Psalm 65:4. "Blessed is the man whom thou choosest, and causest to approach unto thee, that he may dwell in thy courts: we shall be satisfied with the goodness of thy house, even of thy holy temple."
"Blessed is the man whom thou choosest," or, "Happy is the man whom thou choosest."

The word blessed in this verse is a plural word-hence this sentence might be translated, " O the blessednesses of the man whom Thou choosest!"

It speaks of the many blessings, and of the many happy experiences which come to the man whom God chooses. It is blessing upon blessing-a multitude of blessings.
"Blessed is the man whom thou choosest." The one whom God chooses -the one that is tried and proved, and then selected. That man is blessed indeed. It is our privilege to be God's selected ones. God chose Israel because of the oath He had sworn to faithful Abraham.

In Deut. 7:6-8 we read: "For thou art an holy people unto the Lord thy God: the Lord thy God hath chosen thee to be a special-margin, peculiar -people unto himself, above all people that are upon the face of the earth. The Lord did not set his love upon you, nor choose you, because ye were more in number than any people; for ye were the fewest of all people: but because the Lord loved you, and because he would keep the oath which he had sworn unto your fathers."

And in Neh. 9:7 the Levites blessed the Lord and said, "Thou art the Lord the God, who didst choose Abram
and foundest his heart faithful before thee, and madest a covenant with him."

In Psalm 106:23 we find the words, "Moses his chosen," and in Num. 17:5 the Lord spoke directly of Aaron, "And it shall come to pass, that the man's rod, whom I shall choose, shall blossom." And it was so. "Many are called, but few are chosen." Matt. 22:16. There are but few who enter into "God's council chamber," and to whom He can reveal His secrets.

In Gen. 18:17-19 we find the Lord saying, "Shall I hide from Abraham that thing which I do? . . . For I know him that he will command his children and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the Lord." "The secret of the Lord is with them that fear-reverence-him;
and he will shew them his covenant." Psalm 25:14.

When the Lord of lords and King of kings descends from heaven to make His final clash with the ungodly nations of the earth, we are told (Rev. 17:14) that "they that are with him are called, and chosen, and faithful."
What a precious word we have in John 15:16: "Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain: that whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it you."

Of Saul of Tarsus the Lord said, "He is a chosen vessel unto me." Are we God's chosen vessels? And let us not forget the Lord's own classification of His chosen ones, namely, the foolish, weak, base, despised nobodies. See 1 Cor. 1:27-29. Are we among that class?
"And causest to approach unto thee." Do we know anything about the causative power of the Spirit? Are we strangers to the compelling, overmastering love of Jesus? Paul said (2 Cor. 5:14), "The love of Christ constraineth us." Weymouth says "overmasters us." And Moffat translates it, "I am controlled by the love of Christ." Are we so controlled? Are we caused to do His will by the compelling pozer of His love?

Concerning Israel's restoration we find the Lord saying in Ezek. 36:27, "I will put my Spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes." In Jer. 18:2 the word came to the prophet saying, "Arise, and go down to the potter's house, and there I will cause thee to hear my words." Have you never been caused to hear the words of the Lord in spite of your innate sluggishness and alarming indifference?

There is power in God's. Wordwhen uttered by a Spirit-anointed man of God-"to wake the dead," and arouse us from our spiritual lethargy. "Causest to approach unto thee."
What bold and striking words Moses uttered to the rebels Korah, Dothan and Abiram (Num. 16:5), "Even tomorrow the Lord will shew who are his, and who is holy; and will cause him to come near unto him, even him whom he hath chosen will he cause to come near unto him."

John leaned on Jesus' bosom-nearest to His heart. He would have us nestle close to His heart of love.

The well known and deservedly popular hymn, "Nearer my God to Thee," fails to flash forth real New Testament truth. The words of Christ, "Abide in me, and I in you," strike a much deeper vein.
In John 14:20 Jesus said, "At that day ye shall know that I am in my Father, and ye in me, and I in you." I am sure that the poet expressed the cry of our heart when he wrote-
"'Tis there I would always abide, And never a moment depart:
Concealed in the cleft of Thy side, Eternally held in Thy heart."
"That he may dwell in thy courts."
These words speak of unbroken, uninterrupted communion with God. Dwell, sit down, reside, "seated in the heavenlies in Christ Jesus." God wills that should be our spiritual location. This morning the Lord spoke to me the words, "I want your undivided attention."
"Nothing between." The singing of that hymn always thrills me.
"Nothing between my soul and the Saviour, Naught of this world's delusive dreams: I have renounced all sinful pleasure,
Jesus is mine; there's nothing between."
We allow our communion with God to be so interrupted. Would that we would be able to say with the Psalmist (Psalm 73:25), "Whom have I in heaven but thee? and there is none upon earth that I desire beside thee." Let us not allow anything to come between us and God; and let us ever remember that it is "the little foxes that spoil the vines: for our vines have tender grapes." S. of S. 2:15.

A court is a place that is separated from the open country, and is usually fenced in, or has fixed boundaries of some kind. We are a separated, fencedin people. In S. of S. 4:12-15 the Bride is spoken of as "a garden inclosed a spring sluyt up, a fountain sealed
a fountain of gardens, a well of living waters, and streams from Lebanon." We are "God's husbandry" (margin, God's tilled land). 1 Cor. 3:9. We are fenced in from the rest of the land, and are God's special care. It is our privilege ,,to be God's "inner court worshippers." See Ezek. 44: 17, 18. Wonderful to be "shut in with God."

Result-"We shall be satisfied." Here the Psalmist changes from he to we. He wants us to know that he is sharing in this Feast.
"Satisfied with the goodness of thy house, even of thy holy temple." A case of double emphasis. Goodness in the highest and widest sense. God's best, and that is Himself.

