"The sea and the waves roaring." Luke 21:25.
"The third part of the ships were destroyed." Rev. 8:9.

"About midnight . . . they drew near to some country."

Tragedies at sea! Titanic! Lusitania! Athenia! Royal Oak! Granville! Floating oil, betokening sub-

marines sunk!

Have you read recently that twentyseventh chapter in Acts, that tells of Paul's shipwreck? In these days of constantly recurring sea tragedies, it is well to read it. It is authoritatively called the finest description of a storm at sea, in literature.

Picture the stately sailing vessel, 276

souls aboard.

Sailors and captain. Soldiers and centurion. Passengers. Prisoners.

See the stop at Sidon, Palestine's most northerly port.

On, following around the coast of Asia Minor.

Forced by contrary winds from keeping near mainland's shoreline, the southerly dip under Cyprus.

Touching mainland again. Changing boats.

The calm, deadly in its hindrance.

Continued lack of wind for their sails, and winter approaching.

Eventually attaining the island of Crete.

The port unsatisfactory for wintering in.

The aim to reach the far end of the island; a better

Paul's warning, despite the enticing south wind. The westward attempt.

How fascinating to follow on—the attempt to keep sheltered, near the island. The terrific wind that rose, driving them far out of their course into mid-Mediterranean, where, tackling overboard, ropes used to strengthen the ship, sails down, they "let her drive!" No compass. No sun, moon nor stars to guide them, for

14 days. Lost. Helplessly driven. Without sleep. Without eating. All hope gone! "All hope that we should be saved was then taken away." It is night.

See! The man of God steps forth.

It is Paul, the prisoner, after long ab-

Courage and strength are written upon his countenance. His shoulders are back. Hope gleams in his eyes. What are his words in this extremity? Hark? "Be of good cheer?" he calls, above the

"There shall be no loss tumult. of life! There stood by me this night the angel of God. Thou must be brought before Cæsar." there was . . . land ahead!


"About midnight . . . they drew near to some country." It was the man of faith who was the first to recognize it. It was the man of God who could eat, then, and urge the others to partake. He was the one with the word of assurance, whom they all came to look to, and obey. How heart-

ening were his words, and they were true.

What an admirable picture does Paul present at the height of the tumult! What calmness he shows! What comfort he conveys! What strength he affords! What ascendency he acquires! It is the prisoner Paul who is the central figure. Not the centurion. Not even the captain. God was his refuge and stay!

Danger of the seas! How well we know it today. Literally, to the bereavement of many homes. Also in world conditions of which the tempestuous sea is the Biblical symbol, "the sea and the waves roaring." The hoped-for port has not been reached. The goal seems farther and farther from sight. The fury does not abate. To the unbelieving, all is again midnight darkness, without compass, and without sun, moon or stars to show the way, the course lost, and the ship driven mercilessly before the raging storm.

Nor can we Scripturally hope for the storm to abate until its blast is yet more terrific. The Apostle John, in vision on the Isle of Pat-(Continued on Page Five)

mine the confidence of the people in it?

There is a legend which tells us that in the days when our Lord was here in the flesh a number of men were looking one day at a dead dog, and making all kinds of uncomplimentary remarks. Jesus came along, stopped, and looked at the carcass of the dog. He exclaimed, "What beautiful white teeth he had!" The legend teaches us that our Lord could think of something good to say about a dead dog. Shall we not in the future try to see the good qualities of one another, and the good features of our great fellowship? Let us learn to be loyal.

Recently a conspiracy to overthrow the government has been unearthed. Seventeen of the conspirators have been arrested, and because they were unable to furnish the bail required, have been committed to prison to await trial. The charge is a serious one. I trust there are no conspirators in our fellowship. If people do not like our government let them move to Russia or to Germany, or to some other part of the world; and if people do

not like our fellowship let them get out; if they can find something they like better let them go, and we shall say, "Good-bye, and God bless you!" Some who did not like us, went from us, and congratulated themselves when they went. It is amazing how sorry they are now that they went, and would give almost anything if they could just get back.

The fourth letter stands for INDUS-TRY. The minister should be industrious. The ministry is no place for lazy men. It is not the vocation of the man who wants an easy snap. The minister must be a worker; the ministry is a work, and a good work. And in order that the man who has been called to this work may succeed he must apply himself to the task in hand; he must be industrious. He should not lie abed until nine o'clock in the morning; he will never succeed in the ministry if he makes a practice of doing that.

The fifth letter stands for GODLINESS. The minister must be godly. How can he inculcate godliness unless he live a godly life? To be godly is to be godlike. That it is possible for us to be godlike is evident from the teaching of the Word. I call attention to just one passage, "Be ye perfect even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." It is not in my heart to enter into a discussion of the doctrine of Christian perfection. I will only say that our Lord would scarcely have given the command were it not possible for us, by the grace of God, to keep it. We cannot become perfect gods, but we can become perfect Christians. A horse cannot be a perfect man, but there is a possibility of his being a perfect horse. Not in the sphere of the God-

head but in the sphere of redeemed humanity is the perfection our Lord, as the Son of man taught when He was here upon earth. He was, and is, the Living Word, as the Bible is the written Word. In the life which He lived when He was here in the flesh, the life of a full overcomer, He showed us what the character of God is like. He was "the express image of His person." If you want to know what God is like, what His real character is, study Christ. And if you want to be like Him spend much time looking at Him as He is delineated in the Scriptures. Listen to what Paul says, "We all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord." 2 Cor. 3:18.

The sixth letter stands for IMMOV-ABILITY and also for INOFFENSIVE-NESS. The minister should be both immovable and inoffensive.

He should be immovable. But not, of course, in the spirit of stubbornness. Stubbornness is displeasing to God and hurtful to the cause of Christ. He should be immovable in the sense in which Paul was immovable. Paul said, "None of these things"—he was speaking of bonds and afflictions-"move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God." Acts 20:24. Mark the words with which he concludes his wonderful 15th chapter of 1st Corinthians, 'Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord.

> The minister should be inoffensive. Of course there are some people who will be offended even though he is inoffensive. To ask that a minister offend no person, under any circumstances, is to ask the impossible, for the reason that it is impossible to preach the truth and not offend some folk. But when the truth is preached it should always be preached in a spirit of love. Jesus to'd His messengers whom He sent fort's to proclaim the truth that they should be "wise as serpents and harmless as doves." It was His way of telling them to be inoffensive. Paul wrote, "Give none offence, neither to the Jews, nor to the Gentiles, nor to the church of God." 1 Cor. 10:32. And again he wrote, "Giving no offence in anything, that the ministry be not blamed. 2 Cor. 6:3. Concerning the Lord Jesus we read that He is "holy, harmless, undefiled, and separate from sinners." In the sense in which He is harmless, or inoffensive, His messengers should seek to be.

