-MERGENCY" is a word of the moment. "Emergency session of Congress," we read, "emergency powers to the Government," or "emergency session of Par-liament." From across the sea we read of emergency air-raid shelters. For housewives we read of emergency recipes for preserving fruit without sugar. Women are requested to be ready upon emergency to take positions vacated by recruited men. Abnormal measures for an abnormal hour. War again stalks the earth as the nations, nearing their time of travail, move to take each one its position as scripturally indicated, for the approaching Armageddon. As a snare, a trap, coil-like, its mazes settle down.

The Spirit-warned and scripturally-warned believer is not being taken unawares. For him this hour has its comforting side, "Then lift up your heads for your redemption draweth nigh." He sees beyond the vexation and calamity.

Always before similar contingencies has the Spirit been faithful. Such, partly, was the ministry of the great prophets. Scofield says regarding the prophet Isaiah, "His testimony to his own time includes warnings of coming judgments upon the great nations of that day." He says, "Prophets were men raised up of God in times of declension and apostasy, . . . primarily revivalists and patriots, speaking on behalf of God to the heart and conscience of the nation."

Upon Jeremiah fell the spirit of prophecy for an emergency hour. "Thou shalt not... have sons or daughters in this place, for thus saith the Lord concerning the sons and daughters that are born in this place, ... they shall die of grievous deaths." This was an extreme emergency measure. The message of warning he found hard. Being publicly humiliated by being placed in stocks, he found hard. So much so that, wishing to be released, he cried, "I was made a derision daily. Then said I, I will not make mention of him, nor speak any more in His name." The spirit of prophecy that had fallen upon him prevailed. So he admitted, "But his word was in mine heart as a burning fire shut up in my bones," he could not cease. The message must go forth.

Upon Elijah fell the emergency type of ministry; burning prophetic words. No normal home. Just mountain fastnesses, or by a drying brook. His meals not normal; his clothing likewise. An emergency message that must be delivered. Yet when God was through with him below he had also a homegoing for him that was far from normal.

Upon John Baptist an emergency type of ministry likewise fell. His desert home was not normal. Eating locusts and wild honey, and wearing a leathern girdle about his loins was far from normal. His message was of the urgency for immediate action.

Upon Christ and His Apostles rested an emergency ministry. Sleeping upon the cold Judean hills. Eating what was offered to them. No settled home life to count upon. If at times they, as well as earlier prophets, shrank from being so much deprived of the comforts others enjoyed, no doubt they prophetically looked ahead, and perceived the approach of the bour when those whom they now sought to warn and teach should be faced with fear, homelessness, sword and hunger. This is plainly told us in an incident that occurred on Christ's route to the Cross. To some who looked on, bewailing and lamenting Him, He turned and said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, weep not for me, but weep for yourselves, and for your children. For behold the days are coming when they shall say . . to the mountains, Fall on us; and to the hills, Cover us."

Upon a Holy Ghost company has fallen again the spirit of prophecy—an emergency ministry. What means the phenomenal growth of tabernacles throughout the land? What mean the countless nights of broken rest, nights of travel, far from home? While other groups dwindle, sitting at ease in Zion, what is the meaning of the swelling host of young witnesses for Christ springing up in the Latter Rain movement, pressed on in the Spirit to be, should need arise, even martyrs for the testimony of Christ? It is an emergency moving of God's Spirit. "They spake with tongues and prophesied." Prophetic. Significant.

An emergency pressure of the Spirit! Has that been the explanation of the constantly blazing lights of our meeting places, with their "JESUS SAVES," or, "RE-VIVAL SERVICES" in electric signs, or red lettered canvas, throughout the land? Is that the explanation behind the admittedly motley host of witnesses? What age has ever seen just such a company? What abnormal hours they have kept, praying, tarrying, seeking the face of God on into midnight hours. What abnormal church programs they have carried on, compared to the normal, comfortably settled programs of twice on Sunday, and one midweek hour.

If the only object of the church was to provide a church home for the saints, and a place for them to be fed, then there are many things that we are doing that we would not do. Endeavor to secure downtown quarters; electric or Neon signs to arrest the attention of the stranger; the grand piano; the radio program. That is an important object, but not the only one. A church is commissioned to win the lost. We are told to go out in the highways and

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The Heavenly Vision

WHEREUPON, O King Agrippa, I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision." Acts 26:19.

Oh, the glory, the power and the blessing of this heavenly vision—this soultransforming, action-inspiring, sufferingdefying vision!

I do not know just when the apostle received the first glimpse of this heavenly vision. It might have been while he was still one of the seventy elders, a member of the Sanhedrin at Jerusalem, when a young man was brought to them charged with diverting the hearts of the people from the traditions of the fathers. While they threatened him his face shone like that of an angel. And Stephen, looking up into heaven, said, "Behold, I see heaven opened and the Son of man standing at the right hand of the throne of God." The glory of God, shining from the countenance of Him whose face outshines the noonday sun, was reflected upon the face of His martyr-disciple, and there perhaps, Saul of Tarsus caught a glimpse of this heavenly vision.

Again when Stephen was dragged out of the city, and the stones rained upon him, Paul saw him still looking upward, and the glory of heaven still shining down upon the martyr as he sank to his knees, praying, "Lord, lay not this sin to their charge." The reflected glory of this heavenly vision shines from the face of the martyr, while with body bruised and bones crushed, he cries, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." Then that soul, leaving that broken body, goes up, up, through the pearly gates and into the arms of Christ who, looking down from the battlements of heaven, has been waiting to receive His first martyr.

But the *climax* of this heavenly vision came to Saul while riding on the Damascus road. Suddenly he saw a light that outshone the brightness of the noonday sun and heard a voice that thundered through his being, striking the rider to the dust. "Who art thou, Lord?" he cried; and when he heard the answer, "I am Jesus," he said, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?"

He was not disobedient to the heavenly vision then, or at any later time through his life.

It was, first of all, a soul-transforming vision, for there on the Damascus road he not only lost his physical sight for three days, but also lost sight forever of the earthly things—his human and natural ambitions. He had somewhat in which to glory. "Circumcised the eighth day, of the stock of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, an Hebrew of the Hebrews; as touching the law, a Pharisee; concerning zeal, persecuting the church; touching the righteousness which is in the law, blameless." But he said, "What things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ." He had many things that might have given him popularity and prestige. Doubtless he had

many plans and ambitions, but one glimpse of that heavenly vision and all his natural desires and ambitions lay shattered at his feet.

Friends, what we need this day is a heavenly vision, a vision that will transform our lives, cause us to lose sight of all earthly ambitions and all earthly plans, and be completely yielded to and controlled by Him. The song writer says:

"What the world needs is Jesus Just one glimpse of Him."

And another says:

"Turn your eyes upon Jesus, Look full in His wonderful face, And the things of earth will grow strangely dim In the light of His glory and grace."

Not only is it a soul-transforming or life-transforming vision, but it is also an



action-inspiring vision. When Saul lay in the dust he said, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" He realized he had to do something. There is much to be done. These are the last days and what we do we must do quickly. Saul did his part. Being let down over the wall in a basket at Damascus he began his famous missionary tours, the story of which has astonished mankind, and the effects of which is not yet fully known. Nothing could stop him, no opposition or persecution, no perils on land or sea, no scourging or beating, no hunger or cold. No Philippian jail could confine him. No storm could overwhelm him. No waves of the sea could drown him. No serpent could kill him. His work had to be done. He went on defying all danger and finished the work God had given him to do.

This heavenly vision will inspire us to action too. There is a great deal that has to be done and I wonder whether we are doing our *best* for Jesus? Of course, I realize that we are doing *something*. When we consider what we are doing compared to what some are doing for God and the promotion of His cause, we rejoice. But we dare not compare ourselves with those who have left their first love, whose zcal has cooled, and whose revival fires are

quenched. Our standard is the Acts of the Apostles. Let us judge ourselves by it.

I confess to you as a minister of the gospel, and a missionary, that in spite of the fact that we are rejoicing in what God has enabled us as a movement to do in the last twenty-five years, and in what we are doing now, I am not satisfied.

When I read the report of the General Council I read it with mixed feelings. First, there was gratitude and praise to God for what He has enabled us to do and for the way the work has grown at home and abroad. But on the other hand, when I consider what needs to be done, and how small a part of our great task we are accomplishing, my heart is burdened and I feel ashamed. About 3,500 churches belong to our fellowship, but of these about 850, during the last two years have not contributed anything to World Missions. About one-quarter of our constituency has failed to catch the vision or recognize their responsibility, and have done nothing toward World Missions. Are we satisfied with that? I cannot conceive of a Pentecostal, Spiritfilled church with a Spirit-filled pastor, failing to contribute to World Missions. Either they have never had the heavenly vision or they are disobedient to it.

There are those who are contributing nobly, sacrificingly, but I wonder if we are doing all we can. Our church has about 250,000 members; yet according to the report of the Foreign Missions Department these 250,000 believers have only contributed a little more than \$36,000 a month during the last two years, or about $14\frac{1}{2}$ cents a month per person. Think of it! A Spirit-filled movement in this country of plenty, has contributed only about $14\frac{1}{2}$ cents a month per person, less than half a cent a day.