We begin to lose sight of His bless-
ings, and we are occupied with Him. The language of our heart is-
> "Thy gifts alone cannot suffice, Unless Thyself be given;
> Thy presence makes my paradise And where Thou art is heaven."

The Psalmist said (Psalm 84:2), "My heart and my flesh crieth out for the living God." Satisfied-W ell-fedfilled to satisfaction.
"He satisfieth the longing soul." Psa. 107:9. When we are thus satisfied we never hunger or thirst for anything outside of God. See John 6:35. And yet as our capacity enlarges, we long for more and more of Him. By and by we shall be perfectly and eternally satisfied. Psalm $17: 15$, "I shall be satisfied, when I awake, with thy likeness." We shall be like Hin.

Glorified bodies-no fetters-eternally satisfied.

## Christ's Presence

There is a native evangelist in Portuguese territory in S. Africa named Soxi. He was persecuted terribly by witch doctors, but suddenly the witch doctors ceased to trouble him. The brother of the chief, who had been the chief agent in trying to bewitch Soxi, was questioned. "Mesene," he replied reverently. "It's the truth. Ngana Nzambi is the only God and our witch doctors have no power at all against Him. We have proved it and all our chiefs and all our witch doctors know it at last. My brother (Chief Xa-Muteba) sent a distance of four days' march to bring doctor 66, a witch doctor whose fame you all know and one who never fails. We paid him $\$ 90.00$ (Portuguese money) to come and he was to have a cow when Soxi was dead. He came with all the paraphernalia he had and when he had put the evil spell on the mission, all of us were afraid to come near it for it might kill any of us.

We waited. Nothing happened at all. Then one night we came, the medicine man and I, to see that he died that night in his bed. When he reached his house, imagine our horror to see a white Man walking back and forth past his door. Who could it be? Canzamba (the pastor) isn't white. Is it the Portuguese officer (the only white man within thirty miles) guard.ng the mission at night? Impossible!

We waited some time, then crept closer. It was the biggest white Man we have ever seen and He shone as one who carries a lantern. Back and forth He walked until we fled in terror to tell our people that it was no use. Since then, no one has dared speak a
word against any of the people of God. We cannot fight God and will never try it again. We made the doctor give us back our money since he was powerless and four days after he got home he took sick and died."

And Soxi? He is without question the most joyous Christian I have ever known and the simplicity of his faith puts me to shame.-J. C. Wengatz.

until all were filled. Then a basket of fragments-precious because they had known the touch of His divine power -remained for each disciple. Shall we not humbly ask God to enlarge our hearts that greater rivers may flow to weary, needy ones; enlarge our vision that we may be more keenly conscious of world-wide needs; enlarge our consecration that nothing of talent, time, or labor shall be withheld in our blessed ministry of succoring the weary?

There are so many ways we can comfort the weary. Love makes us very quick to see and understand how to help another. Isaiah has well expressed it in these words: "The Lord hath given me the tongue of the learned, that I should know how to speak a word in season to him that is weary: he wakeneth morning by morning, he wakeneth mine ear to hear as the learned." ## A Mattyr's Prayer

Prayer for our enemies, especially our murderers, has never been discovered outside the Bible, and those whom the Bible has changed; and it has been repeated down the ages. In 1546 when Wishart was led to the fire, with a rope about his neck and a chain of iron about his middle, he sank on his knees, saying, "O Thou Saviour of the world, have mercy on me. Father of heaven, I commend my spirit into Thy holy hands." His hangman fell upon his knees and said, "Sir, I pray you forgive me, for I am not guilty of your death." Wishart answered, "Come to me"; and he kissed his cheek, saying, "Lo, here is a token that I forgive thee. Do thy office." He was then hanged and burnt to powder.


## The Appointed Test

"He performeth the thing that is appointed for me: and many such things are with him." Job. 23:14.

Job is the speaker. He was going through a great trial of faith, but his faith was in his Maker, and he said, "When he hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold." He recognized the trial as one of divine appointment.

When the Psalmist confessed that he was poor and needy, he added, "Yet the Lord thinketh upon me." Psalm 40:17. The Lord thought on Job. He recognized that there was a need in his life. There was much dross that should be purged, and He used a sharp instrument in performing the thing that was appointed-a very sharp instrument. Pointing out the one who needed purification, He spoke to Satan concerning Job. There was first the removal of all things in which the human heart delights. Job was surely increased with goods and had need of nothing; but all the things in which his heart might trust were removed in one day, and Job was left alone with God. But his confidence in God was maintained.

The instrument God used was allowed to touch the very flesh of Job, to bring it low. Job was tempted sore, the tempter even using his wife to tempt him to curse God and die. But Job had a faith that could be tried by fire. He somehow sensed that the trial of his faith was much more precious than gold, and that it would be to the praise and glory of his God when he came forth purified.

God used the same instrument that he used on Job to sift Peter. Peter was poor and needy, but there was One thinking on him, One who prayed for him that his faith fail not. And Peter, after a most humbling experience, came forth enriched.

God used the same instrument in the trial of His Son. Satan entered into Judas to bring about the betrayal of the Son. He entered into the rulers to condemn Him to death, to scourge and to crucify Him. Christ on that bare cross of Calvary was stripped of everything. He was stripped even of His reputation, for He had a reputation with some of being a great prophet. He was stripped of His clothing.

But Peter, under the power and inspiration of the Spirit, showed that this
-Calvary-was according to the eternal purpose and foreknowledge of God. Calvary was in the counsel of God and came by divine appointment. The Son of God could say, as did Job, "He performeth the thing that is appointed for me." He endured the cross, despising the shame, for the joy that was set before Him, knowing that through Calvary many sons would be brought into glory.
"He performeth the thing that is appointed for me: and many such things are with him." You say, "Surely there are not many Calvaries?" Yes, there is a Calvary for every member of Christ's body. Said the Spirit-filled apostle, "I am crucified with Christ." Gal. 2:20. The Son of God said to His disciples, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily" (Luke 9:23), that on which he is to be crucified daily. And each son who learns to suffer with his Lord can say, "He performeth the thing that is appointed for me: and many such things -that crucify the flesh, that bring it down to death-are with him."