> The seventh letter stands for OVERCOMER. The minister should be an overcomer. Have you ever studied the seven promises to the overcomer in the second and third chapters of Revelation? They are a study in themselves. The minister has a lot of things to overcome. He must overcome jealousy, if he has a disposition to be jealous, covetousness, if he has a disposition to be covetous;

self-seeking, if he has a disposition to be a self-seeker. You know what your besetting sin is, or what your particular weakness is; you know to what in human nature, so far as you are concerned, the world makes its strongest appeal. Your weak point may not be mine; mine may not be yours. thing that is wrong, that thing that the devil makes use of to cripple your ministry, to hinder you, to make you less effective than you would otherwise be, you must overcome, and you can do it by God's grace.

The last letter stands for NOTHING. The minister must be nothing. This may surprise some of you. I will tell you what I mean. I mean just what Paul meant when he wrote, "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. So then neither is he that planteth anything, neither he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase." 1 Cor. 3:6, 7. If Paul (Continued on Page Six)

How the Sorcerer's Power Was Broken

There is a village in Java that is one hundred per cent Pentecostal. It is a refuge for the persecuted from every part of this country. The following story tells what was the beginning of the Pentecostal revival in this village.

While visiting the village of Gambang Walla, the mayor of this hundred per cent Christian village gave his testimony. He was so enthusiastic that I asked our interpreter to translate it to me. The story is as follows.

Many years ago, when he was just a boy, he saw Black Magic and desired to have the power. Therefore, he went into the bush and fasted and prayed for ten days and nights, begging spirits to inhabit his body. At the end of this time a power gripped his body that threw him over and over on the ground, making him foam at the mouth like a mad dog. From this time, he had remarkable power and was recognized as a doctor of black art. Some of the things he says he did, and all the people in the village verified it, are too weird for description.

Years later a Christian missionary woman appeared in the village and began teaching about Jesus, and praying for the sick. The natives began flocking after her, and this made the witch-doctor angry. He came to the meetings and sat and tried to throw his devilish influence over the missionary, so that she could not talk. He failed, although it did greatly disturb her.

He came a number of times until at last one night in a fury he challenged the young lady, saying that if she had more power he would leave the village, but if he had more power she must leave. The missionary said, "Well, do something."

He walked to the front of the church before all the people and he lay down on the dirt floor, was perfectly motionless for a few moments. He became stiff; one could hardly see him breathe. Then he began to move; his feet, head, body, all on a level, gradually ascended. He floated knee high, waist high. This was the power of levitation being demonstrated.

"What can I do?" said the missionary girl. "I know I cannot float in the atmosphere." The natives were nearly hysterical seeing their master float. A thought came to the missionary that all she could do was to get him down. She reached and caught him in the chest, and shouted, "Come down, in Jesus' Name." Down he came, but started up again. Then she held him down.

The Apostolic ministry of Mark 16:17 became hers. She began to rebuke the vile, unclean spirits, commanding them to loose their victim in the Name of the Prince of Peace. The witch-doctor went into convulsions, but she held him down. He choked and foamed at the mouth, his stomach moved on the inside as if something was coming out. The girl, trembling under the holy unction of God, bound those filthy demons, delivered him of them, and

consigned them to the pit of hell. The missionary prayed that God would sweep and clean the temple and come in to dwell.

The witch-doctor stood up. He felt himself all over, then looked at the people and then at the missionary. He said, "Something has happened; my power is gone; but I am happy in my heart." Praise God for a work that was done that night that has not ended yet.

Before the missionary would let the former witch-doctor leave the church, she laid hands on him and prayed for him to receive the Holy Spirit. He received that night, and has since become a leading native preacher in that part of the country. He is now the Honorable Mayor of Gambang Walla, the hundred per cent Christian village.

both in Jerusalem, and in all Judæa, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." It is from this scripture that we have the vision of World Missions. We are to be witnesses unto Christ in our own community, and as we are faithful there the Lord will move us on to surrounding districts, and some faithful ones He will send to "the uttermost part of the earth."

We believe that in all the Bible schools of the Assemblies of God they have caught the vision of "the uttermost parts of the earth," and every school has its Missionary Bands that pray definitely for the different foreign fields. However, in the Glad Tidings Bible Institute in San Francisco they have in addition a Students' Home Missionary Council that has the burden of Evangelism of the home field. This Students' Home Missionary Council is being encouraged by our Home Missionary Secretary, Brother Fred Vogler, who states, "Since only a small percentage of our students that graduate from our Bible schools go to the foreign field, the large majority must look towards the home field."

Recounting his experiences in the Home Missions field, Brother Vogler states: "For a number of years, while superintendent of the Kansas District, I had a burden on my heart to help the young people of the various Bible schools. For many years I offered the entire graduating class of Central Bible Institute a place to work in Kansas if they felt the Lord was leading them in that direction. For the first ten years of the history of Central Bible Institute, over twenty-five per cent of the graduates were working under my supervision. My plan was to place as many as three or four girls in a group, and two or three boys in a group, and start them out in pioneer work in Kansas. We would furnish them a tent, equip it, and see that they had living expenses for one month, and from then on they had to look to the Lord themselves.

"This plan became very, very successful. I believe all our Districts could use many of our students in this way by grouping them together. Christ sent them out in twos. I have found also that in this day we could do something like the Syrians who it is said went out 'in bands.' Those who have studied the history of this movement in its beginning will know that all our workers went out *in bands* in the early days.

"I found that after these graduates had put on a successful meeting, that two of them could stay behind and carry on the work, while the others, having gained much valuable experience, could press on into another field."

Brother Vogler makes this practical suggestion: That each school should write to the various District Superintendents to secure road maps of the different States and place a dot where there are assemblies located. It will then be seen that there is a vast territory yet untouched by the full gospel message. Prayer could be made for the untouched sections and pioneer efforts could be arranged with the various District Presbyteries. Often a disused church could be obtained or an old movie theater that is not being used.

