## War Mews Mpset dabakkuk Joo!

OHE new invincible power of the Chaldeans was gathering like a stormcloud in the north. Rumors reaching Jerusalem told of their ferocious character, insatiable lust for conquest, lightning campaigns. "Impregnable" forts and defence lines crumbled before them. Kingdom after kingdom was overrun. Thousands of captives were on their way to Babylon to build its palaces and develop its industry. The time was coming when Judah's craftsmen would join this throng.

The Chaldeans themselves were elated. No nation could escape their dragnet-woe unto them if they did not come to terms! "Therefore they sacrifice unto their net and burn incense unto their drag." Drunk with military success they worshiped the god of power and chanted the militarist's hymn: "The world is for the strongwoe to the weak!"
War hysteria swept over Judea. The grim remark "our turn's coming" was heard everywhere.

Habakkuk, too, was disturbed by the war bulletins. Yet there was something he had forgotten. For many years he had prayed, "O Lord, how long shall I cry? and thou wilt not hear! even cry out unto thee of violence and thou wilt not save!" He had complained about God's seeming indifference to the ungodliness of his people, but it came like a shock to learn that the coming of the Chaldeans was God's answer to his cry. "For lo, I raise up the Chaldeans, that bitter and hasty nation which shall march through the breadth of the land, to possess the dwelling places that are not theirs."
Everybody wants peace and justice. But since the nations will

he will say unto me, and what I shall answer when I am reproved." He records what the Spirit of God taught him for the sake of tried souls in every age.

And the Lord said, "Write the vision, and make it plain upon tables that he may run that readeth it," or "that one may read it on the rum." That is, he was to inscribe the message upon tablets and expose it in public and explain its meaning to anyone who cared to inquire. God had set up His bulletin board to counteract the nervewracking effects of the current war bulletins!

In $2: 4$ we have the essence of God's bulletin. "Behold, his soul which is lifted up is not upright in him: but the just shall live by his faith." He condemns the insolent militarist and makes faith in God the rule of life. Habakkuk learned that the Chaldean conquerors were the unwitting instruments of God's purpose. For God uses one doomed nation to bring judgment upon another. Their mighty empire was doomed and its collapse would reveal that might heedless of right carries within it the seeds of death. "Behold, his soul which is lifted up is not upright in him." The Chaldean nature is inflated, presumptuous, insincere and unreal; therefore it lacks the principle of permanence: it cannot last. Neither can any system that follows in its footsteps. Therefore confidence must not he founded upon men or nations but on those eternal principles by which God governs the world. The bewildering and terrifying clash of armed forces are controlled by an all-wise and all-powerful and loving God who overrules evil for righteous purposes.
For example, think what a blessnot take the unselfish way, God
teaches them by the hard way. And sometimes it looks as if hell had broken loose on earth and that God had lost control. But He raises up nations like the Chaldeans to scourge the world for its departure from righteous principles.

The prophet's indignation over Judah's unpunished wrongdoing turned into perplexity at God's method of dealing with it. Judah no doubt deserved chastisement. But how could a righteous God employ for His
factor in human destiny? Is arrogant, restless militarism to dominate the world indefinitely? "Shall they therefore empty their net, and not spare continually to slay the nations?"

## An Inspired Bulletin

Habakkuk's complaint reflected the soul distress of godly people in Jerusalem, and for his sake and theirs he resorted to prayer. "I will stand upon my watch, and get me upon the tower, and will watch to see what
ing Hitler has been to this country (unintentionally, of course)! He has rudely jarred us out of our complacency and has made us to realize that merely singing and talking about the glories of American democracy will not save us from decadence if we lack the spirit of the men who founded it. He has made us search ourr hearts and ask ourselves the question, "What have we in this land that is worth dying for ?" And if

# Some Great Discaveries 

WESLEY R. STEELBERG AT THE NATIONAL YOUNG PEOPLE'S CONFERENCE

THESE are days when adventure seems to hold great fascination for young men and women. When Admiral Byrd made his last trip to the Southern tip of the world, a host of young people wrote to him saying, "I should like to join your company. I will drive a tractor or do anything else you will want me to do, if I can just go with you." They were willing to suffer any privation and hardship and cold, in order to go. There are others who would join expeditions going into the heart of Africa and other places where they would be subjected to heat and cold and dangers from wild animals that might cost their lives.
Did you ever go on a treasure hunt? They give you a little note to go to an oak tree, then turn and go to a certain point, and then go in another direction, and then they will send you some place else, and by and by maybe you will end up with a box of candy as a prize or something like that. There is a greater prize than that. We know of young men and young women who are determined to discover the wealth and the glory of the riches of God in His Son Jesus Christ. Do you know that when God gave us Jesus Christ, the Scripture says He gave us with Him all things? Did you ever stop to realize that He that gave His only Son, freely and willingly gives us a continual gift that comes to us every day of the year? Hallelujah! And so we are going to go on a treasure hunt tonight, and use God's Book to find where the treasure is.

1. We shall discover Jesus as an understanding Friend. It is a precious thing to know that you have folk that really understand you. There are many who have never discovered that Jesus understands them. They feel they have peculiar problems, peculiar burdens, peculiar obstacles that no one seems to understand. But it is so wonderful to go and pour your heart out to Jesus and know that He really understands.

Many are the times when as a young man I felt I was in a measure slighted by some who perhaps misunderstood, who made sarcastic comments because of certain things. My heart was wounded. I felt the barbs and stings, and bitterness. Then it was wonderful to go to Jesus, to just lay my head upon His shoulder. He would open His heart to me, and put His arms around me, and I could almost feel Him stroking my head and saying, "Now, Son, it is going to be all right., You just trust Me, your Elder Brother." Isn't it precious, isn't it wonderful to discover the blessedness of the understanding heart?

