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## Preparation for Reiqning with Christ

(2)HERE are some about whom we know little, whose names are immortalized in Scripture. We do not know much about Jabez except that his mother called him the "son of her sorrow" and that he prayed a simple prayer, the record of which is preserved in the Book: "Oh that Thou wouldest bless me indeed, and enlarge my coast, and that Thine hand might be with me, and that Thou wouldest keep - me from evil, that it might not grieve me." And it is written that God granted him that which he requested.
Sometimes prayers of this character are costly. David had an enlargement, but his enlargement came when he was in distress. Psalm $4: 1$. He had been anointed to be king of Israel, but there was one upon the throne who hated him, who envied him, who sought his life. David had to flee. He had to be very dependent upon the Lord for the preservation of his life. He was chased out of the land he loved and driven far away from the tabernacle. His long-
ing continually was to be there, joining with others in worship of Jehovah. But down in the cave of Adullam, with a crowd of undesirables, God gave him an enlargement of heart, and with his enlarged heart he magnified the Lord. Out from his distress came praises that are immortal. The way of distress was the way of enlargement.
And thus the man who was diminished and brought low was made one who could ably reign over God's people Israel.

Moses was chosen from his mother's womb to be a prophet of God. He was rescued from death by Pharaoh's daughter and reared in the court of Pharaoh. He was instructed in all the learning of a country that was noted for its learning. But what does learning do? Learning puffs

up. Moses, filled with self-confidence, thought he could bring about the deliverance of his nation from the hand of the oppressor. He imagined that his people would have confidence in him since he had had such a remarkable training at the court of king Pharaoh, and that they would accept him as their leader to take them back to the land that God had promised their father
of Israel in the land of Persia. Vashti, the queen, had been debased, and the king wanted someone to take her place. He chose a maiden who was of the Jewish captivity. She was a humble maid who was willing to yield to the word of her guardian Mordecai. A crisis hour came for those who were in captivity. A decree had gone forth that all Jewry was to be destroyed. Mordecai asked the maid to make petition for the lives of her people. It was no small task to go and petition this tyrant king, for there was a rule that any who entered into his presence, who had not his favor, should be destroyed.
Mordecai said to her, "If thou altogether holdest thy peace at this time, then shall the enlargement and deliverance arise to the Jews from another place . . . who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" Esther answered Mordecai, "Go, gather together all the Jews that are present in Shushan, and fast ye for me, and neither eat nor drink three days, night or

Abraham. But filled with all the knowledge of Egypt, puffed up with all that he knew, he was too big for God to use.

So the Lord took him into the wilderness to be "minished and brought low." Psalm 107:39. For forty years God was emptying out this man who had learned all that Egypt could teach him. And God put within him that which was essential-meekness of heart, lowliness of spirit, and an absolute dependence upon the power and presence of Jehovah. It was a man of humble, lowly, meek spirit who went forth to Egypt to deliver God's people, but he had with him the presence of the great I AM. He had been diminished, but he had also become enlarged.

There was a maiden among the captives
day: I also and my maidens will fast likewise; and so will I go in unto the king, which is not according to the law: and if I perish, I perish."

Esther was filled with compassion for her people. She was willing to intercede on their behalf even though it meant her own death. At that crisis hour the heart of the Jewish captive maid was enlarged. She made petition to the king. Was her intercession unavailing? No. God inclined the heart of the king to answer her petition. Haman, the enemy of Israel, was destroyed, and instead of there being a diminishing of the people of God, there was an enlargement.

We are living in days of like crisis. Many

# 2uartus, a Brother

egAIUS mine host, and of the whole church, saluteth you. Erastus the chamberlain of the city saluteth you, and Quartus a brother. Romans 16:23.
I have spent some time trying to find out something about Quartus, but I have been unable to find out much about him, except that Quartus means the fourth. The fourth Son was often given the name of Quartus. According to the custom of that day, the first son inherited the greater part of his father's estate, the second son something less ; the third son usually got most of what was left, and the fourth son often was the recipient of very little of what his father possessed. But as I read the entire last chapter of the Book of Romans, I find Paul had singled out one outstanding character in that entire closing chapter when he said, "Quartus a brother." I really feel he singled him out for singular blessing when he called him a brother.

Some years ago when I first began preaching, I had varied ambitions. I like to see people with ambitions. There is no place in God's plan for a lazy Christian. God wants Christians who have ambition and who are willing to work. There is no place in God's plan for a lazy preacher, and if he is lazy he will never get anywhere. God expects us to have ambition, and to put our hands and feet and our whole self into the work of God.

I have always believed in having a destination. I have met many people who are not going anywhere and who have no plans for getting to any given place in a certain time. The result is, they never make a success of anything they do. Christians, under God, ought to mark out a plan according to what they believe to be the will of God, and work in that direction. Amen!
I had planned largely on what I believed would give me personal satisfaction while serving God. I first wanted to preach to a big congregation. I felt maybe God would sometime let me be a preacher. At that time some of my friends told me if I could land a job I should take it, because I would never make a preacher anyway, and it would save me and my father embarrassment. However, God had called me to preach. I never had any ambition to be a preacher although God had called me, for I felt there was nothing easy about it. I asked God to help me, and I am still praying and asking God for help, and believing that some day I shall realize more of the things I desire.

I wanted to preach to a great crowd If you could see the crowds I preached to, you would realize why. I was preaching on an Indian Reservation, and sometimes I had eight, and sometimes as many as fifteen. The offering ran anywhere from a dime up to twenty-five cents. It took all my money for gas and light, and I spent my time chopping wood in order to have wood for the fire. I did not have any church, I did not have a good suit of clothes, not even a necktie, I did not get a haircut even for
three long months. I did not complain, but I was anxious for God to give me a crowd to preach to.

Then I had ambitions to pastor a big church sometime, and I felt if I could only achieve this I should feel supremely happy. I also wanted to get on the presbytery. I never told anybody that. $\bar{I}$ felt in my heart if the Lord would only trust me to be a presbyter, I should be happy. Now I think that is the most thankless job in the world. You sit up all night, and if anything is accomplished the other fellow usually gets the credit. I had other ambitions, but these three are the ones I have singled out to mention here.

God was kind to me. In the first five or six years of my ministry God smiled upon my life and gave us a splendid revival after a long drought. Right out of heaven it came. We had been four weeks and two nights without a soul at the altar, and then God broke the heavens open and down came the blessings that filled our hearts. In a few nights we were out of the little church into a big auditorium. This proves to me that God can get the crowd any time, if you and I can believe Him to help us. And so I had a crowd.

I recall Brother Greisen was there that afternoon, and some of the other brethren, and God did give us a great service. When I walked out of the auditorium Brother Greisen came and put his hand on my shoulder-I was just a youngster-and he said, "Son, God did bless and help you today." I was grateful to God, but I had expected something in my own heart that was not there that day. Now don't misunderstand me. I was happy for the crowd, I was happy for God's blessings. I did not deserve it. But I had expected some feeling of satisfaction, some feeling of having accomplished something. That was absent from my heart, and I confess I suffered a letdown.