Brother Vogler also makes the suggestion that many of our pastors could take graduate students as assistants. It is scriptural for the younger workers to labor with the older experienced men. This was certainly true of the apostles as well as the prophets who preceded them. There is much work to be done on the line of house-to-house visitation. By this means all of our churches could be doubled or tripled in size as they make a systematic canvass of the whole territory round about, inviting folk to come to Sunday School and church and above all to yield their lives to the Lord Jesus Christ.

mos, wrote, "I stood upon the sand of the sea, and saw a beast rise up out of the sea." As he saw that roaring sea, swept by conflicting winds, torn in angry tumult, dashing its salt spray high into the air, the wild elements in confusion, he saw arise out of that confusion the coming Antichrist. "The wicked are like the troubled sea, when it cannot rest, whose waters cast up mire and dirt."

For the storm-tossed sea is the symbol of the godless peoples of the earth, restless, confused, filled with tumult, and torn with strife. Not a few are being drawn under

in the storm.

Scanning the horizon, we endeavor to see beyond the dark, confused, stormy present. What cheer is there? What hope? What comfort upon the horizon?

"Be of good cheer! It is I," called One long ago, as He walked upon the stormtossed sea. We believe that again, He draws near!

"The sea is His, and He made it!" The Lord sitteth as King upon the flood.

Need we be then intimidated? Need we

crouch in self-pity?

As Paul's faith was a mystery to those about him, so can that of the believer be today. Despite the fury of the blast, he can say, "I KNOW whom I have believed, and that He is able." At midnight he *knew* they were near land.

This age is ending.

Though the breakers now roar, we shall yet arrive where no storm breaks. The water-tight compartments of modern ships may fail to save them, and their gyrostabilizers fall short of their hopes. To the believer, the Captain is on the bridge, piloting surely through the gale.

We have all felt keenly the stories of recent losses at sea. Brother Peter Birchall, lost on the Athenia, was well known to a great circle of friends. His wife's story, published in the Christ's Ambassadors Herald for January, has touched our hearts, as have other incidents of trouble at sea. Brother Birchall was a guest in the Missionary Rest Home in New York not long ago when we were ministering there, and told us of his contemplated trip to England. He drove us down to the Hudson River, and went with us aboard the Queen Mary. We waved a group of departing missionaries away.

Majestic vessels may go down at sea. Rev. 8:9 speaks of a time when "the third part of the ships were destroyed." If we appear to be in the shadows of the events of the Apocalypse, whose shadows are surely even now being cast ahead, let us remember that these very events bring the unveiling of Christ.

"The ship was now in the midst of the sea, tossed with waves: for the wind was contrary. In the fourth watch of the night Jesus went unto them, walking on the sea."



When the pleasure ship, the Lady Elgin, capsized some years ago on Lake Michigan, a youth, Edward Spencer, permanently wrecked his health in swimming out to the rescue until he had brought seventeen to shore. Tossing later in a delirium, he constantly asked, "Did I do my best?"

Paul, confident in his own heart, for he had heard from God, was able to cheer others. "Then were they all of good cheer, and they also took some meat," which he in the storm broke for the fainting ones to eat. About midnight? ". . . they drew near some country."

It is the midnight hour. It is written concerning our Lord, "He maketh the storm a calm, so that the waves thereof are still. Then are they glad because they be quiet; so He bringeth them unto their desired haven." All this comes as a response to the cry from the troubled ones, who are at their wit's end, that rises to Him in the midst of the storm Psalm 107:23-30.

The Promise of Christ's Coming

Though Christ Jesus tarry, He shall surely come. "For yet a little while, and He that shall come will come, and will not tarry." Heb. 10:37. God's word surely has to be fulfilled.

The world says, "Where is the promise of His coming?" The promise is in the Word, in the Old and in the New Testament. Darkness inquiring about the things of light. Let darkness get light, then it will understand. If He, the Light, could come within those who are asking, they would not inquire: "Where is the promise of His coming?" But there is no light in them, hence they ask.

"Though it tarry." Hab. 2:3. Tarry does not mean that He is not coming. You tarry for a midsummer day; you tarry for Christmas. Because they are postponed eight, nine or ten months, it does not signify that they will not come.

"Where is the promise of His coming?" It is in God. God says He shall come, and come He will. Multitudes are asking this question, and there is a multiplication of signs of His coming. The two going together coincide.

Some won't see what others cannot help seeing. "Wheresoever the body is, thither will the eagles be gathered together." Eagles can see what man cannot. They have a higher order of vision, and live on a higher plane, in the mountains. Man says, "where?" because he has man's vision. But the eagle sees the speck, the sign, the small sign.

Elijah by faith saw the cloud, the size of a man's hand, coming before his servant did. He was expecting what his servant could not see. Later, the servant saw the cloud. And it was not long before the cloud covered the heavens. Be like Elijah. Believe, expect revival rain though there be no cloud, not even one the size of a man's hand.

Through prayer the cloud the size of a man's hand will soon overshadow the whole land, yea, the whole world. You can pray for the invisible to become visible, for an empty heaven to be filled. A full heaven means a replenished earth. Prayers sent up

bring blessings down.

"Where is the promise of His coming?" It is where you put it. You can put it in front of you or behind you. Those of Noah's time were willfully ignorant. The ark stared them in the face, but they put it as it were behind them. The ark to them was not a place of refuge, it was foolishness. To many, Christ is not the One who has come to deliver them; to them He is foolishness.

"Where is the promise of His coming? for since the fathers fell asleep, all things continue as they were from the beginning of creation." In this they are willfully ignorant. And willful ignorance brings woeful punishment.

"But ye, brethren, are not in darkness, that that day should overtake you as a thief. Ye are all the children of light." "Unto them that *look for Him* shall He appear the second time, without sin, unto salvation."

Are you looking? Are you longing? Are you wanting? Are you expecting? Unto them that *look* for Him. He is worth looking for. He will bring full redemption.

The Power of God's Word

Crossing the north of India in a caravan, a godly missionary, stooping over an exhausted Indian who had been left to perish, whispered in his ear, "Brother, what is your hope?" Lifting himself with a great effort, the man replied, "The blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth us from all sin," and expired with the effort. Amazed at the answer of an apparent heathen, the missionary observed a piece of paper grasped tightly in the hand of the dead man: it was a single leaf of the Bible, the first chapter of John's first epistle.

The Shout of Faith

"The shout of a King is among them."
—Num. 33:21.

How often the battle has been lost for want of a shout! How often in prayer our faith has come short of that full assurance that bursts into triumphant praise, and brings victory! We have the shout of faith in Josh. 6:16-20, "Shout! for the Lord hath given you the city... the people shouted... the wall fell down flat." Heb. 11:30. The shout of victory in 2 Chron. 13:15, "The men of Judah shouted... God smote." The shout of praise in Isa. 12:6, "Shout... for great is the Holy One in the midst of thee"; and in 2 Chron. 20:22, "When the people began to sing and to praise, the Lord set liers in wait."