It was a very humbling process for Job. It brought him to self-abhorrence, and deep repentance for all the failings of his frail flesh. He was especially convicted of the sins of his tongue, and said, "I will lay mine hand upon my mouth." Job $40: 4$. He was to come forth from the fiery trial with a meek and quiet spirit, swift to hear and slow to speak. After the trial God gave him twice as much as he had before.


There is the stripping, the breaking down, but afterwards a glorious enlargement, enlargement with eternal blessings. The Son of God was brought low, but has been exalted to the highest. In due time He will exalt those who have been crucified with Him, who have been purged, purified and made white, to share with Him His throne. They shall reign with Him.

Do not resent the trials, the purgings, the purifications, and the crucifixions. God means them all unto good. In them all say with Job, "He performeth the thing that is appointed for me."-S. H. F.

Here is the secret of divine all sufficiency, to come to the end of everything in ourselves and in our circumstances. When we reach this place, we will stop asking sympathy because of our hard situation or bad treatment, for we will recognize these things as the very conditions of our blessing, and we will turn from them to God and find in them a claim upon Him."

At Valley Forge is a large statue of Anthony Wayne, erected to perpetuate his memory as a reward to his heroism and faithfulness to his nation when it was laboring for sovereign independence. Let us meditate on the value, perpetuation, and reward of right relationship to the sovereign Kingdom of God and of heroic Christianity.

Religion alone will not save, for it is possible to be very religious and at the same time to be very sinful. Man is not saved through a system, but by personal faith in the Saviour. The primary purpose of the Gospel is not to build up a system of religion, or a methodical order of worship, but to save the people from their sins. Never was the Christian church more prosperous in spiritual blessing and service than in its beginning when its churches were but the simple homes of believers and its cathedrals the open spaces of nature, lighted by the stars of heaven, where the believers gathered to worship God in spirit and in truth.

Salvation brings assurance that one's sins are gone. "Blessed are they whose iniquities are forgiven, and whose sins are covered. Blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not impute sins." The purpose of salvation is to blot out the past, to cleanse the heart, to restore man to fellowship with God. He who is saved by faith in the atonement of Christ through surrender of his life to God has no fears for the future. There is therefore "now no condemnation." Before him are no dark and chilly waters of death through which he must pass. He believes that the same Saviour who suffered at Calvary will welcome him and, at the judgment seat of Christ, when rewards will be bestowed, his peace is assured. He is ready to meet God.
Too many however look upon salvation only as a means of escape from being lost. Ought we not to think of the rewards which await loving obedience and faithful service? Probably the effort put forth to get dying people to accept Christ lest they be lost has caused many to fail to see the richness that may be ours in Christ Jesus. Heaven to some people is little more than deliverance from hell. In eternity there will be differences of position and blessing as definitely as there now are on the earth. "There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars, for one star differeth from another star in glory.

So also is the resurrection of the dead." The righteous will then stand in their places each according to his rank. All the redeemed will be radiant, but not all will shine with equal splendor. Some will be there without any reward having built here only "wood, hay, and stubble," the fruit of their unwise toil having been burned up. Rewards are the fruit of wise and faithful service.

Another good letter has come to us from one of our most remote fields, the Burma border, written by Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Morrison. We are glad to share with our readers a few paragraphs telling of the marvelous progress the gospel is making in this new territory among the Lisu people. They write:
"We have now been seven months in the Salwin since our return from furlough, and it is needless to say we are happy to be back again. The work increased during our absence and now we can see quite a change. God's abiding presence has been with His people here through some remarkable experiences. Now the villages are opening up and people's hearts are responding to the gospel.
"There is a community of Lisu people far up in the fertile part of the mountains here, consisting of three villages not far apart and of some three hundred homes. We have prayed for these villages for several years and have marveled that they could hold off so long and not accept the gospel message, but this year they have sent several times for workers and want us to start a work there. The northern end of the valley is also sending in word for us to keep workers in that part steadily this year, and they want us to open a permanent station among them.

## Many Following On

"Since returning this time we have baptized 147 in water, and now again quite a number are ready to follow the Lord in this His blessed command to all who repent and believe in Him. As we look back over the history of the Lisu work (only seven years old in the Salwin Valley) we are amazed at how the power of the gospel has changed the hearts and lives of the Lisu toward their home, fellowmen, and spiritual things. As we go into their homes we find no chicken feathers, egg shells and branches of trees or other wooden devices that they formerly used in devil worship, no beer pots or odor of brewing beer. Now their houses are swept clean (after Lisu fashion) and here and there we see a simple little book shelf with a hymn book and a neatly bound book of the four Gospels and Acts, and sometimes wooden beds along the wall.
"On Sunday they prepare early to gather at the little chapel they have built themselves in their village. One usually stays behind to watch the house while the rest go to

ence and power manifested during the special meetings held here at P'u Chi, Shantung. We went forward in faith and prepared to open the meetings, although we should not have dared to plan for them in the natural, as conditions are very unsettled in these parts. God encouraged us and met us every step of the way. The people began coming in the first day and we had over one hundred with us. The Lord was with them on the road and no one was molested. Twenty-six were baptized in water and one in the Holy Spirit, while we were all edified and strengthened in God."

## STREAMS IN THE PERUVIAN DESERT

## By H. C. Ball

Peru is different from any other Latin American country we have ever visited. Even before landing in Peru we realized we were approaching a land peculiar in some respects, for posted in our ship was a warning that in Peru only one brand of matches was lawful-the "Llama brand." After landing we discovered that there is a monopoly on salt also, all the salt used being Peruvian. In the northern part of the Republic we passed the great salt flats, with their beautiful mounds of salt resembling tall inverted ice cream cones.

