She states that one night a fellow worker brought to her a trouble about a younger worker who somehow seemed to be missing the way of love. This led to a wakeful night of questioning, "Lord, have I failed this worker in any way?" Then senience by sentence came the "If's" quoted in the second part of the article.

Lest some true follower should come under a sense of condemnation by the words "then I know nothing," the writer desires to make it clear that the sense in which these words were given was that, penetrated, melted, and broken by a vision of Calvary, we are made to realize that so far we know nothing, or less than nothing of that fathomless love of Calvary's Lamb. Paul's cry was, "That I may know Him (Christ)!" He already knew Him in measure, but desired to know Him in His infinite fullness.

But read the article through to the end. While prepared for those called to be under-shepherds we believe this article contains a needed word for many a Saint.

## PART I

Sometimes it is given to us to look up through the blue air and realize the love of God. And yet, after all, how little we see! "That ye may be able to comprehend what is the breadth and length and depth and height and to know the love of Christ which passeth knozuledge"- the words are too great for us. What do we comprehend? what do we know? Confounded and abased, we enter into the Rock and hide us in the dust before the glory of the
majesty of love-the love whose symbol is the Cross.
question pierces then: "What do I know of Calvary love?"

## PART II

If I belittle those whom I am called to serve, talk of their weak points in contrast perhaps with what I think of as my strong points ; if I adopt a superior attitude, forgetting "Who made thee to differ? and what hast thou that thou hast not received?" then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If I can easily discuss the shortcomings and sins of any; if I can speak in a casual way even of a child's misdoings, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If I find myself half-carelessly taking lapses for granted, "Oh, that's what they always do," "Oh, of course she talks like that, he acts like that," then I know nothing of Calvary love.

If I can write an unkind letter, speak an unkind word, think an unkind thought without grief and shame, then I know nothing of Calvary love.

If, in dealing with one who does not respond, I weary of the strain, and slip from under the burden, then I know nothing of Calvary love.

If I am perturbed by the reproach and misunderstanding that may follow action taken for the good of souls for whom I must give account; if I cannot commit the matter and go on in peace and in silence, remembering Gethsemane and the Cross, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If my attitude be one of fear, not faith, about one who has disappointed me, and I say, "Just what I expected," if a fall occurs, then I know nothing of Calvary love.


If I cast up a confessed, repented and forsaken sin against another, and allow my remembrance of that sin to color my thinking and feed my suspicions, then I know nothing of Calvary love.

If I have not the patience of my Saviour with souls who grow slowly; if I know little of travail (a sharp and painful thing) till Christ be fully formed in them, then I know nothing of Calvary love.

- If I cannot keep silence over a disappointing soul (unless for the sake of that soul's good or for the good of others it be necessary to speak), then I know nothing of Calvary love.

If, the moment I am conscious of the shadow of self crossing my threshold, I do not shut the door, and in the power of Him who works in us to will and to do, keep that door shut, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If I cannot in honest happiness take the second place (or the twentieth) ; if I cannot take the first place without making a fuss about my unworthiness, then I know nothing of Calvary love.

If, when I am able to discover something which has baffled others, I forget

Twenty-Fiftly Anniversary

General Council Camp Meeting and Biennial Business Session

Believing that the twenty-fifth anniversary of the organization of the Assemblies of God deserves some special recognition, it has been decided to hold a General Council Camp Meeting in connection with the General Council this fall. Twenty-five years ago this spring in Hot Springs, Arkansas, some three hundred ministers and delegates met together and entered into an agreement of spiritual fellowship and cooperation. In the quarter of a century since that time this fellowship has multiplied itself over ten times, and now there are well over three thousand ordained ministers and three thousand five hundred assemblies that belong to the General Council. The cloud, the fire, and the glory still rest upon His people. The anointing abideth, hallelujah! So all Spirit-filled messengers of the cross and members of His body are invited to attend a spiritual feast in celebration of the power and presence of the Lord which has rested upon us throughout these years, to be held at Springfield, Missouri. from August 30 to September 14, 1939.

## The Camp Meeting

Every preparation is being made, that the people of God may drink deeply of the wells of full salvation, and of the riches of His Word. Seven days of spiritual blessing without business sessions are planned to precede the General Council.

Early morning prayer will be conducted during the seven days of the Camp by Elder Fred Vogler, Assistant General Superintendent. Other members of the Executive Presbytery and visiting ministers will bring God's message to the people at the regular morning worship hour. Elder John Wright Follette of New Paltz, New York, will speak each afternoon of the Camp, taking us on most delightful excursions into deep spiritual truths. Special thought has been given to the choice of the evening speaker in order that we might have that challenge, inspiration, and constructive upbuilding which we need and love. The choice has fallen upon Pastor L. L. Riley, of Russellville, Arkansas, who will speak each evening of the Camp. Elder Carl W. Barnes, Springfield, Missouri, will be the leader of song throughout the Camp Meeting and Council.

