When Esther approached the king and found favor in his sight, he was very lavish in promising her what she desired, even to the half of his kingdom. And when the daughter of Herodias danced before Herod, he was very lavish in promising her what she wanted; she could make any request to the half of his kingdom. But when the Lord spoke to His disciples He said, "It is the Father's good pleasure to give you"-what? Not half the kingdom, but the whole. God so loved that He gave the very best gift, His Son; not a partial gift, but a complete gift, that men should have faith in Him and not perish but have everlasting life.

When the Lord told Israel, "I am the Lord that healeth thee," He did not make a reservation and say, "I am the Lord that healeth thee partially." No, He is a complete Healer, just as He is a complete Saviour. Would you be satisfied if He pardoned some of your sins and not the rest? No. But you joy in the fact that as you walk in the light you have fellowship with the Lord and His precious blood cleanses from all sin. The Psalmist glorified God for the many benefits bestowed, and praised the Lord who forgiveth all iniquities, and who healeth, not a few, but all diseases. He promised Israel that if they would diligently hearken unto Him He would put none of the diseases of Egypt upon them. Why was it important for them to diligently hearken to His Word? Because faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the Word of God. He has called His own to walk by faith, and as they hearken to Him and believe His Word they are kept from the diseases which the unbelieving Egyptians had.

When He sent the plagues upon Egypt, the Egyptians and even the magicians were covered with boils, but the children of Israel to whom the Lord had made promise were exempted. And the Word of the Lord came to them that they were to keep the Passover. They listened and believed the specific instructions, and they observed a Passover, fulfilling every word that was spoken. And when judgment came upon Egypt and Egypt was smitten, from Pharaoh's palace to the dwelling of the poorest in the realm, there was not a house where the first born was not smitten and destroyed. But God had promised that when He saw the blood He would pass over,
and His own who sheltered neath the blood were exempted from death. He brought them forth and took care of them. There they were in the wilderness, lacking many of the things which were considered necessary, but they were preserved by the Lord and there was not one feeble person in all Israel.

A plague came upon them when they had sinned, but when they repented God showed Moses what to do-to raise up a brazen serpent, and He gave the word that whosoever looked should live. And Christ showed that as the serpent was lifted up in the wilderness, so He, the Son of Man, should be lifted up. Do you think there is less power in the Cross and in the Son of Man lifted up than there was in a brazen serpent-the brazen serpent that Hezekiah destroyed, calling it Nehushtan, a piece of brass? Would you say there is less power

for your physical needs in the uplifted Christ than there was in the uplifted serpent? Such a suggestion you would consider blasphemous.

Isaiah foresaw the uplifted One when through him the message of the uplifted One was spoken, "Look unto me, and be ye saved." Saved from sin, saved from sickness, saved from all the curse, saved from the old corrupt nature, saved and delivered out of the hand of the enemy with a glorious redemption. # How Pentecost Came to a Brazilian Jungle

Where could the saying that "Truth is stranger than fiction" be more strikingly illustrated than in the settlement of Lettish colonists, hidden far inland in the great Brazilian forest? The romantic, thrilling, but sad account of this colony from its inception nearly forty years ago to this time sounds like an Arabian Nights Tale or a Baron Nunchausen story.

As we were crossing that vast land which is Brazil it was our pleasure to visit and minister to the people of this encampment, more startlingly unique I suppose, than any other colony existing in the world today.
In 1921-2 an especially spiritual section of the Lettish Baptist church in Latvia received an astonishing revelation that they were to flee to Brazil. As quickly as passages could be arranged two thousand brave Christians obedientlv packed up and departed from Latvia to take refuge in the forests of Brazil, there to escape the scourge of Communism as it was moving across northern Europe. They have founded and built a Christian community and are living happily, far removed from the excitement and rush of twentieth century life in Europe.

The exodus was so extraordinary, and included such prominent people that the government became alarmed, and sought to compel some of the would-be emigrants to remain. Thus some were compelled to slip away bv night, escaping the police who were looking for them. Arriving in Hamburg they took passage for Brazil. Those who had no money were magnanimously supplied by those who had more than enough. From the Brazilian port of Santos they began their perilous journey into the wilderness, the men leading the way, cutting a path for their families with axes.