"Christian America" spends more for chewing gum than for World Missions. My heart was stirred and moved with shame when I looked at the statistics and wondered if it could be possible that our Spirit-filled Pentecostal believers are not contributing more than $3\frac{1}{2}$ cents a week toward World Missions. I wonder if we are not as guilty as the rest in contributing less toward Missions than we spend for chewing gum.

Beloved, in view of these facts, I feel we need an action-inspiring vision, a new vision of our responsibility, for should the Lord come and we are expecting Him, I wonder if we should be satisfied and feel that we had done our best.

This heavenly vision is not only an action-inspiring vision, but it is also a sacrifice-inspiring, or a suffering-defying vision. When Paul caught that vision, Christ said, "I will show him what great things he must suffer for my Name's sake." But regardless of suffering Paul was willing to go through. He says: "Of the Jews five times received I forty stripes save one. Thrice was I beaten with rods, once was I stoned, thrice I suffered shipwreck, a night and a day have I been in the deep. In journeyings often, in perils of waters, in perils of robbers, in perils of mine own countrymen, in perils by the heathen, in perils in the city, in perils in the wilderness, in perils in the sea, in perils among

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The Blind See, The Cripples Walk

Many of you have heard of the untouchables in India. There are 60 millions They are not lepers, but they of them. were born low caste, the very lowest of the low, and they have no place, no status in India. Because of the caste system no opportunities are held out to them, no chance of rising from the low caste that they were born in. If you should meet a Hindu priest who was dying with thirst, and suggest to him that he drink from an untouchable's water jar to save his life, that priest would throw up his hands in horror. He would not think of such a thing as to drink from the water jar of an untouchable. It would break his caste and he would become an outcaste. The very touch of these outcaste people is defiling. And at the end of life there is considered no salvation for them because they were unfortunate enough to be born untouchables.

But there is one man in India who is championing the cause of these untouchables, a Hindu, educated in Oxford university, in England. He is a remarkable man, who has a wonderful position, though he himself is an untouchable. How he ever rose to this place no one knows, but by sheer perseverance and ability he has risen. But that man could not drink from the village well or the well where the high caste people drink, although he has a wonderful education and is very refined. But a person of no ability and no education whatsoever, if he were a Brahman, could drink, while this one would have to step back because he is an untouchable.

This educated man has seen the unfairness of it all, and is championing the cause of these 60 million untouchables. There is a day coming when this man will write a page of India's history. The people in the Christian church should lay hold of God for this man, that God would reach his soul.


We know the only hope for these poor people, the only thing that can lift them up and give them a place, is the gospel of Jesus Christ. Let us take them upon our hearts. This is the day of opportunity in India. The leaders of one of the religions in India (the Sikh) have seen that there is an opportunity to work among these people and try to win them for their religion. The Mohammedans also see an opportunity and they have gathered together a large sum of money, many thousands of dollars, for this purpose, and are training 1,000 young Mohammedans to send out as evangelists to work among these people and convert them to the Mohammedan religion. Now what is the Christion church doing?

I am sorry to tell you that in some districts church doors are being closed, especially in the Methodist church. Because of the depression in the past years, and lack of money, they have recalled many of their missionaries and dismissed their Indian workers. In some places whole districts have been closed, and churches which were dedicated to the worship of the living God are being used for other purposes. I wonder what we are doing? Oh, I thank God that our Pentecostal people have not had to retrench as yet, and I pray God they never will. I believe we shall never retrench until Jesus comes. There are a number of faith missionariës who have not retrenched and who have dared to step out and believe God. They are working among these people and God is working upon hearts.

India is one of the hardest fields in the world, but I thank God that in these last few years He has given us some very precious fruit. Now we have in India several schools, a school for girls and two for boys, and a Bible school for young man and one for young women. In former years we had to take as our native workers those who came from other denominations, whatever we could get, and trust God to bring them into a place of real service. But today we have our Bible schools where our young men and women are being trained and are going out into the work.

Since I have been here I have received a report concerning a young Brahman priest from Nepal. He had been seeking the truth for five years and somehow the Lord led him to our station, and there he was given a Bible. He was taught, and was gloriously saved. This young man has now been sent to Bible school to train for Christian work. He has the burden of his country on his heart and as soon as he has sufficient Bible training he expects to go into that land which is closed to missionaries, and preach the gospel of Jesus Christ to his people.

We also have in our mission a worker about whom perhaps some of you have read in the Evangel. This man was a Brahmin, an educated man. He compared the Christian religion with the Mohammedan books and with his own religion, and was convinced that there is only one way to be saved and that is through the Lord Jesus Christ. He determined he was go-



ing to follow the Lord and be baptized, but when the time came the Brahmin priest threatened to kill him and do all kinds of things and his courage failed him. Finally one night as he was running away, in the middle of the night, as he was lying asleep, the Lord Jesus appeared to him and he was gloriously saved there alone at the railway station.

That man today is a preacher of the gospel in the power of God. He has charge of one of the out-stations and God is using him in a remarkable way. Hundreds, yea, thousands of people have come to his little home for prayer; sometimes as many as a thousand people come to the healing meetings which are conducted each Sunday. There have been marvelous healings-the blind have their sight restored, and deaf and dumb people have been healed-not one or two, but large numbers of them. Hundreds of cripples of all descriptions, some born crippled, have been delivered in the mighty name of Jesus. Some have been brought on beds, unable to walk, and after prayer in the mighty name of the Lord Jesus have been able to rise and go home carrying their own beds. Oh, I praise God that we have a God of power!

In a place where we have opened an outstation, they have established a little church and 30 people have taken their stand for God. Most of these are from the untouchables and they have no means of helping with the work. Their leader was the first to be baptized. He was getting seventeen rupees a month as a sweeper. Now, since he became a Christian, the native church gives him eight rupees a month, a little less than half of what he got as a sweeper. As a result of his ministry sixteen sweepers in another town have taken their stand for Christ and have been baptized. They have decided they want a church of their own, where they can meet for worship and prayer, and have asked if we could get them a little piece of property which would cost about \$25.00. So they are going to put up a church.

Two Mighty Miracles

One of the elders of the Dutch Reformed Church in South Africa by the name of Mr. Wessels saw the truth of Divine Healing and began to pray for the sick. As a result there were great miracles taking place, and this very quickly became noised abroad. The district leaders of that Church were much displeased over this and called a meeting of all the ministers to discuss the matter, with a view to either stopping Mr. Wessels from praying for the sick or putting him out of the Church.

The day came for the meeting. While Mr. Wessels and four other ministers were at the station waiting for the train that was to take them to the appointed place, a woman came with her two children. One of the children, nine years old, which the mother was carrying, was so badly crippled in its arms and legs that it was unable to help itself or to walk. Its arms and legs were all drawn up and stiff. The other child, aged seven, was completely blind.

As Mr. Wessels looked upon this scene he said within himself, "It was for such

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Pentecost-the Best Wine at the Last

They were at an end of natural resources. Catastrophe faced the bridegroom as far as the entertainment of the company was concerned. The disciples were powerless. They had seen no miracle. The mother of Jesus had a fraction of faith. She stated the circumstances, "They have no wine," but had no solution of the difficulty. She thought her Son would be the solution. Her surmise was right. He is, was, and ever will be the solution of every difficulty.

His mother said to the servants, "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it." So He gave the commandment to the servants to fill up the waterpots with water. There was always plenty of water. Then when the servants had filled up the waterpots He said to them, "Draw out now, and bear unto the governor of the feast."

Now would be the opportunity for any critics present to pass their opinions. They said later on, "He deceiveth the people." The critics would say, "He is actually sending off water to the governor. Bad wine, inferior wine, is bad; but water for a wedding! an insult!"

As a precaution the governor tasted it first, so that no tricks could be played on the guests. The critics would say, "Oh, yes, it is palming off water on the governor. We saw the whole transaction. We saw the waterpots filled with water to the brim. There is no fooling us." But they would be losing sight of His Godhead. It was not sleight of hand. It was the Divine working on the material, unseen by the human.

He took the five loaves and two fishes and blessed and brake and gave them. And He could have kept on breaking them to feed not only five thousand but five million or thirty-five million. He has been doing it ever since. How was it done? The Son of God did not explain His divinity, His Godhead, His might, His power. You can see the results, and the result of seeing should be worship.

The servants were privileged. They knew. The Lord is always privileging His servants. "It shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of My Spirit upon all flesh . . . and on my servants and on my handmaidens will I pour out in those days of My Spirit; and they shall prophesy." His servants shall know. The servants who carried the precious drink were in the position to know, far better than any critical onlooker.

The governor of the feast called the bridegroom and said, "Every man at the beginning doth set forth good wine; but when men have well drunk, then that which is worse: but thou hast kept the good wine until now." Poor governor! He gave the credit to the wrong person; and lots of people today are rejoicing in God's privileges, but they give the tribute in the wrong place. God answers prayer in healings. The healed ones give credit to nature, circumstances, and doctors, instead of giving praise to Him who is the great Physician. And so it is in every department of life.