Some years went by. I was called to the church in Kansas City. God helped us there and blessed us in spite of ignorance, and gave us a splendid work. But even though living in a lovely home, having a wonderful church, a fine Sunday School, a large crowd-on Sunday nights many times we had only standing room-I did not have in my heart the satisfaction I had anticipated would be mine when I arrived at that place.

The brethren honored me by asking me to sit on the Presbytery, but even though I had achieved that goal it had not brought to my heart the satisfaction I had anticipated. I felt discouraged-not with what God was doing, but with myself. Have you ever been discouraged with yourself? Sometimes it is a good thing. You get to see where God is in the program.

I thought it would be nice if God would let me out of the ministry, and let me get a good job where I could support a church. I would not mind being a Sunday School officer or something like that; I would work hard and put my money into the church
and give to missions. I felt I did not have in my heart what I wanted there.

One day a man said to me, "I have been thinking about you. I wonder if you have been thinking,,of getting a job?" I said, "Yes, I have."

There are lots of people who forget the call of God. I had forgotten it momentarily. I thought, "Now I will resign from the Presbytery, and then later I will resign from the church; and then I will take this job and settle down. I will go to church, I will love the Lord, I will stay a Christian, but I will let somebody else have the job of preaching. The world is full of preachers anyhow." I had not consulted God about it. I wrote out my resignation and took it to Wichita to the Presbyters' meeting in Brother Vogler's home. I sat in the Presbyters' session all day and kept it in my pocket. I thought, "Now tomorrow when the afternoon comes I will hand it in."

On the morning of the day when I was to hand it in in the afternoon, a young preacher wanted to see me. Mrs. Vogler called me downstairs. This fellow was standing on the porch. He wanted to surprise me. I pushed the door open and stepped out on the porch, and he threw his arms around me, and the tears were running down his cheeks. He sobbed and cried and would hardly let me go. He said, "Brother Long, I am in a hard place." I knew that. We had discussed it in the Presbyters' meeting. He hardly had bread on the table. For weeks he ate carrot soup every day.

He began to pour his heart out to me and said, "I told my wife we must not be discouraged. God is good to us." I listened to his story and it just pounded my heart into bits. And then he said, "I came over here. I walked most of the way. I can take it. But I need some brother. You have been just like a real brother to me. You were there when I was saved and I kind of look to you. And I said to my wife, 'I can walk to Wichita; if I can only see Brother Long, he can help me.'

I could not even help myself! There I was, ready to quit, ready to give up preaching, ready to take an easy job where I could make good money, ready to settle down and let the work of God go. I thought, "Here is a boy eating carrot soup, living in one room, with a stove in the corner for heat. He is suffering. But he is not discouraged, he does not want to quit; he just wants some help from me." And so I helped him. And when I helped him, I helped myself.

When I got off my knees I had something inside I had never had before. I had been saved, I had been filled with the Spirit; but now I had just learned what I wanted to be-I wanted to be " $a$ brother."

I tore my resignation to pieces and tossed it in the wastebasket on my way back to the Presbyters' meeting, and then went home and sought the face of God. God gave us a revival. Brother Welch came up, and in the next week or two fifty or sixty were baptized in the Holy Ghost. The glory of God came down.

Since then I have been praying and asking God not to give me a big crowd to preach to all the time, but to let me be a brotherfor I can say honestly that the greatest privilege in my life today is the privilege of speaking to someone who is discouraged or heavy hearted, someone who needs a friend. Oh, how much we need brothers in the church today! We have lots of evan-
gelists, lots of preachers, lots of singers, lots of deacons, lots of all kinds of people in authority, but we do not have nearly as many brothers as we need in the church today.

People are sitting in these seats who will never be touched by the pastor's sermon or the evangelist's message. People walk in and out of our churches who will never be touched by the choir's singing or the special number; but they would be touched if somebody would walk down and clasp their hand and say, "God bless you, Brother!" There are people who come to this church like they do to every other church, and they are praying for a brother. What a need there is for brothers. Amen!

Not so many months ago i was in bed. I had been ill about six months. I remember one Sunday morning I was lying in much pain, and I heard some little voices outside the door. My wife had gone to church. My heart longed to be in the house of God. You may not appreciate God's house this morning, but if you had to stay away for six months you would grow so hungry to hear the people sing, to hear a prayer, to hear a sermon.

This morning I heard some little voices in the hall, and I begged the nurse to let those fellows in. She promised she would, and in filed six or seven little fellows. They brought me some flowers. They were newsboys, boys I had liked to talk with.

I seem to be without dignity; I like to talk to the little fellows on the street. They remind me of the time when I used to stand on a street corner and sell papers. It stays right in my soul. There they stood. One little fellow was the spokesman, and he said, "Mr. Long, we hope you will be getting well soon." And he twisted his finger in his hat. "We miss you on the corner, so we ,got together and brought these flowers."

That was all they had to say. And so I talked with them for a moment. Then each one shook my hand and they stood still while I prayed, and they wiped the tears out of their eyes as they left.

God had wonderfully blessed me there with flowers. Some had been cabled from France-God bless the ones who sent them -and standing right near were two dozen American Beauty roses. That night they wanted to take all the flowers out of the room as they said they were taking all the oxygen out of the air; but when they wanted to take away the six little roses these poor boys had brought, I said, "You can take away the other flowers, but leave these."

Those flowers came from the little fellows who wanted to be brothers to somebody whom they felt had wanted to be a big brother to them, and I considered them the greatest bouquet that ever came inside my room, because they came from little hearts that were filled with that desire to be a brother.

One day when I was so busy in the temple I could hardly find time to do my work, a man came to see me. He had an oldfashioned bowler hat and clothes thirtv years out of date, and he said, "Can I talk to the pastor?" I said, "Surely." He told me his story, how he loved God, how he had been a Christian, sailing around the world: told me all the ships he had sailed on, and how he had always served God no matter

When he had finished his story, I had a word of prayer with him, and then I said, "Dad, what can I do for you?" He answered, "Nothing." "Do you need a meal?" "No, sir." "Have you a room?" "Yes, sir." Well, I wondered what he came for. I said, "What was your object in coming to see me? Is there something I can do?" He said, "I have walked up and down the streets of the city and knocked at the door of one pastor's study after another, trying to find somebody who would let me in. I just wanted to sit down and unburden my heart, that's all."

I bade him good-by and saw him go down the walk. His face was lit up. I stood and watched him. I had spent twenty-five minutes with him, and did not think they had been wasted. The next Sunday as I came on the platform and sat down, in the front row of the section to my left sat the little man with two of his friends, and his face was illuminated. We had testimony meeting and when he stood up he paid me the greatest compliment I have ever had when he said I was a pastor who could be a brother. He was far away from England, his homeland, and he needed a friend and a brother.