The entire coast is one vast desert except where a river flows down from the Andes or water has been found, converting the desert into a beautiful garden. Several times we traversed these deserts in automobiles. At times our driver would strike out madly over the wide sand beds and we would wonder if he would not get lost in the multitude of tracks going every direction. At one time we were stuck in the sand for over an hour. Again between Chimbote and Trujillo, while using the beach at low tide as a highway, a high wave struck us and only by quick work were we able to rescue the car. Another night we spent sleeping on the floor of a truck with about twelve other passengers. with the cold sea breeze fanning us to add to our discomfort.
The people are generally the same as those found in all Latin American countries. The Roman Catholic Church is the State church. Peru, I believe, is the last of the countries of the western hemisphere to tolerate this union. We are surprised to not find more fanaticism, and to observe that Peru is remarkably free from extreme Romanism as we have found it in some other Latin lands. The spiritual needs of the people cannot be expressed, for they have been kept in spiritual darkness for centuries. The
warm reception we received everywhere, by sinners as well as the saints, seemed to reveal to us that the land is truly ripe for the gospel of the living Christ.
After visiting the churches around Lima -Callao, Miraflores and Lima-we went to Huancayo where the Barkers have carried on missionary activities for the past twelve years. A ten days' meeting there seemed to revive the brethren and men came to the services who had never come before. One Jewish merchant who came for the first time contributed ten soles toward our expenses as his expression of appreciation. A sole is a little more than our quarter.
It was our privilege to be in Chimbote for a conference the last four days in July. Mrs. Ball and I were honored by being made the principal speakers. The brethren of Chimbote were just finishing their chapel -the first Protestant church building in all the Department (State) of Ancash. It is built of adobe, nicely whitewashed inside and with a beautiful white front. The Lord honored His Word from the beginning and besides many saved, eleven were baptized with the Holy Spirit. Brothers Jeter and Miranda baptized eleven precious believers in water while some fifty saints stood on the banks of the little desert stream and sang praises to God in Spanish.
Our dear missionaries and native brethren have many hindrances to overcome to bring the message of salvation to the needy multitudes, such as vast, sandy deserts, cold and bleak weather in winter and terrific heat in summer. High trails must be crossed on mule back over the bleak Andes, almost void of trees and vegetation on the western slopes, while the eastern slopes abound in places, in malaria-infested jungles. In the, interior sections they still run the risk of losing their lives because of the powerful sway of the Roman priests. Yet, in spite of it all, the membership in our Assembly of God churches and outstations must run to eight hundred or more and a real work of God's marvelous grace is going on. The blessed Spirit of God is converting dreary places of Peru's spiritual desert into living valleys, as streams in a dry and thirsty land.

## FIRST EVANGELICAL CHURCH IN ANCASH, PERU, DEDICATED

Hugh P. Jeter writes from Chimbote, Peru: "For months we have looked forward to the time when we could dedicate the first evangelistic church in the Department of Ancash to the service of the Lord. At times the prospects were not very bright, still we did not want to appeal to the homeland for aid, wanting to have a church built by the native brethren with their own means. Finally this dream has become a reality.
"We arranged to have special meetings and sent out the invitations to the missionaries and brethren in Ancash and La Libertad. The time was appropriate for there were about four legal holidays in a row and people could get away from

their work to come. Some came from the mountains, some from Trujillo, some from the South, and a truck load from the sugar plantation of San Jacinto. What a time of rejoicing we had! The Lord favored us with the visit of Brother and Sister H. C. Ball, who had arranged their trip to Peru to be with us at that time. The Lord stirred our hearts again and again as we listened to their Spirit-filled messages.
"We had a baptismal service when eleven believers followed their Lord in water baptism. That night Brother Ball gave a most helpful message upon receiving Salvation and the Baptism with the Holy Spirit. We then gathered in the prayer room and after a short time the blessing of the Lord began to fall in a most remarkable way. We were there in the presence of the Lord until three o'clock in the morning. During that time nine believers received the fullness of the Holy Spirit Baptism, and the next day two or three others were filled as on the day of Pentecost.
"We thank God for this manifestation and earnestly pray that this will be the beginning of the long-sought revival we so much need. About fifteen of our believers at San Jacinto have received the Holy


Spirit, and since the fellowship meeting some have also been filled in Nepena where the San Jacinto people go for services. Please pray for this group in San Jacinto. It is the only congregation we have in Peru, to my knowledge, which supports their own pastor entirely, so that he can give his full time to the Lord's work. They also take a very active interest in the evangelization of the surrounding territory."

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Mrs. Mary Janz, the writer of this testimony, was a member of the Bethel Temple in Los Angeles. The pastor of this assembly, Brother Louis Turnbull, assures us of her truth and integrity. About three months ago Mother Janz went to be with her Lord whom she loved and served so well. Although she was over ninety years of age she kept active in her ministry up to the last few weeks of her life. Her life story, given below, is truly remarkable.

I was born in Russia a little over ninety years ago. Great hardship came through the German-Russian war, so we moved to Germany when I was small. I was baptized and raised a Roman Catholic. Father was a drunkard, and one day he took a hammer and hit me and my brothers and sisters, killing two of my brothers. Very soon my poor mother died, heartbroken, only thirty-three years old. Then I was raised by my uncle. Once I forgot to pray for my dead father and my uncle whipped and kicked me, so I crawled under a pile of logs and stayed there three days.
When I was eighteen I married Mr. Janz. He was a Lutheran but our wedding was in the Catholic Church. We raised five children, two dying there in Germany. In 1880 we sailed to America, and my baby boy died at sea. We came to Dubuque, Iowa, where we lived fifteen years, raising seven more children. One girl died of dropsy, and my fifteen-year-old son was accidentally shot. Later my year-old baby died, and then a seven-year-old son died too. It was just one trouble after another, and I said, "What have I done, $O$ God, that You punish me so?"