Like Christ: In Suffering Wrong Andrew Murray

"For this is thankworthy, if a man for conscience toward God endure grief, suffering wrongfully. For what glory is it, if, when ye be buffeted for your faults, ye shall take it patiently? but if, when ye do well, and suffer for it, ye take it patiently, this is acceptable with God." 1 Peter 2:19, 20.

Let us study the example of Christ. From Him we may learn what it was that gave Him the power to bear injuries patiently.

Christ believed in suffering as the will of Cod. He had found it in Scripture that the servant of God should suffer. He had made Himself familiar with the thought, so that when suffering came, it did not take Him by surprise. He expected it. He knew that thus He must be perfected; and so His first thought was not how to be delivered from it, but how to glorify God in it. This enabled Him to bear the greatest injustice quietly. He saw God's hand in it.

Christian! would you have strength to suffer wrong in the spirit in which Christ did? Accustom yourself in everything that happens, to recognize the hand and will of God. This lesson is of more consequence than you think. Whether it be some great wrong that is done you, or some little offence that you meet in daily life, before you fix your thoughts on the person who did it, first be still, and remember, God allows me to come into this trouble to see if I shall glorify Him in it. This trial, be it the greatest or least, is allowed by God, and is His will concerning me. Let me first recognize and submit to God's will in it. Then in the rest of the soul which this gives, I shall receive wisdom to know how to behave in it. With my eye turned from man to God, suffering wrong is not so hard as it seems.

Christ also believed that God would care for His rights and honor. There is an innate sense of right within us that comes from God. But he who lives in the visible,

wants his honor to be vindicated at once here below. He who lives in the eternal, and as seeing the Invisible, is satisfied to leave the vindication of his rights and honor in God's hands; he knows that they are safe with Him. It was thus with the Lord Jesus. Peter writes, "He committed Himself to Him that judgeth righteously.' It was a settled thing between the Father and the Son, that the Son was not to care for His own honor, but only for the Father's. The Father would care for the Son's honor. Let the Christian just follow Christ's example in this; it will give him such rest and peace. Give your rights and your honor into God's keeping. Meet every offence that man commits against you with the firm trust that God will watch over and care for you. Commit it to Him who judgeth righteously.

Further, Christ believed in the power of suffering love. We all admit that there is no power like that of love. Through it Christ overcomes the ennity of the world. We all acknowledge the truth of this as a principle, but we shrink from the application. Christ believed it, and acted accordingly. He believed that by silence and submission, and suffering and bearing wrong, He would win the cause, because thus love would have its triumph.

And this is what He desires of us too. In our sinful nature there is more faith in might and right than in the heavenly power of love. But he who would be like Christ must follow Him in this also, that He seeks to conquer evil with good. The more another does him wrong, the more he feels called to love him. Even if it be needful for the public welfare that justice should punish the offender, he takes care that there be in it nothing of personal feeling; as far as he is concerned, he forgives and loves.

Ah, what a difference it would make in Christendom and in our churches, if Christ's example were followed; if each one who was reviled, "reviled not again;" if each one who suffered, "threatened not, but committed himself to Him that judgeth righteously." Fellow Christians, this is literally what the Father would have us do. Let us read and read again the words of Peter, until our soul be filled with the thought, "If, when ye do well, and suffer for it, ye take it patiently, *this is acceptable with God.*"

Beloved fellow Christian! would you not love to be like Jesus, and in bearing injuries act as He Himself would have acted in your place? Is it not a glorious prospect in everything, even in this too, to be conformed to Him? For our strength it is too high; in His strength it is possible. Only surrender yourself day by day to Him to be in all things just what He would have you to be. Believe that He lives in heaven to be the life and the strength of each one who seeks to walk in His footsteps. Yield yourself to be one with the suffering, crucified Christ, that you may understand what it is to be dead to sins, and to live unto righteousness. And it will be your joyful experience to know what wonderful power there is in Jesus' death, not only to atone for sin, but to break its power; and in His resurrection, to make you live unto righteousness.

You shall find it equally blessed to follow fully the footsteps of the suffering Saviour, as it has been to trust fully and only in that suffering for atonement and redemption. Christ will be as precious as your Example as He has ever been as your Surety. Because He took your sufferings upon Himself, you will lovingly take His sufferings upon yourself. And bearing wrong will become a glorious part of the fellowship with His holy sufferings; a glorious mark of being conformed to His most holy likeness; a most blessed fruit of the true life of faith.

"Cannibals Want Missionaries" A True Story

"Why, sure they do," exclaimed Charles T. Studd when he saw this notice, so worded as to naturally raise the query, "What for?"

When Charlie Studd read this announcement he was fifty years of age. He had just returned from India where for years he had labored in a living death from asthma. He had hardly ever slept between two and four o'clock at night. Night after night he had sat up in a chair fighting for breath. His wife wrote, "Charlie is a wreck, and almost the slightest movement brings on asthma." The disease was chronic and humanly incurable. He had suffered fifteen terrible years.

But God has many ways to speak to His obedient children, and by letting Charlie Studd see this unique notice was the method He used in calling Studd to be a missionary in the heart of Africa, and pioneer-founder of the great Heart of Africa Mission. He talked with the missionary Karl Kumm who, being a foreigner, was ignorant of the unfortunate choice he had made in selecting the words composing his notice. He told Studd of multitudes of people in Central Africa who had never heard the gospel. Explorers, big game hunters, European officials, scientists, and traders had been among them, but no messengers of the Cross. The shame of it sank deep into Studd's soul. "Why have no Christians gone?" he cried. "Why don't you go?" God replied.

"The doctors will not permit," he answered.

"Am I not the Good Physician?" God reasoned. "Can I not take you through? Can I not keep you there?"

He promised God he would go; but how? Fifteen years he had been dragging around half dead, it seemed, with asthma. He had no money. Going through with such an undertaking would tax the utmost strength of the strongest man. However, upon his insistence a committee agreed to send him if the doctors would agree; but when the doctors refused, the committee declined to do anything. But God said, "Go," and he had promised God he would go.

He began praying and money began coming in. When he had partly enough to pay his fare one way he booked passage. Even his wife, a woman of remarkable faith and consecration, who had stood with him faithfully during his many years of missionary service first in China and then in India, could not agree that it was God's will for him to go out to Africa to die, as it seemed certain would be the case if he went.

A "gambler for God," he joined the ranks of the great "gamblers of faith," Abraham, Moses, Paul, etc. "Men that have hazarded (literally gambled with) their lives for the name of the Lord Jesus Christ." December 15, 1910 he sailed from Liverpool. "My soul is on fire," he wrote, "to do the work of Christ. I seem to hear Jesus saying, 'Go over and possess the good land of the world. Every place your feet shall tread upon (thank God my feet are large), to you have I given it."

Accompanied by Bishop Gwynne he set off for the Southern Sudan. On foot and by mule they trekked for two and a half months in such a deadly country that twenty-five of the twenty-nine donkeys they used died, but Studd was kept splendidly fit throughout. They decided there was no proper ending for a new missionary effort in that land they explored, but they heard that in the Belgian Congo there were vast masses of people as depraved and destitute as any, who had never heard of Christ. Studd decided to go to them.

Eighteen months later he and a young companion of only twenty were pushing their lonely adventurous way into the very heart of the Belgian Congo—the first pioneers of the Heart of Africa Mission. Seeking to stir up enthusiasm at home he had shouted:

"We pray and preach; we bow the knee; we receive; we administer the Holy Communion of the Passion of Christ; we recite the creed triumphantly; we shout, 'Onward Christian soldiers, marching as to war,' and then?—we whisper, 'I pray thee have me excused!' What glorious humbugs we are!"

He and his coadjutors in deciding upon the policy that should characterize the whole enterprise, determined that "the funds for this work shall be sought from God only. Nobody else shall be asked for a donation or a subscription. No collection for this work shall ever be taken up at any meeting held or recognized by this brotherhood."

"I know I am God's" (he wrote that first day in Belgian Congo); "I know I only want His glory and the salvation of others, and I know He knows it. I never was better nor stronger for years and years, but best of all, I know God is with us. He talks to me, and His blessed Word means more than ever before, and urges me on more and more, and makes me burn to dare and do for Him."

Later on he took the African fever and was near to death when he was reminded of the Bible instruction to call for the elders and be anointed with oil. There was no elder but twenty-year-old Barclay F. Buxton, his companion. There was no oil of any kind but kerosene; but the Bible did not say what *kind* of oil. "We must not be narrow minded, he wrote humorously. So he was anointed and prayed over. The next morning he was sound and well.

How to Improve Your Sunday School

Note: This is the first of a series of twelve articles under the above title which will appear in forthcoming issues of the Pentecostal Evangel. The reader may wish to clip and paste them in a notebook for future reference.

