

Snowy slopes; a few brave pines trying to go as high as they can; a great curtain of sky so closely drawn, except quite low down where it is raised a little, that it seems to be covering something; a peak that shines out white and clear and triumphant —of what is this the figure, O Lord, my God?

Is it that which surely shall be, the coming of the conquering light? Is that peak the last step up from what we call time, to what we call eternity, with its vision, liberty, revelation, powers and great delights? All that the words mean: "We shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is. And His servants shall serve Him: and they shall see His face; and His name shall be in their foreheads"—is that foreshadowed there? Beyond that curtain does the first of those many mansions stand, which the wise tell us are not simply fixed abodes in some spiritual city, but rather stations along the highways of some vast realm, the country of our Father?

Is this, the unimaginable (for it passes the furthest frontiers of our thought) part of the reality beyond that is shown in a figure by this pure peak?

Then, O my heart, welcome all that is sent to prepare and to brace thee for so generous a tomorrow. Welcome barrenness, snow and frost, limitations, frustrations, the strain of uncertainty, steep ways, dull days (but look up on such days, to that which is higher than earth). Welcome these things as the purposed preparation for something made ready for thee before the foundations of the world.

If the mysteries of the unexplained close round thee in the evening, or, far more truly, as the dawn draws near when thou shalt "waken in His splendor beyond the hurt of night"; if thy mind pushes ahead of thy body, and thy longing to do for thy Beloved Lord crushes thee, and the love that is in thee shatters thee, for it seems too mighty, too expanding, to be contained in the vessel of the human soul, so that love itself is turned to sheer passion of pain even so, set thy will to welcome all. Let thy-



self be broken. Let thyself be rent. Lay those keen yearnings in the hands that were wounded for thee. Let another gird thee and carry thee whither thou wouldst not. The hour hasteneth when it will be said, "And the angels carried him far above the peak, beyond the curtain, to that which is eternal in the heavens." For it is soon cut off—that silken thread that holds us down, and we fly away. The Lord looses the fettered ones, and sets them free to serve.

And if, as I know well is true, thou wouldst die a hundred deaths if only the nations might be delivered out of their heavy oppressions, and all cruel handling of our fellow-creatures who cannot complain, but must endure, could by one stroke be ended, then stay thyself upon the word that once spoken can never be annulled: "Thou, Lord, shalt save both man and *beast.* My covenant will I not break, nor alter the thing that is gone out of My lips: I have sworn once by My holiness that I will not fail David. The Lord sitteth above the water-flood; and the Lord remaineth a King for ever. The Lord shall give strength unto His people: the Lord shall give His people the blessing of peace."

Is not this strong consolation? Be consoled, therefore. In the end the Creator of the earth will justify His creation of a world, which He foreknew would sin and suffer from generation to generation. Fear not to dare to think such thoughts. There was one who drank of the cup that is filled to the brim with anguish, and he said, and was not rebuked for saying, "Will the Lord cast off for ever? and will He be favorable no more? Is His mercy clean

The Relation Between the Church and the Sunday School

The Lord has impressed me that the time is very short until the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "I must work the works of Him that sent Me, while it is day; the night cometh, when no man can work." We are deeply of the opinion that through the Sunday School we as pastors and Christian workers have a remarkable means by which to accelerate the work of God in our communities and in our movement everywhere. To understand the power that there is in the Sunday School and to properly employ that power, it is important that we get a clear understanding, first of all, of the relation between the church and the Sunday School.

We are to consider five points or phases of this relationship: (a) that the Sunday School is a splendid place for the teaching ministry of the church to find scope and place; and (b) likewise that in the Sunday School we can profitably direct the activities of our church members. (c) It is an ideal field where the pastor can train prospective workers for the harvest field. (d) Also, it is a strong feeder for church membership and church life. And last, (e) we should remember that the Sunday School is a *child* of the church.

It is said in Matt. 9:35, that "Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing every sickness and every disease among the people." The ministry of Jesus was not distinctively and and every disease among the people." only a preaching ministry. The Bible emphasizes the fact that Christ taught as well as preached up and down the land. In what is called the Sermon on the Mount, He really taught the people. In a boat, by the sea, and all over the land, He taught the people as well as preached the things concerning the kingdom of God. Christ is our example as workers in the harvest field. If Jesus found it important to teach the people as well as to exhort and preach to them, you and I should place that same emphasis on the teaching phase of our ministry.


In the Great Commission He instructed us to "go and preach the gospel to every creature," and in the same Great Commission as recorded by Matthew He said, "Go . . . *teach* all nations, baptizing them . . . *teaching* them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." Therefore our commission, our instructions, our orders from our great Commander-in-Chief, are not merely to go out and preach this gospel as flaming firebrands, but to be careful to teach the people line upon line, precept upon precept, here a little and there a little. Those are our Holy Ghost orders from our divine Head, and I believe we shall do well to carry them out.

The Sunday School provides a convenient and excellent opportunity to pour into the minds of adults as well as young people and children the truths of this glorious gospel, and teach them the Word

of God. The Sunday School provides scope for the teaching ministry of those who are sent out to work for the Lord Jesus Christ.

Second, The Sunday School provides a splendid place for the activity of the church members. In the second chapter of Ephesians it is said, "We are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." In Titus we are told, "This is a faithful saying, and these things I will that thou affirm constantly, that they which have believed in God might be careful to maintain good works."

Now Jesus was the master worshiper, He was the Son of God in the highest possible sense, yet He was active, oh, so active! working the works of His heavenly Fa-



ther. That was the meat He ate—the work the Father sent Him to do. It is not enough that *pastors* and *evangelists* shall be very active in the kingdom of the Lord. The Baptism in the Holy Ghost is not merely for preachers, missionaries, and evangelists, but it is for all—"as many as the Lord our God shall call." The Baptism is an enduement, an equipment, and an anointing for service. "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto Me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judæa, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

Do we appreciate the Baptism in the Holy Spirit? Do we believe that every member of the body of Christ should be baptized in the Holy Ghost? You know we do. Therefore, on every one of us who has received the Baptism—and all of us ought to receive it—there rests the obligation to go out and be exceedingly active in the harvest feld. doing all we *possibly* can to save souls everywhere. It is the will of God that every member of every church shall be active in the things of the kingdom.

It is the law of human nature that we must be active. To be bound hand and foot is a very pitiable condition to be in. Solitary confinement is the most terrible punishment short of physical suffering. It is not in us to be still. It is not God's thought that we should be still. Of course, there are times when we should be still and we expect that. But generally we must be active for our Lord.

There is much to be done. Good works are what we should be engaged in. Work, work while it is day, "for the night cometh, when no man can work." It is our responsibility and it is our glorious pleasure and privilege, to be active in the things of the Lord. We must recognize the fact that our people not only have the *right* to be active but that it is their duty and responsibility to be active in the things of the kingdom.

