






Thursday morning, Sept. 7 "All things come to him who waits." The long-anticipated and much-prayedabout General Council is on at last! Attended the seven o'clock prayer meeting held in the east room of the new \$30,000 auditorium which was built at C. B. I. for such occasions. What a prayer meeting! Hundreds of people with shining Chas. E. Robinson and J. Bashford Bishop

faces and tear-dimmed eyes shouting over and over, "Hail Immanuel!" Brother Stanley Frodsham, in charge of these morning prayer meetings, had us pray that God would increase the number of native workers on the foreign mission fields to 2,000. But Brother Ball, Superintendent of the Latin-American work, appealed that since thousands in these days of war are volunteering to lay down their lives for their country, we had a right to expect many thousands more to enlist for Christ to fight sin. He proposed we pray for ten thousand native workers instead of two thousand! Devotional service began at nine. Brother

Williams requested that Marcus Gaston of the C. B. I. Sextette sing, and six young men filed in with four trombones, violin,

and piano accordion, and the song was thus accompanied. Wonderful music! Our General Superintendent brought the opening message of Council. "What do these feeble Jews?" he enquired, reading from Nehemiah. What a sermon followed! What do these feeble Pentecostal people? When Brother Williams was through one felt as if they are at any rate seeking to do something.

Crowd was separated after devotional service, ministers and delegates sitting in center sections, all others elsewhere. Reminded us of another day when some shall be taken but others left. Printed report of headquarters activities was distributed before adjourning.

Thursday afternoon

A resolution was proposed directing the distribution of profits of the Gospel Publishing House. It was agreed that 30% of its profits should be kept for replacement and extension, and the balance given away for certain agreed-upon purposes.

Thursday night

C. A. service held on the great platform which will seat eight hundred. Gene Hogan, young pastor from Saginaw, Michigan, led song service; and Theodore Gannon, Secretary of Kentucky District, brought the message from Luke 19:41-42 showing the need of making use of our opportunities.

While he spoke crowds were entering the auditorium and by seven-thirty it was packed with hundreds on the outside. Carl Barnes was song leader. Singing was inspiring beyond words. What a sight to look out from the platform on a congregation of about four thousand people with hands cupped to their mouths singing, "Hallelujah, What a Saviour!" How far it must have carried!

Friday morning, Sept. 8



Harry Bowley was called up to speak. Saints will not lie or steal, he said, but many have become bound. Filth of the flesh is gone, but filthiness of the spirit often remains, creating bondage. Let us cleanse *ourselves*, he emphasized. Demon spirits work on self-life, self-will.

Those who were bound in their spirit life were invited to the altar. It was already eight o'clock. Multitudes sought deliverance. At nine o'clock they were still coming. Many blessed freeings from all sorts of demon oppression and physical disabilities. At ten o'clock many were still waiting. Eleven, twelve, and one o'clock passed before the meeting ended. of prayer and "casting out!" Meanwhile an important business session had been in progress. Report of headquarters activities for past two years was accepted. Report also on important School resolution.

Friday afternoon

Fine business session with much debate, but blessed unity was in evidence. A resolution was put on record that ministers of our fellowship who engage in meetings in antagonistic, non-Council assemblies, without the approval of the District officials, should be made subject to discipline. We must be loyal to our fellowship and to our leaders.

Friday night

Tonight's C. A. service was in charge of Eastern, Potomac, and New England Districts. Fred Eide, pastor in Wrightsville, Pa., led song service; and Wilfred Brown, pastor at Lancaster, Pa., brought the message, stressing the fact that God's best workmen, such as Joseph, Moses, David, and Jesus Himself, must pass through the school of suffering before they are greatly used.

Another very hot night. Crowds getting larger. Hundreds of people sitting on outside of the auditorium. Eric Johnson, missionary from Congo and the Gold Coast, gave fine message at the beginning of the service. Told us there were 649 in the Sunday School at Tamale in the Gold Coast!

Willard Peirce sang, "I Am Amazed That God Could Ever Love Me." Joseph Wannamacher, pastor in Milwaukee, played beautifully on his violin. The Central Bible Institute male quartet of 1935-36 sang, "I'd Rather Have Jesus," which proved such a blessing that they had to sing another.

The All-Powerful Christ

W HEREFORE He is able also to church. It comes by receiving Christ and save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make inter-

He ever liveth to make intercession for them." Heb. 7:25. That was Christ's mission in this world—to save sinners. In His sacrificial death He proved to the world His willingness to save. It is God's will that every man and every woman should be saved from their sins.

But when in the beginning God made man He made him a free moral agent possessed of the power of choice, able to choose for himself. While God is able and willing to save men and women to the uttermost, He does not do it against their will. Men must choose for themselves. Jesus said, "Whosoever will, let Him *take* the water of life freely."

As I see the dark clouds of war that have gathered, they speak to me of the soon return of our Lord Jesus Christ, and my heart is made to cry out to God on behalf of the multitudes of men and women whom Jesus died to save but who are still living in their lost and sinful state. I do not know how much longer the gospel privileges will remain. It may not be for long. But I am glad Paul's words, "Now is the accepted time; behold now is the day of salvation," are still true.

A woman of Samaria went to the well to draw water. She found Christ sitting alone on the well. He had sent the disciples into the city to buy food. Perhaps He knew this woman would come and He wanted to deal with her alone. He preached to multitudes, but upon occasion He was not too busy to preach to a single individual.