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1. 20% Attendance Gain. Previous to the opening of the evening service in a certain large church, a mother was seen wheeling her baby to the side door. Accommodating ushers lifted the baby carriage up the steps and placed it near the speaker's desk. It is not uncommon for a mother to bring her baby in a baby carriage to service, but the unusual thing in this case was that the baby had a mustache and was perhaps something like 40 years of age. Although pitiably undeveloped, this baby was fondly loved by his mother.

We think of the many Sunday Schools still in the baby carriage stage; Schools which have never grown—victims of arrested development. God loves these babies as much as He does His big, healthy, well-grown fellows, but we imagine His heart longs for the day when the condition hindering their growth will be removed.

A worthy goal for which to strive is a 20% yearly gain in membership for each Sunday School. Some may think this difficult for a very large Sunday School, located in a large city, yet this is possible, if the School has trained leadership and all members are active.

How can a Sunday School increase numerically each year? First, by knowing the possibilities for growth. This calls for a community survey to ascertain the number of unreached souls.

Sunday School superintendents are often heard to remark at the close of the session, "Everybody bring somebody next Sunday"-and nobody does it! This is too indefinite. We must be systematic. Your community, if large, should be divided into small districts. A capable leader should be appointed as captain over each one. Assistants should be assigned to him, or he should be given the liberty of selecting a number of earnest Christians to help him canvass that district and to meet prospects. Canvassing should be done with more than the thought of merely inviting people to increase the Sunday School. Visitors should make their calls with the purpose of ministering to the needs of the homes. They should ascer-tain the number of residents-those who are not Christians, and babies or shut-ins who can be ministered to by the extension departments-the Cradle Roll and the Home Department.

When the statistics of the prospects are gathered and compiled, assignments should be made to different classes of the School. Revisitation should then be made by representatives of those districts. One visit is not enough.

Sales managers encourage their salesmen by assuring them that if they will make as many as thirty-five calls a day, they will have all the business they will need to make a fat paycheck. Also, salesmen are assured that if they call upon a client as many as seven times, they will have a very high percentage of sales. It is not enough, therefore, for Christians merely to call one, two, or three times. Let us be pleasant, courteous, and persistent in our calls. Fully detailed instruction for this type of work may be found in our new book, "The Cure for Empty Pews," by Kenneth G. Olsen, price 35c.

When visitors are brought to the Sunday School, their names, addresses, etc., should be recorded on Classification Slip, Form No. 9, price 10c per 100. This should be repeated their first three Sundays. Immediately following this the General Secretary will enroll their names, addresses, and other information on individual record cards (price 1c each). Use form No. 10 in the case of a pupil of three to eight years of age; Form No. 11 for pupils from nine to adulthood. If the new pupil is brought by a regular scholar, a green star (signifying life, activity, and growth) will be pasted on the margin on the individual record card belonging to the pupil who brought the visitor. If the visitor attends three Sundays and is enrolled as a regular member, the worker is entitled to a gold star (signifying rewards) on the record card. If the new one is unsaved and the older member by the help of the Lord helps him to respond to the altar call, and prays with him until he is brought to a definite experience with Christ, the worker is entitled to have a red star (signifying salvation through the Blood) pasted on the margin of his record card.

We have in our office a card made out for an intermediate girl who was not only faithful in the six points of the record system, but was also faithful in witnessing. Her individual record card carries thirty-five green stars, twelve gold ones, and eight red. It makes a most beautiful sight. However, the ministry back of it is far more beautiful than the card!

This plan provides for individual record cards of the Four and Six Point Record System doing double duty. It gives the pupil visible reward in striving to be a 100% pupil (present, on time, with studied lesson, bringing offering, bringing a Bible, and remaining for church). It also provides recognition of his faithfulness in winning unreached ones, encouraging them to become members of the Sunday School, and later to be won to Christ. (Ask for free sample copies of our Simplified Record System.)

This plan, if adopted by the Sunday School and if properly supervised and encouraged by the pastor, superintendent, department heads, and teachers, will undoubtedly give the School three most desirable accomplishments:

1. Every member of the church a member of your Sunday School.

2. Every member of your Sunday School for Christ and the church.

3. Every member of the Sunday School an active member.

As a result of such systematic canvassing and house-to-house visitation, classes—especially children's—may increase so rapidly that it will be necessary to divide them. One worker suggested that the teacher who could, with the help of her pupils, build up her class to the point of division (thirteen or more) should be recognized by the Sunday School with an appropriate reward.

We trust that the reader will see the possibility of using these suggestions in the work of the local Sunday School to accomplish a 20% Increase in Attendance.

He remarked, "We *can* trust Him too little, but we *cannot* trust God too much."

At last, on October 16, 1913, they gained their heart's desire, reaching Niangara, the very heart of Africa, after nine months of arduous traveling and living mostly in tents, during which time, as he said afterwards, "We got into so many tight corners, but always found God there, that we began to look out for, nay even desired tight corners to get into, that we might see how God would extricate us from them."

Gaining a concession at Niangara and beginning to put up buildings, he went on five days journey to Nala where he got another concession. The country swarmed with laughing delighted people who ran along by his bicycle in the greatest glee. He says:

"It was the funniest thing in the world to see a woman catch the first sight of one riding alone. Her face would express terror as though she had seen the devil; then all of a sudden it would be changed into a huge broad smile, and she would drop her work and run after us, joining in the fun as only an African woman can."

He undertook another trek to Poko and another of six days to Bambili, at both of which places concessions were secured. Thus one man, and he as good as dead, past fifty-two years of age, overcoming the greatest obstructions of the friends at home, of savage and warlike tribes, and impossible disease-infested strange country, opened up in the very center of the dark continent the densely populated country where the gospel had never been preached, but which has ever since been occupied by the Heart of Africa Mission.

Leaving his young companion to welcome the new recruits who were even then on their way, financed and sent out through the indefatigable labors, faith, and prayers of his wife, Charlie Studd turned his face toward home. He trekked three hundred miles to the Congo, then proceeded seven hundred miles down stream in a boat, then home to England to go up and down the land like a quenchless flame of fire, arousing people to either go or send to the waiting multitudes in the new mission territory.

This true story has been gleaned from the delightfully interesting book of 266 pages, called, "C. T. Studd, Athlete and Pioneer," by Norman P. Grubb, for sale at Gospel Publishing House for \$1.25 postpaid. The book is a remarkable tonic to faith.

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THE DYING WORLD THE LIVING WORD

BIRDS TRAINED FOR WAR

The fact, reported in the *Gospel Minister*, that Russia has a million carrier pigeons trained for carrying war reports, shows that the Scriptures are up-to-date even on this point. In Eccl. 10:20 we read, "A bird of the air shall carry the voice, and that which hath wings shall tell the matter."

FINLAND'S NATIONAL ANTHEM

At this time of Finland's national crisis it is interesting to note that the national anthem written by Finland's renowned composer, Jean Sibelius, and loved by the Finns, has found its way into the new hymnals of Protestant churches. One line of the anthem reads, "Be still, my soul; the Lord is on my side."

WHAT MONEY CANNOT BUY

Although the *Wall Street Journal* supposedly is not a religious paper, it recently said: "Money can do many things, but there are two things money cannot buy: happiness and heaven." These are gifts from God which come only to those who receive Christ's salvation and obey His Word.

LYING SPIRITS

The Satanic powers behind spiritists may be real, but the predictions of spiritists are often erroneous. A front page editorial in *Psychic News*, the chief spiritist journal, admits that most mediums had predicted that England would not go to war. Happily the confidence of many Englishmen in spiritism has thus been shattered, and we trust that fewer people will resort to the mediums for prophecies and for supposed "messages" from dead soldiers than did so in the last war.

A MEXICAN PROTEST

Mexicans are taking exception to the way Americans dress while in their country, and their attitude should put our country to shame. According to *Herald of Holiness*, the chamber of commerce at Monterrey has posted notices in the hotel rooms advising visitors that the Mexican temperament cannot quite accommodate itself to seeing women on the streets in "play suits" or "shorts and shirts." Churches have posted signs announcing "females in men's attire" not admitted.

SOLVING THE JEWISH PROBLEM

According to several press reports, the new Jewish province which the Nazis propose to create is to be centered round Lublin in Central Poland. Another source, says Jewish Chronicle, declares that the new Jewish region will be centered in Galicia in Southern Poland. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency, reports however, that not one but many Jewish "reservations" may be established in the more sparsely populated parts of Polang. All German Jews would be consigned to such "reservations" and non-Jews evacuated.

SLAVERY FOR THE ISRAELITES

Adolph Hitler is playing the role of Pharaoh in the new Israelitish bondage. According to the Swiss daily Bund, the Gestapo has worked out a detailed plan for drafting the entire Jewish population in Germany into labor battalions supervised by S. S. Black Guards. Thousands of Jews in Germany have been ordered to report for labor service. Many Jewish girls have already been sent to unknown destinations to do forced labor. The pay is barely enough for food and shelter and they live a slave existence, says Jewish Missionary Magazine. When ill they receive no re-This situation prevails in Slovakia also, lief where all male Jews from the age of 19 to 49, by a new decree of the Slovak Government, are subject to work service. The military authorities long ago compiled a register of all Jews of military age and are now using them for digging trenches or as artisans.