My parents were Scandinavian and they were very strict, and until I was quite a large boy. At eight o'clock every night my father would be sitting reading his Bible, and he would just clear his throat-he did not have to say Wesley or Philip or call us by name - that meant "Go to bed!" So up we would jump and scamper towards the bedroom. When we got to our bedroom, if we felt a little mischievous I would get hold of a pillow and whack away at my brother and
maybe hit the bedroom door and there would be a thud, and we would stand perfectly still. If nothing happened, he would take a whack at me. That would happen one, two or three times, and then we would hear that ominous clearing of the throat again. There were no more pillows thrown after that because we knew if there had been, my mother would have played "Amazing grace, how sweet the sound" with an old hickory stick on us.

I sometimes thought Mother and Dad did not understand me; but when I learned that Jesus understood a boy's heart, it was a wonderful thing. I could pour my heart out to Him and could tell Him all my troubles in a way that no one else would appreciate or understand.
2. A second discovery we make is that God has a designed purpose for every one of our lives. The day you discover that your soul will leap within you. Your heart willI don't know how to describe it-simply dance for joy inside you when you stop to realize that Jesus actually has planned something for you, that you are included in the great plan of God, that God is actually interested in you.

My mother expected a girl when she got me. Poor Mother! So she taught me certain elementary home duties that most girls usually do. I learned to wash and iron, to wash dishes and scrub the floor. One Saturday afternoon I was double-scrubbing the kitchen. She was never satisfied to have me wipe it. She said, "Take soap and wash it good. Soap it good then rinse out the cloth and wipe up the soap."

I was young-ten years of age-God had saved me. I knew what salvation was. God had met me in prayer. My heart had reached out to God as a lad. I thank God for a godly father and for a godly mother who had a family altar, and who taught us to read the Scripture. I had to memorize two verses of the Psalms and read a chapter from the Bible every morning before I went to grammar school, every day of my grammar school life. I thank God for that, I do appreciate it more than I can say.

So I was down on my hands and knees scrubbing the floor, in front of the kitchen stove. Mother had some old-fashioned Scandinavian coffee bread baking. I liked to scrub in front of the stove because I could scrub and I could smell. I would scrub and then I would smell. I was scrubbing and smelling, when someone said, "Wesley!" I jumped to my feet and ran to the adjoining bedroom where mother sat

in a rocker darning stockings, and I said, "Did you call me, Mamma ?" She said, "No. Why ?" Well, my mother had never told us a lie. I trusted my mother so implicitly, and my father, and knew they would not do anything wrong. They were next to God in my estimation of righteousness. I stood and looked at her and I said, "But, Mamma

I had been taught never to question my mother's and father's word. If they, said "No" it was no, and if they said "Yes" it was yes. I said, "Mamma, somebody called me!" I did not dare to say, "You called me." She said, "If someone called you I don't know who it was. , Now go back and get your scrubbing done.'

I went back and was scrubbing away, and I heard my name again-"Wesley!" and I jumped up and ran into the bedroom and I said, "Mamma, you called me, this time, didn't you?" She said, "Son, what's the matter with you?" I said, "Nothing, Mamma; but somebody called." "It „was someone of your playmates, I suppose," she said. And then she stopped and looked at me, and she said, "Son, do you suppose God is talking to you as He did to Samuel?"

That nearly paralyzed me. I say that reverently. It was such a solemn thought, I stood transfixed in my tracks. I said, "Maybe so," but I went to the back door to make sure, and there was no one out there. So I went back to scrubbing again, and mother said, "Now if you hear that voice again, you say the same thing Samuel said, 'Speak, Lord; for thy servant heareth." I scrubbed for about a minute and a half, and the third time I heard the voice: "Wesley !" I stopped with my rag poised in my hand and listened, and then I said, "Yes, Lord; what do You want me to do?" An audible voice from heaven said, "I want you to go next door and talk to the old man who is dying over there."

I got up and tiptoed into the bedroom. When you meet God, I want to tell you, you do not feel big; you feel very, very small; you feel like moving very carefully, you feel as though the slightest misstep would be deadly to you. Often in my childhood I felt a sense of the presence of the living God.

I walked in there and I said, "Mamma, God told me to go next door and visit our neighbor who is dying." And my mother burst into tears. She sobbed and she cried. Now I was frightened. I said, "Mamma, what's the matter ?"

She pulled me over and hugged me and said, "Darling, God has chosen you instead of me. For two weeks God has been talking to me about going to see the old man next door and I was afraid to go, and now He has called you." I cried with her and the tears of mother and son dropped down to the floor.

She said, "You must hurry now and obey God." If it had been anybody else but God that had asked me, I should have been frightened to death. That man was the worst character in the community. He beat his horses with a shovel until the blood
streamed down and when he got very angry he would bring his shotgun to the backdoor and shoot it in the air. He swore terribly and we were about frightened to death. When he came home from his duties every child in the neighborhood would run for cover. We would crawl under the barn, into the haymow; we would go anywhere to get away from that man. But today I combed my hair and washed my face and tidied up a bit and started out.

When you discover that God has a purpose for you, that He has something for you to do, it will grip your soul and encourage your heart. God has a design, He has a purpose for every one of us; and that purpose is so profound and so holy and so marvelous that we cannot afford to miss it.

I went to the porch and knocked at the door. A quavering voice answered. There was a woman so crippled with rheumatism that she could hardly move from her place. As she called "Come in," I opened the door timidly, walked in, and said, "I have come to pray for your husband.'