After many davs of wandering through the luxuriant subtropical growth of the jungles, wading swamps and climbing hills, they came to a place where the leaders decided to settle. Two thousand pilgrims pitched their tents on a river bank, and called upon God to help them in their arduous and perilous task of establishing themselves in the forest. The entire camp worked in hapnv unity, eating out of the same pot as they cleared the land. It must have resembled Israel of old taking possession of the Land of Promise.

They encountered many dangers. Wild animals were fierce and plentiful. Alligators and other reptiles were hungry for human food, and, worst of all, fevers and other diseases broke out. In the center of the camp was a huge bell, used to arouse the people to bring them in the early morning to the great central tent for Bible reading and praver. It was also used to indicate work hours and meal times. During the first year however, it was better known as the "Death Bell," as it was rung so often to announce a death in the camp.

The industry that called for most attention during the first awful twelve months was coffin making. One hundred and thirty precious children succumbed to the tropical climate, improper food, and other hardships. A number of the older ones also died, including some strong young men and women. The Indians took the colonists to be enemies and fell upon them at unexpected moments, thus further reducing their number and adding to their miseries.

All funeral services were held at noon in the assembly tent. The clanging notes of the great bell would ring out and summon those who were able, to come to pay their last respects to the deceased. Those who told us the story said they knew of no day during the first year but what some were either dead or dying. One sad day four comrades were laid side by side in rough caskets made of lumber they sawed from a tree's trunk. The sorrowing colonists stood by and wondered what the end would be. Our Lettish interpreter, who speaks marvelous English, said they wept so much that at last they could not weep even over the dead. They could only with bowed heads and breaking hearts follow their comrades to the grave side.
"The morning cometh," spoke a great prophet of old; and so the downcast, brok-en-hearted colonists slowly emerged from their period of dark tribulation and began to experience prosperity.

Rather than receive land as a present from the Brazilian government or take it by force, they purchased land from the supposed owners. But as they discovered the unusual honesty of the newcomers, the Brazilians took advantage of them. As soon as the colonists had paid one man for land another claimant would come and say, "This land is mine. You must pay me or move away." Their great piety caused them to continue paying until all claimants were satisfied.
As most of their money was now gone

and many had none at all, some were obliged to travel to Sao Paulo and find work for a year or more. After saving some money these returned, cleared their land, and built homes. Others worked on large coffee plantations part time, to keep a little food in the house, until the first harvest was reaped.

Gradually they became firmly established and built a church and comfortable homes. One section desired to continue the communal system and an equal allotment of all profits. Another section wanted to work individually and have a private home and farm; therefore the individualist went to his farm, while about a thousand lived as one great family, even issuing their own currency for use in the colony. We were privileged to visit both parts of the colony and see their simple but interesting life.

As the years passed, Europe was forgotten as a home. And the "time of affliction" was succeeded by blessed prosperity. But to the great sorrow of those who knew God in a real way, the church cooled down in spirit. Intellectual sermons with classical music became their only spiritual food. Many longed and prayed for the visitation from God that they were expecting when they left Latvia for the New World.

In course of time the woman who interpreted for us while we were ministering to these colonists received in the mail from a cousin of hers living in the United States a copy of the Pentecostal Evangel and also a full-gospel magazine printed in England. In these journals she read of marvelous revivals in progress. Remarkable healings were described in a manner that moved her soul. Then she read that God is baptizing in the Holy Ghost today, just as He did in Jerusalem on the Day of Pentecost. Thus a tremendous desire for more of God was caused to spring up in her heart, and she began to pray earnestly for an infilling of the latter-rain Holv Spirit. Thereupon such an overwhelming power grinned her entire being that she was amazed. As she rejoiced in the blessing she was receiving there sprang from her lips sounds, words that were not intelligible to her. She went to a neighbor woman and confidentially told her about her experience. She and this neighbor kneeled in prayer and to the supreme joy of both the Lord baptized her in the Holy Ghost! In the exuberance of their inv they went over to another neighbor and told her of their marvelous experiences, and asked her if they might pray with her. This God-hungry neighbor received also. This strange news circulated about the colony from mouth to mouth, and others received the Holy Spirit Baptism with great joy. Then the baptized ones discovered that the Holy Ghost had been poured out at various places all over Brazil.

About one and a half years ago a Brazilian Assembly of God evangelist. under the direction of the Lord visited the colony with the Pentecostal message. It was received with great joy by many.