A course of Teacher Training will also be provided during the Camp, and will be taught by Elder Myer Pearlman, instructor at Central Bible Institute, and writer of Sunday School literature at the Gospel Publishing House. Rousing Christ's Ambassadors meetings will be conducted as vesper services throughout the Camp, and the entire day of Wednesday, September 6 , will be devoted to the activities of this, our young
people's organization. A great Missionary Rally will be held Sunday afternoon, September 3, under the direction of Elder Noel Perkin, General Missionary Secretary of the Assemblies of God.

## The General Council

The General Council sessions will begin Thursday morning, September 7, at nine o'clock. Elder Ernest S. Williams, our beloved General Superintendent, will open the Council with one of his inspirational addresses. Business sessions will be conducted each day at ten o'clock in the morning and two o'clock in the afternoon. Special instruction and open forums in Sunday School and Daily Vacation Bible School work are planned for a short period each morning before the business sessions. Other features of pastoral work may also be considered at this time. Instead of an afternoon devotional message, a short period of praise and worship will precede the business session each day. Faithful preachers of the Assembly fellowship who have not been heard before at General Council time will appear as the evening speakers. Among those invited are Pastors Ben Mahan of Washington, D. C.; E. M. Yeats of Houston, Texas ; H. A. Stemme of Chicago, Illinois; John P. Kolenda of Lansing, Michigan; and T. J. Gotcher of Little Rock, Arkansas. A devotional Communion-Memorial service will be held Sunday morning, September 10, and another great Missionary Rally in the afternoon. The early morning devotional and prayer service will be in charge of Brother Stanley H. Frodsham. Vesper services during the Council will be in charge of the Christ's Ambassadors.

## A Call to Special Praise for What God Has Done, and to Special Prayer for a New Revival

On April 9, 1906, the Spirit of God was outpoured in Pentecostal fullness at Azusa Street Mission, Los Angeles, California. Although from the beginning of this century many had received an experience like to that of the hundred and twenty on the day of Pentecost, the Azusa Street outpouring was really the beginning of a world-wide revival.

On April 2, 1914, a number of ministers of the Pentecostal faith met together in Hot Springs, Arkansas. The result of this gathering was the formation of the fellowship known as the Assemblies of God. Twentyfive years later, on April 2, 1939, at 2:15 p. m., there will be a special gathering of many friends at Springfield, Missouri, to dedicate a Tabernacle that has been
erected on the grounds of Central Bible Institute. Should the Lord tarry until September next, the Seventeenth General Council of the Assemblies of God will be held in this building.

Our General Superintendent, E. S. Williams, will be giving a special address at this service of dedication.

May we suggest that on Sunday, April 9, we gather in all our assemblies for a season of thanksgiving to God for the great things He has done for us, and also for special prayer for a new outpouring of His Spirit. How blessed it would be if in all our churches, at this time, we could once more spend ten days of tarrying at the footstool of the throne of our Lord in supplication for "Pentecost plus Pentecost."

Emergency dormitory space will also be arranged which will provide sleeping space for another one hundred and thirty. Persons bringing their own bedding may occupy a cot in one of these improvised dormitories for one dollar a week. We cannot provide bedding for these cots. A modern cafeteria in the new C. B. I. building will provide good meals at reasonable prices. In the extended oak grove adjoining the C. B. I. campus, all facilities are being installed to make camping easy and delightful. You may bring your own tent or trailer and camp here throughout the Camp and Council without charge.

As only a limited number can be entertained in the C. B. I. buildings, we advise that you write immediately for reservation. Room or dormitory space will be reserved as the orders are received for those who enclose remittance for reservation with their order. Every possible arrangement also is being made for the entertainment of guests throughout Springfield. This includes hotels, tourist cottages, and private homes. A welcoming committee will be at Central Bible Institute to receive you, and do their best to get you comfortably located. It is also planned for this com-
mittee to meet incoming trains and buses. You can be sure of a wonderful time with the Lord and your brethren if you come to the General Council Camp Meeting and Council session this fall. The other band went to the police-station and said that Gairdner and I had spoken against the Prophet, blasphemed their religion and torn their new clothes.

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They brought some constables who said, 'You must come with us.' 'Why ?' 'Because you have struck these effendis (gentlemen) and torn their clothes.' 'But it is neither true nor probable. See, we are only two, and they are many, and look at the wreckage they have made of our room.' 'You must come along.' So they took us to the police-station with a following crowdsome drunken."

But God protected His servants. The Police official asked the effendis what was their complaint. They said we had blasphemed their religion and torn their clothes. What was my relief when the other Moslems who had followed us said there was not a word of truth in the accusation. They said, 'These men are drunken. Not an impolite word has been said about our religion, and instead of their tearing our clothes some effendis have smashed up their room.' The official took their witness and ordered the plaintiffs to spend the night in the cells. Then Mr. Gairdner said, "Oh no, please let them go home. We came from our country to set at liberty the captives, and I don't want anyone locked up for my sake.' The official was much interested in these words and kept us for a talk. He said, 'What do you mean by saying you came here to set captives at liberty?' Mr. Gairdner replied, 'We did not come to break into your prisons, but to set free those who are captives of Satan, bound in the chains of $\sin$.' Thereupon the official sent for coffee, and listened with a good will ; thus, when the students would not listen, God caused their very uproar to procure a hearing for the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ even in a Moslem police-station."