I could not begin to tell how many people have been brothers to me. It has been an uphill pull every inch of the way. One day when we were having a battle, two preachers and their wives drove in to see us and we had them stay to the evening meal. We had a wonderful visit with them. And when they left, after they had had worship with us, they said, "The Lord bless you, Brother Long. We thought of you over
here, and we drove over."

If they had only known, that day I was just flat up against the wall, so to speak. I could hardly believe I could face one more day in the battle, but the next day I found I was strong again to do the work I had to do, all because of a brother. There are thousands of men and women who need a brother worse than they need a preacher; they need a brother worse than anything in the world.
$I$ have lots of brothers around the world, but I have one blood brother. He and I have been inseparable all my life. When we were little fellows we slept together, we sold papers together on the street, we worked together. He was a Christian before I was, and then he prayed for me until God softened my heart. My brother used to make mistakes, but nobody knew from me that he was not perfect. If anybody said a word about him I was ready to fight. In fact, I had my nose skinned more times in my life defending my brother than in any other way. When he did wrong, if. the world said a word about him I would stand up for him, but when we got alone I would say, "You little brat; didn't you know any better than to do that?" To the world I was his defense.
I thank God from the bottom of my heart for brothers, for men who have real-
ly been brothers to me when I have suffered heartache and pain and have lifted the load off my heart. I pray that God will give us more real brothers.
I remember when I journeyed to see my own blood brother in St. Louis. Paul would not go to church because he could not pay the price to preach. I went and talked to him. I had never hit him in my life, buṭ that time I said, "Sit down and listen to me, or I will knock you down and make you listen by sitting on you." He said, "Bill, would you do that to me?" I said, "I will do it if you don't listen. I have come to tell you what God has told me to tell you, and I am going to say it." When we finished that meeting the sun was coming up. and Paul was kneeling down by my knee. He was willing to give up his job and make any sacrifices. He said, "I don't care what I have to face, I will do it."

On the fourth day of April when he knelt in the church at Des Moines and was ordained my heart was filled with joy. He was my brother. But better than all, beside him knelt another lad I had met, who one time threw a handful of sand into my gas tank. The same night he was to go home with me; but he did not know that. One the way home the car stopped. It was thirty degrees below zero and as we stood by the road working on this carburetor the lad asked me if I could still sing, "Are We Downhearted?" our theme song in that revival, and we sang it standing by the car. I knew that he was the one who had thrown the sand into the carburetor, but I did not feel to scold him for it. Several nights after that he came to the altar and gave his heart to God. Now after ten years I see him kneeling in the altar at the ordination service; not my blood brother but a brother none the less.

One day I gave a man something to eat, got him a room, got him a bed. And the last day of my crisis in the hospital, having been twenty-one days at death's doorcould not speak or hold a conversation, could not lift my hand, could have no visitors except my wife or father and they could only stay ten minutes in twenty-four hours -the little man came to see me. I saw his face in the doorway and asked the nurse if he could come in. She let him in for two minutes and I shall never forget that visit as long as I live. He had in his hand a little box, and he laid it down on my bedside table. And he said, "Brother Long, you have been a brother to me, and I want to be a brother to you. Could I pray for you?" I told him he could. I could not talk, but at least I gave him the word. He took his hands and put them over mine and prayed one of those prayers like Elijah prayed when the fire came down from heaven. If I had to I could repeat that prayer.

When he walked out of the room the tears were running down my cheeks, and my nurse came to me and said, "I am sorry, I let him in ; I knew you would get nervous." I said, "I am happy." I had had visitors, but never visitors like that.

He was just a little man who had never prayed a prayer in public in his life, but he wanted to pray for me. And he left the little box with nine pieces of chocolate candy in it. It had been torn on one end, but he had fixed it up, with a little verse on it. He was writing as a brother. I had had (Continued on Page Five)

# "With Siqns Following" 

## Camments and a Cammendation

6UKE, "the beloved physician" (Col. $4: 14)$, and a frequent companion of Paul, began his remarkable narrative, the Gospel that bears his name, thus:
"Many writers have undertaken to compose accounts of the movement which has developed among us, just as the original eye-witnesses who became teachers of the message have handed it down to us. For that reason, Theophilus, and because I have investigated it all carefully from the beginning, I have determined to write a connected account of it for Your Excellency, so that you may be reliably informed about the things you have been taught." Luke 1:1-4, Smith-Goodspeed translation.

That Luke had the help, the anointing, the inspiration of the Spirit, in his undertaking, there can be no question. And while he intended the narrative particularly for Theophilus, whoever Theophilus may have been, there can be no question about the fact that the Holy Spirit, who moved Luke to write, intended it for a great multitude of readers, and that it should have a place in the inspired canon of Scripture.

Luke is supposed to have written his Gospel about A. D. 65. He was almost as far removed at that time from the date of the crucifixion of our Lord, and the marvelous events that immediately followed that crucifixion, as we are at the present time from the date of the initial outpouring of the Spirit in these days of the Latter Rain. Marvelous things had taken place in the earth as a result of "the movement that had developed," and it is doubtless true that much false information, information that was misinformation, had been given out by the enemies of Christianity. Christianity's enemies were many in those days, for the Spirit of Christ is opposed to the spirit of the world-ever has been and ever must be. The Holy Spirit's object in moving Luke to write was that people might "be reliably informed."

Reliable information concerning the movements of God in the history of the world has always been important. And that God has been moving in an unusual manner during the past few years in every part of the inhabited earth, there can be no question. Much has been written concerning this Pentecostal movement, much that is true, and much that is not true. There was, perhaps, never a time when Satan endeavored more persistently to oppose the onward progress of the plan and program of God than he has during the past few decades. And one of his most favored weapons has been calumny

Several years ago the editor of the Pentecostal Evangel, Stanley H. Frodsham wrote a book entitled, "With Signs Following." This book has had a large circulation, and has been a great blessing in scattering the light near and far. It could hardly be called "a history of our movement." The Pentecostal movement in these last days has been so world-wide, and there has been so much connected with it, that one wonders if a
history of it, in the strictest sense of the term, could be written, even though the writer had the pen of a Gibbon. But if a history cannot be written "a connected account" can be. And this is what our brother did.

Several years have gone by, and during these years God has continued to work in a signal manner. Much has been learned concerning what God did at the beginning of the movement-much that was not known at the time the book, "With Signs Following," first appeared. Consequently there has been an increasing demand that the book be revised, and that a new edition be given to the world.

The demand has been met. The book has been thoroughly revised; much has been rewritten; new material has been added, and the narrative, in every respect, has been brought up to date.

Thee revised edition has just been issued from the press of our Gospel Publishing House, and I hasten to bespeak for it the largest sale of any book yet issued by our printing plant. This book ought to be in the library of every Pentecostal preacher, and in the home of every Pentecostal family in the land.