She answered, "Yonder he is in bed, he's a-dying," and she said, "he'll need somebody to pray for him." I went in and knelt down by the bed. The old fellow had chewed tobacco and let it run down over his beard until his beard was matted with tobacco juice. The bed covers were actually repulsive. He stirred and opened his bleary eyes and said, "What are you doing ?" I said, "I have come to pray for you. God told me to pray for you." His lips began to quiver, he held out a trembling hand and said, "You have come to pray for me? Go right ahead and pray." I prayed a little childish prayer, I opened my heart and said, "O God, save this poor man, heal this poor man. Forgive him for swearing, forgive him for the way he treats his horse." Then I jumped up and ran out of the house like a thousand animals were after me to devour me.

The next morning there was a quavering voice at the fence calling "Yoo-hoo." My mother went to see who it was, and the old lady was standing there, tottering on her crutches, and she said, "My husband wanted me to tell yout he felt God had forgiven him. He died twenty minutes to five this morning and he said, 'Tell the little feller I am going home to heaven.' "

Oh, the day that you find that God has a purpose and a design for you, you have made a discovery that will outshine any gift of gold or diamonds or jewels. Have you discovered that you are a partner of Jesus Christ in the great work of saving souls?
3. You will discover that God trains His soldiers. He says, "It is good for a man to bear the yoke in his youth." Lam. 3:27. Joseph had to accept the plan of God for his life. When tempted and tried he showed what kind of manhood he had. When he was cast into prison he might well have said, "God does not care anything about me. He let my brothers sell me to the Ishmaelites. Now He has let a bad woman put me in jail." What did he do? He got hold of an old prison broom and swept those rooms so clean the prison keeper said, "You're a nice boy. I have a mind to let you sweep the whole jail out and you will not have to stay in that cell there alone." He swept and worked with a will, and one day they brought in two dignitaries with chains
around their necks, and all kinds of signs of social prestige.

Joseph was a fine young fellow, like Pentecostal folk are, and he said, "What are you doing down here?" and they said, "We don't know what is going to happen to us." He said, "I hope you will not have to stay here very long." He did not say, "I have been here a long time." They said, "We each had a dream last night." "Oh, did you?" And so they told their dreams. Joseph said, "I will have a talk with my Father and find out what those dreams mean." When men learn about getting in touch with God they can do things for the glory of God that will astound worldly persons. They will be amazed at you, they will say, "I cannet understand it, but I tell you it amazes me. I will have to admit that!"
What happened? Joseph told them the meaning of their dreams and it came to pass just as he said. He said to one of them, "When you get back up there, tell the king about me, will you?" And he said "Yes." But like some do when they promise to pray for the missionaries, he promptly forgot it. So Joseph swept a little longer.

The Lord sometimes puts us in a corner. You say, "I expected to be president of the group. I think there's politics in the church. and they don't seem to care. I can conduct, and I can sing, and I can do this and that. If they don't elect me to office I will not come." You will discover God tells us about putting up with problems even in our young lives.
I remember an illustration along this line. I was assistant pastor in a large mission hall in Los Angeles and also pastor of one of the first groups of young people that were allowed to hold separate young people's meetings, and I remember one night a woman who was old enough to be my mother got hold of me and said, "Young man, I have something to say to you." I said, "Yes?" She took me aside and began to tell me all the faults she found in me. "You're just too big, to walk on earth! You're this and that," and after she had enumerated things for an hour and a half I must admit I was beginning to boil inside. I was just waiting for an opportunity to tell what I thought, but the Holy Spirit was talking to Wesley R. Steelberg while that was going on. It is wonderful how God has a secret telephone to talk to you alone. While others are talking in your ears, He is talking to the heart.
As a last triumphant note she said, "Last night I saw you on a suburban streetcar with your arm on the back of the seat in which a young lady sat." That young lady is here tonight. She happens to be my wife. And as she finished, the boiling had ceased, the grace of God had come to my soul, the peace of God filled me, and I said, "Sister, I want to thank you for your kindly
counsel." I wasn't a hypocrite. God had helped me. I said, "I want to thank you for your kindly counsel, and I want you to pray for me." She burst into tears. She gripped my shoulders and she said, "Wesley, I want you to pray for me, I am a mean old lady, that is what I am." And we got down together and I prayed for her and she prayed for me, and because God gave me grace to keep still and receive a scolding which I partially undoubtedly deserved, I had a friend for life. That dear mother in Israel promised me that never a day would pass but what she would pray for me. I believe she kept her promise until they laid her in the casket.

When you discover that tendency of human nature that seems at times to actually want to avenge you, God is seeking to deal with your heart. You will be delighted to know that God takes that much interest in you, that God cares enough to discipline you, to talk with you, to deal with you about the ordinary problems of life.

You will find that God provides joy of service in the midst of menial tasks. You say, "I can sing and be in the choir, and the pastor said, 'I should like you to stand at the door and give out books. I should like you to see that the pitcher in the pulpit is always filled with cold water!' He is trying to make a janitor out of me! What do I come to church for?" Oh, remember how Jesus, your lovely Saviour, was willing to gird Himself with a towel and to wash and wipe the disciples' feet. He was willing to become a servant that He might set an example for you and for me. Many a time you will find the sweetest experiences wrapped up in the most menial and sometimes the most unappreciated things you do.

When in Portland, Oregon, in my early ministry I was preaching the gospel in a little chapel in that part of the city on the Willammette river, opposite the business district. I had been speaking there and some of the young folk got jealous of me because I was young. I had walked down to the center of the city to hold a street meeting that afternoon. I had given the last fifteen cents I had in this world in the missionary offering because God had told me to do it, and then I had walked all the way down town. Nobody offered to take me in their car, nobody offered me dinner or supper. I had not had anything to eat and I was hungry. It was about five o'clock in the afternoon. On top of it all there was not a soul at the street meeting but me. They drove by me, one, two, three cars. They would look at me and go by. I sang as well as I could. A few drunks gathered around and looked at me with bleary eyes. I testified and they asked a few questions and made some mocking remarks. I felt pretty discouraged.

