches. He that overcometh shall not be hurt of the second death." Rev. 2:11.

In the opening passage of this article we read that God will gather all nations unto battle. We just read where God is able to stir up a warlike spirit in the hearts of men. Again, in Rev. 17:17 we have an account of God's putting it into their hearts to fulfill His will.

Under the present shadow of world events, the unbeliever certainly has plenty of ar-guments against the possibility of God's hand being in the awful mess of human affairs. But surely no question can arise after a careful study of prophetic passages in the Bible -and those passages are being fulfilled before our very eyes today, regardless of the efforts of every sane leader of the world to stop the on-coming tide of destruction.

Many places in the Bible tell of the day in which God will gather the nations. Among such references are Micah 4:11; Zech. 14:2; Zeph. 3:8; Rev. 16:14. Space will allow only the study of the third chapter of Joel at this time.

First, the reader must know that God gives very few details concerning the last great world war. In fact, He deals only with the final decisive battle; namely, Armegeddon. Naturally, the process of preparation leading up to that great finale is a tremendous undertaking as viewed by human eyes.

Puzzling as it may seem to many of those eyes, the preparation for the coming war has reached the stage where it is a known fact that the decision must be reached in the vicinity of Palestine.

Let us turn to the opening passage and see for ourselves that these nations shall be gathered into the valley of Jehoshaphat. With boundaries and

names being constantly changed in the last few years of diplomatic arguments, it is hard to find many boundaries of Bible-day prophecies. In the study of ancient maps, we find the valley of Jehoshaphat covering the northern section of Palestine.

It should stir the reader when he hears Mussolini state that Palestine must be under his control in order to stop the on-coming hordes of Communism from the north and east. Do we not read in Dan. 11:44 that tidings out of the north and east shall trouble the last world leader? It is not for this article to state who that last leader is, but it is known that Rome will set up military headquarters in Jerusalem or vicinity, in the last days of man's rule. Dan. 11:45.

And the thing to remember before we go into the study of Joel: all important news concerning the present stir of nations is closely censored, and we can expect a great deal of propaganda calculated to whip the masses into one accord with the national leaders.

Combining the different statements of world leaders, and adding much reading "between lines," we are now, this very day, getting a secondhand account of things told hundreds of years ago by the living God and Creator of all things.

The very fact that God addresses the Gentiles (Joel 3:9), and tells all the men of war to come, is proof enough that this was to be in our day. First it is to be in the Gentile age or after Christ was crucified and the Jews dispersed. Today is the first time since then that *all* nations, East and West, are practically ready for war, on a greater scale than the fighting now going on in Spain and China.

In verse 10 we read an account of the old scrap iron that will be "beat" into war material. Are not the blast furnaces of the world going day and night in work of that nature?

Again see the next war spirit manifested in the next line: "Let the *weak* say I am *strong*." When the fighting

spirit really saturates a person, it is a well known fact that he loses all sense of personal fear or danger. Instances of individuals weak and small attacking opponents much greater in strength are innumerable. As a worldly saying goes: "as is the individual, so is the nation." Small nations today are plainly in that frame of mind.

Another puzzling condition of world affairs today is the fact that great wars are in progress without the formality of breaking off diplomatic relations. It is a case of no one claiming the résponsibility of starting war.

That thought brings us to a reference in Isa. 10:5. God uses the Assyrian of the North as "His rod of anger" to send "against an *hypocritical nation.*" Then in verse 7 we find that the Assyrian does not mean to do it: "neither does his heart think so," *but "it is in his heart to dcstroy.*" Today, we see the nations frantically trying to stop the coming struggle and no war being declared, but destruction of life and property has been going on for two years, the momentum increasing in size and fierceness at a rapid rate.

We read in 1 Cor. 1:19: "For it is written, I will *destroy* the wisdom of the wise and will bring to *nothing* the understanding of the prudent." Nothing could be plainer in the worldly scenes about us. The nations are falling into the hands of an angry God.