## "Quicken Me"

The 119th Psalm is a whole prayer book in itself. I believe you will find seventyeight petitions in this one Psalm. Five times the prayer comes, "Teach me thy statutes." Five times more we hear the prayer, "Give me understanding." But eight times we have the prayer, "Quicken me." To be quickened is to be refreshed, renewed, revived.
There comes in all of our lives the wintry season. See that farmer as he goes through his orchard in the month of January. He is not discouraged because he sees no fruit on his trees. If he is a godly man he will say, "Thank God for the cold and the frost. In this season my trees are taking root downward and later on they will bear fruit upward."

The trees will be all the stronger as they learn to resist the bleak wintry blast. God has told us: "While the earth remaineth, seedtime and harvest, and cold and heat, and summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease." Gen. 8:22.

But, praise the Lord the winter does not last for ever. There comes a time in the spring when the trees that have looked dead for so many months begin to show signs of quickening and life. The leaves and blossoms appear. As in the natural, so it is in the spiritual. We can pray for the spring quickening.

## The Change Christ Makes

I stood one day speaking (a missionary writes) and a little cripple sat on the front seat. She was so badly deformed that she could not see over the back of the bench. All the time I was speaking there was a prayer in my heart :hat this stricken little soul would get my message. But I found that I had wasted my sympathy, for she became a message to me. At the close a lady came to introduce one of her teachers. She led me to this cripple. She must have seen the look of surprise on my face, for she said: "Yes, one of my teachers and, moreover, the best one I have; in fact, she is the greatest spiritual power in this school and has led more people to God than any other person in this city."

I was interested and urged her to go on. She told me how as a child she had been dropped by careless hands, and her back broken, and how for many years after she had been a badtempered little cripple lashing with the sharpness of her tongue against her fate and against her environment. But one day she let Christ into her embittered soul, and all was changed. She felt the urge to become a teacher. When she was sent to the village to take charge, there was almost a riot by the villagers, who supposed her crippled body to be a thing of illomen. But the missionary insisted that they try her, promising that if they did not like her as a teacher, they would take her back. Out of pity they agreed.

Twice we have this cry in Psalm 119: "Quicken me, O Lord, as Thou art wont." This is the literal Hebrew of verses 149 and 154. We hear also the prayer, "Quicken me according to Thy Word." Also the petition, "Quicken me, O Lord, according to Thy loving kindness." Do you ever send up a prayer, "Quicken me, fill me with life"? Our blessed Lord Jesus came that we might have life and that we might have it more abundantly, and He will not fail to respond to this Spirit-given prayer.
But how does He quicken? We know that the plentiful rains have their part. The husbandman has to wait long and patiently for the precious fruits of the earth. A necessary factor in fruit bearing are the early and latter rains. We are bidden in Zechariah 10:1 to ask for rain. In response to our prayers He will send the rain. Through the gracious rains of the Spirit we shall bring forth abundance of fruit and thereby shall our Father be glorified.
Do you want to bear much fruit? Then send up this prayer, "Quicken me." Or offer that prayer which we find in Psalm 85:6, "Wilt thou not revive us again?" Pray not only for revival for yourself but for the whole community. In response to this Spiritgiven prayer we are given assurance in the same Psalm (v. 12) that "the Lord shall give that which is good."-S. H. F.

Him who revealeth the deep and secret things, and knoweth what is in the darkness and showeth it to us; if I forget that it was He who granted that ray of light to His most unworthy servant, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If I do not give a friend "the benefit of the doubt," but put the worst construction instead of the best on what is said or done, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If I take offense easily, if I am content to continue in a cool unfriendliness, though friendship be possible, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If I feel bitter towards those who condemn me, as it seems to me, unjustly, forgetting that if they knew me as I know myself they would condemn me much more, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If the praise of man elates me and his blame depresses me; if I cannot rest under misunderstanding without defending myself; if I love to be loved more than to love, to be served more than to serve, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If I crave hungrily to be used to show to a soul in bendage the way to liberty, instead of caring only that it be delivered; if I nurse my disappointment when I fail, in-
stead of asking that to another the word of release may be given, then I know nothing of Calvary love.
If I want to be known as the doer of something that has proved the right thing, or as the one who suggested that it should be done, then I know nothing of Calvary love. If I slip into the place that can be filled by Christ alone, making myself the first necessity to a soul instead of leading it to fasten upon Him, then I know nothing of Calvary love.

## PART III

I have felt these words scorching to write, but it is possible to be content with the shailows of love, if indeed such shallows should be called love at all.
The more we ponder our Lord's words about love, and the burning words the Spirit gave to His followers to write, the more acutely do we feel our deadly lack. The searchlight of the Spirit discovers us to ourselves, and such a discovery leaves us appalled How can even He who is the God of all patience have patience with us? Like Job we abhor ourselves and repent in dust and ashes.