When Paul and Silas had recourse to the same strategy God suddenly sent a great earthquake (Acts 16:25). All this shouting and praising that proved so effective took place in adverse circumstances: in the face of the hatred and cursing of Moab and Midian; before the impregnable walls of Jericho; in the midst of the ambushment of an enemy who outnumbered them by two to one; at the advance of an immense army of Ammon and Moab which threatened their destruction; from the inner prison, where God's servants lay with bruised and bleeding bodies, their feet fast in the stocks. It was then they offered "Sacrifices of shouting" (Psalm 27:6, R. V., marg.), and all heaven was moved on behalf of their

Billy Bray, when funds had failed and want stared him in the face marched up and down his room shouting and praising God, just to "let the devil know that all was well with him," and that he had a loving Father. May He gives us "a like spirit of faith," whether it is in respect of spiritual conflicts or temporal needs, and if the wind is contrary, and the sea tempestuous, may we always come out triumphantly on top

There is one other shout—the shout of loving welcome (Zech. 9:9). "Rejoice greatly . . . shout: behold, thy King cometh unto thee." May it be ours to welcome the King back with glad Hosannas when He Himself "shall descend from heaven with a shout."—J. Gordon Logan.

The Faith for Desperate Days

The Bible is full of such days. Its record is made up of them; its songs inspired by them; its prophecy is concerned with them; and its revelation has come through them. The desperate days are the stepping-stones in the path of light. They seem to have been God's opportunity and man's school of wisdom.

There is a story of an Old Testament love feast in Psalm 107, and in every story of deliverance the point of desperation gave God His chance. The "wit's end" of desperation was the beginning of God's power. Every page of the Bible confirms the testimony.

Recall the promise of seed as the stars of heaven, and as the sands of the sea, to a couple as good as dead. Read again the story of the Red Sea and its deliverance, and of Jordan with its ark standing mid-

Study once more the prayers of Asa,

Jehoshaphat, and Hezekiah, when they were sore pressed and knew not what to do. Go over the history of Nehemiah, Daniel, Hosea, and Habakkuk. Stand with awe in the darkness of Gethsemane, and linger by the grave in Joseph's garden through those terrible days. Call the witnesses of the early Church, and ask the apostles the story of their desperate days.

The Bible is one long record of desperate days, and its pages are written for desperate days of all ages. The grief-free cannot read it. Dry eyes cannot find its treasures. It is for the broken-hearted. I never knew the meaning of the twenty-third Psalm till I heard my mother repeat it as her feet touched the river. The "wise and the prudent" are blind to its mysteries, but to the babes and the heart-broken it is made known.

Faith did not make our desperate days. Its work is to sustain and solve them. The

It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing praises unto Thy name, O most High.

Psalm 92:1

only alternative to a desperate faith is despair, and faith holds on and prevails. Its strength is in its power to wait. Unbelief judges by the immediate; faith stakes everything on the ultimate. Despair looks hopelessly at the problem; desperate faith trusts God against all odds. Hear what Job says from the ruined heap of his life: "Though he slay me, yet will I wait for him." Isaiah says: "Who is among you that feareth the Lord, that obeyeth the voice of his servant? He that walketh in darkness, and hath no light, let him trust in the name of the Lord, and stay upon his God."

There is no more heroic example of desperate faith than that of the three Hebrew children. The situation was desperate enough, but they answered bravely: "Our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the burning, fiery furnace; and he will deliver us out of thy hand, O king. But if not, be it known unto thee, O king, that we will not serve thy gods, nor worship the golden image which thou hast set up." I like that "but if not."

I have only space to mention Gethsemane. Ponder deeply its "nevertheless." "If it be possible . . . nevertheless!" Deep darkness had settled upon the soul of our Lord. The "why" of the cup pierced His heart. Trust meant anguish unto blood, and darkness to the descent of hell—"nevertheless! never the less!"—Samuel Chadwick.

The Religion of the Minister

was not anything, why, then he must have been *nothing*. And forget not that he it was who said, "In nothing am I behind the very chiefest apostles, though I be *nothing*." 2 Cor. 12:11.

One of the outstanding temptations of the minister is to have an exalted opinion of himself. Many among us have overestimated themselves. You can see it in the way

they walk, in the gestures they make, in the way they conduct song services; and sometimes, in the way they pray. If you have a temptation to overestimate yourself it would be well for you to have this text tacked up in your study where you can see it several times a day, "If a man think himself to be something, when he is *nothing*, he deceiveth himself." Gal. 6:3.

All any one of us can be is an instrument, or agent, in the hands of God. Here is a log that is ready to be sawed and split for stove wood. And here are a saw and ax. How long will it take this saw and ax to saw and split this log? You say it depends on the strength of the man who undertakes to do the job and on the fidelity with which he applies himself to the task. Exactly. All that the saw and ax can do is to be used, and unless they are used they are helpless; they can do nothing. Apart from the man they are nothing, so far as getting the work done is concerned. This is what I mean. You and I can do nothing apart from God. If anything is accomplished through us it must be accomplished by God. If we will yield ourselves whole-heartedly unto Him, if we will give Him our strength, our time, our talents, our obedience, He will use us. "Except the Lord build the house they labour in vain that build it."

May God help us to be real, to be reliable, to be ready; to be energetic, loyal, industrious, godly, immovable and inoffensive; to be overcomers, and at the same time to realize that we are *nothing*. Then we can stand still and see the salvation of God.

Will You Share?

Hudson Taylor said that he had known more than a hundred instances of Chinese accepting Christ at their first hearing of the Gospel.

He addressed a company of Buddhists one night in Ningpo. When he had finished, one of them rose and said: "All my life I have been seeking light for my mind and peace for my heart. I have tried Taoism, Confucianism, Buddhism in vain. But I do find light and peace in what I have heard tonight. Henceforth I follow Jesus." From that night and until his happy and triumphant death twenty years later this man was a devoted servant of Christ.

But the day after his entrance on the Christian life he asked Dr. Taylor: "How long have you in England known of this wonderful Saviour?" Said Dr. Taylor, "We have known of Him more than 400 years." "Oh then," said the man, "why did you not come sooner? My father sought for light all his life, and finally died in the dark. Why did you not come sooner?"