I thought somebody would surely take me to the meeting that night, but nobody offered me a ride. I was running to get back in time-I was the evangelist there in the church-and the young people passed me in their cars, calling "Well, come on; you will get there if you try."

I got to church, the song service had started, I was perspiring and red-faced. I went in and sat down and the pastor went through with the preliminary part of the service. I preached the Word of God, and as I preached souls came to the altar. There (Continued on Page Twelve)

In the first issue of the Evangel printed this year there was an article by Sarah Foulkes Moore entitled, "What It Means to Pray Through." This article told the story how seven years ago a colored preacher, Elder Dabney, was assigned to the pastorate of a church in the most desperately wicked part of Philadelphia. Together with his wife, Elizabeth J. Dabney, he went to this new field of labor. At the first meeting there was no one present but themselves. Realizing the great need of prayer, Sister Dabney made a vow to the Lord that if He would save the souls of the people in that community, she would give herself to Him in prayer, devoting three days and three nights each week for three years. Moreover, she vowed that during two of these three years she would fast as well as pray in the church these three days and three nights of the week.

No sooner had Sister Dabney begun to give herself to prayer than God began to work. Souls were saved, healed, delivered. The neighborhood was stirred. They had to move to a larger church to accommodate the crowds that were seeking God. A revival broke out in the neighborhood and they had to move to a still larger church on the main highway.

At the end of three years of fasting and prayer, the Lord manifested Himself to Sister Dabney in a wonderful way. At that time He powerfully anointed her for the ministry of intercession and told her that wherever she would pray souls would be delivered, bodies would be healed, fetters would be broken, and He would be glorified.

This simple story has been an encouragement to many to pray. We received many requests that we put the article in tract form. In a few weeks we had to print 40,000 copies of this tract (this tract is still available from the Gospel Publishing House, at 10 cents per dozen, or 50 cents per pound).

Sister Dabney knew nothing of this article going into the Evangel but was happy because of its publication, because many souls were moved out of their lethargy. She wrote us: "I prayed to the Lord to open a door somewhere and permit me to help people of all nations to enter into this divine field of prayer and lamentation for souls to be delivered out of Satan's bonds, prisons, and pits. The gospel must be preached among all nations, and this ministry of praver and soul travail must also he shared by many souls."

Sister Moore writes us: "While Sister Dabney was recently in Philadelphia, a 'phone call came to her from Florida. The wife of a prominent phvsician had heard of the prayers of Sister Dabney through the Evangel article, and called her to pray for her hushand who was apparently on his deathbed. Sister Dabrey had the wife put the 'phone to the dying man's ear and she praved for him. In three days he was back in his office.
"Sister Faye Bress wrote to a friend in Ohio about this work of prayer. This friend's daughter was backslidden, lying
in bed, dying of tuberculosis. When the mother read the letter to her daughter she wept her way back to God. Later an anointed healing cloth was mailed to her, and as soon as she applied it she got out of bed and went thirty miles to a Pentecostal meeting to testify. A day or so later she went sixty-seven miles to a healing service to tell what the Lord had done for her spirit, soul, and body.
"A mother and father left a small daughter at home with fever while they went to Sister Dabney's meeting. They asked that a handkerchief be anointed and prayed over for their little daughter. They simply placed the handkerchicf in the child's hand when they returned home, and instantly her fever left her and her very sore throat was gone. Praise the Lord!"

Brother Charles E. Robinson, of our Editorial staff, wrote to Sister Dabney and asked for prayer for an affliction from which he has been suffering for twentyseven years. She sent a handkerchief over which she had prayed, and Brother Robinson was perfectly healed.

At the present time Sister Dabney is in Los Angeles, California, at the Mission at 33 rd and Compton. She mentions that people of different nationalities are assembling, and God is graciously pouring out His Spirit. Some 100 have been saved and 90 have received the Baptism, and there have been many wonderful healings.

Sister Moore writes: "Sister Dabney is shrinking, timid. She can talk in public but little, but she is bold when God gives her something to say. But her real ministry is at night, in a room, hidden away. Her public services are just God's answer to that night travail. She herself does not minister much in public. She is very modest, talks to few publicly or privately. She has two all-night services every week. I feel her ministry of prayer is for all. She prays with faith and with a burden for all. She is a holy woman. You feel the presence of the Lord when you come near her."

Recently the Erangel printed a call that Sister Dabney made for prayer for this nation and for all nations. All over America

the excitement and confusion aroused by Hitler's victories finally drives us as a nation back to the faith of our fathers, we shall owe that troublemaker our undying gratitude!

In any case we shall make no mistake in regarding him as a scourge providentially permitted by God to make the nations of the world do some unusually sober thinking about international problems.

## We, the Oppressed, Speak!

God has Babylon's doom prepared and He summons the nations who have been their victims to pronounce it. Hearken to the victims' sober message to the aggressor. Read 2:6-19.
"Restless ambition and insatiable greed for power and goods will be your ruin. In enslaving peoples you sin against your own soul. By your extortions and plunderings you are loading yourself with a crushing debt. Others will arise to plunder you. Your strong fortresses will not save you. Their very beams are eloquent with the story of oppression. You cannot rear a stable civilization upon double-dealing, bloodshed and iniquity. All the toil of the nations wearily rearing the palaces and industries of Babylon is destined to perish in the flames. But there is a God of justice, therefore, 'the earth shall be filled with the knowledge, of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.'

By cunning intrigues you have outwitted your enemies, and made them drunk with woe and terror. But you too, must drink of the cup, for when an avenging God holds it forth no nation may refuse it.'

Habakkuk declares the old truth that there is no escape from judgment. For this is God's world and must be run in God's way. When men try to run it on any other plan the result is ultimately a disastrous "backfire." Even in personal life reckless, vicious living leads to broken health. Hate, impurity, selfishness and other vices return to scourge us and to play havoc with our inner life and outward circumstances. As with individuals, so with nations it is true that "God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap.'