Now I submit to you, intelligent thinking pastors of this movement, that the Sunday School provides a splendid place where your people can be active in the things of the Lord. There is room there for the stenographers, door-keepers, truck drivers, visitors from house to house, secretaries, bell ringers, teachers, executives, and managers. There is room in the Sunday School for every kind of activity that our people are capable of. Therefore I say, pastors would do well to fill the various places of Sunday School activity with their people, keep their people busy and happy, keep them working for the extension of the kingdom. Thus the churches will be happier and the kingdom will be extended the more rapidly.

In 2 Tim. 2:2 we read: "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also." Now toward the last days of the ministry of Jesus Christ, He was not out among the multitude so much, but in the upper room with His twelve disciples, content to minister to them. He poured into their hearts the marvelous teachings and influence of God, and by that careful, painstaking ministry to that select few what did He do? He trained them, equipped them, and prepared them, first to receive the Baptism with the Holy Ghost and fire, and then to go out and minister, which they did, bringing the gospel of Christ unto the ends of the earth in that first generation.

Jesus was an intelligent worker in the harvest field. He was not satisfied merely with visible and immediate results. He had a long-range view of what it takes to preach the gospel in all the world. He was content to take time to train a few workers in order that through them He might multiply and reproduce Himself all round the world. You and I should follow the pattern and example of our Lord Jesus in this regard also. Let us as pastors take time to train the people in our respective assemblies, that they may go out and minister for the Lord all over the land. Ten men can do more than one. A hundred men can do more than ten. Why cannot we proceed to train these hundred people and then release them to go out and work faithfully and effectively in the kingdom of the Lord?

I believe a person is not capable of going out and ministering for the Lord in a large way, until he is satisfied and content to work in a smaller way. If we are not willing to take time to be patient and to do our part in our home Sunday School, we have no right or ability, spiritually or naturally, to go out into the larger field to work for God. As pastors we need to see that they have a well-trained, spiritual character before we release our people to go out and work for God. In our Sunday

That was his age for he told it himself. But was he downhearted on that account? No! No! Was he wrapped up in red flannel and hot water bottles? By no means. He was interested in one thing only and that was his birthday present.

It was this way. Forty-five years before, God had promised it to him, and after waiting all that time without a doubt or fear, he boldly came to claim it on his eighty-fifth birthday. Is it not a wonder that he did not get discouraged and give up and die long before that?

Oh, no, that was the furthermost from his thoughts. He could not think about dying—in fact he had not had time to die, for there was the promise to be claimed. The very thought of that birthday present kept him alive.

him alive. It was his tonic, his stimulant. But what about the giants on it whom he had to overcome before he could take possession? Why he tells us in the four-

teenth chapter of Numbers, verse 9, that they were his "bread." He fed on them in thought continually and waxed stronger and stronger.

People often ask me if I believe in dieting. Yes, I believe in dieting on giants. Just eat up, devour every gigantic difficulty and trial that comes your way. You will wax stronger and stronger as you do this. A diet of giants will keep you fresh and youthful. 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"Lord, Help Me"

Brother Gradsby was a singular old minister, with a red, round, pleasant-looking countenance. He once preached from the text, "Lord, help me." Having read his text, he took off his spectacles, and, in his usual, deliberate way, looked round on the congregation, saying: "Friends, by way of introduction, I will tell you how I got this text.

"Before I was fully devoted to the ministry I was in business, and as most business men do, I worked a little on credit. When I gave up business and settled as a preacher and pastor of a congregation, I was owing several sums of money. But much more was owing to me, so I felt no fear of being unable to pay my creditors. One of these creditors, to whom I owed \$100, called upon me for the payment. I said to him, 'I will see what I can do for you next Monday.' He called on the Monday, but I had not got the money. He was rather cross with me, saying I 'had no business to promise except I intended to perform.' This observation touched my pride, and I told him that I would pay him on the coming Monday. He went away in a rage, saying 'he

hoped I would.' "I set out on the following day to see some of my debtors, not fearing but I could raise \$100, but I did not get one cent. I tried others, but with the same success. I then put down on a sheet of paper the names of several of my friends, certain that I could borrow \$100 from any one of them. But, to my utter amazement, I was mistaken. All of them could sympathize with me a deal better than lend me anything. The next day I made out another list of those not so well able to help me as the former, for I thought if I could get \$25 here and \$25 there, I would be able to raise it all. I traveled many miles on my errand, spending a whole day, but returning in the evening without one cent.

"Saturday morning came, and I arose from a sleepless bed. I ate very little breakfast, and when at prayer I was so overcome with my feelings, that my wife asked me if I was sick, or in trouble. 'Yes,' I replied, 'I am in trouble enough'; and I then told her all about the cause of my sorrow. She was silent for a few minutes, and then said, 'You have often talked and preached about the power of faith. I think you will now need some yourself.' Having said this she arose from her chair, and went rattling among her kettles. She was evidently mortified because I had been refused the money by those she had considered our friends.

"On Saturday I was in a state of torpor until evening. I then, with a heavy heart, went upstairs into a little room I called my study; for I had three times to preach on the Sunday and no text; \$100 to pay on the Monday, and no money. What was I to do? For a long time I sat with my face buried in my hands, and then I fell on my knees, and I believe I said, 'Lord, help me' a hundred times, for I could say nothing but 'Lord, help me; Lord, help me.' While praying I felt an impression that these words might serve me for one text. And as Sunday came before Monday, I began Sunday work. But no other text could I think of but 'Lord, help me.'

"While preaching on the Sunday morning, I had so many thoughts and illustrations arising out of the subject that I felt great liberty in preaching. One of my illustrations was about a man I knew well, who was a deacon of a church, and had been an executor for two orphan children. He was tempted to make use of the money, and much of it was lost. This so preyed upon his mind that he lost his peace of mind, and he died with the reputation of a rogue.


"'Now,' I said, 'had this man, the executor, when he first thought of taking the children's money, resisted the temptation by calling on God to help him—help him to be honest, help him to do nothing but what a professing Christian ought to do—instead of losing the money, his good name, his peace of mind, and, perhaps his life, God would have heard his prayer, and saved him.'

"Noon came; but my sermon was not half done. I preached from the same text again in the afternoon, and again in the evening; and I felt that I could have preached from it a week.

"After finishing the night's service, a young man stood waiting for me who asked to see me in private. I took him into the vestry, and requested his errand, expecting it would be about his soul. For several minutes we were both silent, but at length he said, 'You knew my mother, Mr. Gradsby.'

"I looked in his face, saying, 'Surely I did; but I did not know you at first.'

"'Well, sir, when she died she left me some money—in fact, all she had, except two small sums she wished me to give, one sum, of \$25, to a poor old woman of her acquaintance; and speaking of you she said, "Our minister needs help, and I wish you to give him \$100." I paid the \$25 to the old woman; but thinking no one knew, I resolved never to give you the \$100. But while you were talking about the roguish executor this morning, I felt thunderstruck,



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and I have brought you the \$100. Here it is; do take it, and do forgive me.' "It was now my turn to be thunderstruck.

