GOLIATH the giant, that mighty man of the Philistines, certainly was great. He was boastful and well armed; and one bearing a shield went before him. With a loud voice he defied the armies of the living God. And they accepted defeat without a blow being struck at them. They went down before flesh and before words that were repeated to them day after day.

The king, God's anointed, sided with the people and their fears. In their despair the people thought the defense of the Lord had departed. The giant of unbelief came into the hearts of the people when they saw the giant of the Philistines. Their hearts followed the sight of the eyes and the hearing of the ears. God's people are doing the same today-the eyes seeing, and the ea:s hearing unbelief.

Undoubtedly Goliath was a great giant. His sword was massive, and his speech wonderful-wonderful in its audacity-and God's people did not see the blasphemy of it. David came on the scene, the anointed one, despised by his brethren but honored of God.

The giant said, "I defy the armies of Israel this day." David said, "Who is this uncircumcised Philistine that threatens and defies the armies of the living God?" Israel saw the giant, David saw the audacity. David took sides with God. Israel sided with the giant, accepting the giant's estimate of themselves. They certainly were grasshoppers in his sight. They acted like it.

David remembered his encounter with the lion and the bear, he remembered his communion with God, he remembered the choice of himself and the anointing, he remembered his God. Therefore he reasoned logically and in faith that God, who had delivered him out of the paw of the lion and out of the paw of the bear, would deliver him out of the hand of this uncircumcized Philistine. He was just one more beast to slay. He pitted God against the giant. The giant pitted himself against God's army and God's people.

David sallied forth in the name of the God of Israel, armed with the sling and the stones. The weapons were formed by the action of soft water-pebbles rounded by the brook, and there were strips of the hide of the slain beast to convey them. That simple sling spoke of the blood of a beast having been slain, and prefigured the blood of God's Lamb. The water that shaped the stones prefigured the washing of the water by the Word.

David said, "I come to thee in the name of the Lord of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom thou hast defied." The giant had to go down and then Israel had to rise up, and they went after the enemy.

You do not have to fight the giant. David's greater Son has fought him for you. You just look after the spoils and chase the enemy, led by your David.
If you take stock of your giant you are betraying your Master. Don't look at his size, his weapons-they are recorded to show you how great a victory you can get.
Your David, David's greater Son, lives today. And He wants you to rally under His banner. Thanks be to God who giveth you the victory over Goliath and every other giant. Victory continued from this time with David, and he ultimately came to the throne. Your David (Christ) will come to the throne and you will share the spoils with Him.

## No Need to Fear

WHAT the children of God need today is the anointed eye. When the servant of Elisha saw a host encompassing the city both with horses and with chariots, he was frightened and said, "Alas, my master! how shall we do?" "Be sober. Be vigilant. Because your adversary . . . seeking whom he may devour. Whom resist steadfast." 1 Peter 5: 8, 9.

THE attention of all the world has been focused upon the subtly planned attack at PEARL HARBOR. Spying eyes have observed just what moment to catch the navy unawares, and advantage has fully been taken of this information. This fact, together with the fact that no longer in modern warfare do aggressor nations deem it necessary to wait for a formal declaration of war, has a significant spiritual lesson for all of us. Peter said, "Be vigilant!" Christ summed it up by tersely saying, "W ATCH!"
Bill Henry in the Los Angeles Times (December 8), says:
"The attack was well planned. It is customary for the fleet to go out into Hawaiian waters during the week, and then return on Friday or Saturday night to give the men shore leave. On any Sunday during the time that I was in Hawaii it was possible to find not only the capital ships, but several hundred smaller vessels all cooped up in the vast area of Pearl Harbor. Obviously there are always skeleton crews on the ships, but the personnel on a Saturday night or Sunday morning is probably 60 to 75 per cent ashore."

The Los Angeles Daily News of December 9 says (quoting Representative Dingell of Michigan): "The Navy seemingly tied up its battlewagons every Saturday night in routine manner and went to town till Monday morning. When the Japs arrived there were not enough men to man the guns. The air corps was seemingly in the same position."

But never has there been a day of greater betrayals, sabotage, and Fifth Column activity than modern warfare has witnessed, (as is capably pointed out in various articles, such as Japanese Sabotage in Our Midst, in the Readers' Digest of January, 1942.) They shall betray one another, prophesied Christ, of the end times.

Sharp enemy eyes watch for our spiritual undoing in our most undefended and unguarded hour-for our most vulnerable point. "He stood speechless," the record states of the man who had gotten into the wedding feast, not having the wedding garment on. "He stood speechless!"

There is the other side, also, for which we may be thankful. That is, we too may prepare our "surprise attacks" and in turn catch the enemy unaware, just when he is gloating over what seems to have been a decisive victory. Then the tide will turn. Then our turn will come! As the nation adopts "surprise strategy," so may we, when the enemy may consider us entirely undone.

It is in Oakland that I am writing this, in the home of a faithful minister who for many years labored diligently and acceptably in our fellowship, R. W. Griffin. He has

told me a story that illustrates this in a remarkable manner. A few years ago he took ill, and was laid aside from his min-istry-eventually finding it necessary to give up his pastorate, despite his people's willingness to await his recovery. "I was discouraged and despondent," he states, "although Brother Stanley Cook when pastor here, was wonderfully used of God to cheer me up.
"When I had recovered sufficiently to get out for short walks, the Lord opened up to me the need of those around me. I would sit in the parks, and talk with those beside me on the bench. As I talked with these, and with folks on the streets, I would find they would break down and weep, glad to confide their troubles to me. I would open the conversation by presenting them with a tract or a gospel portion. Frequently the answer would be, 'You are able to help me in this way, but I'm hungry. I have not had anything to eat for some time.' Then I would take them into a restaurant, and avoiding the counter, would choose a booth, seating my guest on one side, and myself on the other, and saying, 'Order anything you like.' 'I don't want to make it too hard for you,' would be my guest's answer. Then as they ate, I would talk to them about the Lord. Now I found that the need was greater on the outside than on the inside. Frequently while pastoring, I had prepared a message for sinners, only to arrive at the church and find I had nobody but Christians present. Now, in this new ministry, I had nobody but the unsaved. I now found I was happier in working for Christ than I had been in my life.
"I went to the city manager and asked for a written permit to go into the parks and give out Christian literature. He gave me a straight look, and said to me, 'Mr. Griffin, if there ever was a time that this work needed to be done, it is now.' So he gave me a permit. I have given away thousands of Gospels (mostly the Gospel of John) to sailor boys, soldier boys, and other young men. I have told them that if they would read and obey the Word of God, that they would keep the best company there is to be kept, cause their parents no trouble, and they would never go behind prison bars, and that God keeps people out of trouble that obeyed His Word.
"I have had these young men ask me, 'Well, what about a fellow that is in trouble already?' I have told them God would help them in ways that they knew nothing of, to get out of trouble. I try to have my conversation seasoned with grace, and do not try to approach all in the same way, nor press the question where it is not wanted. Generally I say, 'Brother, would you read a Gospel?' When they say, 'Why do you approach me as "Brother"? I am not your brother.' I answer, "Yes, you are in one way, for the Word tells us 'He has made of all nations one blood,' but in order to be my spiritual brother you must be born again.?
"Then God definitely spoke to my heart along a line $I$ never would have thought of. He spoke to my innermost being, and said, 'GO TO SAN QUENTIN AND ASK PERMISSION TO PUT UP A TRACT $B O X$.' I went. I was taken into the - Warden's office, and introduced to the Warden. I told the Warden that I wanted
permission to put up a tract box in the prison, and showed him the picture of one that I had received from Springfield, Missouri. But I told him that the one I would put in San Quentin would be a good deal larger than the one in the picture from the Gospel Publishing House.
"He said right away, 'Yes, Mr. Griffin, that will be all right. But I would rather that you would see the Chaplain, as he has charge of that kind of work.' As we walked out of the Warden's office, we met the Chaplain. When I told him what I wanted he quickly consented. He said to make the box, then bring it over, and get it put up.
"I made the box and put 4500 (four thousand, five hundred) tracts and Gospels in it. We placed it in the center of the large Chapel and Library. As we were placing it on the post, there were four of the prisoners came and took literature from it. This was on Wednesday. On Friday I received a kind letter from the Chaplain, thanking me for the interest that I had taken in the men, and saying that eternity alone would tell the good that the literature was doing. I have refilled the box four different times since then.
'I asked the Chaplain, 'How many men will have access to this box?' He replied, 'Every man in this prison has access to this room once a week.' Now in going over to refill the box, I am ushered into a reception room, and convicts are permitted to come into this room for personal conversation with me on spiritual matters. The Lord had so wonderfully opened up the way to San Quentin, that it occurred to me to also try at Folsom Prison, with the same result. There was not a bit of opposition. At San Quentin there are 4,800, and at Folsom there are 3,300, making over 8,000 under the possible influence of this Christian literature.
"Instead of regretting the loss of my former ministry, I feel that I now have entered upon the greatest ministry of my life. My heart has always gone out to the unsaved, and this puts me into contact with so many more than would ever have entered the door of the church where I pastored. When I was pastoring, I would get in my car, and go to visit people of my flock, but pass by the very people that I am now contacting for the Lord! I feel that we owe them a debt, and that we ought to pay it by personal contact. For the Word says, 'Freely ye have received, freely give.' To just stand on the corner handing out tracts, is likely to only have them thrown away. But say a kind word with them, address them personally as 'Lady, or Gentleman, will you accept this?' and next time you will find they still have the same tract, carefully put away in their pocketbook."
"Be vigilant!"
Shortly before Dr. R. A. Torrey went to be with the Lord, he attended a large convention. I was impressed in a lasting way by what he urged at that time. "Get the gospel out while we can," he urged, "by whatever channels present themselves. Get notices of coming meetings into the press, and reports of what was said." Other channels available were mentioned. Augustine, of early church days, wept as he lay dying. Someone said to him, "Augustine, after such an exemplary life, why do you weep?" He replied, "I weep not for my
sins of commission, but for my sins of omission."

