# Brother Welch Promoted to Higher Service 

(2)EAR Brother Welch has gone to be with the Lord he loved so well. It must have been a very joyful moment for him when he slipped into the arms of Jesus. He was in the arms of Brother Fred Vogler when, with a triumphant Amen, he left us to be forever with the Lord.

We somehow like to picture the scene on the other side. The thing that has characterized dear Brother Welch throughout the years of his Christian life has been his faithfulness. We are sure that the Master has appreciated this outstanding characteristic of His servant and has greeted him with the words, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." And what a joy that is! It will be well worth all the misunderstandings, all the trials, all the testings. And it will not be a transient joy, but a joy that will last throughout endless ages of eternity.
Brother Welch was born in Seneca. New York on November 13, 1858. His father ran an Erie Canal boat. When he was a year old his parents moved to Rockford, New York. There he was brought up and was married, and it will be remembered that on January 25 he celebrated his Diamond Wedding anniversary, having lived with dear Mother Welch for sixty years. He had been to the same school with her.
It was after they had married and when he was about twenty-five years of age that both he and his wife got saved in the same meeting in Rochelle, New York. As soon as he was saved Brother Welch began to work for the Lord, and the department of work that he most enjoyed was that of the Sunday School.
The American Sunday School Union recognized in Brother Welch a very excellent laborer and set him apart to open new Sunday Schools, and he had a most successful year in organizing new Sunday Schools for them. He felt, though, that he was not qualified to serve in this ministry and retired from it, and after spending a year in Virginia he went to Schenectady, New York,
where during the day-time he served the General Electric Company, but every night he was serving the Lord in the open air and in mission work. He was especially interested in work in the slums. His was a real soul-saving ministry.
In those days of his early Christian life Brother Welch learned a most important lesson, and that was to ask the Lord to take full control of his mind and his thought life. During the whole of the day he would be reminded to look up at the clock every five minutes, and each time he would commit his mind afresh to the Lord that all of his thoughts might be truly of God. He looked to the Lord to send to his bench hungry souls who needed God and he had the joy

of leading to the Lord many among his coworkers in the General Electric plant.
When he was forty-one years of age he was attending a convention of the Christian and Missionary Alliance at Nyack, New York. He was told by the Alliance leaders, "Brother Welch, you are fully qualified for ordination, and we are going to ordain you." He had not sought this but somehow felt that the Lord was in the desire of the brethren, and he was ordained to be a minister of the gospel.
The Lord made him to know that it was His desire that he should go to Oklahoma, and in 1910 he was sent by the Christian and Missionary Alliance to "superintend" the Oklahoma District. But he found himself the only Alliance minister in Oklahoma. He had a meeting every night for sixteen weeks in a tent. After the summer he took a hall downtown, holding service every night and a prayer meeting at noon. He saw many souls won to the Lord.

There came to Muskogee a band of Pentecostal pioneers, with Brother A. B. Cox (now of Dayton, Ohio) as leader. Brother Welch was convinced that he needed the Baptism in the Spirit and tarried before the Lord for the enduement of power from on high. However it was not until November, 1911 that he received this experience. At that time Brother W. T. Gaston, who was a complete stranger, came to see him one day. Brother Gaston had a work at Tahlequah, Oklahoma, and invited him there for a meeting, and from that time forward Daddy was a Pentecostal preacher out and out. He became pastor at Galena, Kansas, and became greatly endeared to the saints there. He also had some ministry at Baxter Springs, Kansas.

In April, 1914 the call came for the gathering at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and Brother Welch, who had the vision of a united fellowship, went to this meeting. He was one of the committee chosen to draft the original constitution of the General Council.

After the Hot Springs meeting he held a pastorate at Essex, Mis-

The homegoing of our beloved Brother Welch strikes deeply at my own heart and the hearts of my entire family. For twentyfive years we have had the most intimate relationship with Brother and Sister Welch. Upon his election as General Superintendent in St. Louis, Mo. in the fall of 1915, he took up his residence in St. Louis. A short time later we leased a large home owned by the Salvation Army, formerly used as a children's home, and we called it, "The Evangel Home." Brother and Sister Welch occupied an apartment on the first floor. My family occupied the apartment directly above them on the second floor. Brother and Sister Frodsham were living in an apartment in the rear. Other helpers in the headquarter work were distributed over the remaining rooms of the home. We all ate at a common table, shared the labor of home life, met before the throne of grace in prayer daily and had a thousand and one daily contacts, sharing our joys and our sorrows together. Our children looked upon him as a grandfather. We all called him "Uncle Will," and to many he was known even to the present day as "Daddy Welch."

Those early days were filled with struggles and labors which are common to any pioneer work. The General Council had only been organized a few months before. The fellowship was not large, and the circulation of the Pentecostal Evangel was quite small. It was a battle to keep afloat financially and to develop those interests which have since proven to be such a great blessing to so many thousands of our people. We learned to suffer together, to labor beyond all normal working hours, and our faith was increased together as we prayed through, met God and conquered all obstacles.