It is up to individuals to seek the protection of this living God before it is too late. Do you have that protection? "Seek ye the Lord all ye meek of the earth which have wrought his judgment. Seek his righteousness, seek meekness. It may be ye shall be *hid* in the day of the Lord's anger." Zeph. 2:3.

"Yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will joy in the God of my salvation." Hab. 3:18. Of this wondrous river of the Holy Spirit we read, "God is in the midst of her; *she shall not be moved.*"

Ezekiel had a vision of this river flowing from the Sanctuary, an everdeepening river, bringing unspeakable blessing where its flow was deep and wide. Praise God, this river is flowing from the Sanctuary today. In Revelation, John saw this river of hfe. From whence did it come? Out of the throne of God and the Lamb. From this river of life, this river of the Spirit, we must constantly drink today. Let us be quiet and confident, our hearts *still* before the living God, who is an ever present help now, a blessed refuge, a sure defense, a glorious guide, a wondrous preserver. The Holy One that inhabiteth eternity has not abdicated His throne. His arm is not shortened, neither is it palsied. He will yet make His mighty power to be known. For a day is coming when all heaven will be glad for

Pentecostal Work in Norway

The Pentecostal people of Oslo, and throughout Norway, had a glorious day on Sunday, August 28, at the dedication of the new, majestic and modernistic building which was finished last week. This house of God has a seating capacity of 2,100 in the main auditorium, and there is a smaller room seating about 350. Wherever you are seated in the great assembly hall you have a good view, for there are no columns or other obstructions either in the gallery or on the ground floor. The platform is divided into three sections: the first contains the baptismal fount, the second the pulpit and seats for speakers, and the third is reserved for the

choir. The building is a wonderful piece of architecture, practical and tasteful, and well fitted for Pentecostal people. Music rooms, Sunday School rooms, offices, and an apartment for the parish sister are provided.

At 11:30 a. m., the house was filled and there were several hundred on the outside, trying to get in. There were assembled pastors and leaders from every denomination. High and low, rich and poor, came to see this wonderful house dedicated to the service of the Lord, to be a transformer station sending out power-filled, 1 i v e wires throughout the country, yes to the fields afar off. Every

day throughout the week meetings are held, and among the speakers are such well-known men as T. B. Barratt, Lewi Pethrus of Stockholm, A. Endresen of Denmark, Knut Pettersen, Parley Gulbrandsen, and Werner Skibsted.

Pastor T. B. Barratt welcomed the friends from the homeland and from foreign countries, preachers, evangelists, and the public, to join in praising the Lord for His wonderful grace on this wonderful day of our Lord Jesus Christ. Then began the morning service conducted by T. B. Barratt.

There is a name which is the center of our divine service, and that name, seen in large letters on the front of the platform, is—"JESUS." I believe all will concede that this is a beautiful decoration in this otherwise so straight-lined church. Everything centers around this one point—this holy name of JESUS. This hall, with its straight, clean lines and beautiful color, is homelike and majestic in appearance, and no doubt will prove a fine and comfortable spiritual home for the thousands who will meet here —and the center of it all is the name "JESUS."

Our preaching is also centered around this name, and in this we are closely united with other evangelistic Christians. Many are of the opinion that we Pentecostal people are always in a state of ecstasy, because we, like the first Christians, speak in tongues and believe in miracles. 

What About Christmas Boxes?

Each year we have a number of inquiries about sending Christmas boxes to the missionaries. We appreciate the desire of assemblies and individual friends to remembers the missionaries in this way and would like to pass along a few pointers which we have gained from correspondence.

We would suggest that before you wrap your package, unless it is quite small and of light weight, you consult your local postmaster regarding regulations concerning weight and size of parcels acceptable for delivery in the various countries. In certain countries our missionaries have recommended that all small packages should be mailed to them first class to avoid their having to pay high additional postage for interior delivery. A few have notified us that large boxes or barrels of old clothing are prohibited entirely.