## "Be vigilant?"

A pastor said to me, "If we want to, we can!" He referred to what could be done in his own East Bay area if all in the various assemblies would give but ten cents a month, by way of increased radio programs, and said, "If advertising men find it profitable to put out their material, so should we. If a group of our pastors in this area would work together, and go down to Foster and Kleiser, and arrange for 150 billboards in this area to have Assembly of God announcements in the preceding months leading up to Easter, think what it could mean! It is when chances are gone by, we realize with regret their departure.
"Be vigilant."
Our day is changing so rapidly, that may God give us alertness to keep pace with the changes. Missionary activities to foreign lands across the seas is being vastly curtailed perhaps, but there are backward areas in our own land, and activity in South America seems only to be beginning, with tremendous reapings. Possibly blackouts and other restrictions may alter our familiar programs of revival efforts, but we can always contact individuals with conversation about Christ. "If we want to, we can!"
"Be vigilant!"
The channel of prayer need never be closed to us. Says Samuel Chadwick, "The supreme need of the church is a spirit of prayer. There is nothing that will take the place of prayer. Jesus wrought many mighty works without a sign of effort. There was in His marvelous works the ease of omnipotence, but of His prayers it is said, 'He offered up prayers and supplications with strong crying and tears.' When Christ prayed, there was an agony, and the sweat of blood.
"All who have done things for God have been mighty in prayer. They have wrestled in agony with breaking hearts and weeping eyes until they knew they had prevailed. They spent cold nights in prayer. They lay on the ground weeping and pleading with God. They wrestled with principalities and powers, and gripped with spiritual foes. In the church of today there is little power in prayer. There is an absence of travail. The counselors of the Church need seek no other explanation of the church's passionless and powerless ministry. Zion must travail to bring forth."

Be sober. Be vigilant. Every railway or bus station with literature boxes presenting some bloodless way of salvation is a rebuke to us, if we do not have a box there also with Gospel portions, tracts, and our old numbers of Evangels, Gospel Gleaners, and other papers. If a systematic saving of these was the responsibility of some one person, there would be much for use in public places. Particularly when prayer
goes behind our efforts to witness are they effective.

At the recent Christ's Ambassadors convention in Fresno, Calif., for the Northern California-Nevada District, Harry Jager gave a stirring appeal for funds to send copies of the Gospels of Matthew and Luke to 75,000 soldiers in Ninth Corps Area, which includes the Western States, Hawaii, Philippine Islands and Alaska. In less than ten minutes over $\$ 500.00$ was received from the convention and the remaining $\$ 250.00$ was pledged by individual groups of C. A.'s.
The copies that were to go to the men in Hawaii and the Philippines were sent from San Francisco nine days before the war broke out on December 7. Praise the Lord! The C. A.'s pray they will comfort and lead the boys to the Lord. Remarkable that they got away just in time.

## Living for God's Glory

Our daily life, our conversation, our very countenance, must testify that we have found life abundantly in our Good Shepherd. Oh, cease from keeping your own life, defending your own life, when the Holy Ghost works to bring to die every portion of your own life. Brethren, we are so world-like. Our world-like life is the great hindrance to conversions, the great reason why the Gospel has so little success. Yet remember, every Christian has a time when he has given up all to his Lord. Then you were happy, and the very reason of your unhappiness now is that you have not given up all your life, and that in daily life, in daily occurrences, in daily conversation, sometimes you are hesitating between your will and God's will.

Why are so many Christians so often exhausted in their work for Christ? Because they are seeking their own life in the work. Our work can only be fruitful when we are not seeking our own life or our own pleasure in our work, but seeking the glory, the interest, of Christ.-Pastor Stockmeyer.

## Instability

As to lack of faith and patience in prayer James uses a simile which is ludicrously striking-the wave, properly, "the surge of the sea, driven with the wind and tossed." These are two motions when the sea is tempestuous: undulation, up and down; fluctuation, to and fro. Both are referred to"driven with the wind," fluctuation; "tossed," undulation. The peculiarity of the wave is that it stays nowhere; and so the double souled man is unstable in all his ways. If he is impelled forward, he falls back; if he is lifted up, he sinks down again. If he believes one moment, he distrusts the next; if he gets a little ahead he cannot hold on to any advantage. Unstable as water, he cannot excel.-A. T. Pierson.

## Ghist's warming of boming Jradgments

0UR Lord Jesus has been very faithful in giving us adequate warning of impending judgments.
When the disciples were showing Him the great stones in the magnificent temple Herod had built, He declared: "There shall not be left here one stone upon another, that shall not be thrown down."

Was this word of His fulfilled? Did judgment come to the city and to the people who rejected Him? Yes. His word was fulfilled to the letter. The Jewish historian Josephus tells us: "Caesar gave orders to pull down the whole city and the temple .... all the area of the city was so leveled by the workmen that a traveler would never believe that it had been inhabited."

After He had made this prediction of the overthrow of the temple, the disciples (Mark tells us it was Peter, James, John, and Andrew) came to Him upon the mount of Olives and put three questions to Him: "(1) When shall these things be? (2) What shall be the sign of Thy coming? (3) And of the end of the world?" All these three are answered in the two chapters that follow, Matthew 24 and 25.

Here on the mount from which He ascended and on which He will later descend, the Son of God gave us solemn warning of coming wars, famines, pestilences, earthquakes, and countless trials for the saints, and of many being offended. The old story will be repeated: "From that time many of His disciples went back, and walked no more with Him."

He warns us of the rise of false prophets, false Christs, the abounding iniquity and lawlessness, and as a result the love of many (literally, the many) growing cold.