But the light is not turned upon us to rob us of our hope. There is a lifting up If only we desire to be purged from self with its entangling nets, its subtleties, its disguises (falsehoods truly), its facile showing of brass for gold; if, hating unlove from the ground of the heart, we cry to be delivered, then our God will be to us a God of deliverances.
No vision of the night can show, no word declare with what longings of love Divine Love waits till the heart, all weary and sick of itself, turns to its Lord and says, "Take full possession." There is no need to plead that the love of God shall fill our heart as though He were unwilling to fill us. He is willing as light is willing to flood a room that is opened to its brightness; willing as water is willing to flow into an emptied channel. Love is pressing round us on all sides like air. Cease to resist, and instantly love takes possession. A 15 th century poem says,

> Long and love thou never so high,
> My love is more than thine may be.

More, far more. For as His abundance of pardon passes our power to tell it, so does His abundance of love; it is high as the heaven is above the earth. But words fail. Love soars above them all.
To look at ourselves leads to despair. Thank God, the Blood cleanseth.

## If thou be foul, I shall make thee clean, <br> If thou be sick, I shall thee heal. <br> Foundest thou ever love so leal?

Never, Lord, never!
Sometimes, when we are distressed by past failure and tormented by fear of failure in the future, nothing helps so much as to give some familiar Scripture time to enter into us and become part of our being. The words "Grace for grace" have been a help to me since I read in a little old book of Bishop Moule's something that opened their meaning.
He says "for" means simply instead, "The image is of a perpetual succession of supply; a displacement ever going on; ceaseless changes of need and demand.
"The picture before us is as of a river

Stand on its banks, and contemplate the flow of waters. A minute passes, and another. Is it the same stream still? Yes. But is it the same water? No. The liquid mass that passed you a few seconds ago fills now another section of the channel; new water has displaced it, or if you please, replaced it ; water inslead of water. And so hour by hour, and year by year, and cintury by century, the process holds; one stream, other waters, living not stagnant, because always in the great identity there is perpetual exchange. Grace takes the place of grace"; (Love takes the place of love) "ever new, ever old, ever the same, ever fresh and young, for hour by hour, for year by year, through Christ."
There is no torce strong enough to hold us together as a company, and animate all our doings, but this one force of love; and so there is a constant attack upon the love without which we are sounding brass and tinkling cymbal.

That explains why every now and then those who want to live the life of love seem to be constrained to seek the searching and the cleansing of the Spirit of God, first in the secret of our own hearts, and then together ; and we know how graciously. God has answered us, so that though our word must always be, "not as though I had already attained," we do, by His enabling, press onward.

There is another reason why the adversary attacks love. It is this. Far out on our uttermost rim a thing may occur which is the reflection, so to speak, of something that was nourished in the heart of one who is in the very center. I have often known it to be so. Perhaps it was never expressed in act or word, the eye did not see it, the ear did not hear it. But spiritual influences move where sight and hearing have no place; and unlove in any one of us, or even an absence of the quality of love of which we have been thinking, is enough to cause the slow stain to spread till it reaches some soul in a moment of its weakness. Thus irreparable harm may result.

O Lord, forgive. Thy property is always to have mercy. Give me the comfort of Thy help again. Let it be Thy pleasure to deliver me, O Lord my God.

The way of love is never an easy way. If our hearts be set on walking in that way we must be prepared to suffer. "It was the way the Master went; should not the servant tread it still?"

We have toiled for some one dear to us, but never knew it as toil. We have poured out stores of health never to be recovered, but did not know it, nor should we have cared if we had known it, so dearly did we love. And all our hope was that the one so cherished would become a minister to others. But it was not so.

And then unwillingly we become aware of a strange unresponsiveness in the one for whom nothing had seemed too much to do, a coldness that chilled, a hardness that pushed away as with hard hands the heart that had almost broken to save that life from destruction.

Then (but only those who have gone through such a bereft hour will understand) a fear worse than any pain has us in its grip:


In the rapidly increasing darkness of these days we should learn to live more and more by the Word of God-the only infallible LIGHT to our path.
"It has pewer to convict and convert, sanctify and edify; but it has even a higher power and province: it is the mirror of its Author, meant first of all to reveal, unveil, magnify, and glorify Him from whom it originally went forth."Pierson.

Satan is ever seeking to becloud the minds of God's children with unbelief, prejudice, or moral evil, so that they may be blinded to the Lamp of His revelation.
If you find it difficult to understand the Scriptures, search for the hindrance in yoursclf. God's sun is shining, but to him who has no sight all is still in darkness.
God's Word is on a level of its own-high above all human compositions. Francis Bacon wrote: "I do much condemn that interpretation of Scriptures which is only after the manner of men, as they use to interpret a profane book."
"There are professed teachers and preachers who no more grasp the truth they nominally hold than does the sparrow grasp the message that passes through the telegraph wire on which it perches."-McLeod.
Modernistic criticism began by disbelieving Moses' writings, then it assailed the testimony of the prophets, next it threw doubt on Christ's words, and finally rejected His resurrection. See how He foretold these four steps in John 5:39, 45-47; Luke 16:31.
is the love of the years slipping from us? "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do"-is that fading from our memory? Love never faileth, is love failing now? Shall we find ourselves meeting lovelessness with lovelessness?

