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Preach the Word

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Preach the Word! 2 Timothy 4:2.

REACH IT NOW! Instant in sea-son, out of season! Cry it aloud! Spare not. Lengthen the cords! Strengthen the stakes!

Preach repentance! Mark 6:12. Preach forgiveness! Luke 7:49. Preach righteousness! 2 Peter 2:5. Preach holiness! Heb. 12:14. Preach prophecy! Preach the message of the hour! Preach heaven and hell! Preach CHRIST!

Preach it now! Preach it daily! Make it heard! Send it out! Send it upon the waves of the air! Sound it aloud! Sound it without ceasing!

Make it heard from the pulpit! Make it heard from the street corner! Make it to be heard from city tent meetings! Make it to be heard from great rural camp meet-ings! Make the people to hear! Make the nations to hear! Make the heathen to hear! Make the earth to hear! "O earth, earth, earth, hear the Word of the Lord!" Jer. 22:29.

Send forth the sound! Cause it to be heard in all the earth! Cause it to be heard in every city throughout the homeland! Cause it to be heard to the ends of the earth! Cause it to be heard daily! Acts 2:47 and 16:5. Cause it to be heard without ceasing! Cause it to be heard with no

uncertain sound! Cause it to be heard while yet we may. Now the railroads are available for traveling to evangelize. Some day they may be blown up. Now the steamships are available. Soon ocean mines may threaten them.

Preach the Word to the children! Preach it to the youths! Preach it to the maidens! Preach it to the fathers! Preach it to the mothers! Preach it to the toilers! Preach it to those that are at ease!

Utilize every fleeting mo-

ment. Saturate America with the message of God's Word. Noon hour business meetings. Factory meetings. Lumber mill meetings. Prison services. Hospital services. Preach the Word! Get it out, ere insidious and subversive forces bore from

within and the country sinks to her doom.

Nations are arming. Battalions are mobilizing. Airplanes are zooming. War tanks are moving. Poison gases are multiplying. War clouds are menacing. Nations are in distress. Men's hearts are failing them. One ray of comfort and light alone shines steadily. Give them the Word!

The Orient is roused. Bombs are falling. Cities are crumbling. Nations are awakening. The helpless lie wounded and dying. Dare we trifle? Dare we rest? Dare we look back?

The Jews are suffering. Gospel doors are closing. Faithful voices are being stilled. Prison doors, concentration camps, or lonely exile in frozen wastelands shut the mouths of many who desire to cry aloud.

Why hold we our peace? What lack we yet to rouse us? Soon doors will close. Preach the Word in season. Preach it out of season. Saturate the land with the message. In the first century fishermen, tax gatherers, tent makers, heard the call, left all, and went everywhere preaching the gospel. As sons of thunder it was said of them, "They that have turned the world upside down have come hither also."

If Jonathan Edwards, that godly Con-

gregationalist, could fast and pray for three days prior to preaching the sermon, "Sin-ners in the Hands of An Angry God," and preach it under such an anointing that possibly fifty fell as dead under conviction, how terrible if we should lose the spirit of travail and passion. If John Wesley, whose ministry with that of his associates, as historians agree, saved England from a bloody revolution such as swept over France, could preach practically daily for fifty years, and frequently four times a day, often preaching to working men at dawn. before the day's toil, can we be satisfied with easy hours at such a time as this?

"Go!" Go where? Go here-go there, wherever souls are perishing. Every state, province, city, town, or community presents its challenge to those who will lift up their eyes unto the fields and see! See how white, and see how ready to harvest. Will not remorse be our sure portion if we allow these days of crisis to slip unfruitful through our fingers. If we want to sacrifice, now is the only sure time. If we want to witness for Christ, or weep in intercessory prayer, we must absolutely seize today.

What lack we yet? Soon the doors will be closed. Soon midnight darkness will prevail. The night is encroaching upon us, when no man can work.

"Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved!" Joel tells us of this period, the climax of the age. "Alas

for the day! for the day of the Lord is at hand." He urges, "Blow the trumpet . . . sound an alarm!" We are all witnesses. It is for this purpose we have received the Spirit. Are we fulfilling our part?

> "How shall they believe in Him whom they have not heard? How shall they hear without a preacher?" Rom. 10:13, 14. The early church had one generation from the time the Spirit fell, to let that tremendous power be released in preaching Christ. Then came the destruction of Jerusalem. To the Spiritfilled army of these latter days, (Continued on Page Four)

What Shall I Do With My Dife?

For whosoever will save his life shall lose it; but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's the same shall save it .- Mark 8:35.

The setting of this remarkable text throws a flood of light upon it. Jesus with His disciples made a tour into the vicinity of Cæsarea Philippi, and as they were go-ing He asked them, "Whom do men say that I am?" They answered that some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, still others, one of the prophets. Jesus then demanded, "But whom say ye that I am?" Peter answered, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." This answer satisfied Iesus, who declared that His Father had revealed this to Peter, and He charged them not to tell any one. Then He began to show His disciples the sufferings He must endure. Peter could not bear to hear this, and rebuked and contradicted Him, whereupon Jesus said, "Get thee behind me, Satan, for thou savorest not the things that be of God, but those that be of man." No doubt all of the disciples were disappointed, bewildered, and troubled by the announcement Jesus had made, and by His rebuke of Peter. But they must have been much more perplexed and disturbed by what followed.

Jesus had been speaking to His disciples alone, opening His heart to them, but now He called all the people with His disciples to come near and listen. In their ears He declares that any one coming after Him must deny himself, take up his cross and follow in His footsteps, adding, "Whoso-ever will save his life shall lose it; but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's shall save it." What a double paradox! What you save you lose and what you lose you save! What can He mean! How can this be true?

No cheap, meaningless, go-as-you-please, hand-in-hand-with-the-world, empty profession will satisfy Christ. He was not conducting a hand-shaking, card-signing, church-joining campaign. He was not out for great numbers. He was not after moral cowards. He made His appeal to the heroic in men's natures, not to their selfishness. Three hundred picked men carrying lights in pitchers, and in the darkness surrounding the great hosts of the enemy, who all stand in their places, awaiting orders, and at the given signal break their pitchers and blow their trumpets as they shout, "The sword of the Lord and of Gideon," are worth more than thirty-one thousand, seven hundred cowards.

This cheap, "Hip-hip-hurrah! Get-in-the-band-wagon" evangelism has loaded many whole denominations with worldly church members till there is danger of the whole ship's sinking. May the God of heaven save Pentecost from making the same blunder. May the Lord help us to follow the example of the greatest of all evangel-ists who demanded that His followers be willing to deny themselves, bear a real cross, and if need be, die a real death.

When I was a boy, and under conviction for sin, God's ministers preached that it meant something to be a Christian, and the people sang:

Am I a soldier of the cross, A follower of the Lamb? And shall I fear to own His cause, Or blush to speak His name?

Must I be carried to the skies

On flow'ry beds of ease;

While others fought to win the prize, And sailed through bloody seas?

Are there no foes for me to face; Must I not stem the flood?

Is this vile world a friend to grace, To help me on to God?

Sure I must fight, if I would reign; Increase my courage, Lord!

I'll bear the toil, endure the pain, Supported by Thy Word.

These words and others like them burned in my soul, brought tears of contrition to my eyes, and a spirit of determination to my heart.

