Marning of Judgment and a Revelation of Mercy

ESS than a century ago Charles Dickens wrote his "Tale of Two Cities"—London and Paris. But

twenty-five centuries previous Isaiah was given his Song of Two Cities—Babylon and Zion. His song of Babylon is somewhat of a doleful dirge. His hymn of Zion, however, is a hallelujah chorus.

The 13th chapter of Isaiah starts with the words, "The burden of Babylon," or as Leeser translates this, "The doom of Babylon." The prophet gives us a peep behind the scene and we see the proud spirit that animates the city, that evil spirit that inspired Nebuchadnezzar when he uttered his boast, "Is not this great Babylon, that I have built for the house of the kingdom by the might of my power, and for the honor of my majesty?"


Listen to God's indictment of one displaying this haughty spirit, "How art thou fallen from heaven, O Lucifer, son of the morning! how art thou cut down to the ground, which didst weaken the nations! For thou hadst said in thine heart, I will ascend into heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God: I will sit also upon the mount of the congregation, in the sides of the north: I will ascend above the heights of the clouds; I will be like the most High. Yet thou shalt be brought down to hell, to the sides of the pit.' Isa. 14:12-15.

But now let us look at the scope and compass of this dirge of doom. It goes far beyond that of a single city or of a single empire. The Spirit of God says, "I will punish the *world* for their evil, and the wicked for their iniquity; and I will cause the arrogancy of the proud to cease, and will lay low the haughtiness of the terrible." Isa. 13:11.

We learn also from Isa. 14:26 that the whole world is a Babylon. In telling of the doom of the city, the Spirit of God says: "This is the purpose that is purposed upon the whole earth: and this is the hand that is stretched out upon all the nations." Isa. 14:26, 27.

Daniel's words to Belshazzar on

the night of Babylon's fall are for all who have ears to hear. The prophet reminded the king of the humiliation that came to

When the Jews were carried away into captivity in Babylon they were continually taunted: "Bel is victor over Jehovah." This is reflected in Psalm 42:3, where the exiled captive says: "My tears have been my meat day and night, while they continually say unto me, Where is thy God?"

But the captives learned to pray: "O send out Thy light and Thy truth: let them lead me; let them bring me unto Thy holy hill, and to Thy tabernacles." Psalm 43:3.

The Babylonian captivity did not last forever. Babylon was overthrown, and under Cyrus the remnant returned. Hear their song of praise: "When the Lord turned again the captivity of Zion, we were like them that dream. Then was our mouth filled with laughter, and our tongue with singing: then said they among the heathen, The Lord hath done great things for them. The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad." Psalm 126:1-3.

Nebuchadnezzar when his heart was lifted up. He was given seven years of abasement until he knew that the Most High rules

in the kingdom of men, and that He appoints over it whomsoever He will. Daniel then said to Belshazzar, "And thou his son, O Belshazzar, hast not humbled thine heart, though thou knewest all this; but hast lifted up thyself against the Lord of heaven . . . and the God in whose hand thy breath is, and whose are all thy ways, hast thou not glorified . . . God hath numbered thy kingdom, and finished it . . . thou art weighed in the balances, and art found wanting." Dan. 5:22, 23, 26, 27.

As surely as Belshazzar's kingdom came to an end, so surely there will come the termination of the dominion of every earthly potentate, and all the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdoms of our God. He will appoint over them whom He will. And we know that the one whom He will appoint will be none other than the One to whom the guileless Nathanael said, "Thou art the Son of God; Thou art the King of Israel." John 1:49.

The purpose of God upon the whole earth is shown further in Isa. 23:9, "The Lord of hosts hath purposed it, to stain the pride of all glory, and to bring into contempt all the honorable of the earth." Speaking prophetically Isaiah says, "Behold, the Lord maketh the earth empty, and maketh it waste, and turneth it upside down, and scattereth abroad the inhabitants thereof." Isa. 24:1. "The earth shall reel to and fro like a drunkard, and shall be removed like a cottage; and the transgression thereof shall be heavy upon it; and it shall fall, and not rise again . . . Then the moon shall be confounded, and the sun ashamed, when the Lord of hosts shall reign in mount Zion, and in Jerusalem, and before His ancients gloriously." Isa. 24:20-23. Dr. Duke's Testimony to Divine Healing

Dr. Yeomans is now back in her home at Manhattan Beach, Calif., and word comes to us that "she is standing on the Word of God for healing, but she urgently needs all your prayers (Acts 12:5 and James 5:16)." Let every Evangel reader pray for our sister.

we quote one more word from her coworker, Miss Tanis Miller's letter: "When she was so ill in St. Paul, and had been worrying so much over the war and reading all the war news, the Lord told her to stop all her worry, that He was going to win the war. (Read Rev. 19:11-16.) She has not heard or read or even wanted to hear anything about the war since June 4th."

HE ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ was largely teaching. He went about teaching the great truths of redemption, about man's lost estate, and about God's glorious provision for mankind.

The one great reason I have been led to emphasize the truth regarding the Lord for the body, is that it has not only been shamefully neglected but absolutely rejected. Scores jeer and point the finger of scorn at those who pray for the sick. They are accused of all sorts of sordid motives.

My text is from Col. 4:14-just one clause: "Luke, the beloved physician, . . . greets you." Luke was a physician, undoubtedly a competent one. I am sure if they needed a doctor in those days they could not have got a better one than Dr. Luke. He shows superior educational advantages by the character of his writing and the purity of his Greek. He is the author of the Acts of the Apostles as well as of the Gospel that bears his name.

In writing his Gospel he makes it plain that he had consulted documents and compared statements of living witnesses. You see that in the first chapter of Luke's Gospel. "Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us, even as they delivered them unto us, which from the beginning were eyewitnesses, and ministers of the word; it seemed good to me also, having had perfect understanding of all things from the very first, to write unto thee in order, most excellent Theophilus, that thou mightest know the certainity of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed."

"Seeing that many have attempted to draw up a narrative of the events,"-that is Weymouth's rendering, which might imply that such papers were not altogether satisfactory. There is a peculiar independence about Luke's Gospel. It contains additional matter not mentioned in the other Gospels. There is greater accuracy in preserving the chronological order of events. in view of the scientific training and professional background of Luke, it is not surprising that of the three synoptic Gospels, Luke's is the one which deals most fully and minutely with the Lord's miracles of healing. It is in fact the only Gospel in which the following outstanding miracles are related: the raising of the widow's son (Luke 7:11-17); the deliverance of the woman who had been bound by a spirit of infirmity for eighteen years (Luke 13:1117), and the group healing of the ten lepers. Luke 17:11-19.

As a part of the training of a physician, Luke had minutely observed the miracles and recorded all the significant statements and details regarding the healings. He frequently gives us details regarding healings in the ministry of the Lord Jesus which the other synoptic Gospels omit, showing that he had personally investigated the evidence in these cases with a view of securing perfect accuracy. Here are a few instances: The healing of the leper. Luke 5:12-14; Matt. 8:2; Mark 1:40-44. Luke alone states that he was "full of leprosy"-that it was a case in the last stages of the disease. Weymouth gives it "covered with leprosy." The man with the withered hand. Luke 6:6-8; Matt. 12:10-13; Mark 3:1-5. It is only in the Gospel of the beloved physician that it tells that it was the man's right hand. You can see the physician's eye there. It makes a world of difference sometimes whether it is the right hand or the left. Trust the trained eye of Luke to note that detail. Luke also tells us that the centurion's servant (Luke 7:2-10) was at the point of death. All three of the synoptic Gospels give the case of the woman with the issue of blood, but it is from Luke only we learn she was incurable. He plainly states that.