While the young man was putting the money into my hand, I trembled all over. God had heard my prayer. He had helped me through Sunday, and sent the hundred dollars for Monday. It was mine and I took it. I shook the young man's hand, and, without putting the money into my pocket, I went quickly home, spread it out on the table before my wife, saying, 'Here it is! I now see how it was that I could not borrow the money. God knew where it was, and He sent me the \$100, and delivered me out of my trouble. He had heard my prayer, and helped me, and I will trust Him and praise Him as long as I live!' Oh! my dear friends, when that little prayer, 'Lord, help me,' comes from the heart of one of God's children in distress, neither men, nor devils, nor angels can tell its power. It has brought me thousands of blessings, besides the hundred dollars."

How to Improve Your Sunday School

Note: This is the second of twelve articles on improving your Sunday School. You may wish to clip and paste these articles in a notebook for future reference.

The Teacher in Training

In seeking to improve your Sunday School, it is highly recommended that you arrange for at least one class—twelve sessions—of Teacher Training each year. While not a heavy requirement, this can mean much toward progress in your School.

Selection of Teachers. Pastors and superintendents, consecrated and efficient though they may be, can not alone make a good Sunday School. They must have teachers—consecrated teachers, teachers with vision, initiative, and wisdom. Consecration is good, essential, but it is not enough. Some, though earnest Christians, would never make successful Christian workers. There is a lack of vision, and of desire to tackle the tasks nearest at hand. Teachers with the deepest consecration to the cause of Christ and having a vision of the possibilities before the class, initiative to plan, and wisdom to execute those plans, should be chosen. In fact, those qualifications are becoming to any Christian worker.

Do you select your teachers with a pleading, "Please, now, we need you so badly." Or do you do so thoughtfully, deliberately, prayerfully? Some business firms are known to give prospective workers a week's notice before promoting—time to weigh the matter of accepting a place of added responsibility. If you have used care in selecting your teachers, and helped them to realize the responsibility which is theirs, you will not be troubled with tardiness, absences or workers' unwillingness to receive training. Teachers who are guilty of such inefficiency, and who are irresponsive to suggestions of better methods should be replaced by those who will give their best to the Lord. A change in personnel causes temporary inconvenience, but is preferbale to long-drawn-out incompetency.

Kansas Leads.—Kansas leads all other States in the number of Christian workers who have received certificates and diplomas on the Elementary, Standard, and Advanced Bible Study Courses. A capable leader in this endeavor is Sister Ruth Garlock of Kansas City, Kansas. Sister Garlock is an untiring teacher, and has a host of workers who have completed different textbooks. Watch for her article in a forthcoming Evangel.

The short space allowed for this article will not permit detailed plans for Teacher Training classes. Those interested may ask for the free folder giving full information. The wide ministry of the Systematic Bible Study Courses includes not only teachers but prospective teachers. Every young person and adult in the assembly should profit by studying the Bible systematically. Pastors who desire to create and sustain daily Bible reading may well use these courses for a thirty-minute period at their mid-week service or other suitable night, concluding with an old-time altar service. If held on other than the regular service night, a full hour study period is recommended. Let all the adults be encouraged to take part. Each family may have their own textbook at only 50c a copy.

Additional Study. These courses provide the training in personal work and evangelism so much needed. They include child study to help parents and teachers understand how to train up the "child in the way he should go." Authorities state that experience proves children are as likely to go to jail as to college. We need help with our children. Countless letters come to this department from teachers unable to keep order in the class—often the trouble that starts in the cradle,

becomes so acute that it ripens into criminal deeds.

Brother Pastor, Superintendent, if you are not having this type of training in your School or church, the odds are against you. By making such provision you should be able to eliminate at least 65% of the difficulties which retard the progress of your work.

Home Study. For home study, workers may purchase the fourteen books, regular price \$8.25, for only \$6.25. Payment may be made at \$1.00 per month for five months, and \$1.25 for the sixth month. When the last monthly installment is paid, a number of free books will be given. With each \$1.00 payment the purchaser will receive \$1.00 worth of books.

Schools, in our own local churches, we have a beautiful opportunity to train prospective workers and give them opportunity to learn to work for God, to learn respect for authority, to learn teamwork, and all the other things they need to know to be capable workers for God. Your Sunday School is the place where you can train members of the congregation to teach and to give out the Word of God, and when the time comes they will be promoted by the Lord Himself into a larger field of service. Paul, the great missionary of the church, instructed Timothy, his beloved son to be careful to train others also. This is sound common sense and wisdom, and we as Timothys of this generation should take time to train others also to go out and work in the glorious harvest field.

The Sunday School is a vital feeder for church membership. This is absolutely true. Children are comparatively easily won for Christ. We should therefore go out into this easy harvest field and work there for God. A child's soul is precious in the sight of God, and the more souls that are won for God the more stars there will be in somebody's crown. On the battle front they seek the weakest point to break through, and that is common sense. On our battle front the weakest point in the enemy's lines is the children. Therefore let us press forward at this weakest point and bring in many precious souls, children's souls, into the harvest for our blessed Lord. These little children not only are precious in the sight of God, but they open up for you homes where there are fathers and mothers, and you can win the parents ten times more easily that way, than if you should contact them first of all, and later try to win the Whole families can be won if children. vou win the children first.

By the activity of your Sunday School, by teaching the whole Word of God, by engaging the services of all those who can work, by training for service those who are eligible for training—by pouring into the Sunday School all these activities and all this attention and all this ministry, the result will certainly be that you will arouse your church and thus unitedly gather many precious souls into the kingdom of God.

The old-time method of attack is by revival campaigns. Let us not lose our appreciation of this beautiful way of advancing the kingdom, but let us employ other means as well. These other means that I submit to you are worthy of your attention in every possible way. By that attention you will be happy to find that your church membership has grown twice as fast as it would have grown had you neglected Sunday School activity. Keep the revival pressure up, but at the same time bring evangelistic pressure to bear upon the Sunday School part of your church life, and you will win two souls instead of one.

Lastly, the Sunday School is the *child* of the church. A child is created or produced by the parents. A childless home is not a complete home. It may be because of physical inability that children are not born into some homes, and this is unavoidable. But it is never true that a church is void of power to produce a child, which is the Sunday School. No church has an excuse for not having a Sunday School, and it is the business of the church to create and produce a Sunday School. Not only to bring it into existence, but to see that it has food every morning—fed a bortle of milk, dressed, cleaned, and sent off to school, and given all advantages along that line, so to speak.

Many a pastor and church board expect the Sunday School to pay its own way and also buy the piano and meet other such like expenses of the church. The Bible tells us that the parents should lay up for the children, and not the children for the parents. It is the duty of the church to provide for the Sunday School everything that it needs, so that it can develop and expand and grow for the glory of God. May God impress upon you the responsibility of that child, the Sunday School, which is on your knees, so that you will provide for that Sunday School as any fond parent would for a child. Give to it all it needs, good room for development, sympathetic care and oversight, that it may grow.