In such an hour, a prayer now many years old, one felt by a desperate pray-er, burned into words:

> Decp unto decp O Lord, Crieth in me; Gathering strength I conce, Lord, unto Thee.
> Jesus of Calvary,
> Smitten for me,
> Ask what Thou wilt, but give Love to me.

Yes, ask what Thou wilt, any hopes, any joys of human affection, any rewards of love, but let not love depart. Nothing ordinary is equal to this new call; nothing in me suffices for this. O Lord of love and Lord of pain, abound in me in love. Love through me, Love of God.
Our dear Lord listens to the prayer that goeth not out of feigned lips, and it is written for our comfort that He causes those who love Him to inherit substance, the wonderful substance that is grace instead of grace. the perpetual gift of His fulness. This grace s no mere impersonal substance but God
working in us: the Lord in action in our very springs of thought and will. God is Love, so, for us, Love is this blessed Substance that the children of the Father are caused to inherit.
It is the river's word again. The empty river bid "inherits" the water that pours through it from the heights ; it does not create that water, it only receives it, and its treasuries are filled, its pools overflow for the blessing and refreshment of the land. It is so with us. Our treasuries of time, our years with all their months, weeks, days, hours, minutes, are filled with the flowing treasure of love that we may help others. Who could have thought of such joy for us but He whose name is love? Now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, unto Him be glory.

Let us listen to simple words; our Lord says, "Trust Me, My child. Trust Me with a humbler heart and fuller abandon to My will than ever thou didst before. Trust Me to pour My love through thee, as minute succeeds minute. And if thou shouldst be conscious of anything hindering the flow, do not hurt My love by going away from Me in discouragement-nothing can hurt love so much as that. Draw all the closer to Me, come, flee unto Me to hide thee, even from thyself. Tell Me about the trouble. Trust Me to turn My hand upon thee and thoroughly to remove the boulder that has choked thy river bed, and take away all the sand that has silted up the channel. I will not leave thee until I have done that which I have spoken to thee of. I will perfect that which concerneth thee. Fear thou not, O child of My love ; fear not."

Beloved, let us love.
Lord, what is love?
"Love is that which inspired My lifc, and led Me to My Cross, and held Me on My Cross. Love is that which will make it thy, joy to lay down thy life for thy brethren." Lord, evermore give me this love.
Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after love, for they shall be filled.

## "ALL THINGS IN COMMON"

The Alliance Weckly tells of a colony of devout German refugees living in the Cotswolds in England. There are forty familics in Bruderhof, as the movement is called, which was established in England in 1936. All goods are held in common and the community earns its way by farming. Four "servants of the Word" head the colony, who among other duties, perform marriages. There is a steward to-keep the common purse, a distributor of the work, and responsible officials called witness brothers. All important matters are settled by community discussion. They own 211 acres of ground and rent another hundred, and the tilled land is a model for the neighboring English farmers.

Early in January comes Thai Pongal, a Hindu holiday season. It is a good time to hold conventions in our outstations where many Hindu people are working on the tea and rubber estates.

## Eleven Baptized in Water

Miss Long, my wife and I, a Bible woman and one of our converts made up the group who drove ninety-six miles to Balangoda and commenced the convention by holding an open air service near the market. More than a hundred people attended and listened closely, and received all the Tamil and Sinhalese tracts we had with us. Then about sixty came to the service in the meeting hall. When the altar call was given twelve children and one woman came forward and gave their hearts to the Lord. Crowds and interest increased the next day. In the afternoon we held the first baptismal service ever witnessed in Balangoda, when eleven openly took their stand for the Lord Jesus. One of these had come with us from Colom-bo-a fine, intelligent young man who had been a money lender's clerk prior to his conversion. His name was Thanga Rajah which means "gold king." We gave him the name of Joseph. Many Hindu names carry some
meaning about their gods and are no longer suitable when the converts turn to the one true God, so we have to give them new names.
All through the convention the Lord blessed, many raised their hands for prayer and about thirty-five partook of the Lord's Supper at the closing service on Sunday. Many of the people had come a long distance so remained through the entire convention, sleeping on mats on the floor. Before we left them they came to me to pray for them and their children that God's blessing might rest upon them. As they get only two holidays a year and sometimes on Sunday they have to work all day, they appreciate these special times of fellowship.