Perhaps the item of greatest difficulty is that of duty on the goods. In some instances missionaries have had to pay duty far in excess of the value of the contents of the package in order to get it. Some of our friends in America have taken this into consideration and, when sending gifts to missionaries, have ascertained the cost of duty and have sent the amount in to us to be sent to the missionary to reimburse him for the duty he has had to pay. We would suggest this as a good plan; otherwise the missionary to whom you think you are sending a Christmas gift may have to actually buy it at a high price.

One more point we might mention is that of sending articles direct to the missionary. A number of friends have written us in other years saying that they were sending their Christmas box to us to send on, since they understood that we had some less expensive way of getting things to the mission field. In reality we have no way of sending packages other than the regular mail or freight service and your

regular man of meight scrutce sending your box to us and our remailing it only costs more than if you send it direct to your missionary friend. It is sometimes possible to send an article with a missionary who might be going out, but even then we reconmend that you send sufficient money to cover the excess baggage charges and other costs which the outgoing missionary might have to pay to take it.

We would suggest, therefore, that unless you are familiar with sending things to a certain field, you send your gift in money to our Foreign Missions Department, and we will see that your missionary friend

receives it together with your name and address, and you will receive acknowledgement of it direct from the field.

We send all missionary money one hundred per cent to the field, deducting nothing for handling it. We depend entirely upon your extra donations designated "Missions Department Expense" for this work, and are more than grateful for such offerings.

A FAITHFUL WORKER CALLED HOME

The following letter has come to us from Mr. and Mrs. I. G. Shakley in Sierra Leone, West Africa.

"We were shocked to hear of the death of our native worker, Charlie Davies, who went out from our church here at Freetown to take the gospel to his Kroo people in Liberia. He had written us that he was suffering with a pain in his side, but because he kept on in the work no one realized how serious his condition was. We believe the trouble was brought on by too strenuous itinerating—the need was so great and the workers so few. The church has met with a great loss.

We trust you will pray for them as they step into this new work. We are looking to the Lord to supply their support."

Now again there are many in our care who have come in just as these older ones did years ago and we feel that if Jesus tarries, they too, will some day be workers for Him. These girls need a home and care and training as did the older ones. Many of them are orphans and homeless, with no one to love them, but we have taken them in and they are daily learning more about Him.

Help Needed for Teachers

We have eight consecrated teachers in the school who love the Lord with all their hearts and they also seek to lead the children on to know Him better. It means much to have teachers in the school who really know Him. None of them, how-ever, is supported, and month by month

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Dangers of Spiritual Pride. Lesson for October 23. Lesson Text: 2 Corinthians 12.

Pride An old divine once classified pride as threefold: (1) Pride of face, or the vanity of human appearance; (2) Pride of race, from which more than one horrible war has sprung; (3) Pride of grace, i. e., spiritual pride. This was the first sin, committed by the first sinner, Lucifer, Son of the morning. See Ezek. 28:17; 1 Tim. 3:6.

Pride of Face. We shall consume but little time on this. The two bil-


lion dollars which American women spend annually in beauty parlors, is sufficient commentary. Let all who take pride in their face buy themselves a beautiful, Delicious Apple. Observe and admire its firm flesh, its symmetrical shape the marvelous blush of coloring which no beauty parlor attendant could begin to imitate. Keep that apple in your room for three months and look at it again. It is wrinkled, drab, shapeless, unattractive. That is what happens altogether too soon to pretty faces. But a face, adorned by Christian character, will be beautiful forever.

Pride of Race. Here is a dangerous disease indeed. The Jews of Christ's day suffered with it. Because they "were children of Abraham," they felt superior to the "Gentile dogs." Read the eighth chapter of John. See how Christ denounced them for their racial pride. "You say you are children of Abraham, and are boasting in that fact, are proud of that fact alone? I say to you, that your pride shows you to be children of your father the devil." How the Lord hated pride in any form. Personally" I look upon this fearful

sin of racial pride as one of the three evil spirits which, according to Revelation 16, are leading the nations on to Armageddon. Japan reeks with racial pride and considers their race divinely destined to rule Asia and the world. We know whereof we speak. Mussolini has innoculated Italy with the same dreadful serum. As for Nazi Germany, let the following speak for itself.