UNITING THE DEMOCRACIES

The spirit of union which eventually will unite the nations under the Antichrist is already at work. In his book, "Union Now," Clarence K. Streit proposes a federal union of the democracies of the North Atlantic under a Constitution similar to the one under which the Thirteen Colonies of America were united. The plan embraces fifteen democracies, including South Africa, New Zealand, and Australia.

NATIONS AGAINST NATIONS

"A depth often lies in Scripture which is only revealed by events," writes D. M. Panton. "'Nation shall rise against nation,' our Lord says (Matt. 24:7), not only 'kingdom against kingdom.' In the State controlled by a dictator, no man, no home, no institution but is conscripted for war, so that any home may at any moment be bombed out and any family slaughtered; and every other State is therefore compelled so to monopolize its resources that each entire nation is hurled at the entire opposing nation.'" "War," says a leading journalist, "is nations against nations, not armies against armies."

THE DECAY OF RELIGION

The Chairman of the Congregational Union of England and Wales says, according to the *Gospel Minister*: "There is a diminishing membership; structures that were built fifty years or more ago are now far too big and apt to become our prisons. It is not unusual to see a building capable of seating 1,000 to 1,500 with a congregation of 100 and heavy overhead expenses for the upkeep of the structure. The church meeting itself hardly draws ten per cent of its membership."

Churches that offer nothing more than a powerless form of religion are decaying and passing away, but those that keep the fire of God burning upon their altars are still attracting the perishing multitudes by their promise of reality and life.

PEACE IN PALESTINE

The past month was the most peaceful in three and a half years in Palestine, reports *Jewish Frontier*. As Palestine has become a belligerent on the side of the allies, German propaganda and influence has been eliminated and the Arab rebellion consequently has subsided. Many Arabs are coming to the offices of the Jewish National Fund in Jerusalem and offering land for sale. The Arabs are bringing their wares into the marketplaces of the Jewish colonies. Furthermore, since Britain declared war on Germany she has withdrawn her strict guarding of Palestine ports against "illegal" immigrants. It is reported that London has ordered the British consul in Trieste to grant visas to Palestine to more than three thousand people.

THE REVIVAL OF ISRAEL

Jewish leaders see the need of it. Rabbi Dr. Leo Juny writes in the Jewish Weekly: "When we entered Palestine for the first time, we had seen Sinai first. Only when we are imbued with the message of Sinai, can we hope to regain Zion. A national revival without a religious reinspiration, a return to the soil without a return to its soul, is an empty shell, a ghastly mockery. Hence the reconstruction of the Jewish home-land, Jewishly speaking, means that the thought and the act of the Torah (the Scriptures) will be evident in the school as in the field, in the workshop as in the counsel chamber. Just as we cannot imagine a single normal Jew uninterested in the upbuilding of Palestine, so can we not imagine a single normal Jew who could believe that mere physical restoration without spiritual renaissance could end in anything but disaster to the Jewish people and the Jewish land.'

But Jewry will have to come to Mt. Calvary for revival, a revival they will never find at Sinai.

The possibility of relaxation of the anti-Jewish laws in Germany was seen in notices posted at the German Consulate in Antwerp inviting physicians, engineers, and technicians "of German nationality regardless of race" to return immediately to the Reich. The move was regarded as an attempt to attract Jewish physicians and other specialists back to Germany during the war, says Jewish Missionary Magazine. The posters promised that returning refugees would be completely repatriated and that their confiscated fortunes would be returned. However, to date, no Jews have accepted the offer.

JEWISH PHYSICIANS WANTED

THE BIBLE IN GERMANY

Although Hitler's book *Mein Kampf* (under governmental promotion) has averaged a circulation in Germany of 750,000 copies per annum, no fewer than 950,000 Bibles, whose purchase is purely voluntary, are being sold each year in the same territory.

Along with this encouraging sign of spiritual hunger among the German people comes the statement of Albert Duff Cooper, who until last year was First Lord of the Admiralty in England, in a press interview in this country a few days ago: "National Socialism (Nazi-ism) is a revolutionary force, a form of Bolshevism, and now the outer mask has been dropped. Many Germans, who had been told that they were the world's bulwark against Communism, now see that they have been made the allies of Communism. And it is well to remember that many in Germany are strongly religious."

SPIRIT-GIVEN PRAYERS

"Lord, Help Me"

David tells us that "the Lord is nigh unto all them that call upon Him, to all that call upon Him in truth." He says to us that "He will fulfil the desire of them that fear Him: He also will hear their cry, and will save them." Psalm 145:18, 19.

In Matt. 15:21-28 we have the story of the Syrophenician woman who sought deliverance for her daughter who was grievously vexed with a demon. The woman cried, "Have mercy on me, O Lord, Thou son of David." The Lord delights to be merciful, and as we continually look toward the blood-stained mercy seat—His throne of grace—we can count on His abundant grace and mercy being vouchsafed towards us.

This woman had a persistent faith, and despite the disciples' trying to keep her back, and the apparent indifference of the Master that might have discouraged her, she persisted in her prayers, crying, "Lord, help me." This is a simple prayer of three words that we can all make.

The Master knew there was something worth while in this woman and He tried her faith yet further, saying, "It is not meet to take the children's bread, and cast it to dogs." The Lord answered her cry and said, "O woman, great is thy faith: be it unto thee even as thou wilt." And her daughter was made whole from that very hour.

The Lord is an ever present help, ready to succor us in every time of need. When you are in a needy place, do not forget to offer the simple prayer of the Syrophenician woman, "Lord, help me."—S. H. F.



HAPPY DAY IN INDIA

Happy day! Happy day! Why? Because today we are going to a baptismal service on a new station. We start early, the car packed because every one wants to go, and soon arrive at the house where the meeting is to be held. We speak to the children, have the regular service, and then the candidates for baptism testify, most of them with tears streaming down their faces.

As we walk two boys precede us, beating a drum to let the people know we are We gather under a small thatched coming. roof while a group of Hindus, relatives of the man who was baptized, cluster around to hear the story of Jesus, some of them for the first time!

It is evening when we finally turn our car in at the home gate. It has been a long day but such a happy one! For we have seen some following Jesus in baptism and we have been privileged to tell the marvelous story of God's love to many others, some of whom have never heard it before. We praise God from full hearts for these opportunities, and pray that He may use us in arousing the millions of India in true, Holy Ghost revival .- Clarence Maloney.

MOVING OF SPIRIT IN BRAZIL

Word recently received from O. S. Boyer brings glad news of a real visitation of the Lord in Brazil. During an eight-day meeting the power came down many times, the Lord speaking through tongues with interpretation and also through prophecy.

"One was gloriously baptized in the **used f** Spirit," writes Brother Boyer. "The unbelievers present for awhile declared he was drunk! But, praise God, his testimony was so glorious and powerful that they also were led to seek the Lord!

"Five who had already given proof of being saved were baptized in water, twenty-five of us walking eight miles each way for the baptismal service in a pond. Others walked as far as twenty-five miles in order to attend.

"A Sunday school was started with sixteen members and plans have been made to hold meetings every Saturday and Sunday. Eighteen people partook of the Lord's Supper.

The Devil Opposes

"At Forquilha four were baptized in the irrigation lake, a large audience witnessing a baptism for the first time. The morning and afternoon services each day were greatly blessed, and the night meetings were attended by a great part of the population.

"Here also we had hoped to continue eight days but the enemy became so enraged over our good attendance that even in Sobral a movement was started against us. Local authorities warned us that they could not guarantee our safety and we were obliged to telegraph the consul asking for protection for lives and property. Pray with us that this may bring the right results.

"The Lord has given us a splendid native worker in Manoel Gonzaga. He preaches in the power of the Spirit, has talent and the backing of nine years of godly living. We are praying that some one in the homeland will have the burden of this man's support laid upon his heart. Twelve dollars a month will be needed for him to be able to serve the Lord as he is so well fitted to do. Will you pray with us for this need?"

AN URGENT NEED

God has very graciously blessed the ministry of our Latin American Bible Institutes in Saspamco (San Antonio), Texas, and San Diego, California.

These schools are now faced with the problem of trying to finance through school young people who appear to have the call of God upon their lives for ministry but who have no funds to meet their school expenses. For as little as \$2.00 a week a student can be put through school in San Diego; while in Saspamco, where living expenses are not so high, a student can be put through school for from \$5.00 to \$6.00 a month. The school term is for seven and a half months.

One young man arrived at the school in Saspamco who had hitch-hiked from Denver, Colorado. He had just \$6.00 in his possession on arrival. The cost of his books alone would be \$9.00, but he pleaded with the management of the school not to turn him down as he said, "I have to preach, and I must get training."

Any contributions for this worthy work will be well invested in helping these young men to go out to their own people where self-supporting assemblies are being established all the time.

"SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

The Better Priest

Lesson for December 10. Lesson Text: Hebrews 4:14-16; 7:23-28.