## Twenty-one Immersed at Ketetenna

Eighteen miles from this outstation is Ketetenna where the believers had been anxiously waiting for us to come and help them. There we found thirty-five believers and the evangelists waiting for us at the little mission hall. Most of these had come long distances to be baptized. As they sat on the floor around the walls of the hall I asked them to testify to a saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus, which they were all able to do. Then we explained to them carefully the meaning of water baptism and the seriousness of the step they were taking. About a quarter of a mile from the hall was the stream where we baptized twenty-one of them.
Shortly after the service they were ready to start their long journey homeword to be ready for work the next morning, but before leaving they too, gathered around requesting that the missionary lay his hands on each one and pray for each one individually.
Brother and Sister Carl Graves took the convention for us at a place called Coldstream, about eighty miles from Colombo.

God blessed them there, also, and it is reported that six gave their hearts to the Lord and a number who had grown cold came back to the Lord and renewed their consecration. About fifty people attended that convention.

## Ebenezer!

As we look back over the past months since the beginning of 1938 we have a record of God's working with us in seeing some ninety-three coming to the altar for salvation. Fiftyfive have followed the Lord in the waters of baptism, eight have received the Baptism with the Holy Ghost, two new outstations have been opened, and three evangelists and three Bible women have joined us to help in the work of the Lord.

## AT THE LOW CASTE FESTIVAL W. E. Davis

Sowing seeds for eternity! What shall the harvest be? From now on for some time there will be
many festivals affording good opportunities to sow precious seed-the Word of God. We recently attended a low caste festival in which there were several thousand of these depressed people. There was an absence of temple jewelry and wealth for these people are very poor. The festive car was decorated only with bright paper; there were no elephants to push the car, as is customary in festivals among the higher castes. Instead, huge timbers about ten inches square and about fifteen feet in length were used to pry the car along. It was no easy matter to move the car as these cars are of tremendous weight, but these men, in a high state of frenzy, were literally tossing these huge beams into the air, screaming out to the gods.
These people are very superstitious and fearful of evil spirits and demons. In their performances they are violent and go to great extremes. Recently there was a procession in which they went to the temple for certain performances. They are not allowed to enter the temple, but must conduct their rites on the outside. On this occasion the leader, full of the devil, carried a large knife, and during the ceremony in wild frenzy he beat his forehead until the blood streamed, down, then by devilish power suddenly stopped its flow.
We are thankful for good attention while speaking to them. Please pray for those who received Scripture portions that through the Word of God they shall come to know Him. In home visitation we find illiteracy appalling-entire families unable to read or write. These can receive the message only by hearing it. We trust that whether in printed form or the spoken word the message of salvation may bring light to their hearts.

## ANOTHER OUTPOURING IN HARBIN

Mr. and Mrs. A. Wingard of Manchuria write the following good news: "We are glad to report that after much praying and exhorting others to pray the blessed Pentecostal fountain was finally reopened in the Harbin assembly early in January, and at least seven souls received the Holy Spirit Baptism. Some of the young people who had grown cold were reclaimed and renewed in the Spirit. Please help us pray that they will now stand true to the Lord.
"The extra Christmas offering enabled us to help our native workers a little more and to send some help to the two students we have in Bible training. We gave a gift of Sunday School material amounting to nearly eight dollars to one of the assemblies, and passed out three hundred and fiftyone little gift bags to others. It is a pleasure to us each time we can give them a little cheer.
"The Lord opened up the way for us to go down to Peking to visit the Truth

grown folk, they told us, had gone to a beer-drink. We reminded them of the wrong of working on Sunday, which they admitted but could only say that their fathers had told them to plow.
"At another village we found the people boiling beer in three huge pots. We stopped long enough to greet them and to invite them to come over to Shigaman's village for the meeting. Going on a little farther, we found Shigamane very happy to receive us. He is an old heathen man with a number of wives, and his village fairly swarmed with boys and girls who, he said, were his grandchildren. God's presence was very real during the service, and we knew this old man's heart was deeply touched by the Spirit of God.
"From here we went to another place, where we found just one woman and some children. She said she was waiting for the people to return from hoeing her field to give them the beer she had made, and which was the pay for the half-day's work. We spoke to her about her soul, but her darkened mind was not able to comprehend; for when we told her she should repent, she looked up inquiringly and asked, 'Do you mean I should wear a dress?' No wonder the Word speaks about 'gross darkness.'
"We stopped at one more village, explained the way of salvation, and prayed for an old woman who was blind. Returning to our station the burden of my heart was, 'O Lord, send forth laborers into the harvest field.'"

 North ChinaWe held a Christmas program in the prison for the women prisoners. There were ninetynine of them-nearly all Christians. We rejoiced to see their smiling faces and how well they sang and quoted their scriptures. To each we gave a bag of sweets. 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## Christ's Triumph Over Death

Lesson for April 9, 1939. Lesson Text: Matt. 27:62-66; 28:1-15.
He is risen. "He is not here: for He is risen as He said." Jesus often foretold His death and resurrection. An example is Matt. 16:21. At the beginning of His ministry He was challenged by the unbelieving religious leaders of the day, who said, "What sign showest thou unto us, seeing that thou doest these things?" He answered, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up. . . . . But he spake of the temple of his body." John 2:18-22. Thus Jesus rested His whole claim to authority upon His power to rise from the dead. Paul sounds the same note: "And if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain (empty), and your faith is also vain. . . . If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable." 1 Cor. 15:12-19. He then makes the positive statement: "But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the firstfruits of them that sleep.