Following the usual course of the centuries the already existent local church branded the revival as fanaticism and promptly excluded all the participants from fellowship. The bewildered Pentecostals
did not know what to do! One dear old couple said, "We are soon to die and have no children, therefore build a church on our ground, and as soon as we go to our eternal home it will belong to the community as their church." Therefore the men among the believers cut down trees from the forest and sawed the logs into planks, and of this rough lumber they made a house that God has honored with many blessings.

The revival spread and the number increased until at present there are about 150 believers filled with the Holy Spirit. Our interpreter said many others were only waiting to see the permanency of the church before fully leaving the one which has lost its power.

Our visit was marked with great enthusiasm. On Sunday morning, ox carts, two-wheel wagons, people on horseback, and pedestrians from all directions, were seen gathering into the rough unpainted church. To look into the faces of these brave pioneers who had weathered the terrible storms of life and had forsaken a modern civilization in Europe for freedom of worship in a Brazilian jungle, gave one a feeling of the power of Christianity that would not otherwise have been experienced.
In worship the colonists reminded us of our Russian brethren to whom we ministered in Manchuria and Poland. They are deeply sentimental.

Their hearts seemed continually broken before the Lord. Their songs, such as "Hold the Fort" and "Rock of Ages," were sung with a rhythm and spirit that gripped the heart. There could not be felt or seen any sign of frivolity or lightness among them but rather niety and sincerity accompanied every word and song.
After three of us had given quite lengthy talks on Sunday morning, one of the brethren stood and said, "We should like some more, as it is not late yet." His request was granted!

In the evening a great crowd assembled, the house was packed full and many stood on the outside. In the sweltering heat, with perspiration flowing freely, we spoke words of encouragement and comfort to our fellow travelers to the Land of Promise.

As our bus was not to leave until midday on Monday, our friends said that we must speak again on the following morning. To our surprise we found the church full when we arrived. From nine until twelve we took turns in speaking of the wonderful things of God, and how He had raised up this marvelous Pentecostal testimony in all parts of the world in the last thirty years. Afterwards we had a healing service in which God's presence was remarkably felt.

Our lady interpreter, who knew English almost nerfectly from books, was a unique character. She was one of those who have their own possessions. Her daily routine ran like this: she milks her cow, plows with an ox in the field, builds fence around new territory, rides to market in a cart pulled by her ox, besides teaching school, and giving English and music lessons at night. If she walks down the road she takes her Bible or foreign language book, and reads as she walks so as not to lose a moment of precious time.

After we had been served a tasty Lettish dinner, someone announced the coming of the bus. Hastily we bade our newly made

but greatly admired friends farewell, and boarded the bus.

As we slowly moved away in low gear, we noticed a few tear stained eyes watching us. We waved a last good-by to the brave colonists as they stood by the road watching us as long as possible.

## Pentecostal Work Suppressed

In view of the tragic events of which we are even now reading in the daily papers, the following item, translated by $R$. Van Oosbree, Pastor of the Assembly of God at Laguna Beach, California, is doubly interesting. The item was published in "Spaden Regen" the organ of the Assemblies of God in Holland, a short while before that country was invaded.

In contrast with our homeland, where God's children up to the present day can freely gather to worship the Lord in accordance with His Word, there is increasing tribulation and persecution in other lands. Especially so in Italy. The Pentecostal work there dates from the year 1914 when in Florence the first Italian Pentecostal paper was issued under the name of "The Midnight Cry." Some years thereafter the assemblies in that land numbered about five hundred. Then Mussolini ordered the closing of all this work. Many of our brethren then followed the road of martyrdom. Mistreatments were the order of the day; many were confined in concentration camps, and those who were seemingly allowed freedom were under the constant watch of the secret police.

Even here it proved that the power of God's Spirit was mightier than the fist of a dictator.

No punishment could be so severe but that some still saw opportunity to meet in small numbers in underground alleyways (catacombs), private homes, and in hidden, seldom-trodden places.

On a certain day such a secret meeting was discovered by a stranger. He asked admittance and gave himself readily, by confessing his sins, over to the Saviour. After a short time he was also baptized and in every way was looked upon and treated as a brother. Alas, it proved that they had, in this man, taken a serpent to their bosom. When on occasion all the leading brethren were to gather in conference to deal with the interests of the scattered assemblies, he betrayed them to the police. From that moment on he was a celebrated man with the government, even as Judas.