How to Improve Your Sunday School

Note: This is the fourth of twelve articles on improving your Sunday School. You may wish to clip and paste these articles in a notebook for future reference.

THE PASTOR AND THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

There are at least two classes of people—the few who are leaders and the multitudes who are followers. The pastor, in relation to his Sunday School is a *leader*, and may profit by a study of leaders in the Biblical record.

Old Testament Israel had her leaders, and the case of King Saul illustrates how dearly she paid for the mistakes of some of them. Philip, the evangelist, is a splendid example of a New Testament leader. His activities were not confined to the big gospel tent, for we find him out on one of the main highways ministering the gospel of salvation and water baptism to a high ranking officer. Philip was a man-to-man evangelist. In Acts 8:12, we find him baptizing both men and women—he didn't miss the men!

We talked recently to a business man about the needs of the church and his own spiritual need. He surmised that these days folk are too busy for the church. Paul was one of those busy professional men who was glad to give freely of his time. Both educated and talented, yet he loved both classes, and we see him down in the factory district boosting the tent and awning business—and winning men. The beloved Paul "stole" the hearts of his followers for Jesus whom he loved so well.

Jesus, the great Leader, won the hearts of His followers. See Him moving among the throng at the wedding, by the fishing hole, at the lunch counter. Wherever there were men, there was the understanding Saviour. Though Son of God and Man of prayer, Jesus found His place with the people, He was sociable. Because of His love for needy humanity, He went where men were to observe their needs and minister to them.

How marvelously God has moved in the past to bring salvation to multitudes through wise leaders! But how shall we speak of this type of leadership in its relation to Sunday School needs? Who are our modern Davids and Philips and Pauls? They are none other than faithful pastors and evangelists of our day.

Recently a visitor remarked, "Often my pastor mentions the Sunday School during preaching service and urges the people to attend, but he seldom attends himself." Because of the relation of the full gospel pastor to the Sunday School, he becomes commander-in-chief of all Sunday School forces. Therefore, he will be present at at least 95% of all its regular and special sessions. Speaking in army terms, he will operate the School through his carefully chosen and trained generals, captains, lieutenants, corporals, and a host of privates. His followers will love him. Pastors need the godly love and devotion of strong men. Like a leader of old, he will be chosen by his followers because he stands head and shoulders about his fellows, although he'll not act that way.

In the pastor's place of leadership, he will seek to know the best Sunday School methods. These he will impart to his superintendent, and slowly but surely see them incorporated into the local School. He will endeavor to develop his superintendent or, better still, several members for the ministry of superintendent to assure uninterrupted service in case of necessary changes. In his search for helps, he may cause a Sunday School

workers' library to be established in the School. He will direct attention to helps offered in Our Sunday School Counsellor and the Pentecostal Evangel.

He will co-operate with his superintendent in planning monthly workers' conferences that will be different, interesting, and helpful, with the largest possible percentage of workers attending. He will be quick to detect inefficiency in the School and assist the superintendent in eliminating the same with the least possible friction. Because of the pastor's peculiar fitness for his important post he will, by the help of the Lord, guide his workers and the entire School into the most constructive channels resulting in natural, normal, continuous growth, and increased efficiency of operation.

Thus, our LEADERS, the pastors, commandersin-chief of Sunday Schools, will fill a very large place in the hearts of the people. Sunday schools will become channels through which men are caught for the kingdom, they in turn to catch others. This being accomplished, "the people will rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works" done by His help.

The Sunday School is the pastor's best contact with men. He can win church-shy men to a men's Bible class more easily than he can enlist their interest in the program of the church. Once acquainted with the pastor and his Sunday School fellows, it is but a short step to Christ and the church.

Recently, six church announcements in a local paper listed the names of four women Sunday School superintendents. God bless faithful women—we only wish there were enough men to fill such places. Pastors should study carefully our mighty Leader's methods of catching men.

COULD YOU NOT DO THIS?

Here is a good report which should impel others to press forward with new zeal and courage in Sunday School work. Our experience emphasizes the principle that a few with proper vision and consecrated endeavor can do much in the way of increasing Sunday School attendance, resulting in the growth of the church and God's rich blessing coming on many lives. May this account of what the saints at the Morgan Hill, California, assembly have accomplished stir the people of many other assemblies to like achievements.

Five years ago our record attendance was sixty-eight. About three years ago, two women in the church were burdened about the number of children throughout the rural area who were not attending any Sunday School. They began to visit the various homes and soon had members of the church going out before Sunday School to bring in the children. The children were anxious to come. Soon the parents began to come, and that meant that the cars could pick up other children. Soon the number enrolled reached 90. Today we have 217 enrolled. Our community is less than 1,000 population. A few months ago it was necessary to have more room so an addition was built on the church to provide space for 7 more classes.

This is already well filled. The private cars had been overcrowded in bringing in the children, and so the children were asked to bring a small offering each Sunday for a bus. There was such a willing response that today we have a Sunday School bus all paid for.

There has been an increase in every department of the church as the Sunday School has gone ahead.—V. H. Gustafson, Pastor, Full Gospel Church.

Fresh Stirring in Harbin

"After three months' absence," writes Adolph Wingard from Harbin, Manchuria, "we found things rather dull and disappointing in Harbin. We gave ourselves to definite prayer that God would restore the 'open fountain' in our midst. Praise His Name, He heard our cry and, toward the end of October, one received the Baptism. From then until the first of December, it was our joy to see eight others filled with the Spirit.

"We praise God for this blessing for, as Pentecostal workers, we earnestly desire to keep our Pentecostal experience and testimony fresh and burning. Where the blessed Pentecostal Spirit is working, people are being saved; and those who have grown cold are being renewed and made to shine again. Recently four souls have been filled and refilled so that they now enjoy Pentecost.

Work Spreading

"We have recently sent in seven orders for Sunday School material to be used in the different places where our people are working. Through the efforts of our first two deacons a work was opened up in Lo T'ing Hsien. Now another brother is deeply engrossed in starting a work in his home village.

"Some time ago one of our Sunday school workers was given in marriage to a Brother Jang who lived in a village north of Harbin. Since then Sister Jang has begun a Sunday school there and we have rejoiced to hear that a goodly number of folk have already received the Pentecostal infilling in the assembly there.

"Please pray for us and the work here. A number of our brethren are facing a time of crisis due to the government's plan to take over the entire grain trade. This has been a good business heretofore and these brethren

do not know what they will do when their means of livelihood is taken from them."