In Christ shall all be made alive." vv. 20, 21. Our glorious risen Lord, in the Book of Revelation, again calls attention to His conquest over death as being the keystone of the arch of the Christian faith. Rev. 1:17-18.
Jesus Raised the Dead. During our Lord's earthly life He performed three resurrections of which we have record. He raised the daughter of Jairus at $\mathrm{Ca}-$ pernaum, the widow's son at Nain, and His friend Lazarus at Bethany. The first had been dead but a matter of moments; the widow's son the better part of a day (the Jews always buried the same day) ; while Lazarus had been dead four days. Thus

He indicated that the time element makes no difference to Him. Whether bodies are hardly cold in death or have been "sown" into the ground centuries and millenniums previously, when the time comes He will raise them alike from the dead. "All that are in the graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evii, unto the resurrection of damnation." John $5: 28,29$. From Rev. 20:4-6 we see that there is an interval of 1,000 years, the millennium when Christ shall reign on earth, between the resurrection of the just and the unjust, but all people both saints and sinners, shall be finally raised to life.

Resurrection Foregleams. There is yet another example of Christ's resurrection power recorded in the Gospels. When He died "the earth did quake, and the rocks rent; and the graves were opened; and many of the bodies of the saints which slept arose, and came out of the graves after His resurrection, and went into the holy city and appeared unto many."

## STILL TRYING TO SEAL HIM IN THE TOMB

Whom God hath raised up, hauing loosed the pains of death; because it was not possible that he shoula be

replied, "Oh, Lyttleton, I have something wonderful to tell you. When I came to explode the doctrine that Jesus Christ rose from the dead on the third day, I had to be honest. I had to search the evidence. You may laugh at me, Lyttleton, if you will, but when I looked into it honestly, my mind and my deepest soul were convinced that Jesus did rise from the dead. I prayed to Him; He saved me, and now I am His friend." Lyttleton answered, "Thank God, West! I have something just as wonderful to tell you. When I came to explain away that man Paul, and get rid of his testimony, I too had to be thorough and candid. I had to search. And you will rejoice with me, West, when I tell you that after I had searched and studied, I found myself down on my knees, just as Paul was on the Damascus road, and my cry was, 'Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" I am a Christian also." In all the realm of literature nothing has ever surpassed the works which these two famous one-time skeptics have written in defence of the Christian faith.-Harry J. Steil.

## DISSOLVING IN ATHEISM

George Friedman, after a tour in Russia, has written a book on the condition of the Jews there. "He found that under the present order of life many thousands of the younger generation are enabled to break away from the bonds of religion and family in which many were forcibly held, that they spread all over the tremendous territory of the Union, some settle on the land, many go into factories and become absorbed in the Russian economic life. Thus scattered, they naturally and willingly learn Russian instead of Yiddish, and many intermarry. None of them learns Hebrew or knows anything about Zionism. If, M. Friedman argued, this process goes on long enough, the Jews will get absorbed among the Russian people and the Jewish problem will be solved-there will be no Jewish people in Russia."

TEL AVIV: Touching scenes occurred today when the first group from Germany of 80 parents of Jews living in Palestine arrived here. Many wept and kissed the ground in gratitude for having reached a haven from Nazi persecution.-News item.

## THE "ANTI-GODLESS"

According to Revelation, the Soviet paper Troud complains that the atheist groups in the factories and farms are remiss in their propaganda since religious life grows among the people and since there have even been formed little groups of "anti-godless" who are organized against the atheists.

## FRUITFUL PALESTINE

According to the figures of the Jaffa Citrus Exchange, about $14,000,000$ cases of oranges were shipped from Palestine during the season that is now closing, in spite of all the troubles. Of these, more than $8,000,000$ cases came from Jewish farms, and this share alone represents a market value of about $\$ 20,000,000$ net to the farmers.-Revelation.

## PROPAGANDA

According to Dr. Ralph Sockman, there are 800 organizations in this country, professedly patriotic, but in reality organized to spread racial prejudice.
Two kinds of propaganda are prevalent today: first, that which sets class against class (Communism) ; second, that which sets race against race (Nazism, Fascism). Both kinds are contrary to the spirit of the gospel.

## JEWISH FARMERS

Writes Sa Shaolom Israel, Jewish author: "Two thousand years of oppression and humiliation have built up in the Jewish soul an inferiority complex regarding the ability of Jews to till the soil and regarding their capacity for self-government. But the experience of the Jews in Palestine has demonstrated what the Jews can do. It has emphatically proved that they possess the physical stamina as well as the strength of character to endure the extreme rigors required by a pioneering enterprise."