Various prominent brethren were now condemned to prison. Others escaped with a severe warning. Gatherings of more than two persons were now forbidden and the services of the communion of the saints became impossible.

Still we know that neither in Italy, nor in Russia, nor Germany, can the gates of hell prevail against the Lord's assembly nor completely overcome it. Christ Himself shall keep His church established, however hell may roar.

Let us not forget to pray for the brethren and sisters who have to go through the heat of the persecutions. May we show our thankfulness for the liberty which is ours by doing everything in our power to further the work of the gospel, not only by prayer but also by our faithful attendance at our several meeting places and by showing our love for those of like precious faith, by giving our all in the service of God.

## A Transformed Soul

In the Dutch East Indies grows a tree which is often bare, leafless, and unlovely. Its curved and snake-like branches stretch toward the sky; and while other trees and shrubs throw out their scents and flaunt their scarlet or yellow blossoms, this particular tree is seemingly dead.

But suddenly, as if by magic, almost in a night, sap flows, hidden powers spring forth, and there stands a tree unsurpassed in beauty. Snow-white blossoms cover its branches so that hardly any of its unlovely wood can be seen.

The very ugliness of the snake-like branches becomes an asset, for the tree is transformed into a veritable bower of beauty, so that all who pass marvel at its loveliness and fragrance.

Christ comes like that to us, suddenly transforming and resurrecting a seemingly dead soul, so that we, through His Spirit, may cause the world to marvel that such a life, so dead, so unsatisfactory to self and others, can be made beautiful, a joy even under adverse and discouraging circumstances.

Seek entirely to depend on God for everything. Put yourself and your work into His hands. When thinking of any new undertaking, ask, "Is this agreeable to the mind of God? Is it for His glory?" If it is not for His glory, it is not for your good, and you must have nothing to do with it. Mind that!

Having settled that a certain course is for the glory of God, begin it in His name, and continue it to the end. Undertake it in prayer and faith, and never give up! Pray, pray, pray!
Do not regard iniquity in your heart. If you do, the Lord will not hear you. Keed that before you always. Then trust in God. Depend only on God. Wait on Him. Believe on Him. Expect great things from Him. Faint not if the blessing tarries. Pray, pray, pray!

And, above all, rely only on the merits of our ever-adorable Lord and Saviour, that, according to His infinite merits, and not your own, the prayers you offer an work you do will be accepted.-George ler.

## The Conscirntious Objector

Recently a friend handed the writer a copv of the "Pacifist Handbook" with a request that he read the same. In the book are some suggestions quoted in this article, and commended to those who are opposed to war. At the same time a fullfledged pacifist takes a position which is beyond what the writer would feel free to take were our nation called to war.
In the booklet the following religious bodies are listed, according to the Government Census of 1936, as "opposed to war or as advocating nonresistance."

To this list should be added others who are members of religious bodies which do not as religious bodies register any objection to war.

This handbook defines the conscientious objector as follows:
"In the broader sense, a conscientious objector is any person, whether called to military service or not, who refuses, because of his firm convictions, to support his country in the conduct of a war, or to profit, directly or indirectly, from the war.
"This definition includes some who would not repudiate every war, and who believe there may be worse evils than war. They may be willing to fight or give other assistance if the nation is actually invaded, and some would help other peoples who are similarly attacked. But they reserve the right to decide in their own conscience whether the cause merits their support.
"To describe their objection as 'conscientious' is to say that their opposition is not based on either physical or intellectual indolence, or want of patriotism, or cowardice, or the desire to evade responsibility or danger."
This definition of a "conscientious objector" is rather flexible, and gives the individual considerable freedom in determining his course of action. The complete "pacifist," however, takes the position that war is wrong; therefore, under no circumstances ought one to do anything to further war. Some have declared that one ought not to engage in hospital work, reconstruction of destroyed property, or to work in a factory or elsewhere which is policed by men in military uniform.
The Assemblies of God may well be classified among the "conscientious objectors." It is doubtful that it could be classified among the unqualified "pacifists," since it is pledged to "assist the Government in time of war in every way morally possible." Its Article on military service which has been made a part of its Constitution and By-Laws reads as follows:
"While recognizing human government as of divine ordination, and affirming our unswerving loyalty to the Government of the United States, nevertheless we are constrained to define our position with reference to the taking of human life.
"We as followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, believe in implicit obedience to the divine commands and precepts which instruct us to 'Follow peace with all men' (Heb. 12:14), 'Thou shalt not kill' (Ex. 20:13), 'Resist not evil' (Matt. 5:39), 'Love your enemies' (Matt. $5: 44$ ), etc. These and other scriptures have always been accepted and interpreted by our churches as prohibiting Christians from shedding blood or taking human life; therefore, we, as a body of Christians, while purposing to fulfill all the obligations of loyal citizenship, are nevertheless constrained to declare we cannot conscientiously participate in war and armed resistance which involves the actual destruction of human life, since this is contrary to our view of the clear teachings of the inspired Word of God which is the sole basis of our faith. At the same time the General Council hereby declares its unswerving loyalty to our Government and to its Chief Executive, and we purpose to assist the government in time of war in every way morally possible, consistent with our faith."