Jesus said to her, "Give Me to drink." The woman replied, "How is it that thou, being a Jew, askest drink of me, which am a woman of Samaria? For the Jews have no dealings with the Samaritans."

Then Jesus said, "If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee, Give Me to drink; thou wouldest have asked of Him, and He would have given thee living water." The woman thought He meant well water, and said, "Sir, thou hast nothing to draw with, and the well is deep." Jesus answered, "Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again: but whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life."

I am glad we can have that artesian well of living water right in our innermost beings today. That well need never run dry. God said, "With joy shall ye draw water out of the wells of salvation." There is an abundance of the water of life—a well for every believer.

The power of Jesus Christ delivers men and women from the power of sin and brings a change in their life. The change does not come by signing a card or shaking hands with the preacher, or joining the


church. It comes by receiving Christ and His great salvation. If you will turn from your sin and say an eternal "Yes" to the will of God, Christ will come into your heart and you will become a new creature immediately. The Bible says, "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." 2 Cor. 5:17. It does not say, "Shall be a new creature." The change takes place immediately upon our receiving Christ into our hearts.

In Ephesians 2 we have a dark picture, followed by a beautiful one. Paul states that before Christ had come into their hearts the Ephesians were without Christ, strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope, and without God in the world. Think of a man's facing death, facing eternity, facing the God of the universe without Christ! Yet each tick of the clock someone is slipping into eternity.

But following this dark picture Paul says, "But now in Christ Jesus ye who sometimes were afar off are made nigh by the blood of Christ." Christ came and preached peace to all which were afar off, making it possible for us to have access to the Father through Him. "Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints, and of the household of God.

My good friends, we have something to shout about. We have something to rejoice about. One time we had no Christ, we had no hope, we had no promise. We were dying in sin. But Jesus came and died on the cruel cross, and by shedding His precious life's blood He purchased eternal redemption; a redemption which is ours by simply believing on Him. Have we not something to be enthusiastic about?

Christ also has power over sickness and disease. He said, "All power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth." Yes, even devils were subject to Him. When Christ spoke, the devils had to obey Him





and flee. He spoke away sickness and disease.

Remember that man who lived in the tombs? He was so bound by demons that he could not stay home, but tore the clothing from his body and burst the fetters with which he was bound. Out among the dead he lived. One day Christ came that way. A voice said, "Why have you come to torment us before our time? If you cast us out, let us go into that herd of swine." A herd of about two thousand swine were feeding on the mountain side near by. Jesus said to the demon that was speaking, "Hold your peace, and come out of him." Not one demon, but many, out of him." Not one demon, but many, came out. There were enough demons to fill those two thousand swine and send them frantic into the lake to drown. The man was delivered, and soon he was clothed and in his right mind. He wanted to stay with Christ, but Jesus said, "Go home and tell what great things I have done for you and have had compassion upon you."

I do not know what family that man had, but I like to picture him with a wife and children. They had tried to keep him home but he could not be held. Now however I see him delivered by the power of Christ and on his way home. I can picture that wife looking out of the door and seeing her husband coming. A fear comes over her heart. But he breaks the good news to his bewildered family. "I have found the Christ," he says. "He delivered me, and told me to come home and tell you what has happened." I believe a revival started in that community.

Some years ago a girl was afflicted with epileptic fits. It seemed sometimes that she would die, and she was a sinner. One day they called for us to come down and pray with her. We did, and God saved that girl; seemingly she was delivered. She got up. Things went all right for some time. But one day at school she became angry and that thing took possession again. One night during an altar service in the church she fell in one of those fits. We rebuked the devil in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, and God delivered her. She has been all right ever since, and that is about eighteen years. Christ also had power over the natural elements. He spoke with authority. One day when He passed a fig tree with leaves but no fruit, He cursed it, and immediately it withered up. It did not just happen so. Christ spoke the command and the tree had to wither. The people marveled.

He was in a boat on the sea. Christ was tired, and He lay down to sleep. Black clouds arose; the wind began to roar; and the waves became high and threatening. Fear came upon the disciples. They awakened the Master and rudely said, "Carest thou not that we perish?" Jesus quietly arose and looked out upon the sea. With words of authority He rebuked the storm and said, "Peace! Be still!" The wind ceased, the sea became smooth, the boat straightened up and began to sail smoothly. Thus the disciples were filled with a different kind of fear. "Who is this, that even the wind and the sea obey Him?" they asked one another.

Who is this Christ who has such marvelous power? He is the One who came from the ivory palaces of glory, down into a world of sin and sorrow, and went to Calvary's cruel tree. He is the One who gave His very life for the sake of lost men and women. Is there a storm raging in your life? Go to the Master. Christ is not far from any one of us. Hear Jesus say, "Peace! Be still!" Do you think there is no hope? Look to Jesus; He is the Master of every situation. No matter what may be your trouble, Jesus can make things right and put His peace within your breast.

Furthermore, Christ has power over death to destroy it. One day a messenger brought the news that Lazarus was sick. Jesus waited for two days before starting. On the way He said, "Our friend Lazarus sleepeth." They thought He meant the rest of sleep, but then He told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead."

When Jesus arrived Martha said, "Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother had not died." But Jesus said, "Thy brother shall rise again." Jesus went to the tomb of Lazarus. "Take ye away the stone," He said.