## HEART-SEARCHINGS

Their recent troubles have led to selfexamination on the part of many Jews. The following item is from the Jewish Chronicle: "Much of the anti-Jewish feeling is the result of the behavior of a handful of Jews. Some of these indulge in loud and ostentatious behavior. Let a section of propaganda be directed against these few who are causing such a great deal of harm. If they could be shown what effect their behavior is going to have on the future of their children, perhaps it would strike home. It is the future generation who will suffer for the sins of these few. Let any Jew whose business ethics are unsatisfactory be shunned by his fellows; the unfair trader boycotted, and any who bring shame upon the race by their conduct in everyday life be ostracized."

## GOD'S HAND IN AFFLICTION

"The orthodox Jews are comparatively well off," observes Jewish Frontier. "For them, this is a simple well known repetition of their history. Hitler is Pharaoh, he is Nebuchadnezzar, he is Haman. And the Jews have to trust in God, who will awaken other Moseses and other Esthers and will deliver His people as He did before. Some orthodox Jews even think that they have guessed the real intention of God-He sent Hitler in order to drive the Jews out of Europe which will perish, even as He advised Lot to leave Sodom."

## QUEEN DISTRIBUTES TRACTS

Evangelical Christian passes on the following item:
"Seth Sykes, the well known evangelist, tells me that he went into a certain religious book depot, not long ago, to purchase some copies of the widely blessed little tract, Safety, Certainty, and Enjoymen', and was informed that fifty extra copies of the tract were being given free to him, because Queen Mary had purchased a supply of these tracts there a lit'le while before, and had paid for an extra fifty, to be given to the next purchaser. The Queen Mother told the salesman that it was her practice to carry several copies with her, for distribution in going from place to place. A beautiful and inspiring example indeed! -and one which enhancingly agrees with the Christian character of the gracious woman whom Britain was proud to call queen for a quarter of a century.

## "COLD TERROR"

The following appeared some time ago in the official German daily newspaper of America, the Staats-Zeiting: "We do not believe that the German people, that our relatives and dear friends, are participating in the horror mankind has witnessed. We condemn the murder act in Paris, as we are condemning all violence, all excesses. Because we believe in the inherent decency of the German people, we herewith protest against the dark powers that use this murder as a welcome excuse to let loose the lowest instincts against defenseless people, trying to cover up these wanton acts with phrases like 'indignation of the people' which bear the stamp of the Ministry of Propaganda."

## BROKEN TREATIES

Dawn quotes the following from a letter sent to England by the Evangelical Church of the Czech brethren:
${ }^{\text {a }}$ The process of our humiliation and mutilation is over. The loss of territory, though very grievous, is nothing compared to the terrible wounds inflicted on our people, and on our faith in the power of truth and of good will in the world. The faith in covenants and treaties, in pledged words and solemn promises, is shaken. It is of this that we wish to remind the Churches, and individual Christians, whose conscience has not been deadened. Never has the abyss between the ideals of Christianity and national politics been so deep and wide as during these days."

## KARL MARX

The fact that Karl Marx, the founder of Communism, was a Jew, is urged by some as a proof that Communism is a creation of the Jewish nation. Marx was a Jew in the sense that he was born of Jewish parents, but he was a baptized Lutheran and had no connection. whatever with Judaism. In fact, he detested the Jews because he considered them the bulwark of capitalism. According to John N. Moody, Catholic scholar, he was not an original thinker, but most of the elements of his doctrine had already been expressed by such men as Hegel, Feuerbach, Owen, Saint-Simon and others. These men were not Jews. "The same is true of the spiritual fathers of Bolshevism. In that long list of men who prepared the Russian mind for the acceptance of the present order, we look in vain for a member of this particular oppressed group. The Soviet phenomenon is not pure Marxism; it is very definitely conditioned by the Russian mentality, and owes as much to Lenin and other nonJewish Russians as it does to Marx."

## "Say Not Ye"

"There are yet four months, and the harvest is coming? Behold, I say to you, lift up your eyes, and view the fields, because they are white for harvest." Worrell. Loine Honderick, Central Bible Institute, has obeyed this, our Master's command, and in obeying he has already reaped sheaves of golden grain for the Master-and will reap.
In looking over Ozark sections, Loine found two rural communities, 28 miles distant from Springfield, where no churches or Sunday Schools were in operation. The only buildings available for services were rural school buildings. He found directors quite willing to permit the use of the schoolhouse. Full of ambition, and eager to win souls for Christ, this young man set out in his car for personal visitation from farmhouse to farmhouse. At each home he witnessed for Jesus, left the gospel in printed form, and invited the people to services.
The first School was opened last January in Mount Comfort school district, with an initial attendance of 35 . Numbers of the children had never attended Sunday School. This School has enjoyed a steady growth, definite healings have been wrought, and four have been saved.

As soon as the work was well under way, Loine placed the Mount Comfort School under the supervision of another C. B. I. student, Ray Unsderfer, and set out to open another School in the Rossville district two and one-half miles away. The same plan was followed in opening the second School, which had at its first service about 43 in attendance. This School now shows the largest number in attendance. At this time plans are under way for a joint revival for the two Schools.