Not until Christ reigns upon the earth.

## EMPEROR HAILE SELASSIE

Emperor Haile Selassie has been restored to the throne of Abyssinia. He was the first monarch to be driven from his country by the dictators, and he is the first to be restored. Is this mere coincidence or is it the hand of God, in whom Haile Selassie has trusted throughout these six years of exile?
A newspaper printed a story of Haile Selassie torturing with fiendish cruelty one of his rivals, R. V. Bingham, head of the Sudan Interior Mission, denies this story by telling how one of the Emperor's governors plotted against him and was arrested, tried by law, proved guilty and imprisoned, but how, on the night he was forced to flee, the Emperor set this rival free.

Mussolini affected to despise him as the ruler of a barbarian people. But it was the Italians who acted like barbarians by bombing the defenseless natives. The Italians, in order to wipe out Protestantism, shot all who could read, with the result that many native evangelists were murdered. The Italians had the little remnant of the former missionary body in prison, including the young son of the one United Presbyterian missionary there. Protestant missionaries were forced to leave the country after Mussolini conquered the country in 1935?

But now Haile Selassie is back on his rightful throne, and Italian power has been broken. And Protestant missionary work can again be carried on, for Haile Selassie is a friend of the missionaries. It was he, recalls R. V. Bingham, who before the Italian war was establishing schools as rapidly as he could secure trained teachers, and in every school was insisting that the Gospel of John and the Psalms of David should form a part of the daily curriculum. It was he who gave the Sudan Interior Mission 500 acres of beautiful land for their leper work; contributed $\$ 5,000$ for their leper hospital; personally laid the foundation stone and officially opened the building on its dedication.

Haile Selassie is not bitter. In a recent proclamation to his people he said: "I charge you solemnly to receive kindly those Italians who surrender. Do not retaliate for the cruelty they have inflicted on our people, but show yourselves honorable and humane soldiers." He believes in loving his enemies, in doing good to those who hate him.

As in the past, he is giving God the glory. At the height of his power, when crowned Emperor in 1930, he had printed on coronation stamps the words of Psalm 68:31, "Ethiopia shall soon stretch out her hands unto God." In the hour of calamity, when his throne had been taken from him, he said quietly: "If there is justice in this world, and I know there is, then I shall some day, in God's good time and when He considers it suitable and fitting, once again sit on the throne of Solomon." And now, at the hour of triumph, he begins his proclamation with the words, "Ethiopia stretches out her hands unto God."
As he stood before his people on his return to Addis Ababa he said to them: "Let us rejoice, but in the spirit of Christ. Do not reward evil for evil. Do not indulge in the untimely atrocities which the enemy, even in these last days, has been accustomed to practice against us. Do not shame Ethiopia by acts worthy of our enemies. I shall see they are disarmed and given a safe passage to the place from which they came." Hail Selassie is a Christian ruler. Pray for him as he endeavors to restore a peaceful, righteous government in his war-torn land.

## A Call to Worship <br> Lesson for August 3 , 1941. Lesson Text Psalms 95 and 100

A CALL TO THANKSGIVING. The Septuagint informs us that Psalm 95 is also one of David's songs. It is a call to gladsome praise, to joyous shouting, to exultant worship. When the ark of the covenant came into their camp, Israel sent up a great shout. 1 Sam. 4:6. But we have a greater cause to shout than Israel, for every child of God can declare: "The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge." "For He hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." Heb. 13:5. The great salvation the Lord gives does not make us dull and doleful, but joyous and jubilant. Says John, "These things write we unto you, that your joy may be full." 1 John 1:4. Said our Lord Jesus, when He spoke about our abiding in Him and He in us, "These things have I spoken unto you, that My joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full." John 15:11. Speaking of our Lord Jesus Christ, Peter says, "Whom having not seen, ye love; in whom, though now ye see Him not, yet believing, ye rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory." 1 Peter $1: 8$. A prec-
ious Swedish saint testified, "Jesus has put something down in my heart that makes me yump for yoy."
Our Reason for Rejoicing. Why should we not shout when the Lord is so good, when He has done for us exceeding abundantly above all our thought or concept? What a glorious inheritance is ours! Christ is ours. His salvation is ours. His Spirit is ours. All things are ours. He makes us partakers of His own nature. What should we then say for all these things? If God be for us, who can be against us? "He that spared not His own Son, but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not with Him also freely give us all things? Who shall lay anything to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth. Who is he that condemneth? It is Christ that died, yea rather, who is risen again, who is even at the right hand of God, who also maketh intercession for us." In view of this, are we not little short of infidels if we are disobedient to the apostolic command, "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice." Phil. 4:4. The verses of this Psalm show us that our Lord is great, a great King; His hands formed the fruittul valleys, the lofty mountain peaks, the mighty sea, and the whole earth. Contemplating Him and His marvelous majesty should bring us to worship.
Make a Jovful Noise. Mark Guy Pearse was a joyous saint. When he knew that the time had come for his spirit to enter into the presence of the Lord, he made arrangemerits for his own funeral service. He chose the most triumphant songs in the hymnbook; he gave instructions that when the congregation sang, the organist was to "let out all the stops in the organ" so that a loud and joyous sound would be noised abroad on this glad occasion of a humble warrior's coming home to be forever with his King.
The Shepherd Who Gave His Life for the Sheep. While it is blessed to contemplate the Lord as Creator, it is still more wonderful to know Him as Saviour, as the Good Shepherd who laid down His life for His sheep. "We are the people of His pasture, and the sheep of His hand," that hand which was pierced. How much we owe

to the blood of the everlasting covenant, the lifeblood of our wondrous Shepherd that makes us clean and white and spotless. To Him be glory for ever and ever. The contemplation of Calvary should make a happy and holy worshiper out of every one of us.
Today if $Y e$ Will Hear His Voice. Do not fail to study the last part of Psalm 95. It is the call to the sheep to hear the Shepherd's voice, to diligently hearken to all He has to say to them. We are reminded of Israel's failure and our own, our many murmurings and complainings. It is a call to repentance, to turn from our own way of rebellion and sin, and to move into God's way of faith and obedience. As we closely follow the Shepherd, harkening day by day to His voice as He speaks to us from