Also it would seem that Luke had not lost his sense of what befitted him as an educated and ethical member of the honorable profession of Medicine, because while Mark bluntly stated that "she had suffered many things of many physicians, and was nothing bettered, but rather grew worse," we find no such statement in Luke's Gospel though he does say she had spent all she had on them. That would have been unprofessional. When people come to me and tell me a lot of terrible things about doctors, I take it with a grain of salt. Then they say, "Oh,



dog won't bite dog!" But dogs will bite dogs. Luke had no such comment to make.

In chapter 22, Luke tells us that it was the right ear of the servant of the high priest that was cut off. The same principle applies to the ear, in some measure, as to the hand. John corroborates the statement that it was the right ear that Peter cut off. John 18:10. The other writers fail to say which ear it was.

Luke's critical and minute investigation of the miracles of our Lord led to his unreserved acceptance of their genuineness and authenticity. Isn't that wonderful! You always find that those who doubt God's Word are those who do not read it. If they would read the Word, it is so supernatural that they would experience its mighty power to create faith in God. "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word

The Lord was cautioning me this morning about teaching Divine Healing, telling me about our failure to get the results that they had in the early days. I thank God for the results God is giving and for the way He is honoring His Word. But He seemed to say to me that we do not lay the foundation strong and immovable by teaching. I could almost say that most people's eyes stick out like a lobster's when you begin to talk to them in this way. They do not know Divine Healing is in the Bible. It behooves us to earnestly contend for the faith once delivered unto the saints, and not give them a mutilated gospel. It certainly behooves us to teach the Word-to know it ourselves, and to teach it to the people, so that faith may be created in them to grasp the promises of God.

This morning, as I was meditating, I thought about a man who has been dead a long while, John Alexander Dowie. I came in contact with him when I knew almost nothing about Divine Healing. I was never a member of his church. I could not endorse him fully, but I agree with Brother Wigglesworth when he says that undoubtedly Dr. Dowie had a marvelous conception of the gospel of healing, and the will of God and the promises of God in connection with our bodies. I was sufficiently in contact with him to observe his methods. And I can say this, that never before in my life had I seen the Word of God so poured into people-just the Word of God-as he poured it in. He had a huge hotel leased, and he had people there from all parts of the world. Each morning they repaired to the prayer room. It had been a huge barn, but he had had it gorgeously decorated. He had all kinds of decorations. He had the walls all upholstered and luxurious, comfortable seats, and what a crowd of people he had.

I went there in great darkness myself. I looked around and said, "My, this is a terrible assembly! Some of these people need a 'shot' about every fifteen minutes to keep them from dying on the spot." That's the way they looked to me. I saw others who were undernourished, and others who were anemic. They had to be carefully dieted and given food at frequent intervals. I said, "What nurses have you?" They said "None." I said, "This is a mix-up!"

I saw a man on a stretcher, others on beds, others leaning against some person. And what do you think he did? When I was there—I was not there very long, but I can testify that he just gave them the Word, and I can testify that I have been there when he read it to them for three hours consecutively. No stopping for refreshments. That is what we need. Three hours were as nothing there. He read the Gospels until he could read them without the book. He said he always followed that method. And I believe it is a method we ought to follow under the unction of the Holy Ghost.

I believe if we would be true to the Word we should get healings that would absolutely convince the ungodly against their will of the reality of the power of God. I want that we should be able to make God real and Christ real, through this mighty Baptism.

I do not think Dowie professed having the Baptism. He certainly had something however. He had marvelous healings. One case of cancer of the mouth. A girl about 13 years old had a soft cancer in the mouth, awfully malignant, and the doctors said it was impossible to operate on her as she would bleed to death. As Dr. Dowie went to see her, the Lord gave him that scripture, "I kill, and I make alive." And he prayed, "O Lord, kill the cancer and heal the child." And that child lived. I was speaking about her some time ago, and a lady who knew her said she had been completely healed. She took up commercial art, I think it was. That healing was the result of giving heed to God's Word. We must have the Word of God.

Now Luke gives us something about the method of the Lord's healing. In Luke 5: 17-18, in connection with the healing of the man taken with palsy, he states that "the power of the Lord was present to heal." In Luke 6:19 we find that the whole crowd wanted to touch Him because power went forth, and healed them all, cured every one. In Acts 10:38 we read: "How God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power: who went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil; for God was with him."

The healing brought by the Lord Jesus Christ was part of the immutable counsel and unchanging purpose of God. God has never changed. He made man very good, and He has never changed. He wants you "very good"—in spirit and soul and body. It is better to be fully alive than half dead, isn't it? "Whatsoever God doeth, it shall be for ever: nothing can be put to it, nor any thing taken from it." Eccles. 3:14.

I always get a good laugh when I think of Luke. If you had been educated a doctor you would realize how funny it is. It also shows what kind of divine health Paul had. Acts 20:6: "And we sailed away from Philippi after the days of unleavened bread, and came unto them to Troas in five days; where we abode seven days. And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached

unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight. And there were many lights in the upper chamber, where they were gathered together. And there sat in a window a certain young man named Eutychus, being fallen into a deep sleep: and as Paul was long preaching, he sunk down with sleep, and fell down from the third loft, and was taken up dead." Now here is the physician's certificate of death. The first thing people do when an accident occurs is to call a physician and if he says the victim is dead he is legally dead. They have to have a physician. That is what Luke was. He said "he was taken up dead." Then Paul went down. "And fell on him, and embracing him said, Trouble not yourselves; for his life is in him. When he therefore was come up again, and had broken bread, and eaten, and talked a long while, even till break of day, so he departed. And they brought the young man alive, and were not a little comforted. And we went before to ship, and sailed to Assos, there intending to take in Paul: for



so had he appointed minding himself to go afoot." How many miles did he walk? This happened in Troas, and he walked twenty miles—just a little constitutional. Now don't you think it is about time that we took what God has provided for us? How do you think the Lord must feel when He sees some of us today? You say, "Jesus is my physician." Jesus was Paul's physician, and see what Paul did! And he enjoyed every minute of it.

August 11, Missionary Day in the Sunday School

Would you like to hear a true story about a Chinese boy who lived in the Philippine Islands? He had been saving his pennies for weeks and months to buy a bicycle. When he had almost enough money saved up, he heard that his countrymen back in China were suffering from a terrible famine. He felt he must do something for them right away so he took his hard-earned money and bought bread—loaves and loaves of it. Then he took the bread to the Chinese Women's Relief Organization with the request, "Please mail these to China for the hungry people there." A strange request, but here is the sequel:

The women took that bread and auctioned it in little pieces to people who gladly bought when they heard the story of the boy's gift. When the loaves were sold, they were able to send to China for the relief of sufferers an amount equal to one hundred and fifteen times the boy's original investment!

"Did the boy ever get a bicycle?" you ask. Yes, he did, for one of the first people who learned about the lad wrote a check and sent it to him. Nor does the story end here. That

same boy is now renting his bicycle to eager friends, and every penny he receives for it is turned over to the relief of his countrymen.

That Chinese boy was stirred by the call of physical sufferers. A great appeal comes to us—the call of millions, not only in China, but also in all parts of the world—souls lost and dying, without hope and without Christ. Perhaps you have not much to offer. A penny is a very little thing, but because that little Chinese boy saved his pennies, he was the means of bringing help to many sufferers. Little is much if God is in it. If you are willing to do your part bring your gift to Jesus, He will bless it and break it and use it to the feeding of the multitudes—even unto the ends of the earth.

The Swede "Sandwich Man"

Some years ago Dr. Nathan, a missionary in Morocco, was in this country on a brief furlough. In one of his addresses he told of a young Swede converted in one of Mr. Moody's meetings in Chicago. After his conversion the Swede came to Mr. Moody to know what he could do for Jesus. Mr. Moody looked over this awkward and illiterate young man and said, "How would you like to be a sandwich?"

"Anything for Jesus," he replied, not knowing what it meant.