Daddy Welch had a clear vision of the principles of co-operative fellowship and his influence went far in those early days for the laying of a sound foundation in the building of the Assemblies of God.

He was a great lover of men. I shall never forget the day when a report reached us of the awful failure of one of our younger preachers, how he fell on his face by his desk and groaned and wept before God. No censure or unkind criticism-just a broken heart and a tender compassion. Such failures happen in any church fellowship, they are to be expected, and yet when they did come, the effect was always the same-a broken heart and a cry for mercy from God.

His vision for the development of the fellowship was great. He was years beyond his brethren in these matters. Because the brethren lagged behind, they misunderstood the effort that was made in 1925 and he was permitted to step aside from the General Superintendency of the General Council and to enter pastoral work on the Pacific coast. Before his death he was heard to express his conviction that God was even in that disappointment, it was all a necessary part of God's dealing with his life. At the General Council in San

Francisco in 1931, the brethren had begun to catch up with the vision of "Daddy Welch" and so he was returned to Springfield that in his declining years he might give of his wisdom and experience to the headquarters work. It was a splendid gesture and compensated in some measure for the misunderstandings of the past.

There is one other incident which stands out quite forcibly in my memory. Back in the year 1923, while Brother E. N. Bell was serving as General Superintendent, he was sent to the Rocky Mountain District on official business. For some time Brother Bell had been suffering in his body without knowing the true cause of his trouble. He was compelled to cut short his ministry and return to his own home. Brother Welch, filled with concern, called on Brother Bell and they opened their hearts to each other. While they were sitting in conversation, in the front room of Brother

Bell's home, suddenly Brother Bell was stricken with a heart attack and slumped to the floor. Brother Welch tenderly gathered him in his arms, and there the spirit of Brother Bell slipped away to be with Christ. A short time later I arrived upon the scene. I shall never forget the expression on Brother Welch's face and the tones of his breaking voice as he told of Brother Bell breathing his last in his arms.

And now Brother Welch has gone on also, following Brother Bell and Brother D. W. Kerr, both of whom had so vital a part in the early days of our General Council fellowship. We know that heaven is all the richer by his coming. And we too who are left behind have a rich heritage from our many years of association and labor together in the bonds of the Gospel. And all who had known our precious brother can add a hearty "Amen!"

In the promotion of Brother Welch we have lost a foundation stone upon which the General Council was founded, a father in the Lord, one blessed with keen judicial sense, a man of clear cut experience and conviction, a proved pillar in times of crisis. He stood at the forefront of the Movement in its formative days. More recently as President of Central Bible Institute and Executive Presbytery he has been made a great blessing to his coworkers.
while his knowledge of the dealings of God through a life consecrated to His service enriched the lives of all who had any intimate contact with him.
In talking with him a few days prior to his passing to be with the Lord, I remarked on the sadness of losing the treasures of knowledge and experience stored up in the mind and heart of one like himself. "Well," he replied, "there is not so much place for old folks, neither is it possible for them to try and keep pace with a younger generation, but there are some things I have learned throughout my life which cannot be learned from textbooks. But to learn to co-operate in what God is doing means everything."

## The Chtistian and Wat

War does not fit in with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ. This is in accordance with the Christian teaching of the first three centuries, as shown in the writings of Justin Martyr, Irenæus, Tertullian, Origen, Athanasius, Lactantius and Basil. Tertullian wrote that Christians ought not to hold office nor yet serve in the army. "Jesus Christ, by disarming Peter, disarmed every soldier afterwards. Can one who professes the peaceful doctrine of the Gospel be a soldier, when it is his duty not so much as to go to law? Our religion teaches us that it is better to be killed than to kill." Clement of Alexandria mentioned that "those who were the followers of peace use none of the instruments of war." Origen wrote: "We no longer take a sword against a nation, nor do we learn any more to make war, having become sons of peace for the sake of Jesus. Numbers suffered martyrdom rather than accept military service, saying (to use the words of one early martyr) : "I cannot serve as a soldier; I am a Christian."

# Happy Remembrances of Brother Welch By Fred Vogler 

My first contact with Brother J. W. Welch dates back to the year 1916 when I met him in a convention in St. Louis. In those early days the Gospel Publishing House and our General Headquarters were located in St. Louis. Since my first meeting with Brother Welch a very close friendship has existed between us. His life and ministry have been a wonderful example to me.

A much closer association with Brother Welch came in 1920 when he and Brother E. N. Bell asked me to come to Springfield and build a church on the site of the present enlarged church. Well do I remember that, as a group of brethren stood together on the very plot of ground where the Central Assembly is now located, Brother Welch lifted up his voice and quoted the scripture, "Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price." I also assisted in doing some of the work in the original Gospel Publishing House in Springfield.

After Brother Welch left the office of Chairman of the General Council in 1925, he made his headquarters in Kansas and for a time was pastor of our assembly in Galena. At that time I was District Superintendent and he became one of our District officials.

Brother Welch has always been noted for his wisdom as a counsellore, and his valued advice to me from time to time has had a great influence on my life and ministry. On my coming to Springfield almost two years ago, our association became very close. We have gone to conventions together and have ministered in various places.