His ever-living Word and by His ever-present Spirit, He will bring us into His glorious rest. There is a place of eternal rest. It is in our Lover Lord Himself. Our continuous prayer should be

Like John upon his Master's breast,
Here let me lean, here let me rest.
Praise the Lord All Ye Gentiles. Psalm 100 is another call to continuous singing. It is not a call to Israel only, but to all the earth. As a sixteenth century hymn puts it:

All people that on earth do dwell, Sing to the Lord with cheerful voice, Him serve with fear, His praise forthtell, Come ye before Him and rejoice.
It is God's call to all nations to enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise; to be thankful unto Him, and to bless His name.
Why Should We Praise Him? Because "the Lord is good; His mercy is everlasting; and His truth endureth to all generations." Is not the Lord
good to provide so great a salvation as. He has at Calvary? Has He not been gracious and merciful to us, blotting out all our sins when He heard us cry, "God be merciful to me a sinner"? And is He not eternally faithful in keeping all that is committed unto Him? When we contemplate His goodness, His mercy, His faithfulness, "it seems as if eternal days are far too short to sound His praise."
How Should We Worship? Our Lord Jesus calls us to worship the Father in spirit and in truth. This is a call to enter into a spiritual worship of Jehovah that takes us beyond the bent knee and lip worship to the bent heart and to the utterance of the broken spirit that loves and adores the Lamb. The secret of true spiritual worship is set forth in Eph. $5: 18$, in the constant drinking deeply of the Spirit. As we are daily anointed with fresh oil, as we are freshly filled every day with this heavenly wine, out of the abundance of our joyous hearts we shall speak to ourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs. We listen to and appreciate the songs of the birds, but we have more to praise for than they. From the rising of the sun to the going down of the same the Lord's name is to be praised, and if we are filled with the same blessed Holy Spirit that filled the sweet singer of Israel, our hearts and our lips also will be constantly filled with joyous praise.S. ## THE ANARCHIST'S STORY

The mission was an obscure one in the city of Paris. There were quite a number of men and women seated on rough benches. I found a seat, and was immediately struck by the beautiful shape of the man's head behind whom I sat. I said to myself, "This is no ordinary man."
Three or four men gave their testimony, and then my neighbor rose. He told us his name was Henri Fleming, that he was a Belgian, and that, as an anarchist, he had determined to destroy the French President and the members of the Government, and as many as possible of other prominent Frenchmen. So, with his wife and child, he came to Paris and rented an attic in a tenement house. Before, however, he could do anything he suddenly lost the use of his limbs. His wife had him carried to a hospital, and there he lay for thirty and eight weeks, hoping for recovery. Then the distinguished head of the hospital -one of the very persons whom the anarchist wanted to kill-came and spoke very kindly to him, and said that they had done everything they possibly could for him, and were very sorry that they had failed to heal him; and as they wanted his bed for a new patient, his friends would have to take him away. So-as he told us-with his heart a hell of cursing and bitterness, of rage and of murder, for he feared no devil and he loved neither God nor man, he was carried back to his attic.

A few days after his return home his little daughter fell ill, and her mother took her to a medical mission that was in the same street. The child quickly recovered. The woman then proposed to her husband that he also should go there. She had him taken there the next morning, and he was laid among the sick folk waiting for the attention of the doctor. Before attending them severally in a side room the doctor's habit was to read to them all together a passage from the sacred Scriptures. This particular morning he read from the fifth chapter of John, of the man with withered limbs (French text) whom Jesus healed.

As the anarchist listened, he said to himself: "This suits me, my legs are withered. And 'thirty and eight years' waiting to be healed! Why, I've been waiting for thirty and eight weeks! 'Wilt thou be made whole?' Of ceurse I will-why, that's what I'm here for!" Just then he seemed to hear a wonderfully tender Voice saying within him: "Jesus is God. He loves you. Trust Him!"
Presently his turn came to be carried into the consultingroom. The doctor examined him, and then said: "We will do our best for you. We do not promise to heal you, but you must help us. You have a worse disease in your soul-sin-than the disease that is in your body. Come as a sinner to the Lord Jesus. Ask Him to save you from your sins, and say to Him that, as to your legs, you will approve His action whether He cures them or not." ":Never!" shouted the man. "I'm here to get my legs cured, and nothing eles." Once more he heard the Voice saying: "Jesus is God. He loves you. Trust Him." A great struggle began in his mind. Again the Voice said: "Jesus is God. He loves you. Trust Him." The Holy Spirit bowed his heart; he covered his face with his hands and said, "Lord, save me from my sins; and, as for my legs, Thy will be done.'
When the anarchist reached this point in his story he drew himself to his full height, and bracing himself-and certainiy he looked a model of glorious manhood-he faced the men and said: "There's not a stronger man in Paris tonight than I am, nor a happier man. God heard my prayer and made me whole both in soul and body." Well-known Christian people in Paris told me that every word of his story was true.-George Williams.