It was arranged that he should report the next day for duty. He came at the appointed hour, and they placed two boards, strapped together across his shoulders. On one board was printed John 3:16 in full and on the other a notice of the meetings then being held.

"Now," said Mr. Moody, "walk up and down the streets for Jesus and advertise the meetings." The Swede went off smiling, happy that he could do something for the One who had saved him.

As he walked down the street, the boys throwing stones and mud at the board, a traveling man stopped to read the sign and watch the man. The result was the traveling man attended the meeting that night and was converted.

This traveling man had a splendid voice and after his conversion he made it a rule to sing in the missions of the cities he visited. One night he was in the Bowery Mission in New York when a young Jew came in and took a seat in the audience. When the Jew heard them singing about Jesus, he started for the door, but the traveling man was there to meet him. He took him into an adjoining room and spoke to him about his Messiah and Saviour. The result was that the Jew accepted Christ and found salvation.

In closing his address, Dr. Nathan said: "The young Swede lies in an unknown grave in Chicago; the traveling man, too, has gone to his reward; but I am that Jew, and am now a missionary in Africa, winning souls for Jesus. When we all stand before the Lord to receive our rewards according to our service, shall I receive all the reward for the souls won in Africa? How about the Swede who did what he could for Christ? And the traveling man?"

The Steadfast Gaze of Faith

In 2 Cor. 4:17, 18, we are told that "our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory; while we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen." It is impossible to walk by faith if we look at natural circumstances and judge of God's faithfulness by what we see. We must gaze steadfastly at the things not seen, the things which we know are true because God says so—the eternal verities in the Heavens.

As we do this, three things become true in our experience:—first, our affliction, which may have seemed a very heavy and grievous one, becomes a "light affliction" as viewed from the standpoint of faith. Second, in the light of God's promises and His speedy deliverance, it is not for a lifetime, or for many years, but only "for a moment;" and third, our trial or affliction worketh for us "a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory" in our present, earthly experience if we keep our gaze steadfast upon the things not seen.

In Heb. 2:8, 9, we have the vision of faith clearly defined, what it does not see, and what it does see. "Thou hast put all things in subjection under His feet . . . But now we see not yet all things put under Him. But we see Jesus . . . crowned with glory and honor."

While the actual fact is stated that God hath put all things in subjection under Christ's feet, yet at present this is far from being manifest. The enemy apparently is far from being subdued, and is working great havoc in the world and in individual lives. Therefore "we see not yet all things put under Him." We do not look at the things themselves for proof that they are put under His feet, but we look at the reigning Christ Himself. "But we see Jesus . . . crowned."

We must not merely see Jesus as the God-man, as the suffering Saviour, as the resurrected Lord. All this we must see, but more, we must see Him by faith as the reigning One. For He must reign, till He hath put all enemies under His feet." 1 Cor. 15:26. It is as Christ reigns and exercises His kingly power that His enemies fall before Him, and it is as you and I see Him crowned in our own individual lives that He will subdue all unto Himself.

The language of faith will be on this wise: "I cannot see, Lord Jesus, that all things are under Thy feet, but by faith I believe they are put under Thee, because God has said so. I therefore see Thee crowned King, not only in Heaven, but in all my life absolute Conqueror over my whole nature and all my circumstances. Thus shalt Thou subdue sin, sickness and difficulties in my life. I refuse to believe what I see in the natural, and stand upon Thy Word, for 'Thou hast put all things in subjection under His feet.'"

Surely this attitude brings the exceeding weight of glory, even before our victorious faith has been manifested in sight. This attitude of faith glorifies Jesus and therefore He can glorify us with His own glory. Oh, if we would yield up all selfishness, and desire in our prayers first of all to make God true, though every man thereby seem a liar, and to glorify Christ by acknowledging His true position as the all-conquering One, what victories He could work out in our lives.

Blessed Lord, by faith we see Thee crowned, and by faith we see Thee reigning within us, and thus shalt Thou utterly possess us, spirit, soul and body, and reign till Thou hast put all things under Thy feet.

sung:... We have a strong city." Isa. 26:1. This is the city for which those tent dwellers Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob looked, the city that hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God. "God is not ashamed to be called their God: for He hath prepared for them a city." Heb. 11:16. This city although not seen by men of earth is very real and actual to those who have faith. They thoroughly understand those words in Heb. 12:22-24: "But ye are come unto mount Zion, and unto the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem ... and to God the Judge of all ... and to Jesus the mediator of the new covenant."

What sort of people are going to live in this city? We hear this refrain in the song, "Open ye the gates, let the nation enter that keeps righteousness, and keeps truth, supporting truth, and keeping peace: for on Thee, O Lord, they have trusted with confidence for ever, the great, the eternal God." Isa. 26:2, 3. Septuagint version. It is only the redeemed that compose this holy nation. They have been obedient to the word, "Look unto Me, and be ye saved, all the ends of


the earth." Isa. 45:22. They have looked to the Lamb of Calvary, and have washed away their sins in His precious blood. The Lamb of God has imparted to them His own righteousness. They have trusted in Him and He has led them through the gates into the city where He abides. It is the old story of John 1:37-39 repeated. The disciples followed Jesus and He turned and said, "What seek ye?" and they said, "Rabbi, where dwellest Thou?" and He said, "Come and see." And they came and saw, and abode with Him that day. And all through that day that will never end (for there is to be no night in the day of the Lord), those who have followed Jesus are to dwell with Him in the city of Zion.

Contrast the meek and lowly spirit of the Lamb whose presence animates Zion, with that of the proud spirit that dominates Babylon: "Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: but made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: and being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." Phil. 2: 6-8. He made Himself lower than the lowest. We hear Him speaking in that song of sobs, the 22nd Psalm, "I am a worm, and no man."

The proud spirit of Lucifer is to be cast down to the burning hell, but of the lowly Lamb we read: "Wherefore God also hath highly exalted Him, and given Him a name which is above every name." Phil. 2:9. The apostle says to the saints, "In lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves. . . . Let this mind (this nature, this disposition) be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." "If any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of His." The saint needs to be filled with the Spirit of Him who took a towel and girded Himself to do the menial task of the lowest slave.

Some may ask, "Since chapters 13 and 14 of Isaiah teach that the whole world is a Babylon, and we are living in the world which is a Babylon, how can we escape its judgment?" It is possible to live in Babylon as did Daniel and his companions, and be as separate from its corruption and its idolatries as they were. Jeremiah showed that the Babylonian captivity was only to last for seventy years, and the Psalmist tells us that the days of our years are threescore years and ten-just seventy years, or perhaps a few more or a few less. And that is only a little while compared with the countless years of eternity that the saint will live in the heavenly Zion.

Throughout his seventy years' sojourn in Babylon Daniel had his windows open towards Jerusalem continually. And as the time for the ending of the captivity drew near we find him pouring over the prophecies of Jeremiah and praying to God that wonderful petition of penitence given in the 9th chapter of the book to which his name is given. As we pore over the Scripture and see its prophecies of wars and rumors of war, earthquakes, famines, and pestilences being fulfilled before our eyes, we know that the day of our redemption is drawing very near. Let us see therefore that Daniel's attitude of watchfulness and prayerfulness is ours.

When John was given the vision of Babylon he heard a voice from heaven saying, "Come out of her, My people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues." Rev. 18:4. Doubtless the moment will come in earth's history when this voice will be heard by all the saints: but it is recorded for us now, for us to be separate now from Babylon's evils.

Our Master made petition for His disciples, "I pray not that Thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that Thou shouldest keep them from the evil. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. Sanctify them through Thy truth: Thy word is truth." John 17:15-17. It was a prayer for His disciples that they might be kept holy by means of the holy Word, for a place in that Holy City. We need alike the holy Word, the holy Blood of cleansing, and the Holy Spirit that we may be wholly sanctified. For only the holy and undefiled will have a place in the Holy City.