One of our ministers told the writer that he had recently visited a place where there was a munitions factory. Both men and women in the assembly were all working long hours in the factory and making much money. And alas, the deceitfulness of riches had resulted in the choking of the Word, and their interest in the things of God had completely waned. The church had become so dark and so dead that it seemed as though the Lord had removed the candlestick from their midst. The love of the many waxing cold. It will be good for each of us to face the issue and to ask our hearts, "Am I losing my first love? Am I growing cold?" And if so, to confess the same and return with all our hearts to the blood-stained mercy seat.

In view of the fact that the Master warns, us that "in such an hour as ye think not" He will return, we should note and take to heart the four very solemn warnings that follow.

The first concerns servants. There will be two classes of servants when Christ returns. Some He terms "faithful and wise." These have faithfully fed the flock of Christ over which F ? has made them overseers. These have i $t$ failed to supply the hungry children ith "meat in due season." For their fait ilness they will receive great
reward-they shall rule and reign with their Lord.

But should this servant, for it is clear the Master speaks of the same servant who has now become lax and lazy, say in his heart (he may not say it with his mouth), "My Lord delayeth his coming," he would do what unfaithful preachers, who have not spent long hours with the Word in order to serve the saints a good meal, always do, he will begin to beat his fellow servants.

A mature saint was speaking to the writer recently concerning a certain preacher: "We were not treated as if we were the Lord's sheep and led into the green pastures of Scripture truth, but he dealt with us as if we were a bunch of hogs. He would throw swill into the trough with a 'Now you can take it or leave it' spirit."

This servant who has become hard and harsh to others has lapsed into laxity with himself. He has lost his separation, fraternizes with the world, and eats and drinks with the drunken. On such God's judgments will fall. Note the solemn words that follow: "The Lord of that servant shall come in a day when he looketh not for Him, and in an hour that he is not aware of. And shall cut him asunder, and appoint him his portion with the hypocrites: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth."
A few days ago a preacher who has traveled much was in our office. His report was extremely sad. He said, "In many places where I have been, the preacher's main interest has been hunting. Or he has given hours and hours to photography. I have invariably found that where there has been a lax preacher there has been a lax people. But thank God, in some places I have found preachers who are consecrated and zealous for God, and I always find that where the preacher is prayerful and godly, the people are prayerful and godly too."

Wholesome recreation is alike good for the mind and body of a minister, but he

should watch lest any over indulgence should make him a less effective servant of the Master or a less helpful pastor of the flock. "Do all to the glory of God!" should govern every phase of our lives.

The next parable deals with the wise and foolish virgins. In the interpretation of this parable, one thing is clear: Those who are ready go in to the marriage. The unready are left outside. The door is closed against such. They once had oil, but had not replenished their supply. At the midnight hour when they wanted a fresh supply, they could not get it.

How small are our lamps and how tiny are our vessels! We need daily replenishing. Every day, fresh oil! We once heard Sister Carrie Judd Montgomery pray, "Lord, let there always be meal in the barrel, and always oil in the cruse." Can we not make this our petition also? And shall we not look to the Lord each day for His bountiful replenishing?

The next parable deals with talents. The stewards who trade faithfully receive a reward. But the lazy and slothful steward had buried his talent, and instead of blaming himself for his laziness he started to blame his Lord, saying, "I knew thee, that thou art a hard man." Unfaithfulness will always beget in us a wrong concept of our lovely Lord. But how solemn is the sentence of judgment on this wicked and slothful servant: "Cast ye the unprofitable servant into outer darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth."
Let us squarely put the question to our own hearts, "Will such a judgment come to me for my unfaithfulness?"

The Master finally warned of the judgments coming to the nations. They will be separated as sheep and geats. To those on His right hand He will say, "Come, ye blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world: for I was an hungred, and ye gave Me meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave Me drink....I was in prison, and ye came unto Me." These righteous cnes will question the Lord: "When saw we Thee an hungred, and fed Thee? or thirsty, and gave Thee drink?" The King shall answer them, "Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

But to those on His left hand He shall say: "Depart from Me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels: for I was an hungred, and ye gave Me no meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me no drink . . . sick, and in prison, and ye visited Me not." In response to their inquiry the King will say to them, "Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it not to Me ."

Some interpret this parable as God's judgment on those who illtreat Israel, believing that Christ referred to His brethren after the flesh. But we are reminded of a question He once put: "Who are my
brethren?" and the answer, "Whosoever shall do the will of God." For their failure to show compasion to those who are His, "These shall go away into everlasting punishment."
We do not know the exact date when these various judgments will take place. The Master warns us that He will come "as a thief in the night." The thief does not 'phone us ahead of time to tell us when he is coming.

At Christ's coming He will bring about eternal separations. Two will be working in the field. Two women will be grinding together at the mill. Two will be in bed together. One shall be taken and the other left. And since this is so, the Master says, "Be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh." And He further says, "Watch ye therefore: for ye know not when the Master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cockcrowing, or in the morning: lest coming suddenly He find you sleeping. And what I say unto you I say unto all, Watch."-S. H. F.

## Life More AMbimmalanitit

"He giveth power to the faint, and to them that have no might He increaseth strength. They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." Iso. 40:29 and 31.

SHE is only a poor old black woman, not so black as she was, for she is withered in every fiber of her being, and as the grey dust and ash of her little hovel have ground themselves into her skin and given her that dirty parchment color, so the dust of time and usage has dried up her imaginations and faculties.

She is so lonely and seems to have lost everything; first her innocence, if she ever had any, then her youthful and womanish charm, later her children, some to disease and others married far away. Her husband has died, his younger wives were inherited gladly by other male members of the family, but she, poor soul, has lost her power of motherhood. She can only hang on in the family as a drudge, she can still carry water, cut and carry firewood and do a bit of gardening. Banished to a wee hut, she lives alone with her thoughts and memories of happier days and tires herself with her drudging labor.

She is unlovely and so unwanted. Soon she is able only to garden her own little plot and gather only her own few little sticks, and then even this becomes too much for her as old age, misuse and rheumatism bind her tottering and feeble limbs in stronger painful bonds each day.

Visitors don't come her way, so she is left long and lonely with her own thoughts. One night she is too weary to sleep, her hard papyrus mat chafes her old dry body too much to allow sleep, so she sits and thinks, studying her anatomy as she never could before, never having had so little flesh on her bones or such scanty raiment to cover her flesh, and thinks and wonders how many more weary nights it will be before they will find her dead body by the smell of its rottenness. But how can she die without learning something about the unknown God. She has rendered her due to her husband, her children and her Chief, but she has never rendered anything to the God of Creation, and as her body fails, her mind quickens and she remembers snatches of conversation and preaching she has heard without heeding. Yes, they know God in that church and it makes them happy to live and fit to die, so she must go there early in the morning and get to know about God too.


By sunrise she has massaged her limbs enough to be able to shuffle along, and with the aid of a staff is able to get along very slowly the length of the village to the Church. Alas, she is too late! the Christians have had their sunrise service and scattered to their tasks for the day. She must see Eliadya, the evangelist, but he also has gone fishing and may be back any hour before sunset. Sad and disappointed the poor old soul drags herself back home, but cannot rest, so sets off again to find the evangelist. She must see him, so that day the poor old lady, nearly blind, and almost crippled, dragged herself the length of the village and back again four times until just about sundown when she found that Eliadya had returned from his fishing, which had taken him far that day.

The old woman got straight to business, saying: "I am about to die and I want to know the unknown God and then to die at peace with Him." Eliadya graciously dealt with this precious soul until the Light dawned upon her, until she understood enough to accept the Lord Jesus Christ as her Saviour.