No man has authority to speak for the General Council of the Assemblies of God further than the General Council itself has spoken. Any additional advice must be regarded as from individuals and not from the General Council. What is here written is for the purpose of helping our youth in their decision, should our nation be called to war, which we hope may never be, with a desire that it may assist them in forming clear convictions and seeking a course that would be in harmony with their conscience.

In the "Pacifist Handbook" we read: "Jesus, by His teaching and example, discouraged the reliance on violence of the

revolutionary party of His time, and to His own followers He taught nonresistance to evildoers and love of enemies, that love being a positive benevolence which would be strong enough to actually overcome the evil. The early Christian Church thus became an antimilitary group. Not for almost two hundred years did its members enroll in any appreciable numbers in the imperial armies.... The early Christians took Jesus at His word, and understood His inculcations of gentleness and nonresistance in their literal sense. They closely identified their religion with peace; they strongly condemned war for the bloodshed which it involved-they declared that it was their policy to return good for evil, and to conquer evil with good."
It is believed that in the next war industry will be mobilized. "For a number of years an Industrial Mobilization Plan has been held in readiness. The principles of it are comprised in seven bills (S. 17161722, 74th Congress, First Session, 1935), which when enacted will grant to the President dictatorial power over the nation's manpower, industry, transportation, shipping, electric power, finances, labor, and publicity-press and radio."
In connection with the mobilization of man power and industry the Government has made provision for those who are conscientious objectors as to the actual taking of human life.
"Nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to require or compel any person to serve in a combatant capacity in any of the public armed forces of the United States, who is found to be a member of any well-recognized religious sect whose creed or principles forbid its members to participate in war in any form, if the conscientious holding of such belief by such person shall be established under such regulations as the President may prescribe; but no such person shall be relieved from service in such capacity as the President may declare to be noncombatant.'

Some societies, such as the Church of the Brethren, feel it to be "not consistent with their historical position for members to accept any service within the ranks of the army, or to work under the Red Cross or the hospital service, if under military direction." A few have gone so far as to refuse to keep the camp clean where they were quartered because they were supervised by military men. Against such positions as those cited above let us think of the opportunities for helpful Christian service to be found by the conscientious objector. "There are lives to be saved, and men in need of spiritual aid, with their personal problems multiplied, "by the maladjustments which war brings." "In the World War ninety-nine conscientious objectors were allowed to take part in reconstruction work behind the lines in France. The Society of Friends of England and the United States organized the projects, in which two hundred thirteen men and ninety-five women were engaged bv the end of 1917. Hospitals were built and maintained, and medical and dental service provided, in regions laid waste by war and in other sections to which the war refugees had gone." Other services benevolent in character were performed which we omit mentioning here.

The Broadway Tabernacle of New York has provided a statement for its members which, after it is signed, is preserved with the church records to show it to have been the free act of its members. It is quoted here and it would be well for other churches which believe it is not according to the spirit of Christ to take human life, to adopt a statement which meets its approval. There are other societies which have arranged statements for their followers, but the writer prefers that of the Broadway Tabernacle to others which he has read. It reads as follows:
"I have quietly considered what I would do if my nation should again be drawn into war.
"I am not taking a pledge, because I do not know what I would do when the heat of the war mood is upon the country. But in a mood of calm consideration I do today declare that I cannot reconcile the way of Christ with the practice of war.
"I do therefore set down my name to be kept in the records of my church, so that it will be for me a reminder if war should come; and will be a solemn declaration to those who hold to this conviction in time of war that I believe them to be right; and I do desire with my whole mind and heart that I shall be among those who keep to this belief.
"I set down my name to make concrete my present thought upon the question of war, and declare my purpose to think and talk with others about it, that my belief in the way of Christ shall become operative in this and in other questions which now confuse our thought and action."