Daniel saw in a vision the end of earthly empires. He saw the thrones of earth thrown down. But there is one throne that will never be overthrown. Upon this throne the prophet saw the Ancient of days sitting. "And, behold, one like the Son of man came with the clouds of heaven, and came to the Ancient of days, and they brought Him near before Him. And there was given Him dominion, and glory, and a kingdom, that all people, nations, and languages should serve Him: His dominion is an everlasting dominion which shall not pass away, and His kingdom that which shall not be destroyed." Dan. 7:13, 14.

There are just two cities—Babylon and Zion. Many are promenading Babylon's brilliant Broadway. But destruction is coming to Babylon; and death and the pit will be the portion of all her citizens.

The highway of Zion is narrow and only a few are going that way, but these pilgrims are full of joy in the knowledge that eternal peace and eternal blessedness are to be theirs forever in the eternal kingdom of Zion's Prince.—S. H. F.

He shall not get into a panic, neither fetching fears from his yesterdays nor from his tomorrows. Concerning his yesterdays, faith says, "Thou hast beset me behind." Concerning his tomorrows, faith says, "Thou hast beset me before." Concerning his todays, faith says, "Thou hast laid Thine hand upon me." That is enough, just to feel the pressure of His guiding hand.—J. H. Jowett.

He who will not hear must feel. "God speaketh once, yea twice, yet man perceiveth it not. . . . He is chastened also with pain upon his bed . . . Then . . . he shall pray to God." Job 33:14-26.

Souls are like babies—they are born, but they must grow. If they do not grow, they die! Both in the natural and the Christian life, it is not enough to be born: we must "grow up" into the full self-conscious state of adult life. Is there anything so pathetic as the little undeveloped brain and body of a stunted child? Yes, there is—the type of Christian who says that he is "born again," and yet remains undeveloped and unexercised in full Christian vigor.

Scientists tell us of what they call "arrested development"—plants and animals that have come up to a certain level of life and have stuck! Sometimes I wonder if the church is not similarly cursed. "I have made the great choice," says someone. Praise God—but is that enough? Christianity is a growth, a development, a way of life, a long road of attainment that never stops until we meet God. Perhaps it does not stop even then. For whatever heaven is, it is certainly a state of being where we shall be faced with infinite knowledge!

I am amazed at the numbers of people who think they can "grow good by chance." We cannot grow anything by chance—not even a cabbage! We certainly cannot grow strong and athletic by chance. Every athlete will bear testimony to the fact that fitness and power need constant exercise, dieting, discipline, and courses of training.

As certainly we cannot grow learned by chance. Some students think they can—but their teachers think otherwise! To acquire mental power or culture of any kind a student must spend laborious days, and tie himself with the strings of discipline to his study chair. Even genius is a halting thing unless it has the passion of the student to drive it on.

Yet there are people who fondly imagine that they may grow either good or Christian by chance—anyhow! They make the great choice for the kingdom, and then lie back arm-chair Christians. The two things cannot go together, for they are really a contradiction in terms. I am quite certain that this "failure to grow" is the source of most of our moral and spiritual backsliding. "Ye did run well: who did hinder you?"

"Grow in grace and in the knowledge



of God." I suggest two simple needed ways possible for all.

(1) There must be some ordered study of the sources of our faith. Do we know the New Testament, for instance? This is where Jesus and His truth are enshrined. If our faith is to be informed and deep, we must know our Gospels and Epistles. A chance hearing of a sermon and an occasional glance at the Bible are not sufficient for a "growing" soul.

(2) There must be prayer; not only "devotions," but the atmosphere of prayer. If you can only utter broken ejaculations, what could be better? On a starry night look up and say, "O God, how good Thou art!" Or as you walk the streets and are tempted, cry, "Lord, keep me strong and clean." This is prayer—the best of it, its constant atmosphere. All the great prayers of the Bible are like this—a cry of the heart for God.

Thus by study and communion let us deepen our life in grace and knowledge. The church lives on an informed people. Sin and disease fasten on babies!

"Pray Without Ceasing"

A friend once asked General "Stone-wall" Jackson, says a writer in Revelation, what was his understanding of the Bible command to "Pray without ceasing." can give you my idea of it by illustration," he answered, "if you will allow it and not think I am setting myself up as a model for others. I have so fixed the habit in my own mind that I never raise a glass of water to my lips without lifting my heart to God in thanks and prayer for the water of life. Then, when we take or meals, there is the grace. Whenever I drop a letter in the post office, I send a petition along with it for God's blessing upon its mission and the person to whom it is sent. When I go to my classroom and await the arrangement of the cadets in their places, that is my time to intercede with God for them. And so in every act of the day I have made the practice habitual."

SUNDAY SCHOOL LES

Trusting God in a Hard Place

Lesson for August 11. Lesson Text: Psalms 3 and 4

"There came a messenger to David, saying, The hearts of the men of Israel are after Absalom." And in the dead of night the brokenhearted king, accompanied by a few faithful subjects, fled from his palace and crossed the brook Kedron to hide himself from the murderous intent of his own son. What calamitous circumstances! Yea, verily. But in the midst of them David composed Psalms 3 and 4, morning and evening psalms, which express his faith and confidence in

DAVID'S MORNING SONG

His cry of distress. "Lord, how are they increased that trouble me! many are they that rise up against me." Is it not true to experience that man's first thoughts upon waking, are those troubles which beset him before he went to sleep?

David here complains of the increasing number of his enemies (see 2 Sam. 15:12). Absalom is against him. Ahithophel has turned traitor. David's troubles are overwhelming!

"Many there be which say of my soul, There is no help for him in God. And there had been enough sin in David's life to cause this subtle suggestion to cut his heart like a knife. Shimei's words (2 Sam. 16:8), like those of Job's comforters, imply that God is punishing David for his sin, and that therefore God has forsaken him. Can we not sympathize with David? For surely, it is the most bitter of all afflictions to be led to fear that we are beyond God's help.

His profession of faith. Verse 3. By an effort of will David turns from consideration of his enemies and looks away to Jehovah. No matter how trying the circumstances, man always has the power to choose as to what shall be the object of his spiritual sight and thought. Everything seems to be against David, but he sees Jehovah (1) as His shield to ward off the fiery darts of Satan from beneath, and the storms of trial and danger from above; (2) as his "glory," that is, as the One in whom he delights; and (3) as the One who shall lift up his head in honor and cause him to triumph over his enemies. 2 Cor. 2:14.

And how is he able to speak with such confidence? Verse 4 tells us! Past experience has taught David that as often as he cries to Jehovah he is heard. Maclaren points out that "the tenses in verse 4 express a habitual act and constant result. The normal relation between David and Jehovah is that of frank communion; and since it has long been so and is so now, even the pressure of present disaster does not make faith falter. It is hard to begin to trust when in the grip of calamity, but feet accustomed to the road to God can find it in the dark."

His act of faith. Verse 5. Faith and a good conscience can sleep in the mouth of a cannon. David had both and was able to sleep in the midst of his perilous predicament. Anxiety would have kept him awake all night. But like Christ who slept during a raging storm (Matt. 8:24), and like Peter sleeping an infant's sleep on the night of his proposed execution (Acts 12:6), so David slept-slept with his head pillowed on the bosom of El Shaddai, the Breasted One,-slept because he knew there was One watching over him who neither slumbered nor slept (Psalm 121), and then awakened in the morning in safety.

"This quietude of a man's heart by faith in God, is a higher sort of work than the natural resolution of manly courage, for it is the gracious operation of God's Holy Spirit upholding a man above nature.'

His fearlnessness. "I will not be afraid of ten thousands of people that have set themselves against me." David did not underestimate the strength of the enemy, for he reckoned them at tens of thmousands! But David knew that one man with God to back him is always in the majority (Rom. 8:31); he knew that the "race is not to the swift nor the battle to the strong" (Eccl. 9:11), that deliverance came not from physical might but by the Spirit of the Lord (Zech. 4:6), that greater was He that was in him than he that was in his enemies (1 John 4:4), that neither height nor depth nor princialities nor powers could separate him from God's love! Rom. 8:35-39.