The Sunday School should remain subservient, subordinate, and obedient to the church, just as a child is obedient to its parents. A teacher who would teach a Sunday School class, and then make a practice of going home not staying for the Sunday morning service, should not be allowed to teach that Sunday School class. The Sunday School must be tied to the church, and must be subordinate, obedient, and respectful to the church. Children should be taught to stay for the church services, and certainly all teachers should set a good example in this line. The pastor is the head of the Sunday School, and should be respected by every Sunday School member. He should be present at Sunday School every Sunday, and attend every business meeting as well. The child of the church is the Sunday School, and it should take its proper place as a child, and be loved and cared for as a child

There is no mystery about them; their record is told in history. We know their founders, their development, how they reached their peak, and how many of them began to decline. But the true Church is a mystery. It is like that seamless robe which our Lord wore next to His heart. It must have been a beautiful garment for the soldiers did not like to tear it. Even so, the inner Church, the living Church remains one in spite of the external divisions in the visible church. There is no people under heaven more one than the people of God. We drink from the same Fountain. We worship in the same heavenly sanctuary, in the Holiest of all, behind the veil, all alike having boldness to enter in by the blood of Jesus. We are brought into a wonderful one-ness and harmony in the Spirit. We do not need to create that union, but we simply recognize it and endeavor to keep it in the bond of peace.

I remember how an evangelist, well known to me, was traveling in Germany before the Great War, in a Roman Catholic district. In one of the small compartments of the railway coach, he found himself alone with a Roman Catholic priest. It was not very long until they were in conversation. Said the priest, "Who do you think, sir, will be the redeemed in heaven?" My friend was rather curt and abrupt in his manner, and so he replied, "It won't be Roman Catholics." The priest was not offended. He said, "Will it be Lutherans?" "No." "Will it be the Reformed?" "No." And the priest went through the whole category of religious groups that existed in Germany. To each one the evan-gelist replied, "No, it will not be that church." At last the priest said, "Well, I give up; you will have to tell me, who will be the redeemed in heaven?" So the evangelist turned to Rev. 7:9-14, and read, concerning that great white-robed company which John saw in heaven, "These are they which have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb." Up jumped the priest; he put his arms around the evan-gelist, and in tears he kissed his cheek. "Hal-lelujah," he said, "I have found a brother!" And my friend returned the compliment. If they had started to discuss their differences it would have led only to contention, but instead they saw their spiritual oneness and met on the common ground of redemption.

I remember being asked to hold a meeting. The place was crowded. The director of the meeting said, "Will you tell us what denomination you belong to?" That was an embarrassing question. There were many Christian bodies rep-I doubted the wisdom of the resented there. question, but I had to give an answer, so I said: I see many children of my heavenly Father here; they all belong to me even though they will not say I belong to them. But I am in a circle of fellowship which has the Lamb of God for its center and which is wide enough to include every ransomed soul under the canopy of heaven. Everyone smiled and no one was the wiser. The real Church is a mystery.

Among these mysteries is the mystery of Israel. You cannot understand the real purpose of Israel without divine illumination. A mystery is a secret to all except those who have been initiated. In Greek the word "mystery" means a state secret, and the kingdom of God has its secrets just as any other kingdom has.

Is there a story more romantic than the history of Israel? Take its origin. Do you know that the Jewish nation is the only one of whose origin we have reliable data? Can you tell me who was the first Englishman, or Welshman, or American? No one knows. But if you ask me who was the first Hebrew, I can answer, "Abram the Hebrew," that is, a man from the other side and therefore a stranger in the land. He became the father of this people.

Again this nation is the only nation of whose future we have definite information. Can you tell me what is going to happen to the United States fifty years hence? Suppose fifty years ago some one had told you that a great colossus of an empire would collapse like a house of cards, and in its stead there would be a Communistic republic in which the under-dogs of the empire would be the leaders, you would have said he was romancing. Yet it has come to pass. Suppose fifty years ago some one had told you that the German empire would pass away with a big noise and in place of the Kaiser there would rule a former paper-hanger who would have ten times more power than the Kaiser ever dreamed of. You would have refused to believe it. But it has come to pass. Israel is the one nation concerning whom we know exactly what its future



will be. The Bible gives not only the history of the past but the history of the future of this mysterious people. Could you say as much about any other nation of the world?

Let us look for a moment at the experiences of Israel. From a natural standpoint this people should have passed out of sight long ago. people without a country, shattered into atoms and scattered all over the world-and yet still The Jewish race is with us, not as strangely one. a mummy under glass in a museum, but as a living factor to be reckoned with. Today there is no people more virile and up-to-date than the The Jew is the miracle of history, ancient Jews. his story is the history of miracle. The Bible sets forth two things: miracle and prophecy. As long as the Jewish race continues it is a witness both to the reality of the miraculous and the truth of prophecy.

What is God going to do with Israel? In Jer. 31:10 we have a message concerning Israel that is addressed to the ends of the earth. "He that scattered Israel will gather him." You can see that the scattering is literal. The results are still in evidence. Who scattered Israel? The Assyrians, the Babylonians, etc., you say! But it was God behind these nations; and the same God who scattered Israel will gather them. If the scattering was literal, the gathering will likewise be literal. This message is addressed to the Gentile nations because they are to know it. Hitler ought to know it. In his present treatment of the Jews he is ignorant of this.

Some may say, "Didn't God fulfil this Scripture when the Jews came back from Babylon seventy years after the destruction of their city and sanctuary?" Let us see. Turn to Amos 9:14. "And I will bring again the captivity of my people of Israel, and they shall build the waste cities, and inhabit them; and they shall plant vineyards, and drink the wine thereof; they shall also make gardens, and eat the fruit of (This passage does not refer to the them." return from Babylon, as we shall see in a moment.) "And I will plant them upon their land, and they shall no more be pulled up out of their land which I have given them, saith the Lord thy God." Were they not pulled up after their return from Babylon? Yes, they were scattered again and led into captivity after that terrible ordeal when the Romans destroyed Jerusalem in A. D. 70. They were so uprooted at that time that they have never recovered from the tragedy. However, God here speaks of a return that is going to result in a permanent dwelling in the land, so that return must be in the future still.

I said that God has set forth in Israel both miracle and prophecy. There are three miracles God has bound together: the miraculous people, the miraculous Book, and the miraculous Man. You cannot disentangle this threefold cord. Israel is a miraculous people in its origin, its preservation, and its revealed future. Their re-establishment in the land of Palestine will be as a resurrection. But there is another miracle we must connect with it, and that is the miracle of the Book. To Israel were committed the oracles of God, and that includes not only the Old Testament but the New Testament. I often use this argument in dealing with Jews. Some imagine that the New Testament is a Gentile fabrication, whereas the writers were Jews. Matthew, John, Mark, Peter, Paul, etc., all were Jews. What about Luke? some one asks. Well, I used to think he was a Gentile, but I see that Dr. Scofield in the introduction to the Gospel of Luke in his reference Bible, positively declares that Luke was a Jewish Christian. I do not know where he obtained his data. Anyway, the Gospel of Luke is a Jewish book in spirit; the atmosphere is such that a Jew can readily find himself at home in it. The early chapters give us a beautiful picture of the origin of the Christian movement among the hidden saints in Israel. So the Bible, both the Old Testament and the New Testament, has come out of the heart of the Jewish people. And, like the people of Israel, this Book is indestructible. You need never be in a panic about the future of the Bible. No weapon formed against it has ever prospered or will prosper. It has silenced every critic for centuries and it will continue to do so. It is a book of miraculous origin, for it was written by "holy men of God" who "spoke as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." 2 Peter 1:21.