If we want old-time conviction and oldtime conversions, we will have to preach the old-fashioned gospel of sin and salvation. When Paul preached about the impending doom of sinners, Felix trembled. May God give us such blood earnestness in our own souls that all lightness and indifference will leave us, and with tears we may plead with the lost to "flee from the wrath to come." Our gospel is a savor of life unto life to those who are saved; and of death unto death to those who are lost. This preaching of the gospel is serious business both for the preacher and for the hearer.

The whole passage shows that Jesus meant real self-denial, real cross-bearing, for He was soon going to Calvary, and He made it plain that His followers must take the same path. But what could He mean by the first paradox, "Whosoever will save his life shall lose it"? You find these identical words also in Matthew 16:25 and in Luke 9:24. On another occasion He used similar words: "He that loveth his life shall lose it.'

I. If You Save Your Life You Will Lose It

The Lord wants your life. He has a right to it. It belongs to Him alone. All that you withhold from Him will be lost forever. Refuse to give Him your heart, your life, your soul, and you will be lost, eternally lost. Moreover, what you gain and selfishly withhold will be lost also. "What shall it profit a man," He asks, "if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" The answer is not difficult, as we used to sing,

> 'Twill profit thee nothing, But fearful the cost, To gain the whole world, If thy soul should be lost!

No one ever yet has gained the whole world. At the time Jesus was speaking, Tiberius Cæsar was the Roman Emperor, the most powerful monarch on earth. He was worshiped as a god and was called the "Divine Cæsar", but Pliny, the Latin his-torian, says he was the most gloomy of mankind. When on an island where he could indulge every evil unmolested, he wrote to the servile and corrupted senate, "What to write to you, Conscript Fathers, or how to write, or what not to write; may

all the gods and goddesses destroy me more than I feel that they are daily de-stroying me, if I know." Wealth, power, honors, self-indulgence, and all the luxuries of life, could not satisfy his soul, and all was lost with him.

Thomas Edison, when an old man, was asked to give a recipe for happiness. He replied that there are no happy men. He should have known Pentecost, and he might have said, "Accept Christ as your Saviour, seek the Baptism in the Holy Spirit, till you are so full of the glory of God that you are living in the third heaven while your feet are still on this earth." We have gone several degrees higher than happiness. We are clear up in blessedness 'Blessed is the man." I am glad that at my ripe age, by experience I know what that means. I have not gained the whole world, and do not want it, but I have gained Christ, and know something of the power of His resurrection, and a little about the fellowship of His sufferings.

When all around my soul gives way, He still is all my hope and stay.

"Thy money perish with thee," said Peter to Simon the sorcerer. "Thou hast neither part nor lot in this matter, for thy heart is not right in the sight of God." To every rich impenitent man, some time God will say, "Thou fool, this night is thy soul required of thee; then whose shall these things be which thou hast provided?"

Not only do we lose our souls and our worldly possessions if we hold them for selfish gratification, but we lose our talents also. How many who have had wonderful talents for speaking, or singing or playing or for writing, have lost them completely because they would not invest them for God! Many who might have shone like stars on a dark night, have "fizzled out" like meteorites and disappeared from the sky entirely. While some with inferior talents have used them for God, who has increased them and made them a blessing to thousands.

Not a few have heard the call of God to preach the gospel, and some to go to foreign mission fields, and have faltered and drawn back, unwilling to pay so great a price, and then have faded out, or have dropped into sin and misery. Young man, young woman, if God calls you, go, no matter what the price of obedience may be. At Battle Creek, Michigan, I saw a motto which deeply impressed me. It was handpainted on a beautiful panel of rosewood taken from the interior of a grand residence our people bought and remodeled for a church. I told a brother that I would like to have a similar motto for our Bible school at Enid. We have one adorning a wall in our reception room. It reads:

"IT COSTS TOO MUCH TO BE OUT OF THE WILL OF GOD!"

Many students have said it has helped them to obey the perfect will of God. "Obedience is better than sacrifice," said Samuel to Saul. This motto adorns our dining room. Saul refused to obey. It cost him his throne, his family, his honor, his riches, his life, and for all we know, his eternal salvation.

Ananias and Sapphira pretended to give all, but kept back part of the price. The part they withheld from God never did them any good, and yet for the sake of this they both lost their lives and their souls. Christ gave His all; He asks us to give Him our all.

> Saviour, Thy dying love, Thou gavest me; Nor should I ought withhold, Dear Lord from Thee. In love my soul would bow, My heart fulfill its vow, Some off'ring bring Thee now, Something for Thee.

If He calls you, answer, "Here am I; send me."

Trust and obey, There is no other way To be happy in Jesus, But to trust and obey.

You may draw back if you will, and withhold from God if you will, but remember, what you save you lose.

Let us now look at the second paradox in our text; "Whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's, the same shall save it."

What a paradox! What can it mean? We find the same words in Matthew and in Luke. In John we find even stronger words: "He that hateth his life in this world shall keep it unto life eternal." From this text we derive our second proposition.

II. If You Lose Your Life You Will Save It

Without the life, death, and glorification of Christ we might not have been able to understand this paradox. When the pious Greeks at the feast came to Phillip, saying, "Sir, we would see Jesus," and he in turn told Jesus, our Lord did not feel elated with His popularity nor make an exhibition of Himself, but He answered: "The hour is come that the Son of man should be glorified. Verily, verily, I say unto you, except a grain of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit. He that loveth his life shall lose it and he that hateth his life in this world shall keep it unto life eternal. If any man serve me, him will my Father honor. Now is my soul troubled; and what shall I say? Father save me from this hour; but for this cause came I unto this hour. Father, glorify thy name."

Here our Lord announces the law of multiplication. A grain of wheat safely guarded will continue alone. To multiply it must be dropped into the ground to die, to lose its life in the life of a new plant which may yield a hundred fold. If Christ had not freely given His life for us, He might have been the brightest light the world ever saw, but He would never have been able to lift thousands and millions into a new life in the Spirit. It was not a glance at Jesus as the wonder-worker that

could benefit those inquiring Greeks, but it was a sight of Jesus the Crucified that could take away their sins, and transform their lives. Hence we hear Him say in the same connection, "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me." And John adds, "This he said, signifying what death he should die." Our Lord died the most shameful death in His day-as a criminal between two criminals. "He became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." "For the joy set before him, He endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." When He was within the shadow of the cross, He prayed, "Father glorify thy Son, that thy Son also may glorify Thee." Did He mean that both the Father and the Son would be glorified by His execution on the cross as an archcriminal? Yes, Peter died a similar death, as Jesus foretold he would, and John explains that Jesus spoke this, "signifying by what death he should glorify God." Paul counts death as one of the assets of a Christian!

Young men and women of this graduating class, you have done well to study, and to show yourselves approved to your teachers, and we also trust to God Himself, but the main part of your spiritual education lies ahead of you. This is rightly named "commencement day." This is or should be your debut, not into polite society, but into the society of those who live. and are willing to die for the Lord. You are to finish your education in the school of experience. You are to learn, as Paul did, in whatsoever state or condition, whatever your surroundings may be, therewith to be content, so that you may know how to be abased, and to abound; to be full and well fed, and also to go hungry and to suffer need, till you can say with him, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." This is an education that no institution of learning can give you, and yet it is the most essential part for a Christian worker.