In the strength derived from this knowledge,

PROTECTING THE SOUL I will not be afraid of ten thousands of people, that have set themselves against me. Psalm 3:6

> David prays for God to "arise" and intervene for him. Using the past tense he shows that he is anticipating victory on the ground of God's faithfulness in the past—"thou hast smitten all mine enemies." Verse 7.

> His testimony. "Salvation belongeth unto the Lord." David rejoices happily acknowledging that all deliverance, past, present, and future, in fact, all of salvation from its beginning to its yet unseen end is exclusively the work of God Himself.

> His gracious plea. The last part of verse 8 may be translated "Let Thy blessing be upon Great-hearted David! Thy people." Like a greater King who was yet to come, he prayed for God's blessing upon those who were gathered against him! Do we follow his example? DAVID'S EVENING SONG

> A fervent prayer. Verse 1. David expects an answer to his prayers because (1) he recognizes God as the source of his righteousness and claims no merit of his own; (2) he knows that the God who has delivered him in the past ("thou hast enlarged me when I was in distress"), will

deliver him in the future; (3) he appeals to God's mercy knowing that all of God's favors are granted through grace alone.

A pointed question. It is a good thing to speak much with God before speaking to man. David has prayed to God; now he addresses his enemies—"How long will ye turn my glory into shame?" By "my glory," David is probably referring to God who is his glory. Isa. 60:19. His enemies in rejecting him have rejected God and dishonored His name among the heathen. He asks them how long they will delight in empty ambitions and unholy words and deeds.

An assuring fact. Verse 3. David would have his enemies know that in fighting against him they were fighting against one whom God had set apart for Himself. For what purpose has God set apart the godly? (1) For fellowship with Himself. Song of S. 4:12. (2) For the ministry of intercession. Matt. 26:36-38. (3) For service. Acts 13:2; Rom. 1:1; Gal. 1:15, 16.

A solemn exhortation. David now gives wise advice to his enemies. "Stand in awe (or tremble) and sin not." Most people reverse the order. They sin and tremble not! How we need a fear and hatred of the very appearance of evil

in these days!

"Commune with your own heart upon your bed and be still!" We need this exhortation which was originally addressed to David's enemies! We live in an age of unprecedented speed, feverish activity and turmoil. Unless we continually draw aside from all this, and in the still hours of the night or early morning spend time in quietness before Him, allowing Him to speak to our hearts and fill us afresh with His Spirit, we shall be hustled out of vital relationship to Him, like Samson of old not knowing that the Lord has departed from us.

"Offer the sacrifices of righteousness and put your trust in the Lord." vid's people were putting their trust in Absalom and offering the worthless sacrifices of formality. To follow personalities rather than God is as vain and foolish as trying to render religious devotion without obedience to God!

A joyful testimony. Verses 6-8. Skeptics and pessimists say, "Who will show us any good?" One glimpse of the face of Jesus would answer their question (verse 6)! David declares that he is happier in having God without having anything else, than the wicked are in having prosperity and plenty without God (verse 7). Wrapped in the peace of God that passes all understanding, he lies down to sleep. Though surrounded by outward peril, he knows he will sleep soundly because

he reposes in the Everlasting Arms!-J. Bashford Bishop.

RELIGIOUS TRAMPS

One of the undesirable by-products of the modern free-and-easy, tabernacle type of Christianity is the amazing number of religious hoboes it has produced. Every city has its swarm of "independent" Christians who are proud of their freedom and who own allegiance to no recognized body of believers. They go wherever they are "led" to go, give whenever and wherever the notion strikes them, "panhandle" their spiritual food from meeting to meeting, now here, now there, like the wanderers they are. They soon degenerate into sermon tasters, who have heard every preacher in town, but have carried no burden, accepted no responsibility, rendered no directed service anywhere. Such lives are tragic in the extreme. They stand to lose terrifically at the judgment seat of Christ, for their efforts have lacked the unifying power of a life-purpose, and have for that reason been largely wasted .-- A. W. Tozer.

THE DYING WORLD AND LIVING WORD

AMERICA IN NEED

The Herald of Holiness magazine reports that fully one half of the people of America are unchurched, that 35,000,000 youths of America never attend a Sunday School, and that there are 150,000 communities in the United States without a church of any denomination. What a challenge to consecrated men and women!

"A CHURCH IN THE SOUL"

Stalin is realizing the ineffectiveness of mere force. He says: "It is easy to close churches in the Soviet Union; you have only to send to the Ogpu and they are shut. But then every peasant, man or woman, will build a church in the depths of his soul; and this is a greater danger, because such churches withdraw themselves from the control of the political police."

Some oppose the church because they think it is formal. But here is a man who is against Christianity because it is real!

WORSHIP TO STALIN

God has said: "Thou shalt have no other gods before Me," but Russia is putting Stalin before Him. The Moscow *Pravda* recently printed this:

O Great Stalin, O Leader of the Nations, Thou who makest man to be born, Thou who makest the earth fertile, Thou who makest the centuries young, Thou who makest the spring bloom, Thou who makest the chords ring out music, Thou who art the splendor of my spring, O Thou Sun, reflected by millions of hearts!

MEN'S HEARTS FAILING THEM

The American Medical Society, which recently held its 91st annual convention in New York City, reports that since May 10, when the Nazis invaded the Low Lands "there has been a marked increase in complaints of headaches of unexplained origin, insomnia, loss of appetite, highly disturbed mental states, melancholia, depression, apprehension, fears for the immediate future, uncertainty, a sense of insecurity, lack of ability to concentrate on one's work, foreboding." Many of the sufferers "seek help to regain their faith in themselves and in the future of civilization." One prominent physican said, "They feel that we stand at Armageddon." There is a remedy. "Have faith in God." Mark 11:22.

SPEAKING JAPANESE

The Elim Evangel reports a remarkable incident told by one of the Elim missionaries recently returned from the Far East on furlough. In their invasion of China the Japanese troops came to a mission station where there were a number of devout people, some of them rejoicing in the Pentecostal experience. The native Christians had barricaded themselves in their compound. There was a loud knocking on the gates as one of the Japanese officers sought immediate admission, calling upon them to open the door before they burst in. Eventually the door was burst open, and in rushed the Japanese soldiers, taking hold first of one of the company, a Chinese native evangelist. He was about to kill him when the man burst into an utterance in tongues in the power of the Spirit. The soldier stopped and after a moment or two said, "Why did you not tell me there were Japanese here?" He was told that there were no Japanese in the compound. He insisted that there were Japanese and said, that this man had told him in Japanese that if any harm were to happen to the compound or its inhabitants the judgment of God would fall upon him and his fellow soldiers. As a result of that incident, none of the believers in the compound were harmed, and shortly afterward a revival broke out among the Chinese in the district and many were brought to Christ.

"DE-BRUTALIZED"

General Goering told Sir Neville Henderson, Great Britain's last ambassador to Berlin, that the trouble with the British is that they have allowed themselves to become "de-brutalized." The Lord surely de-brutalizes the sinner when he comes to Him. He takes "the ravening wolf" out of the heart and gives instead the spirit of "the Lamb."

A PAGAN CONCEPTION OF GOD

A few weeks ago, reports *The Morning Star*, an English woman publicly said: "If the Allies lose the war I will no longer believe in God." Such a sentiment of course, reveals a pagan conception of God, and war does assist the paganizing of God in human thought. Is God only to receive our allegiance while He fulfills our wills? Is He a tribal God, who is pledged to maintain the interests of the particular nation in which we were born? Does our faith depend upon the course of history and the events of our day? In a day when he saw the nation he loved, and of which he was a part, crushed Jeremiah looked up and said: "The Lord is my portion."