She accepted Him with all her heart and confessed Him with her mouth, and then shuffled off home with a happy satisfaction and joy in her soul. She was too happy to listen to the insults and insinuations poured upon her as she chuckled away to herself on her homeward trip, for many were cruel and callous enough to shout out that she had only professed Christianity in order to get a decent burial from the Christans now that there was no one else to bury her.

As soon as Eliadya had washed, eaten and conducted the evening service, he took along a few good Christians with him to visit the old lady in her wee hut. They found her happy enough and even looking forward to dying, but they prayed with her for that "more abundant life" promised by the Good Shepherd, and then left her for the night. The next day she found that her legs did not pain her and that she could walk instead of shuffling. That day again the Christians gathered and prayed in her hut ; after that prayer meeting she discarded her stick and walked strong and straight. As the prayer meetings continued so did her strength until she took up her hoe and went off to work in the gardens again and later came back bearing a load of garden produce on her head. The mocking villagers then stood amazed and ashamed saying: "Truly the old woman is going back to her girlhood since she got right with God."

Today she is the happiest woman in the village, happy in Christ Jesus, her LifeGiver, and happily supporting herself entirely by her mat weaving and gardening and her testimony is: "That the Lord who saved her is the strength of her life."Redemption Tidings.

(b)HE Lord, He it is that doth go before thee: He will be with thee, $H e$ will not leave thee nor forsake thee: fear not neither be dismayed." Deut 31:8.

The Israelites were about to go into the land promised to their fathers and to engage in physical combat for its possession. Their need was mainly for physical courage. But since the Christian warfare is not against flesh and blood but "against principalities and powers, against wicked spirits in the heavenlies," the courage we need is of a different order-a moral and spiritual courage.

The devil's greatest weapons are fear and discouragement. O how he does strive to discourage us and fill our hearts with fear! So many of God's dear children live in fear. Fear that they will not hold out, fear of want, fear of sickness and death, fear of slander and calumny, fear of ridicule, fear of man, fear, fear, fear. Because of these fears we become discouraged. Let us consider the above scripture. That promise is as certainly for us today as it was for the Israelites of old. "Every promise in the book is mine, every chapter, every verse, every line." "How sweetly Jesus whispers, Follow Me, thou needst not fear, for I've trod the way before thee and My glory lingers near." Your Captain will always go before you, and surely where He leads you can safely follow.

The devil has told you many a time that God has forgotten you, has lost your number completely, but he is a liar and always has been a liar. Let us believe God who has said, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee." And because God has said that, you must not fear Satan's threatenings.

This is a war, a conflict we are in, and we must behave ourselves as good soldiers. God has set us the task of overcoming and not being overcome. He has provided plenty of grace to make us more than conquerors through Christ. Therefore "quit you like men, be strong." Take your Bible sometime and see how many times God has said, "Fear not, neither be dismayed."

Do you know why you are sometimes discouraged or afraid? It is only because you do not believe God. You do not believe His promises, or you fear He is unable or unwilling to keep them. There is no other reason. If we fully believe in the truth and faithfulness of God there is no room for discouragement, worry or fear.

It is true there is no victory without conflict, but it is equally true that every conflict leads to certain victory if we believe in the faithfulness of God and walk in the light of His Word. I repeat, God has set us to the task of overcoming and not being overcome.
"Fear hath torment but perfect love casteth out fear." I am glad to be able to testify, after testing God for fifty-five years, that

God is absolutely faithful and will unfailingly keep His word if we trust Him.
Many, times I have gone through experiences that I thought would ruin me and leave me without hope. I utterly failed God and dishonored Him by my doubt, fear and unbelief. But I lived through the trial I thought would finish me, and came out on the heaven side by and by with victory. Praise the Lord! Now when I get in deep or fiery trial I can still praise the Lord for I know how it is coming out, it is coming out with victory. Therefore I will not fear, I will not be dismayed, for God never has and never will forsake me. Hallelujah!
In Joshua 1:9, we read, "Have not I commanded thee? Be strong and of a good courage; be not afraid neither be thou dismayed: for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest." This was a word to inspire strength and courage on the ground of God's unfailing presence.

Joshua had need of courage, for he was going into battle with an enemy far stronger than he, humanly speaking. If he had shown fear in the presence of the enemy he would have gone down to defeat, for fear is contagious.

In those days a herald used to go down the line before battle and proclaim," Who is fearful and afraid, let him go home," because one man might stampede a whole company and lead to defeat. On the other hand courage is contagious too, thank God. If you are strong in the face of temptation or trial you will encourage and strengthen others. Therefore be strong and very courageous. There are those about you who will fail if you faint, or be strong if you are strong.
I read of a farmer in the Middle West where winds of cyclonic fury often wreak havoc. Such a storm struck one day and wrecked his beautiful farm. Nothing was spared but the home. Barns and outbuildings were all smashed to kindling, fields gutted, crops destroyed, fences down, stock scattered and killed, an awful scene of ruin and destruction.

As the farmer viewed it, his heart sank and his courage utterly failed. He thought he could never retrieve the situation, that all he and his wife had toiled so many years to build was gone for good. He

sat down on a pile of wreckage, and with his face in his hands gave himself up to profound dejection.

Presently he heard a rattling in the pile of wreckage and looking around saw an old Shanghai rooster struggle out. He had fared badly, scarce a feather was left on him. He got out in the clear and looked around, then climbed up on the pile of wreckage. Here he looked out on a world from which all familiar things were gone, but his spirit was undaunted. Flapping his featherless wings against his bare thighs he gave out a resounding challenge. Uh-er-uh-er-o-aw!

It touched the farmer's tickle and he laughed till the tears ran down his checks. Suddenly the world looked brighter and his courage rose. Taking off his hat he said, "Old bird, I was the chicken-hearted one and you the brave one. I thank you." He went to work with renewed hope and courage and in a year or two had retrieved his losses.

How illogical and foolish is worry. You never knew anyone to worry himself well in sickness, to worry himself out of financial difficulty, out of trouble or sorrow, out of loss or failure, or any other situation over which people commonly worry. Therefore do not worry. You dishonor God every time you do. For worry comes because we do not trust God nor believe His Word.

Take hold of this scripture, "Fear thou not for I am with thee, be not dismayed for I am thy God, I will strengthen thee; yea I will help thee; yea I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness." Isaiah 41:10. What more can you ask, dear child of God? What encouragement, what foundation for your faith?

Not only must you overcome temptations to evil with overcoming faith, you must meet the hard trials and circumstances of life with high and overcoming courage. It is not necessary to be overcome by them. Confidence in the faithfulness of God will lift you above these shadows too. His promises are for the life that now is as well as for the life that is to come. "Trust in the Lord and do good, so shalt thou dwell in the land and verily thou shalt be fed." Psalm 37:3.

This has been my bank account for a great many years, and I have not overdrawn it yet. During this last depression my wife and I walked in sight of our finish for three and a half years, but we never reached it. We were as certainly fed by the hand of God as ever Elijah was. God will take care of you. Elijah's God still lives.

We must not faint under chastening. The chastenings of the Lord are in love, "that we might be partakers of His holiness."

At one time of my life. I was going through severe trial and was not bearing it well. I grew bitter and thought it a shame that as good a fellow as I should be having it so hard. I was whining and complaining and seeking some one to tell my troubles to, but the whip was laid on if anything a little harder. One day while
riding along a country road in a light wagon, The Lord began to talk to me.