Our author reminds his readers at the outset that "in these last of the last days, the Lord God has not forgotten His promise given in Joel 2:28, 29, and the same Jesus" who shed forth that which the people in Jerusalem saw and heard at the initial outpouring of the Spirit on the day of Pentecost, "exalted at the right hand of the Father, is shedding forth His Spirit in identically the same manner as He did" at that time. And then he proceeds to show how as far back as the year 1854 there was one in New England who spoke in tongues and another who interpreted what was thus spoken. Testimony is introduced to show that there was a revival in New England in 1873 in which "talking in tongues, accom-

panied largely with the gift of healing, was manifested." He also shows how speaking with tongues characterized the great revival under Moody and Sankey in England in 1873. All this is very interesting. We see how God at that time was beginning to send the showers that we may regard as a prelude to the great downpour which has drenched multiplied thousands in every quarter of the earth.

The story of the reception of the Spirit by Brother Jethro Walthall away back in 1879 is very interesting. We had no distinctively Pentecostal organization in those days, and Brother Walthall became a Baptist minister, but the light which he had received was not countenanced by the Baptist ministry, and he was expelled from the church for what was called heresy. The specific charges against him were his "belief in the Holy Spirit Baptism, Bible Holiness and Divine Healing."

The stories which follow are of equal interest; the story, for instance, of Maria Gerber, the Swiss girl who had come "from that part of Switzerland where German is spoken" and who knew no other language, but who, having come to New York, "received the gift of the English language" in a very marvelous and miraculous manner, and "later went to Armenia as a missionary where she labored for many years. The story also of the Frenchman who spoke only in the French tongue, but who, being assigned to a position where it seemed imperative that he have an immediate knowledge of English "cried mightily to the Lord for help," and who "the following Sunday arose in meeting and was enabled to address his comrades in perfect English, and from,
that time had free use of this language." And of Daniel Awrey, who on the last night of 1889, "as the bells were ringing the old year out and the new year in," was spoken to by the Holy Spirit and assured "that God had for him a new and better experience," and who, the very next night at a prayer meeting, "claimed an immediate fulfillment of the promise," at which time "suddenly the Spirit fell upon him and he began to pray in an unknown tongue."

Equally interesting is the story of Pastor C. M. Hanson under whose ministry in 1895 "a person came clear through and spoke in tongues as in Acts 2:4," and who. "two years later prayed with another soul for the Baptism in the Holy Spirit," and whose prayer was signally answered, for "the Spirit came on her, and she leaped, shouted, praised God, sang, prophesied, and spoke in other tongues." All of which took place before Brother Hanson himself received this marvelous experience, for it was not until two years afterwards that he was filled and enabled to testify, "The Holy Spirit, then, as a person, took possession of His temple, speaking in other tongues, while I realized myself a listener and an instrument in the hands of the Almighty."
The author has furnished us with an account of the outpouring in Topeka, Kansas, in 1900, and of how newspapers sent reporters, and articles appeared in Kansas City and St. Louis papers, advertising the work, so that "some came to see what the Lord was doing;" of "the outpouring throughout the south," and in Los Angeles to which the message was carried from Houston, Texas. And of how the revival marvelously spread, the Christian and Missionary Alliance being favored with
gracious manifestation of the Spirit" at Beulah Park, Cleveland, Ohio, at which time Elder D. W. Kerr, now of sainted memory, and his wife, were baptized in the Holy Ghost.
He has told us also of the outpouring at Nyack, where many of the students of the Christian and Missionary Alliance training school were filled with the Spirit, among them our own W. I. Evans and D. H. McDowell, both of whom have been towers of strength in our Assemblies of God movement.
A record is provided also of the gathering of Pentecostal ministers at Hot Springs, Ark., in 1914, at which time the General Council of the Assemblies of God came into existence. As indicating the signal manner in which God has put His stamp of approval upon what the brethren did at Hot Springs, I quote in full the paragraphs that follow :
"In the years that have followed this organization has become a large one. On December 26, 1940, the records of the Assemblies of God showed there were 4,016 ordained ministers in the fellowship, and 3,930 affiliated churches with a membership of approximately 200,000 . At this time there were 393 missionaries laboring in fortyeight foreign countries. The Missionary Secretary, Noel Perkin, reports that in foreign lands there are 1,420 assemblies set in order and other regular meeting places, 62 mission institutions such as Bible Schools, orphanages, and elementary schools, and 1,018 native workers, pastors, evangelists, and Bible women. In 1939 the sum of $\$ 410,000$ was received for Foreign Missions, and in 1940, \$499,500.
"This organization has its headquarters at Springfield, Missouri, where it has a large publishing house employing about 125 workers, and a Bible School where there are nearly 350 students in training for the ministry. The Pentecostal Evangel, the nfficial organ of the Assemblies of God, has a circulation at the time this book is being published of nearly 75,000 copies weekly. A full line of Sunday School literature is published for 6,200 Sunday Schools."
A sectarian spirit is foreign to the spirit of Pentecost. This fact is reflected in this paragraph :
"The Assemblies of God is not the only organized Pentecostal work in this country. There are several others that are doing a splendid work and standing for the same fundamental truths of the Word."
Our brother has written concerning "the Pentecostal Flame in Canada," "the Pentecostal Outpouring in the British Isles,", the "Revival in Norway and Denmark," the "Continuous Revival in Sweden," "Marvelous Miracles in France,", "Pentecost in Various European Lands," "Latter Rain Falling in India and Ceylon," and "The Outpouring in China." He has told us in considerable detail concerning the moying of the Spirit in Egypt and other parts of Africa, in South America, among the Latin Americans, in Central America, and among the islands of the sea. No great field in which God has been working in Pentecostal power in these last days has been overlooked.

The book contains a very interesting chapter on "A Sign to Them that Believe Not," and another on "Pentecostal Out-
words, "During the past nineteen centuries, in times when the spiritual life ran high, the Holy Spirit has been received just as at Pentecost, with the accompanying manifestation of speaking in tongues." This statement is accompanied by reputable testimony, beginning with that of Irenaeus, Tertullian and Justin Martyr. Irenaeus is generally regarded as the connecting link between the Apostles at the beginning and later adherents to the cause of Christ, as he was a pupil of Polycarp, and Polycarp was a disciple of the Apostle John.
The writer of this review regrets that space forbids further quotations from this excellent work. He will simply add that its publication marks, in his opinion, an epoch in this movement which has stirred the whole inhabited earth and which has increased in power as the years have come and gone, and we trust will continue to roll on in ever increasing fullness until the Lord shall come and rapture His church.
The authoress of the very interesting "Historical and Secret Memoirs of the Empress Josephine," in her preface says, "It is pleasant to read a good book; but it is not so very easy to write one. The first condition, and the one which is the most rarely observed, is, unity of object and in terest ; the second, and which must be reconciled with the first, is, to describe events well, and to seize the different shades of each picture." Brother Frodsham, in my opinion, has met both of the conditions successfully, and he has indeed written "a good book," and has done it in the face, of the fact that it was "not so very easy" to do. The interest of the reader will
therefore be sustained from the beginning to the end.
I know of no book that is so packed with information concerning the Pentecostal movement, and that so bids fair to be a recognized authority on the subject as the years pass by, if Jesus tarries, if indeed any merely human volume can be spoken of as an authority on any subject.
The greatest care has been taken to establish the truth of every statement made, and if any person should discover that in some particular instance the writer has overstated or understated a single fact, he can rest assured that it was not due to the fact that the author in even the minutest particular was careless.
If we are wise we shall do our best to get this book into the hands of all our people, and into the homes of those who are interested in our movement but have not yet sought for the divine fullness and been filled with the Spirit. May its circulation speedily reach a hundred thousand copies, and be translated into many foreign tongues!