Should the time come when you feel down-hearted and discouraged because the way is hard and the cross heavy, the support inadequate and co-operation and appreciation at the zero point, sit down and make a list of all your sufferings and sacrifices for Christ and the gospel, then turn to Paul's partial list, as given in Second Corinthians, sixth chapter, and then do your whining and complaining. Search the records and find if you can one-person in all history, who has been a blessing to mankind and an honor to God, who did not give himself wholeheartedly to the cause for which he lived. It is God's great law of life and of spiritual progress and attainment-You sow, if you want to reap; give, if you want to get; suffer, if you want to reign; die if you want to live. If you want your life to be useful and beautiful give it freely to the service of Christ wherever He may choose to send you; be not afraid of sacrifices and sufferings. God has made you "to stand abuse" with Paul. Learn to suffer want, opposition, persecution, and if need be "the loss of all things." Invest your lives in the great cause of Christ and join the ranks of the most illustrious souls who ever walked on this earth, "of whom the world was not worthy." But all must be done with a worthy motive, to which we now turn our attention.

III. "For My Sake and the Gospel"

Without this motive you may invest your life and your talents and possessions and lose all you invest, and your soul besides. This motive and this alone will sanctify and glorify your investment, and put you in line with all the mighty men who have given their all, and have entered into His glory. There is one great bank in which God wants you to make your deposit, and whose deposits He guarantees. It is the Bank of Heaven. If you deposit in the wrong bank, it may break and go down, and you and your investment go down with it. "For my sake," said Jesus, "and for the gospel's sake," He added, to help our understanding. But Christ and His gospel are one, and the same. What you do for Him, you do for the gospel; what you do for the gospel, you do for Him. This is the enterprise in which God is more interested than in all else, and in which Christ invested His life. In this great enterprise God is still investing His abounding grace; the Holy Spirit is giving us His guidance and power; and Christ is still interceding, mediating, advocating in heaven, and administering the affairs of His people on earth. You cannot give as much as a cup of water to one of His disciples and lose your reward. You may invest a million on the stock market and lose every penny overnight.

Mrs. Comstock, missionary to Arracan, bidding good by to her children, to send them home to be educated in the United States, remarked, as she wept, "This I do for Jesus' sake." What have brave souls not done, endured, and suffered for Jesus' sake? Paul who knew what suffering for the sake of Christ was, triumphantly asks, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ, shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, *For thy sake* we are killed all the day long, we are accounted as sheep for the slaughter. Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us."

For the sake of Jesus and the souls for whom He died, a noble army of missionaries have crossed the seas, have braved dangers in many forms, in many lands, among strange, unsympathetic, and even hostile pagans and savages, and hundreds, if not thousands during the past century have laid down their lives. Our hearts are thrilled as we think of Carey and Judson and Morrison and Paton and Captain Allen Gardiner and the seven heroic souls who died with him.

Soon some who are graduating tonight may be called forth to follow in their train. Already scores of our Pentecostal missionaries have laid down their lives on foreign shores. "For my sake and the gospel's." For His sake, sacrifices are easy.

"For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though He was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich." 2 Cor. 8:9.

Filled With Joy

Acts 13:52 tells us that "the disciples were filled with *joy*, and with the *Holy Ghost.*" Filled with joy because filled with the Holy Ghost. Where *one* is, the *other* is also in evidence.

Note the background to this joy. Verses 50, 51: "But the Jews stirred up the devout and honorable women, and the chief men of the city, and raised persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and expelled them out of their coasts. But they shook off the dust of their feet against them, and came unto Iconium. And the disciples were filled with joy, and with the Holy Ghost."

The best pictures have usually a dark background. This brings out the picture in greater relief, and adds beauty to the scene.

"The fruit of the Spirit is . . . joy." Gal. 5:22. "The kingdom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost." Rom. 14:17. The best definition of joy that I can think of is that of "calm delight." To be joyful is to be calmly happy. It is not a mere soulish emotion. It is a spiritual quality.

As Isa. 65:14 puts it, "Behold, my servants shall sing for joy of heart." Joy of heart usually ultimates in ecstatic songs of praise. *Ecstasy* or *rapture* may be defined as an overflow of joyous happiness. It goes without saying that divine joy is something that baffles all human analysis.

1. Joy is God-produced.

In Ezra 6:22 we are told that "the Lord had made them (Israel) joyful." And in Neh. 12:43 we are told that "God had made them rejoice with great joy." We find the Psalmist David stating a solid fact of Christian experience when he said, "In Thy presence is fulness of joy." Psalm 16:11. It is when we are in the conscious presence of God that joy springs up in our hearts.

2. Joy is something altogether independent of *circumstances* and *conditions*.

We never weary of repeating the words of Hab. 3:17, 18, "Although the fig tree shall not blossom, neither shall fruit be in the vines; the labor of the olive shall fail, and the fields shall yield no meat; the flock shall be cut off from the fold, and there shall be no herd in the stalls: yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will joy in the God of my salvation."

And Jesus, in the Sermon on the Mount, gave utterance to a marvelous truth when He said (Matt. 5:11, 12), "Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for My sake. Rejoice, and be exceeding glad: for great is your reward in heaven."

3. Joy is conditioned on our faith.

In Romans 15:13 we read, "Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing." And Peter in his First Epistle (1:8) says of Jesus, "Whom having not seen, ye love; in whom, though now ye see Him not, yet believing, ye rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory."

4. Joy is often linked with *tears* and *weep-ing*.

Weeping and tears oftentimes open up the

avenue for pure joy. Psalm 30:5 tells us that "weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning." And Psalm 126:5, 6 encourages us by the fact that "they that sow in tears shall reap in joy." "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

5. With joy comes strength.

Joy is linked with *strength*. Neh. 8:10 makes this clear, "The *joy* of the Lord *is* your *strength*." George Muller used to say, "In my waiting on God and His Word in the early morning, I sought for and obtained a 'joyful spirit'; for I found that this made me strong for the day's work and conflict." We will do well to "follow in his train."

6. Divine joy has its spring in "love of righteousness, and hatred of iniquity."

"Thou hast loved righteousness, and hated iniquity; therefore God, even Thy God, hath anointed Thee with the oil of gladness above Thy fellows." Psalm 45:7; Heb. 1:9. These words were spoken of the Son of God who was revealed as better than the *prophets*, and better than the *angels*.

We shall find it an experimental truth that the more we *love righteousness* and *hate* iniquity, the more shall we be anointed with the oil of joy and gladness. The oil of joy will lubricate the whole man; and will bring to us health, life, and gladness.


7. God is not pleased when we are *lacking* in joy.

We have a striking word relative to this in Deut. 28:47, 48: "Because thou servedst not the Lord with *joyfulness*, and with gladness of heart, for the abundance of all things; therefore shalt thou serve thine enemies which the Lord shall send against thee, in hunger, and in thirst, and in nakedness, and in want of all things."

8. Joy comes through *meditation* on the *Word*.

In Psalm 39:3 David says, "My heart was hot within me; while I was musing the fire burned." *Deep meditation* on the Word will bring *deep joy*.