Danger. "A press dispatch from Berlin (Dec. 1936) reported a statement made by Leader Schulz of Pomerania in one of the new castles erected as training schools for future Nazi leaders. 'I don't want to be guilty of blaspheny, but I ask you: Who was greater, Christ or Hitler? Christ, at the time of His death had twelve disciples who were not even completely faithful to Him. Hitler today has 70,000,000 people behind him. We cannot submit to having differences alongside of us which breathe a spirit different from ours. Hence National

Socialism (Nazism) says in all earnestness "I am the Lord thy God, thou shalt have no other gods beside me."'" God who hates pride, God who punished it in Satan, in Nebuchadnezzar, in David, in Saul, will visit judgment on any nation and people who are guilty of such blasphemous pride as this! Those who spring to defend the present German regime, if they will examine their own hearts will find lurking there some traces of pride, which they need to eradicate by the blood of the Lord Jesus Christ! God save our American Democracy from Fascism, as



well as from Communism. Just as well chose between a rattlesnake and a cobra —each is poisonous!

Pride of Grace. Read the Lord's condemnation of the Laodicean church in Revelation 3. How proud they were of their church buildings! Of their accumulated religious prestige and background! Of their movement! (A movement is nothing without the Mover.) "Thou sayest I am rich and increased with goods, and have need of nothing"—simply bloated with spiritual pride— "and knowest not (the blindness of pride) that thou art wretched. and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked."

Paul's Thorn in the Flesh. Therefore after God had given Paul the marvelous experience recorded in 2 Corinthians 12, lest he should be lifted up with spiritual pride, "pride of grace," God gave him a thorn in the flesh to keep him humble. To keep him staked down to earth, lest he inflate the balloon of

his ego (he never did) with the gases of spiritual pride and soar into self-exaltation, and thus never afterward be "any *earthly* good."

Kitchen Kollege. In an ancient monastery the Abbot had a fine way of keeping the monks humble. After one of them had preached a particularly good sermon, and knew it, the Abbot would consign him to peeling potatoes in the kitchen for a few days. That kept them humble. The Lord often has to lead us to the potato barrel doesn't He, and put us on "kitchen duty"?

Brought Low. Madame Guyon, whose inspired writings influenced the Wesleys, Whitefield, and Fletcher in the great Methodist revival, was said to have been a very proud and ravishingly beautiful young woman. God sent her a "thorn in the flesh" to buffet the pride out of her, in

the form of smallpox. When that disfiguring disease had fin-ished with her, her once beautiful face was hopelessly marred. But Madame Guyon knew how to humble herself under the mighty hand of God, and through the remaining years of her life, "walked with God," like she Enoch. The inspiration of her life and of her writings became the spark that set several nations ablaze for God, with revival fires. "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble." -Harry J. Steil.

LIVING WORDS

In the light of a gorgeous autumnal sunset, a party of school-girls, returning from a walk, met Dr. Chalmers, the old Scotch preacher. Years later one of the girls recalled "that calm and lovely face with heaven stamped on it-the soft silvery white hair-the Scotch accent. Dr. Chalmers asked me about my studies: then, when bidding me good-bye, he said: 'But oh! my dear young friend, seek above all knowledge to know Christ.' Timidly I replied, 'I will tryand wish to be so good, and hope to meet you in heaven.' 'Cling

to Christ, then,' he said, 'and we will meet again—if not here, up there,'—pointing upward as he spoke. I never met him again. He died in the May following. His words did not die with him. They will remain with me for ever."