While we hope our nation may not be drawn into war, should war come, a few suggestions for our young men who might be called would not be amiss.
When called upon to register, the conscientious objector ought to make it clear that he is opposed to military service.

If called the following sound advice is worth remembering: "The conscientious objector can still be human-display neat appearance, cheerfulness, a sense of humor, lack of bitterness toward those with whom he differs, frankness, and humility. He can overcome the inclination to be self-centered and can show an interest in the fortunes of his fellows. He can be firm in his convictions without being offensive to the man who cannot agree with his point of view. He can endure abuse without becoming abusive. To those who are reasonable he can set forth his reasons."

Should one be conscripted he may be sure that his position will be tested. Able arguments will be presented to convince him that it is his duty to take up arms. It may be that he will suffer at the hands of others until they are convinced that he is conscientious and not merely a "slacker." According to Major Kellogg's Report on the objectors of the world war, he says:
"Many of them were uneducated youths who had grown un in farm communities where they had had little contact with the world at large. Their religion was dictated to them by their pastors, and thev accented to the letter whatever they were told. With these young men the practice of the army officers was to lay down to them a different set of facts, representing the Government's point of view, and under this pressure many of them admitted that they might have been

wrong and agreed to accept military service."
It is important that one know how to speak as well as to act during a time of war. According to the Espionage Act of June 15, 1917, "Whoever, when the United States is at war, shall wilfully make or convey false reports or false statements with intent to interfere with the operation or success of the military or naval forces of the United States or to promote the success of its enemies and whoever, when the United States is at war, shall wilfully cause or attempt to cause insubordination, dislovalty, mutiny, or refusal of duty, in the military or naval forces of the United States, or who shall wilfully obstruct the recruiting or enlistment service of the United States, to the injurv of the service of the United States, shall be punished by a fine of not more than (sic) $\$ 10,000$ or imprisonment for not more than twenty years or both."
Whatever may be the individual decision of the conscientious objector he must remember that none of us can entirely avoid being a part of the war program if war comes. Surely he would not wish, in the interest of showing his aversion to war, to become an obstructionist to the successes of his own nation, and thus a helper to the enemy. His decision is so serious that now, before the war fever is abroad, he ought prayerfully and Scripturally to determine the position that he feels God would have him take were he called to serve. Then let him stand by his convictions in the spirit of meekness.

## Love Wins

After Richard Weaver's conversion, one of his greatest trials was the persecution in the coal-pit by his fellow workmen. Working one day he heard the lad who was attending to his wagon cry out. On going to see he found another collier trying to take away his tub, which to have lost would mean so much out of his day's earnings.
"I thought," said Richard, "that God did not tell me to see a man stand and rob me." The man cursed, and swore that he would
push the tub over me. "Nay," said Weaver, "the Lord will not allow thee." He was in a great rage, seized the tub, and said, "Now I will push it over thee, thou Methody devil." Richard stood before it, and the man began to push. Then said Weaver, "Now, Lord, now devil, which is the strongest?" Both pushed, Weaver singing,

Jesus the name high over all,
In hell, or earth, or sky;
Angels and men before it fall,
And devils fear and fly.
"And the Lord and I being stronger than he and the devil, he had to get out of the way, and let me have my own. So I gave the tub to my boy."

On arriving at the coal-pit, the man was the first he met. Richard said, "Good morning," but got no reply; but when he reached the bottom, he found his antagonist waiting for him. The poor fellow burst into weeping, saying, "Richard, will you forgive me for striking you?" "I have forgiven thee," said Weaver: "ask God to forgive thee." Richard gave him his hand and they went to their work. But the poor man could not rest until he felt he was forgiven. They both went on their knees in the pit; and the man who came weeping went back rejoicing, saying, "I am happy now in Jesus, Glory to God and the Lamb for ever."