The disciples who walked with Jesus to

Emmaus said, "Did not our heart burn within us, while He talked with us by the way, and while He opened to us the Scriptures?" And we will find our hearts will burn with joy and victory as He talks to us through His Word. See 1 John 1:4.

9. Sometimes our joy overflows.

Peter writes of *joy unspeakable* and *full* of *glory.*" 1 Peter 1:8. How often we have proved the truth of those words:

When we walk with the Lord,

In the light of His Word,

What a glory He sheds on our way!

Seven times in the Psalms we read, "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord." He is worthy of *perfect praise*.

10. There is the joy of *service*, and the joy of *suffering*.

Both are linked together in Acts 5:41. "And they departed from the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for His name." All down the church age to the present hour *real service* and *real suffering* have gone hand in hand; and I might also add, *real* glory.

Then-----

Shall I be carried to the skies On flowery beds of ease; While others fought to win the prize

And sailed through bloody seas?

As we face the future with its dark and threatening clouds of persecution and death, we shall need more and more the joy of the Lord to lift us above all these conditions, and to keep us victorious in Him.

11. A final word. Note that it was the *disciples* who were filled with joy.

A disciple is a *learner*—a *pupil*. Jesus said (Matt. 11:29), "Learn of Me; for I am meek and lowly in heart." It is the *meek* and *lowly* ones who are most filled with joy. Let us then enthrone Christ in our hearts, and yield ourselves to the Spirit's indwelling, and this joy will be ours.

the call sounds again, Preach the Word. Preach it in the power of the Spirit. Permit that momentum, that spiritual force never meant merely to rest in the bosom of the happy recipient to be released in witnessing in a host of channels.

Preach the Word! Get the message out. The tabernacle and other buildings that God has given us can be utilized to the fullest extent possible. Often at periods when it is not practical to bring in outside help, it is possible to have services going much of the week under the labors of anointed talent from local sources, or spiritual and promising young workers, without too heavy a burden upon the assembly. This keeps the doors open, instead of closed, lights shining out instead of darkness, and a fresh stream of new blood pouring into our ranks.

The time is short. The Spirit provides undreamed of momentum when given right of way. Faithfulness will be rewarded. *Preach the Word!* There was famine in Canaan. No matter how hard the sons of Jacob tried to produce a crop, it was a failure.

Then good news came. There was corn in Egypt. There was one raised up in that land who could supply all they needed. Bread enough and to spare. So they went down to Egypt to purchase provisions, and Joseph gave them all they needed. He showed great interest in them, and great concern for those nearest and dearest to them.

They thought they would have to pay for their corn. But their money was returned to them. The corn was provided without money and without price.

They went back to Canaan. But after they had eaten what they had brought, they were again in need. Nothing would grow in the land. They must go again to Joseph.

Then Joseph made himself known. He told them there would be yet further years of famine. They must come where he could take care of them. He would abundantly provide for them and theirs. They should have the best. They came. Jacob and his whole family were given the choice land of Goshen in which to dwell. Joseph did not fail to provide all they needed. Even occupation was provided for his brethren. They could serve the king.

There is a famine in the world—a famine not of the bread that perisheth but of the Word; of that "bread which cometh down from heaven, that a man may eat thereof and not die." John 6:50. Cheer up. There is a place where there is abundance. Go to the heavenly Joseph. He will provide abundantly. You may want to pay for the bread, but all is provided without money and without price. He tells you, "I am the living bread which came down from heaven: if any man eat of this bread he shall live for ever." John 6:51.

Do you think you can go back and live independently of your heavenly Joseph? You will soon find yourself in want again. You cannot live on the memory of an old experience. You will starve to death unless you keep returning to the only source of supply, to our lovely Christ of whom Joseph is but a type. He is interested in you and in every member of your family. He has suffered much, much more than Joseph, in order to prepare bread for you. He says, "The bread that I . . . give is my flesh, which I . . . give for the life of the world."

He will tell you that out in the world there is only famine. You must come and live near to Him. He will abundantly supply all requirements of yourself and your household. He Himself will be the land of Goshen in which you can live and move and have your being. He will give you occupation. You will be given a place in the service of the King, the task of feeding His lambs, of tending His sheep.

Ruth was given bountiful provision by Boaz. He said to her: "Bring the vail that thou hast upon thee, and hold it. And when she held it he measured six measures of barley and laid it on her: and

she went into the city." Ruth 3:15. She shared this wonderful provision with her needy, widowed mother-in-law.

Our heavenly Boaz will give you out of His bountiful store. You can take what He gives and share it with the needy.

Do you need wisdom, righteousness, sanctification, and redemption? He will provide. But you will find that provision is not something apart from Himself. He supplies Himself, and all you require you will find in Him, who will come and indwell you and be within you exceeding abundantly above all you ask or think.

If we turn to the second chapter of Leviticus we shall get a glimpse of our heavenly food. Here we are told of the "meat" offering, or as it is called in the Revised Version, the "meal" offering. Other offerings speak to us of the sacrificial death of Christ our Saviour, but this offering especially pictures His sacrificial life, a life that was always a sweet savor unto God. For even before He preached a single sermon or performed a single miracle or ministry, the Father spoke out from heaven in loving approval of the sweet odor of His life of lowly subjection, declaring: "Thou art My beloved Son; in Thee I am well pleased." Luke 3:22. Some think, "If I could only get out into

Some think, "If I could only get out into the ministry and win many souls to Christ, then I know my life would be pleasing to God." But a life of lowly subjection in the home, in the shop, in the factory, in the office, can be a sweet savor to God if only Christ is allowed to come in and be our all in all. How important it is that in these days when Bolshevism stalks the land, we learn the important lesson of 1 Peter 5:5: "Ye younger, *submit yourselves* unto the elder. Yea, all of you *be subject* one to another, and be *clothed with humility:* for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble."

See the ingredients of this offering. Fine flour—nothing coarse, nothing uneven. The fine flour speaks of suffering, of corn bruised and ground very fine. The Master says to us, "If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me." Luke 9:23. His was a daily cross, a daily life of suffering, of being misunderstood and maligned all the way to Calvary. If we are to be "even as He" we must not shirk the grinding, the suffering; for we can be encouraged to know that the sufferings of this present time are not to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us.

With the meal was oil—an ever blessed symbol of the Holy Spirit. Christ was anointed by the Spirit and all His words and ministry were in that power. And should we seek for less, when He has promised the same glorious provision for us?

Then there was the frankincense. Surely this speaks of the wondrous life of continuous anointing and prayer that Christ had with the Father. Note that all the frankincense was burned on the altar; His life of communion and prayer was all for God—a sweet frankincense unto Him.

Part of the fine flour and oil was offered to God and part was given to the priests. How wonderful it is that His anointed priests, (and every child of God is a priest. See 1 Peter 2:9), should be allowed to share with God in this heavenly provision. The priests were to feed in the holy place upon this holy offering, and in order to partake of this holy food the priest himself must be holy. As one old writer puts it, "Our position, our practice, our persons, our associations, must be holy ere we feed upon the meal offering."

As we read on in the chapter, there are other aspects of Christ. We see the offering "baken in a pan," and surely this speaks of the fiery trials which were His from Bethlehem to Calvary. And Peter reminds us, "Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: but rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that when His glory shall be revealed ye may be glad also with exceeding joy."