The Bible has one remarkable feature. It bears the mark of the people from whom it has What kind of people were they? sprung. A suffering people; a nation that cried to God out of the depths; a race that has been humiliated, crushed, humbled, and oppressed. Out of their sorrow and pain has come this Book. Cut out of the Book of Psalms all that refers to suffering and you will not have much left. That is why this Book appeals to mankind. It will always have listeners, readers and lovers who will treasure it, for it appeals to broken hearts. As long as there are hearts that are weary and eyes that are sore; as long as men are perplexed and bewildered by the enigma of life and the mystery of time and eternity, so long will this Book have those who will ponder its pages, for it will speak words of comfort, bind up broken hearts, and pour oil and wine into human wounds.

There is another remarkable thing about this Book—it is the frankest ever written. The critics claim that Jewish patriots have concocted the Bible in order to flatter Jewish national pride. I know that is how history is usually written, but that is not true about the Bible. When a

Jew reads this Book he reads of his own shame. He sees himself as in a mirror, going a-whoring from God to worship idols as did the nations round about, a provocation to God from the beginning. What about Judah, the ancestor of the tribe which bears his name? That is a shameful chapter in Genesis that cannot be read in public. What about David, their most notable king? There is a chapter of his life so dark and so sordid that it makes the crimson rush to the cheek of the Jew who reads it.

When I was in England eighteen months ago there was a great trial on. The former King now the Duke of Windsor, sued a publisher who had put out a book portraying the Duke's life when King and telling of his relations with "Wally." Because of the reproach it involved, the Duke of Windsor made the publisher eat his words, otherwise it would have gone bad with him. Yet did David sue Nathan for defamation of character? No, he did not dare, for he knew that back of that record was God.

When the Jew reads the story of his nation he finds it full of indictment. Stephen summed it up in Acts 7:51-53 by saying: "Ye stiffnecked and uncircumcised in heart and ears, ye do always resist the Holy Ghost: as your fathers did, so do ye. Which of the prophets have not your fathers persecuted? and they have slain them which shewed before of the coming of the Just One; of whom ye have been now the betrayers and murderers: who have received the law by the disposition of angels, and have not kept it."

Yet in spite of such accusations, the Book is treasured by the Jew. The orthodox Jew regards it as his choicest treasure. It was the only thing Israel took into exile when everything went to When throne and temple were pieces for them. overthrown and they were led into captivity, the Book was still theirs, and it was their solace and strength, the sheet anchor of their souls. The Scriptures enabled them to lift their heads amidst the sky scrapers of Babylon, and preserved a remnant to start afresh and build the temple again in preparation for the first advent of Christ. The miracle Book and the miracle people cannot be separated.

The central theme of the miracle Book is the miracle Man. The Old Testament testifies of "Search the scriptures," said Christ to the Him. Jews; "they are they which testify of me." John The Old Testament joins its witness to the 5:39. New Testament concerning the Christ. Like the men who carried the grapes of Eshcol on their shoulders, two before and two behind, the Old Testament before and the New Testament after bear witness to the glory of Christ. He is the miracle Man of whom it was written, "His name shall be called Wonderful." "Wonderful" in Hebrew means "miraculous." He is miraculous in His birth, in His resurrection, in His throne life; and this miracle Christ who is the theme of the Bible is the son of this miracle people. That is the real reason for the existence of Israel. It was from them, according to the flesh, Christ came.

He is the Glory of Israel, though they do not yet acknowledge it. The eyes of Israel are still blinded to their brightest Glory. But remember the prophecy of Simeon. It was revealed to him by the Holy Ghost that he should not die until his eyes had seen the Lord's Christ, and he was led by the Spirit into the temple just as Christ was presented there. When he saw that Child he knew it was the Christ. He took Him up in his arms, and as he looked into His face God became great in his sight, and he said, "Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word: for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation, which Thou hast prepared before the face of all people; a light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of Thy people Israel." It was a prophecy concerning which there was not the slightest trace of fulfillment at the time. The world was wrapped in pagan darkness. Only in Israel was God known. Yet when Simeon looked on that Child he said He was a Light to lighten the Gentiles. Did he know how the light would

come to you, and how messengers would carry the message of light to China, to India, to Africa, and the lands of heathen darkness? Yet he did not stop there. "And the glory of thy people That has not yet come to pass. How-Israel." ever, as surely as the first part of Simeon's prophecy is being fulfilled, the second part shall also.

Israel has had no glory since Christ and they parted company. He said, "O Jerusalem, Jeru-salem, thou that killest the prophets, and stonest them which are sent unto thee, how often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, and ye would not Behold, your house is left unto you desolate. For I say unto you, Ye shall not see me henceforth, till ye shall say, Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord." That is to say, God has written "Ichabod" over the people. Christ was the incarnate Glory in their midst, and when He said farewell to the temple it became desolate. The Glory departed -but not forever; only until they say, "Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord."

In Jewish Orthodox weddings the high point is when the bridegroom meets the bride under the canopy held by four friends of the bride, and the whole company, breaks out in Hebrew saying, "Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord." They are rehearsing the conversion of Israel every time they have a wedding. When the Bridegroom returns He will bring the glory back, and penitent Israel will shout, "Blessed is He that cometh (as Bridegroom) in the name of the Lord." Simeon had the vision. Do you see how the miracle Book, the miracle people, and the miracle Man are bound together?

How can this come about, this final reunion between Israel and its glory? In Zech. 12:10 we read, "And I will pour upon the house of David, and upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem, the spirit of grace and of supplications: and they shall look upon me whom they have pierced, and they shall mourn for him, as one mourneth for his only son, and shall be in bitterness for him, as one that is in bitterness for his firstborn. In that day shall there be a great mourning in Jerusalem, as the mourning of Hadad-rimmon in the valley of Megiddon. And the land shall mourn, every family apart; the family of the house of David apart, and their wives apart; the family of the house of Nathan apart, and their wives apart . . .

And then there will be opened, says the prophet, a fountain for all sin and uncleanness; or, as Luther translates it in his beautiful German Bible, "a fountain free and open." Then will Israel take up that song which we sometimes sing, "There Is a Fountain Filled with Blood." They will doubtless make a slight change, and sing it:

"Dear dying Lamb, Thy precious blood Shall never lose its power Till all the Israel of God Is saved to sin no more."

Let me remind you of John, the only one of the disciples who stood by the cross of Jesus. He was rewarded by seeing what no other disciple saw, that not a bone of Christ was broken when the soldiers came to break the limbs of the crucified ones. There flashed into his mind the Scripture, "A bone of it shall not be broken." It was Passover time in Jerusalem and there was a Passover lamb in every house. The Jews were very careful not to break one of its bones. However, John realized that the Passover lamb was only a type. The true Passover Lamb was on the cross. And then he saw the soldier come and plunge his spear into the side of Him who had dismissed His spirit, and out came the stream of water and blood.