Brother Welch seemed to become alarmed about his condition along in March, when he opened up his heart to me and said what he feared might be the consequences. Well do I remember a number of times he said to me, "Fred, I am not going to be with you much longer." We tried to comfort him and tell him what a blessing he had been to us, and how we longed to have him remain. During the Southern Missouri District Council in April he said to me, "I believe this is going to be the last message I will ever preach to the Southern Missouri District." It was the last, for he never preached again in public.

Two days before he passed on to be with the Lord we were in conversation together, and this is what he said: "I would like to live until the General Council meeting, not that I would want to minister or to have any active part, but I would like to greet the brethren and say good-bye to them all." But the Lord saw fit to call him to higher service. It was my happy
privilege to be with Brother Welch the last few moments he lived.

During the last few hours Brother Welch was suffering intense pain, and Mrs. Alice Flower and I engaged in fervent prayer. We laid our hands on him and asked the Lord to take away the distress. Never shall we forget how he joined in with such a fervent Amen, and in the face of all the suffering he praised the Lord for victory. The Lord soon answered this prayer, for the end was in sight. And as I held him in my arms and tried to make him comfortable on his pillow, without saying a word and with-
and was brought right down to death. He was insensible for many hours and believed that his spirit actually left his body. But God raised him up in a moment of time, giving him a perfect and miraculous healing. With a new faith he began to pray for the sick and he saw some outstanding miracles in his ministry. He prayed for one woman that had a cancer in her mouth and she went outside and spit the cancer out; she was perfectly healed. At one camp he prayed for a number of deaf mutes and they were instantaneously restored, the Lord giving them both hearing and speech.

From the beginning of the General Council he became a presbyter and worked heart and soul for the unifying of the fellowship. For God had given him a vision of the dependence of every member upon others in the body, and that the body is compacted by that which every joint supplieth. For the next twenty-five years his whole heart and soul was in the General Council fellowship and in the building up of the body.

In the year 1915 he was made chairman of the General Council and he held this position until 1920 when once more the Council elected Brother Bell, its original chairman, to fill that position. Brother Welch then acted as secretary until the death of Brother Bell in 1923, and then once more he was elected to be chairman of the General Council.

After the 1925 Council Brother Welch went to California. For more than two years he pastored the assembly at Modesto, California. Sister Welch became very sick in Modesto and he gave up his pastorate in order to give his whole time to taking care of her.

In 1930, at the request of Brother R. J. Craig, he accepted a position as teacher in Glad Tiding Bible Institute in San Fran-

souri for a year. God greatly blessed his ministry here. During the time of his pastorate, there came an epidemic to the town and a great many babies died. cisco, and labored there for a year. He was to return to this Institute, but at the request of the brethren of the General Council in 1931 he came to Springfield to be president of Central Bible Institute and to act as a member of the Executive Presbytery. He has also served on the Missionary Committee since 1931.

He had hoped to be present at the coming General Council and to say good-bye to all the assembled brethren. But you will have to let the Evangel be his proxy and express his last hope: "Good-bye, and God bless you all." For his heart was full of love and tenderness to every minister in the Fellowship.

# Personal Memories of Dear Daddy Welch by then 

One day in the summer of 1916 a letter came to me in San Jose, California from Daddy Welch, who was then chairman of the General Council. It contained this statement: "The brethren in 1915 made me editor of the Pentecostal Evangel, but I don't fit into the position. I am praying for God's man to come and be editor. Are you that man? Couldn't you come to the General Council meeting which will convene in St. Louis on October 1 of this year?"

The Lord opened the way, and as we arrived in St. Louis Daddy was down at the station to welcome us. During the next eighteen months the Welches, the Flowers and a few more of us lived together in the old Evangel home in St. Louis, Missouri. Those were days when the Lord knitted our hearts together with very strong cords of love.

Daddy Welch loved the children in the home, and they all loved him. There were three of themJoe and Adele Flower, and my daughter Faith-and he had to take all three of them on his lap every day and listen to their childish prattle. One day he went to the barber, and contracted "barber's itch." He tried to pray the prayer of faith for himself but the itch grew worse until his face was terribly disfigured. But the three little children loved Daddy and had a great compassion for him, and one morning at family prayers they laid their hands on him. The prayer of faith went up from the three little tots, and the Lord answered. Immediately he was healed. Today all these three children are in the ministry, and they have all retained their love for him to the end.

As it has been our privilege to work together these many years in the Council fellowship we have learned year by year to highly esteem Daddy for a great many outstanding characteristics. First, he was unswervingly righteous. It could truly be said of him as of His

Master, "He loved righteousness, and hated iniquity."

The Lord took him through a most remarkable experience at one time when he had asked Him to show him his own sinful heart. For a whole night there was unveiled to him the exceeding sinfulness of $\sin$. The sight was so fearful he lost consciousness. Once as he regained it he found himself standing before a picture of his mother, and crying, "O Mother, Mother, why did you bear me?" The second time he found himself standing before a portrait of his baby that had gone to be with the Lord, and crying, "Oh, why didn't the Lord take me instead of you?" But during all that period never once was there any condemnation for $\sin$. There came a realization that Christ had borne that at Calvary. From that day, how Daddy loved to preach the message of grace, pointing to the One who bore our iniquities on Calvary as the Pro-

vider of a complete deliverance from $\sin$ and all its consequences.