There was to be no leaven in the offering. Leaven everywhere in Scripture speaks of corruption, of evil, that which puffs up or inflates. There was nothing corruptible, nor sour, nor inflated in our lovely Christ. Even His body saw no corruption.

The Master bids us beware of the leaven of the Pharisees, of the Sadducees, and of the Herodians—of the wrong teaching of blind leaders of the blind. Let us, like the noble Bereans, compare everything we hear with the Scriptures of truth.

At passover time there must be no leaven in any house. If there were, the souls in that house would be cut off from Israel. Paul reminds us that Christ our passover is sacrificed for us, and bids us to purge out the old leaven, and keep the feast, not with the old leaven, neither with the leaven of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.

There was to be no honey in the offering. Honey would sour and ferment when placed upon the fiery altar. No, with Christ, instead of the souring honey, there was a fragrant frankincense, that which on the altar emitted a sweet savor to God. Natural sweetness will fail, but a life of holy communion and prayer will be truly pleasing to our God.

There was also to be salt in the offering. Constantly in Scripture we come across the phrase "the salt of the covenant." When two parties made a covenant of salt it was one of an enduring character—their friendship was to be an enduring one. In Christ is that which endures for ever. He bids us, "Have salt in yourselves"—the grace of endurance.

Salt speaks also of pungency. How pungent were the words of Christ. And through the apostle He bids us, "Let your speech be always with grace, seasoned with salt"—even as *His* words always were.

If we seek to live holy lives, we must be constantly in the holy place, living on the holy provision made by our holy God; feeding on the Word He has given that speaks of Him who is the living bread. Each day we can make our petition, "Give us this day our daily bread," and as we feed we shall become partakers of Christ.

An Address to University Students

by George Muller

"I too have been a university student. I have read all the Latin and Greek classics. I can talk Latin and Greek, can speak nearly all the European languages, can read Hebrew, Arabic, Syriac, and some other Oriental tongues, have studied mathematics, philosophy, chemistry, and such things.

"I am a graduate of the University of Halle. There were twelve hundred students in the University when I was there. For the most part they were a wild, swearing, beer-drinking sct. I was ringleader among them in their mad pranks. At that time there were but eight Christian students in the whole twelve hundred. We who were not Christians made it hard for them, but they were brave, manly fellows and had a weekly prayer meeting.

"Along toward the close of my university course something seemed to go wrong with me. I was not sick, and I had no misfortune, but I was unhappy. 'What's the matter with you, George?' I asked myself. 'You are not studying hard enough,' I decided. I studied harder than ever, but still I was not happy. 'Go more into society.' I went into society, but my unhappiness continued. 'Why, George, are you going crazy? You need new scenery and associations.' So I took my staff and tramped down into Switzerland, where I expected surely to drop my burden, but I did not.

"I grew frightened and hurried back to Halle, and took up my studies again. But my burden grew heavier and heavier. At last I remembered the eight Christians and their prayer meeting. I sought one of them whom I knew, and said, 'Carl, you have a prayer meeting?' 'Yes.' 'Where do you hold it?' 'I shall not tell you.' 'Why not?' 'You know very well, George, you only wish to mock and scoff.' 'Upon my word, Carl, I do not.' I finally convinced him that I was in earnest and he told me the place of meeting.

"I was promptly on hand at the hour. A chapter in the Bible was read, a few prayers were offered, some remarks were made, and the prayer meeting was over. But I detained the young men and told them my case. I said, 'I

do not know if it is what you have that I need, but tell me what it is.'

"One and another told me of Christ. They prayed with me, and I prayed for myself. At last I saw Christ as my Saviour. I believed on Him, and gave myself to Him. The burden rolled from off me, and a great love for Christ filled my soul. That was more than fifty years ago. I loved Jesus Christ then, but I loved Him more the year after, and more the year after that, and more every year since. How much I love Him now I could not begin to tell you. Jesus Christ is my great and glorious and adorable God and Saviour, whose love fills my soul."

After his university course George Muller was led to open an Orphans' Home in Bristol, England. He determined to trust God alone for his needs, never asking others for help, and never to go in debt. This he did, and although at first the work was limited, God sent him money and he was able to build new Homes from time to time until he was providing for 2,100 orphans. During fifty years more than five million dollars came in 'answer to prayer, most of this being spent to build and maintain the Orphans' Home and the rest going to other worthy causes.

In his ninety third year he wrote: "I have been for sixty-eight years a lover of the Word of God, and that uninterruptedly. During this time I have read considerably more than one hundred times through the whole Bible, with great delight. I have for many years read Old and New Testaments with prayer and meditation four times every year."

Christ can truly satisfy the heart of a university student, and the life that admits Him as Saviour and Lord can become a channel of untold blessing.

IRRELIGION

Reported an English religious leader: "It is calculated that not more than 5 per cent of London's population is greatly concerned with church going."

MODERN SANHEDRIN

A Jewish court of justice has recently opened in Manhattan, New York, for the hearing of cases involving religious matters. For certain grave matters the rabbis will call in 20 colleagues to form a small Sanhedrin, or 100 rabbis for a large Sanhedrin.

RUMORS OF WAR

Says Prophecy: "Between now and midsummer of 1941, American taxpayers will spend close to four billion dollars for national defense. Their money will buy: a streamlined navy roughly matching the British navy and far outstripping any third navy afloat; an air force of 9,000 planes, held large enough to aid effectively in repelling any attack on the Western Hemisphere."

DANGER

Dr. Chas. G. Trumbull, editor of The Sunday School Times, writes: "It is a dangerous thing to attack the Jews. It is worse than dangerous -it is deadly. It may, or may not, mean disaster to those Jews that are attacked; but it must mean disaster to those who do the attacking. From this there is no escape. For God has given His word in the matter, and God never breaks His word."

CHURCH UNION

Recently the Northern and Southern branches of the Methodist churches united. Comments L. A. Reed:

"In the Great Uniting Conference about to close here in Kansas City, it is the opinion of the writer that the Southern Methodists have dominated the conference. They have occupied the 'Amen Corner,' and have given it a real spiritual and evangelistic flavor, especially in the early watch and four o'clock services. We pray it may dominate the new union."

CLOSED SYNAGOGUES

Reports Jewish Chronicle: "The old Danzig Synagogue, known as the Mattenbuden Temple, has been seized by the local Nazis and converted into a fire station. The Nazis have now begun the demolition of the Danzig Great Synagogue. The building is boarded up, with a notice: 'The Synagogue is to be demolished,' over the entrance. The boarding outside bears the ominous inscription: 'Come, dear May, and set us free from the Jews,' indicating that a Nazi coup is expected during the present month."

WAR INVENTIONS

According to a writer in Redemption Tidings: Two patents recently issued were for anti-aircraft projectiles, one to follow a beam of light until it strikes, the other to track its victim down by following sound.

"An attack by enemy planes is guarded against by anti-aircraft guns which will automatically fire as soon as the approaching aircraft intercepts an infra-red beam aimed at the same point as the gun.

"Another patent exploits the photo-electric cell principle, which when attached to a torpedo will cause it to explode when it gets within the shadow of the ship. Bullet dodging will be pretty futile in the next war."

He comments: "Inventors of evil things (Rom. 1:30) need to be reminded of something else that is designed to pursue until it overtakes . the righteous judgment of God. The Scripture says, 'Be sure your sin will find you out.''