# How Mudishi Faund Gad 

A True Story by F. P. Burton, Congo Belge

Mudishi was desperate. He had done all a man can do against the gospel testimony at Mpyana Mbayo, but now he found himself yearning after it.

At this juncture he received a serious setback. Some young fellows had professed faith in the Lord Jesus, but they were serving two masters.

Mudishi went to unburden his heart to them, and to tell them all he yearned for. He hesitated to go to the teachers, for he had insulted them so often, but he thought that some of the new believers might help him.

Alas, he found them in the forests behind their huts, sitting round the beerpots with godless companions. He was disgusted, and turned on them furiously, saying: "If you want to be Christians, then be Christians out and out. If you want to be heathen, then be heathen, but what is this? This morning you were singing 'Take my life and let it be consecrated, Lord, to Thee,' but now you are half drunk, and enjoying the company of the enemies." And he walked away in disgust.

His dead wife's relatives, eaten up with cupidity, would have picked his very bones if they could have gained by it. The more he paid, the more they demanded. The original gun and money, with very much more, had long been handed over. He hadn't a thing left, and scarcely dared to be found with food, lest they snatch it from him. They were out to make his life intolerable, and to snatch the last possible morsel from their victim, declaring that unless he continued to pay, his deceased wife's spirit would dog his steps with every possible misfortune. At last he asked: "Well, what more do you want?

The father-in-law demanded another 250 francs, and promised, after that, to free him of guilt. The demand flung Mudishi into despair. If ever a man drank gall and wormwood he did during the days that followed. His courage had deserted him. His hopes of wife and family were snatched from him. His erstwhile friends now looked the other way as they passed him, lest they should be expected to help him out of his dilemma. Those whom he had victimized as a policeman of the chief, now gloated over his discomfort. Even the chief and his counsellors, who had once been so friendly to him, were now afraid to show any kindness. They concluded that Mudishi must have grieved the spirits of the dead, or he would not be in such a predicament, and they felt that they must be loyal to the spirits of their forefathers, rather than to the suffering man.

As Mudishi sat in despair one morning, among the weeds and dirt, outside his unswept hut, contemplating suicide, the Spirit of God told old Shayoano to go and look him up. He approached with the greatest tenderness, and putting his hand on Mudishi's filthy shoulders, he said: "Son, how long are you going to continue fighting against God? We are praving for you. You are bound to be saved. Why not now ?" Mudishi's first thoughts, however, were
for the unreasonable demands of his father-in-law. He explained the situation to Shayoano. After a while in silent prayer, the old man said: "I will lend you my gun. Go down the Kahese path and have a good hunt. You are all wrought up by grief and despair. A day out in the forests will do you good, and will relieve your mind."

Mudishi thought, "But why the Kahese path? That's not the likeliest place for game: just a wilderness of rocky hills." However he went, and as he strode through the familiar woodlands, he weighed in his mind the question of the two religions. The heartless, hopeless worship of the dead, which had proved so utterly unable to help or to console him, and the untried grace of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The tiny, wriggly forest path leads past a marsh, and streams bordered by palm groves, then upwards through flower-strewn glades and still upwards to a ridge of massive rocks, thrown in giant profusion, like a rampart between two watersheds. It was just as he reached the ridge, with the vast miles of forest lands stretching behind him, and the new view of the Lualaba River and Valley bursting on his view ahead, that Mudishi suddenly halted, and to his own surprise looked up and prayed, "God, are you really a God of love? If you care for me, then help me, for Jesus' sake."
It was his first prayer, and the place where his old life disappeared, and the new life in Christ opened up before him.
"Please help me," and the cry had scarcely left his lips when his sensitive hunter's ear caught the sound of a rustle of leaves, and the rattle of hoofs on the rocks and stones. He pinched some powdered earth between his fingers, and flung it into the air to see from which direction the wind was blowing. A few minutes' stealthy stalking through the bracken and undergrowth, and there before him stood a massive male eland nibbling at the young shoots. It must have heard something which made it suspicious, for it lifted its head and ran off at a dignified trot. Mudishi knew that in another second it would be out of sight, but long training in the forests had taught him that when startled, an eland stands for a moment, to see what the danger is, before it makes a final dash for safety. yell, at the same time raising Shayoano's old gun to his shoulder. Then in that split second when the eland stopped to look the bullet crashed home, and the great beast fell dead almost at his feet.
Before its movements had ceased Mudishi flung himself on the grass beside it, and as his overwrought mind broke loose in a flood of tears, he cried, "Oh God, you are! Jesus is! Love is! Heaven is, and now I belong to You."

He cut off the eland's tail, as an evidence that he had killed game, and covered the body with leaves and bracken to prevent the high-flying vultures from spotting it. Then he made straight for Shayoano's home and the little chapel. The believers were there praying for him. His soul was so full of joy that he had forgotten about the eland as he burst in upon them, and holding up one hand with the gun, and the other hand smeared with blood, he shouted: "I believe on the Lord Jesus Christ."

The saints were not at all surprised. Indeed they had been expecting it. They all had to shake hands with him, and then they all kneeled together to thank God, to exhort him and to congratulate him on losing his burden of $\sin$.

Then someone asked: "But what is that in your belt, Mudishi?"
"An eland's tail. Oh I must tell you. There's a dead eland near the Kahese path."
Shayoano counseled: "You must give a leg to the chief, but do not eat the rest. Sell it when you have dried the meat, and pay your father-in-law. God has sent you that meat to deliver you from your difficulty.
When the chief saw the eland's leg, so heavy that Davida and Petelo staggered with it, he came to the conclusion that the spirits could not be so sorely displeased with Mudishi after all. Two days were spent out in the forest, cutting up, drying and selling the meat. There was no difficulty in disposing of it. The natives from Kibondwe and Kahese swarmed about him like flies, begging for just a little piece, and holding out their baskets and money.
On the second night the hunter found that he had 300 francs, and still sufficient meat to give a piece to each of those Christians who had prayed so faithfully for his salvation.
Of course his dead wife's family heard of the eland, and came to claim it, but it was gone. They were enraged, and demanded all the money that he had gained. However, he took them before the chief, and in the presence of witnesses he paid them their 250 francs. When they claimed more, and clamored for his sister, too, as a slave, the chief took Mudishi's part. He said: "If you, parents of the dead woman, are not content with what you have received, then I will take everything from you, as you have done from Mudishi.'
"Then at least you will allow us to take you to the river and to purify you," they said, but to everyone's surprise Mudishi stoutly refused, saying "I have done with lying heathen ceremonies for good."