ONE YEAR IN NEW STATION

In October, 1938, W. E. and Mrs. Davis began their work in a new station at Palghat, South India. In his most recent letter Brother Davis considers the advance made during their first year.

"It has been a struggle," he writes, "but we praise God for the victory He has given and are believing for greater things in the future. There have been battles and trials as there always are in 'breaking the sod,' but He has stood near to help and encourage.

"There have been several definite conversions for which we thank God; and a number have received healing from the Lord. One little girl, formerly the most disagreeable and disturbing child in Sunday School, has given up idol worship and is believing in Jesus. Recently, when she was ill with fever, she prayed that Jesus would heal her and was delivered immediately.

"We have just observed our first anniversary of coming to Palghat. The Lord granted us a precious service with the sweet presence of God beautifully manifested in our midst. Special blessing rested upon the testimonies of victory won through the power of Jesus.

"Our hearts were stirred as we heard of some of the trials our workers have gone through, but they have stood faithful and gained the victory promised to the steadfast ones.

Hospital Work

"Much good is being accomplished in the hospital where Mrs. Davis and the Bible woman visit regularly. Many hungry souls have been pointed to the Saviour and Healer. About three weeks ago a young woman who had been badly hurt was brought in. She had never heard the Name of Jesus!

"A few days later this young woman accepted Christ as her Saviour and gave wonderful testimony to the peace and joy she received in her heart. Only a week before she was lost in heathen darkness; but within the week she received the Lord as her Master and now has received her call home to be with Him, bless His Name!

"Only God knows what fruit the hospital work may bring. Many eager listeners are dismissed in a short time and we never know. But, this we do know, His Word will not return unto Him void, so we believe Him for the harvest."

TROUBLOUS TIMES IN CHINA

"War, floods, famine, and pestilence have been the program for China during the past year," writes Augusta Remacle from Yunnan Province. "Cost of food and clothing is soaring so high they will soon be out of reach for the poorer people. Floods have destroyed homes and crops and many lives. The rice harvest has been very poor, and the corn crop has entirely failed in some places.

"Nevertheless there is still a gleam of hope. The people of this province have been prosperous, independent, and self-satisfied; they have desired everything but God! In this time of want we feel that the Lord is moving upon their hearts. In the last month I have sold twenty-five Testaments—a thing which has never happened before! Our services are much better attended and the people listen attentively. Let us pray that China's troubles will bring many to our Lord!

Encounter with Bandits

"One missionary, traveling down to Tali, met robbers on the road a day's journey from here. They took everything she had and even wanted the clothes she was wearing! Three times they untied her shoestrings to steal her shoes, but her protests that she would not be able to walk over the mountains barefooted finally caused them to stop.


"She herself was not molested but her nerves were quite shaken. The horsemen who were with her also lost all they had. At the next station a Chinese Christian gave her a quilt and an old coat to wear during the rest of her journey.

"We do praise God for permitting us to work in sad and needy China. May His will be brought to pass in these times of trouble—and perhaps even by the troubles themselves!"

PETTENGERS RENEWING FELLOWSHIPS

"The past six weeks," writes Edgar Pettenger from Brakpan, Transvaal, "have been spent in getting adjusted again and in renewing fellowship with missionaries and workers. Several welcoming meetings have been given us at different points along the mining area. The power of God has fallen among the fifty to seventy-five people who gather for services. Meetings have been carried on every night and three times on Sunday for quite a long time.

"Brother Bhengu has been called away and a good native pastor is now a definite need for this location. We praise God for His great blessing here and know that He will surely bring forth the one He wants in this position.

"Opportunities are many and great in this mining area to which natives from many parts of Africa, particularly Portuguese East Africa, come for work. We praise God for the privilege of serving Him here and pray that He will enable us to be real witnesses for Him, filled with the fire and the power of the Holy

Ghost!"

of meetings in Hung Kau, then we went to Yan Teh for some special services.



NO LAZY MAN'S JOB!

Lawrence Perrault's latest letter from Cuba leaves us almost gasping as we realize the rush and urgency sometimes involved in going about our Father's business. "A few days "After eighteen wearisome hours on the bus we arrived in Palma Soriano to hold a service that same night. In the morning we went to the nearby town of Candonga to make arrangements for opening a regular Sunday School there. From Service to Service

"On Sunday we began with Sunday School in Palma, hastened back to Candonga to open the new Sunday School there, and then returned to Palma for the watch-night service. This was a blessed time of feasting with the Lord; many sick were prayed for and seemed to receive help, some testifying later to instant healing.

"Monday night we were back in Santiago for another good service with the friends there. The next night's service in Candonga will be long remembered. Every seat was filled by 7:30 and all available space was occupied by men standing. During the full two-hour service the presence of the Holy Spirit was so evident that scarcely a person moved. The next morning I asked a young man who had stood during the meeting if he had not been worn out. He answered, 'Que vale!' which is to say, 'I should say not!'

"Wednesday afternoon—off to prayer meeting in Calderon; Wednesday night—back to Palma Soriano where the power of God fell during the altar service. One of the first to raise her hand and come forward was a denominational worker who had published her disapproval of the noise in our meetings.

"For a change, on Thursday we were really busy! At 5 A. M. we were up and off into the mountains with a group of Christians for a service in Caney del Sitio. We climbed down the cliff that edges the river and searched in the darkness for a place to cross. The girl carrying the hymn books fell in! Then a league and a half back into the mountains, lunch, service at noon, return, and the train again. This time the service was in a new town, Los Pasos, where the local theatre owner had offered us the use of his theatre for services.

"What a service it was! No one knew anything of the gospel nor even what hymns might be, so we had it all. Brother Carides preached and then I preached. Another train ride to Palma Soriano, the bus to Havana, and we were home again!

"Tired? Yes! But what a blessing to be allowed to become tired, and even dirty; and hungry sometimes, in the service of our wonderful Lord and King."

"SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Jesus Teaches a Lesson on Thankfulness

Lesson for February 25. Lesson Text: Luke 17:11-19; Psalm 103:1-5.

There is an old English proverb, "Put a snake in your bosom, and when it is warm it will sting you"—base ingratitude, to say the least! Yet the proverbial snake is no more base than the man who wounds the heart of God by failing to be truly appreciative of the innumerable blessings He bestows. May our lesson from God's Word so inspire us that from our hearts praise may rise continually as a sweet incense to God.