MAN-MADE HELLS

In Russia and Germany the dominant political party seems to be a kind of substitute for the church, having as its "saviour" the political head, as its Bible the official writings, and as its "hell" the concentration camps for those who reject the 'gospel" of the head of the State.

Reports Time: "Too many alumni have emerged from concentration camps with the same story to leave any further doubt that brutality is part and parcel of the concentration camp routine. whipping post is used freely; men are forced to run while carrying heavy loads, are prodded by bayonets if they fall out of step. A sport of the guards is to throw Jewish boys into latrines and push their heads under with rifle butts."

THE SCATTERED NATION

Over 244,000 Jews have left the German Reich up to the beginning of the year, reports the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. Of these, Asia, including Palestine, and the United States have absorbed 50,000 each. In Europe, France received 20,000, and Great Britain, Switzerland, and Holland 12,000 each. Altogether, European countries took 96,000 refugees; American lands 90,000; Asia, including Palestine, 50,-Two 000; Africa, 6,000, and Australasia, 2,000. thousand refugees were admitted to Sweden in the last two months, stated Dr. Westman, Swedish Minister of Justice, in Parliament last week. The majority of them were Jews. About half of the refugees have received permission to stay in the country until arrangements are made for them to emigrate elsewhere. Four hundred Jewish refugees from Germany, Czechoslovakia, and Poland sailed from La Pallice, France, for South America, within the last few weeks. Another 800 are to leave shortly.

WHERE SHALL THEY GO?

A circular sent out by "The Christian Friends of Palestine" states: "Congestion of population provides an excuse for aggression and expansion. It is generally conceded that Europe is in a turmoil because Europe is over-crowded.

"In this over-crowded Europe, six million Jews are being libelled, besmirched, hounded, spoiled, tormented, massacred. Their wives and daughters violated, their synagogues sacked, their books burned, their holy scrolls-the tablets of the lawdefiled. Their God-our God-the God of Christendom blasphemed. These Jews and their ancestors have lived in Europe for more than two thousand years, but now they must go as if they were aliens, pariahs, nomads. It is bootless to speak of justice, or to plead for mercy before the fiends of hell. Millions of Jews must emigrate. Where shall they go?

"Various territories have been suggested as possible centers of colonization for Jews. An empty Near East, and especially Palestine as an actual center for Jewish colonization is the best answer to WHERE THEY SHALL GO.

"Why Palestine?" This circular continues:

"Because in the last forty years the Jews have poured into the land \$500,000,000 and 500,000 men, and have with their money, their sweat and their blood changed Palestine from a barren backward land to a fertile country, vying with the most progressive centers of modern civilization.

"Because the devolpment of Palestine has opened up widened economic frontiers for the whole Near East.

"Because Palestine is the most readily accessible, easily reached country open for refugee colonization.

"Because Palestine historically has been the home of the Jewish people from the Bible times unto this day.

"Because fifty-two nations recognized this historic claim of the Jewish people to Palestine and solemnly affirmed the right of the Jews to settle there."

The British government has just declared its decision to make Palestine an Arab-dominated state in which one third of the population may be Jews. Jewish immigration will be restricted to maintain this proportion. Britain's chief motive is to gain the support of the Moslem world in case of a European conflict.

DAUGHTER OF ZION MOURNS

Naturally the Arabs are elated, but the Jews are dejected. The day of the proclamation has been called "the darkest day in Jewish history." Pious Jews fasted! great demonstrations were held, acts of violence were committed. Jews threatened a campaign of non-cooperation and some threatened armed resistance. It is easy to understand this disappointment on the part of an oppressed people to whom so many lands are closing.

The Jews' attempts to build their homeland has experienced and will experience many setbacks. Only the Lord their God can bring full deliverance to the land.

TRAGIC ISOLATION Rabbi Solomon B. Freehof, Atlantic City, N. J. stated in a recent lecture: "The great sorrow of the Jews in Nazi Germany is their enforced isolation. A few years ago the German Jews were part of German life in almost all its phases. They participated in its literature, in its drama, in its business, in its professional and academic life. Now they are ruthlessly excluded from the body social and cultural. Jewish school-children sit on ghetto benches. Jewish professionals may not associate with their fellows. Jewish business men are boycotted and isolated. They are forced to walk down the side streets of German cities and to live like pariahs, scorned and alone. This isolation, so tragic, in Germany, finds its reverberation all over the Western world. A new loneliness has over-taken Jewish life. The average Jew begins to feel that he is singled out for scorn and for suffering, that he must bear a heavy burden alone. Truly, it is not good for man to be alone and the Jewish soul is lacerated by the new sense of worldwide isolation and exile."

WHAT OTHERS ARE SAVING

We remember our first visit to his home. His mother told us she didn't know any more about God than a post could know, even though she was a good Catholic! She was the first one to be converted and has been baptized in water.

Encouragement to Weary Workers

Recently seven obeyed the Lord's command and followed Him in water baptism. God is good to give us such encouragement. There are many who are hard of heart and hearing. It seems as though these have been snatched as brands from the burning. The people are in great darkness; some not knowing the truth, others realizing the deceit of their religion but rejecting light.

They are full of self-righteousness. Real tears of repentance are rarely seen. The people come because they are persuaded of a better way; then, through much teaching, they are led to the light. We are glad for the Pentecostal way, for, as we teach them to seek deeper experiences, they do receive assurance of sins forgiven and great blessing.

Carnival Time

The people have just celebrated Carnival again. At this time almost everything is forgotten except dress, masks, and wine. They use decorations made to represent all manner of characters and every imagination of the devil's likeness. These are not objects of adoration of course, but serve to reveal some of the paganism that makes up the Catholic religion.

These seven who have recently been brought out of darkness into the light of salvation through Jesus Christ are the first in the city of Mendoza, Argentina, to take the step of water baptism.

Many Services

We have a prayer service every morning, Sunday School and two other services on Sunday, Bible study on Tuesday, preaching service on Wednesday, and prayer meeting on Friday. We hope to open another hall very soon, as one hall serves a very small section.

We are also especially interested in the Jews, of whom there is a large group in Mendoza. We pray God will enable us to bring to them the true salvation of our Lord Jesus Christ.—W. F. Dunbar.

ON SAFARI IN LIBERIA Lois Shelton

Going home! Going **home!** Going HOME! How our hearts thrill at the thought! It seemed we had been away so long—away from our black friends, our converts, our coworkers, away from the field to which God had sent us and which we had learned to love as home.

At last all was ready and we were to leave on the last lap of our long journey to Faloka. All through January we had been sending loads to Faloka, hoping to have them all up before we came, and bringing only necessary camping equipment along with us. When the hammock men showed up, all their wives and children came too! And each begged for something to carry!

As we still had some large boxes left, there was a final scramble to repack into suitable weights; then each chose one, and started on the twenty-three mile walk back to Blebo where he would receive his load the next morning. Mrs. Simmons and Joan also wanted to return to Faloka; and, as thirty-two hammock men appeared instead of the sixteen needed, they came and brought the main part of our wood cook-stove also.

Journey's Start

Before dawn we left in the truck for Blebo, arriving just at sunrise. The carriers soon gathered around to receive their burdens, hammock men were sorted out, small articles distributed, and away we went, over sixty people strung out along the trail.