So clear and definite was the voice of God that I drew up at one side of the road and listened, and this is what He said to me: "My son, the course you are pursuing is a reflection on My goodness and love for you. I am the one who is letting these trials come to you and for a purpose. I want you to know that I love you too well to let a single blow fall on you that I can spare you and still make of you the man I am trying to make. I want you to stop whining and complaining about Me and learn your lesson like a man.'
How those words went through me. I never got over them and never forgot them. I promised God that day I would stop my whining and complaining and study to be the man He wanted me to be, and by the grace of God I have done little whining since. The sweet and blessed freedom I have today was obtained at a great price. I was stubborn and refractory and God had to take me through the fires, through suffering and heartbreak, bloody sweat and tears mostly caused by my unbelief and doubt, dishonoring God by worry and discouragement.
I was born with the blues and was subject to periods of despondency in which I many times planned to kill myself. This followed me into my manhood and into my Christian life. But one Sunday morning when I was going through a period of deep discouragement I heard a young woman sing a song of cheer and courage. She sang with all her heart and soul a message for me. Each verse recited some cause of discouragement but closed with the refrain, "But I have met the Captain down by Jericho and I won't be discouraged any more." The song thrilled my very soul and, looking up to Jesus the Captain of my salvation, who was Himself perfected through suffering, I promised Him by His grace I would not be discouraged any more.

And by His grace I have kept that promise, and He has helped me so that for many years now I know no discouragement. I don't know how to be discouraged nor what it feels like to be depressed. Thank God, that to me is greater riches than silver and gold. Lifted up above the shadows.
I will finish with a true story. In the Revolutionary war a naval battle was fought on one of the Great Lakes. The American squadron was commanded by a youth of twenty-three named Perry, while the better equipped British flotilla was commanded by a veteran. Perry's flagship was given special attention and soon its masts were shot away and hanging over the side, the rudder was smashed and the ship was unmanageable. Perry boarded another ship to carry on the fight.

Down in the hold of the flagship a young surgeon was at work cutting off mangled limbs and binding up broken heads, a gruesome task. By and by as the men were carried down they registered discouragement. They said, "The battle is going against us, our ship is disabled and the captain has left the ship." Gloom settled down like a cloud on the young surgeon. But presently they heard cheering and as other wounded were carried down they said, "We've won the victory and the captain is back on board."

The surgeon dropped his tools and start-
ed for the companion way. "Where are you going, doc?" called his assistant. He replied, "Oh, they say the captain is back on board and I must see him." He climbed the companion way and as his head cleared the deck, sure enough there was the captain on the quarter deck with the flush of victory on his face. The surgeon gazed for a long minute at his captain and then went back to his hard task cheered. The captain was on board and all was well.

So the Captain of our salvation braved all
the fury of hell. But He rose triumphant over death, hell and the grave, and having seized the victory is now set down at the right hand of power, and ever liveth to make intercession for us.

Then dear child of God, when you are tempted to discouragement, when things are going hard and the shadows are heavy, take a good long look at the Captain of your salvation who has overcome for you and DON'T BE DISCOURAGED ANY MORE.

IN a quaint little village far up in the mountains of Switzerland, lived an old man who had spent his life working in ivory. His hair was as white as the ivory flowers he was making; his shoulders were bent; but his eye was bright, and his hand was very sure as he used the tiny tools in fashioning the petals of the flowers. ## Something NEW in Sunday Schools

Should be read by every pasfor, officer, and teacher. Reading time: $3 \mathrm{~min}, 20$ seconds.

In the past two Evangel issues you have noticed large blank spaces with words, "Coming Soon" in large bold face type. Perhaps you wondered what was coming. You need not wonder longer for in this article we introduce what is new in Sunday Schools.

## In 1939 General Council.

When General Council convened in Springfield (1939) it adopted a resolution recommending that each group of General Council District Executives appoint a competent Sunday School worker to be known as District Sunday School Representative, a representative for each District. This worker was to be responsible for the advancement of Sunday School work in his own District. Most Districts appointed their representatives who have done some constructive work. Some of these include such workers as: Ernest L. Friend and Bernice Mast in the California Districts; Miss Miller of Louisiana; Agnes Stokes of Arkansas; N. T. Spong of the Eastern District; Anna Schmidt of Kentucky; etc.

In February, 1940, the first nation-wide Sunday School Conference of the Assemblies of God was held at headquarters, attended by workers from many States. This Conference equipped workers to go back to their local fields inspired to do more effective work for the Sunday School cause. As a result, countless District and Sectional Sunday School conferences have been held throughout the nation.

Regional Conferences, 1941.
In addition to these, the Gospel Publishing House sponsored a series of Regional Sunday School Conferences during January, February, and March of 1941. They sent their representative from the Sunday School Department at headquarters on a 4500 -mile tour. In these Conferences workers from approximately twenty-five States were reached.

## General Council, 1941.

When the General Council Sunday School Committee met in Minneapolis last September, they carefully weighed what had been accomplished by means of the Conferences held in the past two years, and they felt that still more good could be done if a full-time Sunday School representative from the Gospel Publishing House could be placed on the field in interest of Sunday School Conferences throughout the nation. Therefore, a resolution to that effect was presented and passed by the Minneapolis General Council.

## Action of Executives.

In fulfilment of that General Council recommendation Gospel Publishing House executives met in General Superintendent Ernest S. Williams' office and during a number of sessions gave serious consideration to the furtherance of Sunday School work for 1942.

Therefore, the first week in February, they are sending Rev. Robert L. Hillegas on a Sunday School tour of the field. Plans are being made for him to spend a week both in the East and the West Texas Districts, a week in each of the New Mexico and Arizona Districts. He will spend two weeks in both the Southern California and Northern California-Nevada Districts. In Districts having General Council Bible Schools he will spend an extra week, thus making possible (if it is desired) a week's ministry to students in those Schoolsstudents who soon are to be pastors; evangelists, and teachers

on the field. His tour will also include the Northwest and the Northern States, finishing in Minnesota and at North Central Bible Institute, before the close of the current spring term of that school. Details of the tour are incomplete

## Making Our School a Veritable Lighthouse.

In executive sessions held at headquarters (in December) an outline for improvement of local Sunday Schools was presented and highly endorsed by executive brethren. There are twelve features built around the thought of "Making Our Sunday School a Veritable Lighthouse," from which the light of God's Word should shine forth to warn and to beckon a storm-tossed nation of people. The first six improvement features seek to correct and adjust what already exists of working material in the School, getting the organization and working staff in the best possible shape. Thus, following suggestions of the first six fea-
tures, a School can lay definite tures, a School can lay definite
foundation stones for permanent growth. This done, the School wili be ready to participate in the six fruit-bearing features of the Lighthouse Plan.

## A Beautiful Chart Free.

Five thousand beautiful Lighthouse Charts have been printed, one for each School. About February 1 they will be mailed (free) to the secretaries who ordered the Janwary quarter's literature from us. Pastors and superintendents should keep in touch with their literature secretary and get the chart.

A Lighthouse in Four Vivid Colors.

The chart is printed in striking red and black colors on white cardboard, size $251 / 2 \mathrm{x}$ $301 / 2$ inches. In the center will be merely the black outline for a Ligithouse, divided into four sections from bottom to top. With the chart you will receive a blue section of the Lighthouse base marked off with black mortar markings. This you will cut out and paste on the lower section of the stone base. In June we will send (free) the rest of the blue base for you to trim and paste as before. In September we will send (free) the vermillion red section of the lower part of the tower. Then in December we will send (free) the fourth section, thus completing the superstructure of your Lighthouse. Windows and doors are printed in black.

## Each one will be interested.

Even the children in your School will be delighted as you receive the vari-colored sections of your Lighthouse. Everyone will watch it grow. But best of all, as your Lighthouse grows in vivid colors, we trust your School will be growing in numbers and in spirituality. This will be accomplished as you follow the twelve features printed on the left and right sides of the Lighthouse Chart. And there are full instructions found in the Lighthouse folder accompanying the chart.

PALESTINE JEWS
The latest report is that there are 550,000 Jews in Palestine. According to Prophecy Monthly, about one half of them derive their living from agriculture, industry and transport. Only one sixth are engaged in commerce, and only one fifth in clerical and professional services.