"Let the water and the blood, From Thy wounded side which flowed, Be of sin the double cure-Cleanse me from its guilt and power."

It was love's answer to the world's hate. This spear-thrust, the last indignity imposed by wicked

men upon our Lord, was answered by that which alone can wash away their crimson guilt. That very spear point was tinged with the crimson blood of the soldiers' redemption. Love and hatred met there, and love won the day.

John stood looking back to the Passover when the Israelites had come out of Egypt. "This day shall be to you the beginning of months," the Lord had said. With the Passover they made a beginning as a nation. Thus they will also make a new beginning. "They shall look upon Me whom they have pierced." In the shadow of the cross will Israel, having become a penitent nation, begin anew.

Israel has not yet come into the fulfilment of the covenant made by God to Abraham and confirmed to Isaac and Jacob, but as they began in type in Egypt they will begin again. They will arise and take up their wanderings afreshnot as of old, down the weary centuries tossed to and fro as a hare that is chased, but as the representatives of the once crucified but now glorified Messiah, His messengers to the uttermost parts of the earth.

Great Value of Bible Schools

"The things which thou hast heard from me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men who shall be able to teach others also." Thus Paul commanded Timothy, and the same command points the way of today's effort to enlarge the kingdom of God on earth.

We cannot overemphasize the importance of Bible school training in missionary work, for the missionary cannot possibly reach every town and village personally; but, if he can train young prospects for the native ministry and inspire them with the same vision as he has for the work, a great measure of success will be achieved.

A young native pastor, returning to his church after the first year of the El Salvador Bible Institute, put in practice what he had learned. Under his ministry during the following three years his church membership increased from sixteen to one hundred and twenty; eighteen of his converts were called to the ministry, five becoming pastors of other churches while twelve came to study in the Bible school. Besides this he has opened up regular services in eight different places. Although all may not have such outstanding success, his record serves to show what can be done with and through a trained native ministry.

We thank God for those in the homeland who have the vision of this work and realize its importance in the service of our God. We remember that those who help **thus** will rejoice with those who work upon the field, for, as Jesus said, "He that soweth and he that reapeth shall rejoice together. For herein is the saying true: One soweth and another reapeth."

The Fisherman's Village Work

Some months ago in traveling homeward from a fellowship meeting we stopped in a little fishing shack and there witnessed to four fishermen. One man was so overjoyed at finding the true Lord of his salvation that he invited us to his village, where we preached, and twenty-five souls were saved. BETTIAH WORK GROWING

Hilda Wagenknecht writes of God's continued blessing upon the orphanage and school work in Bettiah, North India. "More girls continue to come in," she says. "During the past few weeks we have taken in many new ones. "Of course the entrance of every new girl means an added financial burden, but we are glad for each one, for we never know what work she might be able to do for the Lord later. Already some of the older girls are working as teachers and Bible women, so we know our labors have not been in vain. "Besides the smaller girls who have been taken in lately, we have also accepted an older girl of about thirteen, a child who was married to a boy three years older than herself when she was nine but who has continued to live with her parents until now.

"The young husband came from another village where the gospel has been preached, and he and the whole village turned to Christ some time ago. Instead of growing up as an ignorant village boy, he has been at the mission school and is a fine Christian.

"When the parents of his girl-wife brought her to him he refused to accept her for she was an ignorant little Hindu. At last they reached a decision that if the girl would attend school and become a Christian she would be acceptable as his wife.

"She has been at Bettiah only a few weeks, but we know the Lord will meet her as He has so many other girls here. We thank Him that we have the privilege of leading these girls to Him and training them in Christian ways, but we do need the prayers of those at home that He will guide us in wisdom and love.

"It is still very hot in Bettiah, but our workers go out each day, carrying the gospel to those in darkness. Crowds of men along the roadside, or in the bazar, or near the jail where hundreds gather each day to plead their cases before lawyers, furnish ample opportunities for personal work.

"In the villages also good crowds gather to hear the messages, and we know that the Word shall not return void, but it will bring forth fruit for His glory. Just now several people are coming to the meetings who are really interested in becoming Christians. We pray that God will speak to their hearts and give them courage to step out boldly for Him.

"We thank God for His blessing upon our meetings and for our church which continues to be full for the services. It is such an encouragement to hear people praying earnestly and yielding their hearts more fully to Him."

ANOTHER YEAR IN FIJI

The Heetebrys send Christmas greetings from the South Pacific. "May God bless you," they write, "for standing behind us in offerings and prayers. Without them we should have failed. Without your aid we should not have been able to win precious jewels for the Master.

> Truly we are all workers together in this marvelous vineyard of our Lord.

"Another year with its battles and victories has gone. Real Pentecostal seasons have come our way. About eighteen have received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost, a number have been saved, and others have been healed. What joy it has been to our hearts to hear men and women, boys and girls of Fiji praising, singing, and rejoicing in the Lord!

"We have had splendid times of fellowship with guests from over the seas. The Lord has blessed the ministry of each one in various ways. Three young couples have been married in the Mission

RELIGION WITHOUT LIGHT Melvin Hodges

Beyond all doubt the people of Nicaragua are religious. One of the first impressions received by a newcomer is that created by the many cathedrals, the black-robed priests on the meets, by evening chanting as devout families say their "prayers." The name of God is often mentioned; often the doors of houses bear the inscription, "Viva Cristo Rey" or "Hail, Christ the King!"

Nevertheless there are no people who walk in deeper darkness than these very ones who seem to proclaim the Christ. Here there is not absence of truth, but truth distorted into falsehood, for there is no religion in the world more adept at "changing the truth of God into a lie" than Romanism.

Here the devout inscription of "Viva Cristo Rey" turns out to be the favorite battle cry of a group that is determined to wipe out all evangelical truth. Romanism is a religion of a closed Bible; the layman is forbidden to read the Scriptures without special permission. The people are taught to reverence the traditions of men as taught by the Roman church, instead of the inspired Word of God.

Although the Roman Church claims to be the bride of Christ, God and Christ are both pushed into the background by idolatry and superstition. Worship is ascribed to the dozens of saints whose pictures or images are in every home. Before them the candles are lit and the prayers are chanted. Even when the picture or image is of Christ, He is not the true object of worship but rather the material heart of the Lord which is painted red upon the breast of the figure!

Worship of Mary

Above all, Romanism has as its very center the worship of Mary, to whom the people cry out in time of affliction or danger, "Most holy Mary, Mother of God, save me! Pray for me!" A Catholic paper recently published in Nicaragua states:

"There is no doctrine of the Catholic Church with which the Most Holy Virgin is not intimately connected. To have tried to leave out her sanctuary and her temple would have meant the destruction of all the gigantic structure of our religion, so important is the place filled by this Daughter of the Eternal Father, this Mother of the Only Begotten Son, this Wife of the Holy Spirit, this image of the Church, this Universal Mediator of all grace! The choirs of angels and saints proclaim her their queen. The person that consecrates himself to Mary receives in his heart with her image all revelation."