## Jehoiachin Abased and Exalted Lesson for June 23. Lesson Text: 2 Kings 24:6-16; 25:27-30; Jer. 22:20-30

"And I will give thee into the hand of them that seek thy life, and into the hand of them whose face thou fearest, even into the hand of Nebuchadrezzar king of Babylon, and into the hand of the Chaldeans. And I will cast thee out, and thy mother that bare thee, into another country, where ye were not born; and there shall ye die." So spoke Jeremiah, the weeping prophet, concerning Jehoiachin king of Judah. And his sadly pronounced message of doom was fulfilled in minutest detail!
Jehoiachin receives punishment. 2 Kings 24:8-16. Jehoiachin was only eighteen when he inherited the throne, and like Jehoahaz, he held it only three months, but that was long enough for him to do "that which was evil in the sight of the Lord" to such an extent as to incur the wrath of God and swift doom. The day of mercy for Judah as a nation was past. There remained nothing but "a certain fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation."
Nebuchadnezzar, the king of mighty Babylon, sent his army against the city, and appeared upon the scene in person. Jehoiachin saw that resistance was hopeless, and to save his nation from needlessly being butchered by the Babylonians, he and the other members of the royal house marched outside the city in procession and voluntarily surrendered.

His surrender did save the nation from slaughter, but it could not save the city from being ransacked and plundered, nor its inhabitants from captivity. Nebuchadnezzar proceeded to "kill two birds with one stone" to once and for all impoverish and weaken Judah, and to strengthen his own kingdom. The wealth and sacred vessels of the temple were removed to the treasuries of Babylon. The King and the royal family and at least ten thousand of the inhabitants of Judah, the noblest, wealthiest, bravest, and most skilled, were torn from their homes and led to Babylon where, according to Nebuchadnezzar's purpose, they should contribute to the enrichment and strengthening of his kingdom. A remnant consisting of "the poorest of the people," were left behind to till the land. Thus was Jerusalem denuded of more than half her population and left to "sit solitary" and to weep "sore in the night." See Lam. 1:1-22.
Jehoiachin obtains mercy. 2 Kings 25:27-30. For thirty-six years Jehoiachin languished in the darkness of a prison cell. Then he experienced a happy change of circumstances. Evil-Merodach, who succeeded Nebuchadnezzar, had compassion on the miserable captive. Jehoiachin passed from the gloom of a dungeon to a throne, from prison food and prison dress to royal banquets and apparel fitting his rank, from the depths of misery to happiness, dignity, and honor. In releasing Jehoiachin, God indicated to his chastened people that for them, too, there was a place of repentance, a day of grace, a restoration to favor. The years of captivity were brightened by the prospect of restoration to their native land according to the prophesies of Isaiah and Daniel.

Negotiations long under way have brought reality to a plan for the settlement of five hundred Jewish refugee families in the Dominican Republic in South America, reports News Sheet.

THE GOSPEL IN ABYSSINIA
Two Waldensian pastors, recognized by the Italian Government, are working in Addis Ababa, reports Alliance Weekly. Four weekly services are held, and a small school and dispensary are carried on. In six centers where native believers have continued the work since the missionaries were driven out, from 1,000 to 1,600 people are hearing the gospel every Sunday.

THE HARVEST IS PLENTEOUS
From Herald of Holiness we learn that thousands of people in the Portuguese Cape Verde Islands off the coast of Africa are turning from Catholicism, though they have never heard the gospel. If there is no one there to lead them to Christ, these 200,000 people will drift into atheism. This paper tells how badly missionaries are needed there. "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few."

## THE SURPLUS OF WOMEN

Says the New York World-Telegram: "American women are growing healthier than the men, and their superiority is so great that in every decade of life, from cradle to old age, fewer females die than males. A clear-cut surplus of women is in prospect as a result of this trend, figures published by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company indicate. The women were ahead at the start of the century and have improved their position ever since." The Bible predicts a great preponderance of women over men in the last days. Isaiah 4:1.

GROWTH OF CATHOLICISM IN U. S. A
According to Revelation, the Roman Catholic yearbook of 1940 claims a total Catholic population for the United States, Alaska, and the Hawaiian Islands of $21,403,136$, including babies. There are 33,912 priests at work, plus 17,087 student priests in 202 seminaries. Roman Catholic high schools and colleges have 480,483 enrolled while $2,108,892$ additional pupils are studying in parochial schools. The priests report 73,677 conversions to the Roman Church in the year 1939, the largest number ever recorded.