THE HUMAN RACE DRIFTING

"France prays to Joan of Arc to save them," says a newspaper headline. Recently Premier Reynaud said in a speech, 'If a miracle is needed to save France, I believe in miracles, because I believe in France." Chicago's mayor recently said, "My religion is Roosevelt."

The human race is drifting from God. Men would rather believe in anything than in God. France prayed to Joan of Arc, but she sleeps on. Premier Reynaud believed in a degenerated France, but France has crumpled. Chicago's mayor may deify Roosevelt as god, but the President is but human. Paul in an hour of danger and distress showed us where his faith was rooted: "Sirs, I believe God." Let us do likewise.

QUESTIONS PANSWERS

Does "For I am married unto you" (Jer. 3:14), refer to present day backsliders? Is God married to the backslider?

When Jeremiah wrote, he had in mind Israel, whom God likens to a wife who had turned out to be a harlot, and for this cause had been put away. Jer. 3:1. The Lord shows that according to the law, such should not be taken back by her husband, but that God was willing to take Israel back, in spite of her spiritual harlotry, and that He considered Himself married unto her, even though she had so grievously sinned. The Scripture might be used today in an accommodative sense only. As for Israel, the nation has the promise of national restoration. Ezek. 37; Rom. 11.

Can a person become a new creature when baptized with water?

Since salvation is conditioned on repentance and faith, if a person has met these conditions, he might receive the assurance of salvation while being baptized. His becoming a new creature would not result from the water, however, but from his meeting Scriptural conditions.

Can one receive Baptism with the Holy Spirit when he accepts the gospel?

We believe so. It looks like this happened at the home of Cornelius. The Scriptures, however, show that in most instances the Baptism with the Spirit followed receiving the gospel. Acts 2:4; 8:14-17; 19:1-7; Eph. 1:13, 14.

THE CAUSE OF FRANCE'S DOWNFALL

Thirty years ago says Dr. Louis S. Bauman, France's Premier M. Briand, boasted: "We have driven Jesus Christ out of the army, the navy, the schools, the hospitals, the lunatic asylums, and the orphanages. We must now drive Him out of the State altogether." M. Briand may have succeeded in eliminating religion but he could not do away with the judgments of God. Today we have seen God's judgment falling upon this nation until it has crumbled.

JERUSALEM AND THE ITALIAN FLAG

The Catholic Church plans to share in the spoils of the Fascist victory, relates *The Times* of London. Recently this became a distinct possibility. Thirty Italian bishops sent a telegram to Il Duce urging him to crown "the unfailing victory of our Army" by planting the Italian flag over Jerusalem.

The Manchester Guardian reports that the Axis powers plan to turn Palestine over to the jurisdiction of the Vatican and transport Palestine's Jewish population to Ethiopia. Under the plan, said the Guardian, the Pope will care for the holy places in Palestine, and let Italy run the country.

ANTI-SEMITISM IN AMERICA

In a recent radio forum address Dr. Stanley High made some significant statements concerning those whose chief business is to stir up racial or religious hatred. He said:

"There are those who have built their foundations on anti-Semitism—hatred of the Jew. The prophets of that idea have a large and growing American support. There are probably two hundred organizations in the United States which—openly or indirectly—accept anti-Semitism as a part of their platform and preach it aggressively."

Dr. High says that they work like termites—employing anti-Semitism in this country to build up a following so that they might remake democracy in their own alien image. The Word of God to Abraham applies to his seed: "I will bless them that bless thee and curse him that curseth thee." Gen. 12:3.

We should be the very last, writes Tom Olson in Now, to discourage anyone in the study of Bible prophecy, but we would call attention to the fact that others have labored to show by the use of different numerals that Nero's, Napoleon's, the Roman Pontiff's and the Kaiser's number was 666—yet they did not fulfill that prophecy.

Hebrew and Greek (in which the Bible is written) are the only two languages in which every letter has a numerical value.

Revelation 13 was originally written in Greek. It is inconsistent to take English, German, Italian, or Russian names and try to count up the numbers for them, to fit that prophecy (Revelation 13:18) without first translating them into Greek. Furthermore, it is not the "Beast" that be-

Furthermore, it is not the "Beast" that believers should be waiting and looking for today, but their "Beloved." It is not so much "signs" as "sounds" that should interest us for "the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God" (1 Thess. 4:16) to rapture His own to Himself.

One hour's journey south of Mukden is Liao Yang, where our newest outstation is located. Several months ago workers were sent there to see about getting permission from the authorities to start a work. Almost miraculously it seemed the Lord moved everything our way. The permission was granted, and a building was secured.

Remodeling the building and preparing necessary furnishings started immediately. On the first day of February everything was ready, and a group of us went down from Mukden with our musical instruments for the opening services.

We enjoyed a blessed day with the Lord, singing, praying, preaching, and hearing testimonies to the glory of God. The service began at two o'clock and when, after four, we had closed with prayer, still no one wanted to leave! So we again gave an opportunity for testimonies. As we listened to one after another give honor to the Lord, our hearts were filled with joy and praise for what had been accomplished in just a few months time.

This group of earnest Christians has taken hold splendidly and is helping with responsibilities in greater measure than we could have hoped.

A Season of Opportunity

Right after opening the Liao Yang outstation came the Lunar New Year when the Chinese rest from their work for one or even two or three weeks. At this time the people have leisure. We are able to attract many to our gospel halls to hear the Word, for here is some place where they may go and not be charged!

Our workers afterward visit the homes of those who give in their names as wanting to know more. This year we held eight days of special meetings at our main station, a week in each of the gospel halls, a week in the Fushun outstation, and two weeks in our new Liao Yang outstation.

Heaven-sent Revival

At Liao Yang, the Lord blessed in a precious way. One of our best evangelists and his wife who is a Bible woman conducted the services, and their voices gave out under the heavy schedule. The people gathered for prayer from 5:00 A. M. to about 8:00 or 9:00 o'clock, then went home for food and returned for the evangelistic service lasting from eleven until two. At 4:00 P. M. was the third service of the day which only lasted about two hours! Then at seven the Bible study was held, with prayer lasting until around eleven at night.

The Lord gave the workers strength for the services each day, and the Spirit began to work. They testified later that God did not need their voices as one after another came under the power of the Lord. Five precious souls received the Baptism in the Spirit. Thirteen were baptized in water, and over one hundred gave in their names as wanting to be believers and follow the Lord.

Besides the five who definitely received the

Spirit, there were others under the power of God who will surely receive if they hold fast and go on with Jesus. The gift of interpretation was manifested as the Spirit spoke through some to the edification of the body.

Of course the great blessing of God brought opposition from others outside the church, and some, who heard of "strange" happenings, came to see for themselves. Two came often enough and stayed long enough to receive the Baptism in the Spirit themselves! We praise God for the wonderful work He wrought in the hearts of many during these meetings.

Another Door Opens

In a large industrial section west of the main city of Mukden another door is open to us. Some time ago one of our colporteurs, selling Gospel portions, contacted one of the keepers of a large shop who became interested and desired to become a Christian.

Later, word came that if we would go there and preach to them, the shopkeepers would open one part of their shop for weekly meetings. Two workers held the first service. Over thirty came out, and seven gave in their names as wanting to follow the Lord. They were so interested that, after one evangelist had preached two hours, they still were not satisfied and the other one had to continue the preaching.

Four of these new ones came all the long distance from their homes for our midweek Bible study and prayer service in the church. We praise God for giving us open doors where we may preach the unsearchable riches of the Lord Jesus.

Sowing Seed at Temple Meetings

In that section of the city where our East Suburb Mission Hall is located, large crowds gather each year for the annual heathen temple meetings. This year we held six days of special meetings there in order to take advantage of the opportunity these crowds offer.