We had hoped to make good time the first day in order to make the second a little easier. Instead, it took us **only** two and a half hours to finish lunch!

Night of Rest (?)

Early in the evening we reached a small village, and, according to custom, were parked with our loads in front of the chief's hut. He soon provided us with two small mud huts for our lodging. We set up our cots, hung mosquito nets, put up table and chair, and cooked supper on the little kerosene stove. We had to light a lantern quite early as the three doors were filled with observers!

"The smell of the white man is sweet," they say, meaning that they like to be near us and see what we do. When we finally retired, we felt perfectly safe, but piled some tins in front of the open doors so that we should know if the town goats decided to occupy the house with us.

Homecoming

Early in the morning we were up, picking the rice—which rats scampering in the loft had showered down—out of our hair. Soon we were hastening up hill and down, over streams on foot logs, through the cool jungle and the broiling hot sun. Bodies were weary, feet heavy, but our hearts were light for we were

Less than a year ago Brother and Sister W. F. Dunbar located in Mendoza and opened this neat and attractive gospel hall. A number of people have been won for the Lord in these few months and the good seed of the gospel has been planted in many hearts. nearing home. At five o'clock we crossed the Gee River and began to climb up the long hill to the mission station.

Natives called out greetings or hastened to shake hands. At last, home! dirty, doors nailed shut, boxes piled high, but home nevertheless! And joy filled our hearts as we thanked God for bringing us back to the field of our labors for Him.

School begins very soon and we shall be teaching. Also, there will be the village work, language study, and all the many, many duties of the missionary. Pity the poor missionary who is not a jack-of-all-trades, as everything from preaching to putting up a cook-stove will surely fall to her lot! But praise God who giveth strength for the job, and joy in its commission!

ADVANCE IN FREETOWN

Brother and Sister Oman send greetings and good news from Sierra Leone. We rejoice with them as God moves in saving and baptizing power in their midst. "We did not have any tarrying services,"

"We did not have any tarrying services," writes Brother Oman, "until we were able to teach the Christians about the Holy Spirit. With a little teaching we were able to show them from the Word that the Spirit is a person, and that they should tarry for Him.

"Since the beginning of our study early in March nineteen have been filled with the Holy Spirit at the various services. New Appointment for Egypt

For many years Brother Cadwalder has felt God had further ministry for him in Egypt; in fact this conviction has been with him more or less continuously since his first visit to that land. A special request from the Executive Committee of the Egyptian District Council was that our Brother Cadwalder should be sent to the field as its Superintendent; so we are accepting these facts as indications of the will of God and sending Mr. and Mrs. Cadwalder forth with our prayers for God's blessing on their ministry. Funds will be needed for their transportation and support.

Deputational Workers

Early in June Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Williams will be in again. They are covering the Tennessee District in deputation work, speaking on world missions, seeking to revive missionary zeal in the older assemblies and to create a world-wide vision in many assemblies where there has never been a missionary. Good reports are coming to us of Brother and Sister Williams' work in the Southeastern states, and as a consequence the first missionary offerings ever to be taken in some of these assemblies are now coming in to our office.

Your Remittance

While speaking of missionary offerings, we might mention that contributors often enquire of us which is the best form in which to send their money to the Missions Department. We would say that it is never safe to send a large amount of currency in a letter unless it is registered. The best way is to send a money order or check, made payable to "Noel Perkin" or "The Foreign Missions Department." It is reasonably safe to send a small amount in stamps.

Our Missions Department staff is busy these days preparing reports and compiling data concerning missionary giving in the various assemblies and districts in response to the many requests we receive for such information. We want each assembly to receive credit for all missionary money sent in, and believe that a word to the secretaries of the assemblies might help in this connection:

It is necessary that the correct and complete name of an assembly be given each time an offering is sent in from that assembly in order that we may give proper credit. For example: If an offering comes in one month from "The Assembly of God" in a certain town, and the next month an offering comes in from the same town under the name of "Gospel Tabernacle," we are unable to know whether these are two different churches or whether the secretary has made a mistake in the name of his assembly. If an assembly should change its name, it is important that we be notified. Sometime this summer we shall have, available for your help and interest, a series of maps showing our various mission fields with a few important statistics and pictures of the missionaries working in the respective fields. Further announcement will be made when they are ready.

Home Mission Workers

It was a real homecoming for Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Solmes when they returned to Springfield with their little son, Marcus, for Commencement, since they both attended school here and Mrs. Solmes graduated with the class of 1935. They have been working for the last three years among the Navajo Indians of Arizona and New Mexico.

Calls continue coming to us from Brazil for missionary help, but inasmuch as our Scandinavian Pentecostal friends have been largely responsible for the Pentecostal missionary activities in that field, we have been cautious not to encourage many new workers unless there should be some special indication of God's hand in the case.

Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Kolenda, who have had a most successful ministry in Michigan and other parts of the United States, feel God has spoken to them about going to Brazil. Brother Kolenda has occupied an official position in the Central District as well as being an able evangelist and pastor. He has formerly lived in Brazil and besides speaking English speaks not only Portuguese (the language of Brazil) but also Spanish and German. We feel the appointment of Brother and Sister Kolenda to missionary work in Brazil is going to prove of blessing and advancement to the work in that land.

The Nigeria Call Answered

Mr. and Mrs. Everett Phillips, who have been in charge of one of the Assemblies in Alton, Illinois, felt in our appeal for Nigeria a special call to their own hearts. Fourteen years ago Mrs. Phillips saw in vision the land of Nigeria as the field to which God was sending her, and Brother Phillips likewise has felt the call to Africa for many years. They have been approved for appointment, and hope to sail in September. We were happy to have them as guests attending Central Bible Institute Commencement exercises.

Another important response to the Nigeria call has been the willingness of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Shirer to pioneer this new endeavor. Mr. and Mrs. Shirer have had considerable experience in missionary work in Africa, having pioneeered in both Mossiland and Gold Coast. Their address after June will be Ikot Ekpene, Nigeria. We thank the dear friends who have been sending money for this new field and helping to make possible the reaching of many thousands for God.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSO

The Crucifixion of Christ

Lesson for June 25, 1939. Lesson Text: Matt. 27:22-56.

Pilate's Great Question. "What shall I do then with Jesus which is called Christ?" There are but two sides to the Christian issue. "For" or "against." "He that is not with Me is against Me; and he that gathereth not with Me scattereth abroad." Matt. 12:30. Thus spake the Saviour in the days of His flesh. Poor Pilate tried, like so many do today, to find a third side, a middle ground, a neutral position. But to do nothing about Christ, is to be eternally lost, even as Paul warned the "do nothings" of his day, saying, "How shall we escape, if we neglect (to neglect is to do nothing) so great salvation?" Heb. 2:3.

The Issue Cannot Be Evaded. Pilate tried to

shrug off the issue, but it wouldn't work. He tried to wash it off with his futile water-and-basin act, but neither did that work. He had come to the crisis of his hife, as we all do sooner or later—he must *choose* between Christ on the one side and the world and self on the other. He must either, fall on this Rock and be broken, or else it will fall upon him and grind him to powder. Matt. 21:44. He refused to *break* his selfish will and abandon his ambitious plans and he became broken.