They took away the stone. I believe there are a lot of stones that we need to take away today, stones that are keeping the power of God from being experienced. Jesus stood in front of that open grave, in which was lying a body four days dead, and looked up to the Father in prayer. Then He cried, "Lazarus, come forth!" The dead man came forth, bound hand and foot with grave clothes. Jesus said, "Loose him, and let him go." Then they took off the grave clothes and found that under the foul-smelling wrappings his flesh was whole and living. Friend, perhaps you still have some of the things of sin in your life. Come to Jesus and let Him set you free from the foul old grave clothes, and put you on the way to glory free and happy and shouting the praises of God. He is the Christ we are serving today. He is the Almighty Christ who has power over sin, and sickness, and death as well.

I was dying of typhoid fever twentyfour years ago. I was conducting a revival in Logan County in the country. God was blessing in those early days of my ministry. fall. Ten or eleven were saved in the first week, and some received the Baptism. Suddenly I was called home because my daughter was sick with typhoid. It was eighteen or twenty miles across the mountains to my home. I was taken half way in a buggy, and walked the rest of the distance. I carried my suitcase, and the sun was hot as I walked along.

I reached home on Thursday. On Saturday I was sick with typhoid myself. It was the after effects of that day's journey, when I had walked so far with no water to drink. The fever raged. For eleven days we fought the battle, trusting God for healing. People made all kinds of threats because we stood on the promises of God. The fever ran 105 and better, and the weather was hot, but we stood firm on God's eternal truth. About the eleventh day my fever was around 106, and it seemed that I could not live for I was so hot. I was having a battle to keep my mind stayed upon God. But through the prayers of God's people I did keep my mind covered with the Blood. While I was sick, my daughter was delirious in her sickness and did not know what she was doing. But we prayed.

One day a fellow-minister came and prayed, but there seemed to be no touch from God on my body. Next day my fever rose higher. I prayed. Then all at once the power of God hit me on the top of my head and went through my body like electricity. The fever left, and I began to praise the Lord. I called for my clothes, dressed, got up, sang a few songs and had prayer.

All at once a peculiar feeling came over me. I felt myself slipping. I became dizzy. My circulation stopped. I had eaten nothing. But I kept my mind on God and kept praying. It seemed Jesus was standing at arm's length from me. They thought I was having a vision or going into a trance. I saw life was slipping out of my body.

Finally the thought came to me, "You are going to have to die and leave your family." My daughter was lying over there with a fever of 105. I said, "Lord, she is yours." I thought I was going to die. I told them I was going. I kept slipping. They prayed, and I kept sinking.

I sank down until they could not tell there was life in my body. I was as cold as a dead man. There was no beat in my pulse. They raised me up in bed but I could not hold my head up. But in answer to their prayers God touched me, and raised me up, and I have been preaching the gospel ever since. Some thought I had died. There was no sign of life to be seen in my body. But when I got to the place where I couldn't pray, they prayed. God handed Hezekiah fifteen years more of life, and He has given me twentyfour years. Hallelujah!

Jesus is able to destroy death, for He has all power. He is the resurrection and the life. And although we may die, a time will come when Jesus Christ shall give the word and all the dead that are in the graves will hear His voice and arise, some to eternal life and others to everlasting damnation. Paul said of the Christians, "We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed. In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and he dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed." Then shall death be swallowed up in victory. "Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

Christ has power over sin, power over sickness, power over nature, and power over death. He has all power. He has power to fill you with the Holy Ghost and enable you to live for God and gain the victory over the world, the flesh, and the devil. Is He real in your life today? If not, open the door of your heart to Him, and He will come in as He has promised.

What America Needs

While the War Clouds Hover Over the Nations of the Earth Raymond T. Richey, in Temple of Religion, at New York World's Fair

R AYMOND T. RICHEY accompanied by a group of two hundred mus.cians, workers, and ministers conducted a service in the Temple of Religion in the World's Fair Grounds, New York. After the Christ's Ambassadors sextette from Central Bible Institute, Springfield, Missouri, had led the congregation in singing two well known hymns, Evangelist Richey said:

"If my people which are called by my name shall humble themselves and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land." 2 Chron. 7:14.

This is the voice of God speaking to a nation that had forgotten His law, forsaken *His* way for their own, and had brought suffering and distress not only upon themselves but upon the very land as well.

It seems to me that this is a picture of our beloved America today, and perhaps of all the nations of the earth. Instead of brotherly love and kindliness, instead of the unselfish aiding of each other, there is bitterness, suspicion, and selfishness on every hand.

There is a companion verse to this one found in Prov. 14:34-"Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." We are proud of this flag that floats above our heads. "Old Glory" we call it, the beautiful stars and stripes -the white for purity, the blue for loyalty, loyalty not only to our flag and the government for which it stands, but loyalty to righteousness, to honesty, to clean living. There is one thing, I believe, that through the years has kept Old Glory afloat and that God. On our dollar we read "In God We Trust." God grant that it may not be just a slogan on our coin, but may it be the deep determination of our hearts. "Some trust in chariots, some in horses, but we will remember the Name of the Lord our God."

There are two things that belong together in America and you cannot separate them. That is the open Bible and the Red, White, and Blue. If you take one from us, we cannot long have the other. If you take away the open Bible Old Glory will soon come down, and if you take away the Red, White, and Blue, we shall not long have the open Bible.