He washed himself and bought a new cloth. Then he went straight back to the chief, who was seated with his headmen and police, and before the whole company he announced his faith in the Lord Jesus expressing his grief that he had been a bitter enemy to the children of God.

## The Racks of Success

And Samuel said: "When thou wast little in thine own sight wast thou not made the head of the tribes of Israel, and the Lord anointed thee king over Israel?" 1 Sam. 15:17.

A ship that had weathered storms of the Atlantic in all their fury lost its course and ran upon a hidden reef, which brought final destruction to that ocean vessel. Although the ship had weathered the fiercest gales of the Atlantic it met its final doom when sailing through the calm of evening.

Adversity is an excellent tonic for the Christian. David knew the meaning of adversity. "But in mine adversity they rejoiced, and gathered themselves together: yea, the abjects gathered themselves together against me, and I knew it not; they did tear me and ceased not. Psalm 35:15. Yet David rejoiced in the midst of adversity. Why?
"He who is low need fear no fall." When we are in the valley of adversity there is not a great deal of danger of a fall. When the storm is raging and the billows are leaping high we cling close to our Pilot and Guide. But it is the calm of life, the rocks of success which we must guard against. More ships, sailing the sea of life, have been wrecked by the "rocks of success" than were ever wrecked by the winds of adversity. The danger lies in the calm of the evening; perhaps after a fruitful voyage across the sea of life. The rocks of success are treacherous.

And Samuel said: "When thou wast little in thine own sight How wonderful to be little in our own sight! No matter how great we may become in the sight of others, let us remain low in His sight. Saul failed to remain "little" in his own sight. He was king! Why should he carry forth the command of God? Didn't he know better? Why should he utterly destroy? And Saul, the successful king of Israel, met his defeat on the rocks of success.

And David lamented with this lamentation: "The beauty of Israel is slain upon thy high places: how are the mighty fallen!" 2 Sam. 1:19. How? The rocks of success were too subtle for Saul.
"Ye mountains of Gilboa, let there be no dew, neither let there be rain, upon you, nor fields of offerings: for there the shield of the mighty is vilely cast away, the shield of Saul, AS THOUGH HE HAD NOT BEEN ANOINTED WITH OIL." 2 Sam. $1: 21$. And oil is a type of the Holy Spirit. What a tragedy! Once anointed with oil and now a wrecked bark on the rocks of success. How we need to remain humble in the sight of God!

It is far easier to avoid the pitfall if we know that it is in our path. Therefore, we may all realize that the rocks of success will wreck our bark unless we remain "little" in our sight. When we are "great" in our sight we become "little" in the sight of God.

One preacher of ability and anointing
was continually going through the valley of persecution. Trial after trial came his way. We should not complain amid persecution. God knows what is best for us. Paul had the same experience: "Yet of myself I will not glory, but in mine infirmities." 2 Corinth. 12:5. And this good brother knew what it was to be in the valley. Then there came a day when he passed the storms and entered the calm of life's sea. Suddenly, there was a crash! What happened? His bark was wrecked on the rocks of success, "AS THOUGH HE HAD NOT BEEN ANOINTED WITH OIL."

People wondered. What could have happened? The secret was this: He was "little" in his own sight when the storms were raging on the sea of life, but when he entered the calm he became "large" in his own sight.

Recently we were enabled to make a pioneer evangelistic trip into the very heart of darkest Liberia. It was a long and tiresome journey, traveling by hammock along the jungle trails. Our necessary food supplies and road equipment had to be carried on the heads and backs of the natives. When the loads seemed to become heavy the natives sang and chanted their songs of folklore in their own unique African tempo of rhythm, thus buoying up their spirits once again to "put strong," as they express it. We too gained fresh courage as our minds were quickened by the old familiar martial hymn, "Onward, Christian Soldiers, Marching as to War." Yes, praise God for the privilege of being a crusader in this invincible army of the Lord pressing ever onward -blazing new trails and possessing spiritual ground for the Master.

## Jungle Travel

The day's march was from early morning when the sparkling dew still kissed the jungle foliage, until the captivating hour of the tropical sunset when all creation became as an enchanted ethereal paradise of heavenly glory.

Our entire trip covered some four hundred miles of rough, winding jungle trail which led into many difficulties and hazards-but it also led to thousands of benighted souls who had never heard of Christ. For days we journeyed through dense jungle forests with enormous trees interlaced with lianas and vines, through dangerous bogs and innumerable swamps. At times the river beds were part of the trail we followed, while at other times we crossed the rivers on a single pole which served as our bridge. Again, we toiled up the slopes of the hugest hills, forced at times to pause and catch our breath. The weather was hot and damp; the intense heat enervated our bodies and sapped our vitality.

## Prayer Alone Can Prevail

Many towns were visited with this glorious gospel and we saw a marked degree of definite conviction as the Word went forth. In the course of their journey they came to a small tribe which had ben visited occasionally through the years and from which the "first fruits" of a church were called out when our missionaries were there three months previously. Already one of their number had assumed the place of leadership, gathering the people regularly for praise and worship.

When these two brethren arrived the joy of the Christians was great. The leader, in his zeal to make their visit altogether pleasant, concealed from them the fact that his mother was in a near-by house critically ill. Not until the second day of their visit did they learn of this, when he carried her a bucket of bath water and to his horror found her apparently dead. Immediately the alarm was given and the people according to their custom gathered around her to wail. Helplessly and sadly the two visitors looked on until.

Said Deacon Peter to Deacon James: "When Jesus was upon earth and came into such a place as this, He DID SOMETHING." As His followers they decided to do something too. They began to pray. Others joined them. They kept on praying. Finally the woman who, as far as they could ascertain was dead, sat up, then stood up. The women took her to the outside bath house, bathed her, brought her back, and the deacons said, "Now give her something to eat."
Of course the news spread abroad so that people from all around came flocking in to look with amazement at these Christians who had been given such faith-while our workers in turn rejoiced at the opportunity of pointing them to the Saviour of their souls.
In this tribe and another small one near by there is not one person who can read. They say one man can read two verses from the fourteenth chapter of John, but we realize that he has memorized the verses. Hungry souls -from all the precious truths given to us in the Book they have access only to two verses. James and Peter want to go back soon and spend a week with them.