## HEADQUARTERS BRETHREN'S ACTIVITIES

Brother Ernest Williams, our Superintendent, has been an active worker in the Young People's Conference just held in Springfield. He left Springfield on July 3 to attend the Oregon District Meeting. He will be preaching at Glad Tidings Tabernacle in San Francisco and Bethel Temple in Los Angeles, and then will be ministering at the Southern California Camp Meeting, at Pacific Palisades, Santa Monica, from July 23 to Aug. 3.
Brother J. R. Flower has also been an active worker in the Young People's Conference at Springfield. He has just gone to take part in the Eastern District Camp Meeting at Green Lane.
Brother Fred Vogler reports: "I was one of the speakers at the North Dakota camp meeting at Lakewood Park, near Devils Lake. It proved to be one of the most interesting camps I have ever attended. A spirit of prayer was prevalent throughout the entire camp and seekers never had to be urged to go to the prayer room. On the opening day of the camp six received the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, and from that time not a day passed but what someone received this glorious infilling. During the ten days of the meeting more than fifty were baptized in the Holy Ghost. In the last missionary service it was an inspiration to witness ninety-five young people standing to their feet in consecration, volunteering to go anywhere the Lord would send them.
"On our return trip from North Dakota we were privileged to spend Monday, July 1, at the North Central District camp meeting in Lake Geneva, Minnesota, where again we enjoyed the marvelous presence of our Lord. It seemed that after every service the prayer room would be filled with hungry seekers. Missionary zeal was running high. The camp meeting committee state that this has been one of the greatest camps held in Lake Geneva.
"Early in the season, before prices advanced, we were able to secure six $40 \times 60 \mathrm{ft}$. tents. These are all being used in home missionary endeavor. One was sent to the Potomac District, another to the Appalachian District, a third to New Mexico, and a fourth to Kentucky. A tent also has been sent to Fort Bliss, near El Paso, Texas where William Coxe Jr. assisted by Evangelist Harry Jaeger is conducting a revival meeting among the soldiers. Another tent is in operation at Fort Leonard Wood, Waynesville, Missouri. The report comes to us that a good meeting is in progress and there is real enthusiasm about this work among our soldier boys.
"The Home Missions Department has also purchased two tents in Georgia and has assisted in the securing of tents for the Alabama and Louisiana Districts."
These are anxious days for Noel Perkin, our Missionary Secretary, who is being kept very close to his office during these days when not a few of our missionaries are in peril. Brother Perkin was able to have some ministry at the Young People's Conference, for at the same time he could keep in close touch with his office. Constant cables from our missionaries are needing his prayerful attention. Pray for him and for our many missionaries who are living in the war zones.

Is it correct that Jesus was in the grave for three days, then appeared to His disciples during forty days, thus leaving seven, instead of ten days, that the disciples tarried until the Day of Pentecost was fully come?
For our answer we would look at Lev. 23:15. "And ye shall count unto you from the morrow after the Sabbath (Jesus rose on the morrow after the Sabbath) even unto the morrow after the seventh sabbath shall ye number fifty days." Thus the type shows that it was fifty days after the resurrection of Christ that the Day of Pentecost came.
In Hebrews 1:14 angels are called ministering spirits sent forth to minister to them that shall be heirs of salvation, but $I$ do not find that saints in heaven can be sent back as ministering spirits.

Angels are an entirely different order of being from human beings. Persons do not become angels when they die. The ministry of angels is revealed all through the Bible. An angel announced to Abraham that Sarah should have a son; angels encamped about Elisha to protect him; and angels blinded the wicked men of Sodom. The ministry of angels should be appreciated. At the same time they ought not to be worshiped. Rev. $22: 8,9$.

Help has been extended to missionaries from Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Switzerland, England, and Germany, as well as to scores of Christians and refugees in China and Europe who are suffering as a result of the war.
The fact that such assistance is deeply appreciated is evidenced by letters constantly received in the Missions Department which simply brim over with gratitude and thankfulness.

## Lightening the Load

One missionary, whose name and location for obvious reasons we are omitting, writes, "I am penning these few lines in a weak effort to convey to you my heartfelt gratitude for your kind consideration of myself and my dear wife during our time of deep trouble. We thank you from the bottom of our hearts for your kind offers of aid, for your generosity, and above all for your prayers on our behalf. I was released on the day of my 'trial,' March 30, 1941, after having spent 7 months and 3 days in military prison. If only you knew, I am sure that you would thank God for His answer to all your prayers. After such an experience we never can forget what we owe to those who so faithfully have prayed for us. More we cannot write, but we know that you will understand."

## "Before They Call

A missionary of the British Assemblies in West China who received help from our fund sends the following message: "As we do not know the source of the gift, we write you desiring to express our most sincere thanks to the donors, also testifying to the unfailing faithfulness of our Jehovah Jireh. 'Before they call I will answer' has been literally fulfilled in our experience recently. During the past week we had become somewhat concerned regarding our circumstances and need. Although it seemed almost impossible we prayed that somehow God would supply. To our surprise and joy we find that supply has come via the United States, which makes the answer more remarkably intensified by the fact that it was coming long before we knew our need, praise God. The money came at the right time."

## FIRST FRUITS AT FAN LING

## Lula Bell Hough, South China

Just a little more than a year ago we were definitely led to Fan Ling, and as we watch the work grow by leaps and bounds we are more than convinced that this is of God.
With a group of converts waiting to be baptized, we felt the need of a baptistry in our mission. Scarcely daring to hope that our little group could afford such a venture, we took the step of faith two months ago, and before the baptistry was completed funds were on hand to pay for it.
Then on May 18 we realized our first fruits when Brother Park, of Hong Kong, officiated at our baptismal service. Nineteen were ready
for baptism but only twelve of the number were able to attend the service. Several of this group since becoming Christians have suffered severe persecution in their homes, but we are confident that He who has saved them will strengthen and bring them out more than conquerors.
You will notice the little gurl at the extreme right of the group pictured. This is Ch'ui K'am who is eleven years of age and who has attended our services from the beginning. She was one of the first to express a desire to follow the Lord. Last year Ch'ui K'am started a prayer group among the children at school. During recess period, instead of playing as did the other children, she gathered some of her schoolmates who also attended our Sunday School and went to a near-by hill to pray for her parents and for other needs. Her father, Mr . Siu, is standing just behind her in the picture, for he too has found Jesus as His Saviour.