Our workers stood outside the gospel hall door to play their instruments and beat the

drums. Soon a great crowd would gather. An invitation was given for the people to come inside where they might sit down and rest and, incidentally, hear the gospel! The hall would fill up in a few minutes, then we would sing and preach, the workers alternating with each other. When the crowd began to thin out, the horns and drums soon called together a new group. This was continued for five hours during the middle of the day when the crowds outside were greatest.

This time offers a wonderful opportunity to present to these people the true and living God in contrast to the idols of wood and clay which they have come so far to worship. Praise God for every chance to sow the seed of His Word. We are confident that He will cause a great harvest of souls from Manchuria to spring from it.

It gives us great joy to see that the glorious gospel of Jesus Christ is still going forward in these days of world chaos. Two missionary couples are sailing this week—Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Jennings August 12, and Mr. and Mrs. Virgil F. Smith August 16.

Brother and Sister Jennings are going to Liberia, West Africa. They have spent several years in the Kentucky Mountains in missionary and Bible school work. We are sure they will fill a real need in Liberia. Steamer letters and packages will reach them addressed in care of the "Hikawa Maru" of the N. Y. K. Line, 1404 Fourth Avenue, Seattle, Washington, sailing August 12.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have already had a successful ministry in Brazil, and have worked in full co-operation with our General Council missionaries. They are returning to resume their work this time under Council appointment. Mail will reach the Smiths up to the time of their sailing addressed to them in care of the "Delbrasil" of the Delta Line, 221 Baronne Street, (Strand Building) New Orleans, Louisiana, sailing August 16.

We are happy to add these two couples to our missionary family, and trust the Lord may accompany them to their fields of labor and give them each a profitable ministry.

RAIN IN PUERTO RICO

Louis C. Otero sends a happy report of a baptismal service in the new station at Juncos, Puerto Rico, conducted by Frank Finkenbinder. "On a beautifully clear afternoon the crowd gathered at the river for the service. After a devotional period during which the presence of God was very real, Brother Finkenbinder began to baptize the believers.

"At once, it began to rain! Happy in spite of the inclement weather, those on the river's bank sang, 'Lord, send the Pentecostal rain,' and hallelujah, the spiritual floods began to fall! How blessed it was to see the candidates so showered with Pentecostal blessing that they could not refrain from shouting and praising the Lord—some in tongues as the Spirit gave utterance—as they were baptized in water!

FAITHFUL SERVICE

"Thank God for all His faithful workers in Brazil, and for the privilege of being numbered among them!" This was the sentiment expressed by J. P. Kolenda on returning to his home station at Porto Alegre after two months spent visiting his fellow workers in Brazil.

No Address Needed

During his travels, Brother Kolenda arrived one Sunday evening at Ribeirao Preto, and having no address he anticipated difficulty in locating the Assembly of God in this city of

some eighty thousand population. After having supper in town, he started out to look for the hall but had only walked one block when he came upon the missionaries, Sisters Miller and Flessing, conducting a street meeting with about two hundred people standing around them. It was touching to see eight step into the ring and pray for salvation, among them a fine young couple who followed to the hall and have since given evidence of going on with

A New Field

Several days were spent with Brother and Sister Fullerton who are opening a new work in Sao Carlos and locality. The work is growing slowly, but surely, and the Sunday School also is progressing. Recently, in definite

answer to prayer, permission was received to conduct open-air meetings in the city which before had been prohibited. They ask that we pray with them for a real outpouring of the Spirit in their midst and the Baptism of believers.

Concerning a Scorpion

An incident is related in connection with a visit to the Olsons at Lavras: "While at the mission hall Brother Olson stepped into the side room where stood a bed which is used at times by the native worker. Lifting the sheet, he discovered a scorpion underneath. He managed to catch it in a tin can which was near at hand. Brother Olson then took the scorpion home and showed me an interesting thing. He built a circle of fire with paper, placing the scorpion in the center. When the scorpion saw that there was no way of escape, it lifted its tail and with the stinger gave itself a death blow. Strange, the reptile which gives its victims such agony before killing them does not want to suffer, but ends life quickly."

Brother Kolenda says of the Olsons who have been in the country only two years: "Brother Olson has a good knowledge of the language. He has a fine work at Lavras, with three outstations in charge of native workers. The state in which Lavras is located has a population of nine million, with scores of cities of ten to thirty thousand where there is no full gospel work. We need your prayers and co-operation in bringing the gospel to Brazil."

A REQUEST

The following request comes from the Ted Vassars of Poona, South India.

"We have reopened a district near Poona in which seven new Sunday Schools are now operating. To go to the farthest village, it is necessary to travel between thirty and forty miles. We have found this too far to ride a bicycle in this climate. Brother Vassar tried it and became sick before reaching home.

"With a small car, we could not only start more new Sunday Schools but also hold night services in these villages. A fairly good secondhand car can be purchased for about three hundred dollars. We are praying that God will lay this great need upon someone's heart."

Conference of the South India and Ceylon District Council

The Conference of the South India and Ceylon District Council was held at Coonoor, Nilgiris, from April 9th to 12th, inclusive. A wonderful time of fellowship and blessing was enjoyed, and reports from the various stations, outstations, and new stations showed progress on every side.

In Memoriam

Sorrow and regret were expressed for the decease of Sister Dorothy Ganz in September, 1939, only a few months after she had come to the field. The Council rose for a period of silence in respect for Sister Ganz.

Field Reports

COLOMBO, CEYLON—Walter Clifford stated that the assembly has been set in order and is making rapid progress toward becoming self-supporting. Services are held in three languages—Singalese, Tamil, and English. The Sunday School and the Christ's Ambassadors Society are making splendid progress under the blessing of the Lord, the former having outgrown its present accommodation for classes. Good word was also given concerning the seven outstations.

Brother Clifford spoke stirringly concerning the tremendous need of a Bible school in Ceylon, that Singalese and Tamil workers might be trained and thus much more accomplished for the Lord in the Island.

POONA, SOUTH INDIA—Both Indian and British soldiers have been baptized in water and are going on with God. There are now seven Sunday Schools in charge of Indian workers, with scope for as many more if workers were available. Brother and Sister Vassar have been carrying on extensive visitation work and report tremendous scope for such a ministry. Prayer was urged in regard to a great need for Poona—a church building to accommodate the people.

Brother Stoddart, during his visit to England, was privileged to meet some of those who had been under his ministry among the soldiers in Poona, and who are now preaching the gospel.

Our Poona missionaries are being asked to take over a large unoccupied area in the Marathi District. They hope to accept this territory but in doing so appeal for more workers to help capture the strongholds of the enemy.

GALLE, CEYLON—Brother and Sister Graves report the completion of the tabernacle and praise the Lord for lifting the financial burden of it. During a visit of Sister Eady twelve received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit.

TRAVANCORE—Mildred Ginn was full of praise for those who had graduated from the Malayalam Bible School and had gone to work in that district.

PALGHAT—A new station has been opened by W. E. Davis, with splendid opportunities for reaching the heathen in surrounding villages.

The Ministry of Child Evangelism

Wave Berg, 1835 Washington Blvd., Chicago, Illinois

In the Evangel of June 29 Willard Peirce told us what was being done on the line of child evangelism in California. In this article Miss Wave Berg tells us what they are doing in Chicago. It is not difficult to pick up a crowd of children from the streets and bring them to a home. A number of homes can be opened up in every city, the children won for Christ, and then instructed in the things of the Kingdom.

Don't fail to read this article; and then "go and do thou likewise."

Our first classes among the children were held in 1937. We had two classes and three teachers. In 1938 we had six classes and twelve teachers, and this year fourteen classes and twenty-two teachers. These classes are for boys and girls from four to fourteen years of age. They meet one day a week and just for one hour immediately after school hours.