GOOD SAMARITANS IN CHINA
Tertullian said: "When the pagans deserted their nearest relatives in a plague, Christians ministered to the sick and dying; when the pagans left their dead unburied after a battle, and cast their wounded into the streets, the Christians hastened to relieve the suffering." So Madame Chiang Kai-Shek wrote recently: "The Generalissimo and I feel that no words we could speak could sufficiently express our debt of gratitude to the missionary body all over China who have been a help to the distressed and the best of friends to hundreds of thousands of refugees."

## RUSSIAN BIBLES

A vigorous effort was made by the Christians of Scandinavia to spread the gospel among the Russian soldiers who invaded Finland, and especially among the Russian prisoners, says the London Christian. A fund was created and some who had no money to give contributed their wedding rings and other precious possessions. But how could Bibles in the Russian language be secured? Importation of them had been stopped for many years. However, a supply of Russian Bibles was unexpectedly discovered in a publishers' stockroom in Helsinki. Also an English firm still had standing the type for a Russian Bible and so a new edition was published and sent to Finland for use among the prisoners.

A REMARKABLE LEPER CHURCH
The faithful witness and consistent lives of Christian lepers have become generally known. But the zeal of the Christian inmates of the Leper Home at Fusan, for the propagation of the Gospel that has meant so much for them, is surely remarkable. This Home was the first institution established by the Mission to Lepers in Korea, and has for some years been sheltering 500 of these needy sufferers. In their earnest desire to spread the Gospel among their own people, they decided, about three years ago, entirely on their own initiative, that they would support an evangelist. Out of their scanty allowance of about a farthing (half a cent) a day for buying tit-bits to go with their rice and vegetables, they have managed to raise the necessary $\$ 15.00$ a month for his salary. They correspond with him regularly and uphold him with earnest prayer.

WORK AMONG COLORED PEOPLE
Thirty-four years ago when the fire fell at Azusa Street in Los Angeles, many colored saints were filled with the Spirit. A number of these are still holding high the Pentecostal banner. Among these are Brother and Sister Cotton who have a mission known as Azusa Pentecostal Temple, at East 27 th and Paloma Streets, Los Angeles, Calif.
Mother Cotton writes us: "We have read the item on page 11 of the Evangel of May 18, on 'Negroes and Communism.' I am more convinced than ever that my people have been neglected by the Pentecostal saints, knowing what inroads Father Divine is making among them. Our mission is to evangelize the Negroes, and we appeal most earnestly to the people of God everywhere to help us with their prayers that we may lead many of them to Christ. We need help to combat the inroads these Moscow-trained atheist Negroes are attempting to make among our people."

A REVOLUTIONARY WAR
Alfred Rosenberg, the Nazi party philosopher, declares that "the war which began before all the world on May 10 is the greatest of revolutionary wars. An outworn era is crumbling to dust beneath the marching feet of the German army." The editor of The New York Times writes that this revolution is not directed against the plutocracies, the tyranny of gold, free world trade, capitalism, or even merely against democracy and liberty. "What its supporters hate and despise and seek to destroy is nothing less than civilization itself." It is what Rauschning calls "a revolution of nihilism." The Nazis' aim is to destroy the civilization that is based on Christianity and set up a new social order based upon a creed of paganism.

## WHAT IS COMMUNISM?

Communism is a studied revolt from the Jehovah of both the Old Testament and the New, both the God of creation of unevangelized Gentiles and the same God revealed in the Christ of Christendom. Karl Marx, the fountain of modern Communism, sprang from a long succession of learned Rabbis; and Liebnecht, descended from an influential Lutheran clergyman, is said to have had Luther's blood in his veins. Stalin, the foremost Communist of the world, studied for years in the Theological Seminary in Tiflis, from which he was expelled. In Trotsky's excommunication in the synagogue, during which his mother fainted, his father charged him as "a proved enemy of Judaism and a curse to humanity: I want him expelled from the community of Jews, damned and cursed beyond redemption in earth, heaven, and hell." Trotsky retorted later: "If you refer to the Jewish religion, I have none. Religion is to me merely opium for the intellect. As to my origin, I cannot help being born a Jew, but I hate and despise all of my race and they know it, since they have cursed me in their synagogue." Years ago a Christian worker in New York prevailed on Lenin, then a refugee, to go with him to a church, but on reaching the threshold Lenin turned and said: "No. I will not go in. I will build the new Russia without your Christ."