One day I caught poison ivy when berrypicking. My leg was sore with it a long time. We were penniless in Iowa but when we moved to Portland, Oregon, I kept boarders and my husband worked, so we became more prosperous. We opened a restaurant and saloon. My poisoned leg got worse till it was black as coal.

A Protestant woman came and wanted to pray for me. I insulted her and said my religion was better than her prayers. Nevertheless she came back again, and as I became worse I finally told her to pray if she wanted to. At last the pain was unbearable, and the doctor said I must die. They took me to the hospital and everyone was sorrowful.

The doctors wanted to amputate my poisoned leg. However God seemed to say, "Keep your leg; you are going to use it." So I asked that my leg be treated instead, and the doctors then poulticed it taking all the flesh off the bone. This made me easier, but next morning the same pain came back. My face, hands and leg became black and bloated up. Afraid that my poison might spread among the other patients, they took me to the pesthouse. I was laid in a dark
third-story room, all my face covered with a rag except my mouth. They even plugged the keyhole, and covered my door with a sheet wet with carbolic acid. Three doctors held a council and declared I could only live twenty-four hours.

But my blessed Saviour was near me, although I did not know Him then. Oh, how I love Him today! A priest came to administer the last communion, and he sprinkled me with holy water, but that did not help me any. The Lord sent some Salvation Army folk along the road below and I heard them sing, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul." Then they prayed for the unsaved souls, and that touched my heart. I commenced to talk to my Saviour. "My Jesus! My Jesus! Help me!"

I was slipping away. I could no longer move my limbs, and I felt a touch coming on my heart like a stroke. But I called again, "Jesus, help! Forgive me my sins." And then I got rest-sweet rest-and fell asleep. That was on a Friday in July, 1908. Next morning I awoke refreshed and I heard a voice saying, "Do you believe in Jesus? I am He. Rise up and walk. Take no pills or medicine. Believe! Don't eat the soup they give you. Don't stay herego home." So I sat up in bed. The room was dark. Then the Lord said, "Take that rag off your face." I did, and there came a wind that fanned all the swelling out of my face. I got out of bed, raised the window shades and saw the world outside. My heart was filled with love, and I sat on a chair praising and praising my Saviour as I wept for joy. I felt no pain, no itching, but I was cold. Jesus said, "Go to the closet and find a dress," and so I did.

When the nurse came to see if I were dead, and found me on a chair glorifying God, she was frightened. They told the doctor and he sent up medicine and pills. But I said, "No, God doesn't want me to take any medicine or pills. I am healed." The mother came and asked, "Who was here and helped you into that dress?" I said it was Jesus. She sent for the doctor, who felt my pulse and looked at my tongue, then asked, "Who was here and raised you up? Yesterday you were dying, and today you are well." I said, "Jesus raised me up." With that he grew angry and said I was crazy.

After that some soup was brought to me. A voice said, "Eat it," but Jesus reminded me not to. "I won't eat the soup," I said, "but tell me, Jesus, what shall I eat? I'm hungry." The Lord said, "Go into the hall and drink water," so I did. Next day I walked downstairs. I phoned to my people, but they said they had the casket ready and did not believe it was my voice. So they did not come after me, and next day the mother said I should give an offering to the mother of Jesus for my healing. I went to the chapel, but instead I thanked my
blessed Jesus for healing me and saving my soul.
I then asked Him how I could get away from the Catholic pesthouse, and He told me to phone the lady who had wanted to pray for me. So I phoned, first asking her forgiveness, and she came and got me out. She took me directly to their mission and led me to the altar. But before they could lay on hands and pray for me I was shouting, "Glory to God. Jesus healed me of blood poisoning and saved me from all sin. I love Him!"
The Lord showed me that I should not worship images, nor kiss the wood and stone, but worship only the living Christ. "Woe unto him that saith to the wood, Awake; to the dumb stone, Arise, it shall teach!" Habakkuk 2:19. When I went home my husiband was greatly surprised to see me alive. At first he welcomed me, but when he saw me so happy and heard me shouting, "Glory!" he declared, "Woman, you are possessed with the devil." I went into my room and lay down. I remembered what they preached about at the mission, so I prayed, "Jesus, if You have something more for me, give it to me." And there came a big light in which I saw Jesus, and He said, "You're going to see still greater things, and be My witness. Don't be afraid of man. Come and follow Me."

One night my husband said, "If you don't let that religion go I'll kill you." I said. "Do what you will, I must follow God for this is of Him." But he denied it, saying, "You got the devil from the 'Holy Rollers.'. Then he packed up and left me, telling all the children to oppose me because I had left the Roman Catholic Church. The whole night I prayed to my Saviour for help, as I was penniless and lonely. He told me to open the Bible at Micah 4:9, and so I read, "Now why dost thou cry out aloud? Is there no King in thee? Is thy Counsellor perished?" The next night the Lord gave me a vision revealing my life work, and soon He sent me to witness for Him and to pray for the sick. He even took me over to Germany to witness to my sister, and He has given me the joy of seeing many souls saved and many sick bodies healed.

The first miracle Jesus did through me was to heal my granddaughter of black diphtheria. The city doctor sent her home, but I ancinted her with oil in the name of the Lord, laid hands on her, and prayed. Next morning the doctor came and said, "Where is the girl I sent home?" I pointed to her, but he beheld her red cheeks and at first would not believe it was the same girl.