## RUSSIANS AND RELIGION

A writer in The Christian (London) states that in Russia today one third of the town population and two thirds of the rural population are still firm believers. The Soviet Minister of Education had to admit some time ago that "religion seems like a nail; the harder you hit it the deeper it goes into the wood."

## JERUSALEM

Once again Jerusalem is predominantly a Jewish city. According to Prophecy Monthly, there are 80,850 Jewish inhabitants, representing 61 per cent of the city's total population. There are in Jerusalem 73 distinct Jewish quarters, many of which are inhabited by persons coming from the same country, and possessing common social forms of life.

## MISSIONARIES IN WAR ZONE

"More than 1,600 U. S. Protestant missionaries are in war areas in the Far East," the committee on East Asia of the Foreign Missions Conference of North America reported on December 29, according to an Associated Press dispatch. "The committee secretary said the best available information placed these missionaries as follows: Japan, 82 ; Korea, 29 ; penetrated China, 862 ; Indo-China, 56; Thailand, 83; British Malaya, 69; Netherlands East Indies, 59; Philippine Islands, 424; and 47 en route to or from the U. S. In addition there are more than 2,000 missionaries scattered through Free China, 300 in Burma, and a few in Oceania who may become involved."

## WAR AND THE GOSPEL

With a new 10,000 -watt transmitter a Protestant faith mission in Ecuador is reaching -90,000,000 Spanish-speaking people in Latin America with the gospel. The President of Ecuador says, "All this country is witness to the great efforts made by this movement to serve the country in the fullest meaning of the word." It is such work that this war-torn world most sorely needs. As Dan Gilbert says: "The evangelization of America is the first requisite for national defense and for the insuring of victory over the enemy nations. The evengelization of the world is the first requisite for the preservation of peace, once the war is won."

## JEWISH REFUGEES

Many Jews have perished as the wave of Satan-inspired Jew hate has engulfed Europe. Many others lived to suffer under Nazi tyranny. Nearly a million European Jews, however, fled to other lands between 1933 and 1940. According to Time Magazine, 330,000 fled to Russia, 135,000 to the U. S., 116,000 to Latin America, 110,000 to Palestine, and 150,000 to England, France, Belgium and The Netherlands. Even in some of these new lands their sufferings continue. The Nazis caught up to many who fled to France, Belgium and The Netherlands. Multitudes of Jews have been seized by the Nazis in occupied parts of Russia, also, for most of Russia's four million Jews lived in western Russia. Poor tortured Israelites !
God has scattered Israel, as He warned.' To a disobedient people He has said: "Among these nations shalt thou find no ease, neither shall the sole of thy foot have rest: but the Lord shall give thee there a trembling heart, and failing of eyes, and sorrow of mind: and thy life shall hang in doubt before thee." Deut. $28: 65,66$.

NIEMOLLER AND THE JEWS
Pastor Martin Niemoeller is as strongly opposed to anti-Semitism as to the Nazi doctrine of the supremacy of the State. He has said: "Jesus Christ, the founder of Christendom, was a Jew. I love the Old Testament. Hitler is trying to denounce this Testament as 'Jewish,' but there is no Christianity without it. Whoever is an anti-Semite and presecutes the Jews can never be a real Christian."
He made this statement to Dr. Leo Stein, an eminent German jurist who was confined in the same concentration camp as Niemoeller but who recently reached America. Dr. Stein asked him why he had ever joined the Nazi party. Niemoeller replied, "I was betrayed into joining. I have had two audiences with Hitler. In 1932 (shortly before the latter became Chancellor) he promised me on his word of honor to undertake no measures of any kind against the Church. He also promised me not to have any pogroms against the Jews, but only to remove them from positions in the government. I was naive enough to believe him, and that is why I am sitting here in camp today. . . . The second time we parted as enemies, and I told him that not he but God alone was my Leader."
Niemoeller helps his Jewish fellow prisoners in every way possible and they look upon him as a true friend. Like other imprisoned ministers, rabbis, and priests he acts as a chaplain. He ministers to dying prisoners regardless of creed, though severe punishment awaits him if caught, and hundreds of prisoners (Protestants, Catholics and Jews) have died in his arms.

## A Second Sunday School Tour

Last February the Gospel Publishing House sent the Superintendent of the Sunday School Department to hold a series of Regional Sunday School Conferences in the Eastern States. In response to the demands of the field and in fulfillment of the recommendation of the last General Council, the Publishing House has temporarily employed Robert L. Hillegas as Sunday School field man.

He will leave headquarters February 1 for a tour of approximately four months holding Sunday School Conferences. Most conferences will be of two days and two evenings' duration. Schools are urged to have their pastor, officers, and teachers in attendance at all sessions. These conferences will be different and more practical and helpful than anything else we have ever attempted in the history of our Movement.

## DEAD SEA TREASURES

A recent article in American Hebrew stated that 'mordern warfare is largely chemical and, in the Dead Sea, Palestine has one of the greatest chemical reserves in the world. It is also practically the only source of potash. The potash yield of 65,000 tons in 1939 was doubled the following year; the bromine output was more than doubled. Bromine is indispensable for the production of the highest grade of aviation petrol. Magnesium metal, the lightest and strongest material for airplanes, is a byproduct of Dead Sea potash. For explosives, fertilizers, chemicals and a wide range of other vital war-time products, the Dead Sea in an inexhaustible treasure house." May this not be the "spoil" for the sake of which the northern armies of Gog shall invade "the mountains of Israel" in the end-time? Ezek. 38:8, 12.

## JEWS IN ARGENTINA

A recent article by Dr. Chaim Weizmann contrasts the two great experiments in colonizing Jews. One attempt was made in the Argentine starting fifty years ago. Fifty million dollars was spent there and $1,500,000$ acres of land acquired in a favorable location with good climate. However, during fifty years only about 30,000 Jews have been settled there and the younger generation does not seem inclined to stay.
It was about the same time that first attempts were made to settle Jews in Palestine. These attempts were met by race hatred, financial troubles, and governmental opposition. And yet, in spite of all these difficulties, over 500,000 Jews have colonized Palestine and the number is constantly growing. There is a reason why the colonization in Palestine should be so much more successful than in Argentina. The Lord has said, "Thy children shall come again to their own border"-the border of the Promised Land. Jer. 31:17.

## The Decision Includes the Whole Family

There is something very gratifying about the way boat people make up their minds to follow the Lord; the decision includes the whole family, and that night Mr. Lei with his wife and three round-faced sons knelt at the altar. They did not leave the church until they had made arrangements for destroying their gods, and a few days later found us seated under the low matting which shades the middle and hinder part of the boat-home (which is altogether about six feet wide and twenty feet long), and after singing and praying, we solemnly collected the objects of their worship. We should call it a pile of useless junk, but to them each article has great significance and is clothed with fear and superstition. You would be surprised, too, at the amount of money expended on these common looking objects, including six pairs of chopsticks tied together, a little painted wooden sword, a stick of charcoal and iron tied in rags, and a number of little chains worn around the wrists as charms, for these particular articles were prescribed by some priest or witch doctor as a specific cure or charm, and had to be bought at the prescriber's own price.

We knew it was a serious thing the Lei family was doing . . . it would be inevitable that the prince of the power of the air would put up a fierce battle to try to frighten his subject back into subjection. The very next day special prayer had to be called as a son of Mr. Lei became suddenly and seemingly seriously ill, but God gave the victory in a very short while, and Mr. Lei's faith was unshaken.

## "They Would Follow His Example"

We were informed that the main gods and the ancestral tablet were kept in one of the other five boats, to which Mr. Lei's boat belonged and in which his six brothers lived. They would follow his example very soon, he assured us. We wondered . . . would this really come to pass? and our joy was great when a few days later we were taken out to where the six boats were gathered for a service. Along with all their separate charms and trinkets, much like the ones mentioned, the four wooden idols, about eight inches high and the ancestral tablet which had been worshiped by all the members of the six boats, were surrendered to $u$.