We sat with him for many years in the Executive Presbytery and have often heard him say, in substance: "This is clearly the righteous thing to do. Let us do it, and trust God." Even though it seemed an unpopular thing to do, he always chose to do what was right.

Another outstanding characteristic was his hatred of debt. He would never purchase anything himself unless he had the money to pay cash for it, and he would not agree to any policy of going in debt at the Gospel Publishing House. "Let us live on a cash
basis," he would say, and so not once have we purchased a single piece of machinery unless we had the money to pay cash for it. This has become the established policy of the Publishing House.

As far back as in 1917 he had the vision of Central Bible Institute. It was a great move of faith when the Central Bible Institute was projected in 1922, but God honored his faith and that of Brother E. N. Bell and Daddy Kerr. It was his great joy to watch the growth of this institution. The graduates of the past few years have very much appreciated his counsel, as coming from one who was spiritually mature and of vast experience in the ministry.

It was the writer's privilege to be with him and Brother Harry Bowley during his last campaign of ministry, which was at the Deeper Life Convention held at Easter in Tulsa, Oklahoma. We well remember one day when the three of us-Daddy, Harry
and the writer-had our arms around one another praying definitely for the needy ones who came to that meeting. And how wonderfully he preached. We had never heard him in greater power, and his ministry was greatly appreciated.

We shall never forget one night when many who were in bondage came forward for deliverance. To Daddy had been given the gift of the discerning of spirits, and as one by one the people came he saw exactly the trouble with each one. What a blessed ministry he and Brother Bowley had in setting these bound ones free. It was a night of marvellous deliverances when many captives had their bands broken. They became joyously free and went around the platform shouting the praises of the great Liberator.

During the past few weeks we have had a number of talks with Daddy and have appreciated his many words of counsel. We learned one great secret of his life of ninistry. It was this: he yielded his mind wholly to the Lord, and constantly looked to God for special wisdom. It is no wonder that so often in General Council exactly the right word has been forthcoming through this humble instrument whose mind was wholly yielded to God. Heavenly wisdom was poured into his mind as he looked to the heavenly Source of all wisdom.

One of the lessons he impressed upon us during the last few days of his life was this: to continually commit our minds to the Lord. He would say. "Look to Him to fill your thought life and to take complete control of all your thinking, bringing every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ. Let there be a continuous commitment, if needs be every five minutes, until your whole mind becomes completely saturated all the time with the thoughts of God."

We would like to share this counsel, which we greatly treasure, with all our Council ministry who have learned to love him. Learn his secret of a continuous commitment of your mind and your heart to the Lord, looking to Him to deliver you from all carnal thinking and to cause your mind to be truly spiritual, and to be receiving continuous renewing and quickening and heavenly inspiration.

One of our delightful memories is when we met on January 25 to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of the wedding of Daddy and Mother Welch. The brethren of the Central Bible Institute invited them out to supper and at the same time invited some of us who were his oldest friends. Then a ladies' chorus of sixty students sang a hymn of praise. And as the tokens of love, in the form of sixty beautiful red roses, were brought by these students, the hearts of both Brother and Sister Welch were deeply moved. We felt we were only giving honor to one to whom honor was due as we gathered together that night and expressed our grati-
tude for the beautiful life and ministry of Daddy and his faithful co-worker. But to-
day we know Daddy is receiving the highest
honors from the Lord he honored so highly and served so faithfully.

Good night, Daddy dear, we'll see you in the morning.

## The Inner Spirit of the Cross

The act of Crucifixion is one thing, but the spirit in which the crucifixion is to be borne is another. In some respects the act may be brief and finished, but the inward heart disposition that should pervade crucifixion is a continuous principle extending through life, ever widening its range, over a multiplicity of applications, and growing in intensity to the end. This divinely beautiful spirit of self-immolation cannot be defined. It can only be faintly described. It is a heart quality, a soul essence too fluid to be held in by words.

If we could get a vision of the soul of Jesus from the last supper to His death on the cross, and have a clear spiritual discernment of all the thoughts and feelings, and affections, and sympathies, and every quality of disposition that was in His nature during those long hours, in such a spiritual vision we should see the mind appropriate to crucifixion.

Thousands have had in greater or lesser degree a spiritual revelation into this history of the soul of Jesus. Such an insight can only be given by the Holy Ghost, for it is infinitely beyond the natural reason and imagination.

In the same proportion that we discern the inward spirit Christ had during those hours, in that proportion can we drink of that spirit, until we can suffer, bleed, and die in our measure, with the very same disposition He had.

It is a Silent Spirit. It suffers without advertising its depth of suffering. It can be subdued, scolded, criticized, misunderstood, misrepresented, and checked and hindered in a thousand ways without a groan, or a kick, or a trace of threatening. 1 Peter 2:23.