One day I visited a distant city. I took my oil, my Bible, and some tracts and went from door to door. In one house were three brothers, one of whom had been lying sick for years. I anointed him and prayed, and he got out of bed and walked. The other
two then cried to God for mercy. In another house I found a blind girl, and Jesus touched her eyes so that she could see. Next day I again went to the sick and sinful ones, praying with them and singing with them all day long. At least four were saved in that place, and I could not count how many were healed.
When I returned to Portland I found my son had come home with smallpox. All he could say was, "Mother, help." At once I anointed him with oil and called on God. The devil had to flee. It was the first time my son had showed any faith in prayer. Next morning it seemed that smallpox was breaking out, but I prayed again and it left. When his friends came to see him they marveled at his recovery. He tried to smoke with them as usual, but the tobacco appetite had left and cigarettes tasted queer. He was a saved boy.
About a year after I was saved the Lord definitely sent me back to Iowa where I had first lived upon coming to America. My oldest daughter had been in the insane asylum there for two years. When I arrived she was being held down with straps. When the spell was over and I was allowed to see her, she was horrible-looking and she fought me. But three times I laid hands on her in Jesus' name and commanded the devil to leave. She fell on the floor screaming, and after ten minutes she was saved and in her right mind. The nurse was saved too. My daughter now has no more such spells.
The Lord Jesus said to me in 1913, "Go and tell your sister in Germany what I have done for you." In two years I had saved up three hundred dollars from the offerings of those who had been healed and saved, so I set out alone from New York. The people on board were wicked and as I witnessed for the Lord I met opposition. But I laid hands on some who were seasick and prayed. One woman and one man were healed and saved and then I was not so lonely. One young sailor on board named Hans said he had been a drunkard for fifteen years. He asked me to pray for him, so I did, laying hands on him. I commanded the devil to leave and asked Jesus to save his soul. Hans fell down under God's power, then began crying for mercy. Next morning he came on deck sober, a saved man. He refused to drink any more beer, but instead he read the Testament I gave him.

When I reached Germany I found my sister sick, suffering and poor. I told her the Lord Jesus had sent me to get her saved and healed. She said, "The Catholic priest comes every week, and he told me to drink sharp liquor to kill the germs." But I got them to throw away all the images and holy water, then they were both healed and saved, and they moved to a place near a Pentecostal Mission.

I went to Hamburg and was asked to speak at the Free Methodist Church. A woman came in with blood and sores on her face. They thought it was cancer, but I said, "Take that woman away, she has leprosy." They withstood me at first, as she happened to be the preacher's wife. The Lord told me to tell her to confess her sins. The second day she was healed, and shout-
ed, "Jesus washed my sins away," Another miracle happened in that Church when I anointed and prayed for a child who had been crippled two years. First I asked its mother to confess her sins. Then I put the child on the floor and told him to walk in Jesus' name. He immediately walked, and there was great rejoicing.
I went on to Berlin, and a woman there begged me to heal her only son. I said, "I can't do a thing; Jesus is the Healer." She took me home for dinner, and I said she must burn her spiritistic books. I also told her to give Jesus her heart. Then we went to the town where her boy lived He was possessed with a demon, and tore off all his clothes. But I looked to God for power, then commanded the devil to leave. God showed me the boy had lived
in adultery. Suddenly the entire building was shaken. The boy rose up and walked.
As the Great War was raging, a United States official came to take all Americans back home. My papers showed I was a citizen and Christian worker, so he gave me forty pounds and a free passage to England. When I reached London I was despised, being a German, but I witnessed for the Lord. The fourth day at sea our ship was captured by German submarines. I went on deck with my Bible and said to the submarine sailors in their own language: "I bind you devils there. If you destroy this boat, you'll be the first one to go to the bottom." As they stood on their deck, I held my hands up against them. They replied that I must be a hypnotist for they (Continued on Page Eleven)

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## A LAST-MINUTE REPRIEVE

I had long wished to be the bearer of life to some condemned cell. My wish was granted. On Tuesday a poor sentenced criminal was to be hanged. But on the Monday, all unexpectedly, I was summoned to take him his life. I had succeeded in obtaining a reprieve-a paper signed by Queen Victoria giving him back his forfeited life

I dreamt not of delay in delivering it Delay appeared cruel. Yet I asked myself, "How can I tell him? The shock will kill him! But he is already in the bitterness of death. He is dead in law. I must do my duty."
I stood before the murderer in his cell. His face was wan; his knees were feeble; his vacant eyes looked as if, with dry hot grief, they had burned down into their sockets. Melancholy picture! She who owned him as her husband had just been carried out, in a dead faint; the expectant orphans had likewise paid him a last farewell.

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"My poor man, can you read?" "Yes," was the reply. But fearing to break the news too suddenly, I added, "Would you like your life?" "Sir," he responded, "do not trifle with me." "Is life not sweet? Would you not like me to procu:e your life?" I said. "It is no use; I'm justly condemned." "But the Queen could give back your life," I persisted.
He looked inquiringly at me. "Can you read this?" I asked. Eagerly he read the paper. It was too much for him. He dropped down at my feet as though dead.
Reviving after a time he asked, "Sir, who sent me this?" "The Queen sent it." "Why did the Queen send it to me?" "I cannot say. It was grace in her. It pleased her to do it." "What have I ever done to the Queen?" "Nothing but break her laws."
Tears filled his eyes. "Could I see the Queen?" "What for?" "If I may, why, I would fall at her feet, and this life I'd place at her service. If I had a thousand lives they are not mine, but hers."
How could he love the Queen? Was he not, on the morrow, to be hung by her laws? There was room enough for misery, fear and dread, but none in the nature of things for love, it would seem. If his reprieve depended on his love for his sovereign, surely he would have perished. But since his forgiveness rested only upon the sovereign's love and grace, and his acceptance, liberty was his, and the love that swept into his soul could not be resisted.
Suppose I had said, "My poor man, you must reform and turn over a new leaf." Or even, "You must appeal in deep repentance for the Queen's forgiveness." Why, on the morrow he was to die. None of those outward moral amendments, nor inward exercises of soul, could ward off the deathpenalty the law demanded. He must be hung by lazw, unless saved by grace.
All men were guilty before God and were under sentence to die, but Christ took that sentence. He died in your stead. It is the good pleasure of God to grant a pardon to all who will accept it. Not because any man was worthy, but because of His sovereign grace, He has written, "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool." Isa. 1:18. God waits to be merciful since Christ has died to make your salvation possible.
Do you believe this gospel of the grace of God? Do you believe that Christ died that you, a condemned sinner, might be forgiven? If you do, you are saved, and saved now. Not a moment need intervene between the proclamation and life! If you are not saved as yet, then embrace God's promise today. "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life." John $3: 36$. Do not delay; the opportunity may pass. "Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation." 2 Cor. 6:2.-J. Denham Smith.