ANCIENT LETTERS

Letters, written just before Nebuchadnezzar's triumph at Lachish, have been dug up by archæologists, according to the *Alliance Weekly*. These letters were written by Hebrews inside the walls of Lachish, in Palestine, while struggling against the attack of Nebuchadnezzar's Babylonian army in the year 589 B. C. The prophet Jeremiah was then alive and preaching.

The letters, over a dozen of them, are written on scraps of clay. The ink on the letters has been analyzed and found to be a mixture of carbon and iron fluid, possibly made by dissolving soot in an extract of oak galls.

soul of man! The presence of love in human relationships reminds one of the history of that graceful and elegant palm tree which is so admired in California. In cottage or mansion, on country lane or fashionable boulevard, everywhere you will find its graceful plumes. Bnt people seem to forget that this imperial tree is not native to California. It was brought in years ago from verdant islands at the blistering equator.

And likewise this wondrous commodity, love, that glorifies every human relationship! Love has been carried by the Holy Spirit into the heart of man from the heart of God. Love in the home could only be possible by having God in the home.

Furthermore, a tempering process is necessary before the equatorial palms can be planted in the cooler clime. Somewhere between their South Sea habitat and their present Californian abode was a special place where the gardener "toughened them up."

Similarly with love. Cold, harsh, human nature could not afford a fitting abode for the fervent love that emanates from God's great heart. There must be a tempering garden. And this is the beautiful garden of prayer. Here men and women bow before the Lord to let Him conform them to His own image. Here bitterness, criticism, jealousy, selfishness and other elements foreign to godliness are discarded, and man becomes a fit dwelling-place for the love of God.

Is love lacking in your home? Then seek it from above. Set up a family altar where all the household can be tempered to receive God's love. True peace and true joy will characterize your family relationships when all are united in love, "which is the bond of perfectness."

SELF-DISTRUST

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When our Lord commands, "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation" (Matt. 26:41), He adds a rapid analysis of the redeemed man, in order to show how perpetual, how universal, is the need for our vigilance and prayer: "the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." Our capacity to bear at any time is measured not so much by the weight of the load we have to carry, as by the strength we have with which to bear it; and our flesh, Jesus says, is always weak, and weak in all of us without exception. Here then is our perpetual reminder. The Saviour would have us filled with so profound a self-distrust that no prayer is oftener on our lips than the cry to escape testing. Napoleon is said to have ordered a coat of mail, and when the maker brought it, ordered him into it and then shot at him again and again; and when the armor had stood the test, richly rewarded him. However it is madness for us to rush on such a challenge in the spiritual realm. Mr. Moody says that a life's observation taught him that the falls of Christians are nearly always due to their underestimating the power of the enemy. The keen realization of our weakness is one of our supreme safe guards because it precipitates us fulllength on vigilance and prayer .- D. M. Panton.

SALVATION WITHOUT WORKS

A Roman Catholic priest was called to the bedside of a dying man, to administer the last sacrament. However he was greeted by the most awful cursing, and being an honest man, the priest thought to himself, "I cannot administer any sacrament to him in such a state of mind." What is meant where the Bible says that "he that is least in the kingdom of God" is greater than John the Baptist?

This has to do with position and privilege. John was the last of the Old Testament prophets. The Church is a New Testament mystery. John spoke of himself as "the friend of the Bridegroom." The Church is spoken of as "the Bride." Because of this closer relationship which the New Testament provides over the Old Testament, he who is least in the present dispensation is positionally higher than those of Old Testament times. "They without us could not be made perfect." It does not mean that we are greater in excellence of character than John was.

Please explain Matt. 23:35, where it says that God would require of that generation all the righteous blood that had been shed from Abel to Zacharias.

This shows that sin is cumulative according to rejected light. There was not nearly as much light when Abel was slain as when Zacharias was killed. By that time Israel had the law and the prophets and the promises of Messiah. In rejecting Christ as Messiah, the climax of light, they brought upon them all the guilt of the age. It is so again now. With the light of the gospel which has shone for many centuries rejected, the world is now ripe for greater judgment than any that has gone before.