It has calmly signed the death warrant of self. It can have a thousand little gifts and treasures and harmless earthly pleasures and pleasant hopes and friendly ties snatched out of its hands, without clutching the fingers to hold on to them. It can obey God and be rushing at full speed on lines of service and duty for Him and then at the touch of God's Providential air-brake, it can be brought to an instantaneous standstill without shaking the train to pieces by a single jar or the least jostling of the will from its perfect repose in Jesus.

It is a flexible spirit with no plans of its own. It can be turned by the finger of God in any direction without a moment's warning.

It can walk into a dungeon or a throne, into a hut or a palace, with equal ease or freedom.

It partakes of the movements of the Divine mind, as a floating cloud partakes of the movement of the air which encircles it.

It can wear old threadbare clothes, and live on plain food with a thankful and sweet disposition, without even a thought of envy or coveting the nice things of others. It
looks with a quiet, secret, joyful contempt on all the honors and pleasures, learning and culture, and the honorable splendors of earth. It inwardly despises what other people are longing to get hold of.

This is because it sees into heaven, and is so fascinated with the magnitude of coming glories, that even the pretty and honorable things of the world look ugly to it.

The rugged cross which frightens so many Christians is embraced by this spirit, with a secret, subtle joy because it knows that all sufferings will enlarge and sweeten its love. What other Christians shun as hardships, it will gladly accept, as an opportunity of sweeter union with God. It loves its enemies with a sweet, gentle yearning affection, utterly beyond what they would be willing to believe. It can be bruised and trampled on, and turn with a quivering speechless lip, and tear-dimmed eye and kiss and pray for the foot that under pretense of religious duty is trampling it in the dust.

It will not receive human honors unto itself.

If it is praised or honored by its fellows, instead of eating it as a sweet morsel it offers it up instantly to the Lord as the angel did with the good dinner which was presented to him by Manoah. Its highest delight is in sinking into God and being little. It loves to humble itself both before God and man. It shuns debate and strife and theological argument.

It is modest and retiring and loves to get out of God's way, and see Him work.

It does not make others wear its sackcloth.

The crucifixion life becomes a beautiful flame of self-abnegation, which takes hold of all sorts of woes, and troubles, and mortifications, and pains, and poverties, and hardships, as a very hot fire takes hold on wet logs and makes out of them fresh fuel for

## Christ Within

"I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live yet not $I$, but Christ liveth in me."-Galatians 2:20.

The heart of true religion is to believe that Christ is literally within us. He is our Life, the living Fountain rising up in the well of our personality. The Apostle Paul was never weary of re-affirming this great fact in his experience, and it would be well if each of us could say every day before starting forth on our daily duty: "Christ is in me; let me make room for Him to dwell."

We must say No to self, that the life of Christ may become manifest in and through us, a reality in daily experience and conduct. When evil suggestions come to us, we must remember that we have entered a realm where such things have no place. We are no longer in the realm of the god of this world, but have passed into the realm of the Risen Christ. Let those who are tempted believe this. Assert it in the face of the tempter, counting upon the Holy Spirit to make their reckoning a living experience.

In Ephesians 6:13-17 is described the armor of the Christian soul; in Colossians 4:12-14 the habit or dress which he wears beneath his coat of mail. We must be careful to be properly dressed each day. If we lose our temper over trifles, or yield to uncharitable speech, it shows that we have omitted to put on the girdle of love. If ye yield to pride, avarice, envy and jealousy, we must not simply endeavor to put off these evils, but take from the wardrobe the opposite graces.

It is not enough to avoid doing wrong. Our Master demands that we should always do and be what is right. When we fail in some sudden demand, it is because we have omitted to put on some trait of Christ, which was intended to be the complement of our need. Let us therefore day by day say: "Lord Jesus, wrap Thyself around me, that I may go forth, adequately attired to meet life's demands." In Christ, for standing; Christ in us for life; we with Him, for safety--F. B. M.

# "Now's Your Chance, Lord" By Mrs. Howard Jayfor 

A large number of children attend our schools in Shae-k'i-chen, and most of the Chinese teachers are just as keen as the missionaries about the "one thing needful." At morning prayers, day by day, it was not unusual to have from two to three hundred boys and girls present.

It was one of our Chinese teachers, a Miss Gold, who taught a little Mohammedan girl to pray. The child had given her heart to the Lord and was eager to learn; so out of school hours the young teacher would take her to a quiet room, explain about praying in the name of the Lord Jesus and pray with her over matters that were on their hearts.

At home, however, the child found no sympathy. When she talked about the Lord Jesus or wanted to pray, her grandfather was very angry. A proud old Mohammedan, he would have no such doings in his house, and the child was beaten and even kicked if he found her praying. But the little girl prayed on, longing for the conversion of her parents and grandfather, and sure that the Lord would find a way.