not move hand or foot. Then I told our Captain to proceed at top speed. We were soon safe, with the enemy far behind. When I reached New York some Christian ladies bathed and fed me, saying, "Mother, you saved that ship. God bless you." The third day I was there they said that the same ship had been sunk on its return to England.
I went to Chicago and one day a Jewish brother asked me to speak for him the following Sunday. I promised to do so. But that Thursday I fell downstairs, breaking several ribs and becoming unconscious. My friends anointed me with oil and prayed, but wanted a doctor. I said, "No, Jesus is my Doctor." They thought I would die, but I was only worried about speaking to the Jews, so I asked Jesus to help me keep my promise to them. Sunday morning came, and I ate for the first time in three days. Then the Lord gave me a vision. Jesus showed me that it meant a Jewish person would be saved. So I got dressed, then went downstairs alone, singing, "I'll go where Jesus' Blood can heal." They did not want me to venture out, but I got on a car and reached the Jewish meeting. A Jew with a long beard went to the altar. I prayed for him and he was saved.
At one time I moved into a new neighborhood, and the first day a Jewish woman asked me for prayer; now she believes in Jesus as her Messiah. The next day a German man called and I helped him with some food and money, took him to the German Mission, and he was saved. Later I took sick with the flu, but I stayed in my room with God. I told Jesus to either heal me or take me home. The third day I could not breathe, and the mirror showed my tongue was black as liver. Shortly afterwards blood flowed out of my throat and my nose. But I called on the Lord again, and His mighty power fell once more and I was healed. Now I am very happy in

Jesus, and love to pray for all the sick more than ten thousand criminals, and among ones that He sends to me. I praise Him for the way He uses me, and I love Him.

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Sowing and Reaping
Lesson for October 30. Lesson Text: Galatians 6.
"Be not deceived, God is not mocked, for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Golden Text).
The Laze of God. "Does not God allow some to be exceptions to that rule? Is it applicable to the Christian as well as the sinner?" This was the question a young woman recently asked the writer, about the Golden Text. There are no exceptions. Whether I wear the ermine of the king, or the blue denim overalls of the peasant, if I sow peas I'll reap peas. If I wear the robes of priesthood, the dark cloth of the ministry, or the white robes of righteousness, if I sow corn I'll reap corn, even as will the farmer, clad in his brown and dirty overalls.
Jacob's Sowing and Reaping. Jacob of old, deceived his dying father, by substituting false clothing, and thus stole his brother's birthright. Many years later, long after his' conversion (Gen. 32:30), Jacob reaped the harvest of that sowing. His sons, in turn, come to him, deceiving him with clothing, as he had done his old father. "See father, this bloody garment, is it not Joseph's coat of many colors. A wild beast has evidently killed him." And, not detecting the deception, Jacob's heart was rent with sorrow. Yes, whatsoever a man soweth, though he sows it when he is "Jacob," the crooked stick, he will reap it, even though his name has been changed to "Israel," the converted prince of God. God forgives us the guilt of our $\sin$. He lifts the penalty of our $\sin$, eternal punishment,
when we repent and come to him; but many of the physical consequences of our evil actions will later on torment us as sure as the boomerang returns to the thrower.
The Grace of God. Do I hear some one protesting, "Does this not bring to naught the grace of God?" Indeed it does not. Rather it is God's way of preserving, defending His grace from presumptuous sins and sinners, who might otherwise say, "I'm now under grace," and thus use the cloak of grace, to cover their licentiousness.

Lust and Murder. David, of old, was guilty of lust, and of dethroning from Bathsheba's heart, the rightful sovereign, Uriah. David stopped not at murder to attain his end. Although he repented (Psalm 51) and although God freely forgave him, nevertheless God warned him that the consequences of his rash act would

follow him through life. His children, guilty of lust, committed murder as the result. His own child, Absalom, undertook to dethrone his father David, from the throne of Judah. "Whatsoever, a man soweth (even God's Davids), that must he also reap."
The Death Penalty. "A great surgeon stood before his class to perform an operation. With strong gentle hands, he did his part of the work well, and then, turning to his pupils, he said: 'Two years ago, a simple operation might have saved this man. Six years ago, the abstaining