THANKFULNESS AND INGRATITUDE

Great need. "There met him ten men who were lepers." These men were drawn together by their common misery which made them ignore the na-

tional enmity which existed between them. Nine were probably Jews while one was a Samaritan. How miserable was their plight! Cursed with an incurable and loathsome disease which separated them, in accordance with the Mosaic law (Lev. 13:46), from the rest of society, they stood outside the village and called aloud for help. Leprosy is a type of that greatest disease, sin, which separates men from God and from the righteous, and which is contagious, loathsome, and practically incurable.

Great deliverence. They cried aloud to Christ for mercy. "And when he saw them, he said unto them, Go shew yourselves unto the priests." There was great variety in the way Jesus healed those who came to Him. These men were not instantly healed as was the leper of Luke 5:12, 13. Instead, their faith was tested. Though there was no visible change in their condition they were to act as if they were healed, and report to the priest whose duty it was (Lev. 14:2-32) to examine lepers and pronounce them cured if such were the case.

"And it came to pass, that, as they went, they were healed." These men had faith! Let us learn a lesson. Many lose faith and think they are not healed if there is no *immediate* change. God's order is, Believe . . . and see. John 11:40. "Believe that ye receive and ye shall have." Mark 11:24. Says one greatly used of God in the min-

istry of healing, "I am moved by what I believe, not by what I see." Let us be likeminded!

Great ingratitude. One of them, when he saw he was healed, turned back and with a loud voice gave thanks. But Christ asked: "Were there not ten cleansed? but where are the nine?" Oh, the wistful sadness of these words of Jesus! men had experienced healing by His mighty power; only one returned to thank Him. Ten men had faith in Him. Only one had love for Him. So it often is today. For more than twenty years a minister kept an account of all sick persons that he visited. In that time he visited two thousand people who, in prospect of death, supposedly gave themselves to Christ and were restored to health. But only two of these by their future conduct proved that their repentance and gratitude was real. One thousand, nine hundred, and ninety eight returned to their old ways!

A little boy was seriously injured in heroically saving the life of a doctor's daughter. The doctor, thankful to receive his daughter alive, and in the excitement of his joy went on, never even stopping to thank the little fellow or to ask his name. As the little boy lay dying in the hospital he kept saying over and over in heartbroken tones,

"Oh, if he had only thanked me! If he had only thanked me!" How the tender loving heart of Jesus must grieve when those for whom He gave His all, fail to show their gratitude!

Great Thankfulness. It is significant to note that the only one to return to give thanks was "this stranger," the Samaritan. The nine who were probably Jews, and therefore children of privilege, went thanklessly on their way. It is well to be children of privilege; but there is grave peril connected with it. We may become so familiar with the great truths of the Word, and with the story of Calvary, that we take all for granted. Let us beware! The object of every blessing we receive is that we may be drawn closer to the Giver. Blessings are good. The Samaritan was blessed; and his blessing drew him to its Giver. So it is God's intention that every

blessing we receive shall bring us closer to Christ.

Great Blessing. "And he said, Arise, go thy way: thy faith hath made thee whole." The nine had a faith which secured for them healing in their bodies; but the Samaritan had a faith which worked by love and secured for him the added blessing of healing of the soul. Heartfelt worship and praise will always result in blessing. It will bring the presence of God. Psalm 22:3. It will bring healing. Matt. 15:21-28. It will bring healing. Matt. 15:21-28. When prayer seems not to avail, turn to thanksgiving and worship!

A CALL TO THANKSGIVING. Psalm 103:1, 2.

In the first two verses of this psalm we see man blessing God—

With his soul. "Bless the Lord, O my soul." The psalmist is speaking to himself, calling, not upon his tongue nor his pen, but upon his soul, his inmost self, to magnify God, lest a dullness and indifference steal over his faculties to silence the song of praise. We, too, need constantly to command our souls to praise God lest we fall

into a state of ingratitude, lethargy, and depression. Psalm 42.

With his entire being. "And all that is within me, bless his holy name." If we would truly bless the Lord and gladden His heart, we must worship not merely with our lips, but with our entire being. Someone has said, "Let your conscience bless the Lord by unvarying fidelity. Let your judgment bless Him, by decisions in accordance with His Word. Let your imagination bless Him, by pure and holy musings. Let your affections bless Him, by loving whatsoever He loves. Let your desires bless Him, by seeking only His glory. Let your memory bless Him, by meditating on His excellencies. Let your every sense bless Him, by its fealty, every word by its truth, and every act, by its integrity."

With recollection of His benefits. "And forget not all His benefits." There is a tendency in the human heart to dwell on the trials of life and forget God's innumerable blessings. Said Mark Guy Pearse, "I was walking home one night with my little daughter at my side. She said: 'Father, I'm going to count the stars.' 'Very well,'

I said, 'go on.' By and by I heard her counting—'Two hundred and twenty-three, two hundred and twenty-four.
... Oh, dear,' she said, 'I had no idea there were so many.' Ah, dear friends, I sometimes say in my soul: 'Now, Master, I'm going to count Thy benefits.' Soon my heart sighs, not with sorrow, but burdened with such goodness, and I say to myself, 'I had no idea there were so many.'"

REASONS FOR THANKSGIVING. Psalm 103:3-5.

The Psalmist has called upon himself to bless God. Now he reminds himself of God's blessings to man. God blesses man with—

Forgiveness. "Who forgiveth all thine iniquities." The greatest reason for thankfulness is given first—salvation from sin. "Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered." Psalm 31:1. No matter how trying a man's circumstances may be, if he is saved he has every reason to praise the Lord!

Healing. "Who healeth all thy diseases." Salvation and healing are linked together. There is not only salvation from all sin through the atonement of Jesus, but also healing from all disease! Matt. 8:17; Isa. 53:5.

Redemption. "Who redeemeth thy life from destruction." David had many hairbreadth escapes from destruction. The jaws of a lion, the paws of a bear, the javelin of Saul each threatened to end his existence; but,

"The angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear Him and delivereth them." Psalm 34:7. Our redemption includes not only salvation from sin, but deliverance from all the power of the enemy! Luke 10:19; Psalm 23; Psalm 91.

Coronation. "Who crowneth thee with loving-kindness and tender mercies." How royally man is treated. Cleansing, healing, and redemption are not enough; God must make him a king and crown him with a crown far more precious than one of corruptible silver and gold, a crown studded with gems of grace and lined with loving-kindness!

Satisfaction. "Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things." God alone can satisfy the deep needs and boundless wants of the human soul. Psalm 63:5; Isa. 55:1, 2; 58:11. What are the good things with which He satisfies man? "All things that pertain unto life and godliness (2 Peter 1:3-4)," all things necessary for full and abundant life!