The time was one of danger and distress through the evil practices of soldiers as well as bandits, and the grandfather had suffered not a little from one company who had taken up their abode in his premises. He had learned that soldiers (such as these) were only robbers in uniform, and great was his alarm when walking on the city wall one day he espied the same company returning. They were marching toward the city with the very officer at their head whom he had painful occasion to remember. What to do the grandfather did not know. There was no protection, no appeal from the demands of such oppressors, and he was sure it was to his place they were coming, as there was more to be squeezed out of him than out of most of his neighbors.

Searching in vain for some hope of succor, the grandfather suddenly bethought him of the little girl. Why, of course! Did she not pray? Hastening home he found her, shook her roughiy to awaken her to the seriousness of the situation, and cried:
"If ever you prayed in your life, pray now! Those soldiers are coming back. I have seen them from the city wall; they will soon be here. You say God answers prayer. Go into that room and praypray that they may not come to our house."

Suiting the action to the word, he pushed the child into an empty room and shut the door.

All alone the little girl, who was only eight years old, knelt down. Was she frightened, tearful, uncertain? Her mother, who was in an inner room, heard her as she poured out her heart to the Lord.
"Heavenly Father," she said, "I am so happy, so thankful, because my grandfather has told me to pray! Always before he beat me or kicked me if I prayed, and
was so angry. But now he has told me to pray. Heavenly Father-now's your chance! Please show my grandfather that you do answer prayer. Please don't let those soldiers come back-don't let them come to our house."

And her prayer was in the name of the Lord Jesus.

The soldiers entered the city and came tramping down that very street. The door of the grandfather's house was standing open-a big, double-leafed door into the courtyard-for he knew it would be no use to shut it. The officer in front of the band drew up and turned his horse's head to go in. That was the place he was making for. And the little girl, inside, was praying:

## AN AMERICAN NATIONALIST CHURCH

The First Church of the American Legion has just been inaugurated in Los Angeles, says Herald of Holiness. It is the first American parallel to Alfred Rosenberg's German Christian movement. It is admitted to be an experiment, looking toward the entrance of the Legion into "religious work" on a national scale. It lays aside all denominationalism. Writes Christian Century: "It is probable that this effort is prompted in part by a sincere desire to see more unity in our cultured community and national life-indeed, all fascist movements are partially stirred by such a desire; but there is not the slightest doubt about what the character and program of this movement would be if it should develop into a real movement."

## MODERN PHARAOH

It is reported from Danzig, which is under complete Nazi control, says Jewish Missionary Magasine, that the 5,000 local Jews are to be converted into virtual slaves for the building of a motor road between this city and East Prussia.

## THE STRENGTH OF GERMANY

Major Fielding Eliot, foremost American military expert, recently predicted that, in the case of a war this year, Germany would be speedily vanquished, says King's Business. Not Germany or Russia, but the southern confederacy (the allied forces of Britain, France, Italy, etc.) will finally be the dominant power, says Bible prophecy.

## THE ORIGIN OF WRONG-DOING

In a recent book H. T. F. Rhodes, famous criminologist, announces that the fundamental causes of crime are poverty, unemployment and sex. Remove the cause and you will remove the crime! But the Bible tells the fundamental cause of wrong-doing, the thing that he calls crime but which God calls sin. Jesus said, "Out of the heart of men, proceed evil thoughts, adulteries," etc. Mark 7:21, 22. A heart regenerated by the Holy Spirit is the only solution.

## ANTI-SEMITISM IN AMERICA

It is estimated, reports Herald of Holiness, that there are 800 distinctly anti-Jewish organizations in the United States claiming $6,000,000$ adherents. In connection with this unfortunate situation we quote from a letter by George Washington, written when the Jews welcomed him to Newport in 1790: "May the Children of the Stock of Abraham who dwell in this land, continue to merit and enjoy the good will of the other inhabitants, while every one shall sit in safety under his own Vine and Figtree, and there shall be none to make him afraid."

## JOINING THE CONTINENTS

And now Europe and America are successfully joined by air, the Atlantic Clipper having made an uneventful flight to Marseilles with thirty passengers on board, the first trip of its kind. Also an American has returned after flying around the world in three weeks and using nothing but regular passenger service, and first case where special planes did not have to be chartered for certain laps. The nations of the world are becoming one great family, in preparation for the universal rule of Anti-Christ, of whom it is written, "power was given him over all kindreds, and tongues, and nations." Rev. 13:7.

## THE SITUATION IN GERMANY

Reports Time: "No foreign clergyman may preach in a German Protestant church, or even converse with a German pastor, without first signing a statement dissociating himself from the views of the Archbishop of Canterbury, who lately advocated an Anglo-Russian alliance!" Such is the result when the Church dabbles in political issues.
On the other hand, F. H. Otto Melle, Bishop of the Methodist Church in Germany, who is visiting America, said on May 14 (speaking of the Methodists and the Evangelical Free Church): "These evangelical churches, who have never received anything from the State and have never asked anything from the State, have not been drawn into the church debate at all. We do our work now as we have always done it." "Nobody till this day has ever asked me what we are preaching, or what we believe, or what we are praying for!" He declares that the State Churches receive an annual appropriation of five hundred thousand marks, and it is the State church of Germany that has clashed with the government.