"The Name of the Lord is a high tower, the righteous runneth into it and are safe." "I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in Him will I trust."

There has been a tendency in America these last few years to trust in everything else, rather than in the power of the living God; but there is nothing but God in which we can trust that will not fail us. The Word of God tells us that when we trust in other things, "They are men and not


God; their horses are flesh and not Spirit, and when the Lord shall stretch forth His hand, both he that helpeth and he that is holpen shall fall."

But out of the worry and fear of the threat of war, out of the depression and the recession, out of strikes here and there and everywhere, out of sickness and affliction, out of everything that burdens and weighs you down, there is a way of escape.

It is the way back to God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, God's Son. It is the way of repentance, of turning from sin, of calling on the Name of the Lord, of putting God first, others next and self last.

When we have done this, God tells us He will hear from heaven and will forgive our sin and will heal our land.

Our land needs healing today. With drouth in one section and floods in an-



other; with grasshoppers and dust storms; with all these things upon us, our land needs healing. There is healing for them all, but it is found only through returning to God. Mary Pickford asks, "Why Not Try God?" This is the question of the hour. Surely we have tried everything and everybody else, and now it is time to come back to "The Faith of our Fathers," back to "Mother's God," back to the "Old-Time Religion."

The greatest men of our day and of every other day of the world's history have been men who prayed and who expected God to answer their prayers. God will hear and answer prayer for you today. There is not a need in your life, nor in theirs, whether it be for spirit, soul or body that He has not provided for. He will save. He will heal. Jesus paid it all.

Become unselfish in your praying. Pray for your community, for your city, for your State, for your nation and that God who controls the destiny of men and of nations will hear as He has promised in Jer. 33:3, "Call unto me and I will answer thee and shew thee great and mighty things which thou knowest not!"

There is a great "S. O. S." call ringing out over our nation at this hour. It is a call to prayer. It is to the high and the low, the rich and the poor, the old and the young, the learned and the unlearned.

It is to preacher and layman, to priest and to rabbi—this call to prayer—this call back to God.

Will you be one to hear and answer the call? Will you say as did one of old, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord"?

Your idea of service may not be what mine is. You may not agree with me on many things that I believe. You may not believe in healing. You may not see a lot of things as I see them, but surely you see that our nation and all the nations of earth need the help of Almighty God in these crisis days. Will you not be one to call on His name and believe that He will hear your call and answer your cry and heal our land?

Houston, Texas, brought the message from Luke 13:23-25 and 1 Cor. 16:9. Again the prayer room was well filled.

Saturday morning, Sept. 9

Arrived on first bus, but prayer room already overcrowded. People can't wait until seven to begin praying! Through the wall came the sounds of seekers in the tarrying room. "May His loving Spirit lead us into the land of uprightness," should the leader. People respond heartily.

Great Divine Healing service began at seven thirty, with P. C. Nelson and Raymond T. Richey in charge. Table was loaded with handkerchiefs to be prayed for. Scripture lesson in Matthew 8, with stress on words of Jesus, "I *will.*" "Make up your mind that this will be the last and only time you will be prayed for on account of this affliction." Vast numbers surged for healing. People emerge joyfully from under the ministers' hands, dancing and shouting. After all were prayed for, Brother Richey spoke again. Stinginess keeps many from being healed, he said. Money cannot buy healing from God, but liberality is often a great help to faith. Then a wonderful offering was taken for current expenses.

Marcus Grable, the Headquarters Sunday School man, spoke. He is tremendously interested in the vast numbers who do not go to Sunday School. Success in this field calls for more than head knowledge. A heart desire, a Holy Ghost passion for the lost, is needed.

Next order of business was election of officers. While they balloted many responded to requests, sang specials, played instrumental numbers, and recited poetry. A very happy time. The unity of the Spirit was shown in the fact that our three executive officers were elected on nominating ballots. This mark of confidence caused great rejoicing. Brother Williams was reelected as General Superintendent, Brother Vogler was re-elected as Assistant General Superintendent, and Brother Flower was re-elected as General Secretary.

Saturday afternoon

Entire afternoon session spent in electing the three non-resident executive presbyters. During the balloting there was more special music, mostly by groups from various Bible Schools. Brothers Gortner, and Wilson were both re-elected. On Monday morning Brother Van Meter was also re-elected.

A Great Missionary Home-Coming

It was a real delight to have a large number of our missionaries gather into headquarters for the great camp and General Council meeting. Many of them we had not seen since we said good-by several years ago when they left for the field; others are here for their first visit.

The immense tabernacle on Central Bible Institute campus was the scene of an enthusiastic missionary rally Sunday, September 3, when 37 missionaries from 17 fields were introduced to the large congregation. Two of them were selected to bring a few thoughts of interest from the foreign field-the first Ralph D. Williams from Central America, telling of

the opening and marvelous development of the work; the second, Mrs. John Torta from Liberia, bringing words of encouragement, showing the hunger for God z.id His Word among many tribes of that little country of West Africa.

Watch That Thermometer!

The high spot of interest of the afternoon was the twelve-foot thermometer indicating the amount being pledged for world missions. Steadily up one side of the huge thermometer the red line ascended to the top, whereupon the blue line on the other side registered \$1,000. Again and again the red line climbed from the bottom to the top and the blue line indicated another \$1,-000 till a total of \$4,635 was recorded in that meeting. Day by day it is still rising.