In no book of the New Testament is Jesus called the High Priest, except in the Epistle to the Hebrews. How precious then, is this Epistle in revealing to us the whole rich cluster of truths and consolations which gather around this central word, High Priest.

In chapter 2:17, mention is first made of Jesus as High Priest. In chapter 3:1, we are told to "consider the High Priest of our profession, Christ Jesus." This we shall do in our lesson today.

An exalted High Priest. "Seeing then that we have a great high priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our profession." Jesus is a "great" High Priest

because of who He is. The earthly high priests were all just types of Jesus, who is here called the "Son of God" to remind us of His divine nature, and "Jesus," to remind us that He is also man, God's man in the glory, His presence there a pledge of our future position there with Him.

He is said to have "Passed into (really, "Passed through") the heaven." Just as the earthly high priest passed through the veil into the holiest place, so the Great High Priest passed through the heavens, triumphed over all spiritual opposition in the heavenlies, putting them to open shame (Eph. 1:19-22; Col. 2:15), and appeared in the holy place in heaven—in the very presence of God, presenting the perfect sacrifice of His own blood. In view of this glorious fact, we are exhorted to "hold fast our profession." Then as a further motive for our holding fast, the writer shows that Jesus is also—

A sympathetic High Priest. "For we have not an high priest unable to sympathize with our infirmities; but rather one in all points tempted in like manner, yet without sin." (Alford) How can Jesus sympathize with us since He never committed sin? He did not have to experience sin in order to sympathize with us! For he who resists until victorious feels the strength of temptation far more keenly than he who yields. Jesus felt the strength of

temptation not with our dull, coarse, blunted sensibilities, but with the keen and delicate sensitiveness of a sinless nature. Jesus can sympathize with us perfectly, and in His sympathy pour in sufficient grace to enable us to overcome the tempter.

"Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." Mercy and grace-what wonderful words! Because we have such a High Priest we need never fear to enter His presence. Though we have sinned we may boldly come to Him "that we may obtain mercy." And whatsoever may be our need for spirit, soul, or body, we may have it supplied, for there is "grace to help in time of need." A petitioner once approached Emperor Augustus with so much fear and trembling that the emperor cried, "What man! do you think you are giving a sop to an elephant?" He did not wish to be thought a harsh and cruel tyrant. Neither does our tender, sympathetic, loving High Priest wish us to hesitate to approach Him. Let us not regard our own unworthiness. Come to Him, fearful one, tossed in the tempest and afflicted, and He will abundantly meet thy need!

An unchanging High Priest. Verses 23-24. The earthly priesthood was subject to constant change, for one priest died and another took his place. Therefore under such a regime there could be no permanent mediation. But in marked contrast to this Christ lives forever! His priesthood is unchangeable, uninterrupted, cannot be altered or transmitted to any one else. "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today, and forever!" Heb. 13:8.

An all-sufficient High Priest. "Wherefore He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them." Because of His character and the nature of His priesthood Jesus is able to save to the uttermost. What an expression that is! It means salvation for the vilest of men! It means deliverance from all sin, past, present, and future! 1 Cor. 1:10. It means victory in every circumstance of life and the pro-



vision for every need! How can these things be? "Because He ever liveth to make inter-cession for us." Many who realize the meaning of Christ's ministry when He was here on earth, fail to recognize the power of His heavenly ministry which He carries on now. Christ is spoken of as Mediator, High Priest, and Advocate. As Mediator He provides salvation for the sinner through His own death. As High Priest He prays that those who are saved shall be kept from sin (Rom. 5:9-10), so that there is no need at all for a believer to sin. 1 John 2:1. But should the believer sin, Jesus becomes the Advocate (or lawyer) pleading the sinning Christian's cause on the ground of His own blood. 1 John 2:2. What a wonderful Saviour! He prays for us now that we may be kept in perfect victory! Let us not disappoint Him! Said Robert Murray McCheyne, "I ought to study Christ as an Intercessor. He prayed most for Peter who was to be most tempted. I am on His breastplate. If I could hear Christ praying for me in the next room, I should not fear a million enemies. Yet the distance makes no difference; He is praying for me."

A perfect High Priest. Verses 26-28. These verses continue to show the superiority of Jesus to earthly priests. Jesus is a suitable High Priest

for all men, perfect in every way. 1. He is perfect in character, being "holy (perfect in devotion and reverent holiness towards His heavenly Father), harmless (guileless, simple, and free from vice or evil suspicion), undefiled (free from all moral pollution in thought, word, and deed), separated from sinners (completely free from any defilement through contact with sinful humanity), and made higher than the heavens (having entered into the very presence of God, a position of perfect victory over all evil powers)." 2. He made a perfect sacrifice and needed not, as did the earthly priests who were sinful, to make repeated sacrifices which had no lasting value. For He offered up Himself, once and for all, a complete and perfect sacrifice for the sins of the world. 3. His priesthood is perfect because it is not subject to human weakness, and is permanently authorized by the divine oath of God.

"What shall we say then to these things?" The first verse of our lesson forms a perfect conclusion—"Seeing then that we have (such) a great high priest . . . Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our profession"!—J. Bashford Bishop.

"THEN IT'S NOT FIT FOR ME"

Among those converted at an evangelistic meeting in Korea was an old woman. The visiting missionary who had conducted the meeting and a Biblewoman taught her as much as they could during the short time they were able to stay in that place, and then passed on.

Months afterwards the missionary re-visited the village and again called on her old friend. The old lady told her how, after she had left, she sat in her hut in the evenings, puffing away at her beloved old pipe and thinking of the wonderful gospel story and of the love of the Saviour towards her. And as she thought of Him she felt that she could not sit there with Him (for she was sure He was there; the missionary had said He had promised to be with her) selfishly enjoying her pipe alone, so, she said, "I held it out to Him, and asked Him to share it."

After some evenings, it occurred to her that the pipe was very old and dirty and He was so very pure and holy: it was not fit to offer Him. So again she smoked alone. This went on for some time, till the thought came: "If it is too old and dirty to offer to Him, then surely it is not fit either for me His follower." She could not put that idea away from her and so she threw away the pipe, with the explanation, "If it is not fit for the the merit deal to more the source and the source of the source of

Him it is not fit for me either. I don't smoke now."

This little incident, told by a missionary recently returned from the field, is just another of those cases in which it can be seen how safe it is to leave the new-born child of God to the quiet teaching of the Holy Spirit. This ignorant old woman "needed not that any man should teach" her. She was led by the Spirit of God for she was a child of God.

byways, compelling them to come in, "that My house may be full" (Christ's word, not ours). But to continue

What is the explanation of an army of "handmaiden" witnesses who have mysteriously appeared, lifting their voices to witness that Jesus is coming soon? Has any other age seen the like? Abnormal assuredly. Only an emergency surely could explain it. We read in the Scriptures that, in the last days, there will be a revival before His coming: that the Spirit will fall upon young men and maidens. Joel 2:28. In other words, it is definitely prophesied that before the Lord comes, some women will have to proclaim the Gospel, under the power of the Spirit, for to look up the meaning of the word "prophesy," one will find it means to proclaim under the power of the Holy Ghost. Women proclaimers are a necessary sign of the coming of the Lord.

We admit there have been faults in our movement, but nevertheless in it we have seen the untiring efforts of men and women out of every walk of life, learned and unlearned, who have been chosen by the Spirit and thrust forth by the Spirit, who have brought this movement, which is now felt throughout the world, into existence. Apparently in recognition of approaching emergency, the Lord has seen fit to use weapons today that might seem as odd as Gideon's pitchers and lamps; as subject to ridicule as David's sling and five stones; and fully as grotesque as Samson's "jawbone of an ass" (when in an emergency, using it, he slew a thousand Philistines!) or the marching around the walls of Jericho. What else can explain the "cow-boy evangelists," or ex-sailor or ex-prizefighter, or even the very youthful voices, that have had their share. The same with various types of gospel music, as one traveling familiarly recognizes, the types, the saints in the north and in the south, in the east or in the west, (equally devout) lose themselves in singing, may be most different indeed. But various weapons may be very acceptable in a case of emergency, to reach "all sorts and conditions of men.

How timely it was sent, this outpouring, preceding the outbreak of the World War by a few years, just long enough to make its message felt in the land. Never, from the first, has this movement moved particularly along lines of ease. But back of its phenomenal growth has been concealed in the background great travail of soul. Impelled by the spirit of prophecy have its messengers gone out. And its countless nights of travel, surrendered hours of sleep and rest in order to tarry, surrendered home comforts of many on the road, have been honored in bearing some little resemblance to the toils and travels of the messengers of first century Christians.

This is being written upon Canadian soil. During our recent absence to attend the sessions of the General Council, the recent declaration of war was made. Returning, certain changes had become evident. A few blocks from our home stands the Armory, and now armed guards are on duty there. The barracks has become the scene of great activity. Much of the time can be heard the beating of drums, the tramping of marching soldiers, the shouting of officers' orders, the blood-stirring sound of the bagpipes, and Highland Kiltie soldiers in uniform are much in evidence. Much drilling and training is going on.