SCHOOL TEACHERS AND RELIGION
President Arnaud C. Marts of Buckwell University recently remarked that he would not have a teacher, no matter what the subject to be taught, who was not an active church member, writes Church School Promoter. Said he: "We believe it is useless to train young men and women unless we bring their minds under a sovereignty of the living God and into the service of humanity."

## TESTAMENTS FOR JEWS IN EUROPE

Mr. and Mrs. George T. B. Davis, burdened with the need for spreading New Testaments among the Jewish people in Europe, are spending several weeks over there this summer. As secretary of the Million Testaments Campaigns, 1505 Race St., Philadelphia, Mr. Davis is laying plans and enlisting workers for the distribution of Testaments in various languages among the Jews of Europe as speedily as possible.
Mr. and Mrs. Davis will greatly appreciate our readers' prayers for the Lord's protection, guidance and blessing throughout the journey. Let us pray that suitable Yiddish, German, and other New Testaments may be secured, and that multitudes of Jewish people may be born again through the distribution of these New Testaments.

## EIGHT THOUSAND AT COMMUNION SERVICE

Brother Donald Gee, writing from Norway, tells of God's gracious blessings at a European Pentecostal Conference just held at Stockholm, Sweden. Twenty-one European countries were represented. Over 70 attended from Great Britain, about 35 came from Germany, and there were other large groups. In all there were 500 foreign delegates. As many as 15,000 were estimated to be present at one time. Prince and Princess Bernadotte attended the last Sunday in the great tent, when Brother George Jeffreys preached. The Conference was concluded with a communion service, restricted to delegates and members only, at which 8,000 were present.
From Stockholm a small party including Brother Gee were driven for 1,000 miles north, visiting assemblies each night. There are about 600 assemblies in Sweden, including many within the Arctic Circle. In this far northern region there is no darkness during mid summer. At midnight the party went up the mountain-side at Narvik with the local brethren for a picnic, and Brother Gee declares the sunshine on the peaks was glorious.

During the special services, the crowds were good and the people attentive. The last day, there were three babies dedicated to the Lord, eight men and women baptized in water, and the special srevices were concluded with the Lord's Supper.

A new Sunday School is being opened there, making four in the city. We do indeed praise God for His blessing on His work, and His miraculous working in our behalf.

## TROUBLOUS TIMES IN CHINA

"Even in the midst of destruction and want," write Walker and Nell Hall, "God gives peace to those that love Him.
"Words seem futile and empty in trying to describe the condition here in war-torn China. The devastation seems almost complete in some districts of Canton. Tottering walls stand at crazy angles among buildings with gaping windows and doors, filled with heaps of debris and waste.
"The people break our hearts as we see them driven by hunger and utter hopelessness into a future which offers no hope without Christ. Church work has necessarily been carried on very uncertainly; but we hope, as we take up residence here again, that the group of believers may once more be gathered together, and that we may help others for whom Jesus died.

## Feeding the Multitudes

"Every morning four hundred of the poorest of the poor are allowed to enter the Y. W. C. A. compound where we are living at present. They enter the auditorium, hear a gospel message, then line up outside to receive a bowl of gruel furnished by the International Red Cross. Only the very neediest receive entrance cards; and, even with all the various organizations working, the need is greater than can be supplied, and many others clamor without
the gates, hoping for a little bite that may be left over.
"God can feed the spirit as well as the body, and we hope these messages, heard incidentally while waiting for food, will cause many to become hungry for the Bread of heaven."

## On Mount Corco-

 vado overlooking the city of Rio de Janeiro stands a great image one hundred feet in height, measuring seventy-five feet from tip to tip of the outstretched arms, designed by a French sculptor and constructed of reinforced concrete by a Brazilian. Could anything seem more common? And yet here come thousands, even millions, to worship!On a height overlooking Sobral stands another image only on a smaller scale, and here come other thousands to worship. Perhaps some one might say these people are great lovers of the Lord Jesus before whose likeness they worship. But-there is
scarcely one in the
 great throngs who would dare open a Bible. They know nothing of the matchless life of the Saviour, or of His salvation. They know only the image itself, and the mass of idolatrous fables gathered about such images. It would be less pathetic if they worshiped some pagan god!

We should think that gods of wood and stone which cannot even arise if they fall, would surely not be popular with the people. But "blasphemy" against these idol-gods is as terrible to them as is blasphemy against the true and the living God to us. They have no real God, as we have, to restrain them from any form of brutal persecution.

## The Earmark of a Christian

One of the first outward proofs of the salvation of a Brazilian is his house-cleaning of images and pictures of Christ and the saints. As long as these are on the wall it is almost positive proof of his idolatry, but their departure marks a real change of heart. Just one glimpse into the front door of a house often reveals the spiritual state of the family living there.

The cross, so popular in many churches at home, never appears in any evangelical church in Brazil. The first thing which must be done to all Sunday School cards and rolls is to remove every picture of Mary or Jesus. Even the dove representing the Holy Spirit cannot be used in this country, for if these things do not prove a snare to some convert, they are sure to be worshiped by others.