God, this rule works positively as well as negatively. If we sow love, we shall reap love. If we sow faith in others, we shall reap faith. If we sow confidence, we shall reap confidence. "Whatsoever a man soweth-" In the ninth of Acts we read of the lack of confidence which the Apostles at Jerusalem had in Paul. And none could blame them, humanly speaking. They found it impossible to believe that he who once persecuted the Church was now a follower of Christ. So they gave him the cold shoulder. But Barnabas, manifesting faith and confidence in him, took him and insisted that the Apostles give Paul a hearing. No more is heard about Paul until we come to the eleventh of Acts. Some seven or eight years have elapsed since his conversion. Why has he not been preaching? He seems to have felt keenly the lack of confidence, the indifference displayed toward him, by the folk at Jerusalem, and he has been back in Tarsus, apparently inactive. For Barnabas, upon being given a church (Acts 11), immediately goes to Tarsus, seeks out Paul, insists on his going with him to Antioch and sharing the ministry with him there. Barnabas' confidence in Paul begat confidence in turn, and Paul began his glorious Apostolic ministry to the Gentiles. What might have been the outcome, if there had not been a Barnabas to sow faith and confidence, in Paul's wounded spirit? We see him doing the same thing for John Mark, when Paul refuses to take him on the second missionary journey. Acts 15:36-41. Mark had failed, Paul had repudiated him, but Barnabas took the young man, and sowed faith and confidence in him. He became Peter's helper at Rome (1 Peter 5:13), he gave us the glorious Gospel of Mark, and Paul, in his dire extremity, said of this same Mark, "Take Mark, and bring him with thee for he is profitable to me for the ministry." 2 Tim. 4:11.-Harry J. "AN EPISTLE TO THE JEWS"
Such is the title of an article written by John Cournos, a Jewish scholar, for Atlantic Monthly. The following are some excerpts:
"Christ has sometimes been called the supreme romantic. I should call Him the supreme realist. That the Jews should have rejected Him, even as has the rest of humanity, proves nothing except the truth of the words, 'Ye stiffnecked, and uncircumcised in heart and ears, ye do always resist the, Holy Ghost: as your fathers did, so do ye.
"It has been one of those preposterous, even ironic, mistakes of history that the Jews, having achieved the apex of their peculiar culture in Christ, should then have rejected Him; it is their supreme tragedy that, having produced Christ, they should have failed of the final effort to incarnate Him in life.
"They-the rabbis-have been saying nice things about Christ from their own and Christian pulpits, and some of them doubtless have patted themselves on the back for this token of their liberal opinion. But that is not enough. The only reasonable and logical thing they can do is to establish the most perfect Jew and the most perfect man among the fully acknowledged hierarchy of their Prophets, their 'Sons of God.' Why not acknowledge Him together with these others? The rabbis should frankly and openly affirm: 'Christ is our own, our very own, flesh of our flesh, and bone of our bone, and He came not to destroy the law, or the prophets to fulfil.' He is our Prophet, our greatest prophet, the keystone of our ultimate faith. We will answer the challenge of Hitler's

Mein Kampf by making known Christ's struggle to establish a free spiritual kingdom on earth.'
"Intelligent Jews to whom I have spoken of my mad notion have, contrary to my expectations, agreed to the logic of the proposal I have outlined. And I recall the words spoken to me by a living world-famous Jewish novelist: 'We Jews must come to terms with Christianity. It is the only way out for us.'." As the times of the Gentiles draw to their close we may expect serious consideration on the part of Jews of the question, "What think e of Christ?"

## FACES TOWARD ZION

The growth of anti-Semitic forces in Roumania threatens the expulsion of the Jews. Already wealthy Jews have fled the country. These troubles are turning Jewish faces toward Palestine. As one Jewish paper says, "There is one clear lesson to be drawn from the now aggravated predicament of the Roumanian Jews, which is that the need for an intensive outlet in Palestine has become thereby the more imperative, as well as urgent. thus knocking the bottom out of the case for a diminutive Jewish State.'

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## THE SUPPLIER OF NEEDS

In the exalted and holy calling of bringing a family into this world, and then training, fitting, and leading them into the world to come, a privilige enjoyed by every father, there are many trials and testings. Charles Cowman says: "God permits temptations because they do for us what the storms do for the oak-they root us; and what the fire does for the paintings on the porcelain-it makes them permanent."

In these times the testings may have to do with money. A father gathering day after day with the mother and the children at the Family Altar, may be without work, and the money so carefully laid by for the "rainy day" may be growing less and less. Possibly he sees that in days, it may be in hours, all will have been spent, and want will be staring them in the face. Give yourself anew and completely to God with all you have; explain what you are doing and ask the others to do the same. assuring them that God will not fail you.
Then ask for what you must have at once, and praise God for sending it. When the thing comes, as come it will and must, if it is necessary for your welfare, the children will have learned a priceless lesson, and your influence over them for good will have been greatly strengthened. ## RED RECRUITING

In 1919 the Moslem authorities were offered any sum within reason by the Jews for the courtyard under the Wailing Wall, but they refused. A correspondent wrote some years ago from Jerusalem, "The Government made a threat that if the Mufti allowed the Moslems to go out of the Mosque of Omar, and to cause a breach of the peace, they would send aeroplanes to bomb and blow up the Mosque." Dr. A. E. Jones, president of the Melbourne Hebrew Congregation, laid the foundation stone of a new synagogue with these words: "The Holy Land has again become the home of our race, and in a little while, when the Mandate shall
have faded away, we will again become a nation, and our great Temple again will be built in its splendor as of old."

SOWING AND REAPING
Commenting on Mussolini's order for the expulsion of the Jews the London Times says, "Throughout the history of modern Europe expulsions of this kind have invariably recoiled upon the countries which have decreed them."
Comments another daily: "One of the oldest truths about the human spirit is that when a man hates his neighbor he is brewing a poison to destroy himself. But, like all great truths, it has to be learned afresh out of the bitter experiences of each new generation."

MOVE ON!
Again the Wandering Jew hears the harsh command. Writes Jewish Missionary Magasine: "The government is determined to free Vienna of all Jews as quickly as possible. On June 30 , amidst tragic scenes, the proprietors of nearly ten thousand Jewish firms announced the dismissal of thirty thousand Jewish employees on orders from Nazi organizations."

Mr. John Wylie, teacher of the Men's Bible Class in the Church at Aquebogue, L. I., told a writer in the Christian Readers' Digest the following: "Just recently I saw my niece sitting in the waiting room of the Long Island R. R. at the Pennsylvania station in New York, and went across to speak to her. I noticed a strange expression on her face; and when I spoke she didn't answer. I laid my hand on her shoulder, and then shook her, but there was no reaction. She was dead to the world, so I picked her up and carried her out. Come to find out, she had been shot with a hypodermic, right in that waiting room, evidently by a White Slaver."

A plan to remove one thousand Jewish school children from Austria, Germany, and Poland, and settle them in Palestine by September 30, was announced in May by Hadassah, the Women's Zionist organization of America.