All signs of an emergency indeed. On the streets it is notable how, suddenly, many may be seen now with empty sleeves; doubtless veterans of the last war, proud to lay aside artificial aids now and display their scars of honor. Last Sunday night, at the Calvary Temple service, where a message suitable to the contingencies of the hour had been announced, again were plainly visible the signs of recognition of this press-

ing world outlook. Filling to the top row of the gallery were quiet, attentive people, listening with almost bated breath to each word. Then the call was given, and how eagerly they started to come. Three young men first. (Mostly young men, it seemed to me!) Then some young women.


Suddenly, down a front flight of stairs leading from the balcony directly onto the platform, came a soldier dressed in khaki, to answer the call. (Not 1914, but 1939!) One could almost, it seemed, hear the concerted heartbeat of the great throng at this touching sight. Then up the aisle, from away at the back, came another uniformed figure, likewise to kneel at the place of surrender and prayer. This one, wearing (as I later observed) a winged emblem upon his collar, was attired in the blue-grey uniform of the air forces. Every heart seemed to beat faster. His young wife followed him, and others followed her.

Suddenly the lights were lowered, and the light of an illuminated cross alone shone out in the darkness, while that crowded audience, standing hushed and reverent, sang, "Abide with Me." As I sat there, watching that still, immovable audience, and thinking of the darkness over the face of the earth, and how the only light shines from Calvary, I meditated upon how many, many times in recent years, similar scenes had been enacted throughout the country. How vital and essential it has all been in view of this emergency hour! Are we ever tempted to think it common? Are we ever tempted to think the sacrifices made a bit heavy?

Ah! Looking at those 1939 soldier boys kneeling there amidst the others, realizing what may lie ahead for many such precious lives, none of the efforts made seem too much . . . traversing the land to sound the alarm, or sending it out over the air lanes of the radio. Coming home that night, and turning on our radio here in Winnipeg, we heard the voice of Brother A. A. Wilson blazing forth a similar warning plea down in Kansas City, the words clear and vibrant, from eleven hundred miles to the south of us. We turn the dial again, and hear the Assembly of God at Peak and Garland, Dallas, Texas sending over the nation their voice, pleading to men to turn to God. Emergency calls to the land to seek God's face!

Surely compared to the great in the land, we are but a simple people, yet, as "the Spirit of the Lord came upon Samson," on the various occasions when he wrought his works of miraculous strength, so it has been by the Spirit of the Lord coming mightily upon a people, that this emergency movement has been raised up.

Let us first of all be true keepers of our "own vineyard," searchers of our own



hearts; feeders upon God's secret riches, in a hidden communion perceived by His eyes alone (for if at its core the apple be not sound, how soon will the whole decay?), then not shrinking from scorn, nor from being, as Paul expressed it, "as it were appointed to death: for we are made a spectacle unto the world, and to angels, and to men. We are fools for Christ's sake." Let us be steadfast, unmovable, "always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as we know our labor is not in vain, in the Lord!"

The Personality of the Holy Spirit

There are more than 250 references to the Holy Spirit in the New Testament. A study of these references shows that the Holy Spirit is not an influence but a person. His characteristics, His attributes, and His work prove this.

Seven times in one verse the third personal pronoun is used to refer to the Holy Spirit: "Howbeit when He the Spirit of Truth is come, He will guide you into all truth: for He shall not speak of Himself; but whatsoever He shall hear, that shall He speak: and He will show you things to come." John 16:13.

His Characteristics

1. He has a mind. "And He that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit." Rom. 8:27.

2. He has a will. "But all these worketh that one and the selfsame Spirit, dividing to every man severally as He will." 1 Cor. 12:11.

3. He has knowledge. "For what man knoweth the things of a man, save the spirit of man which is in him? Even so, the things of God knoweth no man, but the Spirit of God." 1 Cor. 2:11. 4. He has affection. "Now I beseech you,

4. He has affection. "Now I beseech you, brethren, for the Lord Jesus Christ's sake, and for the love of the Spirit, that ye strive together with me in your prayers to God for me." Rom. 15:30.

5. *He has goodness.* "Thou gavest also Thy good Spirit to instruct them." Neh. 9:20.

His Attributes

1. He can be grieved. "And grieve not the Holy Spirit of God." Eph. 4:30.

2. He can be vexed. "But they rebelled, and vexed His Holy Spirit." Isa. 63:10.

3. He can be quenched. "Quench not the Spirit." 1 Thess. 5:19.

4. *He can be blasphemed.* "But the blasphemy against the Holy Spirit shall not be forgiven unto men." Matt. 12:31.

5. He can be resisted. "Ye do always resist the Holy Spirit." Acts 7:51.

6. He can be lied unto. "But Peter said, Ananias, why hath Satan filled thy heart to lie to the Holy Spirit?" Acts 5:3.

The Heavenly Vision

(Continued from Page Two) false brethren, in weariness and painfulness, in watchings often, in hunger and thirst, in fastings often, in cold and nakedness."

At Lystra stones hail down on him until he falls, his blood pouring out on the ground. His body is so bruised and broken that they who watch say, "He is dead." They drag him out and leave him for dead. But his work is not finished. It may be that at this time that took place of which he speaks concerning the man, (doubtless himself) whether in the body or out of the body he knew not, who was caught up to the third heaven, and saw things unlawful to utter. Perhaps the Lord told him to go back to earth, and returning to his bruised and broken body he experienced what he craved, "That I may know Him, and the power of His resurrection." From underneath the pile of rocks and stones this bruised body arises, goes back into the city from which he had been dragged, and the next day walks twenty miles to Derbe, where we find him preaching Jesus. Nothing could stop him. On he went until he finished his course. Regardless of the suffering he says, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or

distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us."

Beloved, his was a vision that defied suffering, and God wants *us* to be willing to sacrifice and suffer if need be. Not the apostles, the martyrs, or the missionaries of the past who gave their lives in obedience to the heavenly vision only, but every one of us must be willing to sacrifice and suffer that others may be saved from eternal suffering.

There are some things harder to give up than life itself. Witness the missionary of Africa who travels through the desert with his family. His child nearly dying from thirst cries for water, and there is no water. He hears him cry, he watches him die, and then digging a grave he places the body of his little son, his treasure, in the hot sands of Africa, as a price of obedience to the heavenly vision.

At another time this missionary digs a grave beneath a tree in the jungles of Africa, and as he digs he cries out, "O Mary, Mary, I loved you when I married you, but I loved you more every day I lived with you." And there he buries his wife. Finally he lays down his own life as well, in obedience to the heavenly vision.

Do you feel that God is asking such a price from the apostles, from the martyrs, from the missionaries, and letting the rest of us feel we have done our best because we have paid 14 cents a month for missions?

I meditated upon what would happen if each one of our constituency would sacrifice more and give at least one dollar a month toward World Missions. We would multiply our missionary work seven times. Instead of receiving \$36,000 a month we would receive \$250,000 a month to evangelize this country and the regions beyond. Think of it! Surely God will not excuse us unless we do catch a new vision and become willing to sacrifice more than we have heretofore.

As for our missionaries, they are willing to sacrifice home comforts and fellow-



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ship, and even their lives. Many of them have already laid down their loved ones away in heathen jungles, and are willing to lay down their own lives in addition. But unless we in the homeland feel our responsibility and are willing to back them up by our sacrifices, and send others along to work with them, we are failing God in this heavenly vision.

Shall we not pledge ourselves anew that we will consecrate our talents, our energies, our lives, our finances, our all that the gospel may go forth before it is too late? Think of Him who left heaven and gave His all that we might enjoy eternal life. How can we give less than our all?

Have you given Him your life, your energies, your talents, your finances? Is it all on the altar? If not, put it there today.


as these that Christ came." After boarding the train he went over to where the woman and her children were seated and spoke to her. He told her of the compassion of Christ and the power of God to heal, and of His willingness—yea, His eagerness—to show mercy, and that in the name of Christ her little ones could find deliverance. At once the mother accepted these assurances and asked for prayer.

He first prayed for the child that was crippled, and as soon as he had said "Amen" the little girl began to slowly stretch out her arms and legs, for the first time in her life, and cried out: "Let me down, I want to walk!" And she walked away shouting, "I can walk! I can walk!"

The other little one said: "Pray for me too; Sister can walk; I want to see." But Mr. Wessels said: "Wait; let me call those ministers." He went back to where the four ministers were sitting, and said: "Do you want to see the power of God?" "Yes," they said; "we would like to see this nonsense." Not only was he anxious for these men to witness this great deliverance, but he unselfishly desired that they might have some part in it.

Skeptical and unbelieving, the four ministers accompanied Mr. Wessels to the woman's compartment. He then told them about the child who had been so crippled, and was healed; then he said: "Come, let us lay hands on the little blind one and I will pray"; which they did. As soon as he had finished praying the four ministers started to walk away, not believing that the child would be healed; but Mr. Wessels asked them to stay for a minute or so to see what would take place, and before they even had time to sit down the child began to move its eyelids, and then the eyes were opened and she was shouting, "I can see! I can see!"