## Expectations Exceeded

We had set before us as an objective one hundred scholars in our Sunday School, but the Lord has done far more than we ever thought or expected-we now have 170 children on the roll. Praise His name! For two Sundays we did not have sufficient seats and had to let the overflow sit on the floor on mats, but the Lord has undertaken in this need too. Ten large benches have been loaned to us until October and fifty-eight stools given for the Sunday School rooms.
With the increase of scholars we have had to open four new classes. Our greatest problem is to find teachers and workers, but we feel there is good material in our midst. We have opened a preparation class where we are training a group of fifteen who are eager to be of service to the Lord in Sunday School and church work.
With the growth of our Sunday school we find the other services of the church are growing also. Interest is increasing and we see new faces in the meetings nearly every Sunday. We covet your prayers for Fan Ling.

of Christian literature are distributed. When we commence singing it is a sight to see children and adults coming out of their hovels, countrymen dismounting from their mules, and a crowd gathering about our group to listen to the "beautiful words of life." Though we cannot speak their language fluently, somehow with God's help we tell them the story of His love and His power to save the worst of $\sin -$ ners ... and then we invite them to attend our mission in their village.
Last Sunday night the Lord gave us a precious service at the little mission in San Pedro. Previously the people had been very noisy and at times boys would throw stones on the hause and do other things to disturb us; but that night a spirit of conviction prevailed. Several came forward to surrender to Christ, evidencing sincerity and real hunger for God. For us this is a victory and we ask prayer that those who have made the start in the new life of Christ will continue in this way.
This is supposed to be the rainy season of the year, but it has failed to rain. The weather is depressingly hot. The fruit falls from the trees unripe, and the garden dries up. How parched and hard the land is without water from heaven . . . and the same can be said of the hearts of the people, for unless God pours out upon us the Latter Rain, it will be impossible to gather a harvest of souls.

## STRIPPING FOR THE RACE

"We do not know how long doors of opportunity may remain open," writes Ada Reitz, Transvaal, South Africa, "and we are trying to redouble our efforts in every possible direction. In other words, we are stripping for the race. Our missionary policy is being scrutinized as never before and we are seeking to arrange the affairs of the mission that should we have to leave the field the natives would be in a position to carry on. The words of the old, familiar hymn come to mind,

## 'Stand up, stand up for Jesus,

"We have started regular monthly meetings with the eight native ministers in this vicinity, for the purpose of Bible study, discussion of problems in the work, prayer and fellowship.

## Rough Travel!

"The mission truck which Miss Waite brought with her when she returned from furlough is proving a real blessing in the work.
"I should like to picture to you a drive we had yesterday (Sunday) through the veldt. In the first place we were to conduct an early morning meeting in a heathen village which was off the main road. We had to drive along a footpath, picking our way, not knowing when we would encounter a stump hidden in the grass. These usually do the greatest damage to the car.
"We held our meeting and then started out in another direction to take a service at an outstation where the worker was ill. In order to save eleven miles we took a short cut through the trackless veldt. First we found ourselves in grass as tall as the car, next in a sandy river bed, and finally driving through a freshly plowed field. Here all climbed out except the driver and with the help of the men the car was pushed across. On nearing the place of meeting, we advertised our coming by blowing the horn which makes more noise than the piece of iron hung in a tree that serves as a bell at other times.
"After the service we came on to Lebaka for the noon meeting where the power of the Lord was very manifest.
"In closing, we want to thank the Lord for His faithfulness, and also to thank you who have prayed for and contributed to the work."

were seven saved that night. But after everybody had gone home there was a boy kneeling in the corner. He was the pastor's son, Nathan Smith. I thought I would not pray with him. I wanted to go home. I had had nothing to eat. I thought I had gone through more than I ought to go through as a minister. The Lord sald to me, "You go and pray for that boy." I got down and put my arm around Nathan and prayed with all my might, and God came down from heaven and baptized him with the Holy Chost.

Everybody had gone home including the folks I stayed with. I did not have a fivecent piece in my pocket and I had seven miles to walk home. The devil was giving me every argument he could for quitting the ministry. I suppose every minister has those occasions some time or other, and young folks have had them sometime in their lives. Nathan had gotten up and gone to his home near by where his father and mother were, and told them he had received his Baptism, and there I was all alone. The devil said, "The preacher has gone home, the preacher's son has gone home, you cannot ask for a nickel for carfare. You have to walk seven miles, and you have had nothing to eat. You will faint on your way home.' That was the argument he gave me.

I remember as I was kneeling at the altar, I heard the door of the church vestry open, and I heard the sound of a peculiar walk. It was that of the brother I stayed with. He
limped as he walked. I thought, "I don't know why he is here." He came up behind me-I was still praying, trying to get the victory over the thing that was troubling me-and he said, "Here!" and stuck a dollar in my pocket. I got the victory right then. I stayed right there and kept on praying and praising the Lord.

After a while I got up and started out of the church and the pastor came and expressed his appreciation and enjoyment of the service, and thanked God for his boy's getting the Baptism. He helped me on with my overcoat and reached down and pulled the flaps out. I walked down the street and thought to put the flaps back inside and then I felt something. I said, "What's that?" I pulled it out. I could not see in the dark what it was. I hurried down to the corner where a street light was hanging. and I opened it up-and it was a five dollar bill! I jumped up and down and I said, "Glory, glory, glory !" There was a policeman down on the corner. He started to walk towards me and then he just stood there and folded his arms. I said, "Bless God, I have got $\$ 6.00$ for 15 c ! Hallelujah !"