May it continue to do so throughout the camp and to the close of the General Council meeting!

What About War?

Many are asking what effect the war will have upon our missionaries and missionary enterprise in general. It does not seem now that it will be necessary to recall the missionaries from any of our fields, and preparations are still being made to send workers out to many parts of the world. Because of the present crisis it would not be wise to send them out to certain parts, and in a few places the doors have been closed entirely.

It is this situation which prompted the emphasis upon the necessity of doing what we can while present doors remain open. Our missionaries are bending every effort to prepare the native ministry to take over full responsibility of the church in other lands, so that should the time come when foreign missionaries must be recalled, the church will remain and continue to grow. It may be too late to finish the uncompleted task in some countries. This we regret. No doubt much more could have been done. The question now is SHALL WE LET THE DOORS CLOSE UPON OTHER UNFINISHED WORK?

Some countries welcome the missionaries and the gospel as never before; many fields are full of hungry hearts pleading that the gospel be brought to them, and that they might have a teacher to point them to the only hope of their salvation. We have 50 candidates already approved for missionary appointment, called of God and burning with desire to accomplish their ministry while doors remain open. A little systematic giving on the part of the home constituency would release them to go, and a host of redeemed souls would greet us at Christ's coming as the result.

Some very wise friends of ours have remembered that the time comes each year (before most of us expect it) to send our Christmas offerings to the missionaries. During August we received the first Christmas offering of this year, designated for a missionary couple in faraway Northwest China. No doubt these workers will receive their remembrance by Christmas time, but many will not unless the money is sent early because of disrupted communications in certain parts of the world. We would urge those desiring to remember their friends at Christmas time with an offering that they plan now to send it soon.

Because of the difficulty in getting mail to its destination in some countries, we would recommend that the most practical gift this year would be money. It costs very little to send it as compared with postage and duty on merchandise, and when sent through the Foreign Missions Department it is certain to reach its destination.


SLIDES ATTRACTIVE IN PERU

UP THE ROAD IN CHINA By Ada Sayer

A group of coolies came swarming into our courtyard. The casual observer might have thought they were about to take posession! With a bustling and a hurry they gathered up our luggage, for we were going upcountry. Having heard the exciting stories of those who had traveled before, we went forth in great anticipation, wondering what our travels might hold for us.

Nights in the Chinese inns are never to be forgotten. A good sense of humor is a great asset! At Tali-fu, to our left as we entered the yard, was the stable for horses and mules. On our right stood a tree where the weary traveler might find a bit of shade. Over in a corner could be seen a few chickens scratching in some straw. Suddenly our attention was drawn to the other side of the yard where a pig grunted contentedly! Our room, being upstairs, afforded us ample opportunity to observe the procedure of life in oriental setting. In spite of the strange surroundings, our own blankets and food brought us a sense of comfort and safety.

Robbers at Shi-ku

From Tali-fu we set out on six days of travel by horse or coolie-chair through mountainous country. A runner came bringing word that we should go to Likiang instead of Shi-ku, as the latter had been attacked by robbers.

After five days of rest in Likiang, we resumed our journey to Shi-ku. There we learned more about the robbers and marveled as Augusta Remacle related her experiences with the robber band. Later I returned to Likiang to continue my language study until time to go up to Erh-Yuan for the third examination.

Witnessing in Temple and Inn

As we traveled up to Erh-Yuan, we stopped by the roadside to rest near a temple. Several women were chasing a chicken which was to be sacrificed to the idols. We went in and found five or six women preparing food to sacrifice. I began to talk to them about worshiping God

and about Jesus who bore our sins on the cross. They listened intently, and I wondered if they had ever heard the wonderful story before. We left with a feeling that our time had not been wasted, and perhaps the few words we had spoken were the first seed which would spring up later into eternal life.

Returning, the rains had caused the roads to be very difficult to travel. I could not help but marvel how well the coolies picked their way along muddy, narrow paths, over slippery rocks and sticky clay as they clambered up and down over the mountains. The second day they refused to complete the full day's distance. With the thought in mind that perhaps the Lord had made some provision for me, I finally agreed to stop at a little village.

The first inn was very crowded with no suitable room at all. One of the boys went out and soon returned with grateful news of a large room, airy and light, in another inn. After supper the woman of the house came upstairs to talk with me. Soon I was telling her about the Lord. She quickly called her husband, and how I did enjoy telling them of Jesus and His love!

I sometimes wonder if these people will ever hear the glad story again, but the Word of God tells us to "Sow beside all waters." So we hope and pray that the seed thus sown will bring forth life and light to these who walk in darkness.

A YEAR FOR GOD IN BRAZIL

Frank and Louise Stalter write rejoicingly of God's blessing during the past year. "It is marvelous to see what the Lord has done in the city of Sao Caetano in just one short year! In the beginning five families all related to one another were saved. This made the nucelus for the congregation here.

"During the year the entire forty members of the assembly who have been baptized in water have stood firmly for God, praise the Lord! We pray that those who have not as yet received the Baptism with the Holy Ghost may do so soon.

"Blessing and progress has been noted in every meeting and open air service; many souls have been saved, baptized in water, and a goodly number have received the Holy Spirit. The people have learned to tithe and are now supporting their own native pastor, a gifted and consecrated young man who has an anointed ministry. "BLED TO DEATH" FOR MISSIONS!

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Living the Christian Life Lesson for October 1. Lesson Text: Colossians 3; 4.