## "They Love It"

While it is not enough to turn from idols, we believe these fisher foik have shown their sincere desire to also turn to worship and serve our living God. They attend services regularly, and while they cannot speak or understand the Cantonese in which we preach, our Chinese preacher talks to them separately after every service, answering their questions, giving them instructions about their practical walk, and telling them Bible stories in the most simple and childlike way imaginable. They love it, and never fail to stay for the altar service and prayer.

## A Wedding

The other day, they called us to their boats to perform a wedding. They wanted it to be a Christian one, and while it is beyond doubt the simplest wedding ceremony we will ever perform, we were pleased that they had obeyed
instructions and done away with all the usual heathen customs, even the firecrackers. New as they were to the Christian ways, these brothers and their families exhibited great grace, we thought, when they did not partake of the wine and cigarets which had been provided for the guests.

A Sweet Savour to Our God
Sometimes it is hard to disregard the strong fish odor which they bring with them, but we do pray that their lives will prove to be a sweet savour to our God who has bought them with such a dear price and who has opened their hearts to receive His Word. We do want you to pray for these families that they may grow in grace and win others of their people to the Lord. Who can tell when the last member of the bride of Christ will have been won and joined to the body? And then, what a thrill to think of the great meeting in the air!

## Old Backsliders

Yes, they backslide in Mossiland as well as here in the United States. These two old Mossi men live in Noden, where Dabanaga is the worker. The one on the left is Konvikido. He waited until the missionary was present to make a public confession. The Holy Spirit can not be deceived. When he was praying and "repenting" of his sins, there was a vacancy, in my heart and I took it with "a grain of salt." A few days later he confided in Dabanaga, asking him if the missionary would not give him a new garment for becoming a Christian! He soon became indifferent and left altogether.

To the right is Masego. He was really saved and went on with the Lord in a way that brought persecution. He was steadfast until he lost a son with measles. He thought that in spite of all the praying and anointing, if his boy died, why Jesus had no more power especially than fetish medicine. He allowed his grief and the insidious talk of people to turn him aside; he has gradually grown cold and indifferent and misses church a great deal. Will you join us in praying them back to victory.

# Wrief Notes Fromin anlill Neanr 

Safe in China

Immediately after last week's Evangel went to press the following cable message was received from H. C. Osgood, Superintendent of our Southwest China field: "Hildebrands here."
About the middle of October we sent money for the return fare of Beatrice and Thelma Hildebrand, and having no word from them recently, we supposed they were on the way home, but evidently they were detained for some reason. From Mr. Osgood's cablegram we conclude that they are with other missionaries in Kunming. While a few bombs have been dropped on Kunming from time to time, our missionaries there are comparatively safe and are receiving money from the Missions Department regularly.

## Great Destruction by Flood

Word has just come to us of the true conditions in Peru as a resuit of the disastrous flood about the middle of December. The daughter of one of the missionaries wrote a few days after the flood as follows: "One third of Huaraz has been swept away. Most of the brethren have been wonderfully delivered from the waters, but nearly all of them are homeless and have lost all earthly possessions. Brother Cano's daughter and her husband were both taken and his family are gone. The most beautiful and modern section of the town has been ruined completely. As the accident happened early in the morning many were taken suddenly in bed and asleep. Surely it was the mercy of our heavenly Father that it did not happen at night when all might have perished. All the north half of the town is a desolate river bed with huge boulders and rocks strewn over the places where pleasant homes and fertile lands extended before.
"A rough estimate of the dead and missing is between three and four thousand. Not only was Huaraz affected, but also many Indian communities near by. Some of the brethren who are homeless are staying in the mission hall. We are doing what we can to relieve the suffering. The Lord is comforting sad hearts and sustaining all His children in a wonderful way."

## Your Offerings Have Helped

Another "returns to give thanks" of those whom we have helped from our War Emergency Fund. A missionary from Norway, working in Belgian Congo writes: "Thank you ever so much for the check received. It will be a good help to us. May the Lord richly bless you and those who serve Him in this way. I am very much down physically after a hard term of about seven years this time. It has been difficult since our land was taken and all connections with the dear ones at home broken. About a year and a half has gone by without any money coming in except a little from the war relief fund and a few small sums from others.
"We have kept up the mission work as usual till the end of this year, when we had to restrict it somewhat. The Lord has wonderfully blessed through the trials so that a number have accepted Jesus as their Saviour and about one hundred have been baptized. We will trust the Lord and be faithful to the end, and Jesus will come soon to receive us unto Himself."

## THE A B C OF SOUTH AMERICA

## H. C. Ball, Chile

It has been my happy privilege to locate in Chile, and then to visit and minister in Argentina and Brazil. These three countries, the most progressive of South America, are called the A B C of the continent.
First South American Pentecostal Congress
In Porto Alegre, southern Brazil, the first South American Pentecostal Congress was held from November 2 to 9. The Porto Alegre Assembly of God church is a very large one, having some 2400 members. The beautiful auditorium would grace any North American city. This is not the largest church in Brazil, however, as in Pernambuco there is a congregation of some 4500 members. In the convention representatives came from Chile, Argentina, Bolivia, but the majority were from Brazil. This was surely a time of spiritual quickening for the missionaries and native ministers.

## In Argentina

I visited Alice C. Wood, our veteran missionary in 25 de Mayo, Argentina, having three days of precious ministry there. This was the first time in my life to see a service start at 9:30 at night. I got the pulpit around 10:00. Such is the custom of the land that a service held earlier would be unattended. Night life is the curse of Argentina, and along with it goes overeating and much drinking of liquors. There has not been the response to the gospel in Argentina as in Brazil. I also preached in Buenos Aires (to several congregations), Bolivar, Henderson,

## Two Weeks' Meeting with the Dunbars

In Mendoza, near the Chilean border, I had the privilege of holding a two weeks' meeting with the Franklin Dunbars, missionaries from Oregon. The Dunbars have worked hard for years in Mendoza. Progress has been discouragingly slow, yet I feel that they have done as well as any other missionaries in Argentina. They have a precious band of believers, some thirty adults, and an equal number of children. The Holy Spirit has not yet been poured out upon the Mendoza church and they request prayer for a Pentecost.
In the morning services from day to day I noted an increase in attendance, in interest and in blessing upon the believers. Surely a glorious outpouring is not far away for Mendoza. We also held services in Miraflores in a mission among a very poor class of people. Some days I preached as often as four times. The Dunbars have built a very nice little chapel with a baptistry therein. Just before the close of the campaign three were baptized with water.

## Glad to Get Back to Chile

When I had crossed the high Andean range and saw the green valleys of Chile before me, I felt glad to get back where I felt the Lord had called us to labor. I had been away from home almost two full months. In my absence, wife and the children had done their best to carry on the work, and I found wife in a very much run-down condition because of the burdens. But, thank God, two had been saved in a little Bible school that our fourteen-year-old daughter, Myrna, holds each Tuesday afternoon.

## Oh, the Need of Poor Chile!

Besides helping in the native Chilean churches we are holding cottage and street meetings
and quite a few are interested, especially one family. The head of this family used to be drunk nearly every Sunday, but for the past two Sundays he has been sober, has had a bright look on his face, and his wife told us that he has been coming home early from work, has not spent his earnings on drink and has been a different man. Thank God! It seems to me that of all the Latin-American countries 1 have visited, Chile is more cursed than any other by the drink habit. Oh, the need, the spiritual need, of poor Chile! Beautiful to look at is Chile, but dark is her spiritual night. Pray for Chile that God will set many captives free from the chains of $\sin$ that bind.