Such needs make us feel that we must go to them at once-yet we know we are serving in God's appointed place, for we work by multiplication rather than addition. The students to whom we minister daily are reaching approximately 500 needy souls as they go into towns and villages for meetings during the week ends. The harvest is great-pray ye therefore.

## ANSWER TO PRAYER

"God has been blessing in our midst," says Elizabeth Maynard. "A few weeks ago we witnessed a wonderful answer to prayer. One of our girls had been poisoned and lay unconscious for eight hours. When she finally recovered consciousness she was unable to speak and it looked as if she would die-but God answered prayer, granting deliverance. The next day the girl remained weak but the third day she was up, walking around. The people exclaimed in amazement, 'What kind of a juju does Ma have this time? We know that sickness is bad enough to kill a person. The girl looked as if she was going to die, and now in this short time she is able to walk.' Thank God for answered prayer!"

## THIRSTING FOR THE LIVING GOD

"In all the tribes around," writes Florence Steidel, "it seems people are hungry for God as I have not seen since coming here in 1935. I am writing from the town of Blebo in the Trembo Tribe where Miss Gollan and I came with twenty of the girls from Cape Palmas last Friday. Miss Carlson who gave some meetings
here about two months ago returned with glowing reports and now we have come officially to place one of our older native ministers and his wife as permanent workers here.
"Last night (Sunday) the young people showed a real interest. At the close of the message twenty-one raised their hands to signify their desire to be saved, most of them girls. As they came forward to pray others joined them until there was not room enough at the altar so the building was turned into an altar. Soon we began to hear glad cries as souls were born into the kingdom of God. ## MS SURDQU SCHOOL LESSON

## Seven-Year Whole-Bible Course

Self-Control in All Things
Lesson for September 14. Lesson Text: Prov. 20:1; 21:17: 23:1-3, 20, 29-35; 25:16, 28; 1 Cor. 9:24-27; Gal. 5:22, 23.
One of the fundamental differences between man and animals is that animals usually follow their desires without respect to what is right, while man has intelligence, knowing right from wrong, and has the power to choose as to which he shall do. This power is the power of self-control-a Christian virtue that is indispensable to the life that pleases God.
I. SELF-CONTROL AND STRONG DRINK. Prov. 20:1. (1) The use of strong drink is deceitful. "Wine is a mocker." It promises the drunkard satisfaction which it cannot give. It deceives others as to its advantage. That it strengthens the human body is deception; chemistry has shown that it contains no nourishment for the body. That it enriches the national revenue is deception. It is true that its taxes bring millions to the national account, but how many more millions it costs the nation because of the crime, poverty, and sickness which it causes! (2) The use of strong drink is enraging. "Strong drink is raging." It excites the worst passions of human nàture. Quarrels, brawls, murders, and immorality spring from it. (3) The use of strong drink is foolish. "Whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." What can be more foolish than to drink something which injures the health, enfeebles the intellect, deadens the moral sensibilities, destroys the reputation, blights the power to accept responsibility, breaks hearts and homes, and is fraught with a thousand other evils! Dr. Adolph Lorenz, the great Austrian surgeon, when asked his opinion concerning the use of alcoholic beverages, replied, "I am a surgeon. My success depends upon my brain's being clear, my muscles firm, and my nerves steady. No one can take alcoholic liquors without blunting these physical powers, which I must always keep on edge."
Prov. 23:29-35. Here again we see in striking language the consequences of strong drink. Observe that drinking causes-(1) Sorrow and woe. Under the influence of liquor men do things which later on they bitterly regret.

They often suffer the loss of health, their positions, their homes, the love of their families. (2) Quarreling and violence. "Who hath contention? who hath babbling? Who hath wounds without cause?" Because of the quarrels, violence, and murders, that have grown out of drunkenness, our police have been supplied with labor, our judges with occupation, our poor farms with paupers, our jails and penitentiaries with prisoners, the electric chair and hangman's noose with victims. (3) Physical disfigurement. "Who hath redness of eyes?" Who is not familiar with the bleary, bloodshot eyes, the inflamed nose with its swollen veins, the blotchy and mottled countenance of the habitual drinker? (4) Sensuality and vice. "Thine eyes shall behold strange women and thine heart shall utter perverse things." A man under the influence of liquor is easily tempted. His judgment is clouded, his passions inflamed, and he is ripe for sexual crimes. (5) Reckless stupidity. "Thou shalt be as he that lieth down in the midst of the sea, etc." In other words, the drunkard is utterly dead to the dangers of his condition. When he awakens he knows nothing of what has occurred during his drunkenness. (6) An enslaved will and

a hardened heart. "When shall I awake? I shall seek it again." And here is the tragedy of strong drink! Some would like to stop drinking and cannot because of its enslaving power; others do not want to stop drinking because the habit has seared their consciences and hardened their hearts.
What should be the Christian's attitude toward alcoholic drinks? Complete abstinence from it, tireless effort to rescue its victims, and unceasing prayer on their behalf to Him who is able to free the drunkard from the enemy's clutches and make him a magnificent memorial of God's power to save!
II. SELF-CONTROL IN PLEASURES AND AMUSEMENTS
Prov. 21:17. "He that loveth pleasure shall be a poor man." Does this mean that recreation and
school. But the young man who pursued pleasure to the neglect of preparing himself for a profession stands in the bread line. The pleasure loving Christian worker or minister who neglects spiritual things through self-indulgence will soon spiritual the touch of God from his life and when that is gone no live church will want his services!