"O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God!" How easily, how gently, by merely displaying His



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mercy and compassion, is the Lord Jesus able to break down prejudices, disarm His foes, and inspire undying loyalty and service to Himself and the cause of His kingdom.

How different was the completion of that journey, and its end, as contrasted with its beginning. What a transformation in the hearts of those four men, and in their attitude toward their brother-minister. Enmity and contempt had given way to love and respect, and real fellowship in Christ.

The appointed meeting, too, had an ending which these men had not contemplated in their original plans. The change was quite as sudden as "Saul the persecutor" experienced on the road to Damascus, and with as sharply contrasted benefit to the Church. The four companions of Mr. Wessels, instead of condemning and witnessing against him, as they had expected to do when they left their homes, spoke in his behalf and witnessed to the miracles of healing which they had seen. The tide was completely turned, and together they all studied the Word of God, finally agreeing that Divine Healing was scripturally sound, and that Mr. Wessels should be allowed to continue his ministry and praying for the sick.



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In 1905 the president of the British Association described radium as being perhaps a million times more powerful than dynamite, and he illustrated his remark by a statement to the effect that whereas 12,000 tons of coal are required to drive a ship six thousand miles through the sea at fifteen knots an hour, the same effect would be produced by twenty-two ounces of radium. Fourteen pounds of radium would keep a fifty thousand horse power engine running for a year; one ounce would drive one's automobile during the entire term of his natural life. A piece of radium is designed to continue in full activity for two million years.

Scientists tell us that in every drop of water in the ocean there is enough energy to generate two thunder storms. The power is there, silent and inactive, but ready at any moment to leap forth and do terrible execution.

We are familiar with the fact that a single pint of gasoline will send a heavy automobile at terrific speed up hill and down for two or three miles.

But we all know that He who made these wonderfully powerful agents has more power than the things He created. Jesus made all the radium there is in the world; He made all the drops of water there are in the seven seas; He made the oil that flows from all the oil wells on earth, from which powerful gasoline is distilled. "All things were made by Him; and without Him was not anything made that was made." John 1:3.

How foolish, dear troubled Christian brother, it is to doubt His ability to move out of your way the hindering causes that keep back from you the money you need for your family, or to remove what hinders your getting a job you are capable of filling at wages sufficient for your needs, even though to do it He may have to displace some one who refuses to confess His name; or to doubt His ability to drive out the devil who is causing that malady about which you have consulted eminent physicians who give you no hope!

RELIGION IN OUR SCHOOLS

For eighteen months a committee, appointed by the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York, has been studying the educational system of the State. In a report recently submitted it declares:

"States are not preserved and strengthened by culture or education or knowledge. They stand on character, morals, and physical well-being. A review of history indicates that as culture rises, morals and physical well-being go down, and that often the destruction or disintegration of the state has followed. Accordingly, we place first on our list of things necessary to produce 'the schools New York State wants,' a deep, true, religious understanding and view-point. . . .

"This committee is convinced that the great lack in our homes and in our national life is the lack of true, simple religion. . . If this Nation does not maintain its religious foundation, its whole structure will fail. . . The United States cannot have or maintain a right system unless it is based on true, religious principles, and therefore, in spite of the fact that some hesitate to include religion in our educational program, we place it first."

PROGRESS IN PALESTINE

Reports Alliance Weekly: Since April, 1936, thirty new Jewish villages have been established, eleven of them during the past year. Jewish agriculture during the same period amounted to about \$15,000,000. (Potatoes, meat, poultry, and fish are mostly supplied from abroad.) There are now 5,606 Jewish indusrial and handicrafts establishments, employing 30,-000 workers. Building enterprises during the year included the medical center connected with the Hebrew University, the Anglo-Palestine Bank in Jerusalem, the Reading power house Tel Aviv, Government hospital at Haifa, at military barracks and many roads. Eighteen new schools were opened during the year, bringing the total of Jewish schools up to 391, with nearly 50,000 pupils, and 700 students are attending the lectures at the Hebrew University.

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

Meditations of a Traveler

A railway station! An interval of time to wait for train connections! I will wander to the door and get a few breaths of fresh air. Hm ...

That is fine. There is still some time to wait. I will look around the station. Here is the news stand. Most of the reading matter it offers certainly is such that time spent in looking over it would be worse than wasted, so I pass the news stand by.

Ah! Yonder is a literature container. That looks interesting. I will see what it offers, as sometimes good illustrations may be picked up in a tract or Sunday School paper left in the railway station by some faithful worker.

Disappointed! Not what I had hoped for. This literature, left by some one who is right on the job, alert to opportunity's openings, is not sound gospel. As I glance over it, I see it is Bloodless. No gospel in it. No cross. No redeeming Christ. No indication of the way of repentance and faith in Jesus alone.



Ashamed! Yes, I feel ashamed. Where is the S. S. group of this city? How is it that the opportunity of leaving literature in this public place has been seized by some one else, and neglected as concerns sound gospel literature?

Let me look at the time. I am hungry. I see there is sufficient time to slip out to a restaurant and get something to eat, and still catch my train. Good! Here is a place quite close; I go in.

What? Another literature container? Let me pick up something of what it offers. So another sect is alert, and spreading their doctrines in this manner! At least I admire their initiative.

Let me think! Can't we find a similar channel of contact with travelers and the general public? It seems to me I remember seeing something in the Evangel about literature boxes to place in public spots. There are certainly

numbers of our young folk who would be glad to take on such responsibility. Many other Pentecostal homes must be like ours, having stacks of choice Christian literature, Evangels, Sunday School papers, Heralds, gospel tracts, and other articles piling up at an amazing rate, and such reading matter is too valuable to destroy.

Here is the outlet! Why could not each piece be stamped (using a rubber stamp) with the



address of the local house of worship, and these piles of old papers put into useful channels of witnessing in this manner? Thus no money need be spent. There is a three section paper rack (with sections for Evangels, for S. S. papers, etc.); there is a tract pocket of duck that could be utilized by homemakers, just inside their kitchen door, to hand a tract to the iceman, and the laundry man, and the delivery boy. There is a literature table that could stand inside the church door, supplied with items of interest from many different angles; library books for the S. S. scholars; packets of tracts for some willing workers to take along. . . . The S. S. Librarian could stand at this table, and distribute both books and papers, as well as tracts.

DO THE JEWS RUN AMERICA?

J. Calvin Reid writes in The United Presbyterian: "It is charged that the Jews own or control practically all the wealth of the United States. The facts are that with the exception of the motion picture industry, the theater, the manufacurer of clothing, and retail distribution, the great industries of America are in non-Jewish hands. Steel, automobiles, utilities, transportation, shipping, oil, coal, heavy machinery, lumber, dairy products, the five-and-ten stores, and the grocery chains are owned by non-Jews. In 1934, of the 80,000 directors of the great corporations of America (see Poor's Register of Directors) 3,825, or 4.8 per cent, were Jews. According to the *Fortune* survey (see February, 1936) of the 1,375 members of the New York Stock Exchange, in the city where Jews constitute nearly 30 per cent of the population, only 252, or 18 per cent, were Jewish. Of the 637 firms listed in the New York Stock Exchange, 55 are Jewish, 24 half Jewish, 39 have prominent Jewish influence -118 altogether, about 9 per cent. In interna-tional banking, the only Jewish firm which did any substantial foreign business was Kuhn, Loeb & Co. (no longer exclusively Jewish). This firm did only 2.88 per cent of the total foreign business as compared with 19.87 per cent by J. P. Morgan & Co., and 11.71 per cent by National City Co. On the other hand, it should be known that the Jews through their philanthropic foundations are very liberal in their support of charitable causes in America.

"In the newspaper field, the three largest Jewish chains have a circulation of 489,871; 391,209; 289,126, respectively-total: 1,170,206. Compare this with the Hearst chain with a total circulation of 5,500,000; Patterson-McCormick, 2,232,156; Scripps-Howard, 1,794,617.

"Fortune Magazine concludes the survey, from which most of the above figures have been taken,

with this statement, 'Any open minded man who has read the facts here collected must grant that the Jews do not come within gun-shot of running America."

THE GOSPEL OF ISAIAH

A young converted Jewess, daughter of a New York rabbi, tells this story in The Illustrator: "My father taught me to read the Bible in He-brew as a young child. We began at Genesis. When we came to Isaiah, he skipped the fifty-third chapter. I asked him why. He said it was not necessary for Jews to read that chapter. I became more curious. I asked him who it was for, and he said Christians. I asked him what the Christian Bible was doing in our Bible. He became angry and told me to keep quiet.

He said again it was not necessary to read it. I wondered why God would put unnecessary things in the Bible. I copied that fifty-third chapter on paper, and carried it in my stocking for two years, until I came to America-the free

country. I looked at it at night, and every chance I could without being seen. I took better care of that paper than people do of money. Through reading this wonderful chapter I was led to accept Christ as my Saviour. I was walking in New York one day and heard a lady reading this chapter. She explained that it referred to Jesus Christ. It satisfied me completely.

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
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