We pray for open homes where we may invite the children of the immediate neighborhood in to teach them the Bible. As Christian parents respond, we agree with them as to the day they want the class. Seventy-five to one hundred invitations are typed, giving the name of the hostess, her address, the day and hour of the class, telling them there will be singing and a Bible story. They are asked to bring their friends.

A teacher or perhaps two will stand within two or three blocks from the home at the noon hour, meeting the children who live in the neighborhood as they go home for lunch. We give each an invitation, asking them to give them to their mothers and ask permission to come to the Bible club after school. At 3:00 o'clock when they go home from school we are again at the same corner to remind them this is the time to come to the Bible club. This is repeated at 3:00 o'clock for a few weeks until they remember it.

A teacher is at the home to meet the children as they go in, taking their names, addresses, and ages. At 3:00 the meeting starts by one leading in singing choruses the children enjoy. Usually motion songs are sung as this rests their tired muscles (most of them have been in school all day and are tired) preparing them for the memory work and Bible story. If the group is large and the ages vary it is divided into classes, the teachers taking the different ages to separate rooms in the home. There they have a short time teaching them the Bible verses and giving the lesson.

Some teachers use the story telling method but most use the visual-aid board. Every minute has to be made very interesting, even to the memory work, as most of the children are from homes where the parents are indifferent and the children come or stay away just as they please. We have different methods of teaching the memory work and many of the teachers reward them for the accomplished work.

The enrollment in these classes ranges from ten to fifty or more, the attendance from four to This past winter we have had classes in Polish, Spanish, Ukrainian, Russian, Negro, Swedish, and White American homes, representing at least ten nationalities. We gather in Catholics, Protestants, and Jews. In many cases the children are not permitted to attend after the parents find out what teaching they receive. We have had children in who have never been in Sunday School or church. As the plan of salvation is given and the children understand it, many accept the Lord as their Saviour. We have contacted some of these children two and sometimes three years later, and have seen a definite change in their lives, for which we praise God. The large portions of Scripture they have memorized will prove a stronghold in their future lives and help them to guard against temptation. We are praying and believing that God will call many of these children to be missionaries either in the home or the foreign fields.

In November, 1939, these classes were organized under the supervision of the Illinois Christian Women's Fellowship, of which Mrs. Elizabeth Ashcroft, 1121 Ashland Ave., Evanston, Ill., is the president. They are now called the Junior Evangelism Fellowship classes. We have had twenty homes opened to us this last winter, but six were closed after a few weeks or months. At our first annual rally, May 11, twelve of the fourteen classes were represented and took part in the program. There were 136 children and 85 adults present, the number of children being small as many were from Catholic homes and forbidden to enter a Protestant church as it is considered a mortal sin. We praise God for the privilege of teaching them from week to week. There were 200 to 250 children enrolled and we were reaching 150 to 160 each week in classes. Up until the time of the rally, or in six and one half months, we had 325 hours of class work with the children. This is equivalent to 25 quarters of work done in a Sunday School or to six and one fourth years. We have had classes in Evanston and Winnetka, Illinois, as well as in Chicago. Please pray with us that next year we may have open doors in many other cities and other States! Pray also for teachers for these classes. We could have had more classes this year had we had the teachers. We are standing on the promise of Isaiah 55:11, "My word shall not return unto Me void."

We have purchased a few books from the Gospel Publishing House and are trying to build up a library for the children. In this way they have wholesome literature to read instead of trashy, degrading literature which they can buy for a few pennies or receive as gifts. Knowing the Juniors are easily influenced either for good or for bad, we feel we must do all we can to keep pure and uplifting thoughts in their minds. One boy read "The Sugar Creek Gang," by Paul Hutchens, twice and afterwards said, "Now

I feel like I should like to be a Christian." There has been a decided change for the better since that time. Some of the children check out Bibles to read, just as they would other books. So far we have only twenty-two books, but are trusting God to enable us to have many times that number another year so that all the children may have some. (We shall be glad to receive any books that others may have which they do not care to keep longer.) We also give them Sunday School papers from the Gospel Publishing House. Many thanks for those you sent us.

During the summer months it is hard to draw the children inside, so we go to them on the street where they are playing and conduct a Bible class in the open just as we should do inside. One year we had seven regular openair meetings each week, the attendance in each ranging from 15 to 60. In this way we reach some who would not be permitted to go inside. Here again we give out large quantities of Sunday School papers and gospel tracts.

The expense of these classes is low compared to mission or church work. The teachers volunteer their services, buying their own material and paying their own car fare. There is no expense for heat or lights as the hostesses furnish these.

WEST COAST WORK—The Lord has wonderfully opened work among the Tamil outcastes, where there are now seven outstations and twelve Indian workers. Five little churches with mud walls and rice straw roofs have been built in village centers, where meetings are held and teaching given, and there are also night schools which enable adults, after their day's work is over, to learn to read the Bible.

In concluding her report of this work, Constance Eady expressed grief over the loss of her beloved coworker, Dorothy Ganz. She urged prayer that married couples might be sent out to this needy field, to study Tamil and help reach these many thousands who have not even heard the name of Jesus.

Open services were held in the evenings, following the conference sessions, and the power and presence of the Lord were wonderfully manifested.

We praise the Lord for our gathering together unto Him, and "there the Lord commanded the blessing."—Constance Swinfen Eady, Secretary.

They are called trochus fishers. They spend their lives in the stench of the rotting snails in a trochus boat. The odor is so offensive that it can be smelled as far away as six miles. They fish by wading about in the warm water infested with venomous sea urchins and other poisonous fish. Peering through a tube with a glass bottom, called a water glass, they can find the sea snails. When they find one they plunge under the water after it.

Nearly all of them have spreading, obstinate ulcerations which little by little eat the flesh to the bone, caused by their contacts with the spines of the sea urchins. When they are not fishing, there being no land in sight, their only refuge is the boat, where the swarms of sticky flies, the terrific heat, and the intolerable stench of the rotting snails make life almost insupportable. So they spend their days gathering sea snails so that folk who live in fine houses may have buttons on their clothes.

It is unlikely that any one reading this item has ever seen anyone who lives so wretchedly as do the trochus fishermen; nevertheless there are many, very many, very wretched people among us. They look out longingly through steel-barred windows; they shuffle about in rags from one tap room to another, confirmed drunkards; they lie on beds or sit in wheel chairs, prisoners of pain; they are forsaken, neglected, or abused mothers of little children heroically trying to carry on after a husband has proved himself to total loss. The list might be greatly increased.

"What have they to live for?" one feels like inquiring. Surely so—what? But, like the trochus fishermen they usually make no provision for anything better. They neglect so great salvation. I have often said, "I am not so much interested in well-to-do people's paying their tithes—they have prosperity—but the very poor man—the man who hardly has enough to eat, he needs to pay his tithes, that he may be able to pray in faith for prosperity."

Similarly, the rich man, the fine, well-groomed, self-satisfied man, if he neglects getting saved still has something. His life here has been satisfying to a degree, and he has that, even if he does go to hell. But the trochus fishermen, and their counterparts living here among us who neglect so great salvation—they have nothing here and nothing ever. Possibly it was some such thinking as this that caused the Lord to say so explicitly, "the poor have the gospel preached to them." God is a Friend of the poor. He will save the rich man if he will come; but He reaches out strongly toward the poor. "Blessed are ye poor."

Let us catch the divine idea and see to it that all the poor, all the trochus-fishermen sort of folk among us have the most loving and urgent and persistent invitations to accept the Lord. The Saviour who told of the final blessed ending of Lazarus, poor and neglected, befriended only by the sores-licking dogs, but carried to the skies by a glorious company of the angels of God, will reach down a strong hand of helping to every poor wretch who, out of his helplessness, misery, and guilt looks up for his Saviour's blessing. You may be rich or you may be poor but anyway you need Christ and His salvation.—C. E. R.