Do they not indeed walk in deepest darkness who are bound in such chains of falsehood and distorted truth? How heavily the burden lies upon our hearts to make Christ known to them, for there is "no other Name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved" than that of Jesus. We have yet to meet one person who has obtained a Christian experience or pardon for his sins through the doctrines of Rome. May God help us to be true lightbearers in this darkness of soul in Nicaragua!

BRIEF NOTES FROM NEAR AND FAR Syria

Praise God for answering prayer for a man who, having tried all kinds of remedies for his illness, was at last confined to his bed and waiting to die. He did not attend our services, but his brother who did, asked if it would be all right to bring him there for prayer. Of course we told him he was welcome.

The dying man was carried in by friends and, toward the end of the service, we prayed for him. From that day of prayer he began to recover until, in about ten days, he was fully healed and able to go about.—John Warton.

French West Africa

How merciful our God is! Here in Mossiland the women are very slow and reluctant to accept the white man's teaching concerning the care of their babies. They are not so reluctant when they want prayer for a sick baby!

Often the missionary, knowing these mothers have allowed their babies to eat greasy, halfcooked meats and cakes, to lie unprotected from the winds, mosquitoes, and flies, finds himself almost a little hesitant in his prayer. But, praise the Lord, **He** does not hesitate! Many times He has touched these little bodies in pity and love and has made them whole. —John Hall.



"SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Victories of Faith

Lesson for December 31. Lesson Text: Hebrews 11:1, 3-5, 7-10, 23-27.

The pre-eminence of faith is kept in view through the entire Epistle to the Hebrews. It was unbelief that had prevented the children of Israel from entering Canaan land. It was unbelief which was causing the Jews, to whom the Epistle was written, to give way to discouragement, to neglect church attendance, and to think of returning to Judaism. To encourage, stimulate, and comfort them in the midst of trial and temptation, the apostle brings before them, in vivid and comprehensive sketches, the history of their fathers. What was their greatness but that they were men of God? And what made them men of God but their faith? Faith defined. "Now faith is a well grounded

assurance of that for which we hope, and a conviction of the reality of things which we do not see." (Weymouth) A little girl says to her mother, "I need a new dress." Says the mother, "All right, Dear, when I go to town today I shall get you one." Her words are a firm ground of assurance to her little daughter. What does the child do? She runs out joyfully and tells her playmates about the new dress she is getting! She has a "conviction of the reality" of the dress she does not yet see! What is the ground of our assurance of the reality of things spiritual, of the provision of all our needs for body, soul, and spirit? The fact that God has spoken! His Word is the unshakable ground of our faith. Faith is believing that what God says is true and acting upon it.

Faith's perception. Verse 3. Though reason may suggest it, though the Bible does declare it, only "through faith" can we arrive at the definite conclusion and know that "the worlds came into being, and still exist, at the command of God, so that what is seen does not owe its existence (or its continuance) to that which is visible." (Weymouth) 1 Cor. 2:14.


Faith's worship. Verse 4. Why was Abel's sacrifice more excellent than Cain's? Because it was offered "by faith." And since faith is always obedience to divine revelation, God must have previously taught that those who

would be accepted of Him, must bring a bloody sacrifice, by which they signified confession of their own unrighteousness and trust in a coming Redeemer. It is possible that this was first taught when God slew an innocent animal, shedding its blood, in order to make coats of skin for Adam and Eve. Gen. 3:21.

But how did the brothers know that Abel's offering was accepted and Cain's refused? Undoubtedly God sent fire from heaven to consume Abel's offering, thus Abel "obtained witness that he was righteous, God testifying (by fire) of his gifts." So by his example, Abel "being dead yet speaketh" to the world today, proclaiming the truth that the only worship that pleases God is the worship of faith. As we bring the blood sacrifice of Calvary's Lamb in faith to God, we can be fully assured of Pentecostal fire falling.

Faith's witness. Verse 5. How was Enoch translated by faith? "Before his translation, he had this testimony, that he pleased God." His pleasing God was the reason for his translation; and his faith was the reason for his pleasing God. Who will be translated when Jesus comes again? They, who like Enoch, have demonstrated their faith in Christ by living holy lives! Faith's work. Verse 7. Faith is practical. It acts and works. And "Noah, being warned of God of things not seen as yet (the coming Flood), taking forethought, prepared an ark to the saving of his house." We have been warned of God of things not seen as yet. Jesus is coming! Tribulation is ahead! Are we "preparing an ark"? Are we so living and working that we and our households will escape the things that are coming to pass? Noah "condemned" the people of his day, showing them by his righteous life and deeds what they should have done, and because they did not do it convicted them of sin, and showed them their liability to punishment. Matt. 12:41, 42. Let us so live today!

Faith's walk. Verse 8. Abraham illustrates the obedience of faith. It was quite a step for him to leave the security and comforts of his home in Ur, but he rendered unquestioning obedience



to God. "He went out not knowing whither he went"—quite a venture! He did not know *what* was in the future, but he did know *who* was in the future and was fully convinced that the God who had called him out would lead him to a "place which he should afterward receive for an inheritance." As we follow our Shepherd, having faith in Him, He will lead us to the fullness of our Pentecostal inheritance.

Faith's waiting. Verses 9, 10. It is harder to wait than to work; and Abraham's entire life was a life of waiting in faith. God had promised that Abraham's seed should inherit the land of Canaan. But how could it be done? For Abraham owned only a small burying ground. Said Martin Luther, "If you would believe, you must crucify the question, how?" Abraham had done that for he believed God's promise though he did not live to see its fulfillment!

God also told Abraham of an eternal dwelling place which he should some day inherit, "A city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God (the new Jerusalem of Revelation 21)." Abraham had faith in the reality of that city, for all his life he dwelt in tents—temporary dwelling places, considered himself a pilgrim and a stranger on earth, and laid up treasures in heaven. Are we really living in faith, like people who are looking for a place in that heavenly city?

Faith's decision. Verses 24-27. What a choice Moses made! Turning down the fame, the earthly glory, the ease and luxury which he might have enjoyed as the "son of Pharaoh's daughter," he deliberately chose to suffer affliction with his own people who were servants of the Egyptians. What led him to make such a decision? His faith! With the eye of faith he saw that "the pleasures of sin" which he might have enjoyed in Egypt were just "for a season," that is, pertained only to this life, while suffering reproach for God's sake would bring him an eternal reward. C. T. Studd, famous English athlete, might have enjoyed fame and position in England, but he had Moses-like faith, gave away every penny of the \$125,000 inherited from his father, spent ten years in China as a missionary, six years in India, and all but two of the last twenty years of his life in the heart of Africa!

Thus we have seen faith at work, in and through the lives of the great heroes of faith-"They climbed the steep ascent of

heaven

Through peril, toil, and pain; O God, to us may grace be given To follow in their train."

THE WRONG PRAYER

MEDYING WORLD THE LIVING WORD

A DESERTED CITY

Before Japanese occupation, says Watchman-Examiner, Canton was a city of more than 1,500,-000 population, about the same as Detroit or Los Angeles. According to a recent estimate the present population does not exceed 9,000.