## III. SELF-CONTROL IN EATING.

Prov. 23:1-3. Someone has said, "The devil is never more active and successful than at banquets; for he gets at the brain, heart, and being of man through his stomach!"' What is the temptation here? A luxurious feast and a keen appetile. If you have either one without the other you have nothing to fear; but when the two come together, beware! How to resist this temptation? "Put a knife to thy throat." Does that mean to commit suicide? Of course not! But it does mean that when tempted to overeat or to eat forbidden foods, one should heed Romans $8: 13$, "If ye live after the flesh (cater to the desires of the flesh), ye shall die (spiritually, and perhaps physically too!) : but if ye through the Spirit do mortify (or put death which is what is meant by putting the knife to your throat) the deeds of the body, ye shall live." We ought to enjoy eating, but let us remember that Lack of self-control in eating is a sin against the body which is the temple of the Holy Spirit, a matter not to be lightly regarded! 1 Cor. 6:19-20. IV. SELF-CONTROL AND DE-
NIAL, A CHRISTIAN'S DUTY. 1 Cor. 9:24-27.
Here is a great challenge concerning self-control. Weymouth's translation has it: "Every competitor in an athletic contest practices abstemiousness in all directions." How true! How rigidly the prize fighter trains for his boxing bout! He denies himself many kinds of food. He separates himself from ordinary life to devote his time to training. Day after day he puts his body through grueling exercise. Is it all pleasure? Not at all! Why does he do it? "They indeed do this for the sake of obtaining a perishable wreath (the Roman prize was only a laurel wreath which would perish in a few days)." The great athletes practice self-denial and self-control in order to obtain money, popularity, and worldly applause-all things which last only for a brief hour. Paul's challenge on the whole might be paraphrased thus-"If these worldly athletes are willing to practice such rigid selfcontrol and self-denial for the sake of securing a prize which lasts only for a time, how much more ought the spirit-
amusements are wrong? Not at all! Recreation, relaxation, amusements, and hobbies are right and beneficial to any child of God, if they are kept in their rightful place! For the youngster baseball, hiking, and other games are normal and right, but if the youngster lacks self-control and spends so much time in pleasure and recreation that he neglects studies, church attendance, and home responsibilities, then these things become $\sin$. Please notice that what has been said about games is spoken concerning growing children. We do not endorse professional ball games, and surely do not approve of attending such. No reasonable Christian will condemn a minister for taking time off occasionally from his strenuous activities to spend a little time in fishing, etc. But if that minister spends too much time in fishing or any other hobby, if he becomes too engrossed in it, if because of it he neglects prayer, study of the Word, or attendance to ministerial duties then that minister commits $\sin$ and needs to exercise self-control.
But how may love for pleasure tend to poverty? The young person who succeeds in business is the one who knows his business and to know his business he must of necessity have studied in
ual athlete to practice self-control in denying him-
self those things which tend to weaken his spiritual life, seeing that he is striving for a spiritual reward which shall last for all eternity! Note: What kind of an athlete was Paul? What was his goal in life's race? Phil. $3: 14$. How did he set about to run this race and reach this goal? Phil. $3: 7,8$, 13; 1 Cor. $9: 26,27$. Did he reach the goal and win the prize? 2 Tim. $4: 7,8$.
The Christian needs: (1) Physical self-control. This may be considered in two aspects (a) as to unlawful lusts (1 Peter 2:11) which call for complete abstinence ; and (b) as to misuse of lawful things. We have discussed eating and recreation. There are a host of other things in the physical realm which are to be enjoyed in their rightful place. But even perfectly legitimate physical appetites must be kept firmly in hand. See 1 Cor. 6:12. In order to be fit for best service for the Lord, to be of best influence on others, and to have personal victory over $\sin$, we must be masters of our bodies, like Daniel of old purposing in our hearts that we will not defile ourselves (see Dan. 1:1-21) by lacking self-control and yielding to sin and the flesh!
(2) Mental self-control. Some who have com-
mand over their bodies do not control their minds and dispositions. Yet anger is a grievous form of intemperance. Prov, 16:32. So is gossip. James $1: 26 ; 3: 2$. And so is mental laziness !
(3) Spiritual self-control. Some who do not err in either of the above mentioned matters need self-control in their conduct in public service. In the matter of expressing emotions and in the exercising of the speaking in tongues in public assembly. We need to be watchful lest while we please ourselves, others are not edified. Verses that apply are 1 Cor. $14: 32,12,26$, and 40,27 and 28 V. HOW TO HAVE SELF-CONTROL. Gal. 5:22, 23 .

The Association plans to make a tour of 100 days across the country, reports Herald of Holiness, to awaken Sunday Schools to do something about these unchurched boys and girls.

## dIVERTING THE BLUE NILE

As Allied and Axis forces continue to fight the "Battle of the Nile," the question arises: "Will the Axis change the course of the Blue Nile?" English newspapers early in 1938 told of an agreement made between the British and Italian Empires, which they said guaranteed, among other things, "noninterference with the waters of Lake Tana. . . thus safeguarding the Egyptian cotton crop." Evidently engineers have seen the possibility of diverting the waters of this lake, that lies so high above sea-level, and on which the Blue Nile depends. They might have been warned of this by the Bible. Many centuries ago God said, in Isaiah 19:1-9 (R. V.)
"The oracle concerning Egypt. . .... I will give the Egyptians into the hand of a cruel lord. The river shall be wasted and dried up, (because) they turn the rivers far away. . . . They that weave white cloth shall be ashamed." The Italians may have read this, and be planning accordingly. At any rate, it will come to pass, for God has decreed it in His Word.

## THE HOLY ROMAN EMPIRE

Can the Roman Empire be revived without having an Italian ruler at its head? Some students of Bible prophecy believe so. They believe that the revived empire may not be the Roman Empire of the Cæsars but the Holy Roman Empire of Charlemagne instead. That empire included the territory which now comprises France, Belgium, Holland, Switzerland, most of Germany, a portion of Northern Spain, Bohemia, Dalmatia, Istria, and Northern Italy. Its emperor was Charlemagne, King of the Franks. After conquering Northern Italy in 800 A . D. he was crowned Roman Emperor in St. Peter's in Rome. Is it not within the realm of possibility that Hitler may be head of a revived Holy Roman Empire, since he already is virtual ruler of most of its former territory?
At Nuremberg on Sept. 12, 1938, according to the London Times, Hitler said: "The Holy Roman Empire begins to breathe again. I had the Insignia of the old Reich brought to Nuremberg in order to induce not only my own nation but also the whole world to consider that long before the discovery of a new world a mighty Germanic Reich existed. The German Reich has slumbered for a long time; the German people have now awakened and taken their 1,000 -year-old crown to themselves."

Some may say, "Ah, I should love to have such self-control, but I have a weak will." But let it not be thought that such self-control as we have been discussing is a matter of natural selfdiscipline. Far from it! Self-control (or temperance as it is translated in the authorized version) is first and last a fruit of the Spirit and therefore available to all! It is "through the Spirit" that we mortify the deeds of the flesh. It is "through Christ" who dwells within us that we can do "all things" which includes exercising self-control! Therefore the weakest saint may manifest the overcoming poise and strength of Christ because His strength is made perfect in weakness!-J. Bashford Bishop.

## AN INFECTION HEALED

In September, 1940 I hurt my leg, making an open sore that would not heal, although I prayed earnestly, and fully believed in healing. It got very bad and on November 6 I was taken to a hospital for violet-ray treatment. I lay there for five weeks, but was under conviction, saying to God, "Why hast Thou let me come to this bed, after all Thou hast done for me?" I became very fearful they were going to amputate my leg, it was so painful. Finally the sore healed over and I came out. My leg looked like an old piece of liver and was painful. Then gangrene set in. It felt as if a corkscrew was being bored into my foot. On the calf of my leg was a black circle the size of a dollar with a red center. On the other side of the leg was a green circle the size of a dollar, and my leg below the knee was the size of a 10 -quart pail.

On January 10, 1941 I called in my pastor, Wesley W. Fleming and had him pray for me. I gave him my brother's address and they sent for him. They asked me what I was putting on the leg, and I, said, "The Blood of Jesus." Between midnight and one o'clock, a. m. January 11 the Lord healed me. The swelling and pain were all gone. When my brother came the next morning he could not tell that anything had been the matter.-Charles R. Hancuff, 303 South Pine, Ellensburg, Washington.