The sum, the whole scope of Paul's epistle to the Colossians is, "Christ is all in all! Walk in Him and in Him alone!" In the church at Colosse certain false doctrine was being taught which dishonored Christ and His work. Paul, in chapters one and two, sets forth Jesus in all His glorious pre-eminence. Then in chapters three and four, he points out how the Christian is to walk in the light of his exalted position of union with the risen Christ.

CHRISTIAN POSITION. Col. 3:1-4 "If ye then were raised with Christ." A. S. V. The "if" really carries the sense of "since" or "seeing that." It is not a question of the fact

of our union with Christ that Paul is dealing with, but the recognition of that union. The trouble with many of us is in failing to recognize our wonderful position. By virtue of the new birth every Christian is one with Christ! We died with Him. Col. 2:20; 2 Cor. 5:14. We were buried with Him. Rom. 6:3-4. We have been raised with Him! Col. 2:12. We are hidden with Him! Col. 3:3. And by virtue of our position with Him, we are more than conquerors! Rom. 8:37. Paul did not say, "If you want to be risen with Christ, do thus and so." No! We do not work to a position of victory, but we work from the position of victory which is now ours, as given above!

"Set your mind on the things that are above." A. S. V. Since we are raised to such a position, dwelling in "heavenly places, far above all principalities and powers" (Eph. 1:20-23), it should follow that we will think on things in that realm, instead of being occupied as we formerly were, with things that are just earthly and of no eternal value. This will at times involve conscious effort, for the demands made upon us by earthly things is strong. But occupation with the risen Christ positively overcomes all things!

"For ye died," says Paul. We are no longer under the power and influence of the old life, the life we

lived as sinners! Rom. 6:6, 7, 14. We are to count this as true. "Reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin." Rom. 6:11. Sin has no power over us against our wills. Sin has no power over a corpse! You can slander, kick, abuse a corpse but it will not fight back! Are you recognizing yourself to be dead unto sin by identification with Christ, and thereby proving your freedom from the dominion of sin?

"And your life is hid with Christ in God." What a position of security! If you will recognize it you will have nothing to fear!

A man on a dark night rolling down a steep place, caught hold of a bush growing out of the rocks and held on in the grimness of despair. His muscles strained and his grip was maintained with frenzy. At length endurance reached its limit. In despair he let go and dropped just six inches! All the time his position had been secure, but he had not known it! So it is with many a Christian. In his position, "hid with Christ in God," he is secure all the time! But he doesn't know it!

CHRISTIAN PRACTICE. Col. 3:5 to 4:6

Christian position and practice are vitally connected. Paul, therefore, after calling attention to the believer's position, shows how we who are dead to sin and risen with Christ should live.

In relation to ourselves. Verses 5-11. "Put to death therefore your members which are upon the earth." We are not told to crucify ourselves; we have been crucified with Christ. That is past. And by virtue of that position it lies within our power to put to death all wrong impulses, some of which Paul names here, which seek expression through our minds and bodies! As one writer puts it, "To say 'I can't' is unconscious blasphemy against God!" We have no excuse whatsoever for catering to, pampering, or allowing any of these, things; we are to simply put them to death! When we feel a wrong impulse, we may say with assurance, "No, I will not allow this thing. For I am dead to sin; it has no power over me. I am Christ's. I am



alive unto Him!" As we thus speak the word of faith, the wrong desire is powerless!

In relation to others. Col. 3:12 to 4:6. Union with the risen Christ results in our being "at one with ourselves." And being right with ourselves results in being right with others.

In verses 12 to 14 Paul gives a list of things we are to put on in contrast to the old things which we have put to death and put off. These graces which are almost identical with the fruit of the Spirit listed in Gal. 5:22-23, are the fruit produced as a result of our union with Christ. Rom. 7:4.

We are told to let the peace of God rule, or more exactly "arbitrate" in our hearts. In other words we are to let the peace of God examine, conclude, and decide all proposed courses of action, and then abide by that decision.

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly" —for it is thus that the new life is nourished and sustained. Word-filled Christians will be able to carry out the remainder of this verse— "in all wisdom teaching and admonishing one another." "In psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord"—in so doing we shall not be moaning and complaining of our own shortcomings! Summing up all that has gone before, Paul says, in effect, in verses 17 and 23, "Do not say, "What harm is there in this or that?" For your life is not subject to laws but to principles! Be sure what you are about to do is for the glory of God, and then do it heartily!"—J. B. Bishop.

TONGUES ARE FOR A SIGN

H. C. Phillips writes in the *Elim Evangel* of an incident that occurred at the Pentecostal church in Bedford, England. One night a lady asked that her brother be especially remembered in prayer. He was a naval officer and was disgusted with his sister attending gatherings where he heard the people were speaking in tongues. He threatened to "break up the meeting and show up these Methodists."

One morning the lady with her tall brother in uniform attended. When the pastor stood up to preach he was mightily under the power of the Spirit, and in the middle of his message spoke a word in unknown tongues. He then gave the interpretation.

After the service the officer walked up to the front and introduced himself to the preacher in a few words. He asked him, "How many languages do you speak?" The answer was, "I only speak English, but I have studied Hebrew and Greek, and I know a little French." "But what languages were you speaking when you addressed the people?" "I cannot say," was the reply, "I just spoke as the Spirit of God gave utterance, as in the second chapter of Acts."