Pilate's Sad End. As a broken man, Pilate was soon recalled to Rome by Cæsar. Broken in spirit, in health, and tormented in conscience, tradition tells us he roamed the Italian Alps, a conscience-stricken wretch. Finally he took his own life by plunging over a cliff. We can accept Christ, or deliberately reject Him—but we cannot ignore Him. "What will YOU do with Jesus who is called the Christ?"

The Power of the Word. At our evangelistic service this past Sunday night, a man and wife knelt at the altar to surrender their hearts to our wonderful Saviour. The man said: "I was able to shrug off all the conviction of the sermon, until you quoted those verses: "Whosoever therefore shall confess Me before men, him will I confess also before my Father which is in heaven. But whosoever shall deny Me before men, him will I also deny be-


deny Me before men, him will I also deny before my Father which is in heaven.' Matt. 10:32, 33. 'Whosoever therefore shall be ashamed of Me and of My words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him also shall the Son of man be ashamed, when He cometh in the glory of His Father with the holy angels.' Mark 8:38." He said, "They got me."

Children of the Exile. "Then answered all the people, and said, His blood be on us, and on our children." They cried, "Away with Him -crucify Him." They boldly claimed they would take the consequences. Thus they showed how sure they felt that they were in the right, and consequently that no evil consequences would ensue!

The Sequel. But what has been the history of this people ever since? Many who that day watched the Saviour die, lived to see Jerusalem and the Holy Land, sacked and destroyed by the Roman Legions in 70 A. D. Josephus, a Jewish historian, informs us, that at that time hundreds of thousands of Jews were crucified outside the walls of Jerusalem. And the people who made of their Messiah an exile from His world have been international exiles ever since. We say this not to judge nor condemn them, not to stir prejudice against them—God forbid, but to warn our hearts as individual Jews or Gentiles, that we cannot reject the Son of God without suffering the consequences!

At this time, the poor Jews are experiencing another of their weary heartbreaking expulsions from European countries, to become poor exiles. What a glad day it will be when Zech. 12:10 shall be fulfilled. "And I will pour upon the house of David, and upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem, the Spirit of grace and of supplications: and they shall look upon Me whom they have pierced, and they shall mourn for Him, as one mourneth for his only son."

Simon Bearing the Cross. "And as they came out, they found a man of Cyrene, Simon by name: him they *compelled* to bear His cross." Armor-clad soldiers of Rome compelled black Simon, from Africa, to bear the cross, whether



he would or not. Not so our blessed Jesus. He compels none, but invites all to bear the cross. "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me." Matt. 16:24.

Bearing—Not Wearing—His Cross. In our day there exists a positive mania for wearing the cross. Worldly women young and old, painted like ancient Jezebel, with a cigarette stuck between their carmined lips or daintily held in their blood-tipped fingers, wear a prominent cross about their necks. It almost seems as though by that means Satan seeks to mock the sacredness of the true Cross of Christ and cheapen its value! Beloved, let us *live* the Cross in our lives! Let us *bear* His cross, His reproach, His persecution.

Three Crucifixions. Hear Paul cry: "But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world." Gal. 6:14.

1. Christ is crucified.

2. I (self) am crucified.

3. The world is crucified unto me.

Many have not learned how to be "crucified with Christ." Gal. 2:20. There is a blessed cure for every evil of spirit, soul and body at Calvary's Cross. Let us be crucified with Christ, and then we shall be crucified unto the world," so that its opinions and reactions will not affect us. Furthermore the appeal, the false glamour of the world, will no longer entice, for the world will be crucified unto us!—Harry J. Steil.

THE SPIRIT OF JESUS

Some young Christians, students of Olivet College, were traveling along one of the main highways of Illinois when a large automobile crowded them from the highway, wrecking their car and causing some personal injuries. They were unable to secure the license number of the car responsible for the wreck. Interested observers gave a license number, insisting that the car bearing those numbers was responsible for the wreck. The driver of this car was apprehended by law officers some miles down the highway and was held until the young folks involved in the wreck could appear against him. When these young people saw the man and his car they recognized that he was not the guilty person, that his

car was of an entirely different make from the one responsible for the wreck. The driver and car were from California and, being a stranger in the state, he expected that he would be made the victim, although he was not responsible for the accident. When the Christian young people informed the officers that they had apprehended the wrong man and insisted that he be dismissed, this driver was greatly surprised. "Do you mean that you are not going to charge me with this accident?" he inquired. The young people insisted they had no charge to lay against him. He said, "This act is more like the spirit of Jesus than anything I have ever seen." He was so much pleased that he took from his purse thirty dollars to assist the young folks to repair their car, and further commended them for their honesty and Christian spirit.

A CHANGED ATTITUDE

The following is the testimony of Dr. Wieman of Chicago University, long known as a modernist of the modernists:

"I see some things I did not ten years ago. New objects of sight are sin, grace, the living Christ. My awakening to the profound depth of sin and grace may be the key to all the other changes I have undergone in

A Rich Inheritance

In Prov. 30:15 we read, "The horseleach hath two daughters, crying, Give, give." The horseleach will suck out your blood, taking everything and giving nothing. May the Lord save us from this spirit of ever asking Him to give, give, give, and at the same time being unwilling to give anything to Him in return.

Paul prays for the saints that they might be filled with the spirit of wisdom and revelation in the knowledge of the Lord, and that the eyes of their understanding (their heart) might be enlightened, that they might know what is the hope of Christ's calling, and what the riches of the glory of His inheritance in the saints. We have a wonderful inheritance in Christ, but He has inheritance in us. "The Lord's portion is His people." Deut. 32:9.

One time the writer lived in South Africa and often visited the gold mines. A few acres of ground on that Johannesburg Rand would be very valuable, a rich inheritance. But the saints are of more value to Christ than all the acreage to be found in the South African gold mines. Every saint of God is a true gold mine to Him. Job said, "When He hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold." Job 23:10. You do not find gold in lumps on the surface of those South African mines. It is in the hard quartz and this has to be broken and ground very fine before the gold can be extracted. We need to be broken, but thank God, a broken heart and a contrite spirit He will in nowise despise. In many mines only about three ounces of gold can be found in a ton of quartz. Perhaps He finds the gold in less proportion in us. Much has to be removed before He can get to the gold.

After the gold is extracted from the quartz it has to be refined. The Lord sits as a refiner of the saints. There is much dross to be removed. Job in his refining process said, "He performeth the thing that is appointed for me: and many such things are with Him." Many refining processes. Let us submit to these until the Refiner can see His own likeness in the gold.

Paul prayed that our eyes might be enlightened that we may see the rich inheritance He has in us. He also prayed that we might know the greatness of His power to usward. As we are wholly yielded to Him, His power will be manifested. Has He not promised that as we have faith in Him, the very works that He did we shall do also, and greater works than these, because He has gone to the Father?

Let us pray constantly that we may have the spirit of wisdom and revelation in the knowledge of Christ; that the eyes of our heart may be enlightened that we may know what is the hope of His calling, the riches of the glory of His inheritance in the saints, and the exceeding greatness of His power to usward who believe. --S. Major Brandi estimated that in brief, strongly resisted attacks, daily casualties per 100 fighting men would be as high as 15, in prolonged battle, five to seven for attackers, four to six for defenders; that 20% of the wounded would be gas cases (compared to 15% in 1918)."