## Hopeless?

In the natural it seems a hopeles task. Even those who are really sincere will not dare read the Bible which they worship! And if one shows even the slightest interest, he is mercilessly persecuted by the rest. Nevertheless, praise God, He can prevail when the battle seems lost, and we have learned that these obstacles can be overcome by prayer and fasting. There are many thousands today in Brazil who worship the true God with great joy. To God be all the glory for the victory!

## MESURDOU SCHOOL LESSON

Rehoboam's Folly<br>Lesson for August 6, Lesson Text: 1 Kings 12:1-15; 14:21-31

King Solomon is dead. All Israel, led by Jeroboam, comes to Shechem with a proposition to present before Rehoboam, Solomon's son, who is in line for the throne.

## Rehoboam's Great Opportunity

 (1 Kings 12:1-5)"And Jeroboam and all the congregation of Israel came, and spake unto Rehoboam saying, Thy father made our yoke grievous; now therefore make thou the grievous service of thy father, and his heavy yoke which he put upon us, lighter, and we will serve thee." What a very simple and reasonable request! Rehoboam had the great opportunity that day to endear himself to the hearts of the people by removing the extreme taxation that had been imposed on them by Solomon his father. He might have lifted the nation out of political oppression and discontent, idolatry, and moral decay. How would he act on his day of opportunity?
In our lives opportunities abound; but sometimes when they come in the form of adverse circumstances, we fail to recognize them as such. We are not helpless victims of circumstance and environment. On the contrary circumstances are stepping stones to success. It is the use we make of them that determines our destiny.

Rehobonm's Foolish Decision
(1 Kings 12:5-14)
"And the king answered the people roughly
saying, My father made your yoke heavy, and I will add to your yoke: my father also chastised you with whips, but I will chastise you with scorpions." Rehoboam stood at the forks of the road. He had to decide what principles would guide his life, and what policies would govern his administration. He decided. And, as one writer so forcefully puts it, "by just one insolent and swaggering word, King Solomon's house lost forever the ten tribes of Israel. And all Rehoboam's insane, suicidal history is written in our Bibles for the admonition and instruction of all hot-blooded, illnatured, and insolent-spoken men among ourselves." Let us notice the following facts concerning this foolhardy decision:

1. He forsook worthy counsel (1 Kings 12: $6-8$ ). Instead of following the wise counsel of the trusted old men who had stood before Solomon, Rehoboam stupidly listened to the young men of his own generation who doubtless felt they knew more than the "old fogies and hasbeens" who had served Solomon. A wise old Negro once said, "When yo goes lookin' foh some one to help you decide sumpin', remember dat it takes most as much smartness to pick out reliable advice as it do to make up y'own mind." Youth will do well to heed the counsel of those of advanced age and known spirituality !
2. He had a mistaken idea of himself. "Rule with a rod of iron! Increase taxation rather than lower it! Show your authority!"-so spoke the foolish young men. Why did Rehoboam accept their advice? Was it not because it appealed to his exalted idea of his own power and importance; was it not because he was ambinous to surpass his father and advance the monarchy to greater power and glory than it had enjoyed under Solomon? "Seest thou a man that is wise in his own conceit? There is

he defeated his own desires. There is only one way to have good servants and that is to be worthy of being well served. Rehoboam in his rough, insolent treatment of the people showed himself unworthy of being well served. The hearts of men and women are the same today as they were then. They delight in love, esteem, respect, praise, and kindness, just as much as they ever did. Try them and see! Pastor, do you want a good flock of sheep? Then be a good, kind pastor! Parents, do you want sweet, obedient children? Then you be patient, and loving and sweet and kind to them! Eph. 6:4. Laymen, do you want fine treatment from your brethren? Then see how kindly and lovingly you can treat them! The Golden Rule (Matt. 7:12) is still the best principle for governing human relationships, and divine love still "never faileth!" 1 Corinthians 13.

## Rehoboam's Just Reward

(1 Kings $12: 16-20 ; 14: 21-31)$
Rehoboam had decided. The people listened to his cruel, heartless words; then they decided. The division of the kingdom followed. Ten tribes followed Jeroboam, making him their king.

But this was not all of Rehoboam's punishment! For he had continual war with Jeroboam for the rest of his life, and went down to his grave with these words as his obituary, "And he did evil, because he prepared not his heart to seek the Lord." 2 Chron. 12:14.
Like Israel of old (Luke 19:41-44) Rehoboam had a great opportunity and lost it. He made a foolish decision based upon pride, selfwill, and selfishness, and by that decision sealed his destiny and accomplished his own downfall. Beloved, let us be instructed! God grant we may always have clear vision, to recognize in every circumstance an opportunity to glorify God, and wisdom based on the eternal principles of Calvary, by which to make our decisions in the light of eternity.

Peter was the apostle to the circumcision, the Jews. Gal. 2:7. It was Paul who was made the apostle to the Gentiles of which the church at Rome was largely made up. Gal. 2:7, 8.

The teaching also throws out of balance the correct understanding of prophecy.