"Well, said the officer, "this is marvelous! I cannot understand it. You first spoke in a dialect used in South America like a native, and interpreted it perfectly. I know the language well. The second time you spoke was in Chinese. Being a sailor I picked up a little of that language, and I know enough of it to say the translation you gave was correct. It is a marvelous gift—I have never heard anything like it."

WAR AND CHRISTIANITY

The refusal of the Christians to bear arms lasted for the first two or three centuries. It was usual for a soldier to lay down his sword when he accepted the truth of Christ. The declaration of their faith has become historic: "I am a Christian, and therefore I cannot fight."

Tertullian said: "Our religion teaches us that it is better to be killed than

to kill." Sydney Smith said: "God is forgotten in war; every principle of Christianity is trampled upon." Geo. Fox, leader of the Quakers, said: "I can-

not fight, for the spirit of war is slain within me." The Duke of Wellington said: "War is a detestable thing. If you had seen but one day of war, you would pray God that you might never see another."

Russell Lowell said: "If you take a sword and draw it, and go stick a fellow through, government won't have to answer for it, God will send the bill to you."

The Soviet is disturbed over a habit which multiplied thousands of her people have taken up, saying, "Thank God." Men and women in all walks of life use it, says *Prophecy Monthly*.

ANTI-SEMITISM CONDEMNED

Prophecy Monthly states that the 37th international convention of Christian Endeavor at Cleveland went on record with a resolution assailing anti-Semitism as "a serious reflection upon the highest Christian ideals."

ANTI-SEMITISM IN RUSSIA

Among the officials and generals executed during the past two years in Russia, a very high percentage have been Jews—among them three Jewish generals and the head of the secret police, Yagoda. Only recently 13 Jews were exterminated, says *Prophecy Monthly*.

JEWS AND THE CZECHS

Any anti-Semitism among the Czechs is only the result of Nazi pressure, states *Jewish Chronicle*. During a recent performance of the play "Street Scene" at Pilsen, a burst of applause greeted the line, "After all, Jews are human beings." On the advice of the Czech police observer stationed in the theater, the line has been deleted.

GERMANS AND HITLERISM

Robert Powell, writing in The Spectator (London) before war broke out, stated there are hundreds of Germans, many of them Nazis and some within the intimate circle of the Fuehrer, who would like to have the courage to tell Hitler that he should cry "Halt!" Others, however, wait only to know Hitler's will and then rush to fulfill it, for purposes of personal advancement. In fact, as a prominent German told Mr. Powell recently, "We have built up a system in which we cannot talk to the head of it, and some of us wonder sometimes whether we do not wish for a war in order that we can restore our self-respect. What we gained in Austria and Czecho-Slovakia we have lost in ourselves." There are many godly Germans who are utterly out of sympathy with the anti-Christian spirit of Nazi-ism.

NOT ALL GERMANS ARE JEW-BAITERS

In Essen, Germany, some Jewesses standing in food queues have been given precedence by their "Aryan" neighbors, says *Jewish Chronicle*. Another instance of friendliness was when a Jewess reported and surrendered her jewelry and valuables, at the command of the Nazis. The woman's son had been killed during the War, and she had a gold watch which had been given to him by his commanding officer. In tears she begged the official not to take this last memento of her boy. The official roughly ordered her out --but told her to take the watch with her.

In Vienna, during a recent black-out, huge red posters were affixed to the walls of many houses bearing the rhymed inscription: "Gone is the Jew, and we're in a stew." Following this, two other black-outs which had been planned were cancelled!

"KINGS OF THE EAST"

Christ's prediction of mighty world upheavals preceding His coming is being fulfilled before our eyes. Upton Close, an observer of Asiatic affairs, claims that Stalin holds the key to the world's destiny. Stalin's plan is to allow China to be defeated, and Japan to be exhausted, after which his agents will bring to pass the communistic revolution in those lands. The Russian dictator's vision is a communistic Asia.

NAZIS AND GOSPEL MISSIONS

At the Colonial Policy Congress recently held in Vienna to advance Gemman colonial demands, the policy of the Third Reich with respect to missionary activities was revealed. Professor Rodenwalt of Heidelburg University declared, "The bringing of Christianity to the heathen of Africa and Asia means a fatal breach between them and their traditions." The missionary outlook is gloomy for any colonies that Germany obtains!

PLEASURE LOVERS

According to *Christian Victory*, a questioner of the University of Tennessee decided—after questioning 239 girls—that the special interest to most high-school girls appears to be "timekilling amusements." The questioner, Mrs. Shaffer, reported that the movies were first among the girls' special interests; listening to the radio second; going to parties, third; reading was sixth. Cooking was far down the list and "caring for children" at the very bottom.

"Lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God !"

DEPENDENCE ON GOD

The New York *Christian Advocate* reports that Congressman Cochran of Missouri recently put into the *Congressional Record* a resolution adopted by twelve of the thirteen original colonies (Georgia not being represented at the time) which is called, "A Declaration of Dependence on God." It came in the report of a committee of three men who had been appointed to draft a resolution for a day of fasting, humiliation, and prayer. Such action is in the right direction; may such a day be appointed, and may many respond in deep sincerity.