## NOTES FROM WAR AREAS

The last letter received from Lula Ashmore brought encouraging news of God's working among the people in Malaya. She wrote:
"It was our joy some weeks ago to see ten believers follow the Lord through the waters of baptism. The youngest of the group was boy eight years old. He gathered up courage to enquire of us whether he might be baptized. He was questioned about his conversion and we found he had a very definite experience of salvation, and his knowledge of Bible truths was remarkable. He went away rejoicing to think that he-a child-was allowed to follow the Lord. Pray for our children, for the majority of them come from homes where idols are worshiped.
"Brother and Sister McKinney and children came up from Singapore to be present with us and to take charge of the baptismal service.
"One young couple who feel the call of God upon their hearts for the ministry were baptized. The man is a school teacher, and just as soon as his term closes he plans to give himself to Bible study and the ministry. The wife goes with me in home visitation and is a ready helper, praising God continually for giving her an opportunity to do some little thing for Him.
'Another young man has felt a call into the ministry and has already been a great help in our services. He needs our prayers.
"We praise God we are still having opportunity to give out the gospel, but each day holds its doubts as to how long the hand of war will be stayed. Pray that the hearts of the people of Malaya shall be stirred to the consciousness of their need of the living God."
On November 23 Leland Johnson wrote from the Philippines: "Enclosed is a snapshot of a meeting we held in San Fernando. We use our public address system each time we go out in evangelistic work. We should like to have two microphones instead of just the one, speaking through an interpreter necessitates handing the 'mike' back and forth between the two speakers, thus interrupting the speaking."
Let us pray that before long our missionaries and Filipino workers may continue the good work which was going on before the islands were involved in the war.

# Ms SUnDOU SCHOOL LEESSON 

## Reading and Obeying the Scriptures

Lesson for February 8. Lesson Text: Nehemiah 8 and 9 .

After Nehemiah had rebuilt the material walls of Jerusalem, he turned his attention to the spiritual. What was needed in order to strengthen the spiritual fibre of Israel? To hear and obey the law! Nehemiah was primarily a builder, promoter, and executive. Another man was more fitted for the job of expounding the Law than he-none other than Ezra, the scholar, student of the law, and writer. Consequently, Nehemiah gracefully withdraws into the background as Ezra, once again, steps into the limelight.
I. THE READING OF THE LAW.

Requested by the people. Observe that Nehemiah and Ezra apparently did not take the initiative in instituting this "Bible Conference." The people themselves "spake unto Ezra the scribe to bring the book of the law" and to read it. How wise was their action! They were coming into their own once more nationally and economically. But they realized that in order to be restored to God's favor they needed to give attention to God's written Law. If only individuals and nations today would realize that true progress, security, and peace, can only be had by respecting God's Word and obeying His will! Open to the people. The people were not forced to hear the Law. Their attendance was voluntary and due to genuine interest. Neither were any forbidden the privilege of hearing the Law. All who wished to hear and who had enough intelligence to understand were at liberty to hear. We are living in days when many who would like to hear God's Word cannot do so. Some are deprived of the privilege by godless political leaders, others by mercenary religious leaders who deliberately deprive their people of spiritual knowledge and keep them in ignorance in order to secure material gain and to make themselves seem indispensable to those over whom they have religious authority. How appreciative we in America should be, because we still are free to carry Bibles and worship openly!
Explained to the people. "So they read in the book in the law of God distinctly and gave the sense, and caused them to understand the reading." The Jews who came from Babylon no longer spoke Hebrew but Aramaic which resembled it. Therefore, the Law had to be translated from the Hebrew in which it was written into Aramaic. Then it was expounded or explained carefully. Here is an encouraging thought. Not all of us can be eloquent preachers and orators. We may not be able to sway audiences by our ability as speakers. But we all may have the privilege of studying the Word for ourselves and then explaining it as simply as possible to others. And, after all, that is a great and fruitful ministry. It is quite possible by means of oratory and cleverly narrated stories to arouse people emotionally, without necessarily bringing to their hearts, in any permanent sense, a portion of God's Word. But we shall never miss the mark if we stick to the Word and explain it as simply as possible to others.

## II. THE HEARING OF THE LAW.

Preacher and people both have a responsibility. It is up to the preacher to speak with inspiration, anointing, coherence, and direction. Then it is up to the people to be inspiring listeners. Observe that these people were-

Reverent. "And Ezra opened the book
and when he opened it all the people stood up." What beautiful and instinctive reverence! If we were afforded the privilege of a personal audience with the President of our country, how very respectful and courteous we should be! Why is it then that so many people show disrespect for God by talking, whispering, wool-gathering, and general indifference, when His sacred and personal Word is being read to them?

Attentive and Hungry. "And he read . . . from the morning until midday before the men and women and those that could understand . . . and the people were attentive unto the book." For six hours the people listened! And they were more interested in the book than the preacher, more concerned with the message than the messenger. What a rebuke these people are to people

who see the preacher but ignore the message, to people who get restless if the sermon is more than twenty minutes in length!

Responsive. "And all the people answered, Amen, Amen, with lifting up their hands."
"Amens" which are voiced because one has been "Amens" which are voiced because one has been told to voice them and "amens" which are spoken because they have become a mechanical habit may not mean much and often mean less than nothing. But a spontaneous "amen" which is spoken because the Word has impressed the heart is sweet incense in the nostrils of God-and a big help to the preacher. May the day never come when the Word, which sends angelic hosts into paeans of praise, will fail to elicit any verbal response from God's redeemed!

## III. THE EFFECTS OF THE READING.

The people wept. "For all the people wept, when they heard the words of the law." Tears which are the effect of hearing God's Word and which are followed by action are more valuable than pearls. Why did the people weep? (1) Because they saw their sins and short-comings. What a blessing! And unless we daily look into the mirror of the Word, we shall be ignorant of the blemishes and defects which have accumulated about our spiritual appearance. (2)

Because they heard all the promises of blessings which they had missed because of their sin and negligence.

The people rejoiced. Sorrow is all right as far as it goes; but it is not to become a permanent characteristic of true religion. Sorrow should lead to immediate repentance and then turn to joy; it should not only cause us to see our $\sin$ but to turn to our Saviour! Therefore, Nehemiah told the people they were to turn from sorrow and to rejoice in the Lord, which rejoicing was their strength. Note that Nehemiah did not say, "Joy is your strength," but "the joy of the Lord is your strength." Natural joy is temporary, based upon circumstances and conditions, often has an element of sorrow in it. The "joy of the Lord" is spiritual joy, which is permanent, not based upon conditions or circumstances, but the fruit of personal relationship with God and occupation with Him.
The people ministered. "And all the people went their way to eat... and to send portions." Their joy was not to be selfish. True enjoyment of God will always lead to unselfish, disinterested service. Joy which does not is counterfeit.
The people confessed. Chapter 9:1-3. For eight consecutive days the Word was read (See $8: 18$ ) and on the eighth day a solemn fast day was called. In real heartfelt contrition the people
confessed their sins. In verses $4-38$ the Levites prayed a fervent prayer which contained an acknowledgement of God's faithfulness to Israel in times past and their persistent and repeated failure and disobedience.
The people reconsecrated. Ch. 9:2 and ch. 10 . Said Spurgeon, "One may understand like at. angel, and yet live like the devil." Hearing the Word, weeping, confessing, etc., is
worse than useless unless followed by consecrated action. It is obedience that counts. See James $1: 22$; Matt. $7: 21$. The people resolutely turned from their sins, separated themselves from unholy alliances and relationships, made a written covenant which was signed by their leaders, which covenant stated that they would keep the law, keep the Sabbath, keep separate, and support the temple and the priesthood. Such covenants made today and kept by Christians everywhere would undoubtedly bring about an unprecedented outpouring of God's Spirit! -J. Bashford Bishop