BOMBS AND BIBLES

While bombs were falling on the Chinese city of Chungking last May, business was booming for the local Bible seller. The Bible store was the only shop which remained open in the whole city during the bombing. The salesman, a representative of the American and the British and Foreign Bible Societies, sold more Bibles than he had ever sold, says The Gospel Minister.

A MOSQUE IN CANADA

Pagan religions are making progress in our Christian lands. It is reported, says *Missionary Review of the World*, that work has been started in Edmonton on the first Mohammedan mosque ever built in Canada. Canada has about 2,000 Mohammedans. Is it not time for the Church to awake and win the heathen at her own doors?

JEWS TO SOUTH AMERICA

The third biennial conference of the World Federation of Polish Jews Abroad met in New York in September to discuss, among other things, the establishing of colonies in South America for those of their race who have been forced to leave their homes, says *Christian Beacon*. Prospects of sending out many Jewish refugees to Argentina especially are quite favorable.

PALESTINE NOTES

The fulfillment of God's purposes in regard to the Promised Land progresses daily. Action by the Council of the League of Nations on the British White Paper that would deal a death blow to the plan for a Jewish National Home in Palestine has been postponed until the end of the present European war, says the Contemporary lewish Record. . . . Arabs and Jews are forgetting their animosity and are fraternizing with one another, all in whole-hearted support of the Government. . . . According to the Economic Bulletin of the Jewish National Fund, there has been a 47 per cent increase of Palestine population since the 1931 census. On June 30, 1939, the population was 1,458,090, made up as follows: Moslems 909,566; Jews 422,142; Christians 114,-442; others 11,940. There are 288,000 more Jews and 184,000 more Arabs than in 1931. . . . American exports to Palestine totalled \$5,012,000 in first seven months of 1939, compared with \$2,-740,000 in corresponding 1938 period.

THE FAITH OF A SCIENTIST

M. Henri de Vaux, professor of biology in the department of sciences, the University of Bordeaux, is an earnest Christian. He writes in *Le Chretian Evangelique* concerning the Bible accounts of the birth of our Lord: "They are told with such purity that one feels on reflection that their source cannot be human. Our children read them with delight and their candor of soul is not even slightly tarnished thereby. And we who were sinners feel the breath of sanctity pass over our souls when we ponder them. This remarkable fact shows that the true author of these narratives is the Holy Spirit.

"It was by a sovereign act of the Spirit that Jesus was conceived within the body of a pure maiden and it is therefore that the Holy Scripture calls the Holy Child the Son of God. Completely man by His mother, wholly God by His Father, Jesus realized in His mysterious person the supreme end of God—namely, God in man. This made of Him a Being absolutely unique in the whole universe."

FAITH IN STAR-GAZERS

It is astounding how many today are putting their trust in astrology. They depend upon the daily horoscope in the newspapers for guidance and counsel. The Lutheran reports that when one issue of a certain London paper a few months ago appeared without a horoscope, because the paper's official astrologer was ill, more than 50,000 frantic inquiries and appeals poured into the office within a few hours. These readers could not face their day's activities without it. What a sad commentary on the despair of those who have not learned to commit each new day to God and to trust in the guidance of His Spirit and the counsel of His Word!

JACOB'S SORROWS

The sufferings and indignities being heaped upon the sons of Jacob, with which the secular press abounds, constitute a pitiful shadow of that awful period of woe known as "Jacob's Trouble" which shall precede Israel's acceptance of their Messiah. According to the Contemporary Jewish Record, the press has advised all Jews in the French army to change their names to avoid harsh treatment in the event they are captured by Nazis. . . . Swiss correspondents report that Nazis forced Polish soldiers to shoot their Jewish comrades in prison camp. . . . The main Lwow synagogue in Poland was changed by the Soviets into a communist club. . . . From German-occupied Poland 57,000 Jews are reported to have been taken to Germany for forced labor. . . . Polish Jews were forced to wear yellow badges or numbers in many towns, while rabbis were subject to torture and humiliation. . . . Faminestricken Jewish quarters in Warsaw were not aided, while Nazis fed Poles and Germans. . 31,216 Jewish soldiers were killed on the battlefield in war in Poland, and 61,000 Jewish prisoners were taken. . . . Jewish shops in Slovakia were seized and turned over to soldiers returning from the Polish front as rewards for their fighting.

AND THERE IS NO PEACE

In a recent article in "News of the World," Winston Churchill, considered by many of England's conservatives to be her greatest statesman, writes: "If the world polled tomorrow, and every grown man and woman recorded their opinion, ninety-nine out of a hundred would declare their desire for peace.

"There never was a time when there was so immense a volume of resolve for peace among hundreds of millions of thinking people in every land. Yet all are moving forward, step by step and day by day, towards the abyss. The helplessness of mankind to avert or control its destiny is more plainly apparent than ever before. All these vast populations long to be left alone to live their ordinary lives, better their conditions, bring up their families, cultivate their gardens. And yet everything is in train to make them fall upon and rend each other with teeth and claws incomparably more deadly than any ever used in any previous guarrel.

"The sovereign people, the enfranchised masses, the will of the majority, Parliamentary institutions, the mass thought of humanity—all these seem to be utterly impotent to stop the approach of another World War.

"All nations are now moving forward, obdurately, blindly, as if in a trance, towards the infliction of indescribable horrors upon one another. Such a contast between the will of man and his actions seems to spring only from madness."

Whether he knows it or not, the Hon. Mr. Churchill has given a striking picture of the hold that Satan, the prince of this world, has over the world-system. There will never be peace while he reigns on the earth. Peace cannot come until the Prince of Peace, our Lord Jesus Christ, shall reign. "Even so, come, Lord Jesus."

THE SPIRIT OF ANTICHRIST

The more extreme Nazi publications have cast off all restraint in their vicious and blasphemous attacks on Christianity, says *Prophecy Monthly*. The paganistic weekly, *Nordland*, viciously attacks the church as a "supra-national power" and the views of Ludendorff are given great prominence. Paganistic literature is sweeping all parts of the Reich, asserting that it is utterly incompatible for any true disciple of the swastika to belong to an established faith and at the same time be faithful to the Fatherland.

Wrote the Hon. A. Duff Cooper recently in *The London Evening Standard*, "The powers of evil are now united. . . . The two Governments (Germany and Russia) which base their systems upon robbery, torture, and murder are marching together. The anti-Christian and anti-God forces are in step."

RUSSIA'S POLICY

Says a writer in a well-known exchange: "A few months ago I asked an attaché of the Russian consulate in one of the countries of Europe, 'What will Russia do in the event of a war between England and Germany?' He answered, 'Wait until both sides are exhausted, and then hop in!'"

If Russia saves her strength until Germany is exhausted by the present war, and then dominates Germany; and if Italy saves her strength until Britain and France are exhausted, and then joins the Allies under a pact that will give her a leading part in the alliance: the line-up of the nations then will be in full conformity with the prophecy of God's Word.

With the nations rushing on so swiftly to Armageddon the appearance of the Lord should be our constant expectation, for surely His coming draweth nigh.

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
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