THE FRUIT OF APOSTASY

Comments H. S. Richardson in *Prophetic News:* "The three great anti-God movements, Communism, Fascism and Nazism, have emerged out of three European countries where a type of religion was in the ascendant which was formal, without being real and vital. In these three countries, Russia, Italy and Germany, the Bible was not given its place in faith and practice. Its authority was denied, and dogma and ritual were substituted for "Thus saith the Lord.""

Is not this a grave warning to our fastapostatizing land of America?

THE GERMAN CHURCHES

Dr. A. C. Headlam, an English bishop, makes the following report as a result of his personal investigation of church conditions in Germany: "I have no doubt that the great mass of the clergy —Protestant and Catholic alike—who confine themselves to their pastoral duties, and do not mix in politics, can do their work uninterruptedly."

He adds, however, two limitations to this statement. First, that a section of the Nazi party is definitely anti-Christian and they are influencing the Youth. Second, the Nazi government gives a broad interpretation of what is meant by mixing in politics. For instance, two German pastors were penalized for offering up prayers for peace during the Munich crisis.

The bishop, while deploring the harsh treatment meted out to Pastor Niemoller, thinks that this courageous preacher acted unwisely in defying the government.

LET US BE THANKFUL

Cornelius Vanderbilt, well known news correspondent, after covering European countries in recent months, returns to say: "In the past two years I have seen more

In the past two years I have seen more horror throughout the world than I ever witnessed in my 22 months with the A. E. F. in France. I have lived through terror and degradation with both armies in Spain. I have looked upon stark madness in the Far East. I have seen men go raving mad before the firing squad in Russia. I have watched the cruel lashing punishment for political prisoners in Germany and Austria. I have been on the spot where people disappeared silently into the dark night in Italy. I have watched great air armadas spread death and destruction over scores of once beautiful cities.

"Our nation's tax load this year will be about 20 per cent of the national income, but, believe it or not, I would personally rather pay 50 per cent of my own personal income to this thing called 'government' than to have to undergo the privations, the indignities, and the outright suffering which I have witnessed with my own eyes throughout the globe lately."

UNDERCURRENTS

Heinz Liepmann in the American Mercury, tells of the underground opposition in Germany to the Hitler regime: "A citizen of Munich, where the Nazi movement got started, put a coin into a slot machine dispensing chocolate, pulled the lever, and out came—a compact, neatly packed anti-Nazi booklet. Thousands of Munich residents thus paid for sweets and received some bitter truths.

"In Cologne subscribers of an impeccably Hiterlite newspaper complained that inside the paper they had found, in place of the regular second section, an illegal pamphlet.

"A Berlin or Hamburg or Vienna burgher, having purchased a routine Guide to one of the teeming patriotic expositions, finds it crammed full of anti-fascist information and exhortation. The first few pages contain the original text, but bootleg text fills the rest of the book.

"A Brown Shirt dignitary turns on his radio, seeking some good relaxing Bierhaus music. A strange phrase freezes his fingers as he turns the dial. Denunciation of the Fuehrer! A powerful secret radio station has broken through. The writer states that some of the men engaged in this activity hold government positions.

"FOR THE HONOR OF THE NATION"

The above is the title of a new book by "Plymouth Editions," New York, in which eight eminent American Gentiles have written. This book demonstrates beyond the shadow of a doubt, says Prophecy Monthly, that the Jews not only played a most important part in the discovery of this continent but they were honorably associated with our colonial development. They helped mightily to finance the Revolution and they bore a brave part under Washington in arms. They have gained honorable distinction in every war in which the country has been engaged and have been commended by our Presidents from Washington to the present day. They have always formed a vital element in the country, nor is there any reason to believe they will not in the future make large contributions to our civilization. The proportion of criminal elements is no greater than among Gentile citizens.

One of the writers in this book is Samuel W. THE NAZIS AND THE REDSKINS

Does 1 Cor. 15:23 mean that not all Christians will rise together to meet the Lord?

We believe they will all rise together, but each in his own order, or rank. The verse divides into three sections. 1. The resurrection of Christ. 2. The resurrection of the saints. 3. Then cometh the end, or the time of the final judgment when the wicked will come forth to be judged.

Would it be possible for a person who had been caught away in the rapture to be deceived at the end of the millennium when Satan comes forth to deceive the nations?

Those who will be deceived will be from the nations that are left after the tribualtion (Zech. 14:16-19), who continue on through the millennium. The saints who are raptured will not be among those deceived by Satan at the end of the millennium, as they will have been glorified long before that time.

Will the Holy Ghost remain on earth after the rapture?

It is the writer's opinion that only the Spirit's restraining influence on iniquity will be removed at the rapture of the Church. When "the earth was without form and void" "the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters." If the Spirit thus hovered over the earth at creation, it seems reasonable to believe that He will not forsake the earth during the time of coming tribulation. Then too, if we believe that the rapture takes place before the tribulation, we also believe that souls will be saved during the tribulation. The 80th Psalm is a cry of distress. From a note in the Septuagint we gather it was a prayer sent up to God at the time when the Assyrians invaded Israel.

The Psalmist saw desolation around on every hand. The only solution was to call on God in the day of trouble. He felt that because of their many sins, God had turned His back on them, and so he sent up a heart-rending cry: "O God of hosts, turn, we pray Thee: look on us from heaven, and behold and visit this vine (for Israel was a vine of the Lord's planting); and restore that which Thy right hand has planted." We must repent of our national, ecclesiastical, and personal sins if we would expect God to answer our prayers for peace.