Invigoration. "So that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's." The human body easily tires; and the human spirit quickly droops. But the precious Holy Spirit is sent to quicken us. Rom.

8:11. Through Him we receive the very life of Christ and mount up with wings as eagles (Isa. 40:31), refreshed and rejuvenated, to face life's

It was also understood that the committee purchased, subject to governmental approval, a large cattle ranch as the nucleus of the proposed community.

THE SIN OF WASTEFULNESS

In these days of unemployment and want among many, we read of thousands of gallons of milk being poured down the drain in some places. Now and again the English Press reports that tons of herring are dumped back into the sea or used as manure, says Elim Evangel. In South America tons and tons of coffee were set on fire because it could not be marketed at a reasonable price. Such wastefulness may well be a reason for many of our economic troubles, for God is sore displeased with it. Although there was an overabundance of loaves and fishes after Jesus had fed the multitude, He said, "Gather up the fragments that remain, that nothing be lost." John

THE PALESTINE PARTITION

Although Great Britain has decided to take no action in Palestine at present, the White Paper remains for future consideration. The plan recommended by the White Paper is for Britain to surrender her mandatory powers in Palestine by the end of ten years, and leave the land divided between the Jews and the Arabs who would be free to rule over their respective territories themselves. Commenting on this, Miss M. Thompson says: "How little do those responsible for this White Paper realize they are placing Great Britain in the pathway of the wrath of God. In Joel 3:2 God said, 'I will also gather all nations and will plead with them (in judgment) for My people, whom they have scattered among the nations, and parted My land.' Great Britain may make these plans, but whether they will be fulfilled is another question, for God too has His plans for Israel and Palestine. God swore that Israel should be re-gathered in her own land, unconverted, in the latter days. Ezek. 36:24-38. The White Paper proposals will merely make it the more painful for the Jews to get back to the Holy Land."

AN ADMISSION

The chief Rabbi, Dr. Hertz, made a most wonderful admission during the last War. He said: "A number of Rabbis have, in the course of our generation, publicly renounced Judaism, or gone over to Christianity-an unheard-of thing in all the preceding thirty-three centuries of our chequered career."

PROTESTANTS IN ITALY

The Waldensian Church has 250 churches and missions in Italy, and their congregations are larger than ever, reports The Presbyterian Message. One reason for this is the retrenchment in other churches. In the face of this increased responsibility pray that this, the oldest evangelical church in the world, will remain true to the simple gospel testimony.

SPAIN'S STAND

According to Revelation, there is an increasing tie between Britain and Spain, as Italian influence in the latter country grows. The iron from the great Spanish mines near Bilbao, is being shipped to France and England for munitions, and not to Germany. The day when Spain and Italy will be joined with France and Britain in a revived Roman Empire, as Bible prophecy indicates, hastens on.

MUSSOLINI AND THE JEWS

As a result of the personal intervention of Mussolini, orders for the expulsion of some 3,000 German and Polish refugees in Italy have been revoked, states Jewish Chronicle. His intervention came very abruptly at a time when Italian authorities were taking strong measures to round up all refugees and give them final warning to leave the country. In several cases the refugees had already been given railroad tickets to take them to the border. One writer says a marked change is noticeable in Mussolini's policy. The Minister of Propaganda has been transferred to the post of Minister to the Vatican, and anti-Jewish propaganda has practically disappeared from the Italian press. No doubt this development means a step toward closer friendship between Italy and the democracies, and the revival of the Roman Empire looms just a little higher.

THE JEW IN EUROPE

According to Jewish Chronicle, only one third of the Jews remain in Austria, their number having decreased from 165,000 in March, 1938, to 55,000 in September, 1939. In German Poland and Soviet Poland according to this paper as well they are being arrested and threatened because, in order to keep the Sabbath, they refuse to work more than six days a week at the hard task of removing debris which the authorities force them to do. In Hungary further clauses of the second Jew law have come into effect, limiting the number of Jews permitted to work at trades to twelve per cent of the population, and the number in professions to six per cent. As a result, many Jews who are about to lose their occupations are ending their lives in despair. The total number of Jews who will lose their employment in the next four years, as a result of the new law, is estimated at 60,000, which means that 200,000 men, women, and children (one third of the Jewish population) will lose their livelihoods. Pray that in their time of trouble many Jews will repent and accept the Lord Jesus as their Christ and their Saviour.

AN EVOLUTIONIST CONFESSION

An Evolutionist professor confesses that no improvement can be seen in man during the past millenniums. He is Dr. Arthur Woodward, director of history and anthropology at the Los Angeles Museum of History, Science, and Art. He said recently: "There has been little or no change in man, in his desires and reactions, since we have had any history of him. Social and political conditions have some effect on the conduct of men, on their dress, habits and behavior, but their urges, hopes, dreams, and emotions still are primitive. Nor have we changed greatly in the matter of virtues, vices, and superstitions. We have no new virtues or vices. We only have different ways of manifesting them.'

The Professor's words are true. Unregenerate man has not changed since the day he rejected the knowledge of God that was revealed to him. His story is told in Romans 1:18-32. Only the New Birth, through repentance and faith toward Christ, can restore man to the place of purity from which God has permitted him to fall.

THE DANGER OF THE DANCE

The round dance was started in a house of prostitution in Paris by a mistress of a King of France and was never danced outside of a house of prostitution, nor by anyone but prostitutes and rakes, for the first one hundred years after it had started. The waltz was originated by a French dancing master by the name of Gault. He was guillotined in 1632 for strangling to death his own sister in an attempt to ruin her. The most popular step used in ballrooms today originated with negro prostitutes of the Barbary Coast, San Francisco. The next most popular step originated with prostitutes on the Bowery, New York. T. A. Faulkner, a converted dance master, took careful census of two hundred prostitutes in Los Angeles, and found that one hundred and sixty-three attributed their fall to the dance and the ballroom; twenty to drink, given by their parents; ten to wilful choice; and seven to poverty and want. Bishop Spaulding of New York said that nineteen out of every twenty fallen women stated that their fall came through the dance. A great educator has said: "The dance hall is the nursery of the divorce court, the training shop of prostitutes, and the graduate school of infamy.'

"No," he answered thoughtfully, "I couldn't. I see that a happy feeling is not enough."

"What would be enough?"

"But suppose you had a vision of a glorious angel, and he told you you had your sins forgiven, would that really be enough to rest on?"
